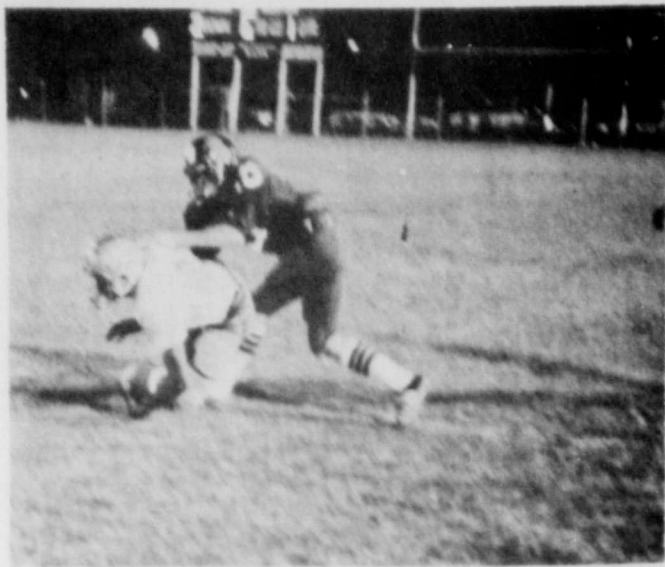




JERRY MC GUIRE takes a Longhorn out of the running in the Lockney game last Friday night. (Photo by Keith)

UN DAY
OCTOBER 24, 1975

This year the peoples of the world will celebrate the 30th anniversary of the United Nations on October 24, UN Day. This is an appropriate occasion for people everywhere to renew their adherence to the Charter ideals of peace and human rights and their determination to promote economic and social progress and a greater measure of justice and freedom for all.

This year finds us at a turning point in world affairs. We sense the promise of a more peaceful world and the opportunity for new strides in international cooperation. To maintain this momentum will require still greater efforts and more effective international institutions. We need to create new arrangements to control new technologies for the common good. We must continue to recognize the interests of rich and poor countries on matters of trade and aid. Equal rights for all peoples must become a reality in fact as well as law.

Important steps have already been taken by the

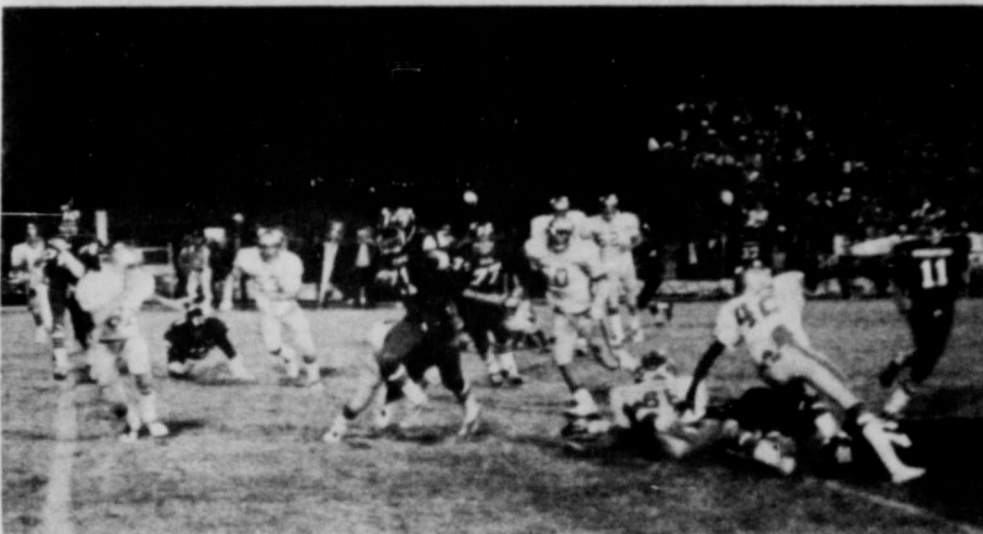
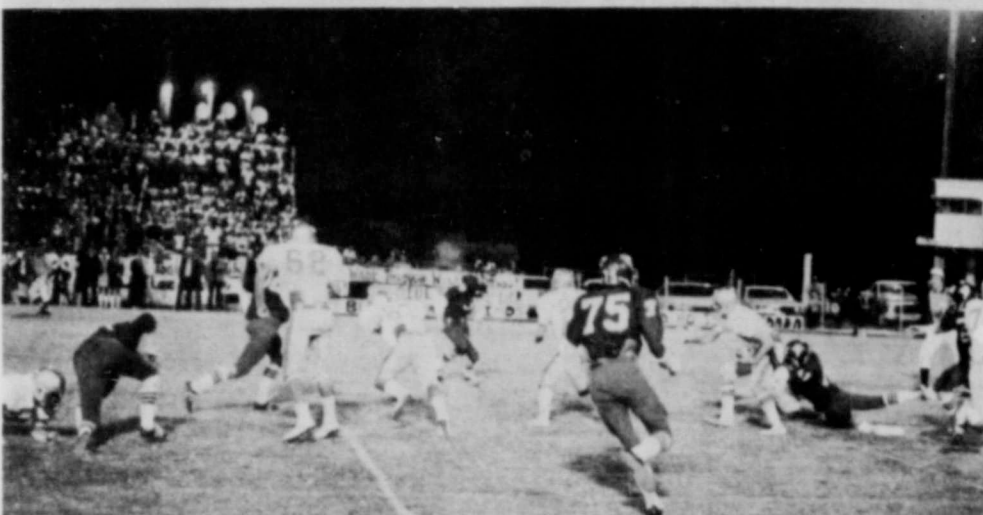
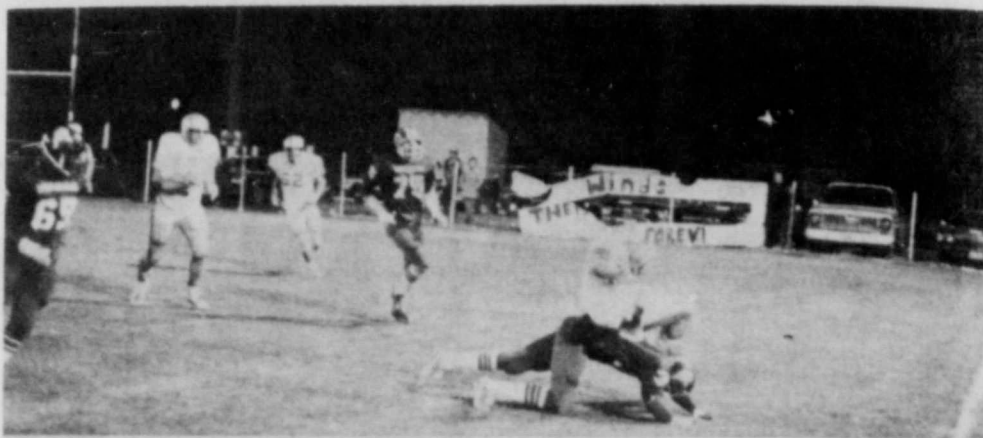
United Nations in meeting these challenges. The UN has once again provided a mutually acceptable mechanism for carrying out the next steps toward peace in the Middle East. The 7th Special Session of the General Assembly marked a beginning of a new relationship between the industrialized and developing countries on economic matters. The International Women's Conference held in Mexico City this summer adopted a World Plan of Action which includes virtually every aspect of contemporary life—civil rights, education, employment, health and nutrition, among others.

NOW, THEREFORE, I Parnell Powell, Mayor of Floydada do hereby proclaim Friday, October twenty-fourth, 1975 as United Nations Day and call upon all the citizens of Floydada to observe that day in the spirit of common purpose expressed in the United Nations Charter. I urge everyone, groups or individuals, to participate in programs and activities designed to develop an understanding of the problems and potentials of the United Nations and to stimulate discussions of ways to make the United Nations into a more effective organization. I ask all citizens to observe United Nations Day with a sense of rededication to the high truths which we in the United States hold to be self-evident, as expressed for us in the Constitution and the Bill of Rights, and for all the world in the Charter of the United Nations.

BROWN TO BE AT ARTS-CRAFTS SHOW

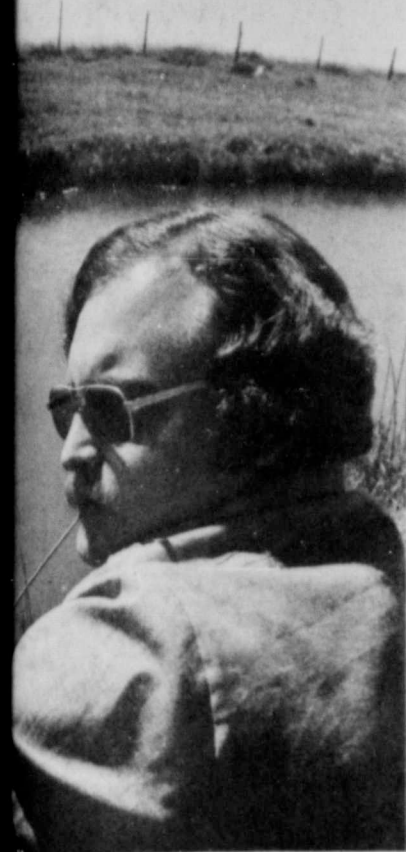

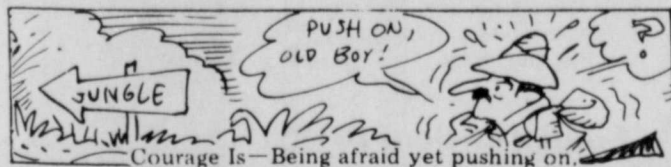
The very future of the two hospitals in the county, the extreme need for more medical doctors are just two phases of the importance of the meeting.

Hopefully, this county will be able to get two representatives on the area health board to be formed at Lubbock.

The National Health Planning and Resources Development Act of 1974 and the Texas Health Planning and Development Act establish a Health Systems Agency (HSA) and assign certain functions to these HSA's. The Secretary of HEW has designated the South Plains State Planning Region 2 as the Health Service Area for this portion of Texas.

The new agency, when approved by Governor Briscoe and the HEW Secretary, will locally approve or disapprove applications for federal assistance for most health related programs and review and comment on applications for certificate of need for changes in hospital and nursing home services and bed capacities. The Health Systems Agency will also be charged with making comprehensive plans for the delivery of health care, as well as making local grants from federal funds to assist in the development of new or improved health services.

The South Plains Association of Governments and West Texas Health Systems have jointly appointed a steering committee to develop South

From the time that man has learned to live in a society he has usually given obedience to two powers, the State and God, as represented by the church(s).

This is evident even in tribal times, when the primitive native has obedience to the chief of the tribe as well as religious awe of the medicine man or witch-doctor. Consequently, what we face today is what has been faced by mankind down through the ages in one way or another.

Authority is important in any society. Obedience to laws and regulations makes it possible for men of various temperments, talents, etc. to function as a united, enduring whole. The opposite of authority is anarchy. Chesterton once said "A man cannot expect any adventures in the land of anarchy. But a man can expect any number of adventures if he goes traveling in the land of authority." (Orthodoxy)

While man sees the necessity of authority for his social life, often there is a decided blind-spot in his relationship with his Maker. Yet God too has established a relationship with man, His Covenant. He has laid out certain rules, His Commandments, to govern that relationship between Himself and us. Man consequently, still has a fuel type of obedience today just as in primitive times. The words quoted at the beginning of this article merely point up and emphasize this aspect of man's life. His obedience to authority, both civil and religious will rest not so much on his conscience but a proper understanding that all authority like life itself, has its origin in God the Creator.

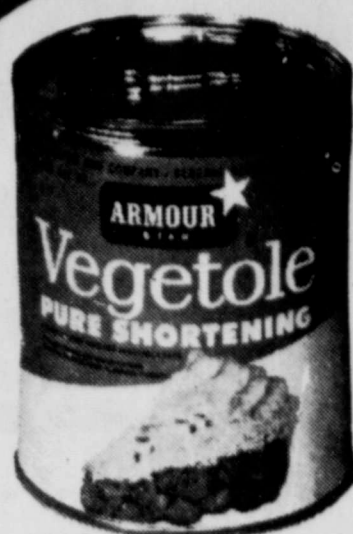

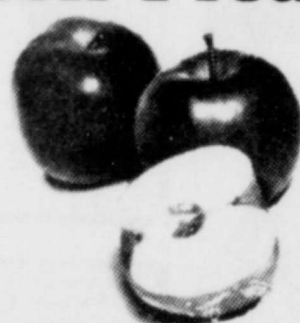
