She was representing Hale County in the district contest, having won in the county contest Dec. 3.

Terri and winners in other divisions of the District I contest will compete in the state contest in San Marcos Jan. 8-9.

Miss Sinclair, Cristie Givens, Karen McClendon and Donna Huffaker, all Hale County winners from Abernathy competed with 144 other winners from 21 counties in District I.

The "Make-It-Yourself With Wool" contest is designed to acquaint the youth market with the place of wool in the fabric and fashion market. It is the only sewing contest which has been on the approved list of the National Association of Secondary School Principals for eight years.

This contest is sponsored by the American Wool Council in cooperation with the Women's Auxiliary to the National Wool Growers, and by the state Sheep Growers Association.

The boys under Coach Wayne Preston sailed by Southland to the impressive tune of 81-58. The girls, coached by Coach Mitch LeMoine, sank the Southland fens 75-28 in a fine show of bench strength.

Miss Linda Miller, a Senior forward, led the 'Lope fens with 24 points on 9 field goals and 6 free throws. Close behind her were Donna Webb and Denise Barker, who scored 20 and 14 respectively. Despite their high totals, these three starters sat out the majority of the last half. Cindy Shadden and Judy Cade stayed on their toes in holding the opposing girls down to 28 points.

In the boys' game, two Antelopes broke the 20 mark in scoring. Junior Lane Wade put 26 through the hoop and Senior Terry Turner added 21 more to the scoreboard. Don McGeehee had 15 for the losers and Don Dabbs tallied 14. The 26-point output was the best of the year for Wade.

The boys started out cold and at the end of the first quarter were behind 17-12. This increased to 30-26 at halftime, but the 'Lopes woke up and led at end of the third quarter by a 54-41 tune. They finally broke loose in the final quarter and scored 27 points for the victory.

City Seeks Bids On Farm Land

Several subjects were discussed and reports made. The possibility of attracting more farmers as Chamber members was brought up. The wide variation was noted in the amount of support of present members.

Office expense for the month, supplies, etc., was reported as being only \$26.00. All projects entered into by the chamber have been paid for, and a balance of \$817.00 remains.

Erection of the Nativity Scene was discussed.

The highway 87-54 intersection problem was reported as being in Austin for study. It was brought out that should highway 87 be designated an expressway, all cross roads would have to either go over or under, thus eliminating the above mentioned 87-54 crossing problem.

Ted Hill was appointed a committee to arrange the date for the annual banquet and other planning necessary.

Of 100 notes sent to merchants of Abernathy asking their ideas on closing Saturday, Dec. 26, sixty-seven replies were received with 66 in favor of closing.

Meeting adjourned at 9:00 p. m.

The Abernathy High School varsity boys' and girls' basketball teams took first place in both divisions of the annual Abernathy Invitational Tournament. The Antelopes won the trophies last Saturday night in the finals of the annual tournament. The wins in the tournament, gave the girls a 10-1 season record and the boys an 8-1 record.

The Antelope girls advanced to the finals of the tourney by defeating Kress in the first game and then taking Cotton Center in the semi-finals. In the Kress game, the Abernathy girls led all the way for a 61-41 victory. Linda Miller put 20 points through the hoop despite the fact that she played most of the last half.

In the game against Cotton Center Friday night, the Abernathy fens outscored the Elkettes 67-51. The game started out very close, and was 16-15 on our side after the first quarter. This widened at the half to 36-29 and the Elkettes didn't threaten again. Donna Webb led in scoring with 28 while Denise Barker had 21 and Linda Miller added 16. Guard Cindy Shadden was a standout on defense.

In the finals, our girls took Dimmitt to the tune of 61-53. Donna Webb led once again in points scored with 29. Tied with her for high point honors from Dimmitt was Linda McColum. Once again, Cindy Shadden showed the defensive ability that made her an all-tournament selection.

In other girls' games Saturday, Ralls defeated Kress 45-25 for the consolation trophy. Cotton Center girls came out third after outscoring the Olton girls 18-2 in the last quarter for a 56-45 victory.

The all-tournament team was made up of two members from each of the first, second and third place teams. Forwards included Donna Webb, Abernathy; Linda McColum, Dimmitt; and Sherry Burnett, Cotton Center. Guards for the stellar squad were Jane Cleavenger, Dimmitt; Nancy Barrett, Cotton Center; and Cindy Shadden of Abernathy.

Boys Beat Frenship

The Antelope boys' team defeated Frenship to gain the championship. In a display of scoring strength, the 'Lopes built a 14-9 first quarter lead and began building from there. The game stayed fairly close until the last quarter when the 'Lopes outscored the Tigers 36-18 for the 78-54 victory. Lane Wade led in scoring with 24 while Terry Turner and Ronald Preston each tossed in 12.

The boys gained the finals by defeating Canyon and Kress in the preceding games. The 'Lopes defeated Kress by the score of 68-53 as Wade tossed in 27 points for high point honors. Pat Hale and Terry Turner each added 10 to the total. The 'Lopes met their toughest opponents in the Canyon Eagles on Saturday. With a strong full court press, they came from behind to defeat the Eagles. Despite being on the wrong end of a 26-17 halftime score, the 'Lopes came back to win it 60-51. Wade once again led in scoring with 17 points.

In the boys' bracket of the tourney, Canyon came back Saturday night to defeat Ralls 64-43 and gain the third place trophy. Consolation winner of the boys' bracket was won by Hale Center over Olton. The final score of that contest was 65-44 as Gil Hollingsworth chalked up 24 for the Owls.

Abernathy placed two out of five on the boys' all-tournament team. Members of the team were Jerry Holley of Ralls, Joe Moore of Canyon, David Burgamy of Frenship and Boyce Paxton and Lane Wade of Abernathy.

Funeral Held For Mr. Lesley

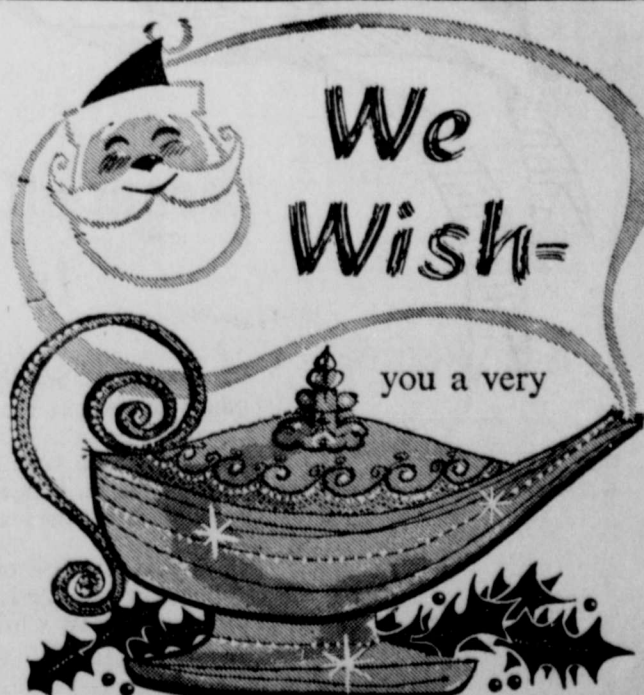

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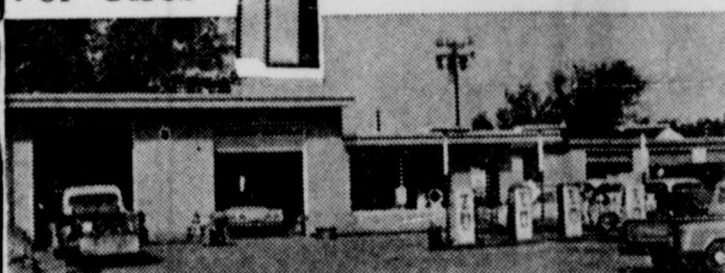
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City Council Has Meeting

The Abernathy City Council met in its regular session Monday night, December 14, with all aldermen present. The Council discussed a long agenda and met with several men to discuss matters concerning the city.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read to the Council by City Manager Charles Norwood. These were approved and accepted as read.

Attorney Malcolm Tisdell of Plainview then met with the Council to discuss the possibility of his becoming the legal advisor for the city. After a long discussion with Mr. Tisdell, the Council voted to accept his services and pay him the requested salary. Mr. Tisdell is also legal advisor for Hale Center.

Mr. Jack Moss of Bolinger, Segars and Company then met with the Council to discuss with the Council the 1963-1964 audit report. He then went through the booklet and explained to the Council the way in which the audit was presented. Anyone who would like a copy of this audit may acquire one at the office of City Manager Norwood. The Council accepted the audit as it was presented.

Mr. Smith, of Parkhill, Cooper and Smith Consulting Engineers, then met with the Council to discuss preliminary planning for the construction of the water pipeline between the city and the airport. Mr. Smith stated that they will probably be ready to receive bids around the first of January. He explained to the Council such things as the specifications that would be put on the pipeline.

The Council then discussed the extension of the lease of the airport facilities to Mr. McPherson, who is presently leasing it. Mr. McPherson is planning to bid on training cadets from Reese to fly light aircraft and he needed an extension in order to make his bid over a period of years. The Council voted to extend his lease, if he is successful, to the number of years called for in the agreement after it is completed. This would be a boon to Abernathy economically.

The Council voted to install three new street lights in the Virgil Phillips Addition on the north end of town. There are presently no street lights in the addition.

City Councilmen present at the meeting were Royce Hensen, W. T. Settle, Jim Bob Smith, Billy Skipper and Dan Z. Ward. The meeting was adjourned at 12:45 a. m.
