C. A. WILLIAMS SAYS THAT COTTON IS O. K.

MANY ANSWERS IN GUESSING CONTEST

INJURED WHEN CARS RUN TOGETHER

At the meeting of the City Council Tuesday night of this week for furnishing material for the light and water systems were purchased. It has been decided that the city will do all purchasing of materials thereby saving the cost that a contractor would make. It has not been definitely settled as to how the labor part will be handled but some scheme will be adopted so that as much local labor can be used as possible. In the matter of purchasing a new engine and generating unit, all bids were rejected. Bids for this unit will be accepted at a meeting of the council on Tuesday, March 6th.

The Pittsburgh-Des Moines Co. of Dallas was awarded the contract for the new tower and tank, they furnishing and erecting same and also discharging the present tower for the sum of \$9600.00. The cast iron water pipe, 2" galvanized pipe, cast-iron fittings, building tile, re-inforcing steel, steel sash and doors, hardware, glass, and a 10,000 gallon fuel oil storage tank was contracted for with the Mid-West Co. Two double acting water pumps were purchased from the United Tron Works. Dunning & Co. will furnish the extension valves, fire hydrants, etc. All motors, and electric equipment such as wire, insulators, transformers, street lights, etc. was purchased of the United Electric Co.

R. D. Dockerty has been employed as City Clerk. He will look after all the records of the light and water plant and all other city business. Mr. Dockerty is a very capable man and has had much experience in looking after public affairs, he having been County Clerk of Woodward County, Oklahoma for eight years prior to moving to Perryton. A superintendent has not been employed as yet. The council have several men under consideration.

It is expected that the work will get under way in a short time now. We will welcome the day that this big job is started for it will furnish employment for a number of men.

I am glad to see more people breaking into print, if more people would air their views on farming and other matters pertaining to the general welfare it would be a great benefit to the whole community, as well as enjoyable and pleasant reading.

Now who is there so dense to a sense of humor that they couldn't enjoy the writeup in regard to planting cotton, by going back some 20 years and looking through the periscope of time I imagine I can see the writer (I don't know who he is) going down a cotton row between Sambo and Rastus chopping cotton, keeping time with the hoe to Rastus sweet lullaby.

If we should plant a good acreage to cotton, and there should come a rainy spell and the weeds take it, I am sure the town would turn out en masse to help chop them out.

It was a good letter well written and I enjoyed reading it, as to the points touched upon I have nothing to say, as I know nothing about cotton, but there are plenty of men here who do know and I would like to hear from some one on the other side of the house.

Frank Roger's letter was overflowing with good hard common sense and facts, things we all realize but don't act upon.

I was very glad to hear him come out for a County Agent, if we ever have any real progress it will be through the work of a County Agent. Look at Beaver County just across the line, now we all know that Beaver County does not compare with Ochiltree agriculturally yet she has outstripped us in many ways due almost entirely to the County Agent.

Lots of people will be against it, say it is throwing money away, and while that is to be expected, it doesn't make it true. They had a County Agent in Lipscomb County several years ago, they didn't keep him because he advocated new methods, they wanted to do business the way their forefathers had done, he tried to have them make two blades of grass grow where one had grown before, but they would have none of it.

Hansford County is trying to get an Agent, shall we take Hansford or Lipscomb as a model, or shall we set the pattern for both.

As to summer fallowing for wheat I believe that most of us are agreed that is the solution if we expect to make this a wheat country, but I believe that it is a small per cent of the farmers that will consent to cultivate the ground two years for one crop except in a small way.

We expect to summer fallow about 20 or 30 acres and sow to rye or wheat this fall for grazing purposes, if we can retain sufficient moisture to grow some wheat or rye that will make reasonably good pasture it would be worth \$15 per acre for milk cows and growing hogs though we never cut a straw.

My friend E. L. Whippo is a great believer in fertilizing, Ed says he has fertilized his ground two years with wheat, he is going to fertilize with barley in March and he feels sure that by June he will have it in condition to raise a row crop.

Now you think that is funny, but I will tell you my friends there is lots of food for thought in that sentence. I believe in sowing wheat here as its our money making crop when it hits.

My opinion in regard to raising a wheat crop is this, follow the header with Disc-harrow or plow and put your ground in condition as quickly as possible, then if you have sufficient possible, then if you have sufficient up and carry it into the winter, sow, if not, then save your seed and plant to some other crop, you haven't hurt your ground any by the working.

I met a Broom-corn buyer in Huntoon last week, he asked me how much broom-corn I was going to put out, I told him 100 acres if he would contract for the brush at \$100. per ton and put up a good and sufficient bond that he would come through with contract, otherwise I would plant the old reliable milo maize.

Excepting cane, maize is the greatest drouth resister and surest crop that we can raise in the Panhandle. Maize raised, fed and sold through the old red sow and speckled hen and their progeny will make more money

The following article was written by C. A. Williams of Gray, Oklahoma who has lived in this country a number of years and has also had some experience at the cotton raising game.

"I will write a little on the subject of cotton in this country. There seems to be knockers against cotton here just like there was against any other new crop that we ever started to raise. When we farmers came to this country in 1903 and went to tilling the soil, some said you can't raise anything here. What have we failed on? In 1906 and 1907 we planted some cotton, just roughed it in and sod in anyway that we could. I sowed one-half bale to the acre on what I put in and I know other men here who made one bale to the acre and the men are still in this country and I can prove it if necessary. We had seed that we brought from central Texas that was not acclimated to this country.

I want to say to Mr. "Fool" that has just told us farmers what to do in the last week's issue of the Ochiltree County Herald that he certainly got his name right and that is all. We have a fairly good grain country of course. Mr. "Fool" says that we have the best grain country in the world. Well, that is taking in right smart territory. Now if we want to raise some cotton where we can use all the seed for our dairy cows and it is much better for them than the oil cake and meal, then, that our business. Every farmer that buys oil cake and meal knows what a big price he has to pay and then he has all the oil taken out of it. Our cotton seed would have all the oil in it. It is hard to beat for feed for the cows and sheep. I don't think there is any one crop that we could raise that would help the country more than cotton, but it is not a good idea for us to go too strong on any one crop.

Our Mr. "Fool" said that the world was always run over with cotton. I wonder if any fair minded person believed that there is a better prospect for a good price for cotton for years to come than for any crop that he farmer raises. The price is very good now and just as soon as the foreign countries get on their feet that they will be able to buy cotton at the price go much higher.

Men, you know what the boll weevil has done and is still doing for the cotton in the south where there is lots of rain but in this northwestern country the boll weevil, will not harm us. Mr. "Fool", take a look down in Wheeler County. You can go and come in a day. They have raised cotton for a number of years, see if it is a negro country, look at their schools and churches and see if they are tumbled down I put in twenty years of my life in the cotton country of Texas and I didn't get as bad as you say.

Men, look and see the price cotton is selling for today, the lint is something like 25c per pound and a bale in the seed weighs about 1600 pounds, which will make 500 pounds of lint cotton at least and 1100 pounds of seed or about 34 bushels. We need the seed for our cows or if you have more than you need will find a ready sale at \$1.00 per bushel which is much cheaper than we now pay for oil cake and meal with the nutritious oil removed.

I say we need the seed and need it badly. We are all selling cream or trying to get some to sell. There is no better butter fat producing feed than the cotton by-products but the present high price of cake and meal makes it almost prohibitive to use. Why should we ship it in here when there is no better part of Texas in which to raise it than right here in this community.

Mr. "Fool", you said that was your name and I have no right to deny it, we don't want to quit raising wheat or anything else. It is very easy to glut the market on broom corn but not so with cotton. Many a man in these parts would have liked to have been out gathering cotton during the nice weather of the past six months. You say that you will say a few things that will give this country lots of money. You seem to have lots of confidence in your talk and you surely think that we will swallow all your dope. Well this good to have one fall in here and say this country. I want to say that

when you sow your fields in wheat after cotton you will see a bigger wheat crop. You can pick over your cotton once, then put the wheat drill right into it. It will not hurt the cotton. If you haven't time to pick your cotton in the fall, it can sown and till spring in this country and not waste much. The cotton gins can now handle the bolls that do not open up good on account of an early frost.

Do not get in too big a hurry in planting. About the first of June is good, it won't give you any more work in cultivating than your kaffir corn. You will not need to hoe it, if you will plant three or four acres to the bushel and here will be chopping as we need it thick here so that it will open. Cultivate good, do not let it get weedy and you will make cotton if your kaffir and maize makes a crop. The cotton in this country does not have the root rot and die as it does in the black belt of Texas.

We must have a cotton gin at Perryton or we will have to haul our cotton to Spearman or some other place. Some of the Balke farmers raised good cotton several years ago and they can do it again and get four times as much for it now. We need the seed for our stock and the sale of the lint. I have sold wheat cheap in this country and the prospects look better for a cotton market than they do for the wheat market. We will all still raise wheat but we do not want to go too strong on any one crop. Mr. Farmer, go to Perryton and put down the number of acres you will plant so that arrangements can be made for a gin and for seed which will be put to the planters at cost. I live ten miles north and one mile west of Perryton.

IMPORTANCE OF SALT FOR CATTLE HEALTH

Salt is such an important matter to cattle and the cattle interests, that I feel that more emphasis should be placed upon it than is usually the case. There is nothing of more importance in wintering a herd of cattle and it should be the kind of salt that they can eat quickly and easily. The reason that block salt lasts so long is because the cattle get little or nothing of it. They may waste hours licking at a block while if the salt were supplied in another form they could get all they desired in a few minutes.

The best salt I have used comes from Willard, New Mexico. It seems to be a natural sea salt and rather coarse. It carries the properties that are very essential to animals, quite a percentage of saltpetre and all the properties of sea salt. The saltpetre is of great advantage.

This salt does not melt in rain nor pack from being wet, making it easy at all times for the animals to get what they want. It should be kept in the troughs continually. One great advantage of this New Mexico salt is that it absorbs coal oil readily.

Coal oil not only keeps the bowels in proper condition during the winter, but where cattle are fed plenty of it, it rids them of lice. Also, my experience indicates that it will destroy or drive off the parasite which causes the cattle itch. I have been using it ten years and have not vaccinated a calf nor had any blackleg. Besides these attributes, it seems to have some effect on warbles in backs of cattle caused by the heel-fly. So it appears to me that if coal oil was more generally used, it would be possible to check the warbles and if everybody used it, to cause the heel-flies to disappear in a year or two.

The coal oil should be put on the salt with a sprinkler, very slowly, in the proportion of one gallon of coal oil to one hundred pounds of salt, leaving the salt in a round pile until oil soaks in. For the best results there should be added, and well worked in, five pounds of slaked lime and ten pounds of sulphur. Cattle men who will do this will find a great difference in the wintering of their cattle.

A LETTER

Dear Folks:—I have been reading with much interest the expressions from different sources on the "crop question." I agree with "A Kool who has been fooled"; let's keep away from the cotton field and leave that for the country where hogs have the cholera, chickens die of limber neck and the cattle have the itch, cotton will thrive in that climate and they know how to raise it, so let's leave it to them and turn our attention to a feed crop and the stock to consume it.

One splendid crop that I have not seen mentioned is the humble "cow pea". Hogs turned in on a field of cow peas will grow and fatten with very little else but water. The old cow will give more and richer milk if fed the hay and an occasional meal of the peas, either as string beans when green or in the dry state will be relished by the family.

The most economical method of raising them is to plant a patch of maize and when being "laid by" plant the peas between the rows. Fence, hog tight, the patch, and when the peas are about ripe, and when the maize is, turn in the pigs; give them access to plenty of good clean water and, if you have never tried it, you will be surprised at the rapid progress they will make. We have tried it and know.

There is no better country under the sky than this for raising hogs, if we can arrange about the feed, and to my mind cow peas and maize solve the problem, and another thing, cow peas are soil builders, that is something to be considered in this country.

I believe if we plant more of a variety of crops, a smaller acreage, given better attention, and devote, say two hours daily to the cows and hogs we will have fewer farms mortgaged, fewer loans past due at the Banks and fewer merchants facing bankruptcy.

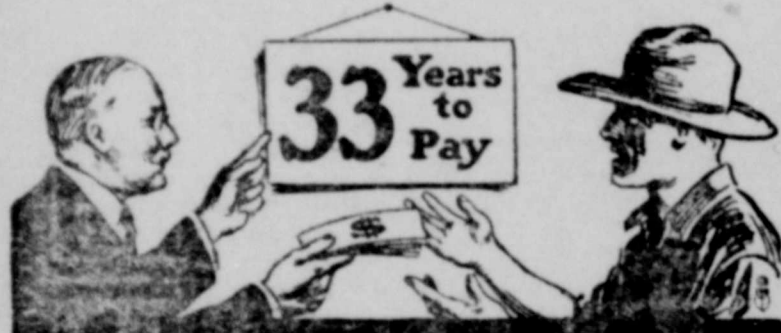

DAIRY HINTS

CONTESTS IMPROVE QUALITY

Demonstrations in South Carolina Have Done Much to Promote Dairy Industry.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

County and state butter contests, a feature of South Carolina extension work for women last year, accomplished much in the way of improving the dairy industry there. South Carolina is not a dairy state. It uses annually about \$14,000,000 worth of dairy products shipped in from other states. Some of this importation is due to the fact that while there is a large amount of farm butter produced within the state, no steady demand for it has been developed. For the purpose of creating an interest in this farm-made butter, and to teach the women to make a better product, contests which were open to home-demonstration club members were started during 1921 in 11 counties.

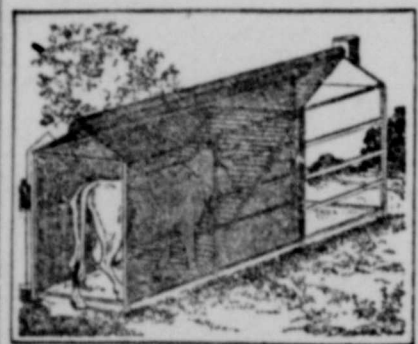
Butter demonstrations were given in all the women's clubs, and all interested persons were invited to a demonstration by the state specialist at the county seat. Three hundred and sixty women and girls enrolled for the contests, and of these 129 sent butter for every judging. Without exception there was a great improvement in the packages brought to market and the quality of the butter sold, as the women learned to what extent the butter is affected by the temperature used for ripening and churning, the care and cleanliness in handling, and the feeds for the cow.

"Contest butter" sold very readily at the various club markets, and those who did not enter the contest were obliged to make improvement in the quality of what they offered for sale or lose the market for their butter. Extension workers report to the United States Department of Agriculture that the butter produced in all parts of the state has been perceptibly improved as a result of these contests.

TRAP KEEPS COW CONTENTED

Kansas Farmer Designs Odd Contraption to Keep Flies From Milk Producers.

Along with keeping his hired help contented the farmer must also keep his cows "contented," if they are to give their maximum production of milk. A Kansas farmer, who believes that bovine contentment depends largely upon keeping the animals

free of flies, has invented an odd fly-trap for that particular purpose. The cow enters and walks through the cage, and the flies are brushed off by brushes that protrude from each side. The flies, or most of them, in their attempt to escape, are caught in a specially designed trap on the top of the inclosure.—Popular Mechanics Magazine.

DESTROYING LARVAE OF FLY

Caution Must Be Used in Applying Chemicals to Manure Piles to Conserve Value.

There are many ways of combating the fly nuisance. On farms, the manure piles are probably the chief sources of fly infection. The use of chemicals in destroying the larvae of the fly in manure piles is one of the important ways of keeping this insect under subjection. However, one must be cautious inasmuch as a too liberal use of some of the chemicals will destroy the fertilizing value of the manure.

FACTORS IN DAIRY FARMING

Of Great Importance That Barns and Utensils Be Clean to Add to Creamery Check.

Good clean barns, clean milking practices, and clean dairy utensils are three essential factors in dairy farming, whether for the man who is making it his sole business, or the farmer who uses five to ten cows to add the creamery check to his income for the month, along with other farming work.

Silo Increases Profits.

Business farmers and experiment stations have found that a silo not only increases the yearly profits of the farm, but eliminates many uncertainties of live stock raising.

Feed Calves Separately. Tie the calves up so they can be fed separately.

Cows Standing Highest. The cows that stand highest in testing association records are fed grain regularly to supplement pastures.
