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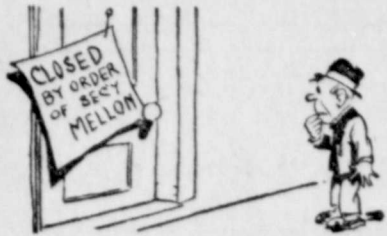

WASHINGTON SIDELIGHTS

To Mix Efficiency With Civil Service



WASHINGTON. — Part of the bureau of engraving and printing, which was reorganized under an executive order by President Harding, removing James L. Wilmett, its director, and other high officials, was ordered closed later by Secretary Mellon for an inventory of the stock, valued at many millions of dollars.

Mr. Mellon's order applied only to the divisions of the bureau which handle the paper used in making bank notes, stamps and government securities. It being explained that a quicker and more accurate checking could be made by a temporary shutdown of all paper work.

About 1,500 employees of the bureau force of 6,000 would ordinarily be af-

ected by the order, officials said, but about six hundred would be used as counters and all others having annual leave to their credit will be given the benefit of it.

Secretary Mellon in a formal statement said: "The statements to the effect that a vast volume of duplicate bonds and other securities have been fraudulently issued and are in circulation are wholly without foundation. There has been no evidence developed of any such situation either in the bureau of engraving and printing or elsewhere in the treasury department."

Following President Harding's declaration that the administration is conducting no drive on the civil service but is driving for greater government efficiency through the civil service, it was learned that some influential administration leaders plan to take many of the higher paid positions out of the ironclad jurisdiction of civil service regulations.

All positions paying \$3,000 or \$4,000 or over, positions of an administrative nature, would be placed in one group. Employees below the higher figures would be in the same position they occupy today.

Blanton of Texas Unpopular in House

THOMAS BLANTON, a Democratic representative from Texas, does not seem to be exactly popular with either side of the house. Representative Garner, Democrat, of Texas, declared in the house the other day that if permitted by the rules to speak what was in the minds of 434 of the 435 house members he would say that Representative Blanton of that state "is a disgrace to this house and ought to be kicked out."

At the onset of his speech Garner said that in this world there "are all kinds of liars, the artistic liar, the traristic liar and the common liar."

Representative Blanton, sitting a few feet away jumped to his feet and exclaimed: "And I will hold you personally responsible if you call me a liar."

Garner did not notice the interruption, but Representative Summers, also of Texas, sitting nearby jumped to his feet and shouted "liar" at Mr. Blanton, at the same time starting in his direction.

It was at this point that the sergeant-at-arms rushed in and Blanton retired from the chamber. Then there came from the Democratic side of the chamber a cry of "throw him out."

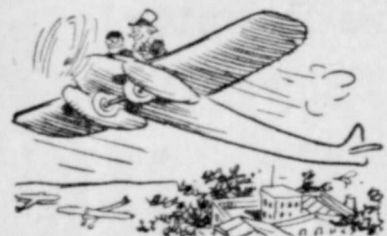


which was picked up by other Democrats, and for a moment there was great confusion. Mr. Garner waited until quiet had been restored to proceed with his speech.

America Up in the Air Over Aviation



WE WILL—and we won't—in aviation. The senate passed a resolution the other day which contains the following:

"Whereas immediate and adequate consideration and development of the science of aeronautics is vital to the commercial and industrial expansion and to the protection and prosperity of the United States; and

"Whereas it daily becomes more evident that if the United States is not to be completely outdistanced in the field of aeronautics, and is not therefore to be left defenseless, a separate school of aeronautics should be created and maintained or separate schools of aeronautics should be established in the United States Military academy

and in the United States Naval academy: Therefore be it

"Resolved that the secretary of war and the secretary of the navy are directed to report to congress (1) whether or not it is feasible and advisable to establish a school of aeronautics, to be known as the United States Academy for Aeronautics, with buildings, grounds, and equipment necessary for instructing and training cadets; (2) whether or not it is practicable to use a part of the buildings and grounds of the United States Military academy and of the United States Naval academy for separate schools in aeronautics, to the end that young men desirous of qualifying for commissions in the United States army service may be appointed as cadets to such separate aeronautical schools in the same manner as cadets are now appointed to qualify for commissions in the United States army and the United States navy; and (3) whether or not it is feasible to take over one of the existing navy yards or arsenals for the purpose of converting the same into a government plant for the development and manufacture of aircraft of various kinds suitable for national, commercial, and defense purposes."

"Home Again, From a Foreign Shore?"

LIQUORS having a value in the legitimate market of more than \$300,000,000 and worth in bootlegger channels more than \$1,000,000,000, shipped from the United States to foreign countries just before the Volstead act went into effect on January 16, 1920, will eventually find their way back to this country, under the provisions of the Willis-Campbell act passed by congress last November to supplement the national prohibition law, according to John D. Appleby, general prohibition agent in charge of New York and New Jersey.

The passage of the Willis-Campbell law, which ostensibly was principally for the purpose of killing medicinal beer, has made it possible for the thirsty to be supplied with good liquors for a much longer period than appeared likely before the measure was adopted, prohibition officials here say. In some quarters the provision for the reimport of liquors is considered as a "joker" in the law.

The law stopped the importations of liquors, and also the manufacture of spirituous liquor in this country save alcohol "until the amount of such liquor now in distilleries or other



bonded warehouses shall have been reduced to a quantity that in the opinion of the commissioner will, with liquor that may hereafter be manufactured and imported, be sufficient to supply the current need thereafter for all nonbeverage uses."

But it is provided "that the commissioner may authorize the return to the United States under such regulations and conditions as he may prescribe any distilled spirits of American produce exported free of tax, and reimported in original packages in which exported and consigned for reexport in the distillery bonded warehouses from which originally removed."

French Note in Spring Clothes

No rigid rules govern the spring fashions. Elasticity is the predominating idea, declares a Paris fashion writer in the New York Tribune. "Pay your money and take your choice," tersely summarizes the Paris dressmaker's attitude toward this spring's fashions. Everybody seems to be, as it were, practicing an electric method or system, choosing whatever seems best in present and past dresses with a view to presenting models that include the excellencies of all previously tested

styles and the deficiencies and failures of none. Thus the dressmakers are showing both the short and the long skirt, with all varying degrees of length between the two extremes of high-shoe-top and floor-touching length.

Likewise, the full gamut in sleeve variations is sounded. There are dresses entirely sleeveless and those with sleeves so long that they form twin trains. There is an indication that the wide sleeve is on the wane. The long, fitted sleeve is offered in its place, but that it will usurp the place of its predecessor is only a prediction. It remains for women to indicate which they prefer.

Worth makes a feature of fancy sleeves, some of which are very long—that is, much longer than the arm. One can scarcely imagine a lady dining in a dress of this sort with any degree of comfort, as the sleeves are usually gathered in the hand or held as a shawl or mantle. Worth is no exception in showing this type of exaggerated sleeve.

Renee gives to some of her models a distinct note of the Italian renaissance through sleeves which trail on the floor in the form of twin trains. One very striking model of this character in red satin shows sleeves solidly embroidered in white crystal beads, this embroidery weighting them so that they trail in majestic fashion on either side of the wearer. The dress has no embroidery other than that on the sleeves. In spite of these long sleeves the arms are practically bare, as the sleeves are open from the shoulders.

Russian Note Prevails in Dress.

The Russian influence is seen everywhere. There are dresses and suits of pure Russian style, many of them bearing significantly Russian names. Russian embroideries and Russian designs prevail more than any other kind of ornamentation. The color combinations found in trimmings and their mode of application in the form of broad girdles and the big plaque-like ornamentations all show Russian artistry as the source of their inspiration.

In the use of materials there is the same variation in quantity or yardage employed. Some of the new dresses can still be cut from three and one-half meters, while in other models, from five to six meters of two-yard-wide goods will be required.

In point of decoration there is the same wide range of choice. There are dresses entirely devoid of trimmings and others so lavishly embellished that it is almost impossible to determine the nature of the original fabric or foundation which holds the garment. In these various processes of elaboration the manufacturer of fabrics has taken no small part. Many of the new materials come from the looms beaded, embroidered with drawn threads, painted, corded, tufted, quilted, blistered, hammered, creased and crinkled until one wonders what they might have been in their pristine state.

No arbitrary decisions are made regarding color. All primaries are represented, together with a multitude of variations in art tones. Thus,

there is the brilliant red of the spectrum, the natural, vital flame color and in its train numerous other reds having an admixture of yellow or of blue or of brown, thereby establishing several distinct red series of multiple tones. In rose shades there are geranium, coral and copper, each one in all possible diversity.

Navy Blue Again in Limelight.

Deep royal blue is another favorite, especially in combination. As for beige and castor, these tones are as the sands of the sea. There is not one that does not seem to have representation. Navy blue is coming back into its own, notably navy blue serge, combined with red; also blue crepe marocain and crepe de chine three-piece suits. Black has its advocates. Gold and silver in both the bright and softened or velle tones, together with steel, copper, bronze and gun metal, are very important.

A very large proportion of the new blouses, whether they are separate or designed for a special suit or are a part of a three-piece costume, are Russian. From a fashion standpoint there is an interesting trend toward the use of the blouse. This has been brought about by the fact that all of the great French dressmakers in their recent openings stressed the tailored suit and also because of the real Russian blouses, which became the rage through being sponsored by the best-dressed women in Paris.

Distinctly new in both cotton and silk blouses for spring are the Russian models embroidered in designs taken from Russian documents. Many of the new models are made of cotton crepe, which makes them more than ever resemble the Russian peasant garments, despite their Paris origin. Any number of these are being brought out by French manufacturers and selling in quantities for distribution in large American stores. They are worn with white serge as well as with white cotton skirts for sport wear.

Among the materials used in blouses are white organdie embroidered in deep yellow, yellow tussah embroidered in white and yellow linen. There are the pure white crepe de chine and crepe georgette blouses. One interesting tailored model is of fine white linen stitched in lines imitating Scotch plaid. There are blouses made of printed mousseline and then there are the pure white, exquisitely made, linen blouses of the type known as chemisier; that is to say, shirtwaist.

Blue Enamel Trims Black Slippers.

A Paris shoemaker is featuring slippers of patent leather with designs in colored enamel. Small wreaths of flowers form buckles at the front and straps at the sides. Other models show straps which cross and button high on the sides. These are made of the enameled leather, the designs being in conventional flowers. The but-

tons are in the predominating color of the decoration, usually red or blue. Bright blue decorations are the smartest and most popular on black shoes. One sees wonderful white shoes with blue forget-me-nots forming the decoration for straps and buckles. Red shoes are also well liked, as well as black shoes stitched with red and green.

Bootmakers are among the most versatile people in the world. 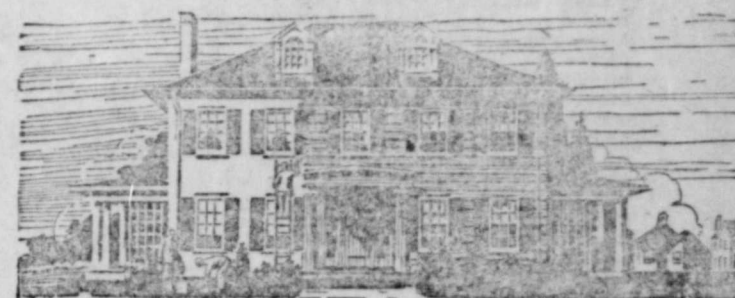

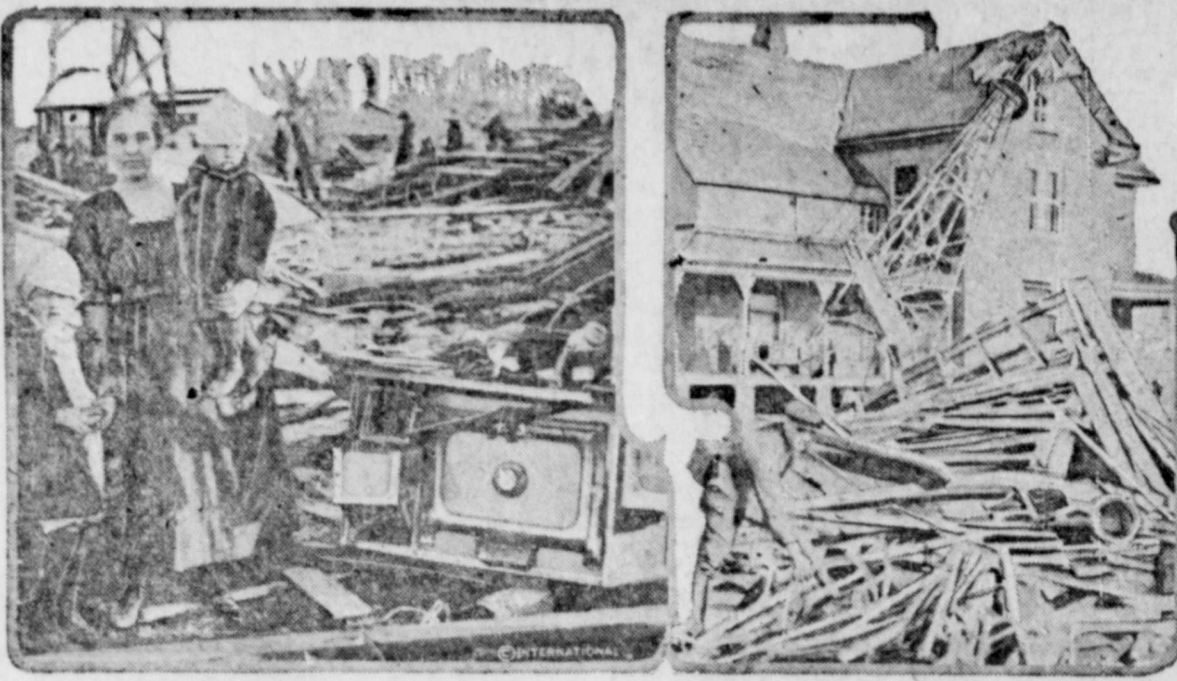

ROAD BUILDING

PROBLEM OF SKEWED BRIDGE

Methods Used for Calculating Stresses and Proportioning Are Not Approved.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Methods of calculating the stresses and proportioning the size of skewed concrete-arch bridges which have been considered good practice in the past may be incorrect and result in the collapse of the structure, according to engineers of the bureau of public

roads of the United States Department of Agriculture. A skew bridge is one in which the center line of the bridge is not perpendicular with the abutment on which the bridge rests, and is used when a bridge crosses a stream or railway track diagonally. The bureau is jointly responsible with the several state highway departments for the correctness of the design of all structures on federal-aid roads, and for this reason the problem is being carefully studied.

WIDER HIGHWAYS WIN FAVOR

Originally Engineers Considered 10-Foot Roadway Adequate—Now Urge 20 Feet.

Former Superintendent of Illinois Highways S. E. Bradt of DeKalb, Ill., who has done much to boost the good roads movement in his state, says engineers originally considered a 10-foot highway adequate to meet the needs of traffic between populous centers.

Then they learned the folly of this contention and boosted the width. It was finally made 16 feet. Roads are being built 18 feet in width and now come prominent engineers advocating a 20-foot highway.

The shoulder maintenance is a prominent factor entering into this problem. The upkeep of a shoulder usually exceeds the original cost of the extra two feet of pavement. It has been learned by experience. For this reason highway experts are going on record advocating the wider pavement for trunk line highways. The upkeep of shoulders is very high, especially where there is heavy truck traffic.

PAVED ROADS AND DAIRYING

As More Improved Highways Are Constructed Milk Routes Are Being Extended.

Paved roads and dairying go hand in hand. As more improved roads are constructed, milk routes are extended and the farmer farther from the city is provided with a market for his milk. Over unimproved routes requiring wagon delivery, the longest route possible is only approximately 15 miles while over paved highways, traveled by motortrucks, routes covering as high as 40 miles are established. Large areas of prospective dairy country are waiting only the construction of more hard surfaced roads. When these are built, many more farmers, now cut off from their market, will receive the benefit of the economical and rapid transportation made possible by the motortruck and the paved highway.

HIGHWAYS ON PACIFIC COAST

Various Western States and Government to Spend Immense Sum for Road Improvements.

Twenty million dollars, the largest amount of money expended in one year on the Pacific coast by the federal government on state highways and post roads, is to be spent during this season. The western states, Washington, Oregon, California, Wyoming, Colorado, Montana, Idaho, Nevada, Utah, Arizona and New Mexico will expend the same amount. Many of the roads will be 20 feet wide and of concrete six inches thick, much heavier than highways built by the states heretofore.

Benefits of Good Roads.

Good roads in the country will do more to lower the high cost of living and more for the prosperity, comfort, culture and happiness of the people than things fought over in 12 presidential campaigns.

Good of Motortruck Lines.

The establishment of motor truck express lines in every farming community will stimulate the production of more food, reduce the cost of living and probably will make public markets successful in American cities.

LIVE STOCK NEWS

SELL GRAIN THROUGH CATTLE

Farmer Who Puts Feed Into Steers and Returns Manure to Land is One Who Succeeds.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

An investigation into methods and costs of beef production in the corn belt, conducted by the United States Department of Agriculture, covering three years, and 906 farms, shows interesting facts concerning the present status of the industry. The man who feeds cattle is marketing his crops as he feeds them, and, therefore, is justified in expecting a return equivalent to average market prices for the feeds. Even if he sometimes falls short of a

return he has not necessarily experienced a loss. The corn belt farmer who sells grain sometimes receives more for his crop than the one who feeds it to cattle, but on the average, for a period of years, except in certain limited areas, the man who puts the feed into steers and returns the manure to the land is the one who comes out ahead. The conclusion is based on feeding in Iowa, Indiana, Illinois, Nebraska and Missouri.

The figures which contain the results of this investigation were obtained from a large number of farms and from several agricultural experiment stations in the Middle West. One phase of the work deals with the cost of maintaining a herd of breeding cows for producing feeder cattle. It was found that feed represented 69 per cent of the cost of keeping a cow for one year, while the other 31 per cent was for interest, labor, equipment and incidentals.

SWINE FOR HOME SLAUGHTER

Members of Shipping Association in Indiana Solve Problem of Having Pork Supply.

Members of the live stock shipping associations in Dekalb county, Ind., have solved the problem of having fat hogs on hand just when they are ready to do their home butchering, and the United States Department of Agriculture thinks the plan could be worked by other co-operatives. Many of the members of the association who do home butchering often found themselves with hogs ready for market or slaughter before the farmers were prepared for the work. Under these conditions they arrange with the manager of the association to ship their hogs to market at the time the animals are ready, and later, when the farmers are prepared to butcher, they buy the desired number of hogs from the association on the regular shipping day. The hogs are sold to them for the net market price returned to the members contributing hogs to the shipment. This practice is an accommodation to the members, as often a farmer who is raising hogs for home slaughter is not ready to butcher at the time the hogs are in best condition, and he is not prepared to feed them as long as he desires.

KING CORN DISCOVERS RIVAL

Experiments at Nebraska University Show Dried Sugar Beet Pulp is Valuable Feed.

Dried sugar-beet pulp will soon become a real rival of corn in livestock feeding, declares the University of Nebraska College of Agriculture.

This statement is based on an experiment conducted by the college during which different rations were fed 12 lots of Utah lambs, 31 to each lot, for 100 days, to determine the food value of the sugar-beet by-product in comparison with some of the standard rations, such as corn and alfalfa or corn, alfalfa, and cottonseed cake.

The beet-pulp-fed lambs led with a profit of \$3.80 per head at the end of the period, while the corn-and-alfalfa-fed lot showed a profit of only \$1.83 a head. The experiment proved, furthermore, that either corn or dried beet pulp is necessary to produce a finished lamb.

Hog Harvesting Time. Farrowing time is harvest time in the hog business. Success at this time means live pigs that will quickly grow into cash; failure means dead pigs that will grow into an entry on the wrong side of the ledger.

Clip Horses Before Spring. Clipping is a practice that should be more universally adopted than it is, for it is an excellent thing for the work horse that has been idle the greater part of the winter and is put to heavy work during the spring.

GUMMED PAPER DRESS FORMS WILL ASSIST RURAL WOMAN IN SEWING



Making a Paper Dress Form.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Women in every part of the country who have heard of the gummed paper dress forms have been eager for directions for making them. This form has been very extensively introduced by home demonstration agents of the United States Department of Agriculture, and a state agricultural colleges, as part of the general extension program relating to clothing to assist the rural woman with her sewing problems. So many requests for further information on the subject have reached the department that Department Circular 207, The Paper Dress Form, has been prepared and may be had upon request to the Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C.

Gummed Paper Pasted On. The foundation of the form is a

close-fitting undershirt worn over the usual underclothing by the model whose form is to be reproduced. On this are pasted, in two layers, strips of gummed paper, such as comes in rolls for bundle-wrapping. Two helpers are needed to paste the strips on the model and the work can be done more rapidly if two others cut and moisten the gummed paper. The circular describes all the materials necessary for making this inexpensive household convenience, and gives each step of the process in detail. Illustrations accompany the text.

Form is Useful. If a woman intends planning and fitting new garments for herself or for a member of the family away from home, remodeling old dresses, or altering ready-to-wear clothes, she will find the paper dress form exceedingly useful in her sewing room.

NEW WAY TO REMOVE STAINS ON LEATHER

Gasoline or Other Grease Solvents Spread Spots.

Department of Agriculture Recommends Coating With Thick Solution of Rubber Solvent That Evaporates Easily.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Leather goods that have been made, unsightly by grease spots and that cannot be cleaned by ordinary cleaning solutions can often be restored by methods developed by the bureau of chemistry of the United States Department of Agriculture. When shoes, traveling bags, and similar articles come in contact with butter, lard, vasoline, linseed oil, salad oil, lubricating oil, or anything of the same sort, ugly stains are produced, especially if the leather is of a light color, and attempts to remove them with gasoline or other ordinary grease solvents result in spreading them.

The method recommended by the department consists in coating the spots with a thick solution of rubber in a solvent that evaporates readily and peeling off the coating when it is almost dry. In some cases it may be necessary to repeat the operation several times. A solution of unvulcanized rubber (Para or Ceylon) in carbon bisulphide, in the proportion of 1 part to 10 parts by weight, as well as some of the prepared rubber cements, has been found satisfactory. It is important that the cement be very thick and quick drying, and that pure solvent be used. Since the fumes of carbon bisulphide are very inflammable and poisonous, it is necessary to work away from flames and where there is good ventilation. To keep the rubber from adhering too tightly to the leather immediately around the spot may be wet slightly just before applying the rubber solution.

Milk produces spots on leather on account of the fat it contains. In addition it often leaves a white residue, and sometimes a dark stain. The white residue may be removed with soap and water, but no way is known for taking out the brown stain. The only way to improve the appearance of leather so damaged is to dye it darker than the original color. Any oil or grease spot should be removed as soon as possible. It is especially important that spots caused by linseed and other paint oils be removed before the oil dries, since the oxidized oils are but slightly soluble in the liquids ordinarily used.

A Knife Hint. It is often difficult, even with a sharp knife, to cut raw meat. You will find that the knife works easier if heated. Dip the blade in hot water at intervals.

Zinc Topped Table. Wash the zinc covered table with soap and water and polish with a wooden cloth moistened with kerosene or vinegar dipped in whiting, baking soda or bath brick.

WOODBBOX HANDY WASHSTAND

When Painted to Match Kitchen Walls It Can Be Made Attractive Piece of Furniture.

Every housewife who burns wood in her cook stove knows that the woodbox is always in the way. Try keeping the wood in a board box made as follows:

From planks 1 inch thick, make a box 3½ feet high, 2 feet wide and 4 feet long. Leave an opening 1½ feet deep on one side through which the

wood can be put. A curtain may be hung over this opening, but it should not be so long that it will hinder when putting the wood in the box.

The water bucket and wash basin may be kept on top of the box, and the towel hung on a rack above it. If painted to match the kitchen walls, or enameled white, such a woodbox makes an attractive piece of furniture.

Household Questions

Rather different is a lamp stand made of Japanese pottery.

Rice pudding baked in cups is good with chopped nuts sprinkled over it.

Linen is greatly improved in color if you use some borax in the water.

When jelly will not set, add the juice of a lemon or some white vinegar.

Keep a button bag near the electric washer for any buttons that may be wrung off.

When gravy does not brown as it should add to it a tablespoonful of strong coffee.

When washing glassware use a small brush instead of a cloth. It will shine much better.

When the belt on the sewing machine gets loose, rub the belt with soap and it will tighten it.

When waffles are served for a summer breakfast be sure that they are crisp and dry, without a suspicion of grease. Serve with them a mixture of powdered sugar and ground cinnamon instead of the more hearty and heating syrup.

DONLEY FARMERS SAVE SOIL BY TERRACING

The farmers in this county are realizing the value and importance of terracing rolling land as a means of soil conservation. Certainly never before has there been so much interest manifest in an endeavor to check the terracing losses caused by soil erosion. Last year it was appalling to see the rolling land in the county which had produced 34 of a bale of cotton per acre, washed into a chaos of hillside ditches, leaving the land destitute of all the valuable surface soil.

In the spring of 1921, only a small per cent of the owners of rolling farms called on me to assist them in terracing work. Since the first of this year we have made 86,472 yards, or about 27 miles of terraces on farms in Donley County. These men all tell me that it is their intention to turn this land over to the next generation in as good condition as they found it, when the time comes. There is little doubt

that the haphazard process of land erosion has depleted the soil of more fertility than was ever marketed off thru crops. If you do not believe in terracing hill land, it is because you have never seen any done correctly, and made to hold. I hope everyone in the county will personally go and inspect some of the terrace work that has been done on your neighbor's farm. If you have done none yourself, I will be glad to furnish you the name of one of your neighbors who has his terraces up, so you can see what the work looks like.

Your farm represents an investment you have made for equipment with which to carry on your occupation. More than that, it is the home of you and your family. Your investment is secure in proportion to the way in which you care for it. Would you invest your money in an enterprise which you were sure would be allowed to wash away into Salt or Red rivers? Hundreds of acres of valuable farm land are washed into these and other rivers every year, and it could be prevented by a little

diligent work and planning. Other generations will be dependent on the fruits of this soil after we have crossed the bar.

SEASONABLE GOOD THINGS

SKIM MILK will prove a boon to many housewives who have forgotten that it may be used in nearly all dishes instead of whole milk, and can be bought in many places for very little. In cream soups, adding a little more butter, the skim milk is especially good.

Sticky Cinnamon Buns.
Take one quart of raised dough, add one-half cupful of sugar, two well beaten eggs, two tablespoonfuls of soft butter, one-half cupful of brown sugar; mix well and roll out. Spread with two tablespoonfuls of soft butter; sprinkle with one-half cupful of brown sugar, mixed with two teaspoonfuls of cinnamon, one-half cupful of currants and seeded raisins. Roll and cut in slices. Brush a deep, heavy sheet-iron pan with fat, sprinkle with brown sugar and set in the buns so that they do not touch. Let rise until light. The buns should be five inches high when baked. Cut the roll in two-and-one-half-inch slices when put to rise. Place an asbestos mat under the pan and be careful not to bake in too hot an oven.

Anise Seed Cookies.
Take one-half cupful of shortening, one cupful of sugar, two eggs, two tablespoonfuls of milk, four tablespoonfuls of anise seed, five tablespoonfuls

Nut Wafers.

Take three tablespoonfuls of butter, add five tablespoonfuls of pulverized sugar. When the sugar and butter are creamy, add three tablespoonfuls of milk, drop by drop, stirring constantly; then add nine tablespoonfuls of flour and a few drops of vanilla. Brush a pan with fat, drop by spoonfuls and sprinkle each with chopped nuts. Dust with cinnamon and bake in a slow oven.

Spicy Fruit Cake.
Take one-half cupful of New Orleans molasses, one cupful of brown sugar, cinnamon, ginger and nutmeg to taste, one egg beaten well; add one cupful of sour cream, a teaspoonful of soda and three cupfuls of flour. Mix well and add one-half cupful of nuts with raisins, figs and dates chopped and mixed to make one-half cupful. Bake in a loaf in a slow oven.
