Late rally proves futile for Wolves

For any Colorado City football fans who witnessed only the fourth quarter of Friday's game between the Wolves and the Seminole Indians the game was well worth any admission price. Those who left before the final quarter or were there as true fans for the entire game know the real story.

Quarterback Ismael Silva, substituting for an ineffective Cary Ritchey, threw two touchdown strikes in the final period to save face and give Colorado City a chance to cheer. It was too little too late, though, as the Indians of district 3AAA already held a 27-6 lead before the final two Pack strikes and answered the scores by Michael Swann and Reggie Gardner with a final score of their own to win the ballgame 34-18.

Colorado City's offense sputtered to say the least during the earlier part of the game. The Wolves turned the ball over five times on three fumbles and two interceptions.

The Indians were only too happy to accept the game in rushing for 342 yards to Colorado City's 25. The Wolves did pass for 199 yards to Seminole's 62 but it took the Pack 33

attempts to complete 12 passes.

Only once in their first three possessions did the Wolves begin with fairly good field position—and that was at their own thirty-four yard line. Ricky Arispe, who seemed to be making plays all over the field for the Wolves, provided the only offense in the three drives as he caught a 12 yard pass from Ritchey and fought for Colorado City's first first down.

The Wolves had to punt away all three times and each time the Indians got close to blocking the punts—finally succeeding on the third punt.

Leslie Martin recovered the block at the Wolves eight yard line. Three plays later quarterback Dale Roberts faked a handoff and went in for a three yard score—something he would go on to do twice more. Shawn Hatchett kicked the extra point with 21 seconds left in the first period.

Ritchey was hit and fumbled on the Wolves next possession. Seminole recovered at the Wolves' 20. Five plays later Roberts kept to the opposite right side for a one yard run with 9:37 left in the first half.

The Wolves were unable to capitalize on an Arispe interception at the Seminole 25. The Indians were robbed through the

air again on their next possession by Ritchey. A 13 yard pass from Ritchey to Swann put the Wolves at the 19 and a 14 yard strike to Gardner made it first

and goal at the four. Terry Jackson carried from there for a 13-6 score at 1:51 of the second quarter. Silva's PAT kick was good but nullified because the

Wolves only had ten men on the field and Silva was not able to do it again.

Kitchens sentenced to seven years

Jack Kitchens, 57, a Mitchell County farmer, was sentenced to seven years in the Texas Department of Corrections Wednesday by a 32nd District Court Jury after it found Kitchens guilty of assault with a deadly weapon.

Kitchens was charged with a Jan. 4 assault on District Clerk Bill Erwin in a rest room at Veterans of Foreign Wars post home 9178 in Colorado City.

Testimony indicated that Kitchens had followed Erwin into

the rest room and had struck him on the head 12 or 13 times with a pair of rusty fence pliers. More than 100 stitches were required to close the cuts. No reason was given for the assault.

Court-appointed attorney Javier Alvarez attempted to show that Kitchens was insane at the time of the assault.

The guilty verdict was reached in 43 minutes, but the jury took 3 hours and 13 minutes to fix the punishment.

C-City youth injured in bus/truck crash

Raymond Lee Rich Jr., 17, of Colorado City was injured Friday afternoon when the Chevrolet pickup he was driving was in collision with a Trailways bus. He was taken to the Mitchell County Hospital for treatment for a broken left arm and a cut on his chin.

Rich was transferred to San Angelo with a broken arm and facial lacerations.

His mother, Cathey Standefer,

said that Rich is a student at Westbrook High School and was returning home at the time of the accident. His pickup was totaled. The accident occurred in the middle of U.S. 80 at the bus station at 4 p.m.

The bus driver was Otis Judson Crowell, 51, of Dallas. The bus contained 20 passengers. None appeared to be injured.

Danny Salazar recovered a fumble for the Wolves right after that score but the half ended just after Ritchey was intercepted by the Indians' Jack Wisdom.

The Wolves went into the locker room at halftime hoping the worst was behind but on their first second half possession Seminole's Wisdom pounced on an errant Ritchey pitch.

The Wolves never really gave up the big offensive play during the first half but that changed in the third period. Seminole split end Grady Dale turned a defending Gardner around deep down field and completed a 39 yard pass to the Wolves six yard line.

Roberts then got the third Indians' score on a three yard keeper with 4:16 left in the period. Jaime Nave ran for two points to make it 21-6.

Two plays later Terry Jackson was stripped of the ball to put Seminole at the Colorado City 39. Back Hector Jaquez broke

tackles and a 35 yard run two plays later for a 27-6 Indian lead.

Two plays later Nave intercepted an overthrown Silva pass. That completed the bad Wolves fortunes as Colorado City then teased the crowd with the two fourth quarter touchdown passes from Silva to Swann and Gardner.

Ty Bryson ended the scoring by giving the Indians a 34 yard touchdown run with 1:54 left in the game. Hatchett kicked the PAT.

Wolves receivers missed at least six catchable passes.

Sales tax rebates reflect downturn

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday sent checks totaling \$15,262 to the cities of Colorado City and Westbrook, two of the 1,022 Texas cities that levy the one-percent city sales tax.

Bullock said the 1986 payments to date are down statewide and Colorado City and Westbrook are no exception with Colorado City showing 2.09 percent decrease and Westbrook a 42.39 decrease.

Colorado City's check this period was for \$14,636.09, compared to \$16,776.25 for the same period last year. The 1986 payments to date are \$193,467.18 compared to 1985 payments to date of \$197,593.94.

Westbrook's check totaled \$846.80 this period compared to \$5,286.44 a year ago. The 1986 payments to date are \$9,324.52 compared to \$16,185.04 a year ago.

Loraine did not receive a check this period. Its 1986 payments to date total \$4,771.50, up 30.15 percent from the 1985 payments to date of \$3,666.14.

Bullock said the decrease in August and September check amounts reflects a downturn in the Texas economy. September checks represent taxes collected on sales made in July and reported to the comptroller's office by Aug. 20.

Nobody was supposed to take this game serious. It was therapy for lunatics who had gone berserk when their croquet games began to slip.

There is no logical explanation for why we were swatting the little ball several hundred years later, though. You're not even considered a lunatic if you participate now. You can do it in broad daylight in front of important people. Sheep aren't even allowed in the same pasture.

To make the whole exercise more difficult, humans have constructed kidney-shaped sand piles and water hazards. Greens are so smooth that striking the ball into the hole is like hitting a ball on a coffee table.

These obstacles are harmless provided you swat the ball correctly. Unfortunately, almost nobody does. So skin divers are dispatched to the bottom of the water hazards after closing hours.

The little balls are retrieved, taken to the pro shop and placed in big jars to be re-sold the next day - often to the same people who put the balls in the water in the first place.

Sometimes it's hard to tell whether a stroke has been taken or not. Grim faced officials have to be summoned to trees and sand traps. A crowd gathers and a national television audience looks on.

Did the swatter actually draw sand with his swatter before it addressed the ball setting directly on top of the sand?

Millions of arm-chair lunatics at home watch replays in slow motion. Did the spec of sand fly prematurely? Grown men in suits whisper into microphones, trying to explain the proper procedure for avoiding premature sand flippage. They caution against accidentally making contact with the little ball while measuring it from just behind tree trunks, too. Somebody out there is always ready to assess a penalty.

After watching all this excitement on Sunday afternoon, the arm-chair lunatics go out to their favorite country clubs or munny courses and try to emulate the pro swatters.

Husbands leave wives and wives leave husbands to swat the little ball for four or five hours a day. Children can either raise themselves or start swatting the little ball, too.

Continued obstinance on the part of the ball usually results in swatters hiring pro swatters to watch them swing their swatters. Why does the ball fall with such depressing regularity?

Swat courses are becoming war zones, what with all the little balls flying in all sorts of unpredictable directions at 100 miles per hour. For some reason, when your ball is about to decapitate somebody you're supposed to yell, "Four." It doesn't make any sense, but it does get people's attention.

The physical knowledge can help for a while. But eventually technique alone is useless. By and large, this is a mental game. Men with long couches in their offices make \$60 an hour listening to people with perfect techniques weeping about their neurotic hooks and slices.

The problem with this game is that it ought to be easy.

Nobody lines up in front of a swatter to block his shot. Nobody throws the ball at the swatter. Nobody spits on it to make it more difficult to hit. People just stand back quietly and allow the swatter to humiliate himself.

For reasons known only to swatters, they're always barking commands at the ball while it's in mid-flight.

"Come back, come back."

"Fade sucker."

"Get down, get down, (expletive deleted)."

The ball, being more sensible than humans, ignores the commands and goes wherever it pleases, seldom drawing applause for its independent spirit.

People justify this madness by saying it is good, gentlemanly (gentlewomanly), exercise.

Not a word of truth to it.

People who fight losing battles with tiny balls for four straight hours are not gentle. As for exercise, the hardest thing most of them do is turn on the switch to the battery-powered riding cart. Or freeze their hands in the ice chest while looking for refreshments.

I know what I'm talking about when it comes to this swatting madness. With the exception of the 31 times I've retired, vowing never again to expose myself to such ridicule, I've been swatting for 20 years now.

If you're going to live in a world of lunatics, I suppose it's only logical to be a part of the global funny farm.

Driving course set

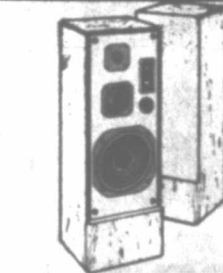

A serve by Strain halted the Abilene streak and gave the Wolves a final point at 13-7. An over-pass by Colorado City made it 14-7 and the Eagles ended the match with an ace as the Wolves let the ball hit between two defenders looking for the other to return the ball.

Tarter served for four points to lead the Wolves. Scoring two each were Stephens and Mann and scoring one each were Hamilton and Strain. Lowrance with two and Hamilton with one had point-winning hits. Sets were by Stephens and Strain.

Fifth bass tournament termed successful event

A three fish stringer which tipped the scales at 14 pounds 1 ounce gave Jerry Dudley an easy victory here at the fifth annual Colorado City Bass Club's open bass fishing tournament Saturday. The margin of victory was the only easy thing about the win, though, as Dudley, who lives in Big Spring, had to overcome 184 other contestants as well as continually changing lake conditions for his winning catch.

An entire week of almost nonstop rains had produced a 4 foot rise in the level of Lake Colorado City since Labor Day and even heavier rains in the latter part of the week had sent the water level in Lake Champion rising almost nine feet, with North Champion creek spewing its muddy water into the reservoir during the whole day of competition.

Despite the week of ominous weather, 185 anglers—the largest crowd by far for the five year old tournament—traveled a combined total of 14,625 miles to fish at either Lake Colorado City or Lake Champion. None, however, did as well as Dudley. In fact, only 43 contestants were able to land fish meeting the new state minimum requirement of 14 inches. A total of 152½ pounds of fish were weighed in and an estimated 85 percent of those were returned in healthy condition to the lake.

The big bass of the tournament was caught by Sweetwater's Bill Doggett. Doggett, who had fished the previous four years with little success, used a blue worm in the logs and brush near the power plant at Lake Colorado City to entice and land

his 6 pound 8 ounceunker. The fish was heavy enough to give Bill a fourth place finish in the heavy stringer contest despite the fact that he was two fish short of his total.

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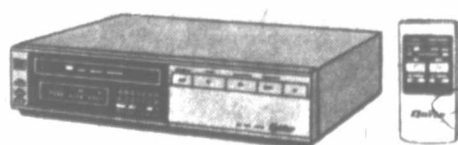

7th graders tie; 8th grade loses

Colorado Middle School football got off to a slow start here Thursday as the seventh graders tied Seminole 0-0 and the eighth grade team fell to the Indians 19-0.

The seventh grade Pack was at the Seminole six yard line two times and at the fourteen yard marker on another occasion during the scoreless deadlock. Statistically the Wolves outgained the Indians 144 yards to 34 and made eight first downs to Seminole's two.

Turnovers cost both teams. Colorado City fumbled the ball five times while losing it three times. The Indians fumbled four times and lost the ball on three of the miscues. The Pack suffered one interception to Seminole's two.

The Wolves' offensive backfield that included quarterback Shayne Anderson and backs Kevin Green and Jason Stone had trouble finding the ball's grip throughout the contest. An exchange in the backfield on Colorado City's second play from scrimmage resulted in a fumble and ended the Wolves' first drive.

The Indians took over at the Wolves' thirty-nine but defense by Cade Proctor, Chris Molina, Jesse Gonzales, Stone and Green held Seminole at the seven-ten.

A short pass by Anderson was intercepted to end the Pack's second possession—again putting Seminole in Wolves' territory. Again defense by Proctor, Gonzales and Green stopped the Indians.

Penalties and a fumble recovered back by Colorado City stalled the Wolves third drive. The second quarter ended on an

interception by Green.

A hard hit by the Wolves caused a Seminole fumble to begin the second half and Chris Molina was there to recover his first of two fumbles.

The Wolves then drove fifty yards to the Seminole six yard line. Big plays in the drive were a fifteen yard pass from Anderson to Marcus Monroe that carried to the twenty-two and sixteen yard run by Stone that put Colorado City at the six.

The next two plays resulted in a loss of four yards. Facing a third and goal at the ten, Anderson passed to Monroe at the goal line but the score was nullified by an illegal procedure penalty. The Wolves got back to the six with a nine yard completion from Anderson to Jerry Lemons but a sack on fourth and goal ended the threat.

Molina, Stone, Proctor and Rudy Melendez forced the Indians into punting but another short Anderson pass ended Colorado City's next possession. Three plays later Molina recovered another Seminole fumble.

The Wolves got to the Indians' sixteen behind the running of Stone and Green, who included a spinning twenty-nine yard run down the right sideline. A first and ten handoff between Anderson and Green with 1:16 left in the game was fumbled and Seminole recovered.

The Indians returned the favor five plays later and Greg Parker recovered to give the Pack one more chance with fourteen seconds left. Anderson fumbled a snap on the next play then made a tackle to end Seminole's last possession.

Turnovers also hurt the eighth grade Pack in their loss—that

The Wolves had nine possessions and turned the ball over five times. Seminole edged the Wolves seven first downs to six.

The Indians gained 148 yards to Colorado City's 106 but the bulk of the yardage came on runs of 26, 16, 43, and 32 yards allowed by missed tackles.

16 and the score.

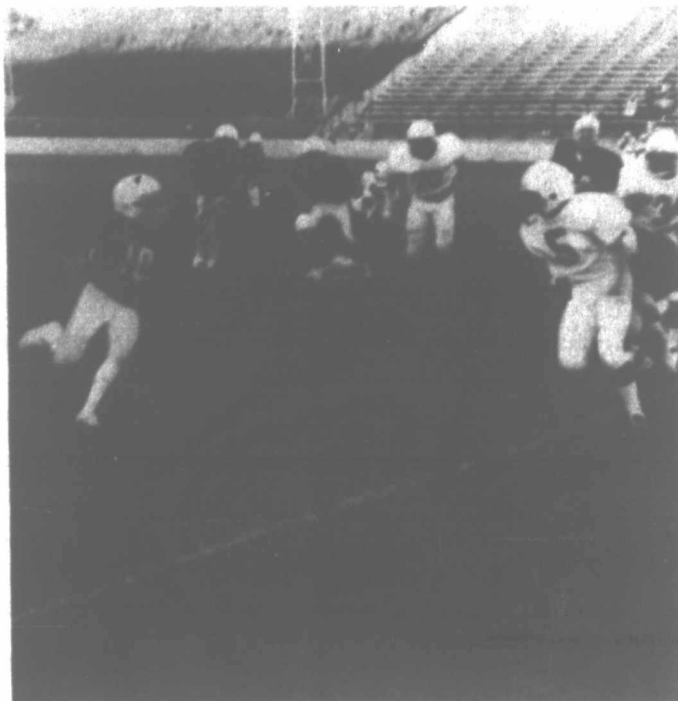

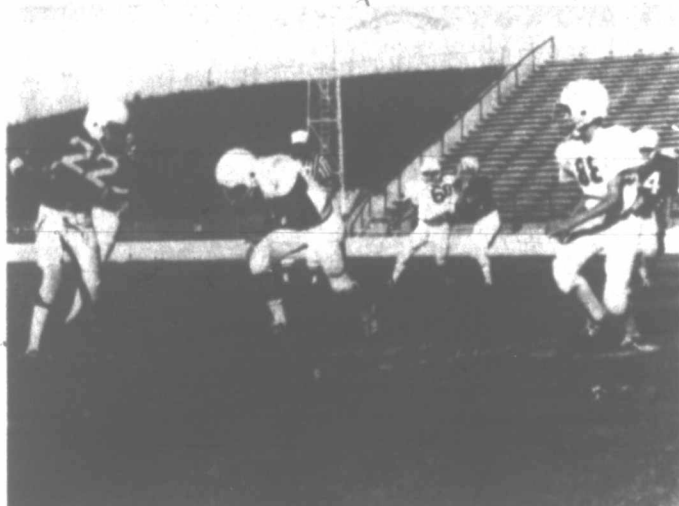
On fourth and four a pitch to the right resulted in a tackle-breaking touchdown run for the Indians that made it 12-0.

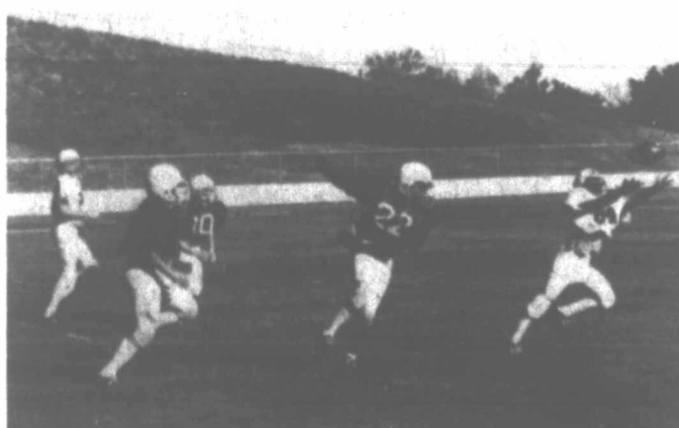

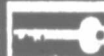

Positive outlook aids feelings about child care

Rather than worrying about childcare, work toward making the substitute care and your own time with your child as positive as you can.

Start by locating the best possible child care, based on your child's age, family financial situation, job location and the availability of child care services.

Whatever type of arrangement you choose, recognize that the quality of the child care is most important. Carefully consider the personality and skill of the caregiver, the atmosphere for child growth and development, the nutrition provided and the safety and cleanliness of the facility, before placing your child.

Once you have a child care arrangement, allow readiness time each morning. Young children have little concept of time. Hurrying and rushing about usually upsets them. Instead, set a "get up time" which allows for preparing and eating

breakfast, helping the child dress and sharing an activity before going to work.

Provide for continuity in your child's care by having brief conversations with the caregiver in the morning and at the end of the day. Let the caregiver know what has happened since they last saw the child, and find out what went on in the child's day while you were at work.

Plan time for both you and your child to unwind once you get home. Whether it's reading, having a snack or playing outdoors, try to establish a routine for relaxation before plugging into the evening chores and activities.

Also plan a special time to be with your child each evening. It may be before mealtime or bedtime. Five or ten minutes of undivided attention may not seem like much, but it often gets lost when parents are busy. Plan for longer activities on the weekends.

"Fit for Life" program to be offered by center

A "Fit For Life" program, will be taught by County Extension Agent Debbie Christian on Mondays for six weeks, 6:30 p.m. at the Wallace Center.

Miss Christian explains that the program is designed to teach how to control weight without giving up favorite recipes, snacking, or eating out.

"The more scientists have studied nutrition and weight problems, the clearer it becomes that food is only half the story," said Miss Christian. "Maintaining a healthful weight is a matter of balancing the calories you take in from food

against the energy expended through exercise."

She notes that "Fit For Life" is a total fitness program that teaches weight control through a combination of basic nutritional and exercise principles. It is an educational program developed by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and is in no way related to other publications by such name.

Registration fee for the six week course is \$25 and must be paid at time of enrollment. Miss Christian explains that \$10 will be returned to each participant who completes the six week course. The remaining \$15 covers the cost of materials for the classes.

To enroll, register at the Wallace Center by Tuesday, Sept. 23. The class will be limited to the first 25 who register.
