Second Trade Day To Be Bigger And Better

The second monthly Trade Day is being planned in Bogata for Saturday, October 12, where local residents, pleased with the results from the first Trade Day in September, are searching their closets and attics for more articles to be put on sale.

Thirty-five stalls were marked off and rented before noon during the last Trade Day, and the swappers came to Bogata from as far away as Dallas. This month's merchandise for sale will include rock collections, barbed wire collections, bottles, boots, type drawers and engravings, handmade pottery, painting, primitives, new merchandise from downtown Bogata merchants, guns, trailers and coins, plus countless miscellaneous items.

The Trade Day is held on the city block surrounding the Tip Top Drive In, and proceeds from the rental of stalls are donated to the Bogata P.T.A. for the air conditioning fund.

A drawing will be held at the October 12 Trade Day, in which a number of Bogata merchants will give away free prizes. There is no purchase necessary, and you do not have to be present to win. Registration blanks may be completed at any Bogata store, or at the Trade Day, with the drawing to be at 3:00 p.m.

Brahmas Dump Rebels

A fumble during the last seconds of the game on Paul Pewitt's three yard line following a spectacular Rebel drive from their own 35 yard line ended the Rivercrest hopes of tying or beating the Brahmas Friday at Rebel Stadium. The Brahmas won 13-6.

The Rebels had already suffered some severe setbacks during the ball game, mostly at the hands of a Brahma 187-lb. back, James Favors, when they rallied late in the fourth quarter to the brink of paydirt.

The twin brother combination of Jimmy and Jerry Curties sparked the drive with two pass completions of 15 and 17 yards. Both catches were outstanding, with Jerry dancing along the chalk line to stay in bounds on one reception, and juggling the ball on his fingertips for the second. The Rebels had first and goal to go on the three when the fumble ended the drive.

The Rebels were quick to score in the first quarter when they started their touchdown drive in their own 37, then drove to the one yard line and sent Randy Jones in for the score. Glenn Fulbright made a 27 yard run on a pitchout from quarterback Curties, and Jones also was a big contributor in that drive with a 14 yard run.

The Rebels drew an illegal motion penalty on the try for extra point and the kick through the crossbars by Jerry Curties was voided.

The Brahmas next series ended with a fumble that was recovered by Rebel Randy Belcher on the Rivercrest 36 yard line, but Rivercrest was unable to move the ball. On fourth down and five, quarterback Jimmy Curties set the squad as if the Rebels were going to try for the first down, then dropped back quickly to try to surprise the Brahmas and draw them offside. Failing that, Curties surprised the fans with a long, high punt that went 43 yards into the end zone. The punting duties for the Rebels normally rest on the shoulders of Jerry Curties.

The second quarter belonged to the Brahmas, with the Rebels running only six plays from scrimmage to 23 for Paul Pewitt. Jerry Curties turned in a 53 yard punt to put the ball in play for the Brahmas on their own 17 yard line, but that was the only positive action by the Rebels in that quarter.

In the third quarter, Clyde Brown found himself in the right place, and intercepted a pass thrown by Brahma quarterback Steve Johnson, on the 25 yard line. Brown returned the interception to the Rivercrest 44 yard line before being brought down, but two plays later a fumble by Randy Jones turned the ball back to Paul Pewitt on the Rivercrest 47.

This possession by Paul Pewitt turned into their first score, with Mitch Batchlor going 27 yards over the left side. The try for an extra point was blocked. Pewitt kept their game on the ground and gained six, seven and eight yards per carry to put another touchdown on the board, and this time added an extra point, bringing the score to 13-6 for the night.

Individual performances by Rebel offensive players were led by Glenn Fulbright, who made eight first downs, lost one fumble, attempted one pass, carried the ball 23 times for 139 yards, and returned on

kickoff for 19 yards.

Jerry Curties made three first downs, caught three passes for 53 yards, kicked off two times for a total of 73 yards, and punted once for 53 yards. Randy Jones made two first downs, lost one fumble, carried four times for 22 yards, returned two kickoffs for 25 yards, and scored six points.

Jimmy Curties made one first down, had two passes intercepted, completed four passes for 62 yards, and attempted 11 passes. Curties carried twice for three yards and punted once for 43 yards.

Mike Medlin recovered a Rivercrest fumble. Sammy Ellis caught one pass for

seven yards and carried three times for nine yards. Randy Belcher recovered a Brahma fumble.

Bill Montgomery and Mike Glosson each deflected a Brahma pass, and Montgomery, Glosson and Keigt Mankins sacked the Brahma quarterback once for a 14 yard loss.

Junior Varsity Loses To Rams

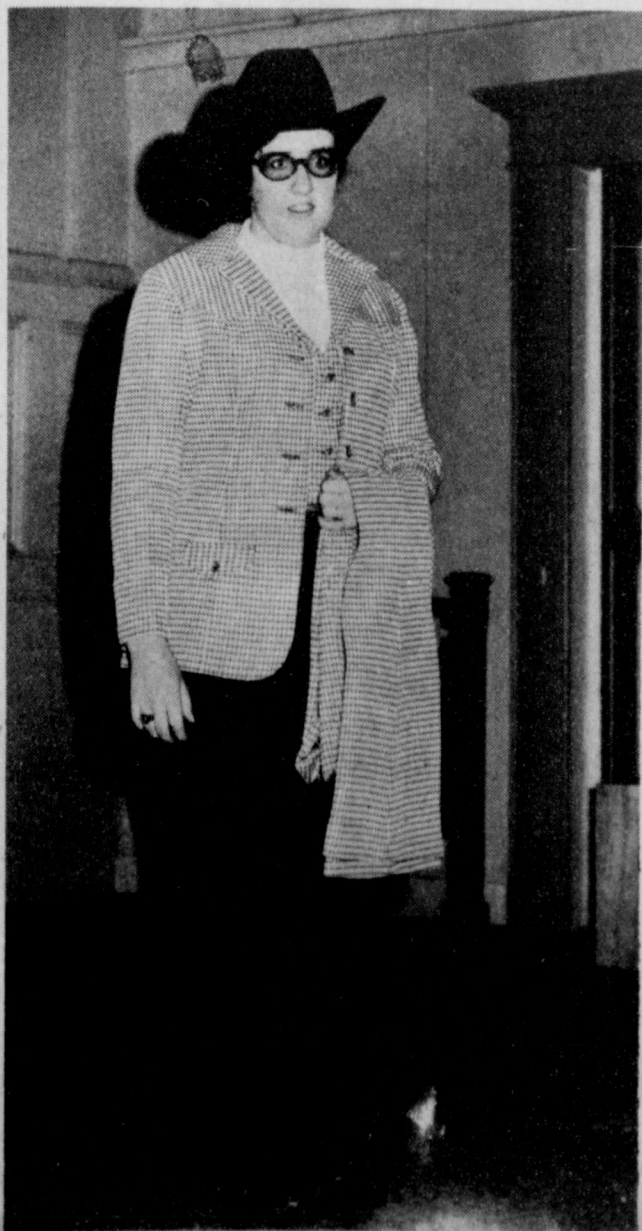
The Rebel Junior Varsity tried to keep their winning streak alive last Thursday night but failed in the attempt after the first half.

Jim Bill Chaloner of Bogata was elected president of the Paris Junior College Rodeo Club when the group held its first regular meeting September 17. Other officers for

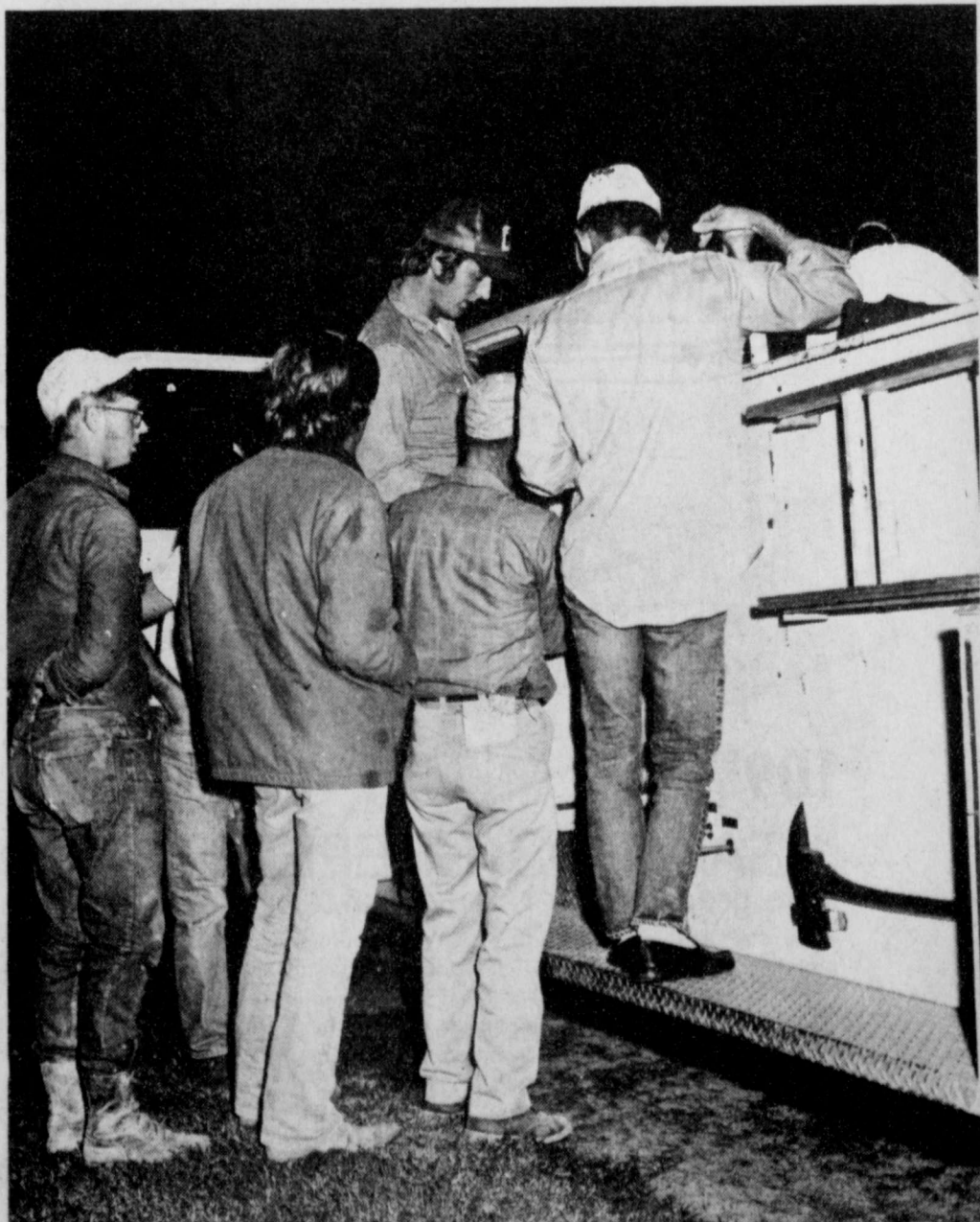
the year are Rusty Jones of Talco, vice-president; Nita Stephens of Sumner, secretary; and Paula Tomblin of Paris, reporter.

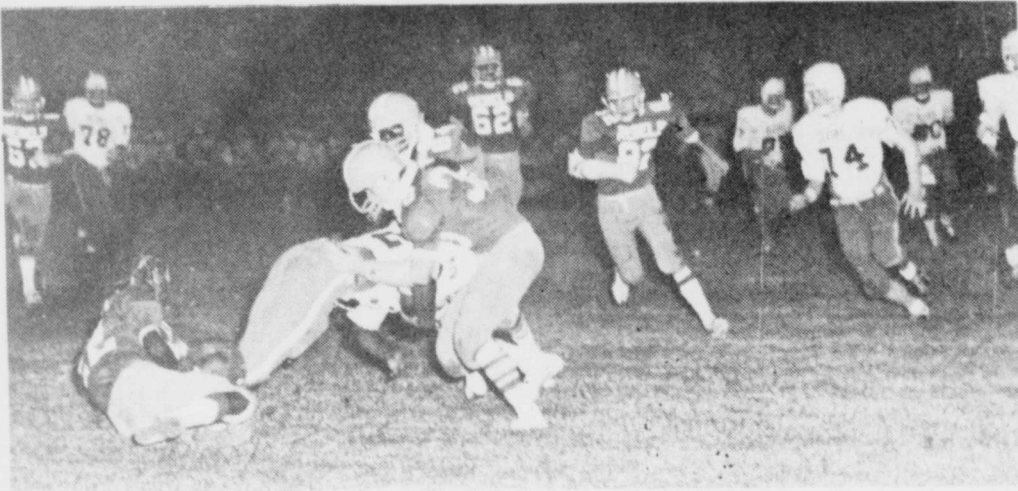

White, Jr. today issued a reminder to any qualified persons wishing to participate in the November 5th General Election that they must be registered by October 5, 1974. A voter registration application may be obtained at the County Tax Assessor-Collector's office in the applicant's county of residence. The application may be filed either in person or by mail.

Many counties maintain branch offices in various locations throughout the county, and deputy registrars may be assigned to other areas. The Tax Assessor-Collector's office should be contacted for specific information.

Secretary White noted that a registration is valid for three years and is automatically extended for the succeeding three-year period by voting in a primary of general election. Consequently, many voters who have participated in prior elections need not make application to renew their registration.

Energy Companies Commended By TIDC

Energy producing companies of Texas were given a vote of commendation by the board of directors of the Texas Industrial Development Council during its recent annual meeting in San Antonio. A resolution passed by the board declared that the oil, gas and electric companies "utilizing the free enterprise system have and are continuing to be a major factor in the economic and social well-being of the people of Texas."

"The availability of reliable sources of energy has enabled communities to attract new and diversified industries, new jobs, help clean up the environment and provide an overall better quality of life," the resolution stated, noting that "all Texans, state and federal entities recognize that through the free enterprise system, not more governmental regulation, the energy producing companies of Texas can continue to provide the energy needs of Texas."

Harry W. Clark, president of the council, pointed out that the present system of regulation has put Texas in a good position to attract new

industries to the state and provide more jobs for its people, "and a change in our system of regulation could seriously impair the ability of our energy companies to construct pipelines, drill wells and build power plants, thus limiting the opportunities of Texas citizens for new jobs and affecting the services provided."

"You need only to look at other states to see the problems energy companies are having which ultimately affect their ability to provide services as needed," Clark continued. "The people of Texas have continued to enjoy favorable rates from their privately-owned utilities and prices for other energy supplies in comparison to other states. This is an added attraction for industries considering new locations in Texas, all of which adds up to more jobs and a better standard of living for our people. We certainly want to keep it this way."

Contribution And Expense Filing Deadline Due

Texas Secretary of State Mark W. White, Jr., today reminded candidates and political committees in the November 5th General Election that their first campaign contribution and expense reports must be filed by 5 p.m. on October 7, 1974.

The reports, covering all political contributions received and expenditures made since either the appointment of the candidate's or committee's campaign manager or the last primary election report, may be filed as early as September 27, White said, with the absolute deadline being October 7.

Candidates running for statewide offices or offices which include parts of two or more counties must file their reports with the Secretary of State.

Candidates seeking local offices or state offices where the district is located solely within one county must file with the county clerk in that county.

Under the law, a report postmarked by 5 p.m. on October 7 will be considered properly filed. However, White noted, the Postal Service no longer uses a postmark which shows the time a letter was mailed unless the letter is sent by registered mail, special delivery, or certified mail.

Candidates without opponents (unopposed) in the General Election are not required to file the reports. Political committees contributing to any candidates are still required to file even if the candidate they are supporting is unopposed.

Filing the reports is required by H.B.4, the Campaign Reporting and Disclosure Act of 1973, passed by the 63rd Legislature.

The penalties for failing to file include felony sentences carrying a penalty of a fine of from \$100.00 to \$5,000.00 or one to five years in prison, or both.
