



Next Saturday to Be "Poppy Day" In Hereford

Memorial Day poppies will be sold in Hereford Saturday by members of the Hereford American Legion Auxiliary and the Weocantewaste Camp Fire Girls.

Memorial Day will be celebrated over the nation next Thursday, May 30, and the annual Poppy Day sale is always made on the Saturday before Memorial Day.

Contributions received in exchange for the flowers will be used in relief and rehabilitation work for disabled veterans, their families and the families of the dead from both World Wars.

"A flower for the living, as well as a tribute to the dead" is the Poppy Day slogan this year.

Vets Can Renew G. I. Insurance Without Exam

The contact service of the Veterans Administration today was seeking every veteran who has let his G. I. Insurance lapse to offer reinstatement without a medical examination.

Robert W. Sisson, Lubbock Veterans Administration Regional Manager, said success of the campaign would result in invaluable service to thousands of veterans.

Ex-GI's can now reinstate policies with out a medical examination, regardless of how long they have been out of the service, provided their health has grown no worse during the lapsed period, Sisson said.

"This liberalization is only effective until January 1, 1947," he pointed out. "Time is running out for many of these veterans and we must use every means to inform them of this priceless opportunity."

"Its importance cannot be over-emphasized. It will not only be simpler to reinstate policies, but many veterans are now able to reinstate who would not be able to pass a rigid physical examination."

Uncle of Local Man Killed in Texas Tornado

J. L. Howard, 82, uncle of Tom Howard of Hereford, was killed Saturday afternoon when his farm home near Stoneburg was struck by the tornado which cut a three-mile swath across North Texas last week-end.

Mr. Howard was the only person killed in the Stoneburg community. His wife was injured, and is in the hospital.

The tornado demolished the Howard home, which was built on a hill-top near Stoneburg and not far from the highway leading to Henrietta.

Reuben Baxter, an oil field worker from Nocona, said he was driving home from Wichita Falls when the storm struck, and saw the Howard farmhouse wrecked as the storm struck. Baxter was forced to clear the highway of wreckage in several places in order to get to Henrietta to sound the alarm.

Garbage Collection Fees Will Be Billed For Current Month

A steady drive has been launched by the City Commission to clean up Hereford, improve the sanitary conditions of the city, and in the course of events, to improve its outward appearance. The first steps in this program have already been taken.

A schedule of charges for garbage collection, as set forth in a city ordinance two months ago, will be put into effect this month, and the fees added to water bills on the first, Mayor W. E. Dameron announced this week.

Although the city is still handicapped by the lack of proper equipment, regular collections have been made this month over most of the city. The business district has been serviced daily, and residential districts have had weekly service by the garbage trucks.

"We realize," the Mayor said, "that in putting the service into operation in such a short time, mistakes have been made and many residences may have been overlooked. If you have not received this service at your home, advise the Sanitary Superintendent and the matter will be corrected. In such cases, the garbage fee will be waived."

The City has been promised delivery on the long-awaited garbage truck within 60 days. The truck has already been delivered to the factory in Detroit where a specially constructed body is being built.

In the meantime, the best possible collection service is being offered with the equipment

now on hand, and every effort is being made by the City to keep Hereford clean and improve the sanitary conditions of the community.

Work is already underway in cleaning-up the City Dump, and repairing and improving the disposal plant. This eye-sore will soon be eliminated, Mayor Dameron promises.

Approved garbage containers are still available at the City office at low cost. A metal container with tight-fitting lid, bought as surplus from the army, is being offered by the city at \$1.50.

"No one is obligated to buy these containers," the mayor advises, "but some metal container of the same approximate size and with a tight-fitting lid must be used."

Every effort is being made by the City Sanitary Department to carry out the sanitary program issued by Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, in an effort to stop the spread of epidemic disease which is now making considerable headway in Texas.

Every point of Dr. Cox program is being carried out in Hereford at the present time.

The city's water supply is being tested regularly. Milk sup- (Continued on Page 8)

City-Wide Sanitary Service Provided at Low Cost!

Garbage Fees to be Added to Water Bill this Month.

There appears to be confusion on some provisions of the sanitary ordinance recently published in the Hereford Brand. We desire, therefore, to reprint some portions of the sanitary ordinance and to call your attention to other provisions.

SECTION 2. Accumulation of Garbage and Refuse: No Owner or lessee of any public or private premises shall permit to accumulate upon the premises owned or leased by him, any garbage or refuse, except in covered containers approved by the City Superintendent of the Garbage Department. Such containers shall be constructed of metal in such a manner to be strong, not easily corroded, rodent proof, and shall be kept covered at all times except when garbage or refuse is being deposited therein or removed therefrom. All kitchen or wet garbage shall be drained of all water and other liquids and securely wrapped and tied in paper or paper sacks and placed in containers.

SECTION 3. Collection, and Disposal of Garbage and Refuse: (A.) Collection of Garbage and Refuse shall be done by The City Garbage Department, or under the direction of the Superintendent of the Garbage Department. No Person, Firm or Corporation shall collect garbage or refuse without a permit. (b.) Placing of Containers: Containers shall be placed at some convenient place to be designated by the Superintendent of the Garbage Department, no garbage or refuse shall be collected unless it is deposited in an approved container and placed as designated by such Superintendent. (c.) The burning of trash or

other waste on the premises, is hereby prohibited, unless it is burned in an approved container, constructed of metal or heavy meshed wire to prevent the spreading of fire. Such containers to be separate and apart from containers used for depositing garbage and trash, and under no circumstances shall the contents of a Garbage Container be set on fire.

(d.) Individual Disposal: The disposal of garbage and refuse by any individual in any place within the city limits, or within 1000 feet thereof, except at the designated City Dump Ground or place of disposal, is hereby prohibited.

SECTION 7. Uncollected Garbage declared a Nuisance: No garbage or refuse shall be collected from any premises where the owner or lessee has refused to pay the fee fixed or is in arrears for a period of one (1) month in the payment of the same. Fermenting, putrefying, or odiferous garbage in containers not disposed of or uncollected due to failure of the owner or lessee of any premises to pay the fees, or not placed in proper containers as required in Section 2, of this Ordinance, is and shall be declared a nuisance, and the owner, lessee or other person allowing or permitting such condition to exist shall be subject to the penalty for violation of this Ordinance.

SECTION 8. Penalty: Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance, and/or provision of the Sanitary Code of the State of Texas, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum of not less than \$1.00 or more than \$100.00, and each day

any such person shall violate any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall constitute a separate offense and to be punishable as such.

The ordinance requires that garbage must be placed in approved containers. The city offers an approved container delivered at \$1.50. This is a well constructed metal container with a tight fitting lid.

These containers would cost about double the price elsewhere. Fly proof, rodent proof and can be handled by one man. The large barrels in common use over town can not be used. They are too large to be handled by one man and are not equipped with tight fitting lids. You are not obligated to buy these garbage containers from the city. Any metal container with a tight fitting lid and near the same capacity of those offered by the city will be acceptable.

These containers must be placed in a convenient place for the collectors. With hundreds of stops to be made by the garbage collectors you will understand why these men can not climb fences, open gates or hunt over your premises to find the containers. Neither can these containers be carried distances. The containers should be placed on the property-alley line, or property-street line where there are no alleys. In extreme cases where this can not be done some arrangement should be worked out with the sanitary superintendent.

Please note garbage will not be collected unless put in an approved container and the container placed convenient for the collectors.

This service is not being forced

on anyone. But the ordinance does require everyone keep their premises clean and in a sanitary condition, which means that garbage must be removed from the premises frequently. A few people have indicated they would dispose of their own garbage. Regardless of the good intentions of these few it will not work out in compliance with the ordinance. Garbage must not be allowed to accumulate on the premises and individuals will not haul the garbage off as frequently as required; if they did it would cost much more than the service fee charged by the city. Garbage must be handled as required by the ordinance after it reaches the dump ground.

BURNING TRASH AND REFUSE

It is a violation of city ordinances to burn trash in the streets and alleys. The streets and alleys are dedicated to public use and travel and are not dumping grounds for rubbish. Fires are dangerous. They make ugly spots in our town. Ashes blow over town on our streets, into stores and homes. We have enough dirt, why make more? Do not burn anything that can be hauled off, this alone would greatly improve the appearance of our city. If you must burn something comply with the ordinance and burn it in an approved container (not garbage container) and on your own premises, not in streets and alleys, or on other peoples property.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Garbage fees as recently published will be added to your water bill this month. The business area has been serviced daily and the residential district

has had weekly service by garbage trucks. We are aware, and hope you are also, in putting into operation a garbage service covering several hundred homes that mistakes will be made. Some homes may have been overlooked. In such cases the garbage fee will be waived. If you have been overlooked please advise the Sanitary Superintendent and the matter will be corrected. We sincerely desire to make this service efficient.

IMPORTANT WARNING:

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has issued a solemn warning against the spread of disease already making much head way over portions of Texas. Dr. Cox sets forth a rigid sanitary program which requires all garbage be placed in metal containers with tight fitting lids, that they be serviced regularly. Flies are known carriers of dysentery and other diseases. Mosquitos carry malaria. Insects carry sleeping sickness and other diseases. To make this program efficient it is a job for every citizen of Hereford. You can not just dump this problem in the lap of the City Commission and wipe your hands of it. The City Commission is willing to take its full share of responsibility and do all it can. We are offering you the facilities to keep our city in a sanitary condition but you must use them to make the system work. This is not only a job for every one but for every day of the year. There is no place to stop, even a slow down means the accumulation of filth, which is always a hazard to health and life. Our citizens are not in accord on some matters such as parks, civic programs etc, but surely all of our

people can unite on the necessity of a sanitary program to protect the health and life of our people. This sanitary program is, as we see it, our number one objective. It is basic to all else. Hereford should be made clean first in a sanitary way and from that foundation we can move on to make Hereford beautiful. A civic program will be outlined later, right now we are concerned with sanitation.

Our water supply is being tested regularly. Milk supplies, food stores, drug stores, eating places are being inspected to insure proper safety from all these sources. The sewer disposal plant has been completely cleaned (first time since it was built) and is operating 100 per cent in efficiency. The grounds around this plant are being cleaned. The area south of the railway (Mexican town) is being cleaned and the occupants moved out to prevent a repetition of last summer. Our Sanitarian, Mr. C. A. Purcell, is doing many other things to improve our sanitary condition. It is most gratifying to both Mr. Purcell and the City Commission that we are receiving almost unanimous support of all our people, and for that fine support we sincerely thank you. We solicit your help in making Hereford the cleanest city in West Texas. It can be done. With your help it will be done. That is our goal and we should be satisfied with nothing less. When accomplished what a drawing card that will be for Hereford, and it will attract the right kind of people.

Hereford Driver Injured Friday As Truck Burns

William Ray Trigg, Hereford, truck driver for Blanton Butane Company, was seriously burned Friday when his truck overturned on the Panhandle Highway near Amarillo.

The accident occurred two miles east of St. Francis. Trigg was thrown clear of the wreck when the truck overturned, but suffered second degree burns when gas escaping from a broken valve ignited.

He was taken to St. Anthony's Hospital in Amarillo where he received treatment for severe burns on his back and arms.

The truck, owned by Lyle Blanton, was a 1942 Chevrolet carrying two butane tanks on a semi-trailer. It had crossed the highway, gone into the ditch on the left side, then swerved back on the highway before turning over.

Highway patrolmen who investigated the wreck believed that the driver had gone to sleep at the wheel.

End of School to Add More Social Security Cards

The beginning of the summer vacation for school children will cause an increase in the number of applications for Social Security Account Number Cards, according to a statement of J. R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo office.

Sanderson recommends to students who have never had a card, or have lost their original cards: Do not apply for a card unless it is actually needed. Be sure to ask for a duplicate card if the original card has been lost, as each person should have only one number for his whole working life; and, finally, be sure to show the card to each employer for whom you work, so he can copy down for his records your name and number exactly as they appear on the card.

Prominent Pampa Stockman Dies in Hospital Sunday

Charlie Thomas, prominent Pampa farmer and rancher and brother of Haynes Thomas of Hereford, died Sunday afternoon in a Shattuck, Oklahoma, hospital two weeks after undergoing an operation. He was 64 years old.

Mr. Thomas was state committeeman for the Panhandle district of the AAA. He was a pioneer member of the Producers Grain Board and an active member of the Panhandle Hereford Breeders Association.

Mr. Thomas had extensive farm and ranch holdings in Gray and Roberts Counties. He had come to Texas from Virginia in 1902. He was a member of the First Christian Church of Pampa, the Masonic Lodge, and Klappa Temple.

Surviving him, in addition to the brother in Hereford, are his son, Charles Jr., and a daughter, Mrs. Joe Osler of Pampa; four sisters, Mrs. Fred Gantz and Mrs. Josephine Thomas of Pampa, Mrs. Bertie Tomlinson of Elk City, Oklahoma, and Mrs. Edna Watson of Perryton; and three other brothers, Sam Thomas of Pampa, Will Thomas of Durham, Oklahoma, and Elbert Thomas of Wichita Falls.

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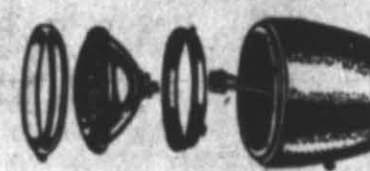
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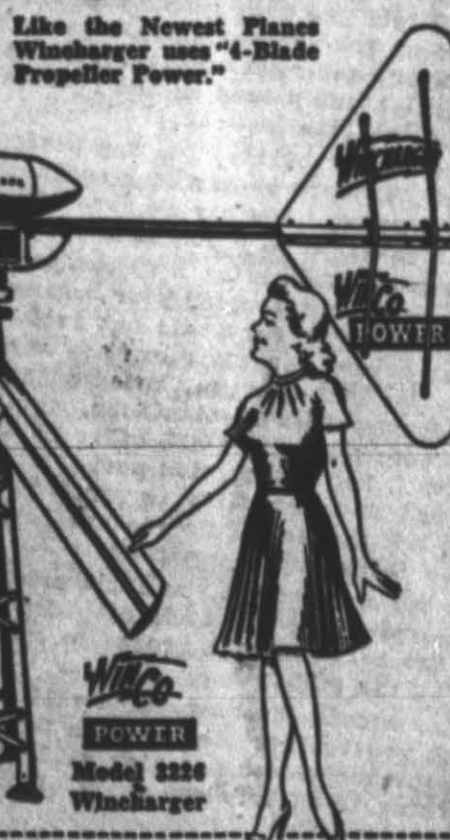
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High School Annual Goes To 375 Students Last Friday

Little Danger From Malaria Here; Hereford Mosquitoes Wrong Type

There's practically no danger that malaria, may become prevalent on the plains, City Sanitarian C. A. Percell believes.

With the influx of many veterans from Pacific war zones suffering from re-current malaria, and the increase in the local mosquito population during the past few weeks, many people have begun to wonder if the High Plains might be its first epidemic of malaria.

Local mosquitoes simply aren't the type to carry the malaria germ, Percell said, exhibiting some prize specimens collected from around town.

The Anopheles mosquito, a black insect which stands on its head to bite, is the only variety of mosquito which is capable of transmitting malaria, and so far no Anopheles have been discovered locally.

Most of the Hereford mosquitoes are Culex, which are smaller, browner, and bite from a sitting position. They're incapable of transmitting malaria, but can cause a considerable amount of annoyance in spreading other diseases.

The city is preparing to wage war against these insect pests, Percell said. So far, only a small advance guard has made its appearance, but the mosquito season is at hand.

Most of the local mosquitoes which are now making their appearance have been breeding in the city's storm sewers, Percell says, and should be easily taken care of by pumping a

supply of oil through the sewer mains.

The City sanitary department will be on the job this summer, spraying with DDT wherever necessary and keeping potential breeding spots under control.

With such methods, the city will take care of any re-entente Anopheles that might turn up in these parts, as well as the pestiferous Culex.

The Pacific veteran who's suffering from recurrent malaria need have little fear of transmitting the fever to anyone else. It can be transmitted only during a spell of fever, and then only if the malaria victim is bitten by an Anopheles mosquito.

Even Crops Can Tell You When They're Hungry



A farmer with the "know-how" can spot, at a glance, evidence of starvation in his growing crops, and remedy it. You will find it profitable to learn the signs of "hidden hunger" in your crops, whether you are selling them as cash crops or using them as feed for livestock. Once you have learned to understand the "sign language" of plants, you can often tell just by looking at a growing plant whether it is drawing from the soil all the nitrogen, phosphorus, potash and other elements it must have to produce healthy, high-yielding crops.

A deficiency in these essential elements will affect the plant's appearance in some way which will tell you just what is short. Here are some of the "hunger signs" in corn, for example:

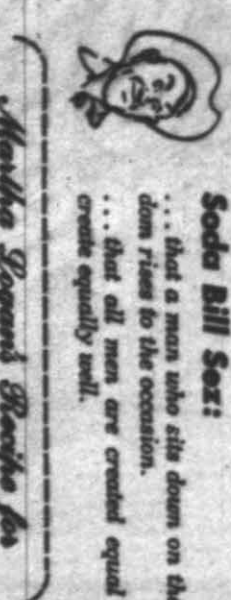
- Yellowish-green leaves and stunted growth indicate nitrogen deficiency.
- Tips of leaves gummed together indicates calcium deficiency.
- Purple color in leaves indicates phosphorus deficiency.
- Bottom leaves dead; yellow striping between

veins of upper leaves (condition known as "white-bud") indicates zinc deficiency.

- Scorching along the edges of leaves indicates potash deficiency.
- Regular yellowish-white stripes on leaves indicate magnesium deficiency.

Other crops also show "hunger signs" which can be recognized at a glance if you know their sign language. Your county agent or vocational agricultural teacher can tell you about them or advise you about books or bulletins which give detailed information. Because of their thorough understanding of soil and crop conditions in your district, they are the men to answer your questions. Both are ready and able to help you. They know the signs of crop malnutrition and can give you valuable advice.

Ringworm in Cattle Causes Irritation and Loss of Weight



Indications of this parasite disease are circular patches on the skin, usually on the head and neck, which soon become denuded of hair. Small blisters and scaly yellow crusts appear, with moderate itching. Colorado A. & M. College suggests the removal of crusts with soap and sand, then painting the area with scab ointment, sulphur ointment, or iodine once a day.



BETTER FARMERS FROM OUR HIGH SCHOOLS

By training the farmers of tomorrow in new farming methods, vocational agriculture is doing much to assure America the most productive and progressive agriculture in the world. Teachers of vocational agriculture have worked for almost thirty years to prepare youth for the practice of better farming. Over 8000 U. S. high schools now have vocational agriculture departments. Broad courses of study are offered to in-school farm boys, and short, intensive courses are open to farmers of all ages. Many schools operate farms or observation plots in which students are able to practice what they are taught. The program is productive as well as instructional.

In the Pacific and Northwestern regions, vocational agriculture is taught to 80,000 high school boys. 64 high schools in these areas operate farms totaling 2,466 acres. The 1945 production record of the school farms and of students on their home farms is a tribute to the skill and spirit of both the young farmers and their teachers. In 1945, vocational agriculture students in the Pacific and Northwestern regions produced 9,000 beef cattle, 11,400 dairy cattle, 15,000 sheep, 44,800 pigs, 55,000 chickens, 40,000 turkeys, and raised over 35,000 acres of field crops, fruits and vegetables.

You who raise and feed livestock know as well as I do that the problems of the livestock industry are usually mighty complicated. Naturally, I am always interested in what others have to say about our problems, especially in the press or over the radio.
