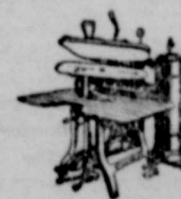

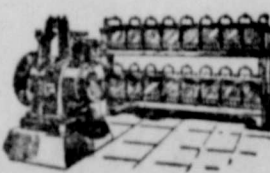

It's very simple; nothing hard about it at all. A relative is a relative, and most of us have too many of the kind that always want to borrow ten dollars, but never have a ten spot to lend. HUSBANDS MUST ORGANIZE

A new menace of organized labor is facing the country, armed with rolling pins and broom-handles, and unless the husbands of the land meet it and organize to combat its unreasonable demands there is not telling what the country will come to. At the national convention of the Mother's Union the other day plans for the adoption of a uniform scale of hours and wages were discussed. Demands for a 361-day year and the sum of twenty-five cents per week in addition to the money necessary for the management of the household were approved unanimously. Some of the more radical members tried to introduce a motion demanding one Sunday off a month, and fifty cents per week, but this innovation was voted down, the majority being of the opinion that unreasonable demands would cause a walkout, or lockout, by husbands and possible anger of the public. It was also voted impracticably to make any attempt to shorten the workday, all agreeing that sixteen hours was the minimum possible. A resolution was passed favoring the care for one hour a day of all children over seven by the husband, thus enabling the wife to pay more attention to her duties around the house. Latest reports from the husbands all over the country are that they are furious at the absurd and arbitrary demands of the Mother's Union, and are threatening a lockout if the resolutions are enforced. The husbands are right! The idea of mothers and housewives wanting as much as two-bits a week to spend on themselves, and just as they please! Whoever heard of such a thing? It is absurd! And as far as a workday of less than sixteen hours, it is entirely out of the question. Next thing we know they will be demanding a fourteen-hour day. Husbands and Fathers must now be firm.

ONLY TWO CLASSES

When anyone talks to you about classes, tell him that we have but two classes in this country—the American and the un-American. The American knows the strength of his country and its faults he is willing by a majority vote and rule. On Friday morning, August 5th, the boss of "Hill Crest" farm and myself, having concluded that we had fully earned a vacation, boarded the East bound "Fast Mail" at Booker, and hid ourselves away to "Grand Old Missouri" to the Centennial, her 100th birthday celebration, as well as the annual State Fair.

Accompanying us to Shattuck, Okla. was W. E. (Coal Oil) Lilly and John A. Dickson of Bible Fame. Mr. Lilly proved to our entire satisfaction that the "Buried City" on Wolf Creek was submerged "in the winter time at 10 o'clock at night." He gave free lectures between stations on everything from the evolution of man down to the present time, then at the station W. E. would get out and kindly assist the brakeman in coupling up.

And while he was gone Brother Dickson would grasp the opportunity to expound a few Theological questions, and give us a treatise on the higher thoughts of man.

It took the "Fast Mail" just 5 hours to cover 42 miles without a breakdown, but the conductor of the "Limited" out of Shattuck, knowing the importance of our getting to the big show on time had kindly held the train until we arrived, he said get aboard never mind the tickets, I thought possibly he would miss us in the general rush, but he didn't, he collected all that a timid R. R. Sponsored by an indulgent Governor would permit.

We stayed in Kansas City over Sunday, Sunday morning we went to the First Christian Church to hear Rev. Braden, and heard the finest sermon that we had heard in many years, it was a real treat.

In the afternoon we went to see "Sell's Floto Greatest Shows on Earth." We saw the elephant.

That evening we went to the Tabernacle to hear Burris A. Jenkins, but he was supplanted by the Rev. Newton of London, England, who is considered one of the half dozen greatest preachers in the World.

I made it my business to talk with the farmers and breeders of all classes, and found that there opinions were almost universal, I mean that they are making a fad of certain points in regard to type. While everyone wants the big, lengthy, stretchy hog with the pretty arched back, but they don't want the arched belly or the legs too long. Every hog should be bred with a singleness of purpose and that is, the need of the farmer and feeder—the heaviest hog in the shortest length of time, as the block is the ultimate end of all.

I also made quite an investigation of the retail prices of commodities. I talked with Wholesalers and Factory men, with old merchants in Sedalia that I have known for 30 years, and the opinions that I have held for some months were verified.

Leaving my "Better Half" visiting friends in Sedalia I returned to Kansas City for a few days sojourn with my old friends, Drs. Thornton and Minor, it was the second visit in just 20 years. While there I visited the Stock Yards and shook hands with a few of the old timers, it reminded me very much of visiting a morgue to have a good time, the shippers were losing money almost without an exception, some losing the savings of a life time.

DESSERT SUGGESTIONS.

A delicious dessert which may take the place of a frozen dish is:



Pineapple Fluff.

—Line glass sherbet cups with thin slices of sponge cake, moistened with pineapple juice. Beat one cupful of heavy cream, add one well-beaten egg and a cupful of powdered sugar with a cupful of shredded pineapple to which a tablespoonful of lemon juice has been added. A spoonful of bright, fresh berries added to each cup makes a most attractive dessert.

Frozen Plum Pudding.—Scald a pint of milk and when hot pour over three well beaten egg-yolks; add a cupful of sugar and cook over hot water until the mixture coats the spoon; strain and flavor with melted chocolate. Fold in the stiffly beaten whites of the eggs and one cupful of whipped cream. Prepare the fruit to be used, steaming the raisins and currants and adding shredded citron after soaking for two hours in orange juice. Freeze as usual.

Sour Cream Pie.—Beat the yolks of four eggs until light and creamy, add a cupful of sugar, the same of chopped raisins and sour cream, with one-fourth teaspoonful of cloves. Place in a double boiler and cook until smooth and thick. Line a pie plate with rich pastry and bake the crust. Fill with the mixture, cover with a meringue, using the whites of the eggs mixed with four tablespoonfuls of sugar. Heap roughly over the top and place in the oven to brown lightly.

A delightful dessert, so easy to prepare if a baked pastry shell is ready, is made by heating the shell with any sugared fresh fruit. Cover with sweetened whipped cream; chill and serve.

Chop Suey With Liver.—Take calf's liver cut into small cubes, fry in a little butter until nearly cooked brown; add a little water from time to time and cook for half an hour; add a cupful of chopped onion and celery and cook fifteen minutes. Season with salt, pepper and two teaspoonfuls of chili sauce. Serve hot with hot cooked rice.

TOBACCO'S FOES LOSING GROUND

Canvass of 7,847 Editors Shows 7,393 Communities Against Abolishing Weed.

ANTIS LOSE THREE STATES.

Utah, Under Mormon Influence, Only Commonwealth to Adopt Prohibition Measure During Year.

"Is tobacco going to have its scalp added to the belt of the prohibitionist beside that of the lamented but as yet not altogether late alcohol?" is the question asked by Garret Smith in an article in the current issue of Leslie's Magazine.

The writer reaches the conclusion that while there has been increased agitation and legislative activity on the subject of tobacco following the success of the drive for prohibition of liquor the efforts of reformers seeking to abolish tobacco have no general support. This opinion is based on the results of the questionnaires on the subject sent out to newspaper editors of the country by the Press Service Company of New York City.

The questions asked were: (1) Do you favor the enactment of laws prohibiting the personal use of tobacco by adults?

(2) In your judgment does the general sentiment of your community favor such legislation?

(3) Is the use of tobacco personally objectionable to you?

No arguments accompanied the questions and from their form it was impossible for any editor to determine the attitude of the questioners. Out of 12,518 editors questioned, 7,847 replied according to the summary given. These editors, it is estimated, represent a combined circulation of 21,870,048. Of the 7,847 editors replying, 7,393, or 95 per cent, represent public sentiment in their communities as opposed to anti-tobacco legislation. Only 260 editors, or 3 per cent of those replying believed there was any considerable sentiment favorable to tobacco prohibition. There were 174, or 2 per cent, in doubt, while 20 failed to record their judgment.

Editor's Judgment Unbiased

"It is of special interest to note that 569 editors in answering the first question, personally favored such legislation, although only 260 of them reported that public opinion also favored the prohibition of tobacco—an indication of the conscientious effort made by the editors to distinguish public opinion from their own personal opinions," the article continues.

"The highest percentage of replies reporting public opinion favorable to prohibition of tobacco came from Utah, where 42 per cent of the editors thought the public were for such a movement. Utah is the only state which has since adopted an anti-cigarette law. The result was forecast by several of the editors who stated that the influence of the Mormon Church was against tobacco. The Mormon Church is also strong in Idaho, which is the other state where the use of tobacco was recently prohibited, but the governor has signed the bill just passed, in which the prohibitory legislation is repealed. In this state 80 per cent of the editors estimate sentiment in their communities as against tobacco prohibition, which, nevertheless, is 6 per cent below the average reported opposition.

"The legislature of Tennessee some weeks ago passed and the governor has signed a bill repealing the anti-cigarette law of that state. The questionnaire showed 93 per cent of its editors believed the public against anti-tobacco legislation. The legislature of Arkansas has also passed a bill repealing its anti-cigarette law. In this state 94 per cent of the editors reported against tobacco prohibition.

Arizona's Practical Joke

"A bill, introduced in the current session of the legislature of Arizona to prohibit smoking in public dining rooms and other public places, was first amended to prohibit the consumption in public of peanuts, chewing gum, tea and coffee and then defeated by the senate. The questionnaire returns from that state were 92 per cent 'no.'"

"In Iowa where the 'no's' were 95 per cent a bill to repeal the anti-cigarette law has been passed, and signed by the governor.

"A bill to repeal the anti-cigarette law in Kansas, with 89 per cent 'no's,' is receiving the attention of its legislature. Last year a petition for a referendum in Oregon to prohibit the use of tobacco failed of sufficient signatures to bring the question to a vote, and 95 per cent of the editors declare their public against legislation. In Oklahoma an anti-cigarette bill has been reported unfavorably in the house. The editors of that state reported 94 per cent against its public support.

"Outside of Utah, where Mormon influence predominates," the article concludes, "the anti-tobacco movement appears, as in the case of Tennessee, Arkansas and Iowa, to be losing ground and is not to any considerable extent supported by the people."

The friends of tobacco feel particularly elated over this showing, inasmuch as 1920-21 was a maximum year in legislative circles with 42 state legislatures in session and the tobacco subject received an unusual amount of consideration.

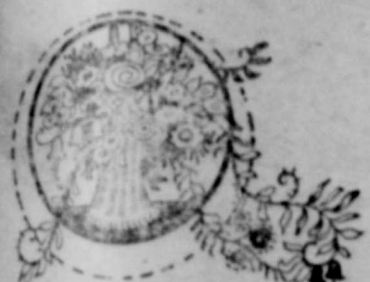

TEMPTING TABLE TRIFLES.

For those who enjoy a meat with a sweet sauce, this dish will appeal:



Spiced Tongue.

—Takes a fresh calf's tongue, put to cook in boiling water and simmer until tender. Peel off the skin and put it into a saucepan with the following: to four tablespoonfuls of butter, bubbling hot, add one cupful of small onions, one red pepper, one and one-half teaspoonfuls of salt, two tablespoonfuls of vinegar, two small carrots, one-half pound each of dates and raisins all chopped, then add a pint of the liquor in which the tongue was cooked and simmer one hour. Remove the tongue, thicken the sauce and pour over the tongue.

Barbecued Ham.—Wipe two slices of ham and trim off most of the fat. Parboil the ham, turning once; drain and put back into the hot frying pan in which the trimmings, having been minced, are fried out; add three tablespoonfuls of vinegar, one teaspoonful of sugar, one teaspoonful of mustard and a few dashes of paprika. When hot pour over the ham.

Lemon Catchup.—Mix a tablespoonful of grated horseradish with the grated rind of four lemons, add three teaspoonfuls of salt, the juice of the lemons, two tablespoonfuls each of mustard seed and celery seed, four cloves and a dash of red pepper. Boil thirty minutes and put away for six weeks before using. This is an excellent sauce to serve with fish.

Date and Apple Salad.—Pour boiling water over a pound of dates and place on a plate to dry after draining. Remove the stones and cut each in quarters. Pare and quarter apples and cut into matchlike strips, squeeze over a little lemon juice. Sprinkle with salt, paprika and a dash of ginger. Serve with French dressing on lettuce.

The common potato contains all of the inorganic elements of the body except flourine. It is especially rich in potassium salts, which are good for nerve and muscle.

HELPFUL HINTS.

When preparing new potatoes, use a piece of sack to rub off the skin; they may be cleaned much quicker than by scraping. When carrying kindling or light wood, a fine help is a piece of strong canvas or carpet with leather handles riveted in to it. Have it 45 by 27 inches. Another help in getting in light wood is to spread an old awning or oil cloth on the ground near the window of the wood cellar, heap on a good quarter of the load of kindling and draw it down through the window. Repeating until it is all moved in half the time it takes to carry and throw it in by armfuls.

A good milk bottle-opener is a horse-shoe nail. The nail makes a good nut pick and has the advantage of being inexpensive. Milk bottles should be carefully wiped before opening them, for more than one reason. Hands which may not have been very clean may have handled the bottle, or bits of glass may have been chipped off and will fall into the glass when the milk is poured out.

A granite dish may be a source of danger, for bits of the enamel, sharp as glass, may be mixed with the food. Never strike the side of a granite dish with a metal spoon. A wooden spoon is the best utensil to use at any time; it does not hurt the hand with much stirring and never gets hot in a cooking utensil on the stove.

Water drained from cooked rice makes a delicate starch to use for starching thin dresses. Potatoes to be dry, mealy and digestible should be drained as soon as they are cooked; remove the cover and allow the steam to escape, shaking the kettle to hasten the process. Then they may be mashed or served in any way desired.

Lemons are cooling to the blood, antiseptic and cleansing. The juice of half a lemon in a glass of water upon rising is considered a tonic and a mild laxative. To treat a cold a pint of hot lemonade with not too much sugar, taken just upon retiring, is one of the best of home remedies.

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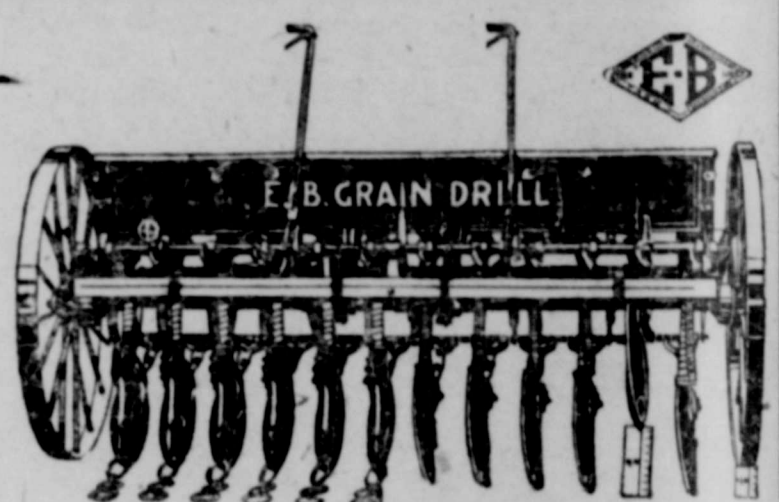
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
