

Texas Crime Rate Shows Decrease In 1983

Both the crime rate and the total number of crimes reported in Texas declined in 1983, according to figures compiled by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

"The crime rate showed a decrease of 6.2 percent with 5,907 crimes per 100,000 population," said Col. Jim Adams, DPS director. "In addition, Texas law enforcement agencies reported 928,827 major index crimes during 1983, a drop of 3.5 percent compared to the previous year. This is the first decrease recorded in the number of crimes since 1961 and it's very encouraging. We had almost come to accept a yearly increase in volume as being inevitable."

Adams said the public's perception of crime could be a factor in the reductions. The violent crime category posting the greatest decline was robbery with the number of offenses down 11.4 percent. Murders decreased by 9.1 percent. The numbers of rapes and aggravated assaults were down seven percent and 6.7 percent respectively.

In the property crime categories, burglary of offenses fell 8.2 percent and motor vehicle thefts dropped 5.2 percent. Theft, the only major crime category showing an increase last year, rose 0.4 percent. Twenty-two percent of the index crimes were cleared by arrests in 1983. The value of property stolen during the commission of major crimes was estimated to be in excess of one billion dollars with \$243 million in stolen property recovered by police agencies.

Eleven Texas peace officers were killed in the line of duty by criminal action last year. Six officers died in duty-related accidents. A total of 3,870 assaults on officers were reported.

Traffic Accidents Show Decrease

Statistics compiled by the Department of Public Safety show 448 fewer persons lost their lives in Texas traffic accidents last year compared to 1982. The 10.5 percent decline in 1983 follows a reduction of 430 fatalities in 1982.

"This is the first time in 25 years that Texas has experienced a reduction in fatalities for two years in a row," said Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director.

A total of 3,823 persons died as a result of motor vehicle crashes in Texas last year compared to 4,271 in 1982, and 4,701 in 1981.

The mileage death rate for 1983, three deaths per hundred million miles traveled, was the lowest in Texas history. The 1982 mileage death rate was 3.4.

The DPS director said public sentiment has continued to build against drunk and unsafe drivers.

"I'm hopeful that this concern will lead to a long term change in attitudes which will encourage safe driving habits by motorists," Adams said. "Since law enforcement

resources are limited, we must continue to seek voluntary compliance with the traffic laws."

Adams noted that at least 26 percent of the 1983 fatalities involved DWI.

"Since state law did not require blood alcohol measurements from drivers involved in fatal accidents last year, we believe this statistic substantially understates the drunk driver's role in fatal accidents," Adams said.

Statewide DWI arrests in 1983 totaled 149,261, an increase of 33 percent compared to the 1982 figure.

Almost 98 percent of the persons killed in passenger vehicles were not wearing seat belts at the time of the crash. The number of persons injured in 1983 traffic accidents increased by 1.7 percent, totaling 208,157.

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation estimated that motorists traveled 129.309 billion miles in 1983, an increase of 3.5 percent above 1982.

That one has double meaning, as many horses were likely to be difficult about crossing bridges, and bridges were frequently either poor affairs at best, or maybe not ever there anymore when one arrived.

The expression "jostled from pillar to post" applied to stage coach travel, and "it's the squeaking wheel that gets the grease" referred to the barrel of axle grease carried on wagon trains to be applied to the wheel that needed it.

The expressions that come to mind are almost limitless. And on the same subject there are dozens of dozens of other words and sayings that while not applying to horse travel, still linger on from a by-gone age!

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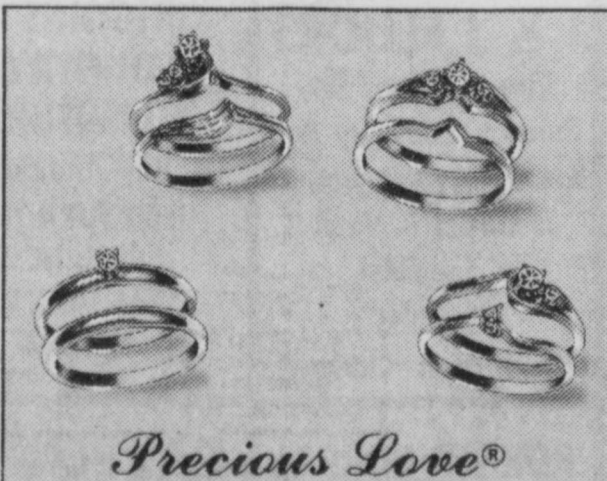
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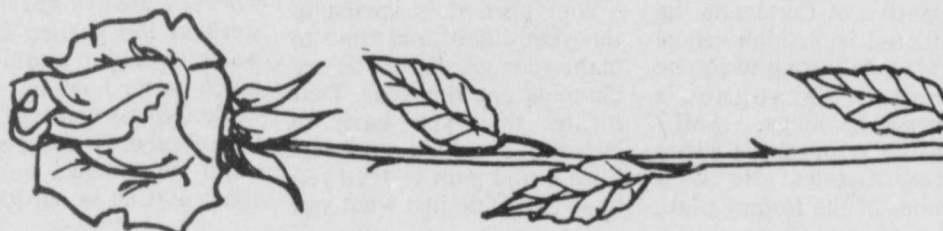
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Ralph Parsons Receives Award

The East Texas chapter is comprised of a seventeen county area, and is a part of the institute's Region IX which covers a five state area.

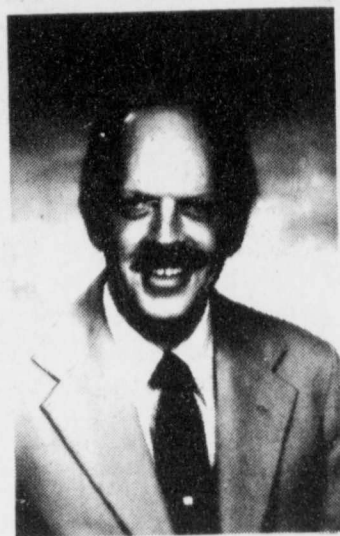

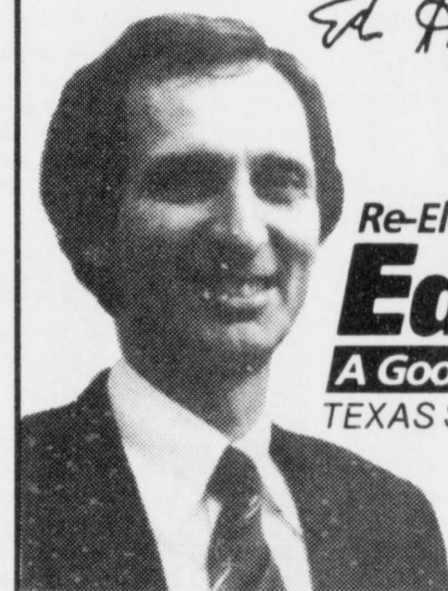

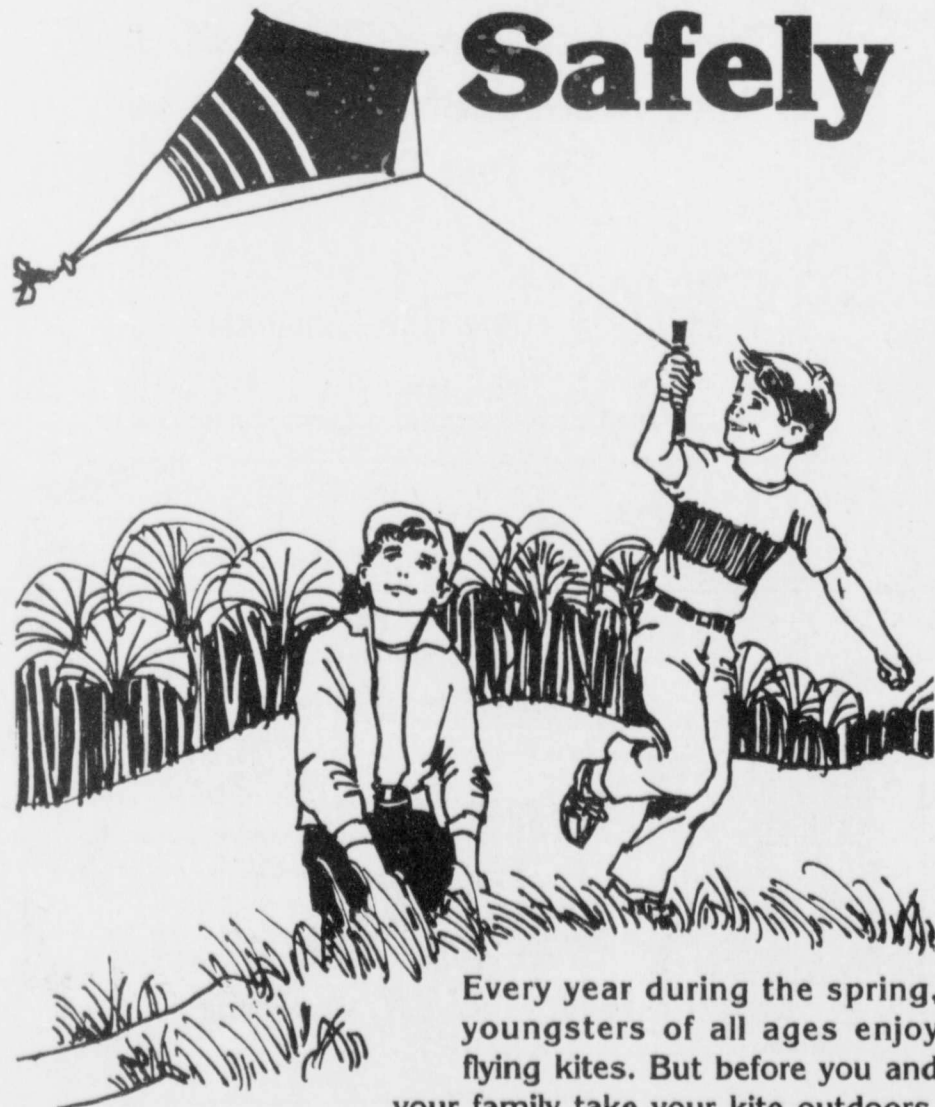

Crunchy Peanut Butter Cookies

1/2 cup peanut butter
1/2 cup shortening
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup honey
1 egg
2 1/2 cups Bisquick baking mix

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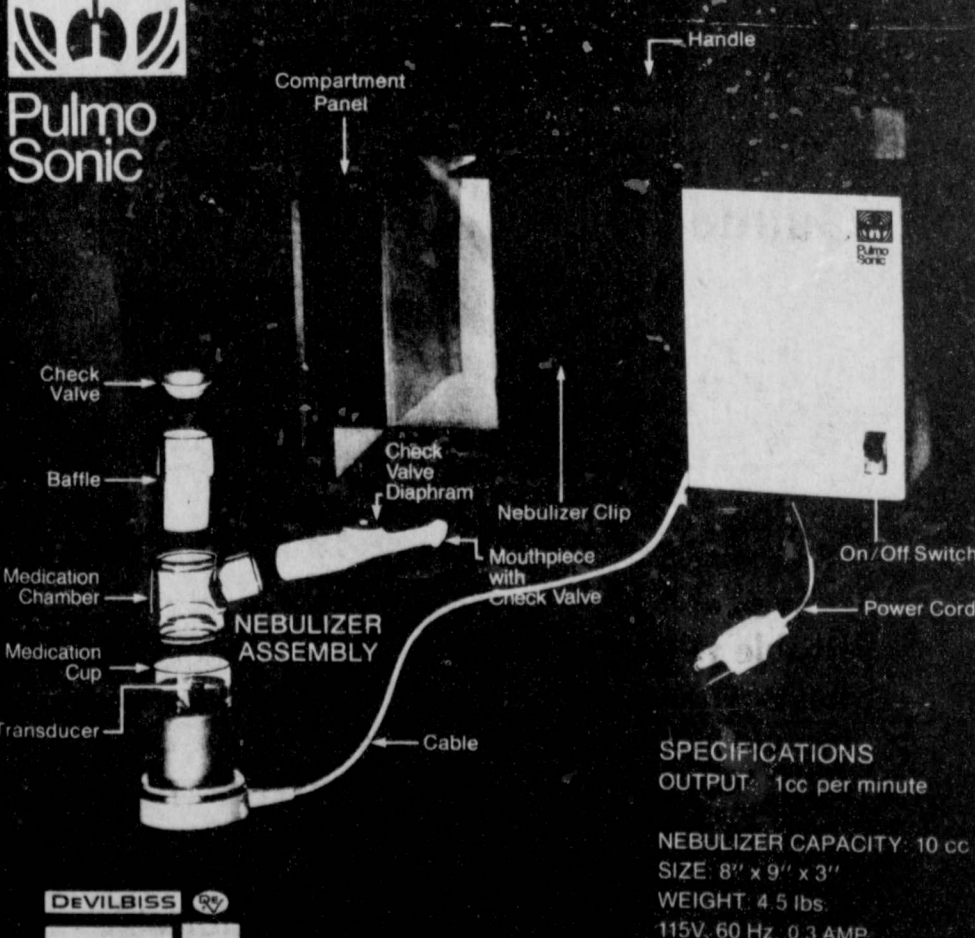
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CITY OF BOGATA ORDINANCES

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE SPEED OF MOTOR VEHICLES UPON THE STREETS IN THE CITY OF BOGATA, RED RIVER COUNTY, TEXAS, PRESCRIBING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATION HEREOF, AND REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BOGATA:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to operate or drive any motor or other vehicle upon the public streets of the City of Bogata, Texas, at a rate of speed in excess of thirty (30) miles an hour, which maximum speed limit shall be applicable upon all the streets within said city, except as hereinafter specified and provided for certain designated streets and portions of streets.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person to operate or drive any motor or other vehicle at a rate of speed in excess of that specified for the following streets and portions of streets:

a) On U.S. Highway 271, southeasterly from the west city limits of Bogata for a distance of approximately 0.212 miles, a speed limit of forty-five (45) miles per hour at all times and, northwesterly from the east city limits of Bogata for a distance of approximately 0.340 miles, a speed limit of forty-five (55) miles per hour at all times; thence northwesterly a distance of approximately 0.200 miles, as evidenced by the attached plan which is hereby approved and made a part hereof.

b) On State Highway 37, southerly from the north city limits, M.P. 13.358, to the south city limits, M.P. 13.691, of Bogata, a distance of approximately 0.333 miles, a speed limit of forty-five (55) miles per hour at all times and, southerly from the north city limits, M.P. 14.280, to the south city limits, M.P. 14.587, of Bogata, a distance of approximately 0.307 miles, a speed limit of forty-five (45) miles per hour at all times as evidenced by the attached plan which is hereby approved and made a part hereof.

c) On F.M. Highway 509, easterly from the intersection of State Highway 37 for a distance of approximately 0.565 miles, a speed limit of forty (40) miles per hour at all times and, westerly from the east city limits of Bogata, a distance of approximately 0.645 miles, a speed limit of forty-five (45) miles per hour at all times as evidenced by the attached plan which is hereby approved and made a part hereof.

d) On Loop 38, southerly from the intersection of Loop Spur 18 for a distance of approximately 0.381 miles, a speed limit of thirty-five (35) miles per hour at all times as evidenced by the attached plan which is hereby approved and made a part hereof.

e) On Loop Spur 38, northerly from the intersection of Loop 38 to the intersection of State Highway 37, a distance of approximately 0.427 miles, a speed limit of forty (40) miles per hour at all times as evidenced by the attached plan which is hereby approved and made a part hereof.

Section 3. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding \$200.00.

AN ORDINANCE RESTRICTING PARKING IN RESIDENTIAL AREAS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF THE CITY OF BOGATA, TEXAS, AND PROVIDING FOR A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BOGATA, TEXAS:

a) It shall be unlawful for any person to leave, park or stand any truck, tractor, road tractor, trailer, semitrailer, bus or any commercial motor vehicle with a rated capacity of one and one-half (1 1/2) tons or more according to the manufacturers classification, or the equivalent thereof, upon any public street, alley, parkway, boulevard or public works within or adjacent to any residential area within the city limits of the City of Bogata, Texas. This section shall not prevent the parking or standing of the above-described vehicles in such areas for the purpose of expeditiously loading and unloading of passengers, freight or merchandise, and provided this section shall not apply to street construction, maintenance and repair equipment, trucks, rollers and implements; to equipment, trucks, trailers and vehicles used by public service utility companies engaged in repairing or extending public service utilities; and to motor buses when taking on or discharging passengers at the customary bus stops.

b) Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction, shall be fined in any sum not to exceed \$200.00.

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING STOPPING, STANDING, AND PARKING IN SPECIFIED PLACES WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF THE CITY OF BOGATA, TEXAS, AND PROVIDING FOR A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BOGATA, TEXAS:

a) No person shall stop, stand or park a vehicle, except when necessary to avoid conflict with other traffic or in compliance with law or the directions of a police officer or traffic-control device, in any of the following places:

(1) On a sidewalk.
(2) In front of a private or public driveway.
(3) Within an intersection.
(4) Within fifteen (15) feet of a fire hydrant.
(5) On a crosswalk.
(6) Within twenty (20) feet of a crosswalk at an intersection.
(7) Within thirty (30) feet upon the approach to any stop sign, or traffic-control signal located at the side of a roadway.
(8) Within fifty (50) feet of the nearest rail of a railroad crossing.
(9) Within twenty (20) feet of the driveway entrance to any fire station and on the side of a street opposite the entrance to any fire station within seventy-five (75) feet of said entrance.

- (10) Alongside or opposite any street excavation or obstruction when stopping, standing, or parking would obstruct traffic.
- (11) On the roadway side of any vehicle stopped or parked at the edge or curb of the street.
- (12) At any place where official yellow curb markings have been placed.

b) Any person violating any of the provisions in this section shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction, shall be fined in any sum not to exceed \$200.00.

Agricultural Briefs

Some new and exciting agricultural chemicals have just been released by various companies that should find use on many area farms.

Graslan Brush Bullets manufactured by Elanco Products is the latest product available for brush control. The bullets are clay briquettes about the size of a man's thumbnail. They contain tebuthiuron which is the same ingredient in the broadcast formulation of Graslan.

Bullets, however, allow users a targeted approach for control of selected species. They should be applied at the rate of four bullets per diameter inch of tree trunk. They should be spread evenly on the soil surface within the drip zone of each tree.

According to the label, four to 16 bullets should be applied per 100 square feet for dense brush or thickets. Uniform coverage is also a necessity.

Following application users will see both top and root kill on susceptible brush. It is currently cleared for use on 56 different brush species.

The material is packaged in one-gallon pails. Check with your chemical dealer for a copy of label and follow the directions carefully.

Another new product is Iovomec for control of certain internal and external

parasites in cattle. It is manufactured by Merck and Company and will be marketed through licensed veterinarians.

It is the only antiparasitic drug to control many commonly occurring internal round worms and lung worms as well as many external parasites such as grubs and lice. It also has the ability to control both the adult and immature stages of most of these parasites with a single injection.

The product is given subcutaneously and has been used successfully in over 25 countries throughout the world.

As with most chemicals, the proper timing of treatment is important. Cattle should be treated as soon as possible after the end of the heel fly season and then they may be retreated during the winter months for lice control. One would be taken a chance to only treat for lice without first taking care of the grubs.

It is not approved for use on breeding age dairy animals and should not be used on any animal within 35 days of slaughter.

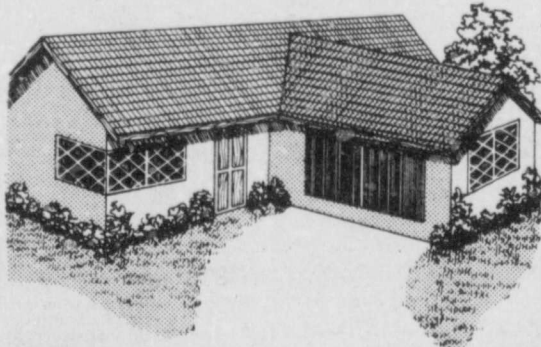

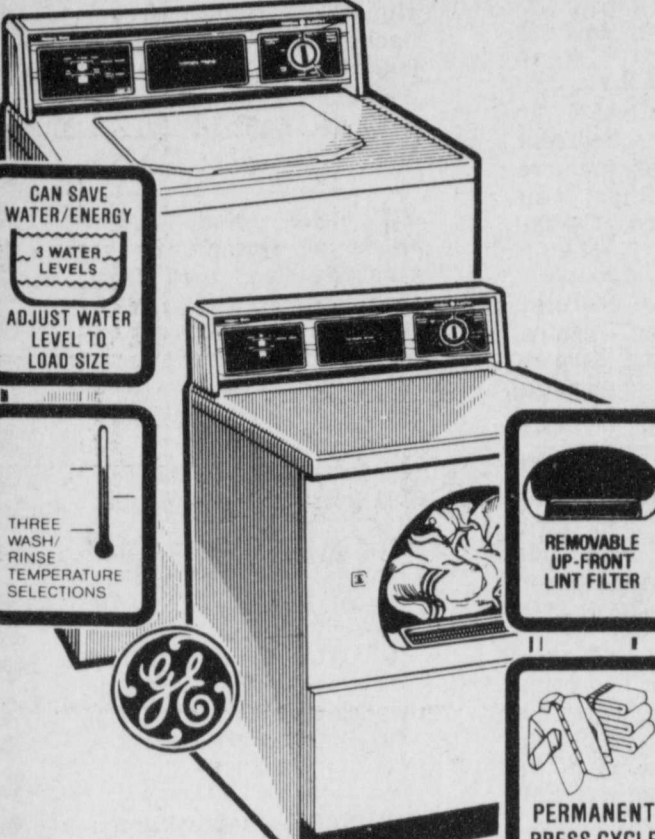

Funds Pledged For A.M. Aikin Jr.

The late senator A.M. Aikin, Jr. believed in the youth of Texas, so much so that he devoted a lifetime, almost 50 legislative years, toward improving educational standards. His work began at a time when there was much to be done. Now, as then, there is still much to do. Over the years, individuals and groups have recognized and responded to the need for quality in curriculum areas such as engineering, business, law, fine arts, and science, just to name a few. Their private gifts have established eighty chairs at the University of Texas at Austin that are dedicated to excellence in these fields. To date, there are none in education in any Texas college or university. Educators in Texas are concerned about quality education in our public schools, colleges and universities. They believe, as did Senator Aikin, that a well educated youth is the

most valuable resource for the future. As a demonstration of their commitment to excellence in their profession and for our children, not themselves, they have set a goal of \$500,000 to establish two chairs in the College of Education at UT-Austin. \$250,000 of this will come from private contributions. Teachers, administrators have already given \$175,000 but the school personnel in Region VIII have committed themselves to assist in reaching or exceeding the goal.

Contributions will be welcome from any person wishing to support quality education in Texas, and may be made to any of the committee or to any other member of the Education Committee. BUDDY'S WORKSHOP Shut Gas Furnace Down for Summer

Is it true that leaving the pilot light for the gas heating system burning during the summer will prevent dust from collecting and thus avoid problems next fall and winter? The pilot light of a gas furnace is not usually exposed. Turn off all the gas, including the pilot light, serving the gas furnace during the summer. The system should be checked—and cleaned, before use next fall. What causes water to collect in the freezer compartment or lower shelf of a refrigerator? Both units have drains which allow melted frost to pass downward to a pan during defrosting cycles. The drains can become clogged with food particles or some foreign matter. Locate the drains and use a small, stiff wire to clear away obstructions. Flush with a small syringe. On some refrigerators, the drain from the freezer compartment passes through the back of the refrigerator into a plastic tube that leads to the storage pan at the bottom. Check the tube for stoppage. Remove it and flush clean with water pressure. Is the problem simple or difficult when a dishwasher begins to do a less effective job, leaving food particles on the inside of glasses, for example? The problem could be simple—like clogged holes in the sprayer. Remove the hub cap which secures the sprayer and check the holes. If they're clogged with food particles, sufficient water is not getting through to rinse thoroughly.
