exempt finance structure and preliminary drawings of the structure.

"However," he told *The Record*, "Colorado City still has first refusal on the initial headquarters facilities." He said there would be room for as many as ten of his regional correction centers in Texas.

When advised of the continued local indecision, *The Record* asked him what would it take to get the local project off high center.

"If either the City or the County would pass a resolution expressing its interest in going ahead with the project, and so advise me by letter from its attorney, then I can proceed. I will then request that PacificCorp retain a well-known and respected independent firm to conduct an extensive legal and feasibility study. The cost of the study could be amortized over several installations. These findings would then be brought back to the sponsoring entity outlining the legal, financial and feasibility aspects of the project."

"Or, if they do not want to proceed, I need to be advised," he said. "Your City Attorney has indicated that there are no legal problems, I brought the financing company in that said there would be no debt obligations, and the project is not dependent upon the TDC. I don't know what else I can do," he concluded.

Police have busy month

The Colorado City Police Department made a total of 71 arrests during the month of September, Chief Bobby Sparks reports.

Sparks said the arrests include two for weapons violations, five for drug violations, three for family offenses, 14 for driving while intoxicated, 14 for other liquor law violations and 33 for other violations.

Sparks said his department received 1,994 calls for the month, down somewhat from the previous month.

The department investigated 11 traffic accidents and issued 33 traffic citations. Five citation violators were fined. Other cases investigated include four aggravated assaults, seven assaults, eight burglaries, five thefts and six cases of vandalism.

suspects as they were running between the Great Western Motel and the Dairy Queen and departed in a car of similar description as provided by Snyder Police. Officer Roberts followed the car, verified the license plate number and stopped them. When he noticed that the car had been "hot wired" the youths were taken into custody for further investigation.

When the owner of the car in Lubbock was notified, he was not aware that his car was missing at the time. All three youths were black, 2 were 17 years old and one was 16. They were charged with unauthorized use of a motor vehicle and burglary of a vehicle in Snyder as well as a vehicle in the Great Western parking Lot.

Chief Sparks said Officer Roberts has been given a special commendation by the department having recovered three vehicles and apprehended suspects, without incident, in the last six weeks.

Special music was presented by Molly Silva and Joe Silva Jr. Joe Silva led the congregational singing. Pianist was Golda Redwine.

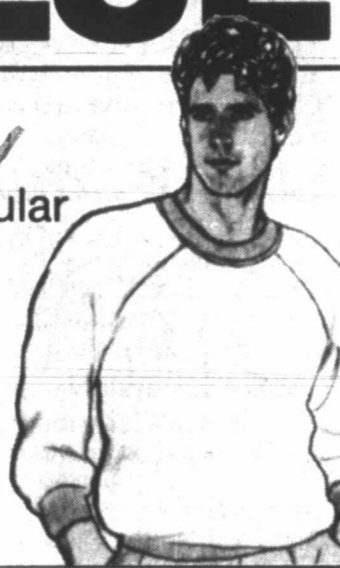

Mitchell County Oil and Gas Report

Drillsite is two miles southwest of Westbrook in a 480-acre lease in the T&P Survey, Sec. 9, Blk. 28. It was spudded Aug. 14.

Wolves atop 5AAA; host Clyde Friday

The Colorado City Wolves moved to the top of the district 5AAA football standings with last Friday's 27-7 whipping of Merkel witnessed by a standing-room-only Homecoming crowd.

Now 5-2 for the year and tied with Ballinger and Wylie at 3-1 in district play, the Wolves have a playoff spot in sight but it's a sight that includes three major obstacles.

The first of those obstacles is Clyde. The Bulldogs visit Wolf Stadium for an 8 PM kickoff Friday for Colorado City's last home game of 1987. Next week the Wolves travel to Wylie then end district play at Sonora.

"No, we're not talking playoffs," said Wolves coach

Tom Ramsey. "That's our ultimate goal but right now we're trying to work on Clyde."

"We all celebrated this weekend," said Ramsey, "but they've all come back down to earth. Monday is a workday. We can't dwell on it. We've got other things to do."

"Defeat's not fatal and victory is never final," said Ramsey.

Clyde is 3-4 for the year and the Bulldogs' 1-3 district mark practically eliminates them from the playoff chase but not from the role of spoiler.

When the Wolves clobbered Merkel Friday they beat a team whose offense had speed to burn. Clyde, on the other hand, has recently gained a reputation as a

team with power. While Merkel reigned as speed demons during last spring's track season the Clyde Bulldogs usually led the point standings after the field events and went on to dominate in those events at the district meet.

"They have a couple of big ones," said Ramsey. "They don't have a big bunch of heavyweights. They were hit as hard by graduation as anybody."

Leading the Bulldogs is running back/linebacker Randy Richardson (6'1", 220 pounds). "He was All-District last season," said Ramsey. "They've been able to move the ball with the Wishbone and Slot I. They've got a pretty good ground game. They had Ballinger down 7-6 but Ballinger scored in the last two minutes to win 14-7."

"Right now all we're concerned with is Clyde," said Ramsey. "In this district you better be ready to play no matter who you are playing. You've got to be ready to play."

"Clyde does throw the ball," said Ramsey. "It depends on how far behind they are. We probably throw it less than anybody. Last year we probably threw it more than anybody."

Tomorrow's game marks Clyde's first visit to Wolf Stadium since the Wolves' stellar 1984 season. Colorado City's visit to Clyde last year was probably the low point of a season of frustration for the Wolves.

"Clyde beat us worse than

anybody," said Ramsey. "It was a miserable night." Clyde rushed for 246 yards in last year's contest and completed 8 of 13 passes for another 174 yards. Richardson carried for 100 of the yards on 17 carries. Colorado City suffered two interceptions and two fumbles in the contest and the Bulldogs scored after three of the four turnovers to take a 42-0 lead enroute to a 49-14 blowout.

Returning from Clyde's 1986 team in addition to Richardson, who gained over 1000 yards, are center Chris Shelton, tackle Kelly Kapke an guards Michael Buchanan and Jesse McCoy. Returning on defense are ends Michael Ramos and Lance Bur-

leson and tackle Ed Ramos.

While Colorado City's entire offensive unit was named Player-of-the-Game for the Wolves' coaching staff, free safety Mark Russell was cited in Tuesday's *Abilene Reporter News* as the Big Country's Defensive Player-of-the-Week. Russell was the leading tackler Friday and made a diving interception in the endzone as Merkel was trying to close a third period 14-7 Colorado City lead.

"I enjoyed the whole game," said Ramsey. "We came out of it pretty healthy." Ramsey said he was still pondering why Merkel chose to give Colorado City the ball and the wind to begin both halves.



No doe permit required in south Mitchell County

Land owners and hunters are reminded that no antlerless deer permit issued by the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department will be required for taking antlerless deer (doe) in Mitchell County, south of IH 20 for the regular deer season for 1987-88.

Antlerless deer taken in Mitchell County will only require being tagged with the appropriate tag from the hunter's valid hunting license.

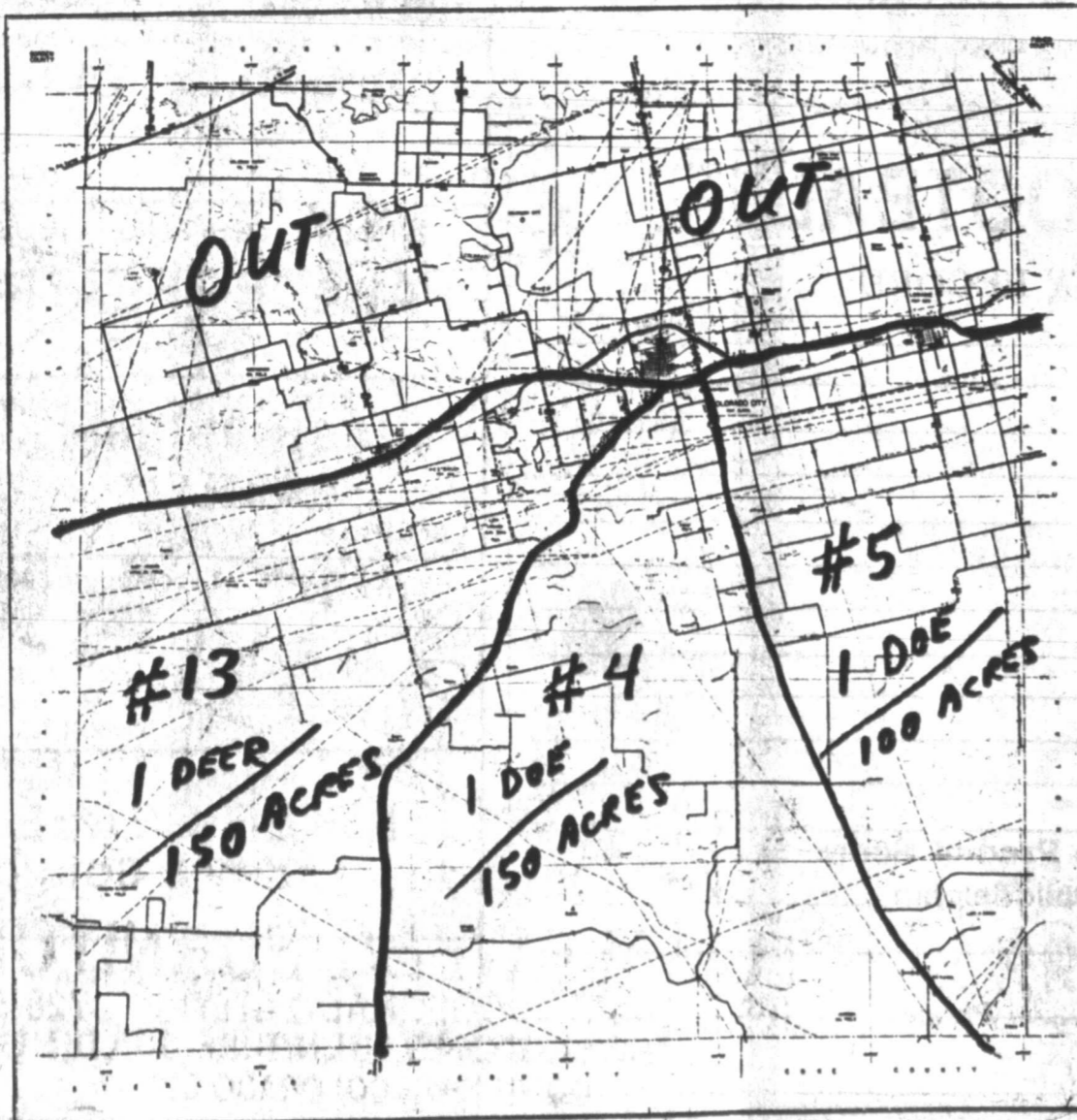
The regular gun white-tailed

deer season for 1987-88 is from November 14 through January 3, with a bag limit of four deer—no more than two bucks—in Mitchell County.

Recommended harvest rates for bucks and antlerless deer, based on recently completed population surveys in Mitchell County, is indicated on the accompanying map, as a guide for landowners and hunters in determining the number of deer to be harvested in various parts of Mitchell County.

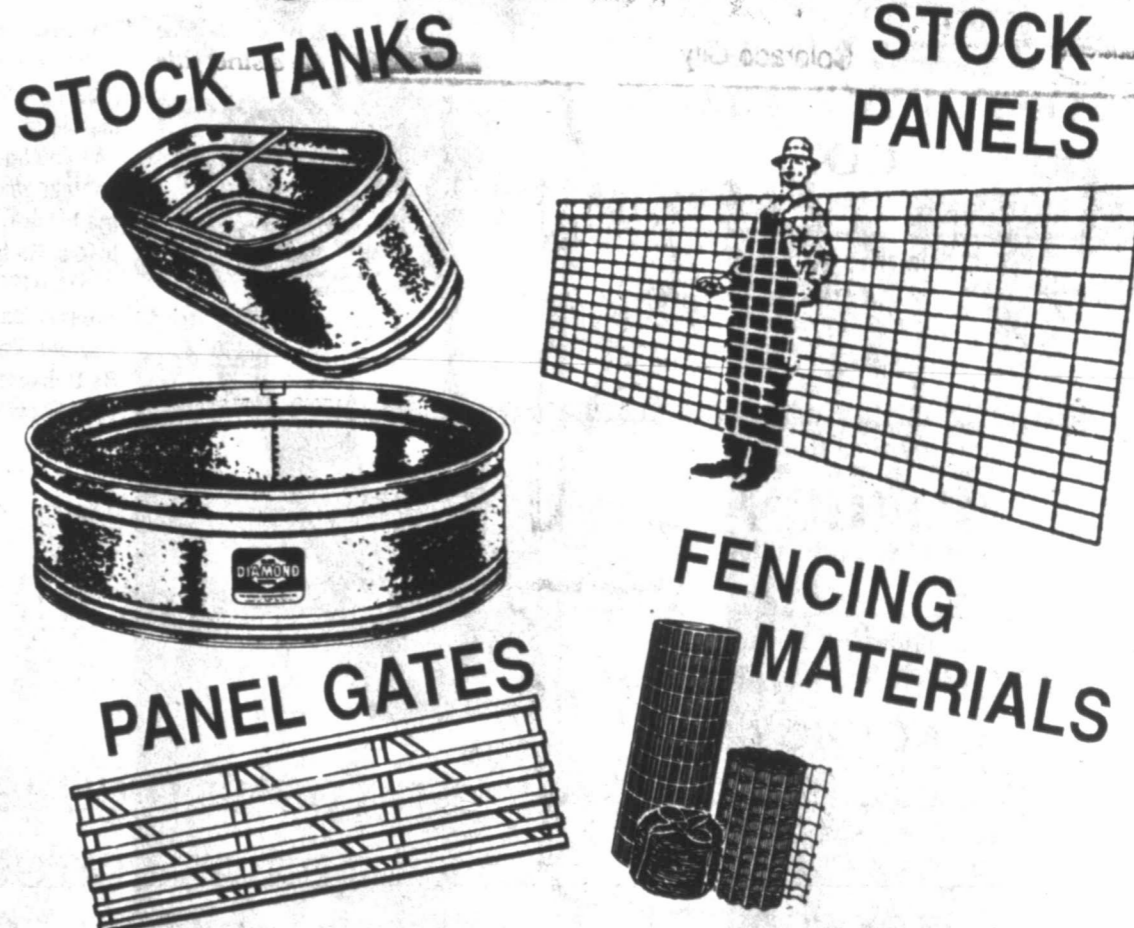
The recommended harvest rate is 1 doe per 150 acres in Compartment #13 and #4, and 1 per 100 acres in Compartment #5.

The Texas Parks & Wildlife Department reminds landowners and hunters that a valid hunting license is required to hunt white-tailed deer and that the appropriate tag should be attached to the deer immediately following the kill. For the 1987-88 hunting season, the head of the deer must remain with the deer until it reaches its final destination.

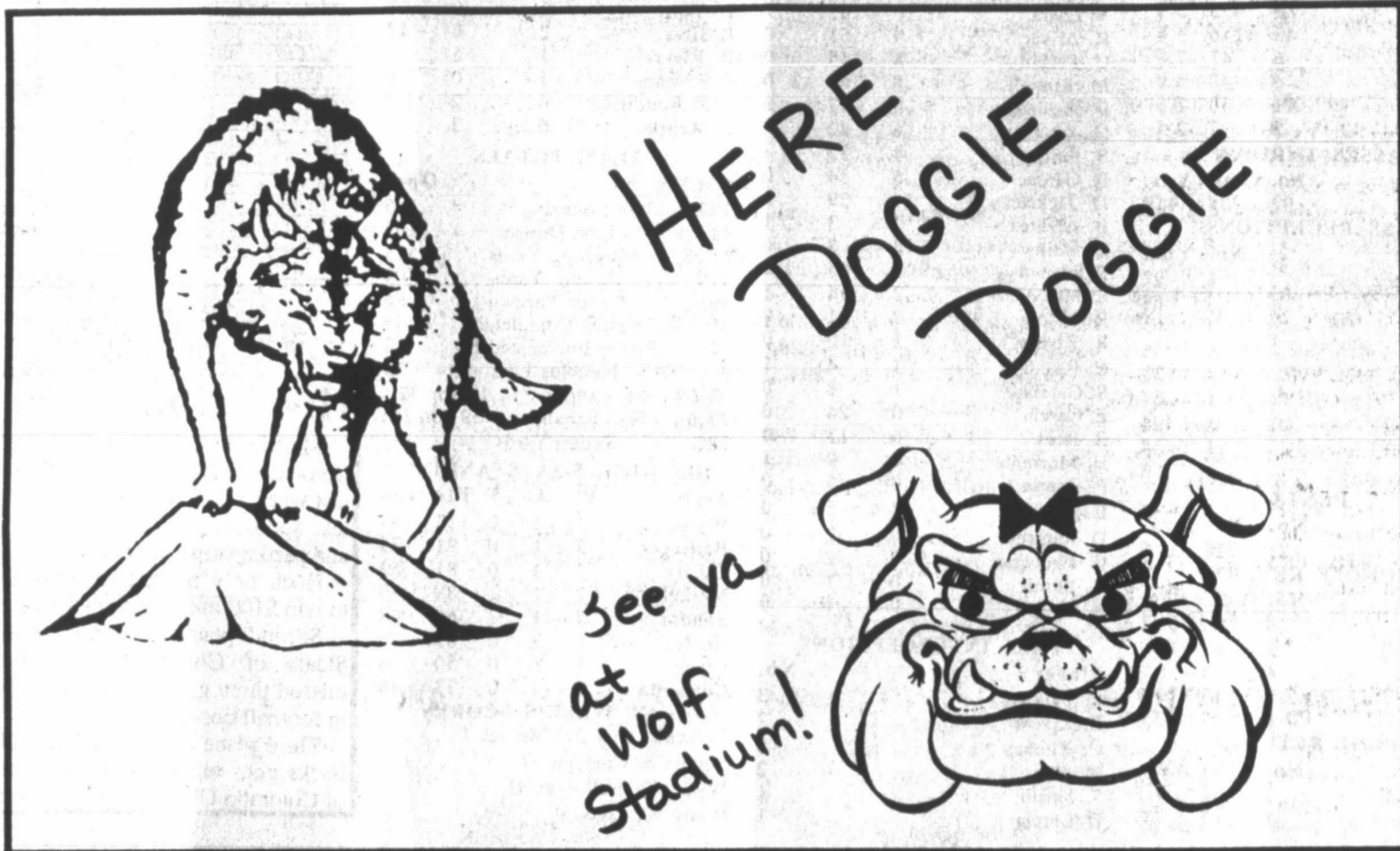

Defeat amendment

TO THE EDITOR: I plead with my fellow Texans to defeat the constitutional amendment Proposition 10 on Nov. 3. Described as a personal property exemption, it would actually accomplish the opposite.

Article VIII, Section 1 of the Texas Constitution forbids the Legislature to allow ad valorem taxation of personal property that is not used for business purposes. Quote: "The Legislature by general law SHALL exempt personal effects not held or used for production of income." Webster defines "effects" as movable property.

Texas Property Tax Code 11.14 (b)(2) makes unconstitutional exceptions to that mandate

County officials' reports

Summaries of the various reports from County offices that were submitted to the regular meeting of the Commissioners' Court Monday were as follows:

TREASURER—Ann Halmark reported that the balance of funds on hand at the beginning of the year was \$6,010,704.32. Receipts year-to-date totaled \$3,333,285.36, \$2,072,285.15 in funds were transferred. Total disbursements for the year have totaled \$1,941,470.25, leaving a balance as of Sept. 30 at \$5,330,234.28.

COUNTY CLERK—Joan Beach reported total civil and general income of \$3,946 for October. Included were Recording and Filing Fees, \$2,511; financial statements, \$119; Xerox Copies and Certified copies, \$948.10; post notices, \$14; marriage licenses, half of \$125; county amps, \$10; septic tank permits, \$70. Probate and Civil Court Fees were Law Library, \$40; Clerk, \$140; Sheriff, \$40; Judge \$20; and CJE, \$12.

MENTAL HEALTH—Center director Scott Augustine reported three new cases were added and there were 7 inactivations leaving 82 current active cases. There were 67 individuals served, 106 client visits and 417 client services delivered. Direct service hours totaled 66.77.

LIBRARY—Librarian Nancy Mayo reported that 2,784 books were circulated, 92 magazines circulated, 83 new books added, 43 new members registered and 22 old members re-registered. Income was \$153.30 from \$85 in fines and \$68.30 for copies. Memorial gifts totaling \$70.90 were given for Lovely Oylar, Jane McCarley, John Garza, Addie V. Payne and Danielle Weaver. Meetings held at the library during the months were Friends of the Library, Historical Commission and the Home Demonstration Club.

The librarian attended the Big County Library System meeting held in Abilene, Sept. 8. Display of the month was an antique

by stating that "personal effects" does not include motor vehicles, boats and other means of transportation (any movable property that rolls on wheels, floats on water or flies in air). I contested that part of the Tax Code in 221st District Court. Therefore, the legislative lawyers are attempting to have us change the Constitution to conform to their unconstitutional law.

Since the Legislature is ordered by the Texas Constitution to exempt ALL our personal property not used for income, there is no need to "ALLOW them to exempt CERTAIN personal property" and in addition to allow each taxing unit to continue to tax personal property if they so choose. They can merely change the law to conform to the Constitution as is.

By approving Proposition 10, we would seriously weaken or repeal the personal property protection that we now have under the Texas Constitution. Please vote against Proposition 10 and any other of the 25 proposed amendments that you do not fully understand and approve. Most constitutional amendments are proposed for the convenience of the Legislature and are often falsely worded for that purpose. As the one who challenged the constitutionality of Tax Code 11.14 (b)(2) I feel dutybound to inform you of the purpose behind Proposition 10 and the inherent danger involved.

During September, the 4-H Clubs held their first meetings of the new 4-H year. On Sept. 26, 3 members and 1 leader attended the District Council and Adult Leaders Association Meeting in San Angelo.

September 24, Mitchell County Farm Tour was conducted with 112 in attendance. On September 29, the County Agent attended a Turnrow meeting on harvest-aid chemicals with 15 Mitchell County farmers attending. A similar meeting was scheduled for Oct. 8.

On Sept. 8, the County Agent introduced Libbie Garnett to the Commissioners' Court as the selection to fill the Home Economics Program Leader Position for Mitchell County. She assumed the position on Oct. 1.

than water wells. First, the holes drilled are bigger in circumference and deeper in depth (casing size of oil wells can be from 12-20 inches wide and the wells are drilled hundreds of feet deep). Second, an abandoned oil well in this area will probably contain salt water in the hole and also possibly be filled with deadly hydrogen sulfide gas fumes. Therefore, the live recovery of a child who has fallen into an abandoned oil well would be almost impossible.

Now that the city limits of San Angelo and other cities are expanding there are increased possibilities that homes, schools, or playgrounds could be built over an abandoned oil well. In past years, many old oil wells were not properly plugged and may be found with only a rock placed over the casing pipe just like the water well found in Midland. I have pictures of oil wells found in Tom Green County with only such rock plugs.

Currently the Texas Railroad Commission has stated that there are over 50,000 unplugged, inactive wells in Texas which need corrective action taken, many are old wells and many are bankruptcy cases. There have been over 800,000 wells drilled in the State of Texas and there are currently over 500,000 abandoned wells. Many wells were drilled before strict plugging methods were required. These wells are not only a danger to anyone who may fall in but they are also a pollution threat to everyone who drinks the water which is being affected by contaminants such as salt brine, chlorides and hydrogen sulfide gas.

In 1983 I worked to get the Texas State Well Plugging Fund established by the Texas Legislature. It is financed by the \$100 driller's permit fee which generates about \$4 million per year. The cost to plug the 50,000 inactive wells is \$250 million. This amount does not even attempt to cover over the 500,000 abandoned wells across Texas. To make matters even worse, \$2.4 million was removed from the fund in the 1986 special session and transferred to general revenue. We must get these funds back and additional funds for the State Well Plugging Fund to perform the remedial work needed on these abandoned wells. Landowners who know of an abandoned well should report it to the Texas Railroad Commission so that corrective measures may be taken using the State Well Plugging Fund.

All abandoned oil wells must be found and properly plugged to protect the people of Texas (especially the children like Jessica McClure) and this is one reason I am running for the Texas Railroad Commission.
