



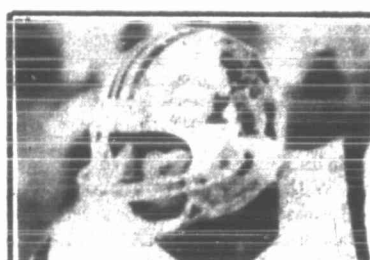

30-year term set for murder

Joe Angel Martinez, 22, was expected to accept a 30-year prison term today for the murder of an 80-year-old Big Spring woman instead of letting a jury decide his fate.

A plea bargain arrangement was agreed to this morning and was scheduled for action by Judge James Gregg of the 118th District

Court this afternoon, District Attorney Rick Hamby said.

Hamby said Martinez of 808 Magnolia will serve 30 years at the Texas Department of Corrections. The same sentence given his accomplice, Jorge Loy Chavana, 22, of 817 W. Eighth by a jury last month.

"We plea bargained based on what the jury thinks the sentence should be worth," Hamby said.

Martinez is represented by Javier Alvarez of Lubbock.

Both men entered guilty pleas to the separate murder charges in district court last November. At that time, they requested that separate juries decide their punishment.

They were indicted by Howard County grand jurors last April for murdering Maurine Terrell in her in March.

She died on March 8 in Lubbock General Hospital from head injuries suffered during the attack at her home three days earlier.

Chavana told jurors last December that it was Martinez who struck the blows that killed Terrell.

The murderers had entered Terrell's home to search for money, Chavana testified. Chavana was acquainted with Terrell from

previous household jobs he had conducted for her.

Big Spring police arrested the defendants two weeks after the assault following an investigation by department detectives.

Detectives said at the time of the defendants' arrest that a motive for the killing was theft or burglary. Less than \$10 in costume jewelry and cash was taken, according to police reports.

Seatbelt violators ticketed

DALLAS (AP) — At least 6,000 motorists statewide — including 41 in Howard County by Department of Public Safety officers — were cited in December for violation of Texas' new mandatory seat belt law, authorities say.

Although statewide figures have yet to be tabulated, DPS spokesman David Wells said troopers issued an estimated 4,000 citations for seat belt violations in December, the first month the law has been enforced.

Sgt. Frank Woodall of the DPS office here said his department was not stopping cars to check if seatbelts are being used. "We look for it when we make a traffic stop for something else," he said.

"We know there were about 800 issued the first week of December, and that the number of violations really picked up during the holidays," Wells said. "Most people are doing what they're supposed to, but as you can see, there are quite a few who've been caught."

Libya warns of reprisal inside U.S.

TRIPOLI, Libya (AP) — Col. Moammar Khadafy said Libya is in a "state of war" ready to repulse any attack from U.S. warships in the Mediterranean, and warned that an onslaught would be answered by attacks inside America, the Libyan news agency reported.

Khadafy also was quoted as referring to President Reagan as an "Israeli dog."

JANA, the state-owned news agency, quoted Khadafy as saying Libya almost went to war Saturday with the United States, which accuses Libya of abetting the Palestinian group it blames for the airport raids that killed 19 people, including five Americans, in Rome and Vienna on Dec. 27.

"The U.S.A. mobilized yesterday no less than 40 warships in front of Libya and we have considered this a state of war and have announced the state of preparedness in the air and

naval forces and air defense," JANA quoted Khadafy as telling reporters Sunday at a farm project outside Tripoli.

Pentagon officials denied Khadafy's charge.

"It would be physically impossible for us to put 40 ships off of Libya," said a Navy source in Washington, who spoke on condition of anonymity. "There are only about 20 ships in the 6th Fleet normally, and that includes everything. There are only about 15 combatant ships in the (Mediterranean)."

On Friday, the aircraft carrier Coral Sea led a task force of seven ships out of Naples, Italy, into the Mediterranean. U.S. Navy sources said the ships were ending a holiday port call and were on routine patrol Sunday.

According to JANA, Khadafy said Sunday: "Actually, yesterday we were ready to fight." He said the forces of his North

African Arab nation were on full alert, and the alert would end only "when the American and Zionist threat is removed."

"If America commits aggression against us, then we will commit aggression against it, inside America itself," JANA quoted Khadafy as saying. "And if America or the Israelis do any harm to any Palestinian living in Libya, we will do harm to American and Israeli citizens in their own places."

Khadafy's reference to Reagan as a "dog" — considered one of the worst possible insults by Arab Moslems — was in the complete Arabic text of remarks he made at his Sunday news conference. It was not contained in a French language text released earlier by JANA.

The Arab text as reported by JANA, monitored in Nicosia, Cyprus, said:

"Reagan discredited America because he became an Israeli

dog, and, it is not good for the president of America to become an Israeli dog. What happened at the Rome and Vienna airports is against Israel. Why did the Americans interfere to threaten us?"

Israel and the United States have accused Libya of abetting the Abu Nidal Palestinian faction, which they blame for the airport massacres, and have called for worldwide sanctions against Khadafy's government. However, Khadafy on Sunday said Abu Nidal does not live in Libya, although he said he has seen him there and abroad in the past year.

In London, The Sunday Times newspaper quoted unidentified Israeli intelligence sources as saying that Libyan and Syrian agents had actually carried out the terrorist raids, using Abu Nidal's name "as a cover."

New law seen as peril to defense buildup

WASHINGTON (AP) — A new balanced budget law will wipe out President Reagan's defense buildup in two years, sending the United States "marching down the mountain we have been marching up," says the chairman of the House Armed Services Committee.

Rep. Les Aspin, D-Wis., released a study Sunday in which he contended the balanced budget law approved by Congress and signed by Reagan last month will force deep cuts in military spending.

"This isn't just tinkering at the edges of the defense budget," Aspin said. "It means we are reversing the defense buildup of the last few years. We are marching down the mountain we have

been marching up."

He said the deficit reduction law will force up to \$83 billion in defense cuts in the next two years, resulting in a 20 percent reduction in Reagan's planned military spending for fiscal 1987.

"(Defense Secretary) Caspar Weinberger, who has prided himself on presiding over the greatest defense buildup in peacetime history is about to preside over the greatest defense cutback in peacetime history," Aspin said.

Aspin said that projections beyond fiscal 1987, which ends on Sept. 30, 1987, are "lousy," but the law is likely to continue to cause defense spending decreases.

Named for its principal sponsors, Republican Sens. Phil Gramm of Texas and Warren Rudman of New Hampshire, the law sets deficit limits for each fiscal year through 1990 and requires that the federal budget be balanced by fiscal 1991.

The bill permits Congress to make the reductions through conventional legislation, but would impose automatic spending cuts for each of the fiscal years through 1991 if Congress and the White House failed to agree on a reduction plan.

The deficit for fiscal 1985 was \$211.9 billion.

Aspin said his analysis shows that defense budget authority will be cut by 5 percent to 6 percent in

the current fiscal year.

In fiscal 1987, he said, defense outlays will drop to about \$245 billion and budget authority to about \$260 billion. Congressionally approved military spending for the current fiscal year stands at \$297 billion when separate legislation for military construction is included.

Under Gramm-Rudman, Aspin said, "defense will lose \$15 billion to \$18 billion in budget authority this year and \$64 billion to \$65 billion in fiscal 1987 — a total of \$79 billion to \$83 billion."

"And Gramm-Rudman doesn't stop forcing cutbacks until 1991," Aspin said. "In other words, Gramm-Rudman could give us a

defense budget that Jimmy Carter would assail as a threat to our national security."

And he said that after the current fiscal year, the administration will lose all flexibility on where to make reductions.

"The administration will have to make equal cuts down to the level of individual line items: F-16s, 155mm artillery shells, FFF-7 class frigates," Aspin said.

Reagan agreed to no growth in military spending for the current fiscal year in exchange for a congressional pledge to permit 3 percent increases, over the rate of inflation, for fiscal 1987 and 1988.

Orchid lover makes rare find

DALLAS (AP) — James Curtis is an orchid lover, but the one he found languishing in a parks department greenhouse two years ago was like nothing he'd ever

seen. An expert proved him correct, identifying the plant as an Epidendrum platyphyllum, a South American variety that had been mentioned in the botanical literature just once.

"That is only time he (the expert) could find this species cited in orchid history, and orchids are a very well-recorded type of plant," said Curtis, a production supervisor for the parks department greenhouse at Crawford Park.

Because the flower is one of a kind, Curtis had the honor of naming it. He chose "Dallas."

"I was very excited because I had never had anything that rare," Curtis said. "Speaking in terms of an orchid grower who is interested in preserving the species, I was excited at having something to share with other orchid growers."

The plant was nearly dead when Curtis first saw it, soon after he went to work for the city of Dallas, but he nursed it back to health.

Since then, the Dallas orchid has doubled in size and produced distinctive chartreuse blooms three times. Last fall, the plant won an internationally recognized award at an orchid show in Wichita

Falls.

With its health intact and reputation assured, the Dallas orchid has become a hothouse superstar, Curtis said. Growers and orchid lovers frequently stop by the greenhouse in southeast Dallas to get a look at the plant and to request seedlings for transplanting.

To meet the demand, Curtis postponed the plant after this year's blooming.

"It's really very important to me for these seeds to develop," he said. "I feel some pressure as a plant lover and an orchid lover to keep it going. I'd hate to lose it to posterity."

But were it not for Curtis' labor of love, the rare orchid would have been lost forever. The plant was cached in an illegal shipment from South America that was seized by the Department of Agriculture several years ago. For months, the plant languished in a government warehouse, then was donated to the city.

"It was in terrible shape," said Curtis, who found the dormant, wilted orchid hidden among other potted plants at the greenhouse.

"I had no idea what it was, and I had to wait for it to bloom to figure out what I had," he said. "Even when it did a year later, I still didn't know what I had, which is not surprising because no one else did."

Minister Shimon Peres, appearing on NBC's "This Week With David Brinkley" on Sunday, said "I think it was really carried out by Abu Nidal. I think it was supported by the Libyans."

In the event of an attack, Khadafy was quoted as telling reporters, "we can reach any place, not with aircraft carriers nor with the bombers, but with suicide" squads.

"I meant it when I said that we will operate on the streets of America," JANA quoted him as saying. However, he reportedly said that U.S. citizens living in Libya "are our guests and they will not be harmed."

Earlier Sunday, ABC and NBC quoted Khadafy as denying that Palestinian terrorists are being trained in Libya, but saying he would harbor anti-Israeli commands if they need training camps.

"If they demand this I will give

them (bases) because they are freedom fighters, but they have no need to establish camps in Libya, which is far from their field of battle in Palestine," the Libyan leader was quoted as saying.

Khadafy would not answer directly when asked if the terrorists who staged the near-simultaneous raids near El Al Israel Airlines counters in Rome and Vienna had come from Libya.

"Attacks on passengers at airports are unlawful actions as far as we are concerned," he was quoted as saying. "But as far as the Palestinians are concerned, some see that as legitimate action."

On Sunday, sources at the Arab League in Tunis, Tunisia said the 21-nation group of Arab nations has vowed "total support" for Libya in the event of a U.S. or Israeli attack. Egypt, a U.S. ally in the Middle East, was suspended from the group after signing a 1979 peace treaty with Israel.

without their belts."

"If a trooper sees a seat belt blatantly dangling by the driver, then he'll stop him. But usually, most of our citations have come from troopers who've stopped someone for speeding, drunk driving, or something," Wells told the Dallas Times Herald.

"We treat it just as we would any other traffic violation. It's not uncommon for a (Dallas) officer to stop someone just for not wearing a seat belt," police Capt. W.R. Patterson said of the 2,108 citations

issued in Dallas. Figures for seat belt citations issued by Big Spring police were unavailable this morning.

Woodall said front seat traffic deaths countywide dropped 32 percent in September, the first month the new Texas seatbelt law went into effect. For this reason, Woodall said his department wholeheartedly backs the new law. Enforcement of the new law did not begin until Dec. 1.

Woodall said that to a large extent people in this area are buckling up.

Fire damages motel room

Fire swept through a room at the Motel 9, 704 E. Third St. Sunday night causing an estimated \$2,000 damage, according to the fire department.

Units were dispatched at 11:12 p.m. Upon arrival, firemen found a room on the building's west wing engulfed by fire with flames rolling

out the door and window. The room's occupant, Larry Hunt, had left the scene and was uninjured in the blaze, said Assistant Fire Chief Burr Lea Settles. Settles said the blaze appeared to be started by a burning cigarette.

The motel is owned by B. Bhakta.

Estes rape charge dropped

ABILENE (AP) — Rape charges were dropped today against convicted swindler Billie Sol Estes as the case was moving to trial.

Medical evidence led to the decision, said Taylor County District Attorney Jorge Solis.

He said a test conducted after the alleged rape showed the presence of sperm in the woman.

"We asked the defendant to submit to a medical examination by a physician of our choosing so we could confirm or refute whether he had undergone a vasectomy. The results of that examination showed that the defendant had undergone a vasectomy sometime prior to the sexual assault," Solis said.

300 summoned in murder trial

LIVINGSTON (AP) — Three hundred people were summoned today as prospective jurors in the murder trial of a former junior high school principal accused of shooting a football coach over the love of a secretary.

Hurley Fontenot, 48, former principal of Hull-Daisetta Woodson Junior High School in Liberty County, is accused of fatally shooting coach Billy Mac Fleming, 38.

Investigators say Fleming was Fontenot's rival for the affections of Laura Nugent, 36, a teacher's aide and school secretary both men had dated and hoped to marry.

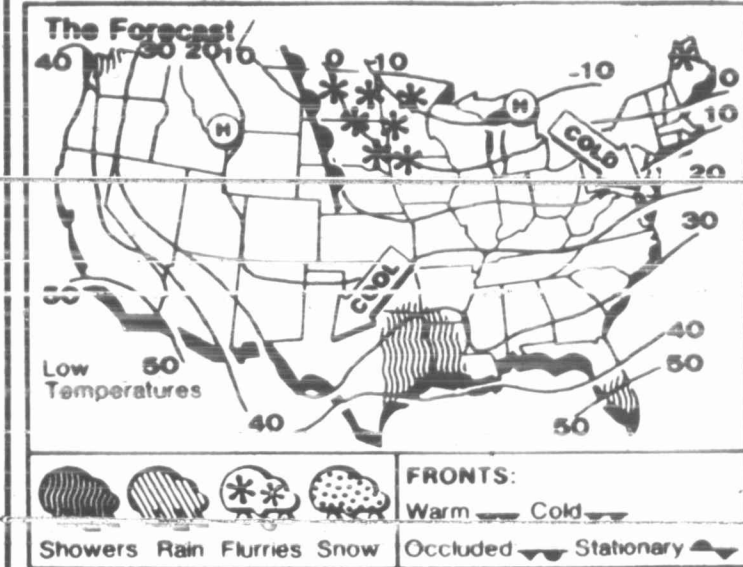
Fleming, who worked at the school for two years coaching and teaching math and science, was last seen alive at the school April 12.

Ten days later, his badly decomposed body was found by a berry-picker in a densely forested area southwest of Livingston in Polk County, about 50 miles away.

Liberty County Sheriff E.W. "Sonny" Applebe said Fleming was shot twice in the back of the head.

Authorities found bark had been skinned from some of the pine saplings near where Fleming's body was found.

Snow and strong winds combined to belt the Great Lakes region with blizzard conditions today while temperatures dipped to below zero in the north and 20s across the Southeast.

A heavy snow warning was posted in northern Michigan near Lake Superior, where up to a foot of snow could pile up by tonight, the National Weather Service said.

Travelers' advisories were posted in western New York. By early today, Buffalo and Watertown had 5 inches of snow, Buffalo had winds up to 53 mph and Watertown up to 46 mph.

Travelers' advisories also were posted for northeastern and southwestern Michigan amid predictions of from 4 to 8 inches of snow.

Areas of heavy snow near the lakes, which had gale-force winds, produced blizzard conditions. Snow spread across eastern Colorado and a mixture of rain, freezing rain and snow stretched across the northern Rockies.

Development foreseen

FORT WORTH, Texas — Dallas billionaire Nelson Hunt's sprawling 2,500-acre Circle T Ranch is home to thoroughbred horses now, but an engineering study predicts it will be the scene of a massive office-residential complex by the year 2000.

The study predicts almost 8 million square feet of office space would be built on the ranch, employing some 23,000 people, the Fort Worth Star-Telegram reported Sunday.

Another 5 million square feet of office space is projected for Hunt's corporate neighbor, IBM, which plans a business park in the area.

Slow start for filing

AUSTIN — A handful of candidates trickled in for the first day of filing for the May 3 primaries, but the big names stayed away.

"I'm glad the Cowboy game was on," GOP official Wayne Massey said as he passed the time on a slow Saturday at the office.

Filing continues through Feb. 3, and officials for both parties said they had not expected the major candidates in the big races to show up Saturday.

Ad alerts claimants

WASHINGTON — An American company, which has already been deluged with thousands of lawsuits from women claiming illness from the Dalkon Shield contraceptive, today began an international advertising campaign to encourage 4.5 million women to file claims before they lose their right to sue.

The A.H. Robins Co. of Richmond, Va., and a Washington-based public relations firm mounted the campaign to inform women in 91 nations they have four months to give notice of their claim.

Space launch put off

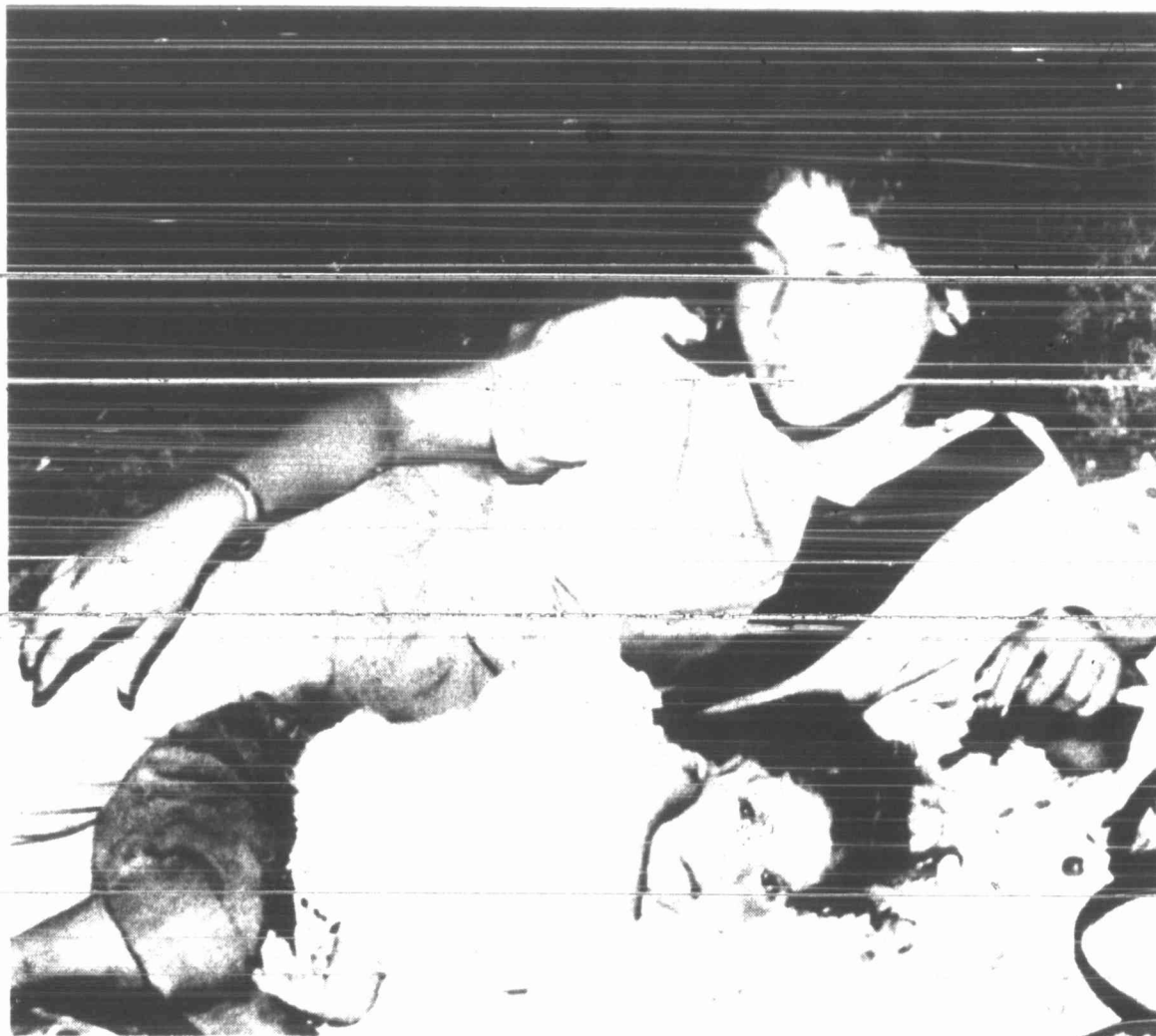
CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — A balky fuel line valve today forced a second postponement of the launch of Columbia with a crew of seven, including a Florida congressman, on the first of three consecutive space shuttle missions to study Hally's comet.

"We have scrubbed for today," said launch control commentator Jim Ball.

"We'll take another hard look at it overnight and come back tomorrow and do it right," launch director Gene Thomas told the astronauts, who had been in Columbia's cabin awaiting launch for nearly four hours.

Rumbles again

Tremors force evacuation in Colombia

BOGOTA, Colombia (AP) — Scientists using seismographs and helicopters kept constant watch on Nevado del Ruiz, trying to determine whether another major eruption of the volcano that killed 25,000 people in November would follow new tremors and ash showers.

The government said Sunday that it would keep about 15,000 peasants out of valleys near the volcano "until further instruction." Police using sirens roused the peasants Saturday and gave them blankets and food for a trek to higher ground.

Tolima state authorities said Sunday many people had to be almost forcibly evacuated and many were in a state of panic. Evacuees took with them only their most valuable possessions, and thousands of evacuees huddled in mountain caves as torrential rains soaked the area.

The 17,700-foot volcano trembled for the second time in two days Sunday, and chunks of ice drifted down rivers.

About 70 scientists have kept watch on the volcano since the Nov. 13 disaster. Pablo Medina Jaramillo, coordinator of the scientists' group, said Sunday that volcanic activity first noticed late Friday night "continues without change."

Medina Jaramillo said the state of maximum alert will probably last through today. He said scientists are monitoring the Nevado del Ruiz around the clock with seismographs and continuous helicopter flights over the mountain.

The Nov. 13 eruption melted part of the volcano's cone of ice and snow, sending a 150-foot high wall of mud down the Lagunilla River. Fifteen feet of mud and debris buried Armero, a coffee center 105 miles northwest of Bogota.

About 23,000 of Armero's 28,000 residents were killed or disappeared, and 2,000 people died in Chinchina, 25 miles west of the volcano.

The government put the area on maximum alert Saturday after the first sign of new activity.

U.S. team reaches Hanoi

HANOI, Vietnam — The most senior U.S. delegation to visit Vietnam since the end of the war more than a decade ago arrived in Hanoi today to press for a final accounting of almost 1,800 Americans still listed as missing in action in Vietnam.

The 10-member team led by Assistant Defense Secretary Richard Armitage was met at Hanoi's Noi Bai International Airport by Assistant Foreign Minister Nguyen Di Nien. The Americans flew from Bangkok, Thailand, aboard a small U.S. government aircraft.

Iraq claims victory

BAHAMA, Bahama City — Iraq's military command said today that its forces had retaken in a "shattering offensive" a string of oil-rich islands captured by Iran almost two years ago.

In an earlier nationwide address marking the 65th anniversary of Iraq's armed forces, President Saddam Hussein vowed to turn the nearby Huwazah marsh area of southeastern Iraq into a "mass grave" for Iranian forces if they attempt to invade the area for the third time in three years.

Protest rallies staged

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan — Thousands of Pakistanis massed for the first opposition rallies since the end of martial law, and called noisily but peacefully for the overthrow of President Mohammad Zia ul-Haq.

Sunday's protests in all 66 Pakistan's major cities marked the 58th anniversary of the birth of Prime Minister Zulfikar Ali Bhutto, founder of the Pakistan People's Party, the largest opposition group.

Bhutto was ousted by a military coup headed by Zia in 1977 and executed in 1979 after being found guilty of conspiring to murder a political opponent.

Moscow snipes at U.S.

MOSCOW — Radio Moscow today accused the United States of using "military blackmail" against Libya in connection with the North African nation's alleged involvement in terrorist raids at the Rome and Vienna airports.

The state-run radio said in an English-language broadcast that the Reagan administration was "whipping up an anti-Libyan campaign" with news reports linking Libya to the Dec. 27 attacks that killed 19 people.

A new attitude on alcohol use

It's okay to talk about alcohol abuse and alcoholism. Public service messages encouraging responsible drinking and discouraging drinking and driving now have become prominent on the airwaves and in print. At the same time, programs in hospital settings to treat alcoholism are flourishing — such as the one at Malone-Hogan Hospital which opened its doors today.

It's socially acceptable to talk about alcohol use, abuse and addiction.

Insurance programs now have begun to treat alcoholism as the disease it is, and cover the cost of getting help like they do for any other illness.

Tonight, a made-for-TV movie deals with just this topic. If society can begin to view drunk driving as it now views cigarette smoking, what great strides we will have made. For too long, the drunk driver was given the unconscious benefit of the doubt by a jury. "There but for the grace of God..." was too often in the back of a juror's mind.

Exciting progress is being made. In May 1984, a Harris poll showed the No. 1 health and safety priority of Americans is the avoidance of driving after drinking.

Alcohol-related traffic deaths have dropped from 28,000 in 1980 to 23,500 in 1984. But, as a group, young people 15 to 24 continue to suffer a disproportionate risk of death or serious injury from drunk driving. Alcohol-related deaths are the leading cause of death for that age group.

We have come far, through the efforts of organizations like Mothers Against Drunk Drivers and the public service contributions of newspapers and radio and television. We have far to go.

We must increase our educational efforts in the schools. Where health education classes have succeeded in their anti-smoking campaign they can follow up with a campaign against drunk driving. And we must not shut the topic of alcohol in a dark closet. We have to keep it out in the open, where it can be dealt with.

Drinking beer the American way

Like all Americans, I harbor an unquenchable lust for acquisition. The impulse to buy goes deeper than bone marrow. I no longer ask myself what to buy. Why bother? Turn on the TV, open the newspaper, drive down a busy street, and things leap out to be bought. Confronted with them, I act according to my nature. I buy.

Though I no longer ask what to buy, lately I find myself asking why. Not that it would ever occur to me to doubt the value of ceaseless acquisition. But it used to be that the people who wanted to sell you things made a perfunctory attempt to provide you with an excuse. This served to snuff out any flickering doubt about tedious practical considerations like need.

For instance, a car salesman might confide that this red two-seat convertible would transport you from zero to 60 miles per hour in six seconds flat. Later, when you were trying to justify the purchase to a skeptical wife, you could trump her arguments with this arresting bit of information: "Never mind what 'need' there is to get 60 miles per hour in six seconds instead of 12."

But that was in the old days. Now the sellers refuse to suggest that you personally will be better off as a result of buying what they have to sell. Now they ask us to buy to further abstract purposes, causes greater than ourselves. The favorite is love of country. Patriotism nowadays is the first refuge of an advertiser.

It used to be that people were exhorted to buy a particular beer because, compared to Brand X, it was better-tasting or cheaper or a more reliable route to drunkenness. Now we are supposed to buy Miller beer because it's "made the American way." Or Budweiser because it's brewed for those who "make America work." Anyone seeing one of these commercials for the first time might think he had somehow tuned in a Fourth of July parade of an American Legion convention. They have more shots of the American flag than "Rocky IV."

perience in inducing people to part with their money. I assume that these themes were chosen because they will sell beer. People seeing the commercials will say, "Miller is made the American way? Not the Russian or Vietnamese way? By God, give me a case!" Or, "Bud is for us guys who make America work? Here I always thought it was for welfare mothers. Bartender, the next two rounds are on me!"

The churlish may react differently. Beer made the American way is, to my mind, akin to "courtesy the New York way" or "law and order, Beirut-style."

Likewise, I have trouble seeing the connection between beer and work. Granted, there are plenty of Americans who show up for the job every day marinated in ethanol. Granted, there are some occupations in which the mental haze and physical lassitude produced by downing a six-pack are no impediment — advertising is probably one of them. But for most people, work is what you do when you're not drinking.

But all this is irrelevant. The point is that we are no longer expected to buy a given brand of beer because of its flavor. We are called by God and country to enlist our taste buds in the job of keeping America great, or at least of proclaiming America great which to some minds are the same thing.

Henceforth, each American's patriotism is defined by his or her choice of beer. Miller and Budweiser are for hard-working, God-fearing, two-fisted, big-hearted American patriots. All the rest are for foreigners, atheists, communists and homosexuals.

This is my kind of patriotism: no muss, no fuss. Next time somebody intimates that this columnist, with no record of service in the armed forces, has never done anything to serve his country, I'll head for the nearest tavern, down a cold one and hum the "Star-Spangled Banner." It beats charging up San Juan Hill.

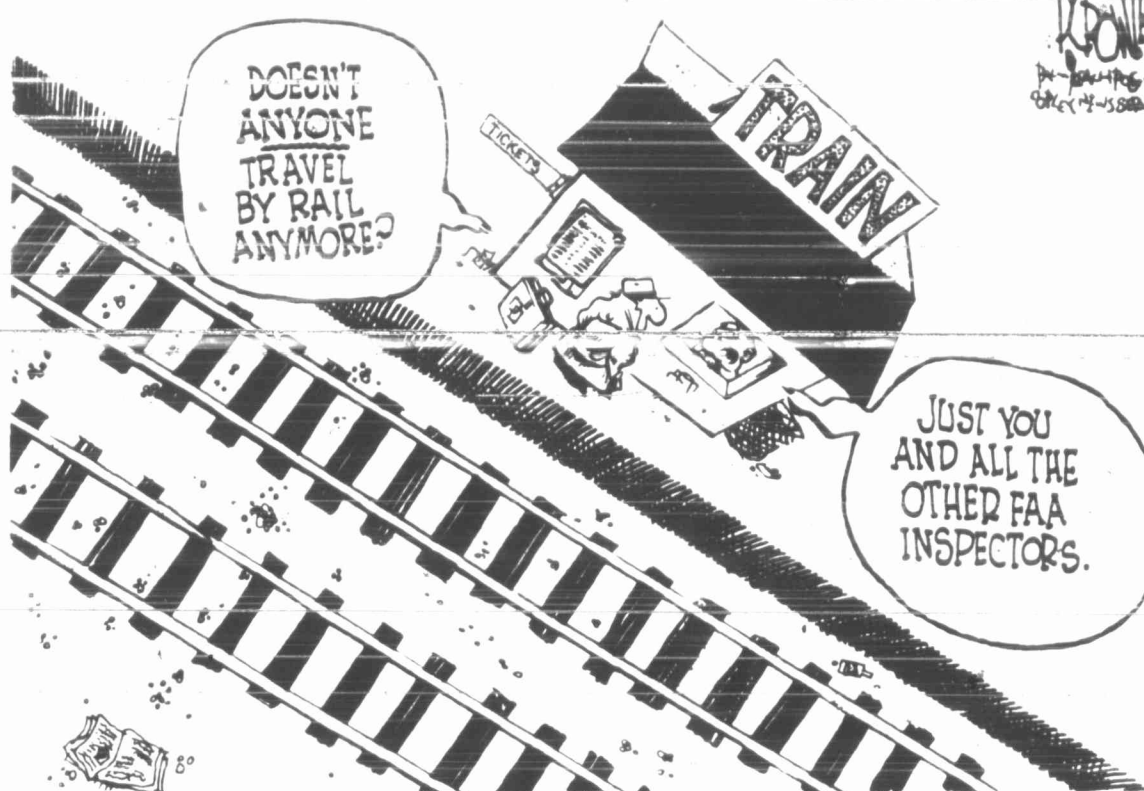

Rebuilt helicopters may be death traps, government says

WASHINGTON — Helicopters pieced together from cannibalized wrecks are filling the air, with the result that many of these patchwork choppers are crashing a second, third or even fourth time, according to the Transportation Department's inspector general.

After studying 788 helicopter crashes between 1972 and 1981, the inspector general recommended over a year ago that the Federal Aviation Administration, which certifies helicopter mechanics, tighten its rules to identify the chopper cannibals. But an FAA spokesman told our associate Donald Goldbergh an agency task force is still "looking into the entire problem."

"Meanwhile, the stitched-together choppers continue to crash at a significantly higher rate than factory originals, according to the inspector general."

Of the 788 helicopters studied, the IG reported: "We identified 54 helicopters that, after being destroyed, were involved in another accident, with 10 of them having three or more accidents." In an additional sample of 33 choppers "that had been destroyed at least once in a crash, we found 23 had been rebuilt a total of 26 times."

Calling for a crackdown, the report stated: "Although it may not be possible to prove the rebuilding practices and documentation are fraudulent, they are unauthorized and clearly misleading to the general public."

Here are some examples cited in the report of helicopters that have risen, phoenix-like, from their scorched, twisted, and sometimes bloodstained wreckage:

• "At the request of the pilot owner, a certified mechanic rebuilt a helicopter that had been destroyed in an accident. Less than four months after the helicopter was rebuilt it was destroyed again in a crash that killed the pilot."

The tragic tale didn't end there. The report continued: "In addition, we were advised that the mechanic had acquired the helicopter again following the latest accident, by purchasing the wreckage from the insurance company. We were unable to locate the mechanic to discuss the helicopter transaction."

• Many owners of the helicopters studied first learned from the government investigators that their choppers had been rebuilt from junk, because the repair logs omitted that vital information.

In one case, a helicopter that was wrecked in a New Jersey accident in 1977 was rebuilt in Florida in 1981 and sold. "The present owner advised us that he

was unaware that the aircraft had been in a serious accident. ... The repair station in Florida advised him that the aircraft had only sustained a hard landing," the IG report stated.

• The military must bear some of the blame for the recycled helicopters. It sells huge quantities of surplus choppers and parts for a fraction of their original cost. These bargains are then used to rebuild junkers.

"During the period of March 1981 to March 1984, (the Defense Department) sold surplus helicopter parts with an inventory value of \$72 million for about \$1.8 million," the report stated. Among the purchasers were several FAA-certified repair shops.

The FAA took issue with the IG report's conclusions, claiming that many of the accidents to patchwork planes were due to other factors and could not be traced to the fact that they had been rebuilt from wrecks.

The IG report noted this objection, but pointed out that there had been a "30 percent increase in the rate of mechanical failure accidents following the rebuilding of these destroyed helicopters."

The FAA insists that more regulations won't stop those who already ignore existing rules, and accuses the insurance industry of contributing to the problem by selling wreckage instead of destroying it.

Hundreds of offshoot groups also meet in secret to plan strikes and protests.

OF MEASE AND MEN: Attorney General Edwin Meese has already become one of the most outspoken holders of that office in this century, hoping his high profile will advance the conservative causes he champions. Now we're told that he's planning yet another attention-getting gambit. Our sources say Meese intends to argue a case or two in person before the Supreme Court. Historically, the attorney general has rarely appeared before the high court, leaving the chore of arguing the federal government's case to others.

U.S. turns 180 degrees on terrorism

WASHINGTON (AP) — After initially urging Israel to respond with restraint to the terrorist attacks at the Rome and Vienna airports 10 days ago, the Reagan administration reversed itself and even raised the possibility of U.S. military retaliation.

That abrupt, 180-degree switch illustrated the division within the administration over how to deal with the problem of terrorism.

Five years after President Reagan took office and vowed "swift, sure" retribution to terrorists in the wake of the 44-day Iranian hostage crisis that helped elevate him to the White House, the administration still hasn't come up with a single answer.

The disagreement generally falls into two camps. On one side are those advisers — chief among them Secretary of State George Shultz and other State Department officials — who have urged military retaliation. They praise Israel, which has a long-standing policy of striking back hard against Palestinian terrorists.

On the other side are Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger and other high-ranking Pentagon officials, who argue that military actions are unlikely to be effective and might even worsen the problem. Some of those advisers have also pointed to Israel, noting that it is still the chief target of terrorists despite its policy.

After the Dec. 27 attacks at the Vienna and Rome airports, top Reagan administration officials originally urged that Israel and other nations exercise restraint, lest the fragile

Mideast peace process be damaged.

But on Dec. 30, White House spokesman Larry Speakes implied that the United States would support Israeli military retaliation. "Our policy is that you seek out those responsible and ... have at it, go at 'em," Speakes added.

Speakes also refused to say what the United States might do, raising speculation that American military action might be in the offing.

But at the Pentagon, officials quickly dashed cold water on that idea, noting that no actions had been taken which might prepare the United States to strike against Libya, whose radical leader Moammar Khadafy has long been criticized by the administration as a chief backer of international terrorism.

After the latest attack, terrorism experts predicted that Western European locations are increasingly likely to be the targets of Palestinian terrorists, in part because stringent security in Israel has made it more difficult for terrorists to achieve their spectacular and bloody results in that nation.

"We're spending a lot more time trying to figure out what to do about terrorists, but nobody has yet come up with an answer that satisfies enough people," said one Pentagon official, who would speak only on condition of anonymity.

"In some ways, the Achille Lauro thing has made it even tougher because expectations have been raised," he said. It was a reference to October's U.S. action when the chartered airliner carrying the hijackers of a cruise ship

was forced by U.S. Navy jets to land at a NATO base and the hijackers were arrested.

That action was widely praised and led to Reagan's warning to terrorists that "you can run, but you can't hide."

Pentagon officials keep pointing out the dangers of military retaliation, perils exemplified by the December 1983, air strike by Navy jets on Syrian positions that had been firing at U.S. peacekeeping forces in Lebanon.

Two of the 28 planes were shot down, one American airman was killed and another was taken prisoner.

And American retaliation also raises the possibility that terrorists might begin attacking targets in the United States, rather than hitting Americans who happen to be overseas.

That possibility was explicitly spelled out last week by Khadafy, who warned that U.S. action against Libya might be followed by attacks in U.S. streets.

In trying to grapple with the problem, the administration has taken the time-honored tradition of appointing a blue-ribbon commission. That panel, headed by Vice President George Bush, is almost finished with its work.

But sources familiar with its work say it will not likely propose any major changes in U.S. policy.

That means the internal debate over what to do about terrorism is likely to go on.

"Nobody really has any concrete answers yet," said one official.

Dangers of a spider bite

Dear Dr. Donohue: Will you write about the brown recluse spider? I was bitten while visiting Michigan, and the doctors there seemed to know little about it. I had to be hospitalized. Now that I am back in California, I feel that someone must tell the medical profession about the seriousness of this spider bite. Is there no antidote to it? — Mrs. R.G.

I can't comment on your experience, but I found that most of my fellow Michigan physicians I spoke to had ready reference to the brown recluse spider and its bites. It is a dangerous spider, which demands respectful observance of its desire to be left alone.

It is generally an outdoor type, although it sometimes will hide behind pictures or in clothing. They can be tan or dark brown and there's always an outline of a violin on the back. They tend to be loners, the trait that gives them their name.

The spider's bite releases a poison that helps digest its anticipated meal — skin. At first,

there is a tiny blue dot, which in four to eight hours enlarges. The affected skin appears dead and there is intense pain.

If a person is bitten, he should see a doctor. You cannot always predict how serious a bite will be.

If it's not serious, padding the bite area may be all that's needed. A tetanus shot is administered then if the person needs one. In more serious bites, some physicians may give high doses of steroids, and others may decide to make a wide excision in the bite area. One group of doctors has used the drug, Dapsone, to limit further damage from the spider's toxin. In very severe cases, skin grafting may be needed.

You can gather from this that the brown recluse bite can be most serious, but few people suffer such dramatic consequences as you. Fewer still have complications such as destruction of red blood cells or diminished kidney function. In such cases, hospitalization is required. There is no antidote for the bite.

I regret that you had such a bad experience when visiting our splendid state, and trust that you did find its beauties and friendliness (except for the spider) redeeming virtues. This same spider has residence throughout the Midwest and Southeast.

Dear Dr. Donohue: My husband

is going in for bypass surgery next month. We all have confidence in the doctors and know he will come back to us in great shape. I want to know what to expect in the way of post-surgery pain. Will it be great, as I've heard? Will it last very long? — Mrs. V.V.

There is bound to be some pain. It may be weeks before he is able to sleep on his stomach, for example. It's not wise to let other people's experience be a guide to what pain there will be. It's a subjective thing. Patients vary in their pain thresholds.

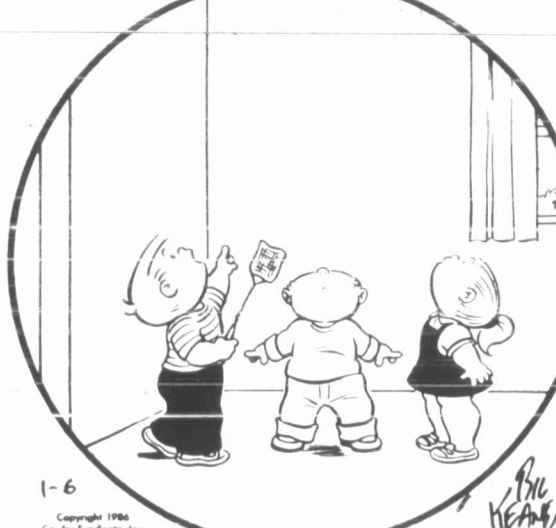

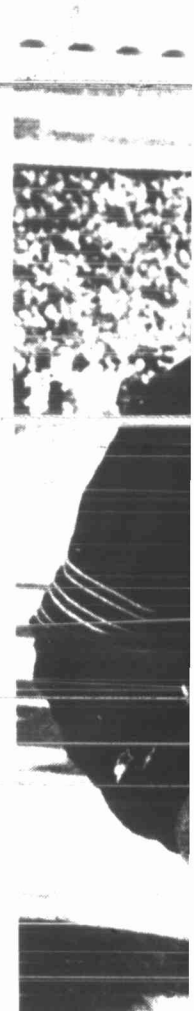

Bears dominate Giants, 21-0

CHICAGO (AP) — Punishing winds, punishing defense and a punishing Jim McMahon-to-Dennis McKinnon passing attack combined to freeze the New York Giants out of the National Football League playoffs.

McMahon threw a pair of touchdown passes to McKinnon and Shaun Gayle returned a botched punt for a touchdown as the Bears recorded their third straight win, a 21-0 victory over the Giants that moved Chicago into next week's conference title game.

The wind chill factor of minus-13 wasn't much colder than New York's offense, which produced just 32 rushing yards and 149 through the air, most after the outcome was decided.

"You've got to love them," Chicago Coach Mike Ditka said of his defense, best in the NFL. "We knew going in we couldn't make any mistakes and we didn't."

Richard "Sackman" Dent, the NFC sack leader, produced 3½ sacks of New York quarterback Phil Simms, as the team dumped Simms six times for 69 yards in losses.

"We really wanted to take the running game away from (Joe) Morris," said Dent, who, along with William Perry, knocked the running back out of the game with a slight concussion. Morris, who rushed for 1,336 yards during the season and 141 yards last week

against San Francisco, left early in the second half after gaining just 32 yards on 12 carries.

The Giants ran only two other running plays in the game, and Simms completed just 14 of 35 passes for 209 yards, as the Bears won the first playoff game held in Chicago since the 1963 title game.

"Today it wouldn't have made any difference where we played," Chicago linebacker Mike Singletary said.

"We dug our own hole," Simms said. "You'd always like more pass protection, but I expected it about like it was."

"We're a quarterback's nightmare," Perry said.

Although Simms said he suffered from the flu before the game, "sick or not sick, I wouldn't have played any better."

As for the Chicago defense, "It wasn't anything out of the ordinary. I like getting hammered," Simms said with a smile.

"They aren't 16-1 for nothing," New York Coach Bill Parcells said of the Bears, who were 15-1 in the regular season. "Their offense wasn't that hot either... yet they are the best defensive team."

The Bears will play the Los Angeles Rams for the National Football Conference title at Soldier Field on Sunday.

McMahon completed 11 of 21 passes for 216 yards, and neither

quarterback suffered an interception.

"I threw spirals," marvelled McMahon, who wore gloves in the game. "I may wear them all summer."

"The wind wasn't really much of a factor," he added. "I kind of forgot about the cold."

The wind combined with Chicago's defense for the game's first score, when Giants' punter Sean Landeta grazed the ball on a punt attempt and Gayle picked it up and ran five yards in the first quarter.

"The wind just took it," Landeta said, of the 14 mph winds that swirled through the lakefront stadium. "I dropped the ball and saw it start to move to the right."

"He barely touched it," said Gayle, who became the ninth Chicago defensive player to score this season.

"I was thinking six (points)," Gayle said of his first touchdown since high school. "There was no use dropping on the ball. I wanted to get a touchdown for the special teams."

Chicago's offense, which was facing the NFL's No. 2 defense, finally got untracked in the third quarter.

McMahon fired a 23-yard bullet to McKinnon, who snatched it away from Elvis Patterson with 8:48 left. McMahon said the wrong Dennis

made the catch.

"The play was designed to go to (Dennis) Gentry," McMahon said. "We had three guys in the area, so I just threw it and Dennis caught it."

McMahon improvised the second touchdown pass, a 20-yarder, with just 37 seconds left in the quarter.

"The Giants were in a blitz situation so I called an audible," he said. "They were McMahon's first touchdown receptions since Oct. 27."

New York kicker Eric Schubert continued having problems in the playoffs, missing a 19-yard field goal that hit the left upright. It was the sixth miss in his last seven attempts. Chicago kicker Kevin Butler, who set a rookie scoring record with 144 points this season, missed field goal attempts of 26, 49 and 38 yards.

Chicago's Walter Payton, playing the first home playoff game of his career, rushed 27 times for 93 yards. But afterwards he was more concerned with the Rams.

"We realize we've got a tough opponent next week," he said, calling the Rams' shutout victory over Dallas "impressive."

"They've got good linemen," said Chicago's defensive tackle Steve McMichael, "but they had to be watching the game today. I'll bet you he (Rams' quarterback Dieter Brock) is going to be bitching at them an awful lot."

Pats upset generous Raiders

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Who are these guys, these New England Patriots? The way things have gone the last couple of weeks, they have the look of a team of destiny.

One thing's for sure, the Patriots are one step away from qualifying for the Super Bowl. And if they manage such a feat, they'll be the first team ever to earn a Super Bowl berth by winning three straight playoff games on the road.

Among their heroes recently have been Johnny Rembert and Jim Bowman, a couple of reserves unknown to just about everyone but their families.

Bowman fell on a fumble in the Los Angeles end zone for a touchdown with 57 seconds remaining in the third quarter Sunday to snap a 20-20 tie and account for the final points in the Patriots' 27-20 victory over the Raiders.

The play occurred on New England's kickoff after Tony Franklin's second field goal of the game, a 32-yarder that tied the game at 20-20. Sam Seale muffed Franklin's kickoff at about the Raider 9-yard line, scooped it up, and then fumbled when hit by Mose Tatupu. The ball rolled into the end zone, where Bowman fell on it.

"You go down there with the idea of trying to strip the ball out of his hands," said Bowman, a rookie safety. "We've scored six touchdowns just from trying to

strip the ball this season."

The triumph by the supposedly playoff-shy Patriots — who a week earlier beat the New York Jets 26-14 in the American Football Conference wild-card game for their first post-season win in 22 years — puts them in Sunday's AFC Championship Game against the Miami Dolphins.

In their victory over the Jets, Rembert, a third-year linebacker, ran 15 yards with a fumbled kickoff for a touchdown that gave the Patriots a 23-7 advantage.

Fumbled kickoffs that turn into touchdowns for the kicking team usually occur about once a year. The Patriots have done it three times in their last four games.

The winner of the Patriots-Dolphins game at Miami's Orange Bowl will advance to the Super Bowl on Jan. 26 in New Orleans. The opponent will be the winner of Sunday's NFC Championship game between the Los Angeles Rams and Chicago Bears.

Speaking of the Orange Bowl, the Patriots haven't beaten the Dolphins there since 1966. That's 18 straight losses.

But maybe that won't matter. Just ask the Raiders, winners of three previous Super Bowls and veterans of many a playoff war.

"I'd say the Patriots have a good chance," Raiders All-Pro defensive end Howie Long said. "If they

run the ball the way they did today, make the big plays, get the good performance from their field goal kicker, they'll beat 'em."

"The Patriots are where they are because they deserve to be there."

One reason the Patriots are where they are is because the Raiders committed six turnovers Sunday.

"Our main objective in training camp this year was to increase the number of takeaways," Coach Raymond Berry said. "It's unbelievable to come out here in Raiders' territory and come away with a victory."

Three of the turnovers were interceptions thrown by Los Angeles quarterback Marc Wilson, one of which set up a New England field goal. Wilson completed only 11 of his 27 passes for just 135 yards.

Another was the fumble by Seale. Another was a first-period fumble by Fulton Walker following a New England punt. Bowman fell on the loose ball at the Patriots 21-yard line and quarterback Tony Eason responded with a 13-yard touchdown pass to Lin Dawson, giving the Patriots a 7-0 lead.

The sixth Raider turnover was perhaps the one that turned the game around. Los Angeles led 20-17 when NFL rushing champion Marcus Allen fumbled and New England safety Fred Marion See Patriots page 8-A

Indiana native keys Michigan St. upset

Motivation shouldn't be a problem for any college basketball player preparing for a game against Indiana, says Michigan State forward Larry Polec.

"I don't know if it's because we're playing IU or at Assembly Hall (in Bloomington, Ind.) or (Indiana Coach) Bobby Knight. We all seem to get up for the game," said Polec, who canned four free throws in the last 23 seconds Sunday to give the Spartans a 77-74 upset victory over the 15th-ranked Hoosiers.

Polec, who had 18 points, likened Indiana to his own team, "a small, quick club and they match up to us evenly."

The game was only one Sunday involving a ranked team.

Tonight's card includes No. 4 Syracuse at Villanova, No. 5 Kansas at Detroit, No. 9 Memphis State hosting South Carolina and No. 18 Louisville hosting Eastern Kentucky.

Michigan State led 57-42 after 5:16 of the second half, but Indiana had a 22-9 run over the next 10 minutes and tied the game 70-70 on junior guard Steve Alford's three-point play with 1:35 remaining.

Sophomore forward Carlton Valentine, who topped Michigan State with 21 points, made two free throws to give the Spartans the lead. They hit five of six free throws, including the four by Polec, to ice the game.

"We feel fortunate to win this basketball game, that the ball bounced the right way for us at the end," Spartan Coach Jud Heathcote said.

"I have to give Indiana credit for the great comeback. We were keying the zone to try to stop Alford. I told the team before the game that we couldn't let him get 30 points or we'd get beat. He had 23 but he had to work hard to get those," Heathcote added.

Knight said the first half of the game was more critical than the conclusion.

"We made some mistakes in the first half at the defensive end and gave away some baskets that put us in a more difficult position than we should have been at the half," Knight said. "We weren't able to control Valentine."

Alford got 17 of his points in the second half. Freshman guard Rick Calloway added 20 for the Hoosiers. Scott Skiles had 20 for Michigan State.

It was Indiana's seventh consecutive Big Ten defeat at home, dating back to last season, and the Hoosiers now are 0-2 in league play and 8-4 overall. Michigan State is 1-1 in the Big Ten and 10-2 overall.

North Carolina got 28 points from Brad Daugherty in overcoming a Brad Daugherty deficit to win the final game in Carmichael Auditorium. The Tar Heels are moving into a new 22,000-seat arena.

Michigan got 23 points from Gary Grant in its 17th consecutive Big Ten victory.

Duke won its 12th straight game on the strength of David Henderson's 25 points.

Unbeaten Syracuse got 19 points from Rafael Addison and 16 from Wendell Alexis in winning for the 10th straight time, all at home.

HAMILTON, Ontario (AP) — Chris Biotti and Dan Shea scored 18 seconds apart to highlight a four-goal, first-period blitz and power the United States to a 5-1 upset over Sweden Saturday at the World Junior Hockey Championships and a bronze medal.

With the victory, Czechoslovakia moved to 4-3 and into a tie with the United States and Sweden. But because of a better for-against record in games involving the tied teams, the United States won the bronze.

The 4-3 record by the United States was its best showing ever. The Americans never have finished higher than fifth in the 10-year history of the tournament.

Second half spree helps Portland win

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — The Golden State Warriors learned that once the Portland Trail Blazers get started, they can be hard to stop.

Portland rallied from a nine-point deficit early in the third period to score a team-record 86 points in the second half and beat Golden State 136-120 in an NBA game Sunday night.

NBA Roundup

The Blazers connected on 71 percent of their shots from the field in the second half in fashioning consecutive 43-point quarters. Their effort broke the team record of 84 points in a half set against the Los Angeles Lakers on March 9, 1980.

"I thought our second half was very, very good," Portland Coach Jack Ramsay said after his team trailed 56-50 at halftime and shot only 41 percent in the first two periods.

Elsewhere in the National Basketball Association, the Los Angeles Lakers crushed Washington 118-88 and the Phoenix-Seattle game was postponed until tonight because of a leaky roof.

Guard Jim Paxson, who scored 25 points, sparked the rally that lifted Portland from its deficit to a 93-83 lead when the third quarter ended.

Kiki Vandeweghe, who led Portland with 26 points, scored 16 in the final period, while Clyde Drexler, who finished with 21, scored 17 in last quarter.

"Clyde was our catalyst. We just

upgraded the tempo of the game," Ramsay said. "Golden State may have been fatigued in the second half."

Purvis Short led all scorers with 36 points for Golden State, while Joe Barry Carroll had 21 points and 12 rebounds.

"We've been playing well recently and haven't been blown out very often," Warriors Coach John Bach said, "but playing two games in two nights was a factor. Our key guys, Joe Barry, 'Sleepy' Floyd and Purvis looked real tired."

Bach also blamed the defeat partly on the absence of forward Larry Smith, sidelined with a sore ankle.

"But you've got to give them credit," Bach said.

Lakers 118, Bullets 88
Rookie A.C. Green scored a season-high 20 points and Earvin "Magic" Johnson added 18 points and 17 assists as Los Angeles easily defeated Washington.

A 14-4 spurt late in the first quarter gave the Lakers a 38-27 lead at the end of the period, and they expanded the margin to 67-49 at halftime. The Bullets were then outscored 27-13 in the third period as the rout continued.

Suns-Sonics Ppd
Phoenix led 35-24 early in the first quarter when water from a leaky roof made the court unplayable.

The game will be played tonight, but a decision will have to be made by the league whether to replay the game from the beginning or resume it at the point where it stopped.

recovered at the Patriots 32-yard line with 7:51 left in the third quarter. The Patriots drove for Franklin's game-tying field goal.

Allen, the NFL's Most Valuable Player who gained 121 yards on 22 carries Sunday, lost only three fumbles during the regular season. "I'm not taking anything away from the Patriots, because they are a good football team, but you just can't play in a game of this magnitude and make the mistakes we made today," Coach Tom Flores of the Raiders said. "We fumbled the ball, we threw interceptions, and those are the types of things that kill you."

The Raiders scored three times to turn New England's 7-0 lead into a 17-14 Los Angeles advantage.

Playoff matchups should prove interesting

Chicago, Chicago, that toddlin' town.

Chicago might be the Bears' kind

of town, but it doesn't look easy being

for the New York Giants. And it

doesn't figure to be any kinder to

the Los Angeles Rams next

weekend in the National Football

League playoffs.

The Bears, who went 15-1 during

the season, continued unbeaten at

home with their ninth consecutive

victory at Soldier Field, a 21-0

mauling of the New York Giants on

Sunday. The Rams are up next in

the NFC Championship Game next

Sunday and they can't expect any

better conditions or any nicer

greeting from their hosts.

The first playoff game in Chicago

since 1963 was played in 17-degree

weather with a swirling 14-mph

wind and the chill factor was 10

below zero. By contrast, the Rams'

20-0 blanking of the Dallas

Cowboys on Saturday was played

in balmy 70-degree temperatures

in Southern California.

"I'm sure we'll be cold," said

Rams Coach John Robinson. "It's

just one other challenge we have to

face.

"We're better off in our own en-

vironment, no question. But it's one

of the things we have to face and

accept if we want to keep winning

and be in the Super Bowl."

Robinson said the game matches

two "power teams. It'll certainly

be a physical contest from our

perspective, because we can't play

any other way."

The battle for the other slot in the

Super Bowl doesn't figure to be ef-

fected much by the elements. The

Miami Dolphins, who rallied for a

24-21 victory over the Cleveland

Browns on Saturday, will host the

surprising New England Patriots.

New England, a wild-card entry,

upended the Raiders in Los

Angeles 27-20 on Sunday.

The host city, meanwhile, saw the

only two teams not to lose a home

game this year.

The NFL was fortunate not to

have any scheduling worries for

the championship games. Before

the weekend began, it was possible

that both title contests would be

played in Los Angeles, dictating a

morning start for one in order to

accommodate television. And when

the Browns took a 21-3 lead over the

Dolphins, the possibility loomed of

both Cleveland and Chicago being

the home sites next weekend. That

would have meant a late-afternoon

start in one of those frigid locales.

In icy-cold Soldier Field, Bears

quarterback Jim McMahon threw

to Dennis McKinnon for a pair of

second-half touchdowns. Both

thrower and receiver were wearing

gloves.

"I threw with gloves on all

week," McMahon said. "I threw a

lot of spirals today. I might just

wear gloves all next summer. ... I

even threw better against the wind

than I did with it."

Linebacker Otis Wilson had this

warning for LA's Dieter Brock, the

next quarterback to face the fear-

some defense that is rated best in

the league. In praise of Richard

Dent, the defensive end who had

3½ sacks and 6½ tackles, Wilson

chanted:

"Sackman's coming, name of

Richard Dent.

"Quarterback's coming, is gonna

get bent."

The Bears must be particularly

concerned with stopping Eric

Dickerson, who set a playoff record

with 248 yards rushing. He outgained

the Cowboy offense by five

yards.

Again, however, Dickerson was

operating on a dry grass field in

warm weather and he wasn't fac-

ing the awesome Bears defense.

"We said we were going to go at

Dallas' strength and that's running

the ball," Dickerson said.

"Everybody said we couldn't run

against Dallas, but we did. We

looked, I think, pretty impressive

today."

They'll need to be at least as im-

pressive to have a chance next

week.

In Miami, the Patriots will be go-

ing into the Orange Bowl fresh off a

pair of superb postseason efforts,

beating the Jets in New York and

the Raiders in Los Angeles. But the

Patriots have not won in Miami

since 1966.

"The last time New England was

down here," said Dolphins Coach

Don Shula, "the game came down

to the wire and we won it (30-27 in a
