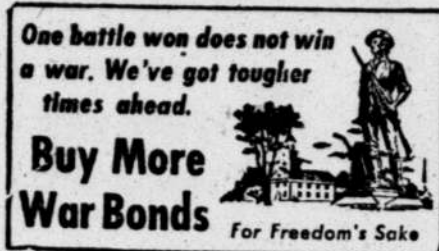

Lt. Corley, who is now stationed at Barksdale, Louisiana, has been in the service since October of 1942. He entered the Air Corp in March, 1943.

Former Lamesan Promoted To S-Sgt. At Base In England

Editor's Note: Following is an article that appeared in a newspaper at Yuba City, California. It concerns S-Sgt. Roger Kidd, a former resident of this city. Sgt. Kidd's father, Bascom Kidd (deceased) is a brother to Cager Kidd Kidd of Star Rt. 2, Vester Kidd of Route D, Henry Kidd, and Mrs. H. O. Singleton of this city.

The promotion of Roger Kidd, route 2, Yuba City, from sergeant to staff sergeant has recently been announced by the headquarters of an A-20 light bombardment group in England.

S-Sgt. Kidd is an engineer-gunner of an A-20 light bomber operating from a ninth air force bomber base commanded by Col. Preston P. Pender of Hendersonville, N. C. His job is to man the ship's guns accurately when necessary and to work together with the mechanics to keep the ship in the best of combat condition at all times.

He was inducted into the army air forces on Jan. 19, 1943, and was sent to Seymour Johnson Field, N. C., to study engineering. From there, he proceeded to Fort Meyers, Fla., where he started aerial gunnery and upon graduation was promoted to sergeant.

Prior to his entry into the army, Sgt. Kidd was employed as a flanger by the Henry J. Kaiser shipyard of Richmond. He is the son of Mrs. B. R. Kidd of Route 2, Yuba City, California.

Chairman Earnest Appeals to Citizens

If we here in Dawson County are going to support our men, who are bravely dying for us, we must buy that bond NOW.

We have only five days to show our men that we are backing them. If we fail, we must say 'We did not back the bravest of the brave.'

Softwood Lumber Will Not Be Issued For A Short Period

The following telegram from National AAA headquarters was received at the local Triple A office this week: "Number G A 201 preference rating certificates shall not be issued for softwood lumber after June 30, until further instructions have been received."

This action was taken because new forms are going to be used for issuing lumber.

Officials at the office report that 118,000 board feet of softwood lumber was issued in the second quarter in Dawson County.

S-Sgt. Mullins Now In The South Pacific

HEADQUARTERS, 13th AAF, South Pacific—Staff Sergeant A. P. Mullins of Lamesa, has arrived in the South Pacific and become a member of the 13th AAF, the air force which has blasted Jap air power from Guadalcanal to Truk in its north-westward drive.

Sergeant Mullins, son of Charley L. Mullins, Star Route Two, of this county, is an aerial engineer aboard a 13th AAF B-24 Liberator bomber.

Prior to his entry into the AAF on November 1, 1942, Sergeant Mullins attended Lamesa High School. He departed for overseas duty on May 25, 1944.

Arrangements are being made for a final Fifth War Loan Drive rally, which will be the concluding push to put Dawson County "over the top" in bond sales. The rally is slated to be held Saturday, July 8 from 3:30 p. m., until 4 p. m. It will take place on the courthouse square.

An effort is being made to have present for that occasion, several wounded war veterans, who will speak to Dawson County citizens about their experiences in the war zones. Needless to say, these men will have many things to tell the audience, about the countries they have seen and the activities they have had part in. These soldiers will probably be brought here from the McCloskey Hospital at Temple.

In addition to this, there is a possibility that army tanks and half tracks will be secured from the field at Abilene, so that Dawson County citizens can see war instruments that are used in battle.

J. R. Earnest, Fifth War Loan Drive chairman will act as master of ceremonies for the occasion.

Every citizen in Dawson County should be present for this affair Saturday, in order that they can get a clearer picture of actual war. There is a need for stepped-up bond buying in Dawson County, in order that this area can complete its quota, and this final bond rally will give you an opportunity to do your part in this drive.

A house to house canvass will be conducted in this area by members from the Rotary, Lions and Knights of Pythias Clubs this week. According to an announcement from chairman Earnest, the canvass will get underway Wednesday, July 5, and the local citizens will be contacted and asked to purchase a bond for the Fighting Fifth War Loan Drive.

New Use For Gelatin Given

A box of gelatin may have a place with your home laundry aids, as well as in your kitchen cupboard.

Gelatin is a good remedy for rayon dresses that become limp and wrinkle easily after washing. Mrs. Dora R. Barnes, clothing specialist for the A. and M. College Extension Service, says the process is simple. Just dip the dress in a gelatin and water solution.

Starching is not successful with most rayon fabrics. Mrs. Barnes explains, but plain, granulated gelatin softened and when dissolved in water likely will give the needed "body" or filling. The amount of gelatin used will depend on the stiffness desired, but usually two tablespoons should be enough. You might use less for sheer rayon, Mrs. Barnes says.

Here are her directions: "First, soak the gelatin a few minutes in a little cold water, then dissolve with boiling water. Pour the solution in a bowl large enough to hold the dress and add enough cold water to be comfortable for your hands. After the dress is washed and rinsed, dip it in the gelatin solution and squeeze it gently. Then roll the dress in a thick bath towel until it is dry enough to iron. Finally, remember that ironing rayon requires low heat."

Mrs. Barnes says she also has

tried gum arabic with similar success, and that borax is good for stiffening lace collars. Instructions for their use, however, differ from the instructions for using gelatin.

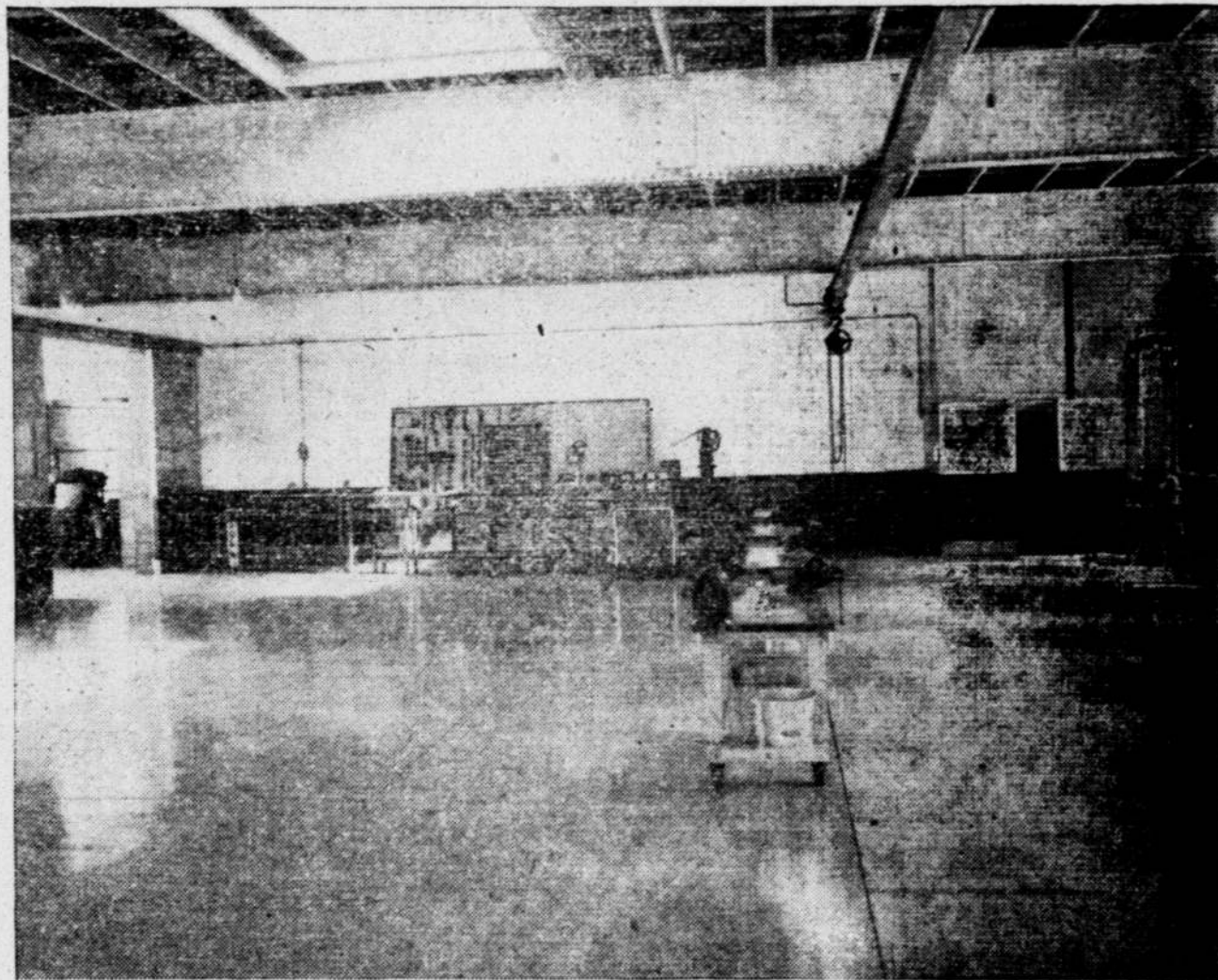

Mineral Oil Is Said To Destroy Some Food Essentials

Increased war-time use of mineral oil in salad dressings, salted nuts, potato chips and doughnuts may have serious nutritional consequences.

This concern is expressed by Hazel Phipps of the A. and M. College Extension Service who cites nutrition research at state experiment stations which have shown that mineral oil robs the body of at least two of the fat-soluble vitamins necessary to health and also of two important minerals, calcium and phosphorus.

The American Medical Association also has issued a recent warning against indiscriminate use of mineral oil, Miss Phipps says. The AMA statement says prolonged use of mineral oil can interfere seriously with the absorption of Vitamins A, D, and K by the body.

The specialists in food preparation explains that because doctors sometimes recommend mineral oil for special diets, apparently many people prescribe it for themselves.

Mineral oil has come into wider use in food preparation during the war because it has not been rationed along with other fats and oils and because it has been plentiful and relatively cheap. Nor does it become

rancid. It has practically no taste. Tooth decay has been a persistent plague since early historic time.

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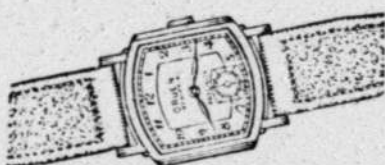

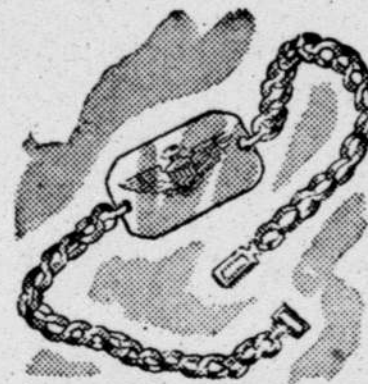

New Rulings Are Given On Hiring of Male Workers

Employers in Dawson County will be permitted to hire male workers without referral by the United States Employment Service under authority of the Area Director of the War Manpower Commission and the Abilene Area Management-Labor Committee. This constitutes a special arrangement under the Priority Referral Program of the War Manpower Commission, which went into effect at midnight, June 30, H. A. Clark, Manager of the United States Employment Service, Big Spring, said, and is subject to change if operating experience and national manpower needs dictate.

No local office of the United States Employment Service is located in Dawson County, he said, and undue hardship would be imposed upon workers if they were required to make a trip to Big Spring to secure a job.

It was emphatically pointed out, however, that while these arrangements permitted a worker to seek employment within the county without having to be channelled through the Employment Service, that the Employment Stabilization regulations were still in effect and that any worker now employed or employed during the preceding 60-day period in an essential industry could not be hired except upon referral by the United States Employment Service or upon the presentation of a Statement of Availability. Clark also said that while workers would not be required to go through the USES when seeking a job inside the county that they should understand that no such arrangements exist in counties in which an office of the USES is located, and that in those counties no employer should hire a male worker except upon referral of the USES.

One of the objectives of the Priority Referral Program is to keep essential workers on their present jobs, he continued, and he urgently requested less-essential employers to refrain from hiring essential workers pointing out that such practice was in violation of the Stabilization Plan and could, if allowed to reach proportions detrimental to the war effort, be a reason for remanding the arrangement on the Priority Referral Program in Dawson County.

No restriction whatever has been placed on agricultural workers, so long as they remain in agricultural work, he said.
