## Woods named to bank board

Lee Woods of Colorado City has been named to the board of directors of City National Bank, according to an announcement by Robert Alford, president and chief executive officer.

Born and reared in Abilene, Woods is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Harley Woods. He graduated from Abilene High School and from McJannet College with a degree in business administration. While taking graduate work at Hardin-Simmons, he taught American government there.

A Methodist, Woods is married to the former Billie Jean Barron. She is the daughter of Mrs. Ross Barron and the late

W. I. Barron, long-time residents of Loraine.

Woods spent 38 months in the Army Air Force. He flew 33 missions over Europe while stationed in England with the Eighth Air Force. He was a first lieutenant when discharged.

Woods retired from Hamilton Brothers Oil Co. in 1972 after nearly 20 years with the company. During this period of time, he held the position of comptroller and secretary-treasurer while traveling extensively to their various offices in the United States, Canada, Italy and England.

The Woods moved to Colorado City in 1976 from Midland where he has been active in the Cham-

ber of Commerce serving as president of the Ambassadors. He is president of Wallace Community Education Council and is a member of the Industrial Team.

"Lee will make a tremendous asset to the board of City National Bank," said Alford in making the announcement.

Woods' election to the board came during a board meeting Wednesday.

In other action, the board accepted the resignation of 18-year board member Waddell Strain. Alford said Strain will continue to be a stockholder in the bank and cited Strain's many contributions to the bank.

## Board studies joint purchase

The Mitchell County Appraisal District board of directors is studying the possibility of joining the county in the purchase of a computer to be used jointly by both entities.

During the board's Thursday night meeting, board member Ronnie Feaster presented the board with a proposal to purchase an IBM-36 computer. He said the appraisal district's cost would be about \$53,000 not counting programs, paper or installation.

Feaster said that the joint venture would benefit the appraisal district as well as the county by sharing in the cost of a computer.

County commissioners Paul Hunter and Ed Roach were present at the meeting. Hunter said the county plans on buying a computer whether or not the appraisal district joins in the purchase or not. He said a smaller computer will be purchased by the county if the appraisal district does not wish to participate.

After hearing the presentation, board attorney Tom Rees recommended that if the board does join in the county that the project be rebid and that both the appraisal district board and the commissioners court unani-

mously approve the purchase.

Hunter said the county had received proposals from four companies and that the IBM system was used as an example.

Ronald Bruce, appraisal district board chairman, said the board will study the bids and the equipment offered before making a decision.

In other business, the board approved the nominations of Lee Woods and Delmar McDaniel to the appraisal review board.

Rees recommended that the board continue to purchase liability insurance if at all possible. Chief appraiser Mike Burt was instructed to contact insurance agent Bob Ratliff about the insurance and its availability and cost.

Burt told the board that because of the decrease in value and decrease in oil production, mineral tax collections will probably be down for the coming year. He anticipates a \$23 a barrel valuation on oil, but said next year the values will probably decline even more. He said the Westbrook and Colorado City school districts as well as the hospital district will be losing about 20 percent in tax revenues for the coming year because of the oil slump.

## City approves certificate sale

The Colorado City Council, during a special meeting Thursday, approved a resolution authorizing the issuance of \$75,000 in certificates of obligation with which to complete funding for a new fire station.

Joe Smith of First Southwest Company of Abilene, the city's financial advisor in the matter, said City National Bank of Colorado City has agreed to purchase the certificates at a calculated interest rate of 8 percent. City Manager Brenda Tarter

explained that the certificates of obligation will be paid back with the \$1 charge added each month to the city's 2,100 water connections.

The fire station, currently under construction, is expected to cost \$420,000. It is being funded in part with a \$200,500 contribution from Colorado City resident Mrs. Marion Basham. Mitchell County has paid \$75,000 to the project by way of a lease agreement to store county-owned firefighting equipment.

## Annual kindergarten round-up slated

Kindergarten and pre-school youngsters will be held Tuesday, April 22 through Friday, April 25 from 9 a.m. until noon at Kelley Elementary School.

The child enrolled for kindergarten must be 5 years old on or before September 1, 1986. The child enrolled for pre-school must be 4 years old on or before September 1, 1986. No child will be enrolled for kindergarten or pre-school without a state birth certificate (not the hospital certificate with the foot prints on it), remind school officials. A state certificate may be obtained from the county seat where the child was born.

The child enrolling in the pre-school program must also qualify under the bilingual program or the free lunch program. The pre-school program is a half day program where the child will either attend the morning or afternoon session but not both. Transportation to and from school must be provided by the parents. No meals will be served to children in the pre-school program even thou-

gh they may qualify for the free lunch program.

Also, when enrolling a child in pre-school or kindergarten bring their immunization record or the address from which the record can be obtained. The following immunizations are required upon enrollment in the Colorado Independent School District according to Texas law.

Oral Polio: At least three doses of oral polio vaccine are required. At least one of those doses must have been received on or after the fourth birthday.

DTP: At least three doses of DTP vaccine are required. At least one of those doses must have been received on or after the fourth birthday.

Measles: One dose of measles vaccine is required or provide a physician-validated history of measles illness.

Mumps: One dose of mumps vaccine is required or provide a physician-validated history of mumps illness.

Rubella: One dose of rubella vaccine is required. Rubella vaccine is not required past the twelfth birthday.

## Band receives honors

The Colorado Middle School band has taken top honors in two recent contests.

On April 16, the band went to University Interscholastic League concert and sightreading contest in Abilene where it received a Division I rating in each event. According to UIL standards, a Division I rating is defined as "a superior performance for the event and the class of participants being judged; worthy of the distinction of being recognized as a first place winner."

The CMS band was the only band in its class to receive Division I ratings. It competed against four other groups. In addition, each of the six judges who judged the competition were unanimous in their decision to award the Division I ratings.

On April 1, the group traveled to Cisco Junior College to participate in the Cisco Junior Music Festival. The band received Division I ratings in both concert and sightreading. Again, each of the judges awarded the band a first division rating.

The next meeting, a noon luncheon, will be Wednesday, May 21, at Villa Inn Restaurant.

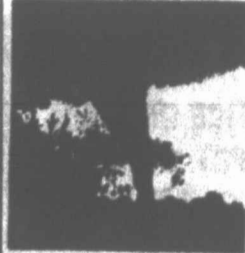

# Farmers face new threat

Texas wheat farmers face a new threat to their crop from an aphid which has come half way around the world to make its first appearance in the United States, says Mike Mauldin, Mitchell County agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The new pest is the Russian wheat aphid and has been found across the South Plains, from Gaines to Briscoe and from Parmer County to neighboring Scurry County.

Mauldin says the pest is easily distinguishable from other aphids. It is only about two milli-

meters long, has short antennae, is green and has a distinctive projection about the cauda, or tail, which gives it a "double tail" appearance.

The pest was first found in the South Plains area about March 20 by Dr. William P. Morrison, extension entomologist at Lubbock. It was positively identified as the Russian wheat aphid by a USDA aphid specialist at Beltsville, Md.

The nearest previous reporting of the pest was in northern Mexico, where it appeared in 1983, Mauldin points out. The aphid is native to Southern

Russia and has been found in the Middle East, along the Mediterranean coast of Europe and North Africa and in South Africa, as well as Mexico.

The aphid does its damage by injecting a toxin into the plant as it feeds. Infested plants turn purple, can have white streaking on the leaves and, when heavily infested, may make the tillers lie almost parallel to the ground.

Little research has been done on the pest, and that was in South Africa under conditions quite unlike those of Texas. However, now Texas Agricultural Experiment Station scientists have begun studies at Lubbock and Halfway on chemical control measures and to determine if the aphid also feeds on grain sorghum and corn.

Mauldin says the recommended treatment at present is a combination of contact insecticide, such as parathion, plus a systemic insecticide. Limited information indicates that greatest benefit is obtained by applying the insecticide before the flag leaf becomes visible.

Dryland or stressed fields appear to be more susceptible to damage from the new pest than well irrigated fertilized fields, says Mauldin.

## Uptons attend reception
