A boy from Pyote, in West Texas, recently found a two-headed rattlesnake while on a field trip collecting reptiles and mice. The nine and one-half inch snake was a rare find, and biologists were surprised that the snake had lived at all.

The extra head would make it difficult for the rattler to make accurate strikes and earn its food. The left head appeared to be the dominant one, and seemed to do the "thinking." The snake's synchronization was off as the right head is heavier than the left.

At last week's news story, the snake was still alive, and on display at Sul Ross University at Alpine.

DOVE SEASON ENDS OCT. 30

Local dove hunters have just over one week remaining in the current season. The dove season for this area ends on Friday, October 30. The season began on September 1. Hunting season for quail and deer will begin on Saturday, November 14. Quail limits have been set at 12 per day with 36 in possession.

The local schools and businesses usually remain on the same time schedule, although some churches have time changes for services during the Standard Time months.

MOUNTAINEERS DEFEATED 38-12 BY JIM NED'S INDIAN TRIBE

The Santa Anna Mountaineers were defeated by the Jim Ned Indians Friday night in Mountaineer stadium by a score of 38-12.

The Indians won the toss and chose to receive. They made 3 first downs before the Mounties got the ball on downs. Roddy Dean made a first down for the Mountaineers, but on the next series two incomplete passes and no gain on the ground forced the Mounties to punt. The Indians made four first downs, and a TD by McClure gave the Indians 6 points early in the second quarter. Golson's PAT

was good. Roddy Dean ran the kickoff back for 23 yards for the Mountaineers. A Mountaineer fumble was recovered by the Indians and on the next series made a TD. The PAT kick was good.

Rocky Dean ran back the kickoff for 39 yards, and Roddy Dean picked up 15 yards and a first. On the next series a fumble on the pitch-out caused the Mounties to be dropped for a loss. Ricky Beal punted.

The Indians went to the air on the next series. A pass from Egger to Howard was literally taken away by Roddy Dean who raced 25 yards for a Santa Anna touchdown. A 2-point conversion attempt failed.

COMMUNITY CHEST WORKERS TO BEGIN DRIVE THIS WEEK

Bill Weeks, general chairman of the Santa Anna Community Chest fund drive, has announced the names of the workers who will be helping with the 1970 drive. Rev. Bill Brewer is co-chairman for the city area and Lewis Shambeck is chairman of the rural drive.

Agencies chosen to receive funds from the 1970 drive are Red Cross, Salvation Army, Boy Scouts, Cub Scouts, School Milk fund, Summer Recreation program, San Angelo Boys Ranch, West Texas Rehabilitation Center, Mental Health - Mental Retardation Center, and the Quarterback Club.

Officials of the Community Chest organization have given information about some of the fund assignments and the agencies to which the money will be given. This information will be given each donor in the community so that they will know where their money is used.

The Mental Health - Mental Retardation Center in Brownwood is being aided this year by local funds. The Brownwood agency is responsible for care of those in the Santa Anna area. The funds to the Quarterback Club help provide the summer baseball program for the

boys in the community. Although the Scouting program is presently inactive in our community, plans are being made to reorganize the program.

The West Texas Boys Ranch at San Angelo provides care for homeless or disadvantaged boys from throughout the area. The ranch is operated on donations from interested West Texans.

The School Milk fund contribution aids in providing free milk to local school children whose families cannot pay for it.

Several local people have been helped through the West Texas Rehabilitation Center at Abilene. The Center is another locally funded agency.

Funds for the Salvation Army and Red Cross are only used when requested for an emergency. Money last year went to hurricane victims in South Texas.

The Summer Recreation program provides swimming instruction for local children. Money from the Community Chest helps provide transportation and instruction.

None of the officers or workers in the local Community Chest organization receive wages or compensation and all work is by volunteers. It has been brought to the attention of the officers that some of the people in the community are donating to fund drives in other towns. All people in the area are urged to make their contributions to the local drive which will benefit several local agencies.

People from throughout the area are urged to donate when the workers call. Those missed by the drive may leave their contributions at the Santa Anna National Bank or with any of the city or community chairmen.

It is planned to have the fund drive completed by the end of this month.

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In Our Opinion

A NATIONAL SURVEY, according to Dick West, editorial director of the Dallas Morning News, predicted that only 55 per cent of those qualified — roughly half — will go to the polls to determine who will govern their lives in the next Congress.

Compared to many other countries in the world, we show practically no interest in our government. About the only thing that will stir us up is a hit in the pocket book, but too few realize that they are directly affected by who is sent to Congress and to State offices.

In little Switzerland, West stated, 90 to 95 per cent of the eligible voters cast a ballot; in Sweden, 80 to 85 per cent vote; and in Italy the figure runs from 75 to 80 per cent.

When only two out of four are willing to take out 15 minutes on election day to cast a ballot and exercise the most fundamental duty of citizenship, then we are riding for a fall. Disinterest has been the downfall of every government which has ceased to exist since the fall of the Roman Empire. When people are only interested in what they can get out of government, then it soon comes to a point that there is nothing to get.

"The Soviet Union is watching," West said, "and laughing." He went on, "Kosygin and Co. do not have to send their termites over here to destroy our foundations, if we ourselves let them rot."

West cites several examples where one vote has been crucial in the history of our country. It is an able answer to those who say, "Hell, my one vote doesn't count anyway."

Thomas Jefferson was elected president by one vote in the electoral college. So were John Quincy Adams and Rutherford B. Hayes.

The draft act creating the manpower to defeat Hitler and Tojo in World War II passed the House of Representatives by one vote.

In 1884 James G. Blaine lost New York state by only 1,000 votes, and because he lost New York State, he lost the presidency.

Many of us remember the presidential election 22 years ago when Thomas Dewey thought he had the presidency sewed up against "Give 'em Hell" Harry Truman. So did his supporters, and even one newspaper put out an extra giving Dewey the victory, but you know that story. If one voter in 3,000 counties had taken the trouble to vote, then Dewey might have been president instead of Truman.

Ten years ago, Nixon would have defeated Kennedy if he had received one more vote in each box.

If you remember your history, you will recall that one vote in Indiana indirectly admitted Texas to the Union.

The story is that Ed Hannegan was elected to the Indiana Legislature because a grain miller decided to take ten minutes off and vote. Hannegan was in turn elected to the United States Senate (In those days the Legislature elected the Senators).

When the vote came up to admit Texas to the Union, it was a tie. Hannegan broke the tie, so we might say that the one vote of a grain miller in Indiana put Texas in the Union.

West wrote on: "The right to assemble, to worship, to acquire, and keep, to talk without fear, to live without chains and to die with dignity depends in a great part on 435 Representatives and 100 Senators who care."

"If you don't care enough on election day about who they are and about what they should do, will they care?"

If you don't vote on November 3, don't gripe about what happens the next two years. You have given up that right!

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STATE Capital NEWS

AUSTIN—Tax-free financial incentives are recommended by Texas' top officials to lure new industry to the Lone Star state.

Gov. Preston Smith came out for the added attraction at no cost to taxpayers. Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes said he agreed that revenue bonds to help industry finance locations would be the preferred route for legislation.

Both spoke here at the governor's annual conference on industrial expansion.

Smith also advocated a pre-employment industrial training program to fill the need for trained labor. He pledged his efforts to maintain a favorable tax climate for industrial development.

James W. McGrew, Texas Research League director, underscored the importance of the recommendations when he told the conference that Texas will need to provide 600,000 new jobs because of the predicted population increase during the next decade.

Sponsored by the Texas Industrial Commission and hosted by Governor Smith, the conference honored six industries for expansion and economic impact on their communities during 1969.

Award-winning industries were Johnson Manufacturing Company of Lubbock, Kilgore Ceramics Corporation, Celanese Chemical Company of Clear Lake, Missouri Beef Packers of Friona, Laredo Packing Company and Friedrich Refrigerators Inc. of San Antonio.

At a meeting before the conference, the Industrial Commission reviewed plans for a 24-page section on Texas Industry in Business Week Magazine on March 13. Also discussed was a computerized, finger-tip data bank on industrial development opportunities in 438 Texas communities over 1,000 population.

COURTS SPEAK — State Supreme Court agreed to hear the appeal of a Houston trucking firm on November 25 relative to a \$300,000 judgement favoring an Odessa widow and her children in connection with a 1966 accident in which the woman's husband hit a parked truck.

In other recent actions, the High Court:

• Rejected the City of Floydada's appeal in a lawsuit over land condemned for the city's airport.

• Turned down the claim of a Houston widow to a share of her deceased husband's inheritance because she waited too long to file suit.

Court of Criminal Appeals dismissed the petition of a

Houston doctor sentenced to life in prison in the sniper slaying of a partner.

Three Houston theater operators seek a federal court injunction to prohibit police raids on nude-film showings.

TAX RAISE, CUT — Employers got both good news and bad on the tax front last week.

Rate experts recommended a 1.1 per cent average increase in workmen's compensation insurance rates.

At the same time, Governor Smith said employers covered under the Texas Unemployment Compensation Act will be eligible for a per cent reduction in their payroll taxes about January 20.

Workmen's comp rate will vary among industries. Under recommendations, average manufacturing rates statewide would increase 4.4 per cent, while those for contractors would drop 2.3 per cent. Oil industry would dip 1.1 per cent and "all others" would increase two per cent.

Unemployment tax cut is possible because the trust fund-reserve for paying jobless benefits reached \$347 million on October 1. When the fund is more than \$300 million on the computation date, a tax cut is mandatory.

450 NEXT DRAFT CALL — November draft call for Texas is 450, says acting State Selective Service Director Lt. Col. Charles Duncan.

First to be called by the local draft boards will be men with random sequence numbers through 145. Those with higher numbers will be subject to call if needed, Duncan said.

Texas' quota is part of the national call for 8,000 men, all for the Army.

A total of 1,310 will have to take pre-induction physical and mental examinations for the November quota.

Local board quotas for induction and pre-induction examinations in November were mailed to 159 boards on October 9.

NEW PARK LAND OFFERED — A Corpus Christi woman offered the state land on Mustang Island for state park development.

Mrs. Sam E. Wilson Jr. submitted two options to the Parks and Wildlife Department

1. A tract of 5,624 acres with 8.3 miles of beach frontage on the Gulf of Mexico, for \$6.1 million; or

2. A tract of 7,495 acres with 11 miles of Gulf beach, for \$8.1 million.

Mrs. Hale also agreed to an easement across her land for a proposed \$3 million Corpus

Christi water exchange pass and offered to give the state 130 acres north of the pass. Litter adjoins 580 acres on the island already owned by the state.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES — Military personnel can qualify to serve as prospective jurors on satisfying election code requirements and if they intend to establish a residence in Texas, says Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin in a new opinion.

In other recent rulings, Martin concluded that:

• No state agency now has authority to execute a FHA form certifying the need for a nursing home.

• College of Osteopathic Medicine in Fort Worth is entitled to representation on the Anatomical Board of Texas.

PRIVATE COLLEGES ASK AID — Private colleges and universities will be seeking \$23 million in state aid to stay in business during the next two years.

Independent Colleges and Universities of Texas Inc. has reviewed its needs in a meeting with Central Texas legislators. Spokesmen for the schools previously have outlined their plight to the Coordinating Board of the Texas College and University System.

Legislation backed by the group will seek tuition equalization grants for private college students and authorization for contracts by the Coordinating Board with private schools for services and degree production.

Although the state is investing heavily in new tax-supported institutions, there are some 16,000 openings in private classrooms.

WASTE ORDERS REQUIRED — Texas Water Quality Board Chairman Gordon Fulcher warns that waste control orders must be obtained from that agency before any type of sewage facility is built.

This applies to individuals as well as municipalities and other government entities.

"This is for their own protection," Fulcher said. "While the type of facility might meet with full approval of the Board, there also is the possibility that it would not, and that money spent on the facility might thus be wasted. Standards vary in different areas of the state."

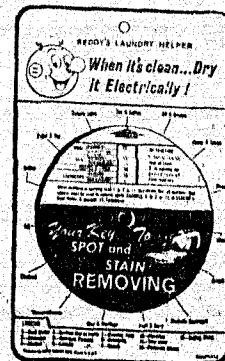

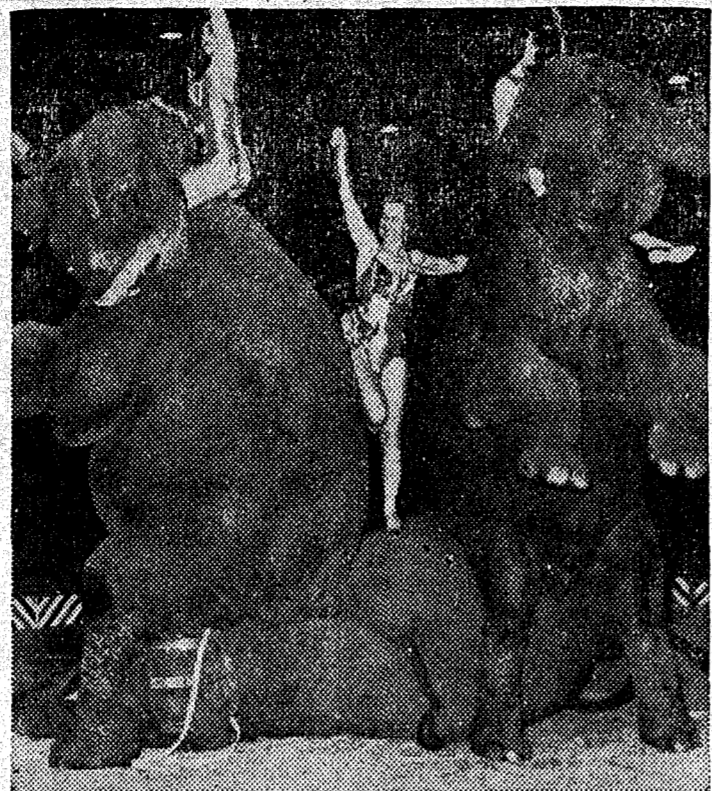

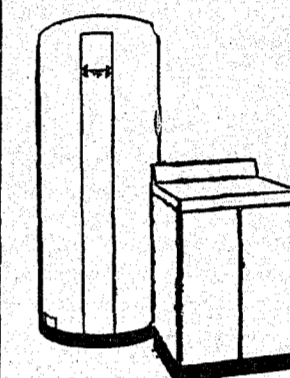

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ASC News . . .

by Joe K. Taylor
The future of American agriculture was projected recently by Under Secretary of Agriculture J. P. Campbell. In his talk Mr. Campbell said:

"The commercial farm of tomorrow will be much more heavily capitalized and operated more efficiently. Although the total amount of land used for agriculture will probably be about the same as today, the average commercial farm in 1980 will be considerably larger than now. The combination of more people in the United States with substantially more purchasing power per capita will mean increased demand for farm products in general.

"Consumers spent about \$120 billion for food and beverages last year. Our U. S. Department of Agriculture economists project a rise in these expenditures to about \$206 billion in 1980. When people in the middle or lower income brackets achieve rising income, they tend to upgrade their diets.

"Thus, per capita consumption of beef and veal which last year reached a new high of 114 pounds may rise to about 130 pounds by 1980. To provide for this increased per capita consumption in a growing population, beef production would have to increase by about one-third.

"Per capita consumption of chicken and turkeys which totaled around 48 pounds in 1969 may rise to about 60 pounds in 1980. This would require an increase of about 45 per cent."

The fact that incomes are rising in many countries of the world, and that when people have more money to spend they demand more and better food, particularly livestock products, bodes well for the future of feed grain consumption world wide. The United States should share in this expanding market.

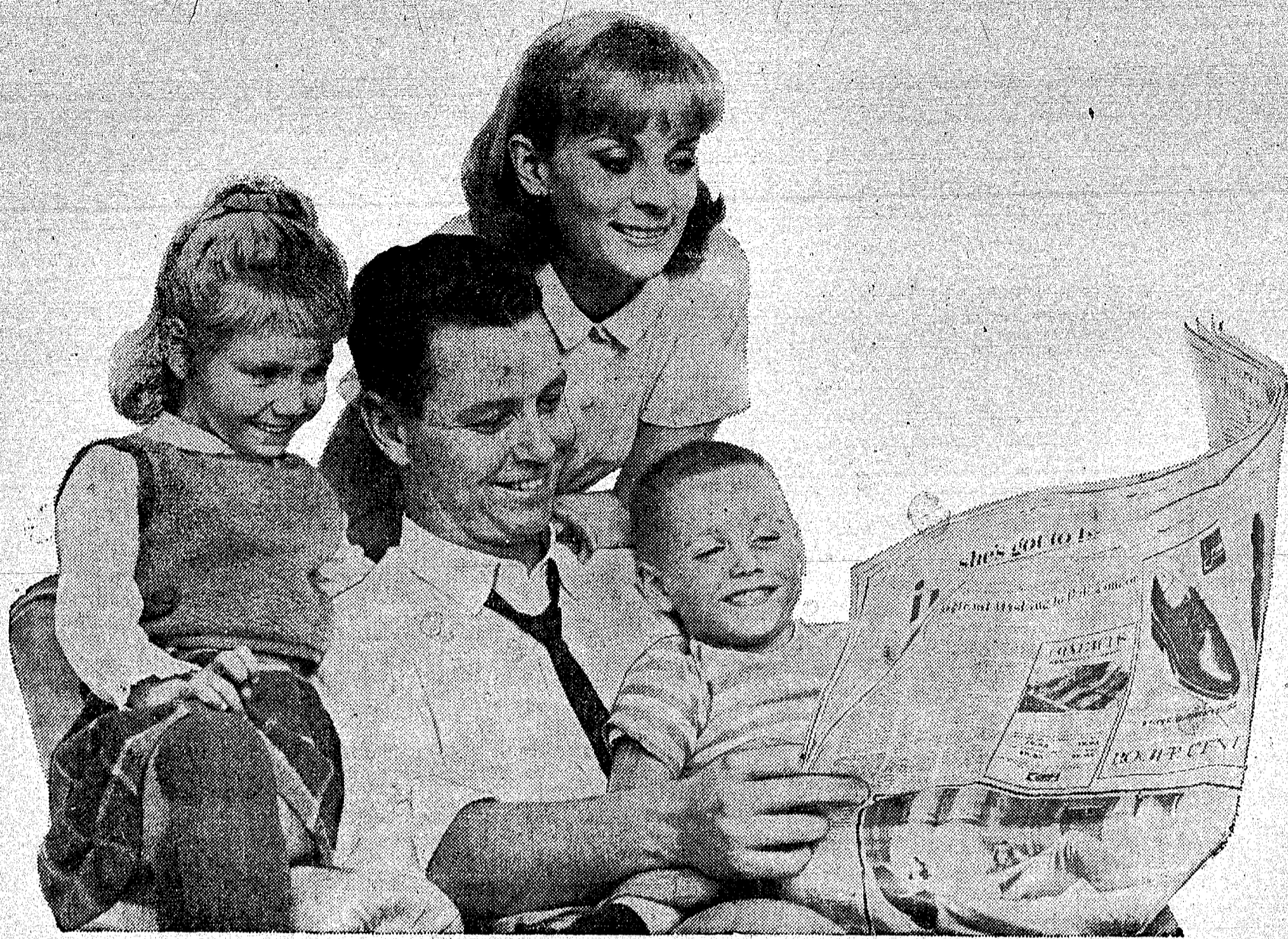

S-Security Is Important To Under 30 Group

If you're in the half of the U. S. population that's under 30, you may think social security is something remote and unimportant to you right now. Not so, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager for the Abilene district.

"In this generally healthy and youthful group, nearly 2 1/2 million people receive benefits because they are disabled or are dependent upon disabled workers. Over 3 million widowed mothers and young children get monthly social security checks as survivors of workers," Tuley stated. "Half a million students age 18 to 22 and a quarter of a million people who became disabled in childhood get monthly benefits as the children of retired, deceased, or disabled workers," he went on. "Disabled children get social security benefits as long as they are not able to work."

"The money in cases like these is important, of course," Tuley added. "But for the young worker who knows that his family will be at least partially provided for should he be injured or die prematurely, there is also peace of mind."

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Glen Rose Park Has Dinosaurs For Attraction

A family of symbolic dinosaurs will have officially "returned home" with ceremonies near here at Dinosaur Valley State Scenic Park in Somervell County.

Governor Preston Smith will join top officials of Atlantic Richfield Co., the National Park Services and Texas Parks and Wildlife Department by formally accepting life-size brontos with simulated eggs for the park site.

The gifts will be presented at the ceremony by Arco executive committee chairman, O. P. Thomas, a native Texan who was president of the former Sinclair Oil Corporation when the dinosaur display was originally created for the 1964-65 New York World's Fair. Since the merging of Sinclair and Atlantic Richfield in March, 1969, the fiberglass creatures have been donated to non-profit agencies with the Glen Rose park receiving the largest single grouping.

Governor Smith will also accept a metal plaque from James McLaughlin, superintendent of Padre Island National Seashore, denoting, Dinosaur Valley as a Registered Natural Landmark. The citation from the National Park Service declares that the area " . . . possesses exceptional value in illustrating the natural history of the United States." The State Park is named for the famed rock-indentured footprints made by theropods probably 100 million years ago.

Accompanying Mr. Thomas at the services will be Frank Sogorka, who has been in charge of the dinosaur collection since it was first viewed by some 10 million visitors to the World's Fair. Since then, he has supervised tours of the display which brought it to
