And, she was first runner up in the queen's contest at the national finals rodeo.

Jeane's championship performance was on Codi, a sorrel quarter horse. She has

Coach Names Offense Unit

Quarterback Dewain Nix will lead the Colorado Wolves into battle in their first varsity game at 8 p.m. Friday against Monahans at Monahans. Coach Weldon Brevard announced Saturday.

The announcement was made following a scrimmage Friday night against Haskell. Haskell scored twice against the Wolves while the Wolves tallied only once.

Other members slated to start offensively for the Wolves Friday night include Larry Dearen at fullback; Skip Maines, I-back; either Wayne Banks or Bob Benson at wingback; Dean Brooks at split end; Jerry Boyd at left end; John Ridge at left guard; either Carl Guelker or Scott Hudson at strongside guard; Skett Kimbrell, outside tackle; Gene Hunt, inside tackle, and Larry Kinard, center.

As yet Brevard is not certain on the starters on defense but said those who will start on defense include Larry Kinard, Mark Waldrip and Bob Benson.

The defense looked spotty against Haskell, Brevard said. The defense intercepted four passes, two by Waldrip who returned the ball to a point that would have given the Wolves good field position had the contest been a regular game.

Each team ran 55 plays on defense and 55 on offense Friday night.

Brevard said the team had a bad week in practice last week and the team will undergo some rugged workouts this next week as they prepare to meet the Monahans team.

The team worked out Saturday afternoon and Brevard has scheduled two workouts for

Monday. One workout at 10 a.m. Monday will include viewing of a film made of the scrimmage against Haskell Friday night. The regular afternoon workout will begin at 3 p.m.

Films and scouting reports indicate Monahans has a real quick and aggressive team, di-

rected by a sound quarterback, Brevard pointed out.

The "B" team also scrimmaged at Haskell Friday night, but only for a short time, Brevard said. However, he said he was pleased with the "B" team as they moved the ball well and surrendered little yardage to

the Haskell "B" team offense.

The "B" team is to go into regular season action about 7:30 p.m. Thursday against Coahoma at Wolf Stadium. The ninth grade team will battle Travis of Snyder ninth grade beginning at 5:50 p.m. Thursday at Wolf Stadium.

1 To Prison, 3 Charged

Man Accused In Shotgun Shooting

Three felony criminal charges have been filed in Justice of Peace Leonard Henderson's

Precinct 1 Court as aftermath of a shooting and disturbance last week.

Manuel Vasquez Del Real, 29, Colorado City, is defendant in an assault to murder charge, accusing him with shooting Pedro Martinez, 29, of Big Spring with a shotgun.

Del Real was arrested by officers in 1700 block of Plum street address Aug. 28, where Martinez received a wound that sent him to the hospital.

However, Martinez received more than a shotgun wound. He is accused in a felony criminal charge with possession of a narcotic drug, marijuana.

Tommy Costillo, 28, of Colorado City is charged with possession of an instrument used in smoking a narcotic drug.

Costillo was taken into custody after police answered a call for help from Mrs. Lupe Martinez, 949 East 15th St.

Costillo and another man were arrested as they left the Martinez house by the back door early morning Aug. 28. Police reported that a pipe was found in a car parked in the drive at the residence.

A 3-year prison term was handed Brigida deLaCruz in 32nd District Court this week when he pleaded guilty to a Loraine burglary.

District Judge Weldon Kirk allowed the defendant credit for time in jail since last May 29.

De LaCruz was discovered in the J. Wiley Walker home last Feb. 28 when the Walkers returned home from Sunday

morning church service.

Walker heard a noise upon entering his residence and observed a person in the attic. Constable Lawrence Graham and the late Jack Walker were

summoned to the Walker home and the three found deLaCruz hiding in the attic.

Only a few minor items had been taken in the interrupted burglary.

This could be a great time saver to suffering mankind and a boon to service stations everywhere as soon as they learned to freeze noses and toes while checking the oil and cleaning the windshield.

THOSE scientists from Israel generously admitted that the concept was kin to the ancient Chinese belief that sticking needles in one part of the human body can heal a pain in some other part.

Americans had rather have

one needle stuck in the arm--or somewhere. Still, a famous American columnist wrote a series of articles declaring that needles in his legs - or somewhere-- absolutely stopped the pain in his stomach.

Wonder if it might work just as well to freeze the elbow to banish an attack of lumbago?

CAN'T help but wonder here, too, if Mr. Nixon had a secret preview of the claims of how freezing toes works wonders.

Could be that he allowed as how if freezing a toe could cure a cold in Israel, freezing wages and prices all over America could cure all this country's ailments and make us all well, rich, and happy.

Am not one to question the President's motives. Am just a little confused about whether or not freezing pocketbooks will really cure his headaches... along with the national epidemic of headaches already yours and mine.

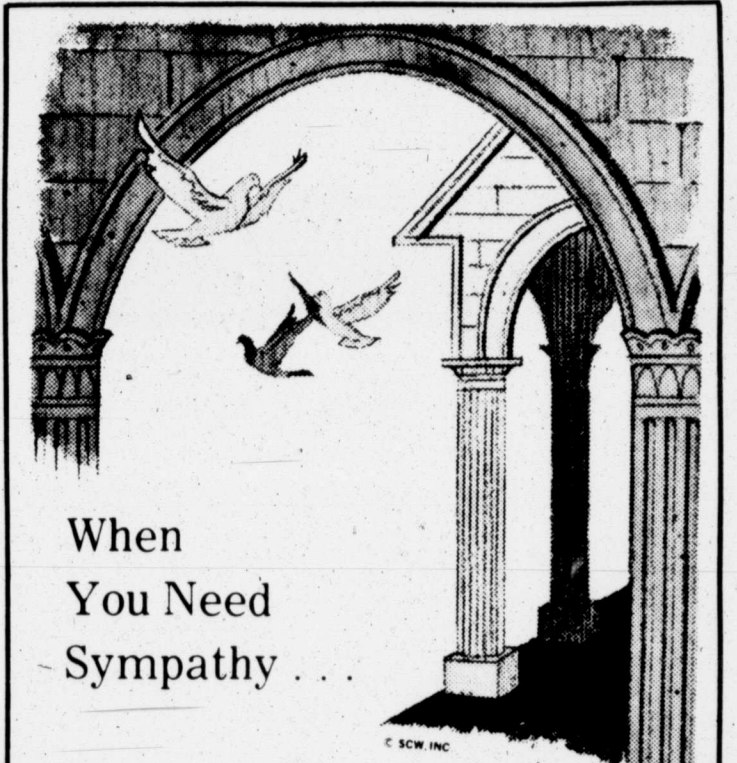

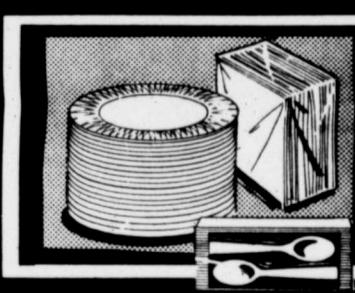
