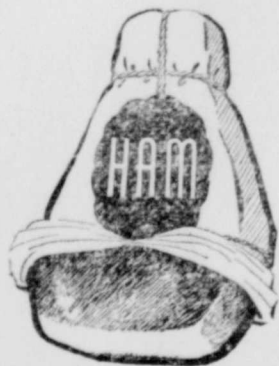

Now lets follow up last week's suggestion of Kitchen Planning. To get full benefit from your electrical equipment, or any other kitchen equipment plan the location of each piece, before you buy any of it. This planning and measuring will save time and money when you start building and it will add convenience, comfort and appearance to your home when it is ready for use.

Locating your electrical kitchen equipment to save time and labor is of first importance in making housework easier and more pleasant. Consider the work you do there and other types of jobs you may want to do there, keeping in mind the size of your family and the number of people who will help with kitchen jobs. Then make a plan for proper use of your new equipment. Remember it is not a job that has to be done all at one time. With a good plan as a guide, you can modernize your kitchen step-by-step, with just the right place for each piece of equipment, electrical and otherwise, that you may add over a period of time.

Modern kitchen planning is based on three main work centers: 1st.—Food preparation and storage center, 2nd.—Sink and cleaning center, 3rd.—Cooking and serving center. By applying this "center" plan you simplify your kitchen work. You have everything that you may use at each center arranged so that it can be reached easily with little waste motion.

Since the food preparation and storage center is planned around the refrigerator, the ideal place for the refrigerator is near the outside door where food supplies are brought into the house. Then with plenty of cabinet space for storage of staple supplies, utensils, and small appliances, such as an electric mixer, and a convenient work center adjoining the refrigerator the preparing and mixing of foods should be a simple matter.

For the sink and cleaning center, it is a good plan to locate the sink between the food preparation and cooking centers and in easy reach of both. And then plan for plenty of work counter-space on each side of the sink for cleaning fruits and vegetables and for stacking dishes and utensils. And any Homemaker wants plenty of cabinet space within easy reach for storing "everyday dishes," and cleaning supplies. And a ventilated storage space near the sink for damp towels is very convenient. The cooking and serving center which is planned around the range is often located near the dining room door so the food may be taken directly from range to table—piping hot and without wasted steps. And make plans for ample cabinet space to store cooking utensils and serving dishes near the range. This will speed up the cooking and food serving job.

If every inch of kitchen space is planned and measured to fit your equipment then it does not matter if you have planned a U-shaped, an L-shaped or a Two-wall type of kitchen, and you may be assured of a convenient, labor saving meal planning center that will be a joy to work in.

And good kitchen-equipment arrangement is closely connected with adequate wiring to serve all your equipment whether electrical or otherwise. Good lighting in the kitchen is just as necessary to prevent eyestrain and add efficiency to a Homemaker's kitchen work as it is necessary in any other part of her home.

TO HOLD SERVICE OFFICERS SCHOOL AT MIDLAND

The Veterans Affairs Commission of Texas announced today that it will hold a Service Officers School in Midland on Saturday and Sunday, April 10 and 11, 1948, in the County Court Room.

This school will be for County and Veteran Organization Post and Chapter Service Officers within a radius of approximately seventy-five to one hundred miles of Midland. All persons interested in veterans' affairs are cordially invited to attend.

This is one of a series of schools being held by the Veterans Affairs Commission throughout Texas. The purpose is to stress instruction on insurance, education, deceased and living veteran benefits, hospitalization, out-patient treatment, compensation, and pensions, etc.

Mr. Harry E. Rather, Education-

al Officer of the Commission, will conduct the school and will be assisted by representatives from the Veterans Administration, State and National Service Officers of the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Disabled American Veterans, and Federal and State Agencies.

BLOCKER WAREHOUSE COMPLETED

Horace Blocker's large concrete block warehouse across the railroad track, east of the T&P depot has been completed. The back part will be used as a garage shop to keep the fleet of trucks Blocker has in use to deliver butane and Cosden gasoline and oils in condition to provide prompt and regular service. In the front of the building will be a showroom for Pontiac automobiles and GMC trucks, of which Blocker has the agency for Martin county.

SIDELIGHTS ON GRAIN SORGHUM

Recently I have discussed with Secretary of Agriculture Clinton Anderson and other officials of the government the possibility of developing better markets for West Texas grain sorghum overseas. Our grain sorghums are now being utilized in many parts of the world.

India is our heaviest overseas consumer of grain sorghum, and the Indians pay cash for it and complain they are not permitted to buy more. There is a quota system in operation which governs all our shipments of grain abroad. Recently we were successful in getting an increase in the grain sorghum quota for overseas shipment.

Exports of grain sorghum to India during the last 9 months approximate 10 million bushels. This includes March shipments which are now enroute.

I am told that the Indians grind the grain and cook it pancake-fashion on top of the stove. In Germany the Germans eat their West Texas grain sorghum in the form of a mush or gruel. In Japan the grain sorghum is milled and used as flour or is polished and used in the whole grain as a substitute for rice.

Last year the U. S. production of grain sorghum was 107 million bushels. Texas producing 69 million bushels of that amount. The largest portion of the U. S. production will be utilized for stock feed but in excess of 4 million bushels will be used for human food in Japan, Korea and Germany, in addition to the shipments to India.

A good price for grain sorghum is a very important factor in the maintenance of agricultural prosperity in West Texas. This is true despite the fact that grain sorghum production in the Nation is relatively small compared to wheat and corn. Last year the U. S. produced 12 times more wheat and 22 times more corn than the grain sorghum production.

Mercy Flights Save Fire-Riddled Village

Isolated Hamlet Receives Food, Clothing and Medicine

GOOSE BAY, LABRADOR.—Canadian and United States airmen, flying out of this jointly operated air outpost, joined in a mercy flight to take relief to the 126 inhabitants of the partly burned out fishing settlement of Makkovik, Labrador.

Food, clothing and medical supplies were dropped by parachute from two C-47s. Other supplies were flown in by a single engine RCAF plane equipped with skis to the tiny hamlet devastated by fire.

Nearly all of the community's food, clothing and medical supplies were burned. There was no loss of life.

To get word of the disaster out of the isolated location, a dog sled driver traveled 65 miles over rough terrain to Cape Harrison, Labrador. The settlement's only short wave radio was destroyed in the fire.

First to meet the ski plane, which landed on a frozen lake, was the Rev. George Harp, in charge of the Moravian mission. Mr. Harp, who also serves as doctor, dentist and midwife to his tiny flock, said that two large buildings, the schoolhouse, missionary homes, a stores warehouse and a church had been destroyed. Also destroyed were 160 sacks of flour, 40 sacks of sugar and valuable medical supplies, including penicillin.

"We are destitute," he said. "We have no food, very little clothing and no medical supplies."

His immediate worry was how enough food and clothing could be shipped arrived in September, 1947, brought to the village. The last and ice conditions will prevent the arrival of another one until next summer.

Mr. Harp said some of the people, panicstricken by the fire, had raided the few supplies that were saved.

Prisoner Hears Evidence, Imposes Sentence on Self

ASTORIA, ORE.—James Hansen pleaded not guilty to a charge of drunkenness.

Municipal Judge Robert Anderson heard the evidence. So did Hansen. Both obviously found it staggering.

"Now what would you do, Mr. Hansen, if you were in my place?" the judge asked.

"I'd find the prisoner guilty," said the defendant.

"What sentence would you impose?" his honor asked. Hansen pondered, then replied:

"Fifteen dollars fine and 20 days."

"I concur in the sentence," said Judge Anderson.

Amish Mite Case Appears

Closed as Churchman Pays WOOSTER, OHIO.—The widely publicized Amish "mite" case is closed unless Amish church officials reimpose a social boycott against Andy Yoder, according to counsel for the 33-year-old farmer.

Minister John J. Nisley, one of four Amish churchmen named defendants in the suit, paid the \$2,939 balance on the \$5,000 judgment awarded Yoder by a common pleas court jury.

First payment on the judgment was obtained when property belonging to Bishop John W. Helmuth was offered at a sheriff's sale.

Army Parachutes Sled Dogs

To Rescue Plane Survivors GOOSE BAY, LABRADOR.—A new technique for rescuing survivors of plane crashes in the frozen Labrador wastelands by pin-pointing dogsled teams by parachute has been developed by the air transport command.

The newly developed operation "dogsled" will save precious hours for plane crash survivors exposed to the bitter cold and possibly suffering from injuries received when their craft plunged earthward.

Conceived by Col. George E. Abbott, Norfolk, Va., the unusual rescue operation is especially valuable because some areas of the woody terrain in Labrador are so dense that helicopters cannot land.

Huskies, sleds and para-doctors jump from C-47's via the silk chute route and gather together at a focal point where dog teams are assembled. Then the unit proceeds to the scene of the crash where it administers first aid, evacuates the seriously wounded and provides food.

The entire procedure lasts only a few minutes, contrasting sharply with the hours and days that it has taken overland rescue teams to reach crash scenes in the past.

Zoo Visitor Seeks Fleas

Of Grizzly for Collection ST. LOUIS.—Officials of the zoo here receive many strange requests but were completely nonplussed recently when a Tennessee flea collector offered 50 cents for two fleas from a grizzly bear with an affidavit to prove their origin.

Every fall the zoo is deluged with requests to borrow or rent tigers, camels, elephants and bears. Such requests usually are made by colleges which want the animals for mascots. All are turned down.

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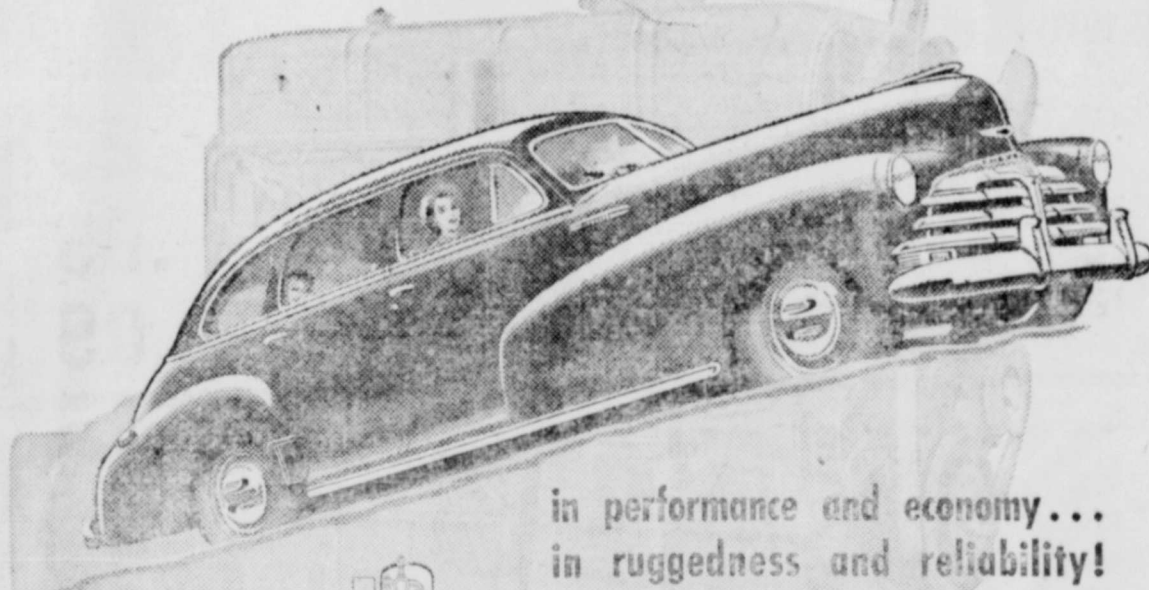
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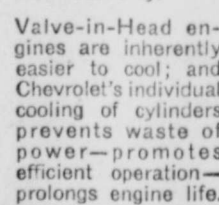

NEW YORK.—Chances of college graduates finding employment are only fair, according to Lawrence W. Zimmer, director of the New York university employment service.

Best job prospects are in the public and private accounting fields, he said. His survey showed the engineering field to be "spotty," the merchandise management field "fair" and advertising, journalism and investment banking "very poor."

Slackest employment period of the year always occurs around January 1 when seasonal layoffs are heaviest. Continued expansion in employee demand that was noticeable during the war has leveled off. Openings now are largely replacements.

Scientists Hunt Methods To Control Huge Rockets

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Army scientists report that they are at work on various electronic devices, including radar, to perfect control of huge rockets.

They are developing new and more powerful rocket motors for guided missiles but controlling the missiles is still their biggest problem.

The Germans found during the last war that their V-2 rocket was a destructive weapon, but control at best was haphazard.

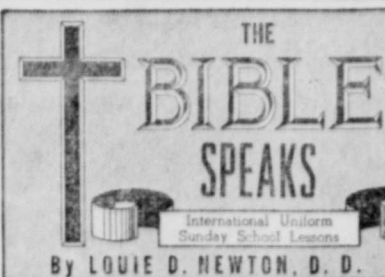

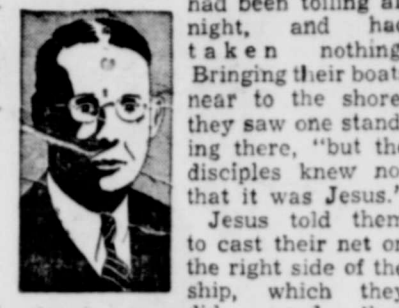
Eternal Life

Lesson for March 28, 1948

"THE Lord has risen indeed," and because he lives, we too shall live. Easter is the day that reminds us of this blessed truth—the truth of eternal life. Well has Henry Burton expressed it in these lines:

*"There's a light upon the mountains,
And the day is at the spring,
When our eyes shall see the beauty
And the glory of the King;
Weary was our heart with waiting,
And the night watch seemed so long,
But his triumph day is breaking,
And we hail it with a song.
"He is breaking down the barriers;
He is casting up the way;
He is calling for his angels
To build up the gates of day;
But his angels here are human,
Not the shining hosts above;
And the drumbeats of his army
Are the heartbeats of our love."*

BREAKFAST BY THE LAKE
READ John 21:1-14 for the exquisite account of Jesus appearing to his disciples in the early morning at the sea of Tiberias. They had been toiling all night, and had taken nothing. Bringing their boats near to the shore, they saw one standing there, "but the disciples knew not that it was Jesus."

Jesus told them to cast their net on the right side of the ship, which they did, and they caught 153 "great fishes." Jesus then summoned them to breakfast. He had prepared the bread and fish on coals of fire. And they did eat.

BLESSED ASSURANCE
BEFORE his death, Jesus had said to his disciples, "Because I live, you will live also," John 14:19, but they did not fully grasp the meaning of the great words. But that morning on the sea shore, they understood. They remembered that he had died on the cross, and now they were assured that he was really alive, for this was the third time he had appeared unto the disciples after the resurrection.

How happy they must have been! How happy we should be on this recurring Easter season, assured that he is alive evermore. And because he lives, we too shall live.

WHAT IS ETERNAL LIFE?
SUNDAY'S lesson leads us on to the answer to the question, What is eternal life? In Colossians 3:1-4 and 12-17, we have the declaration, "Your life is hid with Christ in God. . . ." If we have believed on him — cast ourselves in implicit trust into his keeping — we have eternal life, which is his gift to every believing heart.

Paul goes on to admonish those who have "entered into life eternal," through faith in the risen, reigning Saviour, to put on the garments of his presence and power and peace — kindness, humility, meekness, long-suffering, forbearance, forgiveness.

The evidence of eternal life is to be found in the fruits of the Spirit in our daily lives.

CERTAINTY OF ETERNAL LIFE
WE READ in John 17:3 this word of further assurance, "This is eternal life, that they know thee the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom thou hast sent." And in 1 John 5:11-12, we read, "And this is the record, that God hath given to us eternal life, and this life is in his Son. He that hath the Son hath life; and he that hath not the Son of God hath not life."

In another passage John tells that we know that we have passed from death unto life because we love the brethren.

Easter is the day of eternal hope. It lifts above the fog of earthiness the glory of the blessed hope that fadeth not away. We have God's own testimony that we shall live with him forever, through Jesus Christ, our risen, reigning, returning Lord.
