Former S. P. Conductor Returns From Trip Through Scotland And In Canada

Ben White, retired Southern Pacific Railroad conductor, who has spent a good deal of his time globe-trotting since his retirement in 1928, is back in San Antonio for the winter after a trip to England and Scotland and return by way of Canada, where he visited his boyhood home in St. Thomas, Ontario.

With him was Mrs. White, who is a native of Scotland, and whose girlhood home there they visited while in that country. They have made several visits there since they were married, but this year is the first time they have re-visited St. Thomas for many years.

White first began his work on the railroad in St. Thomas with the Grand Trunk system as a brakeman. He later went to the Lake Shore and Toledo Line, but after working on that line for several years, again decided to make a change.

Hearing alluring reports of Texas and the Southwest, he came to San Antonio and obtained a job with the S. P. Lines. He was with the road for 32 years, his last run being on the San Antonio-El Paso run.

During his visit in St. Thomas, White told several persons about Speaker John N. Garner and mentioned that he lived not far from his own home in San Antonio.

"At least I didn't consider that his home in Uvalde was far from my home in San Antonio," White said. "But the reporter who wrote the story in the paper didn't know that 80 miles is only a short distance in Texas, and said that I lived right across the street from Speaker Garner."

He has been traveling almost continuously since he left San Antonio last April and intends to stay here for the winter. He resides at 715 Blanco Road.—San Antonio Express.

REVISIONS OF STATE FINANCE SYSTEM URGED

Recommendations To Be Made By Legislative Committee

AUSTIN, Texas, Oct. 15, 1932.—An almost entire revision and modernization of the financial administration of the State, with elimination of present "hit or miss" methods of controlling expenditures, will be recommended to the next session of the legislature. That was announced today by Harry N. Graves, chairman of the Joint Legislative Committee on Organization and Economy, meeting in Austin to continue its study of the complex problems involved in the committee's attempt to reorganize the State's 151 distinct governmental departments.

Commenting upon the findings made to date by Griffenhagen and Associates, technical consultants to the Committee, Mr. Graves described the State's present financial structure and some of the proposed improvements suggested in its fiscal affairs.

"No general accounts reflecting the actual financial condition of the State government or of the current budget are maintained," said Mr. Graves. "Even the production of a simple balance sheet for the State as a whole would be formidable task under present conditions. Although throughout the State service there is an enormous amount of accounting work done at great expense, there is so much duplication and so little, if any, attempt at coordination, that the results fall far short of meeting the requirements of the best financial practice."

Chairman Graves declared that, "unlike many of the states, Texas fails to provide for effective budgetary control of expenditures." He said that "the survey brings out the fact that there has been no control of the incurring of financial obligations, and thus an opportunity is afforded to spending agencies to defeat the legislative intent with respect to the purposes and amounts of expenditure particularly as there is no provision made to insure that all expenditures are charged to the appropriations of the year to which they pertain."

"A considerable volume of departmental financing is done thru 'local funds' which are entirely outside of the budget proper," explained the chairman. "Such a system, of course, adds to the danger of unnecessary outlay and further complicates any attempt to discover the State's exact financial situation."

Mr. Graves criticized the present classifications of expenditures under which appropriations are made, saying that "many of the titles of the classes are not explicit, that others cover hodge-podges of items, including both ordinary expenses and capital outlays."

"The entire fiscal system of the State seems to be one of those unwieldy, uncoordinated growths, a result of lack of planning and budgeting over the years," concluded Mr. Graves. "It is our Committee's intention, with the technical advice available, to recommend means whereby the financial functioning of our State government will be unified and modernized to the end that thousands of dollars annually may be saved."

Other members of the Committee which is meeting in Austin at present, include: Senator Carl C. Hardin of Stephenville, Senator Grady Woodruff of Decatur, Representative Phil L. Sanders of Nacogdoches, and Representative J. Turney Terrell of Del Rio.

TWO JAILED IN THEFT OF STATE FUNDS

Charge Of Swindling Is Filed Against Couple

AUSTIN, Oct. 17.—While officers continued their investigation, W. E. Stiles, banking department employee, and William T. Tuton, both charged with swindling the State, were held in city jail today.

Justice of the Peace Tannehill, in whose court the complaints were filed, said that neither man had made bond. He said he had planned to hold an examining trial tomorrow morning, but was uncertain whether it would be held.

Stiles is charged with "cheating and defrauding the state banking department" of \$308. Tuton is charged with swindling the State of \$158.

Sale of the entire Fall accumulation of wool and mohair of the Val Verde Wool and Mohair Company was announced Saturday by L. G. DuBus, manager of the company.

The eight-months wool brought 11 cents and unlimited amount being contracted by Joe Blakeney, representative of Hallowell, Jones and Doak of Boston.

Mohair up to 175,000 pounds sold to Ryder and Brown of Boston thru their representative, Tom Parker. Grown goat hair brought eight cents and kid hair secured 25 cents, the announcement said.—Del Rio Evening News.

REP. THOMASON PUSHES RELIEF FOR DISTRICT

Remains in Washington To Hasten Aid For 16th District

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—The decision of Congressman R. E. Thomason to return to Washington and try to hasten relief for the sixteenth congressional district has resulted in aid for five cities in the district already.

The congressman returned here from his home in El Paso last month and immediately began a series of conferences with members of the Public Buildings Commission which lasted for many days. Last week the list of new buildings to be started soon under the terms of the Garner-Wagner relief act was announced and of the nine in Texas, three are in Mr. Thomason's district. They are at Pecos, Kerrville and Colorado.

Meanwhile, Mr. Thomason he received assurances from officials here that efforts will be made to hasten work on the El Paso federal building and construction at Fort Bliss and William Beaumont Hospital, El Paso. War department officials gave him assurance that local labor would be used on these projects.

Mr. Thomason has been trying to hasten the Big Spring post office building, plans for which are now receiving approval here, and said he would continue his efforts until bids are asked on the structure.

He has been assisting Brewster county and El Paso in presentation of their applications for relief loans from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, and Brewster county was granted \$19,500 and El Paso \$110,000. A. F. Robinson of Alpine and E. H. Simons of El Paso were here in the interests of their respective cities.

On account of the building projects and relief applications, Mr. Thomason has not gone out to speak for the Democratic National Committee, but he might do so later. He was asked by the committee to speak at a rally in Pennsylvania last week, but declined in order that he could stay here and finish his conference with the R. F. C. officials on the relief loans.

ACCEPT "JIM'S" APOLOGY FOR VOTE CHARGES

District Attorney Releases Ferguson From Quizzing

LAREDO, Oct. 18.—(AP)—John A. Valls, district attorney of Webb county, today accepted an apology from James E. Ferguson, for his charge of illegal voting in this county in the Democratic primary, and released the former governor from obeying a subpoena to reveal before the grand jury information on which he based his statements.

Valls received the following telegram this morning from Ferguson: "I very much regret the occurrence which has brought about this to advise you that I was misinformed concerning the voters in Webb county and I have the kindest feelings and friendship for the people of your section. I believe the election in Webb county was fairly and legally conducted."

Valls Placated
In answer, Valls sent the following to Ferguson in Austin: "My only object in summoning you before our grand jury was the ascertainment of the truth and the vindication of Webb county from an unjust aspersion. Any further insistence on my part would savor of vindictiveness, which is not my purpose. Your frank and manly admission of error releases you from obeying the subpoena and I thank you for the expressions of friendship for the people of this section."

The charges of irregular voting in many counties in the state were made by Ferguson and his wife, Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson, Democratic gubernatorial nominee, in answering a suit by Governor R. S. Sterling charging many fraudulent votes had been cast in support of the former woman governor.

Webb County officials are to be commended in demanding that Ferguson prove charges and with his apologizing for same goes to show more than ever that the charges were only for political reasons.

Terrell County had a total of 162 illegal votes cast so "Jim" says and the Editor would certainly like to have Ferguson prove this or apologize either as we feel as though it casts a reflection upon our county and we believe that the election held here was legal in every respect.

If every County, where illegal voting charges were made by these high official, will follow Webb County's example the ballot will be much purer in every way.

DEL RIO, Oct. 17.—Date when radio station XER in Villa Acuna will step up its power from 75,000 to 500,000 watts, making it the most powerful broadcasting plant in the world, could not be learned here Saturday.

H. L. "Bert" Munal, director of the station for Dr. John R. Brinkley, declined to comment on the increased power. Munal recently announced the purchase of station XEAW in Reynosa, Mexico.

The Associated Press reports that the Mexican government has authorized XER to increase its power to 500,000 watts. The new grant, signed by Miguel M. Acosta, Mexican minister of communications and public works, authorizes the station to use the 655 kilocycle channel.

When XER is stepped up to 500,000 watts, it will have 10 times the power of the largest stations in the United States, and no other broadcasting plant in the world will approach its range and power.

The Mexican grant also authorizes the station to operate alternately on two wave lengths.

Pyle filed a suit asking for a dissolution of the partnership and division of the property located in Pecos, Brewster and adjoining counties. H. L. Winfield was appointed receiver. According to the reported settlement Mr. Pyle is to receive what is known as the Lobo ranch and J. M. West of Houston gets the ranch at Longfellow. In the deal, according to reports the stock and equipment on each ranch goes with the property. The partnership was formed about seven or eight years ago. Mr. Pyle was represented by James Cornell of this city.—San Angelo Morning Times.

3,000,000 FAMILIES HELPED BY RED CROSS

Distress in All Areas Met by
Giving Food, Clothing
and Other Aid.

More than 3,000,000 families throughout the nation were given relief of various types by the American Red Cross in the past winter, to aid them in their distress caused by unemployment, disaster or other misfortune.

A major relief task, due to unemployment and other unusual conditions in the bituminous mining counties in twenty states, was met by the Red Cross chapters alone, or participating with other agencies. In these 143 counties, the Red Cross aided 90,000 families through giving groceries, school lunches, clothing, flour and other necessities to combat privation.

Flour, milled from government wheat turned over to the Red Cross by Congress, was given to 15,000,000 persons in the period from March 8 to June 30, the close of the fiscal year. Flour will continue to be given through the winter of 1933-34, and Red Cross chapters also will give cotton clothing, made from government cotton turned over to the Red Cross for distribution.

"The Red Cross faces the busiest winter since the days of the World War," Chairman John Barton Payne said. "It is organized in virtually every one of the 3,672 counties in the United States, and will co-operate with all agencies to meet distress wherever found. The flour has proved of great benefit, and the cotton clothing will be given wide distribution."

While carrying on nation-wide these unemployment and other relief measures, the Red Cross also was engaged in its regular peace-time activities in public health nursing, service to ex-service men and their families, teaching home hygiene, life saving and first aid. The Junior Red Cross, composed of almost 7,000,000 school children, also rallied to the support of the society's relief efforts, and the children aided others of their age in practical ways, formed sewing and food canning classes, and were of great assistance in chapter relief work.

While the wheat and cotton were given by the U. S. Government, no money was provided to pay for the necessary work entailed. The Red Cross will meet this expense of almost \$500,000 from its treasury. Citizens can aid by joining as members of the local Red Cross chapter during the roll call from Armistice Day to Thanksgiving Day.

TEXAS CENTENNIAL NEWS

The Texas Press Association, at the most largely attended meeting of its history on the opening day of Texas State Fair, unanimously renewed its previous pledges to support wholeheartedly the adoption of Texas Centennial Amendment as one of its five major constructive undertakings for the good of all Texas, and urged Texas people to assist in the patriotic movement to "authorize a State Centennial commemorating the heroic period of early Texas history and celebrating a century of our independence and progress, at such times, places and in such manner as may be designated by the Legislature."

The Texas Press Association views the pending Centennial as an opportunity to increase State revenue through increased gas and oil taxes from the millions of out-of-state visitors who will be coming to the Centennial in automobiles and touring every part of the State. Its committee on "lower taxation" made a report at the Dallas State Fair meeting to the Executive and Advisory Boards, which was adopted unanimously by the Association and which said in part: "It was and now is the sense of the Executive and Advisory committees that the question of lower taxes can be endorsed wholeheartedly without interrupting the success of the campaign being waged for the Texas Centennial. The Centennial has the enthusiastic and unstinted support of the Texas Press Association, and in the opinion of these committees there should be no issue between the two projects."

Voters are reminded by the Texas Centennial Committee that the Centennial Amendment is merely an enabling act that will permit but not require State aid for the Centennial. If it is adopted by vote of the people November 8th, the Legislature will be governed by whatever conditions may exist when the holding of a Centennial celebration will be fixed by the Legislature, if at all. The Amendment expressly prohibits any appropriation for any other than the observance of the "heroic period of early Texas history," thus preventing the fixing of a precedent for State support of any expositions, fairs and celebrations in the future.

Whether Texas will commemorate its 100th anniversary will depend upon the expression of the voters November 8th. The State constitution does not now provide for State celebrations and must be amended by Texas voters if this State is to hold an official creditable State celebration in which it can invite the other States and nations of the world to take part. Should the Texas Amendment be defeated, Texans can at least go to the Arkansas party.

RECIPES AND MENUS

DENTON, Oct. 20.—Whether "An apple a day keeps the doctor away," has never been proved, but we do know that an apples has its place in the diet, and should we care to serve one a day they may be prepared in so many attractive ways that the family need not tire of them.

The nutritive value of apples is not in their caloric value, but in their vitamin content with an orange, for example, they are valuable enough to be given a place in the diet frequently in this season when they are so plentiful.

The apple is the one food that may appear on the breakfast table, at luncheon, dinner, in a school lunch or at a picnic. And for the person who needs a little nourishment between meals, an apple is most satisfactory. Apples may be served as sauce, either canned or fresh, baked, boiled in colored syrup and used as salad, or fried. Apple dumplings or apple pie make an excellent dessert, and apple fritters or brown betty are equally good. Apple sauce cake will keep moist several days so proves helpful to most houseworkers.

MENUS

Breakfast: Grapefruit, bacon, apple jelly, whole wheat muffins, coffee.

Luncheon (not to be served same day with this dinner): Cheese souffle, stewed tomatoes, bread, lettuce salad, butter, apple fritters, syrup, milk.

Dinner: Breaded pork chops, baked potato, carrot and cabbage salad, pickled beets, biscuits, butter, baked apples, cocoa.

RECIPES

Cheese Apple Dumplings: When preparing regular pastry cut into

the flour and fat 1 T of grated cheese per cup of flour. Use ordinary method of making apple dumpling and bake in a moderate oven.

Stuffed Apple Salad: 2 c water, 1 c sugar, 6 apples cored and peeled, fruit coloring, 1-2 c diced celery, 1-2 c nut meats, salad dressing. Make a syrup of the water and sugar. Add fruit coloring to make a deep red color. Use a small pan so the apples will be completely covered with syrup and cook 2 to 3 apples at a time. Handle carefully to retain the shape of the apple and cook until apple appears transparent. Let cool and fill centers with celery, nut and dressing mixture. Serve on lettuce leaf with dressing.

Peanut Butter Soup: 3 c milk, 1 1-2 T fat, 1 1-2 T flour, 1 t salt, 4 T peanut butter. Cook flour in melted fat and add milk as for whitesauce. Add peanut butter which has been worked to a paste in a small amount of milk. Add salt and serve hot.

Liver Stew: 1 lb. liver, 3 T flour, 2 T bacon fat, 2 c tomatoes, 1-2 c carrots, diced, 1 c diced potatoes, 1 diced onion. Sauté the liver in fat. When brown add flour and about 2 c water. Cook to a gravy consistency. Cook about 1 hour, adding water as necessary and stirring to prevent burning. Thirty minutes before serving add the vegetables. Other vegetables may be added. This is a good way to persuade the family to eat liver if they are inclined to refuse it.

Texas Industrial Activities

Development of the woolen manufacturing industry in Texas, heretofore notable chiefly for its non-existence, received new impetus when the charter recently was issued to the Texas Mohair and Wool Mills, Inc., at New Braunfels. Capital stock is authorized at \$104,000 and plans are rapidly proceeding to the point of actual manufacture of woolen goods in Texas.

New Texas industrial charters include: Skee-Ette Table Manufacturing Co., Fort Worth; Belew Gin Co., Plainview.

What is said to be the largest export grain shipment ever made from the South Plains comprised eighty carloads of maize and kaffir corn consigned to Germany.

The Mid-Continent Steel and Iron Corporation, capital \$1,500,000, is being organized at Dallas to undertake developments of the huge ore deposits in East Texas counties. Using Texas raw materials, the company will manufacture steel. The ore deposits inexhaustible fuel supplies, good transportation and satisfactory labor conditions were given as the reasons for the company selecting Texas, plus the fact that Texas is buying annually more than \$5,000,000 worth of steel from other states.

STATIONARY FIREMEN EXAMINATIONS OPEN

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced that until November 1, 1932, it will accept applications for positions of stationary fireman (high-pressure plant) and stationary fireman (low-pressure plant) to fill vacancies under the Office of Public Building and Public Parks of the National Capital, Washington, D. C.

The entrance salary for stationary fireman (high-pressure plant) is \$1,320 a year, and for stationary fireman (low-pressure plant) \$1,200 a year; less an annual furlough deduction for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1933, of 8-1-3 per cent and the regular retirement deduction of 3-1-2 per cent.

Full information may be obtained from the Secretary of the United States Civil Service Board of Examiners at the post office in any city which has a post office of the first or second class, or from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C.

STATE AND COUNTY 1932 TAXES DUE

Tax notices have been received the past week and this week from the Tax Collector notifying the tax payers that their 1932 taxes are now due.

According to the new law passed last year taxes may be split now and one half may be paid any time from the first of October until the 30th of November and then the tax payers has until June 30th of the following year to pay the balance of his taxes. However it he does not take advantage of this split tax paying, then all the taxes must be paid by January 31, 1933 to avoid a penalty and interest charge.

W. D. Hunter, deputy tax collector, thinks that heavy payment of taxes will be this month and next with those tax payers who can taking advantage of the split tax payment and paying half of them now. The delinquent list for this county for 1931 it not very large yet it could be smaller and would have been so had times been better.

Terrell County finances are in better shape than some of the counties of this section. While some of her funds are low and others are exhausted there has been no issuing of script so far, for County officials or for paying County bills.
