New dormitory built by local residents

El Rancho de los Ninos is an orphanage run by Bo and Jeanne Bartley. It is located at Flores, Guatemala, in the El Peten.

It is operated totally on donations from churches and individuals. They accept no help from the government of Guatemala.

On Jan. 5, a group of 10 people from the Farwell - Clovis area left for the Lubbock airport. The group left in the Farwell Baptist Church bus driven by Jerry Monk.

The group from this area were: Herman Gerles, J.B. Taylor, Steven Compton - Amarillo Southlawn Baptist, John Rusk - Grady, Sally and Jerry Pierce, Janice Coffman, Dale Cook - Youth Director, Lewis Foster - Newlight Baptist and Ralph Franse.

The purpose of them going was to build a dormitory for 25 girls and a small clinic.

The group flew Southwestern Airlines to Houston. From there they flew out on Pan Am to Guatemala by way of Miami. They left Miami and arrived at Guatemala City at 8 p.m.

The group spent the night at the Pan American Hotel. While there they met another group that had come from Las Cruces, N.M., by way of Juarez, Mexico.

After a night's rest, they flew to Santa Elina and met Bo and Jeanne and headed to the ranch.

On Monday morning J.B. Taylor was made crew foreman, as he had experience helping build the church two years ago. He gave the group their work schedules. Also, mechanics and a dentist, Dr. Sharon Carver from Las Cruces, and two assistants were on hand. Dr. Craig from Floydada furnished the dental equipment.

On Friday some of the group traveled to see the Mayan ruins.

Ralph Franse said, "A few days before an unbroken pottery bowl was found."

On Saturday they had a dedication of the dormitory. They celebrated with roasted pig which is cooked in the ground. Franse said it was fine, but probably needed to be cooked a little longer.

Franse said the main food of the country consists of tortillas, black beans, corn, bananas and fresh fruit.

Franse has been to Guatemala five times and said this was one of the better trips as the country was more stable.

This time next year, Franse said, plans are being made for building a cafeteria.

The group returned home Jan. 14 at 2 a.m.

Farwell voters approve government change

By a large margin, Farwell city voters Saturday approved a change in its form of government.

Farwell residents voted 163-107 to eliminate the current three-member commission and go to a system with a mayor and five councilmen.

Altogether, 270 Farwell residents cast ballots -- reflecting a 46 percent voter turnout. There are 584 registered voters in the community.

All ballots cast were counted. Election Judge Billie Blain reported no problems in voting. Five absentee ballots -- all in favor of the governmental change -- were included in the total.

An election now will be held April 6, a Saturday, at which Farwell voters will elect a mayor and five councilmen. Residents can either sign up to run for the mayoral position or the council-at-large posts.

The mayor will be elected for a two-year term, according to City Clerk Janie Bowery. After the five

councilmen are elected, they will draw lots to see which get one-year terms (two councilmen) and which get two-year terms (three councilmen).

Thus, in 1986, an election will be held for the two council posts held by councilmen for one year. This election will be for two-year terms.

Then, in 1987, an election will be held for the mayoral post and the three council positions that were for two-year terms.

After this initial election, all terms will be for two years.

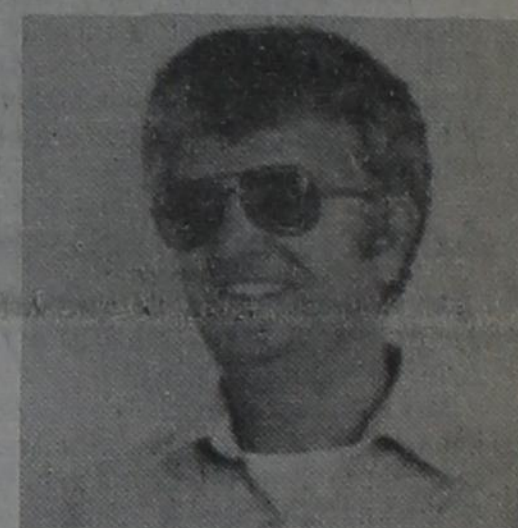
Registration for running for the mayoral and council posts this year begins Feb. 4 and ends Mar. 6.

Texico School Board election scheduled

Registered voters of the Texico School District will go to the polls Feb. 5 and elect two School Board members.

Paul D. Barnes is unopposed for the Position 2 seat. But incumbent Johnnie Rucker and Oran Autrey are competing for the Position 1 seat.

The polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. Voting will take place at the Community Building, next to Texico City Hall.

Voting officials are: Judges -- Wilma Whitener, Mae Stone and Sue Scott; Clerks -- Bernice Thigpen and Mrs. Merced Rojas; and alternates -- Theresa Montano and Joyce Armstrong.

Here's a capsule look at the candidates:

Paul Barnes

Paul D. Barnes is running unopposed for the Position 2 seat on the Texico School Board. The position has been held by Greg Martin.

Barnes has lived in Pleasant Hill for 14 years. He farms and has raised corn, milo, wheat, barley and cattle.

He and his wife, Nancy, have three children in Texico Schools -- Misty, first grade; Chad, sixth grade, and Justin, ninth grade.

Barnes is a director of the Curry County Farm and Livestock Bureau. He also is helping with the Pleasant Hill Fire Station construction.

Barnes said he is naturally interested in school functions, noting that children's education is especially important at this time. He said he would try to serve his district well, if elected, and notes that there are good people to serve with on the board.

Johnnie Rucker

Johnnie Rucker, running for the Position 1 seat, was appointed to fill Mike Spearman's place on the Texico School Board, then ran for the post and was elected.

He owns Dura Bilt Steel Buildings in Clovis and is involved in farming. He and his wife, Sandra, have four children -- three have graduated from Texico Schools and one is in

seventh grade.

The incumbent has been a Curry County resident his entire life and has lived in the Texico School district since 1959. He is on the administrative board of the Kingswood United Methodist Church. He has served on the Farmers Home Administration Board, as community committeemen for the Curry County ASCS and as chairman of the Soil Conservation Board.

"Everything has gone really well in the time I've been on the school board," said Rucker. "There have been no big problems. Everyone works together so well -- parents, teachers, administration and students."

Oran Autrey

Oran Jay Autrey, 27, was born in Mountainair, N.M., and moved to Texico in 1956. He attended Texico School and graduated in 1975. He and his wife, Deborah, have two children -- Brandon, 5, and Ryan, 2. Autrey has coached the Texico Play Inc. basketball teams for nine

years.

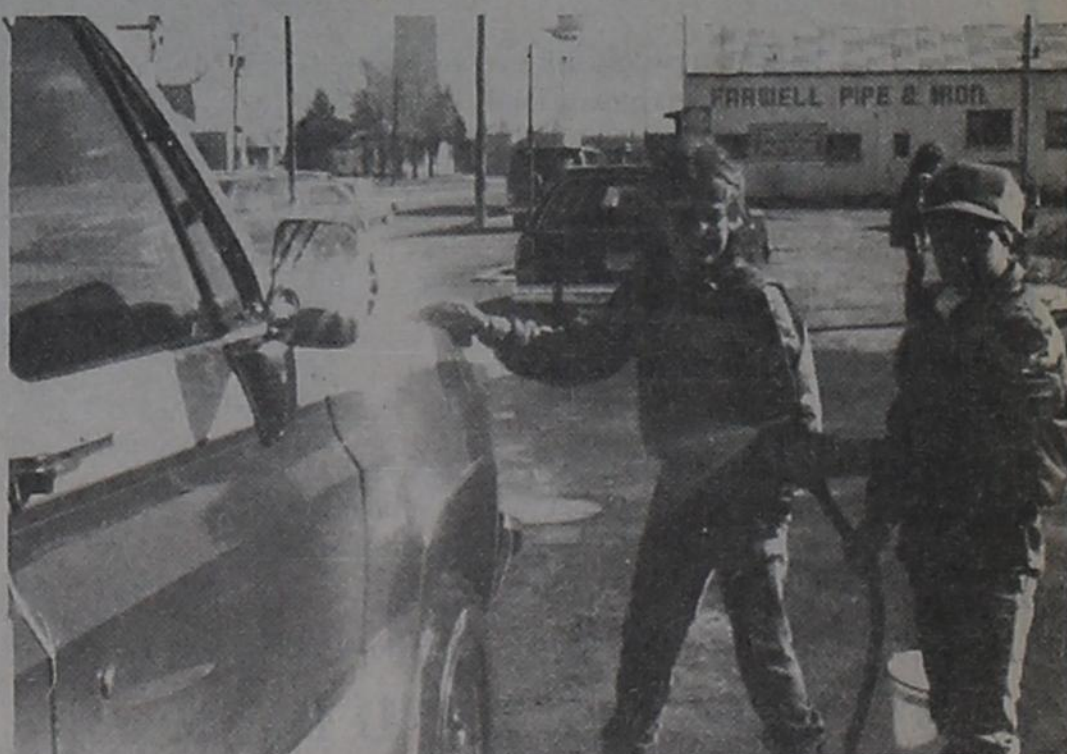
He was employed with Stephens & Sons Construction for six years. In August 1982, he and Bill Stephens became co-owners of High Plains Ready Mix in Clovis.

As to why he wants to serve on the School Board, Autrey said:

"I have become closely related with the Texico School System the past few years through the Play Inc. basketball teams I have coached. I have been very impressed with the way the system has been run by the present board members. When I became aware of a position becoming open on the board I gave serious thought to becoming a candidate."

"I would like to be part of the respected school system at Texico. I

plan to remain in the Texico area for my lifetime and am very interested in the education of all our children. My goal of the future is that the educational system of Texico continue to be a tremendous asset to the youngsters in our area."

Sarpalius: State budget crunch serious

Texas lawmakers, meeting for our Legislature's 69th Regular Session, are facing the most financially uncertain times in recent memory. "Revenue" and "budget" quickly have become the catchwords for this Session.

The reason for the gloom, of course, is the state's ever-tightening budget. Revenues are growing at a slower rate than in the past, and Texans, once secure in the knowledge that their state government was among the richest in the nation, now are facing some hard choices about financing that government.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock spelled out the situation on Jan. 7 when he released the biennial revenue estimate for the 1986-87 budget period that we will be considering during the session. Revenues have grown to \$36.6 billion for the next biennium, a 14 percent increase from the \$32 billion received during the current biennium, but still more than \$1 billion below what was needed for a no-growth budget.

The news only gets worse.

Mr. Bullock estimates that oil and gas production taxes, normally one of the state's biggest tax items, is expected to drop to \$1.7 billion next biennium, a 22 percent decrease from this biennium's \$2.2 billion. Natural gas production taxes, another big-ticket item, has dropped from \$2.3 billion to \$2.1 billion, a decrease of almost 11 percent.

On the surface, the choices seem simply - keep state funding at \$36.6 billion or raise taxes to allow funding to keep pace with inflation.

Police issue warning

State Police will begin a crack-down against non-registered motorcycles and three-wheel vehicles on Farwell area roadways, Officer Craig Hunt reports.

To drive a vehicle on public streets, a driver's license is needed, he stressed.

Hunt said youngsters who are operating vehicles illegally will be arrested, their cycles impounded and charges filed against their parents.

He noted that three options are available to him if a youngster is arrested: the county judge can put the child in jail, the child can be turned over to the parents or guardians if they can be found, or the child can be turned over to the county welfare office.

Hunt pointed out that if a car traveling just 30 miles an hour strikes a three-wheeler, the child can be killed. Also, insurance wouldn't be available due to the circumstances "so parents must prevent such disobedience to our traffic laws."

Trap shoot planned

On Jan. 27, at 1:30 p.m. there will be a trap shoot one-half mile north of Farwell on the State Line Road.

The prizes this year will be silver dollars.

The shoot will consist of Annie Oakley, buddy shoots, quail walks and regular shoot.

The proceeds will go the local projects of the Texico-Farwell Lions Club.

Senator

Bill Sarpalius Reports

Unfortunately, choices in state government are never so easy.

Without outside pressure, most state agencies could get by on the moderate revenue estimates forecast by the comptroller. However, the federal courts have ordered the state to upgrade its prison and mental health facilities. Both certainly are important items, but they put a squeeze on an already tight budget. Adding to the pressure is a water package that might require some state funding, if passed, to help protect Texas' precious water resources.

Under certain circumstances, a tax increase in selected areas might be an acceptable solution. This year, though, it is not a viable alternative. Lawmakers voted last summer in special session to raise various state taxes to pay for education reform. The tax increase was the state's first in 11 years, and most legislators are not interested in raising taxes twice in less than a year.

Instead, most of our colleagues are talking about seeking other forms of revenue. Among the most talked-about suggestions are plans that would legalize pari-mutuel wagering on a local option basis and create a state lottery.

Proponents of both point out that they would bring additional millions to the state treasury. Opponents say the cost of the two plans - both in terms of fiscal expense and loss of state prestige - would be too high.

Pari-mutuel wagering and lotteries both would require the creation of state agencies or the expansion of existing ones to regulate their operation. Opponents of the two revenue plans question whether the additional bureaucracy is worth the funds that would be generated.

Opponents of pari-mutuel wagering also wonder whether bringing horse racing to Texas would in-

crease organized crime in the state. Backers of the horse racing proposal say there is no evidence of organized crime involvement in any racetrack in the nation where a state agency carefully regulates the track's operations. Foes of pari-mutuel wagering concede that point but say off-track gambling would proliferate once racetracks are in the state, with organized crime forces spearheading that illegal gambling.

As we've said, the figures indeed are gloomy and the choices aren't

always the most pleasant. We must find a way to reconcile the state's slowing revenue growth with the increased demand on the budget. The only thing that is certain at this point is that we remain committed to ensuring that no budget cut hurts Panhandle-area residents more than it hurts those who live in other parts of the state.

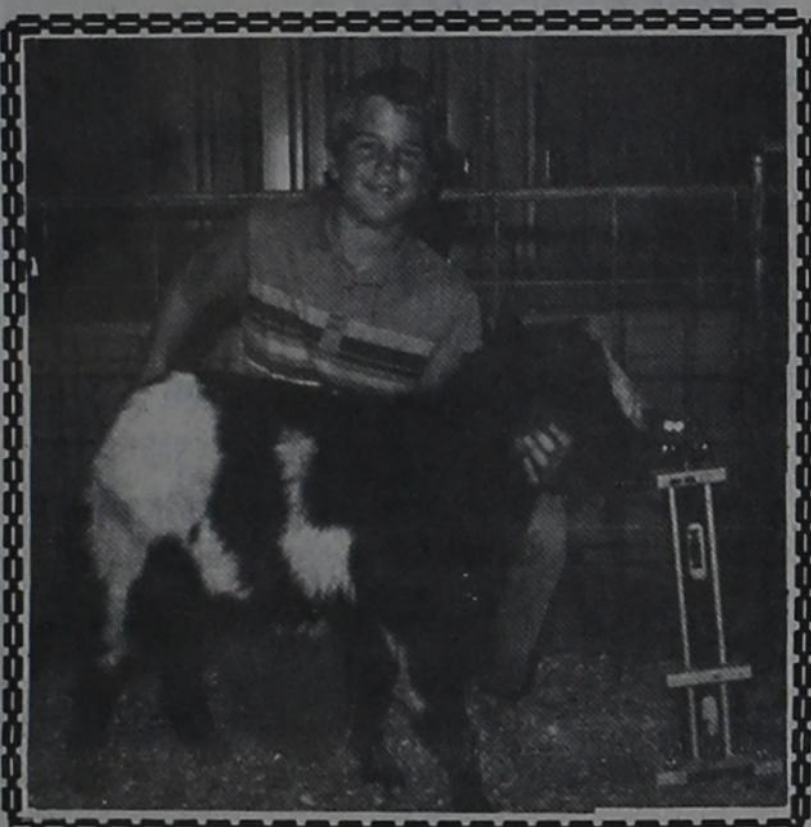

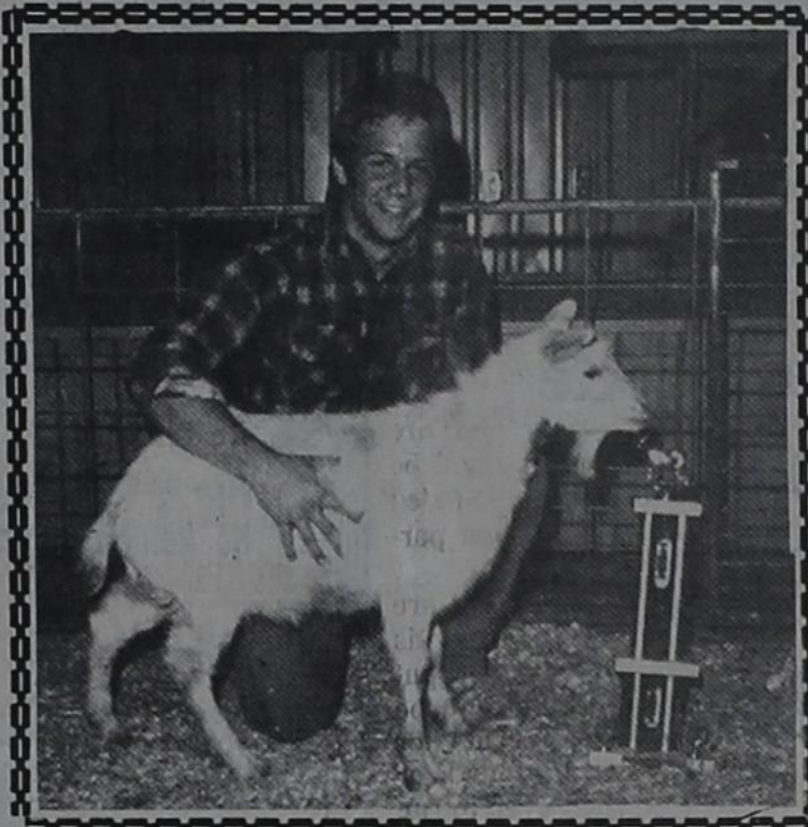
Carl Hutchins showing Reserve Champion Steer

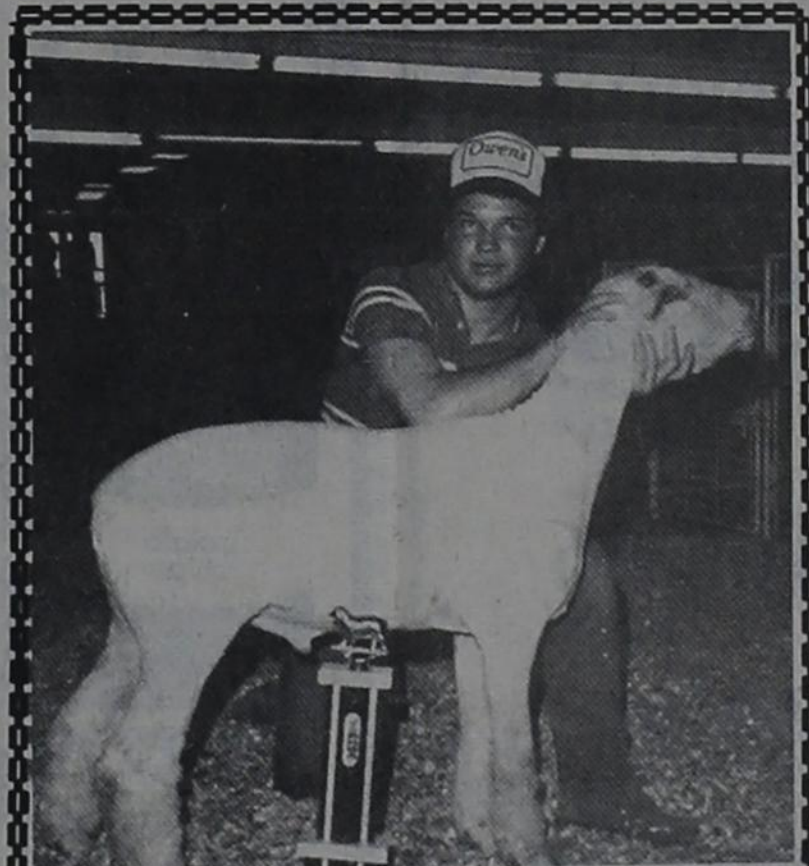

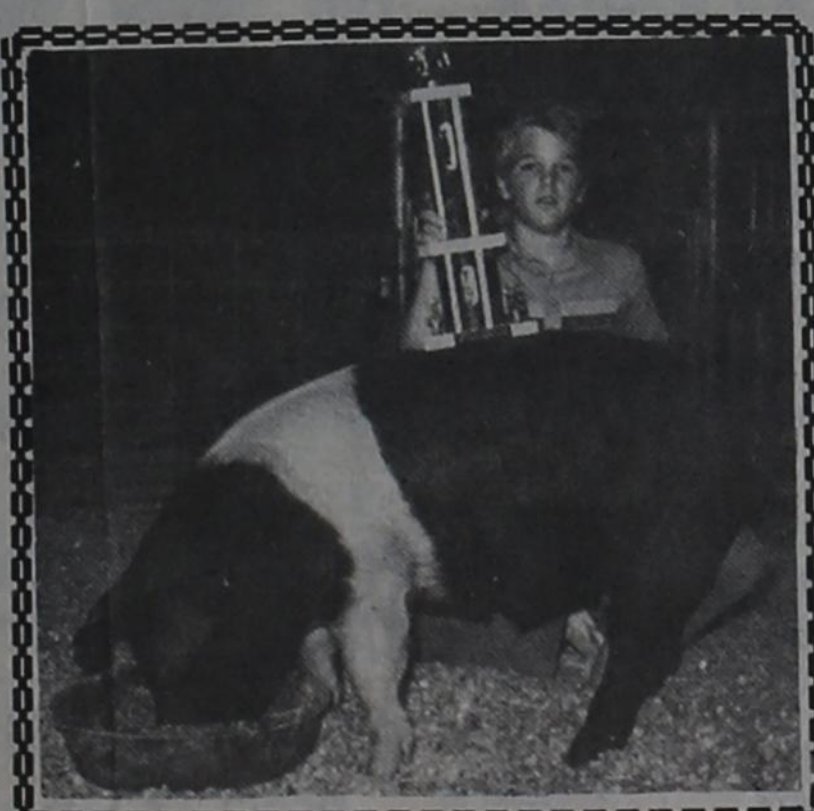

Salt to taste
1/2 cup port wine
Melted butter
Six slices bacon

Rub cavity of pheasants with 1 tablespoon salt. Brown rice in a dry frying pan. Remove rice to a saucepan; add water and 1 teaspoon salt, and cook until tender.

Melt butter in frying pan. Add celery, onion, and mushrooms and cook until slightly wilted. Add to cooked rice; add herbs. Stuff bird lightly; sew together and truss.

Make sauce by combining 1 tablespoon butter, currant jelly, lemon juice, cayenne, 1/2 cup water, cloves, and salt. Simmer for a few minutes; strain and add wine. Add meat drippings, if desired.

Brush birds with butter; place strips of bacon across breasts. Roast in a covered pan at 350 degrees F. about 2 hours, or until tender, basting frequently with sauce. Yield: 4 servings.

Counseling Center to open in Friona

The Plainview office of Central Plains Mental Health/Mental Retardation Center has announced plans to open a Counseling Center in Friona sometime in February.

Due to the efforts of Charles Turner, Director of special education for the Parmer County Special Education Coop, and Gary Smith, pastor of the Congregational Church in Friona and other interested citizens in Parmer County, the Counseling Center has become a reality.

The Parmer County Commissioners and the City of Friona approved joint payment of utilities and basic phone charges which removed the final obstacle to locating the branch office in Friona.

Central Plains MHMR operated a branch office in Friona from 1971 until 1978 when a loss of funds caused it to be closed. The new office will operate much like the previous one with several added services.

Services offered will be individual, group and marriage and family counseling as well as local services to children 0-3 years of age who are developmentally disabled. The children's program, called Early Childhood Intervention, will be working closely with Turner and the Parmer County Special Education Co-op. The Center will serve children until their third birthday and the special education services of the Co-op will continue services after the child is three years old.

Parmer County has been well represented on the nine-member Board of the Central Plains MHMR Center since 1980 by Turner. Prior to Turner's appointment, Baker Duggins was an original MHMR Board member and was highly

instrumental in the initial planning and creation of Central Plains MHMR Center.

Central Plains MHMR serves a nine county region and is committed to delivering MHMR services as close to the home of residents of the area as possible.

The local Counseling Center will have direct contact with Plainview for other services not offered in Parmer County. These services include day treatment, inpatient, group home, residential substance abuse, vocational workshop for the mentally retarded and case management, among others.

The Counseling Center will be located between 5th and 6th on Cleveland Street in Friona. Office hours will be from 8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Monday through Friday with the projected opening to be the first or second week of February.

According to Executive Director Rick Van Hersh: "A very special thanks goes to Kendrick Oil Company for donating the use of the building to be used for these services. Also, a special thanks to the County Commissioners of Parmer County and the City Council of Friona for helping make this service available to Parmer County residents."

Youth jobs available

Persons interested in these jobs are urged to apply immediately.

Legislation co-sponsored

Congr. Larry Combest has co-sponsored legislation to repeal section 179(b) of the 1984 Tax Reform Act, which will be introduced when Congress reconvenes on Jan. 21.

If passed, the measure would rescind a new law requiring detailed records of business expenses relating to vehicle use for Internal Revenue Service deduction claims.

"I have received numerous telephone calls and letters against the new law," Larry Combest said. "It

is absolutely ridiculous to punish the vast majority of honest people because a few individuals abuse the law," Combest said.

Under the new law, effective January 1, 1985, persons wanting to take deductions for business purposes must keep a daily log showing trips, mileage, destination and purpose on every owned and leased vehicle. In addition, they must keep a record of all expenses on each vehicle including oil and gasoline, insurance, repairs and other related up-keep.
