

Smith Named Head Plains Band Camp

Plainview Man President Of Organization Formed At Abernathy Recently To Promote Music

(Special To The Avalanche)
PLAINVIEW, Feb. 11. — Ralph Smith, band and orchestra director at Plainview, was elected president of the South Plains Band camp, which recently was organized in Abernathy to promote musical interests in this section of the state.

H. A. Anderson, of Lubbock, was named vice-president while C. W. Beene, Abernathy, was elected secretary. Arrangement for the grounds will be directed by R. C. Butler, of Crosbyton, and D. W. Crane, of Sudan, will have charge of food arrangements.

The towns included in the original plans were Plainview, Lubbock, Floydada, Crosbyton, Sudan and Abernathy. Others will be taken in later.

The week following close of the schools has been designated as band week and a site near Crosbyton has been selected. Twenty boys from each of the towns will be eligible to attend the camp and take part in the activities.

An all-South Plains band will be selected at the camp and plans are for this band to represent the various towns at conventions and meetings.

Door to Charity Opens in Chicago

CHICAGO, Feb. 11. (AP) — Cook county, which cannot pay its bills, has opened the door of charity to those of its unpaid workers who need it.

Those employees who find themselves unable to buy coal, food, milk or shoes, may now go to the county's charity bureau and obtain what they need, the cost to be deducted from their pay envelopes — when they get them.

The county, although without funds, finds itself in a position of having virtually unlimited credit for the purchase of charity supplies. This is due to contract agreements with dealers.

Only the 4,000 county employees, however, may benefit in this manner. The 36,000 city workers, many of whom are just as hard pressed as the county employees, are still awaiting help.

Story of Gunman Who Couldn't Shoot Straight, Told in Oklahoma Rum Case

OKLAHOMA CITY, Feb. 11. (AP) — Stories of a gunman who couldn't shoot straight and of the belated release of an apparently innocent man from the state penitentiary after he had testified before the federal grand jury, were unfolded today in cross examination of Randall Pitman, county attorney of Pottawatomie county, in United States district court here.

Pitman, a defendant with 16 others in the government's trial of an indictment charging conspiracy to violate the prohibition laws, was on the stand for the third day.

Statement Made
Roy St. Lewis, United States district attorney, drew from Pitman the statement that he had never instituted criminal proceedings against Homer Knappenberger, former mayor of Earlboro, or H. O. Elschman, who was alleged in a civil suit filed by M. C. Bice to have been hired for \$500 by Knappenberger to kill Bice.

Bice's civil suit alleged that Elschman's faulty aim resulted in the failure of one attempt to kill him and that Knappenberger made an-

DALLAS, Feb. 11. A score of suspects was arrested. The large man and his small companion were credited with a number of filling station and grocery store holdups.

Parrish Bill To Bar Collector's Suits Is Okehed

Measure Of Senator From Lubbock Would Prevent Officials Suing County For Fees

AUSTIN, Feb. 11. (AP) — Approval of a bill which would bar tax collectors from instituting suit against a county for fees erroneously paid into the treasury was given last night at a meeting of the state affairs committee of the senate. The bill was introduced by Senator Pink L. Parrish of Lubbock.

Argument on the bill was intense with representatives of the tax collectors and of the various counties present. The former holding to the contention that debts of this nature were legal and ought to be paid and the latter stating that many of the suits were for such enormous sums that county treasuries in many instances would be depleted judgment were rendered.

Wrong Claimed
In supporting the bill, Senator Tom DeBerry of Red river stated the legislature had done a great wrong in ever enacting a bill giving the tax collectors the right to sue. The Parrish bill would re-establish the statute of limitations as the defense of the county against tax collectors' suits.

Another bill by Senator Parrish requiring county officials to make

a sworn return of all accountable and unaccountable fees and limiting the maximum amount to be earned to \$12,500 also was given approval of the committee. A conference with a house committee on this bill probably will be held as there are a few differences between the Parrish bill and a measure introduced in the other branch by Rep. R. M. Hubbard of New Boston.

Would Limit Amount
A bill limiting the amount to be paid by a county for the collection of delinquent taxes to 15 per cent also was approved.

Committee approval was given a measure proposed by Senator Parrish which would require the presentation of evidence that the state and county ad valorem tax on motor vehicles had been paid before a license could be issued.

Another measure by Parrish fixing the bond of county commissioners at \$3,000 also was voted out favorably as was a bill of Senator Thomas B. Love exempting the property of buildings of Y. W. C. A.

and Y. M. C. A. organizations from taxes.

Favorable Action
A bill by Senator Williamson creating a juvenile court, to be composed of the judges of the civil court of appeals, the criminal district court and the county judge, in counties of more than 100,000 population was given favorable action.

Senator Berkeley's bill authorizing the appointment of a state librarian, defining the qualifications and duties of the office and fixing the salary at \$8,000 was also approved.

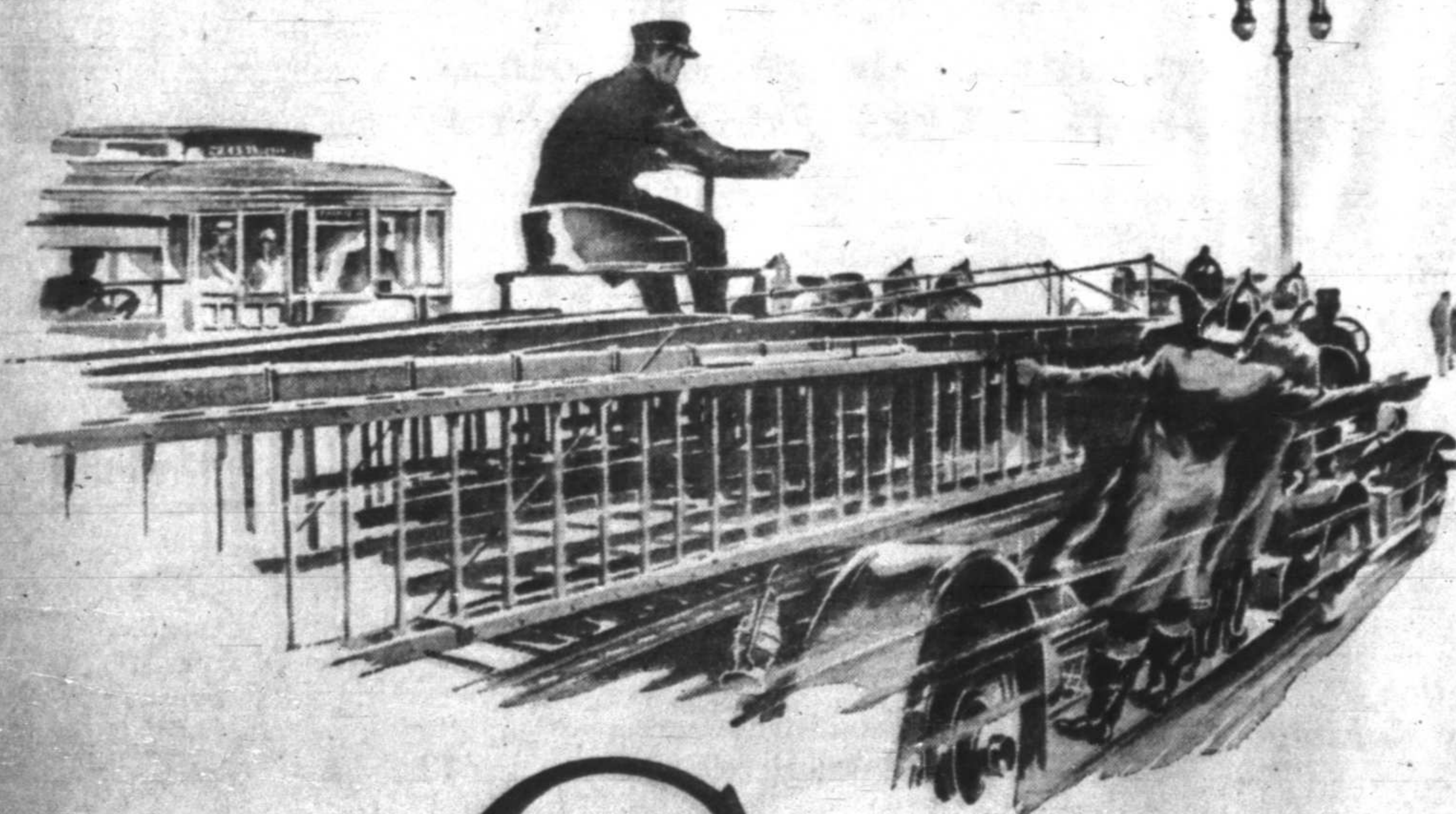

Boost Production Despite Proration

Oklahoma's Daily Average
Of Light And Heavy Oils
Adds 19,430 Barrels In
Past Week

TULSA, Feb. 11. (AP)—Struggling forward under the severest of proration programs, Oklahoma's daily average production of light and heavy gravity oils during the week ending February 8, added 19,430 barrels to the amount of 125,100 barrels added by the Oklahoma City pool, the area under the most severe curtailment percentage.

According to the current report of the Oil and Gas Journal the average production for the state during the week named was 630,000 barrels as compared to 611,555 for the preceding week.

U. S. Ahead.
The whole United States forged ahead approximately 33,144 barrels, totaling 2,618,761 as a daily average in comparison to 2,585,617 for the preceding week. A total of 27,123 barrels of the total increase was added in the Mid-Continent area, the Eastern Rocky Mountain and California areas from 1,000 to 3,000 barrels each.

In Oklahoma the Seminole area added 12,085 barrels and the southern fields 1,010, while the northern areas dropped approximately 5,000 barrels. West Texas added approximately 1,500 barrels, Texas Panhandle 2,736 and Arkansas heavy oil 1,535 barrels. Kansas remained constant.

Continues To Climb.
The Gulf Coast heavy gravity oil area continued to climb in production, adding 9,389 during the past week. California's chief loss was in the Santa Fe Springs area, which dropped behind 5,000 barrels. Heavy oil in that state also dropped 500 barrels.

The light oil increase for the entire country was 21,707 barrels.

Hoovercrats and Regulars in Row

HOUSTON, Feb. 11. (AP)—The rift between "regular" and "Hoover" democrats in Texas was wider today, following announcement by Alvin S. Moody, state chairman of "Anti-Tammany" democrats, of plans for a state-wide convention of his faction to endorse a candidate for governor. Moody said the convention would be held at Fort Worth or Waco within the next 10 days.

In the event the supreme court upholds the action of the state democratic executive committee in barring as candidates on the democratic ballot those who failed to support Alfred E. Smith and the national and state slate in 1928, the Anti-Smith democrats will advance an independent candidate for governor, he said.

DECIDE ON PLAY

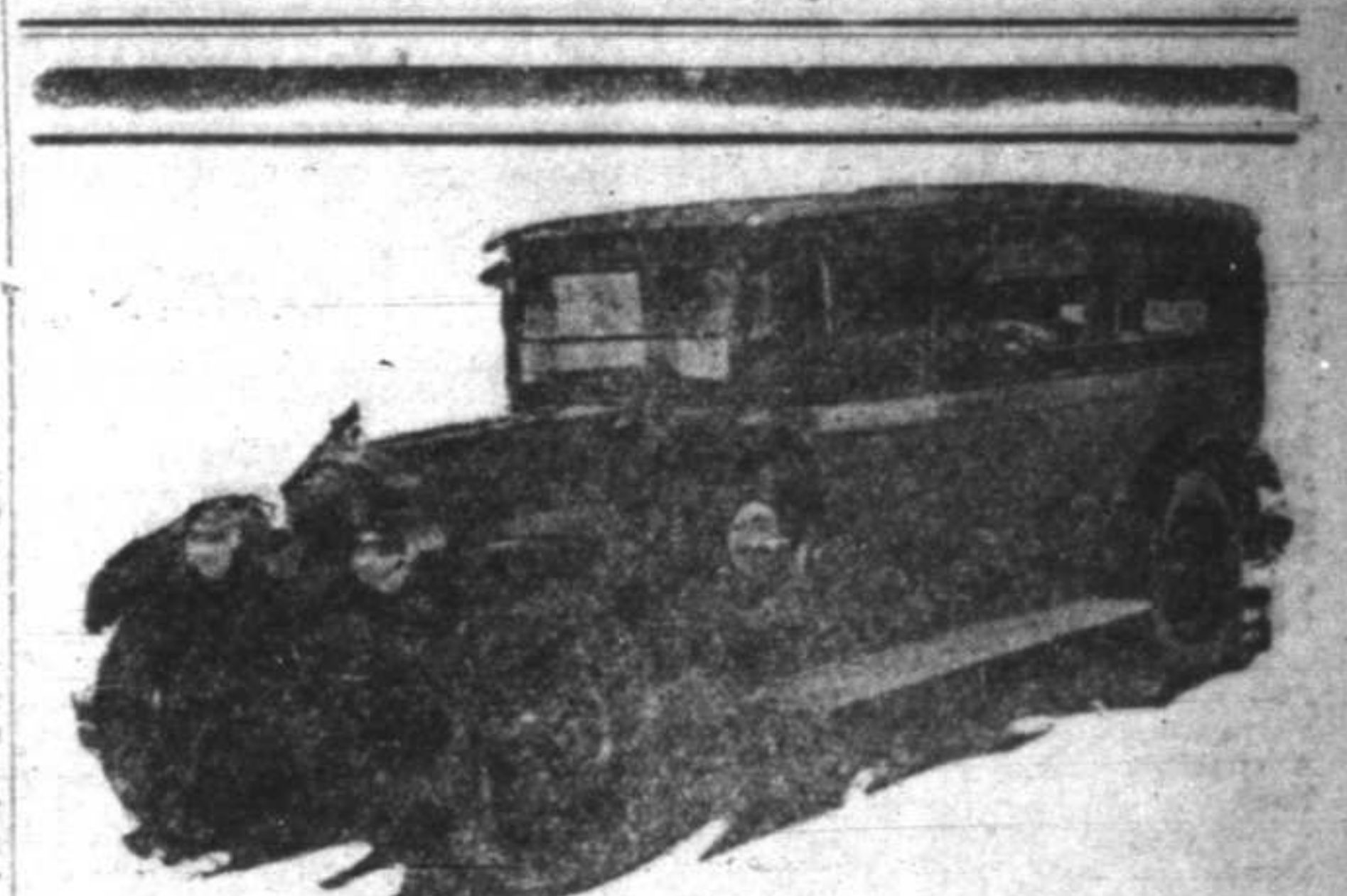

All generalizations are dangerous and among the most popular of them all is the dictum that the mode is based on mere caprice. Real students of fashion will deny this in toto, and can cite many examples to prove their contention.

Almost all fashions have their origin in a real need. The old saying, "The function creates the organ," is absolutely true to fashion. Among recent developments of the mode is the sweater. Its origin is curious and completely proves our point. It is said that the late Queen Alexandra of England was on her yacht one day, when the weather changed suddenly and became cold. She had gone out without a wrap, so she borrowed the jersey of one of the sailors and drew it over her royal shoulders. Thus the sweater became a part of the wardrobe of women all over the world.

But it is not always to a queen that we owe our happiest inspirations of dress. Certain women seem to have a real genius for raiment. They know how to adopt and adapt a hundred fantasies, which, at the beginning, seem too far-fetched, too impractical ever to become a general mode.

The long skirt owes its readaptation to a woman of great beauty, but of large proportions, who insisted upon adding long transparent hems to the short evening skirts worn by her contemporaries of more slender lines. With the longer skirts, longer hair, dressed in curls that could have been incongruous with abbreviated skirts, has followed, as a matter of course.

Woman Invents Evening Jacket. The spangled evening jacket, which has had to great a vogue (not yet over, by the way) was the invention of a woman with large hips who wished to disguise them with straight lines of a material that would lend by its own weight. As it was a ravishing evening accessory, it had success, even with women of svel silhouette. The deep décolleté was adopted first by women with beautiful shoulders, and it would be an excellent thing if it were confined to them. For one of the leading principles of good dressing is to wear only what one can wear to best advantage.

At the same time, a really elegant woman never turns her back entirely upon novelty. She knows too well that to refuse to change is a sign of age. Her native good taste and her abundant self-knowledge, can be safely trusted to guide her choice, while her power of adaptation will enable her to suit herself absolutely in the acceptance of novelties, to be "in the movement," without abandoning that personal expression which is the essence of good dressing.

It takes real discrimination to judge immediately among all the novelties offered each season; to know unerringly just what to accept and what to reject; what to adopt entirely and what to modify. Mother, Widow, Children Of Slain Man File For \$50,000; W. T. Strickel Named Defendant

Uncle Sam Toils To Make Submarines Safe As Abolition Is Talked At London Naval Limitations Conference; Trapped Men Can Escape, According To Tests

End of Under Seas Horrors Seen in New Inventions

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Feb. 11.—The Republic of France may have the most powerful submarine fleet in existence, with its new submersible deep-sea cruisers.

But the United States navy has the safest submarines afloat and is working to end submarine horrors, whether that means anything to the naval delegates now convening at London or not.

The London delegates are expected to consider whether or not the submarine ought not to be abolished in all navies. Meanwhile, however, the United States navy, at its Pacific base here, has been going ahead with the perfection of devices to make its submarines safer for the men who operate them.

It is not going to have another disaster like those that befell the S-4 and the S-51 and drowned their crews like rats in a trap if it can help it.

Making Rigid Tests
The submarine S-29, attached to the bathy fleet at the San Diego naval base, has become a sort of experiment ship for these devices and rigorous safety tests are now being made. The S-29 is equipped with safety features that would enable its crew to escape even if it should become disabled and plunge to the bottom.

To begin with, it carries a stock of mechanical "lungs," invented by Lieutenant Charles B. Mommson, a submarine officer. The lung is a rubberized bag with a capacity approximating that of a person's lungs, a rubber multipiece and a series of valves. Before using, the wearer fills the bag with oxygen from a tank in the submarine, and this supplies him while he is on his way to the surface.

Two methods of escape from a sunken submarine have been worked out: an escape hatch, and an escape hatch. They are somewhat similar in principle, and each performs the task of getting the sailor out of a sunken submarine so that he can float to the surface.

In the past all rescue efforts have been concentrated on raising the sunken bulk with the men inside.

Since the last big submarine disaster, all U. S. subs have been equipped with the lungs, although only the S-29 on the Atlantic side and the S-29 here have been provided with escape hatches as yet.

How They Escape
The escape lock is more elaborate than the escape hatch. It consists of a sizable turret-like room built on top of the submarine's hull, and entered from below by a ladder. The sailors—a large submarine carries about 80 men—enter it in groups of seven. Once inside, they close the trap doors leading from the compartment below, and open a sea valve which admits water into the lock from below.

The water rises until it is approximately chest-deep, when the bubble of air which it traps holds it stationary and forms an air pocket. The sailors then put on their mechanical lungs and fill them from the oxygen tanks.

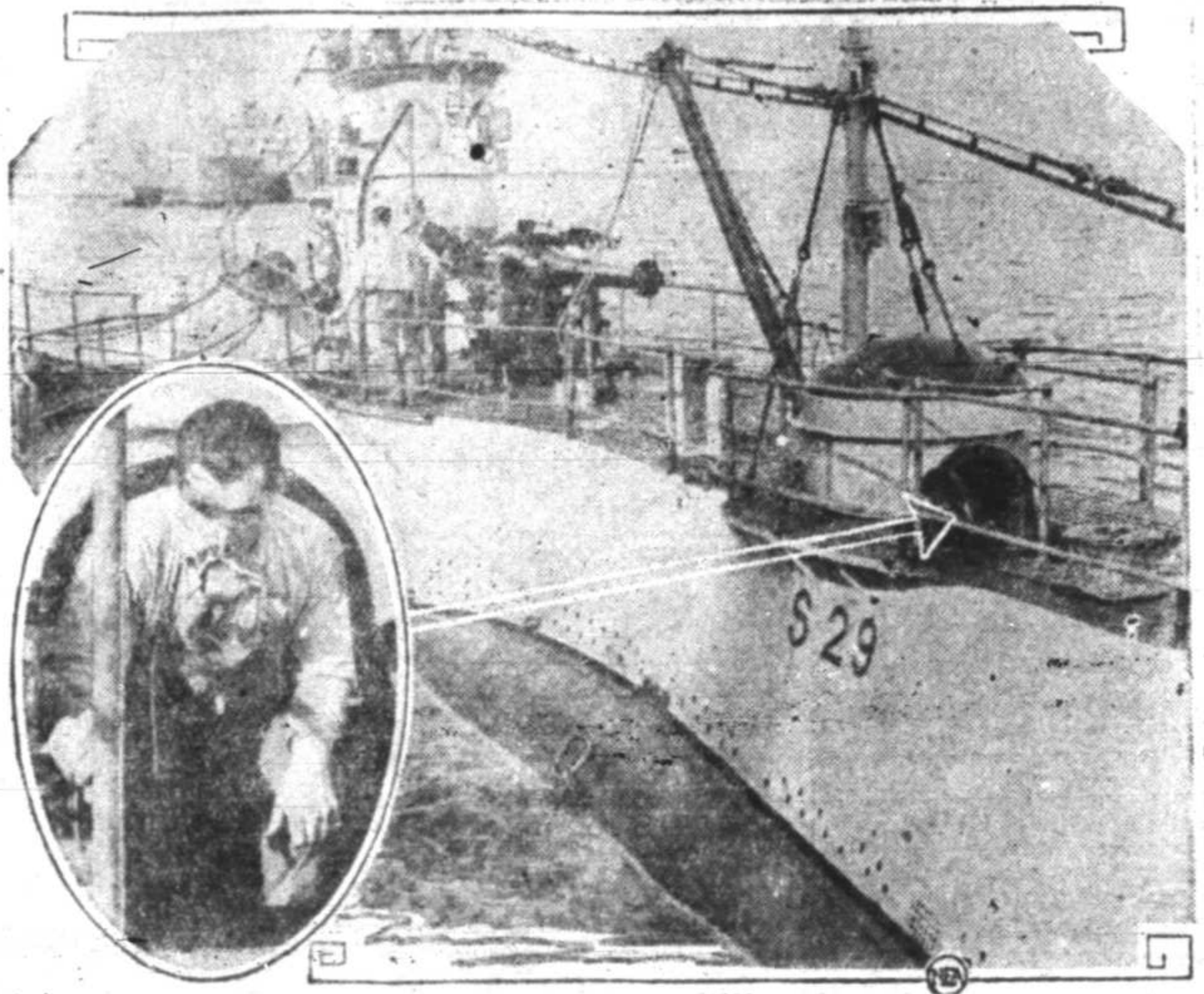
Then two buoys are released. One, painted in bright colors, is a marker or signal buoy. It floats to the surface and marks the submarine's position so that rescue ships can find it easily. A telephone wire and instrument are included, so that men on the surface can talk to the men below, thus eliminating the necessity of sending down divers to hammer messages on the steel hull in the Morse code as in the tragic case of the S-4.

The other buoy supports the lites on which the men will go to the surface.

When these preparations have been made, the sailors open a door out low in the side of the lock, duck down through it and step out into the water, holding on to the life-line as they rise to the surface.

Must Ascend Slowly
Extreme care must be taken not to come up too fast, for the sudden change from high pressure gives a man the dreaded "bends," which is often fatal. So a sailor escaping from a submarine has to stop every 10 feet and breathe deeply: 10 times at the first stop, 20 times at the second, and so on.

Eventually, he reaches the surface and clings to the buoy, where he is picked up by a rescue ship. The escape hatch is somewhat

similar, but much more simple. It is simply a cylindrical tube extending downward through the submarine's deck, that is entered directly from the flooded compartment by men who find temporary safety in the air pocket created near the ceiling.

In a submarine equipped with both of these devices there are, accordingly, two methods for escape from a sunken sub.

No More Worry Turnover
The S-29 is also equipped with a series of "sand eyes," or rings of steel attached to the outer shell. If a submarine is on the bottom, divers from salvage ships can attach the lifting portlines to these rings without the laborious work of days in tunneling through the mud to pass cables underneath. In the effort to raise the S-31, which sank off Block Island several years ago, many weeks were wasted because the divers were forced to dig tunnels under the sunken bulk in order to pass cables and chains around it.

There are also numerous other less important safety features now in use.

Two Men Are Shot To Death in Duel

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 11.—Jose Angel Trujillo, mayor of Toluca, Jalisco, and Juvenio Munoz, former rebel chief, shot each other to death in a duel in the main plaza of that town, says a dispatch to La Prensa.

The dispatch said the plaza was crowded with promenadeurs who were thrown into a panic when the two men met accidentally and immediately opened fire at each other. Personal enmity dating from a year ago when Trujillo headed agrarian forces against Munoz's rebellion led to the shooting.

Dimmitt Man Will Get Sanity Trial

(Special To The Avalanche)
PLAINVIEW, Feb. 11.—Charles Dean, Castro county attorney, announced today that a insanity charge will be filed against W. L. Schmidt, 38, arrested in connection with the death of his wife, Saturday. A preliminary hearing for the man was abandoned Monday.

Schmidt, it was said, once was a patient in a private sanatorium. Witnesses said Mrs. Schmidt died from a charge from a shotgun fired into her head as she was seized on a bench in the home of her brother-in-law, C. R. Fisher, at Dimmitt.

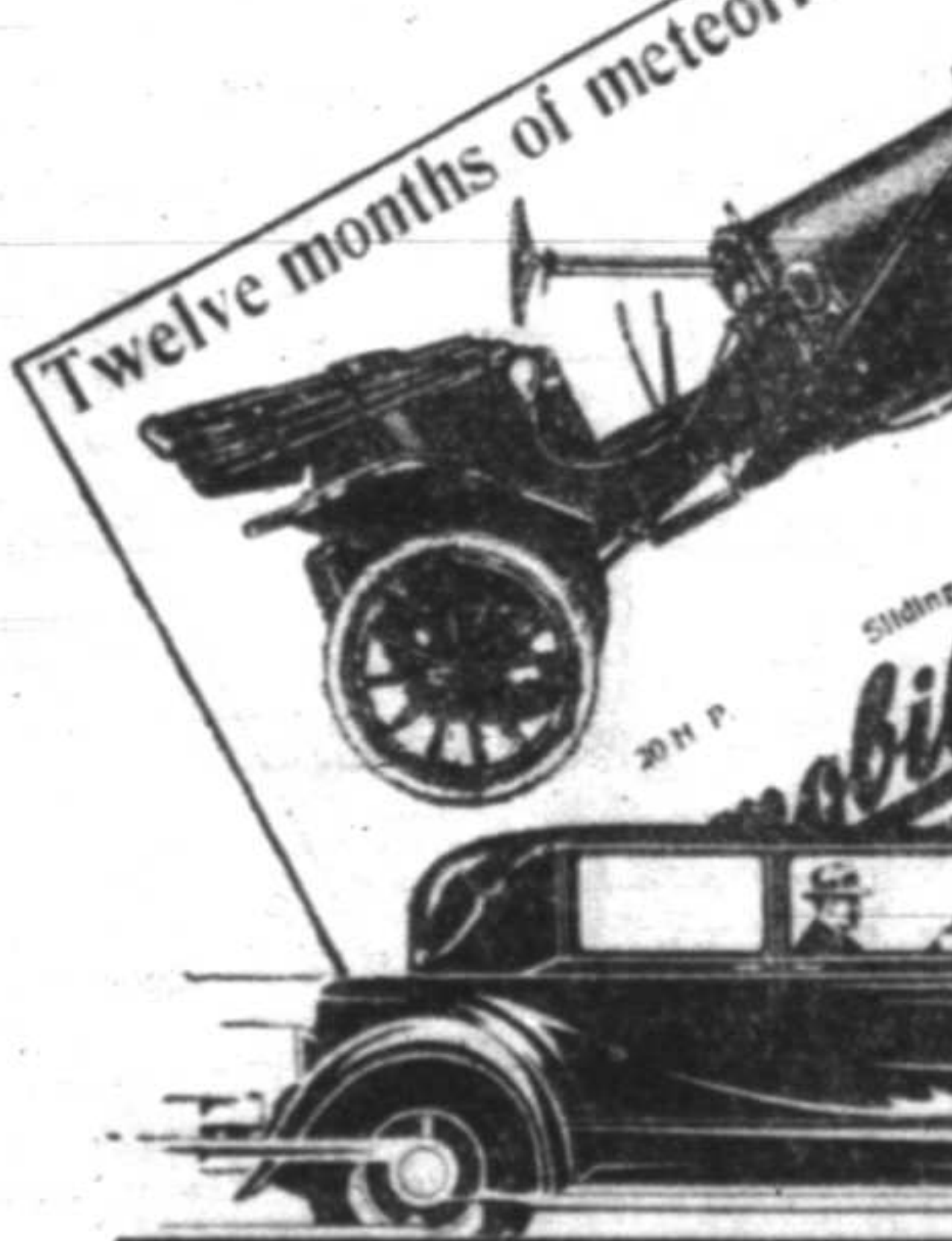

In a hair-raising exhibition that saw the lead alternate spasmodically, the stampeding herd of Buffaloes from Canyon nosed out the Texas Tech basketballers at the college gymnasium last night, 37 to 35, to sweep the two-game series and end the 1930 home schedule for the Crimson court artists.

A whirlwind battle for points from the first to the last whistle, the game, witnessed by approximately 1,800 frenzied fans, was the most bitter court struggle seen in these parts for many a moon.

Both clubs went at top speed and neither held any decided advantage at any part of the contest.

Free Throws Win
Ability to sink their free throws proved in the end to be the narrow margin that gave the invaders their second straight triumph over Tech's cagers. The Matadors were penalized 15 times by Referee Dalton while the Buffs drew but eight.

Tech's sharpshooters held the edge in field goals, 14 to 13, but the Buffs' frequent shots from the foul line overcame this margin.

Showing a decided reversal of form in comparison with their performance of Monday night, the Scarlet-clad cagers took the lead early in the opening period and held a margin through the major part of this half. It was Clarence Hodges again that showed off-way for the homeboys, scoring eight of the 16 points registered by the Buffs in the initial stanza. But the entire Tech crew went into the melee with blood in their eyes and the herd was battled with a vengeance.

Buffs Take Lead
A sudden spur toward the close of the opening period, led by Keith and Newman, enabled the Buffs to break into the lead and the half ended with the visitors leading, 18 to 12.

Oklahoman Takes Issue On Opinion Of Red River Bed

Assistant Attorney General In Hearing On Johnson Bill Before Interstate Commerce Commission

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11. (AP)—W. C. Lewis, assistant attorney general of Oklahoma, today took issue with Attorney General Mitchell's opinion on ownership of the bed of the Red river in a hearing on the Johnson bill before the interstate commerce commission.

The Johnson bill would authorize Texas and Oklahoma to build a bridge across the Red river, between Ringgold, Texas and Terrell, Oklahoma.

Plan Explained
Lewis explained the proposed interstate free bridge would be constructed a half mile from a toll bridge belonging to the Red river bridge company of Texas.

He said a bitter struggle of the two states with the bridge company had made it necessary to come to congress.

Lewis asserted the Red River Bridge company had refused to sell its bridge for less than a million dollars, holding that a perpetual franchise purchased from Indian owners, was worth that much, although the bridge cost but \$20,000 to build. Lewis contended the United States owned full title to the entire river bed and that the federal government should operate with two states in building the bridge.

Opinion Read
Representative Denison, republican, Illinois, read an opinion by Attorney General Mitchell holding that no portion of the Red river bed between the east border of Oklahoma and the 98th meridian is owned by the United States government.

Mitchell held the United States by treaty conveyed the Red river bed to Chickasaw and Choctaw Indians.

"I have the highest respect for general Mitchell but I disagree with that opinion of law," said Lewis.

He further asserted that the federal government had jurisdiction because it involved a compact between states.

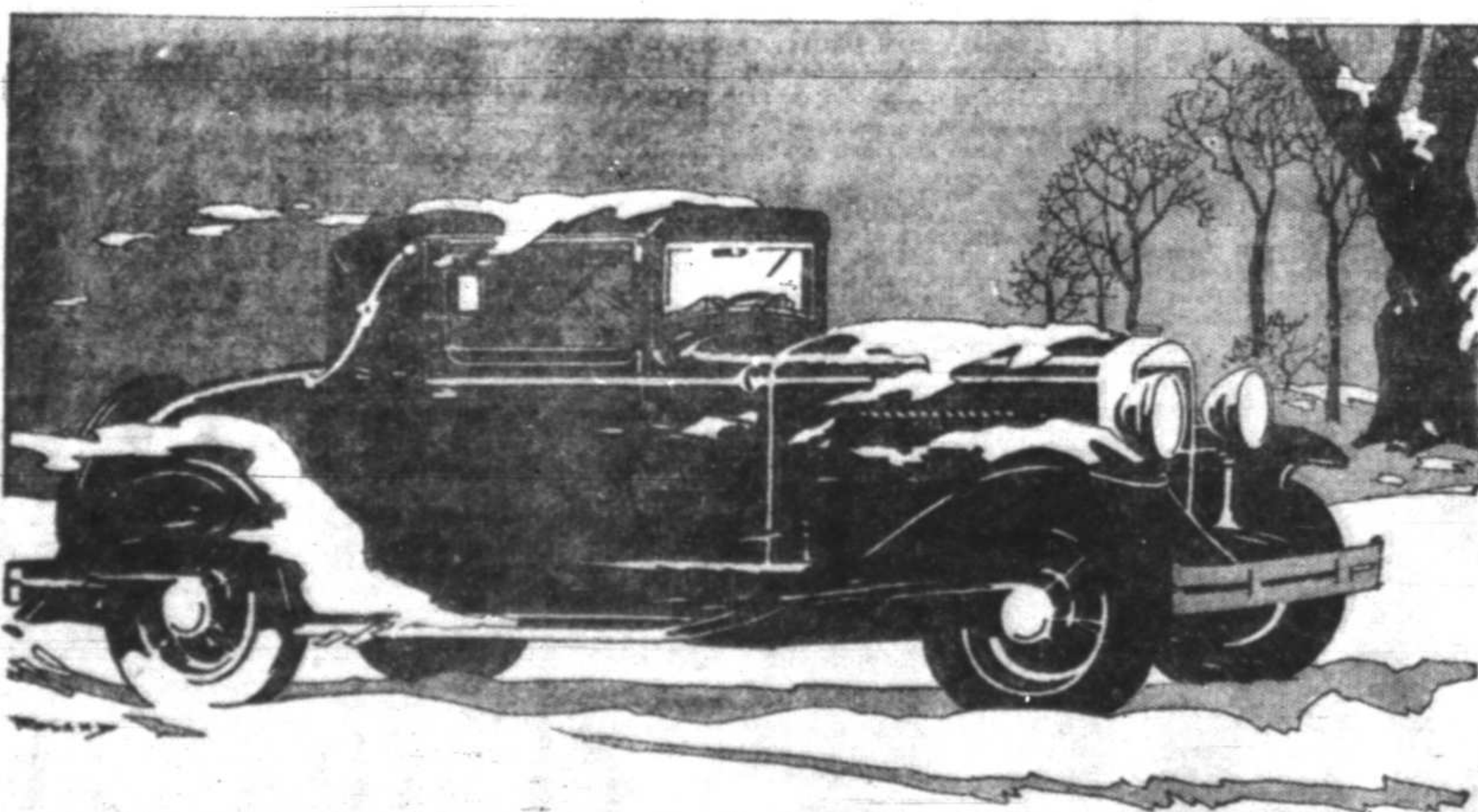

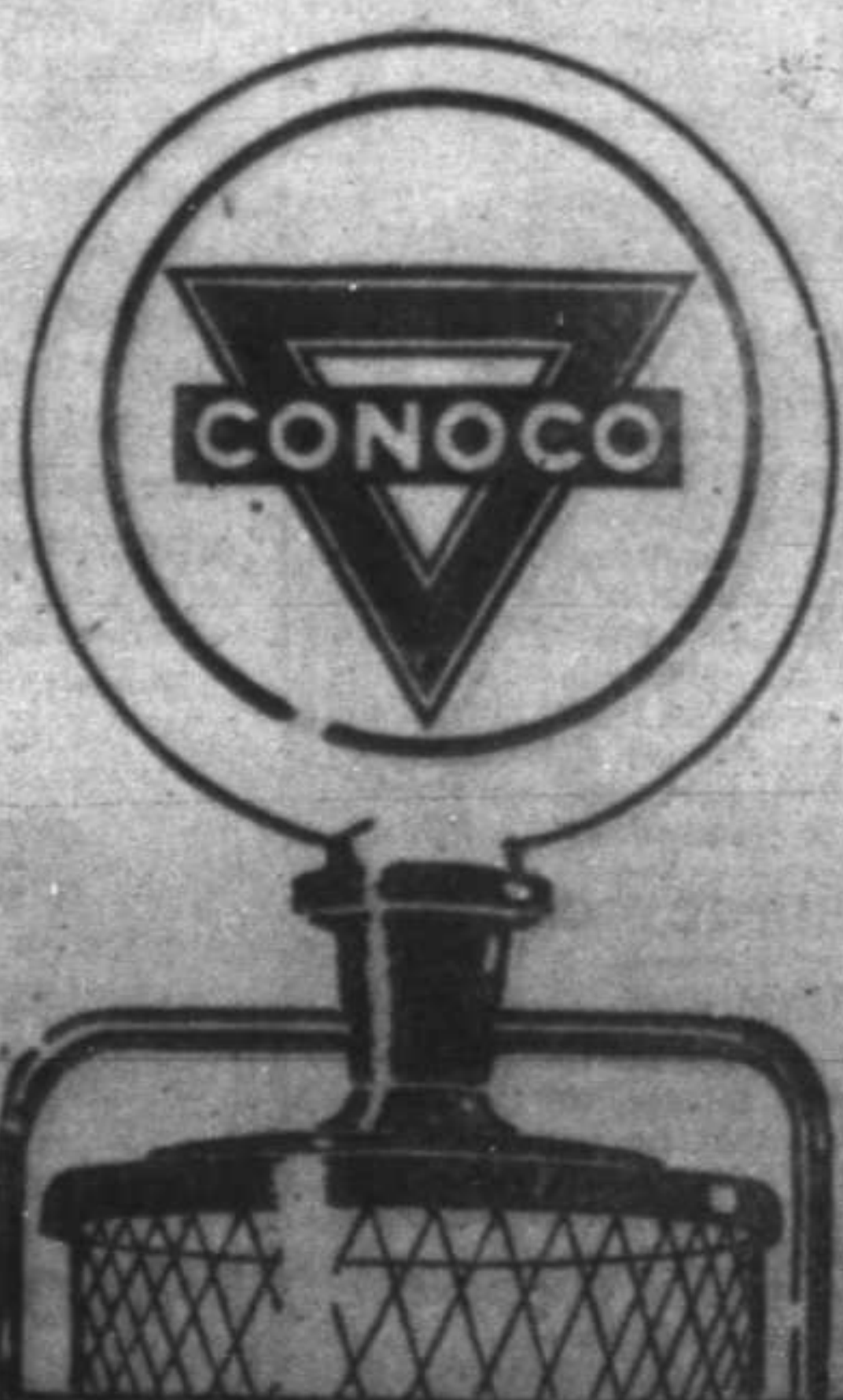

Mohair Producers Co-Op Is Formed

Letters Sent To Members Of Marketing Organization In Accordance With Plans Of Farm Board

UVALDE, Feb. 11. (P)—Letters have been sent members of the American Mohair Producers' Cooperative Marketing corporation by Roy J. Davenport, president, announcing the organization has been completed and is ready to function in relief manner, in accordance with plans of the federal farm board.

A credit of \$1,000,000 in the form of pre-shearing advances of 50¢ per head on sheep and goats which have a six-months growth of wool and mohair, and \$1 per head for animals which have a 12-months growth, has been arranged through the national credit corporation, a government agency, for distribution among members.

The relief is expected to mean revolutionizing of the industry throughout the country, and it is hoped, eventually stabilize wool and mohair prices.

Davenport condemned the practice of what he termed "the speculative element of the state" in trying to establish prices of 33 and 45 cents per pound for mature and kid mohair, respectively, declaring if such prices as these prevail, the industry will be destroyed, as goat men can not pay expenses of operation at these figures.

Auto Protective Company Formed

Announcement was made yesterday of the establishment of district offices of the Automobile Protective Association, Inc., of Texas, in the Hilton Hotel with Tom Smith, formerly of Trinity, as manager.

The association will seek to organize automobile owners of Lubbock and this section of Texas into clubs which will affiliate with others of the state and nation.

Five major departments are included in the organization of the association, namely, legal, medical, claim, legislative and service departments.

Normal Level in Production Shown

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11. (P)—An approximately normal level in the production and distribution of commodities in the United States for this season was announced today by Secretary Lamont after a study of business survey data received at the department of commerce.

He asserted also a conviction that the unemployment situation was more favorable than might have been expected in view of the stock market slump last fall.

"It is to be remembered that January and February represent rather low point periods in the calendar schedule of American business," Secretary Lamont said.

"They are stock taking periods for most large corporations and are not the months in which enterprises are usually extended."

"However, we are having pretty good reports from construction and from productions generally, and there are grounds for assuming that this is about the normal year."

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11. (P)—President Hoover took another step toward development of a new policy in the Caribbean today by appointing a commission to study the question of when and how the United States should withdraw from participation in the affairs of Haiti.

W. Cameron Forbes of Massachusetts, former governor general of the Philippines, was named chairman. Henry P. Fletcher of Pennsylvania, former ambassador to Rome and widely experienced in Latin American affairs, was named as the second member of the group. Other members are Elie Verina, of Rhode Island, a student of Haitian affairs; James Kermey, editor of the Trenton, N. J., Times, and William Allen White, editor of Emporia, Kansas, Gazette. The commission will leave for Haiti late this month.

ONE PERMIT ISSUED

February Building Total Given Slight Boost

Building valuations in Lubbock for the month of February were slightly raised Tuesday with the issuance of one permit totalling \$500. The aggregate for the month now stands at \$103,650 for 11 permits.

Nation Pauses to Observe Birthday Of Abraham Lincoln, War President



ABRAHAM LINCOLN

One hundred and twenty-one years ago, in Hardin county, Kentucky, was born a man who was to become the 16th president of the United States. Today the nation pauses in observance of that natal day the anniversary of the birth of Abraham Lincoln.

President during the titanic struggle between the states assassinated by John Wilkes Booth, an eccentric actor, Lincoln has become a national hero, although states of the secession are not given to enshrining him to the extent of those north of the Mason-Dixon line.

Brief observance of Lincoln's birthday is being taken in Lubbock. Aside from the closing of the banks no formalities are being observed. Officials of the city schools system and of Texas Technological college said no Lincoln program was planned.

Hershey, New Feed Crop, Does Good In Scurry County; Diversification Of Area Gaining National Attention

"Cow, Sow And Hen" Slogan Brings County To The Front; F. I. Townsend Raising New Crop.

LUBBOCK, Feb. 11. (P)—Scurry county in the past few years has accomplished many worth while projects some of which have secured national recognition. One of the most outstanding was the fact that the slogan "The Cow, Sow and Hen" was coined in Scurry county by a Snyder resident, E. J. Anderson, who at the time was secretary of the Scurry county Chamber of Commerce.

Shortly after that, Glen Garner stepped into the international limelight and won the world's record for wheat production per acre when fact was thoroughly broadcast to the world by the publicity department of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

Accomplishments Recorded
Many other noteworthy accomplishments have been recorded of more or less local and state interest, but Scurry county is stepping into the headlines again with a new feed and forage crop that is destined to revolutionize agricultural attitudes. This crop-known as Hershey has been eminently successful in Colorado and North Dakota and a Scurry county farmer is responsible for the project.

The new crop as stated, is called Hershey and first came to the attention of F. I. Townsend, pioneer farmer of near Snyder, about three months ago when an agricultural program was being broadcast from Station KOA, Denver. Hershey is termed a semi-arid crop and was brought to the United States from Russia and tried out in Colorado and North Dakota. Actual demonstration by farmers and experiment stations in both states have shown that the crop has actually matured in 45 days, and bears grain grown as a feed for poultry.

Not a seed catalog in the United States contains the name of this feed crop and after several months of close study and investigation, Mr. Townsend has ascertained sources of supply which will permit the purchase of a carload of the seed for use in Scurry county. Mr. Townsend's argument primarily was to secure a feed and forage crop for West Texas that would mature quicker than maize. As it now stands, maize planted here April 1st takes 120 days before it can be harvested and comparing this with Hershey that takes only 45 to 60 days to mature makes a vast difference.

Requires Less Water
An appeals thought to West Texas is the fact that the crop requires much less water to produce than does milo maize kaffir and cane and will yield from 20 to 50 bushels per acre. Mr. Townsend found in one instance in North Dakota where the crop produced unusually well that they had only 14 inches of rainfall. Comparing that with an average Scurry county rainfall of 22-24 inches should mean a great deal toward the successful raising of Hershey in this section and should likewise be good at many other points in Texas.

According to Mr. Townsend, "there are two varieties of Hershey one is a dwarf and the other a taller variety, both varieties, producing grain about the size of cane seed. The dwarf variety is usually sown broadcast and cut with a binder combine in the same manner as wheat is harvested. While the taller variety can be handled in the same manner in localities such as West Texas where the rainfall is light, the best method is to plant it in rows and cultivate as we do cane, and harvest with a row binder. The new crop will occasion no expenditure for machinery other than a now on every West Texas farm right now."

Can Plant Hershey
Farmers of West Texas and more particularly of Scurry county who are short of feed can plant Hershey the first of April and by June 1st the crop will be ready to harvest," said Mr. Townsend who has been a pioneer agricultural booster in this section. Mr. Townsend adding "The farmer will then have feed to enable him to finish the cultivation of his crops without buying it and can then prepare the same land and plant a second crop of Hershey using the seed grown in the first crop."

After several months of correspondence with growers, feeders and agricultural agents I was thoroughly convinced that if Hershey could be introduced into Scurry county on a large scale that it would save the farmers of this section, thousands of dollars during the present year and be of untold benefits in the years to come," said Townsend.

"I have presented the matter to Mr. O. P. Thrane of the Snyder National bank and likewise being impressed with the benefits that will accrue to the people of the county as a result of the introduction of this crop, he has voluntarily proposed to furnish the money to purchase a carload of Hershey planting seed with a local grocery to distribute the same."

Concluding the interview, Mr. Townsend said "Figure about 3 pounds of seed to the acre where planted in 3-foot rows and 15 pounds if broadcasted. The price for the seed we figure will be around 5 1-2 cents per pound which would include freight, unloading and drayage."

PLAN SHORT COURSE

Dairy Event At Lamesa To Be Held In April

(Special To The Avalanche)
LAMESA, Feb. 11.—Plans are under way here by merchants and farmers to present a three-day dairy short course during April in connection with opening of Lamesa's \$200,000 powdered milk factory. Sponsors already have laid initial plans.

There are at present 10,000 head of dairy and milk cows in Dawson county according to a recent survey. A large number have been shipped in lately by farmers who plan to supply the new factory with milk.
