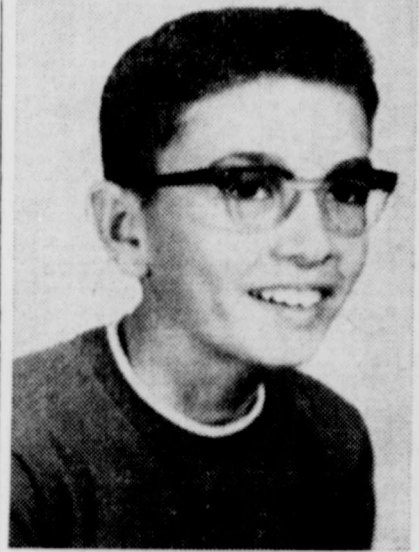

Mike, son of Mr. and Mrs. Billy F. Skipper, will represent Hale County in the District Bee at Amarillo on April 29.

Winner of the High Plains championship honors, to be decided at the Amarillo Bee, will be sent to the National Spelling Bee in Washington, D. C., in late May, with all expenses paid.

This is Mike's third year to enter in the County Bee. He was runner-up last year. A seventh grade student at Abernathy, Mike plays football and is secretary of his class. Building model planes is his hobby.

Mike won the County Bee by spelling the word "ecstasy" which had been missed by Floyd Hicks, Estacado Junior High student, who was runner-up. Mike went on to spell the next word, "emissaries" to win the county championship.

The runner-up is the son of Mr. and Mrs. F. L. Hicks, Plainview. This was his second year to enter the County Bee.

Gloria Clanton, sixth grader at Hillcrest School, Plainview, is the Junior Bee champion. She was the right to compete in the County Bee by first winning a junior contest in which 11 entries of fifth and sixth graders from elementary schools competed. She is the

Each school winner entering the County Bee received blue and gold ribbons and paper-mate pens.

Motor License Count Is Down In Hale County

There had been 16,228 motor vehicles licensed in Hale County through April 1, Tax Collector-Assessor Bill Hollars said Saturday. Returns from the registrations totaled \$371,041.61. Of that sum, Hale County has received \$175,000, maximum permitted under state law, and \$196,041.61 has been paid to the state. Since the county has received all it will get from the registrations, the cash taken in from this source the remainder of the 1961 license period will go to the state.

Registration receipts as of April 1 were approximately \$4,000 under those of the same time last year when 16,294 vehicles had been registered in the county.

Incidentally, Friday's edition of The Plainview Herald in its "20 Years Ago" column noted that on April 1, 1941, 4,460 vehicles had been registered in the county.

LUBBOCK—Science-minded students from grade school through senior high will participate in the South Plains Regional Science Fair April 14-15 on the Texas Tech campus.

Entries will be from schools in 31 counties. Sponsors of the fair are the South Plains Science and Mathematics Teachers Assn. and Tech.

The two top winners in the senior division will be given expense paid trips to the National Science Fair at Kansas City, Mo., May 10-13. There will be a top award given in each of the divisions of biology, physics and math, and judges will select the top two. The third winner will be the alternate.

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Amarillo Is Site Of Baptist Sunday School Convention

AMARILLO, Tex. (Spt.)—More than 3,500 Baptists from throughout the state are expected here for the annual Texas Baptist Sunday School Convention meeting April 12-14 at the First Baptist Church of Amarillo.

The two-day convention is designed to help Baptist Sunday School teachers and officers better use the Sunday School as an evangelistic arm of their church, said W. R. Bumpass of Dallas, secretary of the Texas Baptist Sunday School department. Carrying out the evangelistic emphasis, the theme for the convention is "Outreach for the Unreached."

Principal speaker for the convention's general session is Dr. Ramsey Pollard of Memphis, Tenn., president of the 9-million-member Southern Baptist Convention.

Hale County Weed Control Week Set For April 16-22

The week of April 16th — April 22nd, 1961, has been declared as Hale County Weed Control Week by County Judge James A. Joy. In observance of the week, the Fourth Annual Hale County Weed Control Conference will be conducted on April 19th in Plainview at the National Guard Armory. A half day program has been scheduled, beginning at 9:30 a.m. and ending with a free noon meal at 12 o'clock, which will be served through the courtesy of several Commercial Agricultural Chemical dealers located in Hale County.

The conference agenda will include discussions on perennial and annual weed control, weed control in cotton, applying hormone type chemicals safely, and flame cultivation. In addition an annual progress report will be presented by the Hale County Noxious Weed Control District, two board members will be elected for the district's board of directors, the Hale County 4-H Club will present a weed control demonstration and five Hale County farmers will be presented with awards as outstanding weed control farmers in 1961. One farmer will receive the over all county award and four other individual county precinct awards.

Speakers appearing at the conference will include Fred Elliott, Cotton Specialist from Texas A&M; A. F. Weise, Associate Agronomist and Weed Specialist from the Experiment Station at Bushland, Texas; Archie Martin, Supervisor of the Hale County Noxious Weed Control District; and Hale County farmers including Kelly Bingham, Art Hegi, and Bully Sylvester.

Weed District Board Members whose terms expire this year include M. D. Burrus of Precinct 1, Plainview, and J. J. Hegi of precinct 2, Petersburg. Hale County farmers and land owners are specifically urged to attend the conference to participate in the election and gain up to date information on new methods of weed controls as well as to view the most modern weed control equipment ranging from sprayers and herbicides to flame cultivators all of which will be displayed at the conference. The general public is also invited to attend.

Objectives Of The New Feed Grain Program Are Outlined

College Station — The feed grain legislation, signed into law on March 22 by President Kennedy, has four purposes. They are to increase farm income; prevent

further buildup of the feed grain surplus and reduce it if possible; help assure the consumer of fair and stable prices for meat, poultry and dairy products and reduce the ultimate feed grain program costs to taxpayers.

According to C. H. Bates, farm voluntary specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the program is voluntary and applies only to 1961. All field corn and grain sorghum whether for grain, fodder or silage are covered and cooperators are being asked to reduce their 1961 planting of these crops by at least 20 percent. Voluntary reductions up to 40 percent are encouraged for growers with bases of 100 acres or more. Growers with bases of 25 acres or less may retire the total under the program.

Cooperating farmers will be eligible for support prices — \$1.93 cwt. on grain sorghum, \$1.20 per bushel on corn, 92c per bushel on barley, 62c for oats and \$1.02 per bushel for rye. The non-cooperator will not be eligible for price support on any of these crops, Bates said. His production would have to move at market prices. He cannot depend upon the government price support nor his neighbor's production adjustment to hold up the market price.

Cooperators, if they choose, may receive payments in the form of negotiable certificates which represent grain from CCC stocks. The Secretary of Agriculture will determine the flow of this grain into market channels.

A cooperator, Bates said, agrees to reduce by at least 20 percent his grain sorghum or corn acreage for 1961 below his 1959-60 average. The diverted acres must be put to some conservation use. It cannot be harvested or pastured. Weeds, insects, and rodents must be controlled on the diverted acreage.

In turn he will receive, in addition to his eligibility for price supports on his grain crops, a payment for each acre diverted to conservation use. The rate of payment for the first 20 percent diverted will be 50 percent of the normal production of the acreage diverted times the county support price. (This price will be announced shortly by ASC officials). As an additional incentive, a grower may divert an additional 20 percent and receive a payment of 60 percent times the county price per acre diverted.

Notaries Public Must Re-Qualify For New Term

Secretary of State Frank Lake announced that all qualified Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term June 1, 1963 must re-qualify by the payment of the required fee and the filing of a new oath and bond with the County Clerk of his residence between June 1, 1961 and June 10, 1961.

Lake emphasized that Notaries Public should not send requests for re-appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State. The law specifically requires that the County Clerk approve notary bonds.

Any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment should apply to his County Clerk between April 1, 1961 and May 20, 1961. Application during this period will assure prompt attention before the rush procedure of re-appointing present Notaries.

The Secretary of State further pointed out that each person applying for a commission as a Notary Public must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the county for which he is appointed.

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The exact name and permanent address of the applicant must be furnished the County Clerk. The secretary, this year, has asked that the addresses be returned with the names, please have an address of the applicant when applying for a commission as a Notary Public.

No application for appointment for the remainder of the 1959-1961 term to be accepted after April 1, 1961. Applications for Appointment

received after this time will be considered to be for the 1961-1963 term. Fee for filing is \$3.00, of which \$1.00 is sent to the Secretary of State.

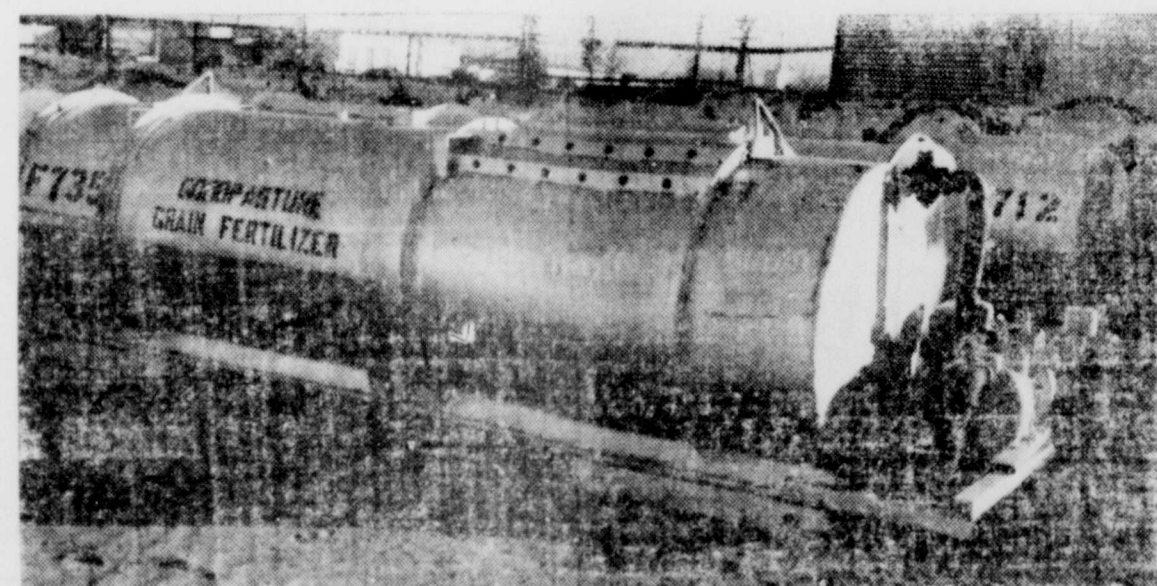

The greatest of American freedom is freedom of speech, the freedom to express oneself. A free society encourages differences and argument. Diversity is a sign of health. Each American must take a stand for what he believes to be right, for this is the democratic way. This is the basis of democracy for which America was founded and without which America cannot exist.

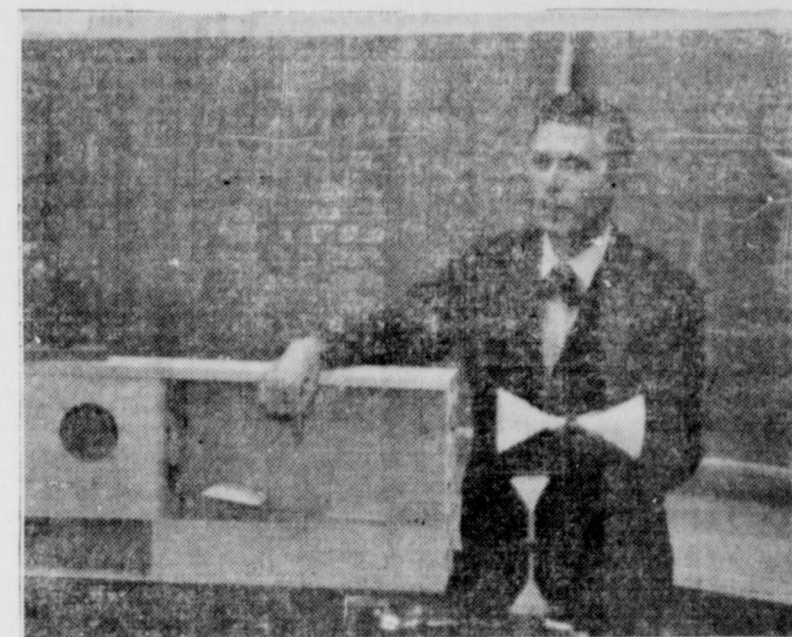

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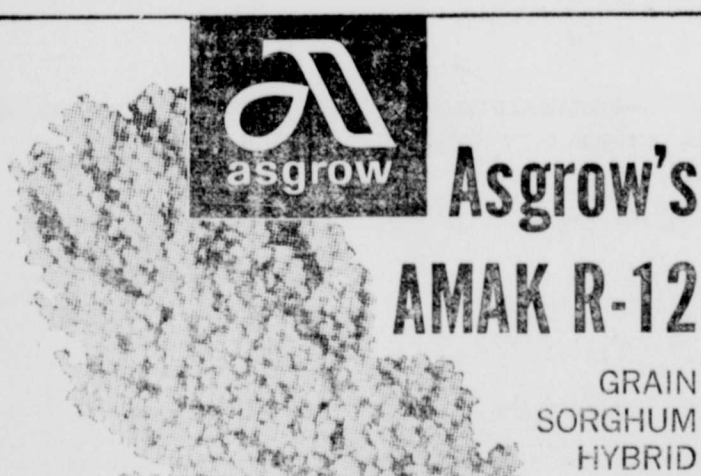

NEWS from the High Plains Research Foundation

"Artificial recharge of run-off water into the underground Ogallala formation on the High Plains is one of the answers to the problem of a declining water table," stated James Valliant, Assistant Water Engineer at the High Plains Research Foundation, in a report on recharge during 1960 issued to Foundation supporters this week.

Mr. Valliant continued, "A total of 145 acre-feet of water was recharged into the Ogallala formation during 1960. Of this amount, 131 acre-feet was from rainfall. The remainder came from run-off water from surrounding irrigation. According to the High Plains Water District, approximately five million acre-feet of water per year is pumped from the Ogallala formation for irrigation."

The United States Geological Survey estimates that from 1.4 to 2.5 million acre-feet of water is caught annually in the 37,000 playa lakes in the High Plains. "If this amount of water could be saved for future irrigation by storage underground, instead of being lost through evaporation, the irrigation period could be prolonged throughout the area."

A recharge well was established at the Foundation in 1957 to study the problems connected with artificial recharge. Two main problems are: (1) the rate the formation can accept water, and (2) the silt content of the water being recharged and how to control it.

In reporting on the study of the acceptance of recharge water in the underground sand, Mr. Valliant said that "water from the lake should be allowed to flow into the underground sand at approximately 85% of the pumping rate." During the past year and a half, "the water from the lake at Halfway has been allowed to flow into the well by gravity at 850 gallons per minute for twenty-three hours, then pumped for one hour, at 1,000 gallons per minute. By surging the well every fifteen minutes during the hour of pumping, approximately 75% of the silt was removed. The pumping period will be increased to one and one-half hours in the 1961 experiments. "If the well pumps sand, a high rate of recharge will allow the water to rise to lake level and might thereby cause a well 'cave-in.' By keeping the water in the well at Halfway at approximately 55 feet below the surface, there was little or no

Heed Railroad Gradecrossing Signs and Signals

Motorists were given a life-saving warning today by J. O. Musick, General Manager of The Texas Safety Association.

"Trying to dispute the right of way with trains can get you killed," Musick said in urging increased public support of the National Safety Council's Signs of Life program.

He pointed out that "an appalling number of highway-rail accidents each year are caused by motorists' failure to heed railroad grade crossing warning signs and signals."

He said the severity of such accidents is so much greater than other types of traffic casualties that the public must be made to realize "how fatal it is to try to beat a train to a crossing."

"More than 1,200 persons are killed annually in railroad grade crossing accidents in the U. S.," he said. "Thousands of persons are injured. Four out of 10 of these accidents occur at crossings at which there are gates, lights, bells, watchmen or combinations of these methods of protection."

Musick urged motorists and pedestrians to join in the nationwide drive to cut down on traffic accidents by carefully observing all traffic signs and signals. He gave these railroad-traffic safety hints:

1. Be sure all tracks are clear. Even though a train may have passed, there may be another train coming.

2. If there are no lights or audible signals at the railroad crossing, listen for the train whistle and noise of its approach, looking both ways before beginning to cross.

3. If there are gates, signal bells and warning lights at a

YOU CAN SPEED EVEN UNDER THE LAW

The cornerstone of speed control on the highway is the phrase "speed too fast for conditions." What is too fast for conditions? In the eyes of the law, any speed is too fast if it is not reasonable and prudent for existing conditions. Fifty on an icy road is too fast for conditions.

As far back as 1678 an accident to a child in a street of Newport, R. I., resulted in the Colonial Assembly enacting the following statute:

"Whereas there was very lately in the town of Newport on Rhode Island very great hurt done to a small child by reason of exceeding fast and hard riding of said horses in said town, this Assembly taking the matter into their serious consideration and being desirous for the future to prevent the like mischief, do ordain that from and after the publication hereof, if any person or persons shall presume to ride on either horse, mare or gelding, a gallup or to run speed in the streets of Newport—said person shall for his offense pay into the Treasurer of said town 5 shillings in money on demand; 2 shillings of which shall be paid to any persons that shall give information thereof and the other 3 shillings to remain for the use of said town."

That speed law, earliest recorded in the United States, set forth the theory of "reasonable and prudent" speed that still is basic 283 years later.

In every state that theory is implicit in the laws governing speed. Arrests can be made for driving slower than a posted speed—if unfavorable conditions make that speed too fast to be reasonable and prudent.

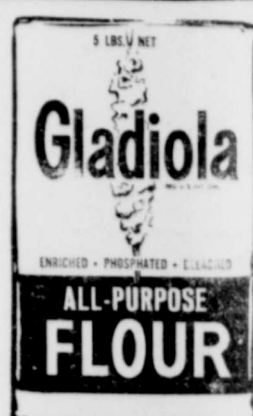
