Victim Was Endeavoring To Aid Girl Friends Start Automobile; Car Catches Her Quickly

In an effort to save her two children from possible injury, Mrs. Will B. Hunt, 27, of 804 Avenue K, was crushed to her death at 8 o'clock last night when she rushed in front of a moving automobile to save her two little boys.

The two youths, John Henry, 9, and Jack, 7, both were injured although it was thought not seriously last night. Little Stuart, five-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Hunt and niece of the Mrs. Hunt who was killed, also was caught under the car, resulting in a broken collar bone.

Playing Street Car Mrs. Hunt was coming three visiting friends, Miss Opal Hightower, Annie Duval and Annie Biffle, to start a street car when the accident occurred. The car was headed toward the home and the women were pushing it in an effort to unlock the door when the car failed to stop when the car stalled.

Widwest Goes For Hoover and Party

Farm Relief Falls to Dent In Rock Ribbed Republican Territory, Even Wisconsin Returns

A republican victory was locked in the farms at the midwest went to press this morning.

Herbert Hoover swept through the entire farm belt, rolling up leads in every area, in excess of normal republican majorities.

Farm Relief Doesn't Dent The farm relief laws, stirred by republicans in their assault on the rock ribbed republican territory, made no dent in the wall. Even Wisconsin, which was lost to the republicans in 1924 through the elder La Follette's victory, returned to the fold.

Over, one of the battle grounds of the farm question, gave its native son a sparkling lead, elected probably an entire republican state and congressional ticket, and voted \$100,000,000 for good roads. One of the few congressional races in doubt was in the fourth district, where Gilbert M. Haugen, republican co-sponsor of the McNary-Haugen bill, was considered still in danger.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6. (AP)—Franklin D. Roosevelt, democratic candidate for governor, was leading Alvin Karpis, republican, by about 125,000 on the basis of returns from 642 districts out of 887 in the state.

Dallasites Are Good Democrats

DALLAS, Nov. 6. (AP)—An impromptu parade of Hoover supporters bearing banners asserting, "We are still good democrats" swept through the business district tonight as bulletin boards announced that a republican presidential candidate was leading in Texas for the first time in history, after half of the vote had been counted.

Other placards by the parade declared, "Al is out," and "Smith sent a telegram."

Hoover's lead increased to almost 1,000 the enthusiasm went up with it. Dallas county gave Hoover a substantial majority.

Plains Area Goes To Hoover, Report So Far Indicates

Lubbock Joined by All Of South Plains Counties In Parade To GOP Candidate, Early Returns Show

Smashing all political precedents into veritable "smashers" and making voting history in no uncertain terms, the citizens of the South Plains of Texas yesterday flocked to the polls to cast their ballots for a republican presidential candidate—Herbert Hoover, of Iowa and California.

Forgetting everything about party allegiance, not desiring to follow the dictates of their nominal leaders and unperturbed by threats of the state democratic executive committee to bar them from the primary elections two years from now, the citizens of this section polled their votes against the nominee of the democratic party and evidently thought little of it.

Whole Section To Hoover From Pecos county on the north, to Dawson county on the south, from Wichita county on the east to the New Mexico border on the west the voters spoke their minds on the presidential campaign and as a result an overwhelming majority of the ballots went into the col-

Rock-Ribbed Solid South Is Crumbling Before Assault of GOP Candidates

Virginia and Florida Slip form Under Control of The Democratic Party and Texas Bids Fair to Join In Parade To Forces Backing Hoover and Curtis

It looks mighty like Herbert Hoover has broken the "solid south."

The hitherto rock-ribbed democratic states of Virginia and Florida appeared to have left their moorings of more than half a century as more and more returns came in tonight from the unprecedented vote cast in today's general election.

The vote tallied shortly before midnight tonight in Virginia gave Hoover 121,394 votes to 114,325 for Smith. These figures were based on returns from 942 districts out of 1,100 in the state.

The vote was: Roosevelt 175,426; Clegg 151,100.

State Vote Still In Doubt As Lead Swings To Hoover

Rival Candidates Run Neck And Neck Over Lone Star State; Amendments Given Passing Ballot

Result Is Doubtful

Accurate Report Cannot Be Given As Yet As Laggard Counties Train Behind Rest of State

(By Texas Election Bureau)

DALLAS, Nov. 7.—The electoral vote in Texas, former bell weather of the "solid south" with Herbert Hoover having a small lead when tabulation of returns was suspended for the night at 1:30 o'clock Wednesday morning. Probably more than half the vote of the State has been accounted for. Thirty-seven counties have not reported and it is possible for returns from these to overturn Hoover's small lead.

Hoover and Smith changed places four times during the night's tabulations. First and last returns favored Hoover. At nine o'clock, when 228,424 votes had been tabulated, the presidential candidates were only four votes apart, Smith having the long end.

Amendments All Pass The four constitutional amendments were adopted by safe majorities; the confederate pension amendment being the favorite.

Moody's lead over Holmes was more than four to one.

The Bureau will suspend tabulations on amendments and on Moody and Holmes as there is no longer doubt as to the result. Tabulation will be continued on Smith and Hoover until returns are conclusive.

Hoover Is Victor In Sweeping Vote In Western States

California's Thirteen Electoral Votes Go For Native Son; Runs Away In Other Areas

California's thirteen electoral votes were added to the Hoover column, and incomplete returns from the other ten Rocky Mountain and Pacific coast states indicated that the republican candidate would sweep this section of the country.

Incomplete returns at 10:30 o'clock tonight, Pacific coast time, gave Hoover a lead of nearly three to one in California, his home state. Hoover had polled 443,287 votes to Governor Smith's 128,413 votes.

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Smith and Raskob Concede Election To Republican Candidate As States In East, West and South Are Lost

Border States Plunge Into Hoover Column to Swing GOP Victory to Hoover-Curtis Team; Landslide In Souther State and Kentucky Big Help to Republicans

With East and West and even a part of the solid South rolling in majorities for Herbert Hoover, his election to the presidency was conceded today by Chairman Raskob of the Democratic National committee. At the same time Gov. Alfred E. Smith made public a congratulatory message to his republican opponent.

"I congratulate you heartily on your victory," Governor Smith said, "and extend to you my sincere good wishes for your health and happiness and for the success of your administration."

Moody Lays Blame To Methods Used By John J. Raskob

Texas Governor Praises the Work of Smith But Says Raskob Is a Cynical Commercialist

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Nov. 6.—John J. Raskob, manager of the democratic national campaign, was criticized in a statement issued here tonight by Governor Dan Moody, which said that the popular vote given Smith was "a magnificent personal tribute and that the south is still solidly democratic at heart."

"Unfortunately for Governor Smith and the democrats the management of the campaign was entrusted to Mr. Raskob, a cynical commercialist who has no conception of the attitude or ideals prevailing in the south or west. The statements which he persisted in issuing had a tendency to drive votes from the democratic party which all the regular democratic in the south could not overcome."

The large popular vote which Governor Smith received is a magnificent tribute and that the south is still solidly democratic at heart."

Wurzbach Loses Congress Race

SAN ANTONIO, Nov. 7. (AP)—Defeat of Representative Wurzbach of the 14th District, only Texas republican congressman, appeared possible early this morning as an exception in generally conceded results compiled by the San Antonio public opinion, according to the Express.

These, accounting for perhaps two-thirds of the vote, gave Augustus McCloskey, Democrat 16,990 to Wurzbach's 13,122. Wurzbach was leading in only two counties of the eleven in the district, with one small county unheard from. Later returns were expected to increase McCloskey's lead with a bare chance of Wurzbach's mustering enough in his two counties to overcome the majority.

Republican Candidate Seems Assured Of Victory In All Border States

Sweeping Majority In Oklahoma and Kentucky Sends GOP Nominee Off On Path Which Leads To Supremacy In Hotly Contested Campaign

Assured of a sweeping victory in Oklahoma and Kentucky, and running well ahead in Tennessee and Missouri, the republican presidential ticket appeared early today to have made a clean sweep of this border group of states for the first time in a general election.

Hoover Leads Missouri.

Although Herbert Hoover was leading in Missouri by 27,804 on returns from a third of the state, the outcome still was in doubt as the count proceeded slowly in St. Louis, a Smith stronghold. From the earliest returns, however, Hoover took the lead and clung to it.

The Morning Avalanche Menu for the Day

BREAKFAST—Baked pears, cereal, cream, beef hash, crisp toast, coffee, milk.

LUNCHEON—English monkey, curly endive with bacon dressing, Dutch apple cake, milk, tea.

DINNER—Roasted and stuffed shoulder of lamb, currant jelly, creamed Jerusalem artichokes, grape fruit salad, old fashioned doughnuts, cider, milk.

Small members of a family should not be allowed to eat the doughnuts for their dinner dessert. However, adults will welcome this traditional fall goodie.

Two cakes compressed yeast, 1 cup milk, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1-2 teaspoon nutmeg, 2 eggs, 3-4 cup granulated sugar, 5 tablespoons melted butter, 4 cups flour (about). Scald milk and cool to lukewarm temperature. Add crumbled yeast cakes and stir until dissolved. Add 1-4 cups sifted flour and beat mixture until smooth. Cover and place in a warm place until puffed up and bubbly. It will take about an hour for the sponge to rise. Mix and sift 2 cups flour with sugar, salt and nutmeg. Add eggs well beaten to sponge and then stir in dry ingredients and melted butter. Slowly add more flour until dough is stiff enough to knead. Knead the dough until smooth and elastic. Cover and let rise in a warm place until double in bulk. This will take not more than three hours. Turn out on a floured board and pat the dough into a sheet about 3-4 inch thick. Cut with a small round biscuit cutter. Let stand on board closely covered until double in bulk. Drop into deep hot fat and fry until delicately brown. Drain from fat, dredge with sugar and let stand until cool before storing in crock or tin box.

The fat should be hot enough to delicately brown an inch cube of bread from the soft part of the loaf in 60 seconds.

How to Achieve Beauty

SPECIAL GROUP OF DEVELOPING AND REDUCING EXERCISES

If all mail service were to stop for the next month or two, it is barely possible that I might forget how important it is to a woman to maintain the youthful lines of her figure. As it is, however, with a large percentage of my letters, requesting information on diet and exercise, I feel it an absolute duty to provide you new incentives to a good figure in the form of different and interesting exercises.

In these articles I plan to begin from the neck, chest, throat and shoulders, work down, in a concentrated effort to provide you with the necessary and most approved forms of reducing exercises. While the neck and throat is at best only a few inches long, it is, nevertheless, a crucial point of beauty, for as contour lines thicken and grow heavy, are creeps upon the appearance. A neck either too fat or too thin adds years to a woman's appearance.

If your neck is thickset, you must use every effort of art and artifice to make it appear slimmer and younger looking. Your collar, your haircut, the lines of your hat in the back should assume an almost cosmic importance. And then, as a final precaution, you must take special care to prevent a double chin and a too prominent "neck of Venus." Those circular creases that can be so attractive in youth, will make a matured woman's neck appear wrinkled and ugly. So, beware lest your neck betray you.

Remember that it is the group of muscles running from the corners of the mouth to the temples that keep your chin light and firm. Let these muscles relax and you will find the chin heavy and sagging. "HUMAN LAWS"

It is refreshing to hear a judge say from his bench that "good humanity sometimes means good law even if the law isn't on the statute books." That's about what a Cleveland judge said the other day in refusing to dismiss a mother's damage case against an undertaking company, which she claimed took and refused to yield up her son's body. Attorneys contended that in Ohio a mother has no property rights to her child's body; that only a wife or husband has that right. "The need for adequate 'training for marriage' in the home, school and church, taking the child as his mother's knee and carrying him on through manhood."

I wonder. Sometimes one opines that the extra emphasis given the serious import of marriage gives it a tantalizing aroma and makes it a subject of experiment as it might not be if accepted in a more casual, less tense manner by youth's elders.

A certain woman has re-created Mother Goose through the medium of real estate in a certain section high up on Lookout Mountain. She explains that all her life she has desired to duplicate Mother Goose village and money at last gave her the opportunity. So here it is, "Fairyland," with the house of the Three Bears, Hansel's and Gretel's gingerbread house, the house of the old woman who lived in the shoe, and all the rest.

The woman is very sure that the whole world of children will hail her gift with incredulous joy. I wonder? Does the Mother Goose world mean a great deal to the child of this modern world with its airplanes and Zepe and autos and marvels of which Bo-Peep and Little Boy Blue in their agricultural world never dreamed? The spider, Mary's little lam, Jack and Jill's hill, must seem rather meaningless to a modern child, who needs a new Mother Goose of the modern world.

YOUR CHILDREN

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Every child should have a certain amount of privacy—of room, time, and ownership. In a house where there is more than one child it is not possible often to serve each a room to himself. Yet we often see homes with two or three children in one room so that the family can have a guest-chamber that lies idle almost from one year's end to the other.

Too often it is the biggest, sunniest room in the house.

Babies and young children, according to the time-honored custom, are persistently regarded as "extras" in the family budgeting of space, and often are given an odd bed in some corner of a room occupied by other people. As they get older the thought of room space is given more consideration. It should be reversed, however. No one in the family needs a room to himself so much as the baby. This of course, is for reasons of health.

Every child adores his own room. It is something for him to live up to. It increases his self-respect and gives him that static feeling that psychologists tell us is necessary as a foundation on which to build other desirable character traits.

Lacking space for that, a wise mother will divide a room, giving each little occupant certain pieces of furniture for his own. No matter how small he is, he should have certain drawers or an entire bureau or chest that absolutely belong to him, his own bed if possible, and a specific portion of closet space.

I also should give every growing boy and girl in the house what might be called "privacy of time." That is, a certain part of every day, be it only an hour, to read or walk or play without interference from others. He needs it. We all need a few minutes to ourselves now and then—for our own souls' sake, we might say.

Then there is privacy of ownership. What pride a child takes in his own things. Teach him to lend and to be unselfish, but interest toys. All children cherish their own possessions. If things

Home of Sam Houston To Be Made One Of Texas' Liberty Shrines; Structure Is Repaired; Officially Dedicated In May

Huntsville Will Be Seat Of Another Monument To State's Freedom; Opened In May

HUNTSVILLE, Nov. 6. (U. S. P.)—The once neglected home of Sam Houston ranking almost equally with the Alamo as a shrine of Texas liberty, soon will become a beauty spot of the state through dedication of a memorial park and the completion of a paved highway which will bring the site within a few hours' drive of the populous centers of the state.
For many years after his death, the home of the great Texas leader was allowed to pass with adequate expressions of their recognition of the first president of the Texas republic and later their United States senator and governor.

Students Start Work

In 1910, through the initiative of students of the Sam Houston State Normal school, money was borrowed to supplement their own offering and undergranted paid for the Sam Houston residence, surrounding grounds and log cabin law office. Through the action of many owners the old home had been removed from its old location to serve as a boarding house and the warrior's office was utilized as a stock barn.

Both buildings were replaced and now stand where they were in General Houston's lifetime.

Through patriotic devotion, a recent Texas legislature appropriated \$15,000 to be expended for repairing the home, and restoring the structure as it originally was in the 50's. Agricultural barns then located on the grounds were removed, the landscape was terraced and the grounds were beautified by countless plants and shrubs.

Opened In May

The park, designated as Sam Houston park, will be officially opened in May when Sam Houston Teachers college observes its fiftieth anniversary.

A monument erected in 1911 at the grave of General Houston in Oakwood cemetery here will also be an object of interest to tourists and Texans. At the unveiling 17 years ago William Jennings Bryan delivered a tribute, and with a part of the proceeds of the great commoner's lecture, the title of the Houston Homestead was obtained and passed by deed as a gift to the people of Texas.

Historical Group Given Old Letter Of Sullivan Ross

ALPINE, Nov. 6. (U. S. P.)—An old letter concerning some of the early life in Iowa of Ex-Gov. Sullivan Ross, recently became the property of the West Texas Historical and Scientific Society through the courtesy of C. S. Bondert of San Antonio, an 80-year-old member of the Grand Army of the Republic. The missive was written to the donor by Edgar Harlan, Iowa State University.

The story in the letter tells of the dispute over a slave which caused Shapleigh Ross to come to Texas, leaving his family until he was still in Iowa. While his wife was in the hospital, she gave birth to the first child in that region. Soon after, she joined her husband in Texas where the father became one of the men who won Texas from Mexico, and the baby, Sullivan, rose to a popular Confederate leader and afterwards governor.

A copy of this letter is on file at the museum of Texas University and it was only through Mr. Bondert's interest in the school that Sullivan Ross was allowed to have the original.

Demand For Bale Zeppelin Cotton Draws Interest

BREMEN, Germany, Nov. 6. (U. S. P.)—There was spirited bidding at the Bremen Cotton Exchange today for a bale of cotton carried by the dirigible Graf Zeppelin on her homeward voyage. The proceeds will be used for the zeppelin's crew.

The hammer fell at 14,000 marks (approximately \$2,500), the highest bidder being the Clason Burger company, a Bremen cotton firm representing the Anderson Clayton company of Houston, Texas, who were the shippers of the bale.

The November issue of the "East Texas" official publication of the organization, was dedicated to home orchards.

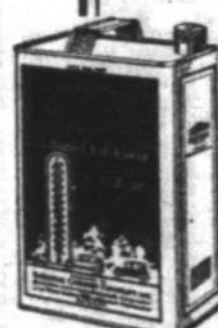
As a stimulus to the campaign, the regional commercial organization will present prizes of fruit trees. Other awards will be given school children turning in the best essays on the advisability of home orchards.

Four Radical Socialists Give
Up Ministry Positions Explaining That Cooperation Impossible

(By Associated Press)

PARIS, Nov. 6.—Almost at the moment of the reconvening of the French parliament, Premier Poincare's ministry resigned office today. Four radical socialist ministers previously had proffered resignations to the Premier, explaining that their party's program made continued collaboration with the national union cabinet impossible.

The Premier put into effect his warning to members of the ministry that in the event of any minister or ministers resigning he forthwith would submit the resignation of the cabinet as a body to President Doumergue.

The socialist ministers involved were Albert Sarraut, interior; Edouard Herriot, education; Henri Queille, agriculture, and Leon Ferrier, colonies.

A Washington Bystander

BY KIRKE L. SIMPSON
WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—Usually there is a little sparring between the big governments when one of the little fellows decides it needs a special commission of technical instructors for a time to help get its navy, army or air force into satisfactory shape.

There are several reasons for competition among the big fellows as to which shall supply the demand. For one thing, there are economic aspects. If a neighboring government turns to the United States to borrow officers of the army, navy or air corps, for instance, it's quite natural that a market of sorts for army, navy or air corps equipment made in America may be developed. The technical commissions are commercial agents in a sense. Then, too, it is not regarded as desirable by any government that technical instruction of this sort in a nearby state should be in the hands of officers and experts of any third power.

U. S. Aids Neighbors.
Washington has repeatedly shown this desire to furnish expert assistance to the Latin-American republics which need it. There are a number of American naval or military commissions of long standing in the countries to the south and army, navy and air schools in this country are opened freely to officers picked by their governments for special post-graduate courses in their own particular branches of the profession of arms.

What inducements governments competing for the sending of such commissions may offer is never very clearly known. There seems at present, however, a growing feeling among Latin-American statesmen that American naval and army officers are of a type very desirable for their purposes and inclined to take such assignments not as pleasurable jaunts into the social activities of the inviting state but a matter of hard, consistent work toward the improvement of the methods and training of the forces to which they act as advisory instructors.

Yankee Pep Praised.
By way of illustration, a quotation from a letter sent from one Latin-American statesman to a colleague in Europe who evidently had urged employment of naval instructors from across the Atlantic rather than the United States is enlightening. "I prefer the Yankee system of education," this official wrote. "My conviction in the matter grows stronger when I apply the Biblical phrase, 'By their fruits ye shall know them.'"

When in the modest, colonial streets of (name of country deleted) you see a dandy-like youth, with a bob, using rouge and hair oil, you can be sure he comes from (name of European city deleted). On the other hand, when you see a robust youngster, without a vest, who keeps his trousers up with a coarse belt, is fond of sports and can give a punch that would make a hole in the name of a great fortification left out, you know without fear of mistake he comes from Yankeland.

"In this connection, I recall a story I read some time ago to the effect that when a Latin visited Niagara Falls he dedicated to the sight the most lyric and vibrating poem, whereas a Saxon, another visitor to the falls, invented a dynamo to profit by their motive forces."

Your Health

MENTAL HEALTH STAFF STUDIES THE EMPLOYEE
BY DR. MORRIS FISHBEN
Editor Journal of the American Medical Association and of Hygiene, The Health Magazine

Because of the increasing importance of mental health to the proper functioning of industry, the Illinois Society for Mental Hygiene recently held a conference on this subject.
One of the great problems of modern life is to fit the worker to an occupation which will yield him sufficient mental satisfaction so that he may have a relative amount of happiness.
Dr. Ralph Hazzard emphasized two special types in this connection: 1.—The young man, who is babied at home, fails at college, and resigns from any position he gets because he feels that he is not appreciated; 2.—The girl who is employed in an office in which her associates are with a higher type of man than occurs in her family or social acquaintances.

The girl soon becomes dissatisfied with her own social life. The social workers in such cases endeavor to make adjustments which will relieve these unbalanced situations.

Studying The Employee.
One of the largest mental hygiene units in industry is established in a great department store in New York City. In this store a staff studies regularly the mental life of the employee in relation to his occupation, endeavoring to fit him properly to his work, recommending promotions on the basis of his mental attitude, and taking workers out of positions which are likely to result in nervous breakdown.

In one case a checking girl became slow and dull in her work in the afternoon. It was found that she had quicker reactions than were required in her job, so that she became tired and bored. Instead of being given easier work, she was placed in a position demanding quicker reactions and more responsibility, and she succeeded promptly.

The arbitrator for one of the largest clothing manufacturers in the country pointed out that industry which is now run on the piece work scale has been tremendously accelerated. The employee's pace is set by the machine which he operates or by the fastest employee in the shop.

150 Processes.
This intense specialization has frustrated initiative and creative impulse. In the clothing industry, for example, 150 processes are used in making a suit of clothes, so that the individual employee can have little pride in the finished job.

A study of the mental aspects of industry must be made to determine means for permitting mental development as well as for providing a means of livelihood.

PRESS COMMENTS

PAYING PROGRESS OF HIGHWAY 9 REPORTED AT LUBBOCK MONDAY

Judge George L. Mayfield reports an interesting meeting at Lubbock Monday of the Highway 9 association. The meeting was attended by county judges and commissioners from counties along the route of Highway 9 from Amarillo to San Angelo. Counties south of Lubbock sent the representation.

A general discussion of what had been done and what was expected in the way of paving was entered into and reports were made by delegates of each of the counties represented. The general report was favorable to the proposition although several counties reported that progress was slow and in some of the counties opinion was divided on the issue.

Lubbock county was reported to have decided on a \$2,000,000 dollar bond issue to procure funds to pave several county roads including Highway 9. A petition supporting the proposed issue has been presented to the court but it is reported that no action has yet been taken.

Judge Mayfield stated that the county officials in the southern section of the highway 9 project are enthusiastic over the proposition and are working hard for its accomplishment but they are meeting with some opposition which may take a longer period of time to straighten out than at first expected.

The Highway 9 association has banded together to secure a paved road the entire length of the route which extends from Amarillo to San Antonio.—Plainview Herald.

THE RAIN TO START OFF THE YEAR WITH

The State of Texas talks about industrialism a good deal, but Texas hasn't gone so far with that sort of thing that it is no longer interested in a substantial and widespread distribution of moisture in the fall of the year. The recent general rains are worth a good deal to the State. Because of what they mean to the farming season ahead of us they will stimulate trade and consolidate the position of business enterprises which have a look ahead in order to determine their present policies.

Ample rainfall in the autumn and early winter means a good season in the ground. As we have a way of saying in this part of the country, Flowed lands were waiting for it, and according to some reports, farmers in certain portions of the wheat-growing area found themselves unable to negotiate loans for wheat seed until the rains showed up to make the crop more of a likelihood.

The admirable weather for cotton picking which preceded the coming of the rim and cold spell furnished an ideal period for farm operations looking toward closing up the work of 1928. With 1929 practically started off already those farmers who made ready for the rain will undoubtedly reap rewards for their forebodingness.

A satisfactory season for holiday merchandising is now in prospect. Texas is experiencing no boomtime of spending. But there will be a period of comfortable plenty, making the State as a whole, 1919 has an excellent chance to outstrip 1928. Indeed, it has a running start already vouchsafed.—Plainview Herald.

OVERPRODUCTION IN U. S. INDUSTRY DECLINED

By John E. Edgerton, President, National Association of Manufacturers

(John Edgerton was born in Johnston county, North Carolina, October 2, 1878. He is a graduate of Vanderbilt college. He was the co-founder and president, for seven years, of Columbia (Tenn.) Military Academy. He has been president of the Lebrun Woolen Mills since 1912, and is now president of the National Association of Manufacturers. In 1921 he was a member of President Harding's conference on unemployment. He is a Democrat and his home is in Lebanon, Tenn.)

There is a great menace in the way in which Americans are allowing the nation's traditions and customs to be altered at the wish of unassimilated immigrants.

Turning toward the economic horizon, the most ominous problems which we see are those which appear to have resulted from the general loss of balance between production and distribution. Of practically all commodities which America can produce it is producing more than it can consume and dispose of profitably in other available markets.

It is safe to say that a general average of 40 per cent of all the factories that are operating at all today are doing so at a loss.

Unless, therefore, through the well-paid employment of its people the nation's purchasing power is kept relatively equal to its expanding capacity for consumption, we shall inevitably have an increasingly embarrassing excess of supply over demand. Our transcendent problem is and will probably continue for some time to be our surplus production in factories, as well as on farms.

As the pressure of economic law descended oppressively upon larger numbers the mass demand for legislative remedy will surely increase in volume. This contingency and much destructive conflict could, of course, be avoided by voluntary curtailments of production in those trades most embarrassed by the surplus. But there are too many swine in human flesh and too much shortsighted disregard among manufacturers, as among farmers, for their common rights to expect voluntary relinquishment of temporary advantage for permanent gain or ethical considerations.

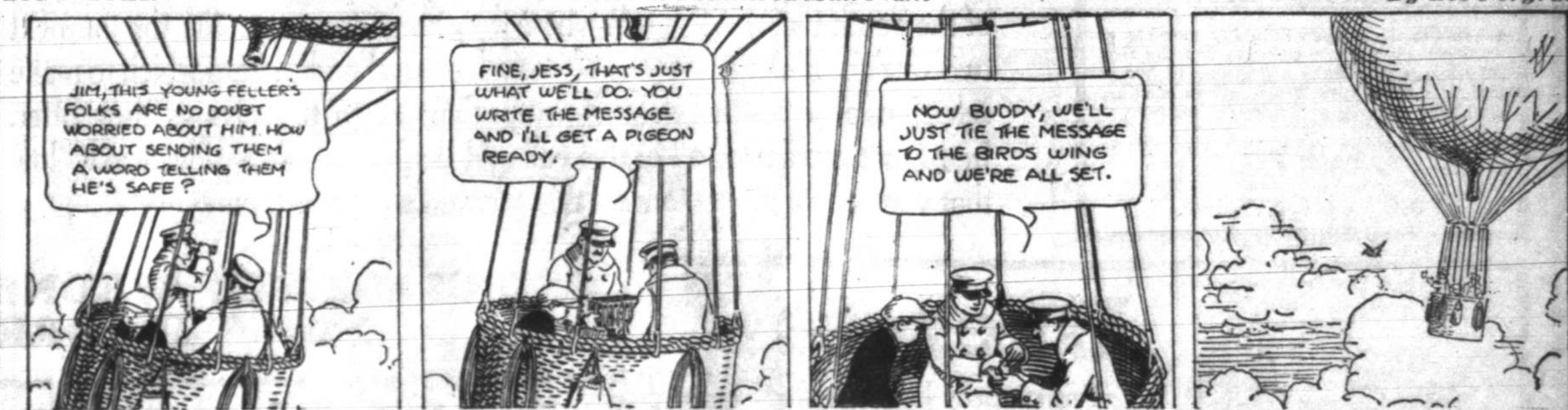

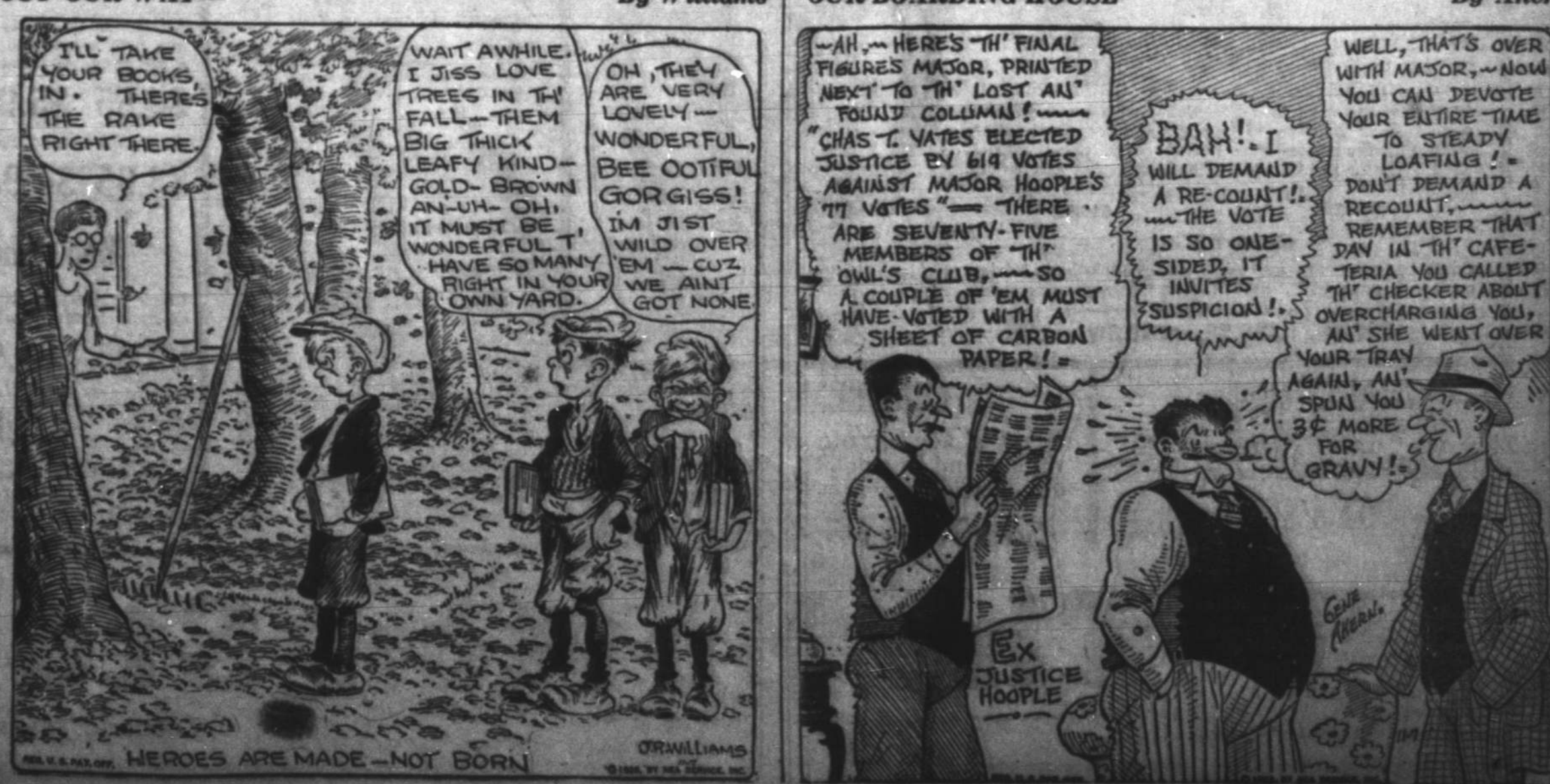

Early Returns Indicate Texas Is Joining In March To Hoover Camp

Refugio, Sabina, San Jacinto, Trinity, Victoria, Walker and Yoakum. With seven counties reported incomplete and four unreported McCloskey, democrat, is leading Wurzbach, republican, for Congress in the Fourteenth District by 2,530.

Cities For Hoover Hoover swept most of the larger cities of Texas, Fort Worth, Dallas, Houston, El Paso, Lubbock, Wichita Falls, Amarillo, Corpus Christi and others going strong for the republican nominee. Waco, Galveston, Beaumont, and some others stayed with the democratic standard bearer. San Antonio had given a slight majority to Smith at last report but this edge was one that might easily be wiped out over night.

Southeast Texas, as expected, went generally to Smith although the district was spotted here and there by counties who gave a majority to the republican nominee. Central Texas was about evenly divided between Smith and Hoover. McLennan county, key county of that section, stayed with Smith, but Hill and Falls counties showed a slight margin in favor of Hoover.

Panhandle Goes G. O. P. West Texas and the Panhandle probably proved the deciding factor in the race. The Panhandle counties were nearly all for Hoover, the margin of victory especially decisive in the South Plains and adjacent sections. In some counties in the lower Panhandle, Hoover's majority mounted to as high as four to one.

Throughout West Texas the republican nominee was favored. Wichita Falls, Amarillo, Lubbock, San Angelo and other key cities of the region were for Hoover. The sheep men and ranchers in Crockett, Edwards, Comcho, Tom Green, Presidio, Fort Davis, Pecos and other counties of the south, West Texas voted overwhelmingly for Hoover, being traditionally republican.

Amendments Carry The four proposed constitutional amendments, submerged in interest by the heated fight over the presidential nominee, carried easily throughout the state, the early returns indicated.

There was every evidence last night that Texas had polled a record vote, this being the reflection of the campaign which has been waged here recently. The campaign was unparalleled in interest for the state. The state democratic ticket swept the field easily, the schism in the party vote being confined solely to the presidential race.

Although Hoover carried Fulton county of which Atlanta is the seat, by approximately 600 votes, Smith won the city of Atlanta proper by a vote of 1,221 to 893 for Hoover. He lost the county, however, when the rural district votes swung to the republican nominee.

but 640 of Tennessee's 2,230 precincts missing. Hoover had a lead of 5,814 over Smith over Oklahoma. The Hoover landslide in Oklahoma had reached a plurality of 97,743 on returns from about half the state, or already more than three times the plurality of Warren G. Harding in Oklahoma in 1920. Only 10 of the state's 77 counties reported Smith in the lead. On the basis of these figures George B. Key, chairman of the democratic state committee, said "It is not necessary to concede the state the figures speak for themselves." Reports from the state's congressional districts showed all eight incumbents, including one republican, holding to leads that varied from a slender threat to an overwhelming majority.

In Kentucky, the Hoover lead reached 150,083 when 3,461 of the state's 4,096 precincts had reported.

If complete returns do not bring an upset, the republicans will win a bloc of 53 electoral votes in the border group.
