JUNCTION HARDWARE CO. GARAGE TO BE ONE OF FINEST IN HILL COUNTRY.

LOCAL HARDWARE FIRM AND FORD DEALER SHOWS
CONFIDENCE IN FUTURE OF TOWN BY EXTENSIVE
IMPROVEMENTS. NEW DRIVE-IN
STATION, SHOW ROOMS AND MOD-
ERN EQUIPMENT.

The work of moving the building and equipment of the Junction Hardware Co. Garage was started Monday and will be completed soon as possible, in order to allow the work on the new building to begin.

The new building which will have a frontage of about 70 feet covering the lots now occupied by the garage and the Junction Grocery, will be of white stucco over concrete, with mangle brick trimming and will be absolutely fireproof throughout. All electrical work will be in conduit, the first building to be wired this way in Junction. Every light globe will be on four circuits and from a control box in the office it will be possible to control every light in the building.

The Drive-In proper, on the corner, will have a frontage of 39 feet and just west of this will be the Ford display room, with plate glass on the south and east sides of the room. Just back of the display room will be the parts room which will open into the office and the office opens into the lobby, which is about the center of the drive-in section. The lobby will also be equipped with plate glass on two sides.

Across the driveway, into the work shop, from the front, is the ladies rest room, which will be modern in every way, having a large vanity room for the convenience of the lady travelers. In front of the rest room a large water fountain will be placed.

Floors throughout will be concrete. Those inside will be smooth, while those on the outside will be of rough texture to prevent accidental slipping or unnecessary skidding of cars.

The drive-in section will be large enough to accommodate four cars at once. Two gas pumps, two air and water pipes and several tanks will be provided between the drives. At the lower side of the slope of each drive will be a gravel absorption trap, which will take up all waste oil, water, etc., that is allowed to fall on the drives.

With the exception of a garage and drive-in recently completed at Kerrville, this new structure of the Junction Hardware Co. will be the finest of its kind between San Antonio and El Paso along the O. S. T. It is an evidence of the confidence of Emil A. Loeffler, president of the firm, and his stockholders, in the future of Junction. This building is one that would be a credit to any town of several times the size of Junction, and will greatly add to the attractiveness of the part of town in which it is located.

Mr. J. C. Ray, who recently completed the High School building, drew the plans for this new structure and has the contract for the construction work. Those who have had occasion to observe Mr. Ray's work here and elsewhere know that he is well qualified for handling such construction and that the work will be first class in every particular.

SIXTY-SIX CENTS PAID FOR LAST MOHAIR.

Seven hundred thousand pounds of mohair sold at Uvalde and Kerrville last week brought an average of better than 66c a pound, according to unofficial reports reaching San Angelo.

The biggest sale was that of 400,000 pounds by the Schreiner Mohair Commission Company at Kerrville, one-half million pounds to J. M. Lea of Del Rio and San Angelo, representing Draper & Co., Boston, and 150,000 pounds to Clinton Brown and a Mr. Cunningham, both of Boston, and Jeff H. Cauthen of Lampasas, representing Ryder-Brown & Co. of Boston. This sale, it is said, marked the entrance into Texas on a big scale by Ryder-Brown & Co.

On the day preceding the Kerrville sale, F. A. Piper & Co. of Uvalde sold around 300,000 pounds of mohair to John and James Dobson of Philadelphia, represented by A. Cohen & Co. of San Antonio. Exact figures on the sales were unobtainable here, but a belief, considered well founded, is that the mohair commanded probably 68c a pound.

The Uvalde and Kerrville sales completely disposed of Texas' fall production, estimated slightly in excess of 3,000,000 pounds. The highest confirmed price paid for kid hair was 70½c and for grown hair, 64c. The average is thought to have been around 70c for kid clips and 60c for grown hair.

Railways have placed embargoes on shipments of wool and mohair from Texas to the East on account of quarantine regulations issued by the States of New York and Pennsylvania as a result of the outbreak of the foot and mouth disease in South east Texas. These regulations require that all such shipments be disinfected under supervision of an inspector for the Bureau of Animal Industry, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

The Mallory Steamship Company has perfected special arrangements for transferring wool and mohair shipments going to Boston from their boats

SEVENTEEN CANS OF FISH PLACED IN RIVER.

Seventeen cans of crappie, bass, brim and calico bass were received here Monday from the State Fish Hatchery at Dallas, and distributed in the streams around Junction.

Frank Cowsett, deputy game warden, was in Dallas last week and secured the fish and accompanied the shipment to Kerrville. They were brought over on a truck. A telegram was received here about 9 o'clock Monday morning by the Junction Hardware Co., who immediately started a car to Kerrville to bring them over, but Frank had found a Schreiner-Hodges truck there and they were sent over on it.

The number in the cans ran from five to five hundred, according to the size of the fish. Several cans contained bass from four to ten inches long.

W. Weidenfeld, cashier of the Comfort State Bank, and Otto Holekamp, merchant of that place, were business visitors in Junction Wednesday. Mr. Weidenfeld says that rain is badly needed around Comfort and that because of the dry weather the farmers are unable to plant any small grain, which is an important crop down there. Mr. Holekamp worked here in a store as a boy, some 25 years ago and this is his first trip back to Junction since that time.

At New York to lighters, it was announced here Tuesday by J. K. Harris, Mallory representative from San Antonio. Under this arrangement the shipments do not touch New York State and do not have to be disinfected.—San Angelo Standard.

SUPREME COURT HOLDS THAT WOMEN ARE ELIGIBLE TO HOLD GOVERNOR'S OFFICE.

"MA" FERGUSON WINS EVERY COUNT IN THE INJUNCTION TO PREVENT HER NAME GOING ON TICKET
DEMOCRATIC NOMINEE FOR GOVERNOR
OF TEXAS. STATUS OF WOMEN
NOW SETTLED.

Austin, Oct. 18.—The Supreme Court, in a lengthy opinion, held Saturday that Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson was eligible to hold the office of Governor and was not disqualified because of her sex or because of her married status as the wife of James E. Ferguson, an impeached Governor.

The court upheld District Judge George Calhoun on every point with the exception of the question of jurisdiction, the court holding that he had no jurisdiction, also that Charles M. Dickson, the plaintiff, had no right to institute the suit.

This decision was in answering six certified questions submitted by the Third Court of Civil Appeals, the two dealing with the jurisdiction and plaintiff's right to institute the proceeding and the others dealing with Mrs. Ferguson's eligibility. The questions are:

Did the District Court err in holding it had jurisdiction over the case?

Did the court err in holding the plaintiff as a private citizen had sufficient interest to permit him to bring the suit?

Is Mrs. Ferguson ineligible because of her sex?

Is Mrs. Ferguson ineligible because of her married status?

Is Mrs. Ferguson ineligible because she is the wife of James E. Ferguson?

Does the record establish as a matter of law that Mrs. Ferguson is the real candidate and that the use of his wife's name is a subterfuge?

On the first two questions of jurisdiction, the court answered yes, that the trial court erred, but on the remaining four questions the court answered no.

The court held unconstitutional the act of the Legislature known as Article 3038-A under which the suit was instituted as far as it applied to offices such as Governor.

Touching on the question of eligibility of Mrs. Ferguson, Associate Justice Greenwood says: "A careful analysis of the constitutional sections of the Constitution, in the light of the proceedings of the constitutional convention and of the terms of previous conventions, makes it

ELECTION BALLOTS TO HAVE FOUR COLUMNS.

The ballot to be used in the general election on November 4, at which time, candidates from President down to public weigher, are to be voted on, will contain four columns.

The Democratic column will be first on the sheet and will contain the printed names of candidates from Presidential electors down. The Republican column will be next and will likewise contain the printed names of a list of candidates with the possible exception of some precinct officers.

The third column will be that of the Independent-Progressive and will contain only the names of the Presidential electors for the La Follette-Wheeler ticket.

The fourth column will carry no party head and will contain the titles of the offices to be filled with blank line under each title, so that the voter, if he or she wishes to use that column can write in the names of the candidates for which they desire to vote.

A letter and renewal subscription was received this week from Mrs. Clyde Gardner, who for the past year or more has been with the Hightower Mercantile Co. at Ozona. It is entirely clear that the electors of the State have left themselves free to choose a Governor without regard to the sex or coverture of the person of their choice. The Constitution itself is so explicit in stating who shall be eligible and who shall be ineligible for Governor as to remove all difficulty in answering the questions certified."

"Mrs. Ferguson comes within the terms of none of the constitutional provisions stating who shall not hold the office of the Governor," continues the opinion. "She is at least 30 years of age, she is a citizen of the United States, she has resided in the State more than five years before the general election, possessing every affirmative qualification which the Constitution declared requisite to eligibility and being under no disqualification working ineligibility under the provisions of the Constitution, it must be held that she meets every test prescribed for the Governor by the supreme law of the State."

Much stress is laid in argument for appellant on the fact that the words "he" and "his" are used in the Constitution in the defining of the Governor's qualifications. To this the opinion says:

"Since we have no English word, which in the singular number, includes both 'he' and 'she', the most appropriate word under common usage, to include both sexes while using the singular number, is the word 'he'. The context of the Constitution as a whole plainly reveals the sense in which 'he' is used."

The Government has just contracted for twelve billion stamped envelopes and newspaper wrappers, which it will sell at retail for a trifle more than the cost of the stamps, and throw in the printing for another trifle beating the printers and stationers out of millions of dollars worth of business which should properly go to them. One of these days some clerk in the Postal Department will persuade Uncle Sam that it will be a great convenience to the public to sell them clothing and dry goods and groceries and other commodities at less than cost, the business being carried on in a public place visited daily by the bulk of the people, with overhead and all other expense absorbed in the postal deficit, and then the printers will have the laugh on business men who talk "buy at home" for the benefit of their farmer trade, but who cross their fingers when it comes to buying their own supplies.—Exchange.

SOME VERY INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT COTTON.

In tropical countries cotton is a perennial, but, as you know, in the United States, it must be planted every year. There are many different species of cotton, but only four or five are of commercial importance. In the South the general classifications are upland or short staple, and sea island or long staple. The fibres or "staple" of upland cotton are usually from one inch to one and one-sixteenth inches in length, while those of sea island cotton are from 1 1/2 to 1.34 inches long. The sea island cotton is worth a good deal more than the upland cotton, but it cannot be raised profitably except on the islands of the coast of South Carolina, Georgia and Florida, and upon the coasts of those States. Furthermore, it is a shy bearer. Sea island cotton, because of its long, strong and silky fibre, is largely used in the manufacture of spool cotton for sewing and for fine hosiery. A fine quality of upland long staple cotton has been raised for a good many years in Red River and adjacent Texas counties, but, like the sea island cotton, the yield is rather light. India and Egypt grow considerable cotton. Texas is by far the largest cotton producing State of the South, making a greater number of bales than any other two states. The cotton belt is

gradually being extended north and west. New Mexico has now become an important cotton state. A demand for cotton has been developed by the manufacturers of automobile tires. In Africa the natives have a primitive sort of cotton gin called the churks. It consists of two wooden rollers turned by hand and moving in opposite directions. It will separate about five pounds of lint cotton a day from the seed. A better roller gin of 11 1/2 horsepower is in use and it does not break the fibre. —Brownwood Bulletin.

DEFICIT OF \$1,974,308 IS ESTIMATE MADE.

Austin, Oct. 18.—Total revenue requirements to operate the State Government for the fiscal year ending August 31, 1925, is placed at \$21,443,134, while the total expected revenue for the same period is fixed at \$19,468,825, thus resulting in a deficit of \$1,974,308 at the end of the next fiscal year, according to statistics compiled by former Senator John G. Willacy, State Tax Commissioner, for his annual report and released Saturday.

Senator Willacy estimates the total assessed valuation of property in Texas for 1924 to be \$3,450,000,000, an increase of \$26,896,829 over the total for 1923. Based upon this approximate total, the revenues arising therefrom to the public free school fund, allowing proportionately for assessing, collecting, errors, etc., should not exceed those of the preceding year to the extent of \$73,621, Senator Willacy said.

KERRVILLE FILTRATION PLANT IN OPERATION.

The latter part of last week saw the completion of the sewerage disposal plant of the Kerrville Sewerage System and a thorough testing of same, after which the plant was accepted by the city commission and put in immediate operation.

Sewer mains on Water Street were immediately put into operation, as was also the line on B Street to Ross Street and up this street to Jefferson and thence to Tivy Street. Other streets will be tested out and turned on as rapidly as the finishing touches are put to the construction work.

The main contract of sewer construction is practically completed, according to Elder Bros., the contractors, but there are several additional lateral lines to be constructed that were not in the original contract. A few of these laterals are to cover sections overlooked in the original plans, but a majority are to serve property built since the plans were made.

However, there is plenty of money in the fund to handle these additions for out of the \$78,000 voted for construction of the sewer system there remains about \$3,000 over and above the cost of completion of the main system. This amount is available for the construction of the laterals. —Kerrville Mountain Sun.

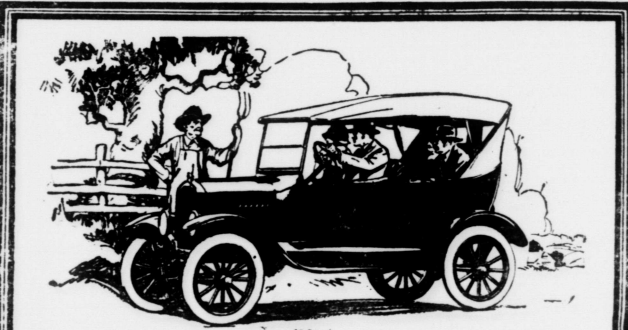

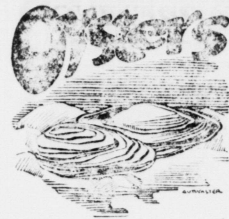

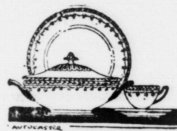

DRIVE ON RIGHT SIDE—BUT WALK ON THE LEFT.

"Somebody tells me that in walking on public roads I should walk on the left side. Is that correct?"

It is. On this point Mr. H. K. Witherspoon, of the North Carroll Highway Commission, says: "It is wrong for pedestrians to walk on the right side of state highways. The reasons for this regulation are obvious. No traffic will be moving in their direction from the rear on the left side of the road, since motor vehicles keep to the right. On the left side of the road they will be facing any vehicle that is on that side of the road, whereas, on the other side of the road they would have their backs to traffic. On the left side of the road there is no danger of being run over.—The Progressive Farmer."

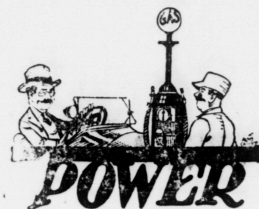

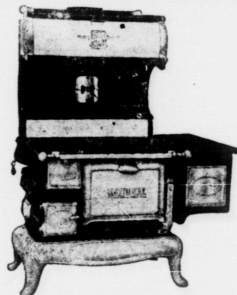

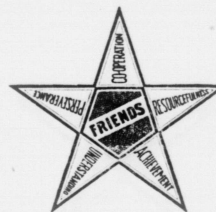
