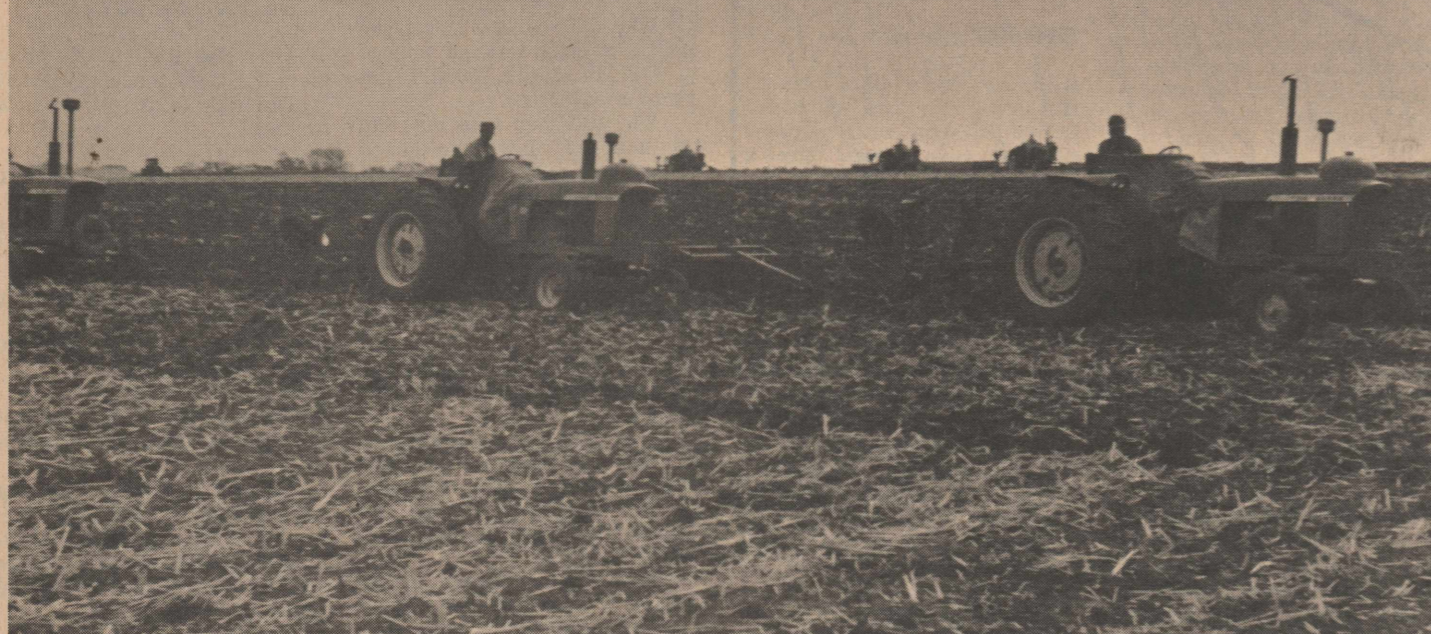

Area Farmers Lend A Helping Hand



TRACTORS WERE WORKING Monday on the Harlan Carson farms here, helping Carson to get his land worked after having spent much of his time in Houston, where his daughter, Kondi, is hospitalized. Thirteen tractors were on one farm, while there were six plowing at the other farm.

It has been said that "a friend in need is a friend indeed" and Olton residents proved this to be very true this week, when they came to the aid of fellow Oltonite, who has been unable to get his land worked because of the illness of his little daughter.

Harlan Carson, who has been spending as much time as possible at Houston with his daughter, Kondi, who has been ill for about six months and hospitalized for about the past four weeks, found the true meaning of friendship when fellow farmers came to help him get his land plowed Monday.

A host of friends, neighbors and hired hands got together that morning at the Carson farms and by 5:30 in the afternoon, the entire 180 acres which Carson farms had been disced, deep-plowed and gone over with a clod buster.

At the suggestion of Larry Witten, the farmers pulled their machinery onto the farm early Monday morning and before the

day was over there were 13 tractors plowing on the farm located about 5 miles north and 2 east of town and there were six tractors working the land located southeast of town about two miles.

During the lunch hour, tractors didn't stop rolling, as there were enough men to relieve the drivers while they ate lunch prepared at the Willie Green home by Mrs. Green, Mrs. Gene Cottrell, and Mrs. Walter Malone and Mrs. John Smoot. Food for the lunch was donated by

Jesse's Super Save. Those working southeast of town were invited to eat at Hamill's Restaurant without charge.

During the afternoon, Olton Butane Company came out with their trucks and serviced the tractors with fuel. The farmers furnishing tractors supplied the remaining fuel needed.

Jim Bartlett Recalls Events Of USS Forrestal Disaster

A serviceman from Olton was one of 5000 aboard the USS Forrestal the date fate dealt her a blow that cost the lives of approximately 132 of her crew.

Jim Bartlett, 24-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Bonnie J. Bartlett, former Olton residents, now making their home in Austin, had just left the flight deck of the ship when the first of a series of explosions took place on that unforgettable day of July 29.

Bartlett, who is the nephew of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Fuller, said that it was later assumed that a jet aircraft which was preparing for take-off apparently had a "hot start" (gas caught fire), hit a missile and caused a chain reaction of explosions among the airplanes that were in a horseshoe formation on the flight deck.

The planes were manned and ready for take-off. That fact, along with the fact that the night crew which was sleeping directly beneath the flight deck was trapped, caused the large death toll.

"When we heard the word 'FIRE' we went topside -- that is we started to -- when another explosion blew me against the catwalk or side of the deck. Fire was everywhere. . . there was no ceiling to it, it reached forever," was the description Bartlett gave of the disaster.

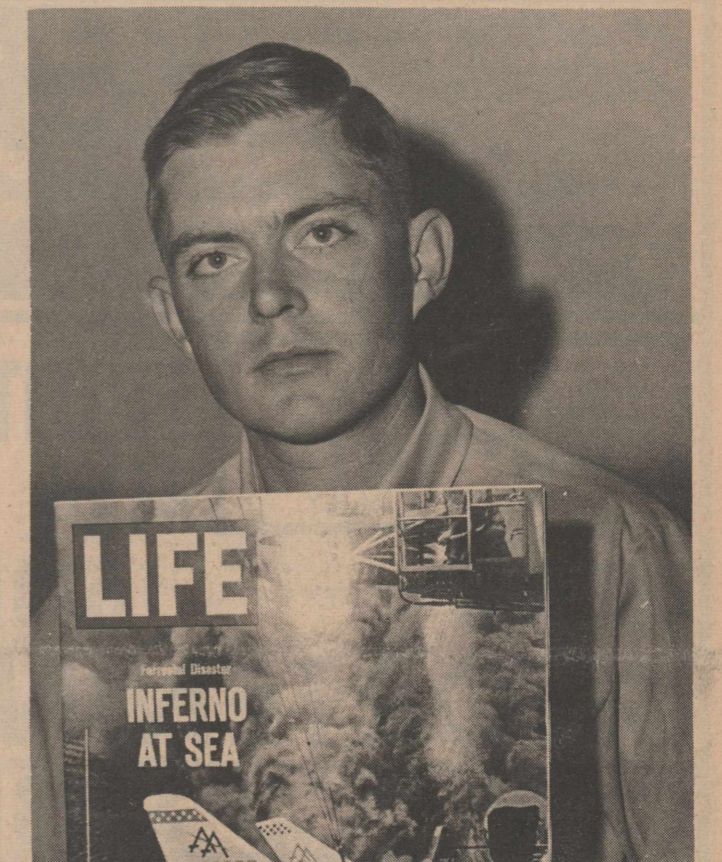
He described the flight deck as being about the length of three football fields.

"A big hole was blown through the flight deck floor and the night crew was trapped. The heat was so intense that the men got into the showers and turned on the cold water in order to stay alive. But the water got so hot it actually just boiled them. They didn't have a chance."

"There was one member of the night crew, who had gone to the post office on the ship to pay a one cent postage due on a letter from his girlfriend. He was the only survivor of the night crew."

Most of the fire hoses were blown to pieces by the explosions according to Bartlett and they were hampered in fighting the fire until other ships in the area were radioed and came to help fight the blaze.

"From the time of the first explosion until the fire was completely out was a total of 18 hours. Also three days later

when we pulled into Subic Bay, Philippines, mattresses were still smoldering," recalled Bartlett.

Bartlett's buddy was one of the men who was on the flight deck directing planes for take off when the accident occurred and was killed by the first explosion.

Bartlett had just been relieved for lunch and had only had time to walk down one deck, fill his plate and sit down when the fire started. He stated that the time of the accident might very well have been a contributing factor to his life being spared.

Known as a "blue shirt", it was his duty to assist in chaining and unchaining the planes before take-off and after landing.

He reported aboard the USS Forrestal on New Year's eve and at the time of the fire, the ship was located about 150 miles off the coast of North Vietnam, in the Gulf of Tonkin.

The ship is now in "dry dock", where she is being re-

paired. Approximately the last quarter of the ship was cut off and are building a new one. The entire ship where the fire was, was completely worthless.

"The whole crew acted more than admirably," was the comment the captain and admiral had following the ordeal.

Bartlett said that his chief, Farrell, was recommended for the Congressional Medal of Honor, for attempting to keep the fire down by running out with an extinguisher trying to keep other bombs from exploding. However, he was unsuccessful and they blew up in his face and no trace of him was ever found.

The surviving men made up a collection for the widows and orphans of the men who gave their lives on that day. A scrapbook was compiled of all news stories and pictures and given to the men who donated to the fund.

Bartlett received his discharge Oct. 27 from the Navy and will be entering Texas State University in Austin soon.

Funeral Services Held For Jimmy Moss Today

Services were held today, Feb. 1 for Jimmy Max Moss, 25, of Wellington, former resident of Olton, Rites were held at 2 p. m. in Main Street Church of Christ with Morgan Sturgess of Wellington, ministers of the Church of Christ officiating. Moss was born April 14,

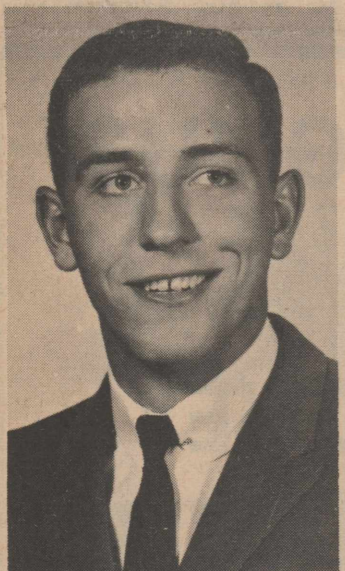
1942 in Brownfield. He graduated from Olton High School in 1960 and from Texas Tech in 1966. He was married to the former Penny Rogers Dec. 23, 1962 in Tulia.

Moss's death Tuesday, Jan. 30, followed a seven-week illness. He was a power use advisor for the Greenbelt Electric Co-op of Wellington where he had lived for one and one-half years.

He is survived by his wife, Penny; two daughters, Melanie D'Lynn and M'Linda Gem of the home; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. K. L. Moss; one brother, K. E. Moss of Perryton; one sister, Jonetta Moss of Wichita Falls and grandmothers, Mrs. J. O. Bledsoe of Olton and Mrs. S. B. Moss of Mangum, Okla.

Interment was in Olton Cemetery under the direction of Parsons Funeral Home.

New Car License Go On Sale Today

Vehicle registration plates for 1968 will go on sale Thursday at the tax assessor-collector's office in Littlefield and at Loveless Appliance in Olton.

The new plates, which have white letters on a black background - the reverse of the color scheme for 1967 - must be on all vehicles operated over public streets, roads and highways by midnight April 1.

A new feature of the 1968 plates will be the word HemisFair imprinted across the bottom of the plates. It is thought to be the first time a promotional slogan has appeared on Texas vehicle license plates.

Herbert Dunn, county tax assessor-collector reminds all vehicle owners that Texas law requires them to bring the titles

to their vehicles when they register their vehicles.

License fees have been changed this year. The registration law, as amended by the 1967 Legislature, established a \$5.30 minimum fee for all vehicles, including boat trailers. New passenger car fees are: \$12.50 for cars up to 3,500 pounds; \$22.30 from 3,501 to 4,500 pounds; \$30.30 from 4,501 to 6,000 pounds, and 55 cents for each 1,000 pounds over 6,000.

Herbert Dunn, County Tax Assessor-Collector, reminds motorists that Texas law requires a person to present his or her title to the Tax Collector when registering vehicles.

Vehicles may be registered only from titles and not from the previous year's receipt.

Recipe Of The Week

Sue is a member of the Mustang Band and O. H. S. Choir. She is active in FTA and FHA and serves the latter as treasurer. She has been active in 4-H work.

CHOCOLATE CHEESE PIE

1 6 oz. pkg. semi-sweet chocolate pieces
1 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese, softened
1/2 c. brown sugar
1/4 c. granulated sugar
1/8 tsp. salt
1 tsp. vanilla
2 eggs, separated
1 2 oz. pkg. dessert topping mix

CHOCOLATE GRAHAM CRUST

Mix thoroughly 1 1/2 cups graham cracker crumbs, 1/4 cup brown sugar, 1/8 tsp. nutmeg, 1/3 cup melted butter and 1 - 1 oz. square unsweetened chocolate, melted. Press into 9 inch pie pan. Chill until firm.

9 inch chilled graham cracker crust (recipe follows)

Melt chocolate over hot water; cool. Blend cream cheese, granulated sugar, and 1/4 cup brown sugar, salt and vanilla. Beat in egg yolks, one at a time. Beat in cooled chocolate. Blend well.

Beat egg whites until stiff but not dry. Gradually beat in 1/4 cup brown sugar; beat until stiff and glossy.

Prepare topping mix as directed on package.

Fold chocolate mixture into beaten whites; fold in topping mix.

Pour into chilled crust, reserving 1/4 of mixture for decorating. Chill until filling sets slightly. Decorate with remaining mixture. Chill overnight. Makes 8 servings.

HOT TUNA BOATS

6 hard rolls
1 8 oz. jar cheez-whiz
1 6 1/2 or 7 oz. can tuna
1/2 cup chopped celery
1 small onion, chopped

Slice off tops of rolls. Partially hollow out and discard crumbs. Mix remaining ingredients and pile into "boats." Place on broiler pan. Broil about 7 minutes, using reversible rack, offset up. Garnish with sliced tomatoes.

CHOCOLATE SKILLET CAKE

1/2 c. cocoa
1/2 c. cold water
1 1/2 c. sifted flour
1 tsp. soda
1/2 tsp. salt
1 c. brown sugar firmly packed
1/2 c. shortening
3 eggs
1/2 c. buttermilk
1 tsp. vanilla
4 - 1 oz. milk chocolate bars

Add cold water to cocoa gradually and mix well. Sift together flour, soda and salt in a large bowl of electric mixer and add brown sugar. Add chocolate mixture, shortening, un-beaten eggs and 1/4 cup buttermilk and beat 3 minutes. Add vanilla and remaining 1/4 cup buttermilk and beat 2 minutes. Line bottom of electric skillet with household aluminum foil. Pour batter on foil. Divide milk chocolate bars into squares and arrange on top of batter. Cover and set controls at 275 deg. Bake about 30 minutes or until cake is just done. Serve from skillet either warm with whipped cream or plain or may be served cold.

This cake may be baked in a skillet or surface unit of electric range on low setting for about 40 minutes.

Spotlight On Senior Citizens

Friends For 50 Years

"We came to the plains together, even made our home together for the first two years and have been inseparable friends for over 50 years, so we decided we'd better tell our story together," was the thoughts expressed by Mrs. Annie Bostick and Mrs. Ocie Holland.

Annie, born July 11, 1894 in Lipan, Hood County, Texas, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Holley, was reared at Lipan and attended school there until the eighth grade.

Ocie, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. B. Bostick Sr., was born June 19, 1893 in Stephenville, Erath County, Texas and attended school at Lincolnville.

Annie was married to Tom Bostick, a cousin of Ocie's, Jan. 3, 1914 at Lipan, having met him when he came from Oklahoma to farm near Lipan.

After their marriage, they moved to Lingerville County where Mr. and Mrs. Marion Holland, who were married Aug. 28, 1910 at Lingerville, were making their home.

In 1915 the two couples loaded their wagons and started toward Plainview. Stopping at Rule about a month, the picked cotton, then moved on, stopping where night fell on them.

Mrs. Holland remembers, "We had old iron skillets and we cooked our biscuits and would eat, then got in our 'over-jets' (beds built up in the wagons) and go to sleep."

"We lived in a little shack with corn piled at one end for about a month and cooked for 10 people, while we were picking cotton in Haskell County," said Mrs. Bostick.

After arriving at Valley View, where they bought land later, the couples made their home together for two years on the Bob Norfleet place.

Mrs. Holland recalled that she said every day for three years, "You can stay here if you want to, but I'm not staying."

"I was used to going to church every Sunday at Stephenville and there wasn't any church or for that fact, any neighbors -- nobody except maybe you would see a cowboy riding through his herd every once in a while. I sure didn't like it."

Mrs. Holland said they would come to town about once a week to get groceries and get mail at Running Water for a while. There wasn't a doctor any closer than Plainview.

Mrs. Bostick recalled having some cattle shipped out here about a year after the families moved out to the Plains.

"My daddy had given me a Jersey cow, so I sent for her and her calf and a yearling to be shipped out here."

The Hollands were parents of a boy, Price, who was three years old when the families moved out to Plainview. In 1915 Arvella Bostick was born and Ruby Lee Sherman was born while the family was living on the Ellis Jones place.

During the 1920 flu epidemic, the Hollands were all with the disease.

Mrs. Holland is a charter member of the Valley View Baptist Church which organized in 1922. The Methodist organized in 1924, Hollands attended the Valley View Church until 1950 then became members of the Hart Church after they bought land located north of Olton. They lived there until 1962 when they moved into the town of Olton. Mr. Holland died in 1964.

They are parents of two children, Price and Ruby Lee; four grandchildren, Wayne Holland of Lubbock and Gayle, high school student at Plainview; Kay Sherman Featheringill, of Midland and Rusty, a senior at Texas Tech; and four great grandchildren.

A son, Vernon Bostick, was born to Annie and Tom after moving to the Plains. The Bosticks had two children, and three grandchildren, Carol Ann, Rita Sue and Tommy.

Children of Mr. and Mrs. Holland and Mr. and Mrs. Bostick were educated at Olton, graduated from Olton and Price and Arvella attended Texas Tech and got their degrees, later teaching at Westside school.

Memories of Annie and Ocie include Annie's raising 240 turkeys one year in order to pay cash for a new Chevrolet car; snow storms in which cattle froze to death or when the snow drifted so high you couldn't get out; colder weather; and going into Plainview for winter supplies.

"We would take two or three days when going for winter supplies. We'd get a load of coal, dry goods and groceries. One time when my husband was coming back from Plainview, deep chug holes were so bad, they had to unload the wagon to get to Running Water," said Ocie.

They recalled when Olton had a plank building for a court house and when it burned down they remembered that the father of Luis and Bailey Hair used to operate a grocery store in Olton; and that the post office at Running Water was "in some lady's house"; that there were no graded roads, they would just "take off across the prairie and go through cattle guards to get where we were going."

For someone who wasn't "going to stay", Mrs. Holland has come to love the country and the people and Mrs. Bostick agrees with her completely.

FHA will be active during the week of the Stock Show, exhibiting articles each person has made. Also in March, will be the FHA area meeting.

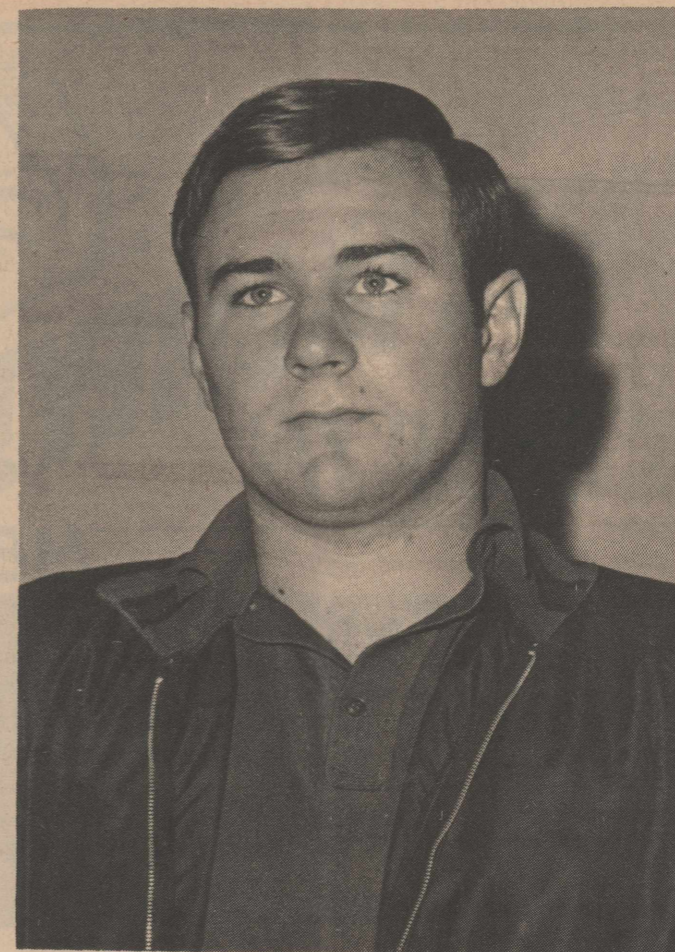
In April, FHA Week will be in "full swing." Also some of the girls will go to the State Convention.

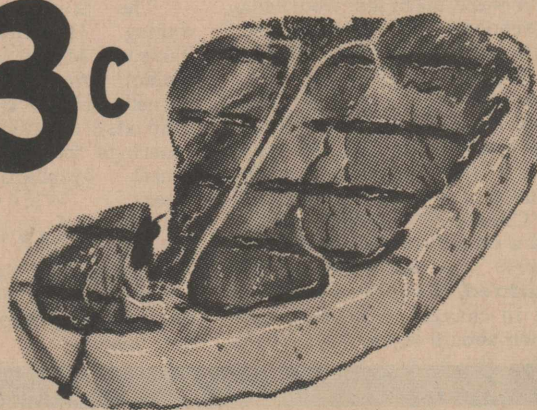
