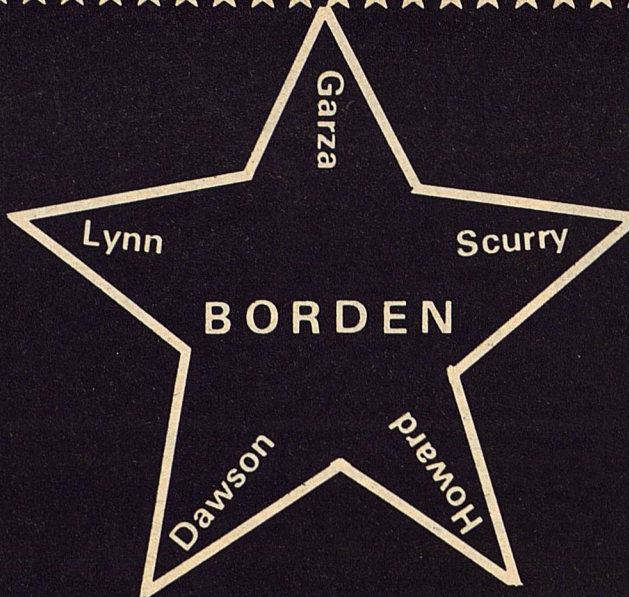

Soil Stewardship Week Set May 27 through June 3

High winds have kicked up dust storms this spring throughout much of Texas, and heavy rains that are sure to come sooner or later will rob more lands of precious topsoil. All this points to a greater need for soil conservation.

And calling greater attention to soil conservation is what Soil Stewardship Week is all about.

The annual nationwide observance will be May 27-June 3 this year, with the theme "Conservation: A Common Commitment."

Commitment is what is needed from everyone to reduce the loss of our

valuable soil and water resources.

We must all make a commitment to work toward this common objective, for it is from these natural resources that we reap the food and fiber that enables our very existence.

The Extension Service is joining the Association of Texas Soil and Water Conservation Districts and the State Board plus the Soil Conservation Service and others in this weeklong observance.

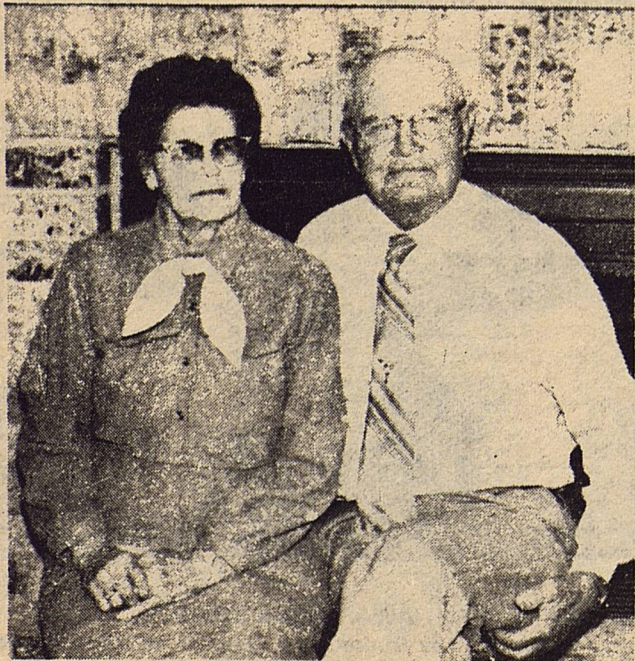
Let's keep America, the beautiful, and America, the greatest agricultural country on this earth. Join in local conservation efforts to protect our soil and water resources.

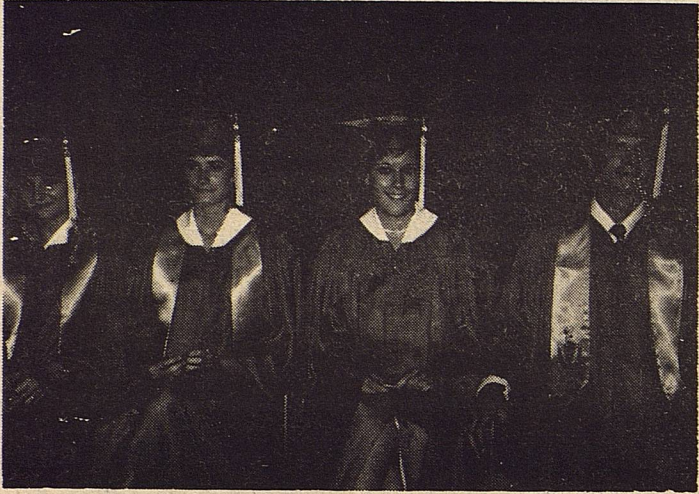

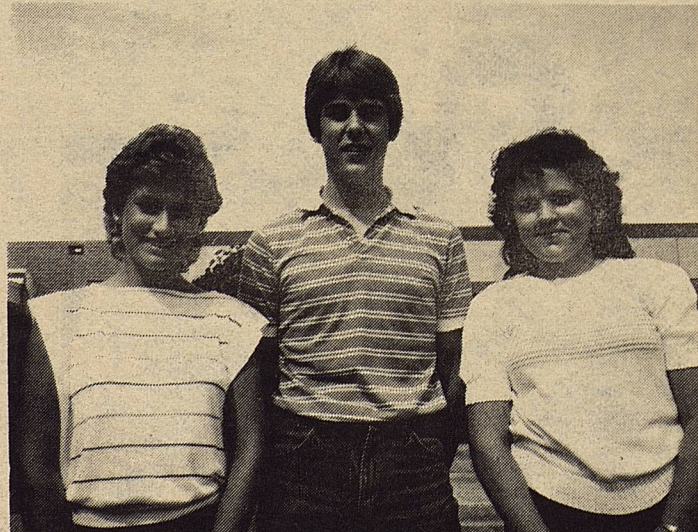

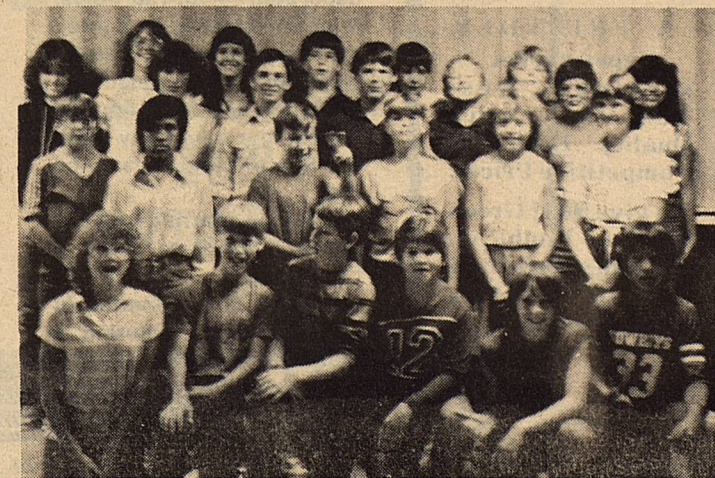

PLAN ACTIVITIES FOR THE KIDS THIS SUMMER

Don't let this summer be frustrating for both you and your children. Plan activities now to prevent the summer doldrums.

Kandy McWhorter, County Extension home economist says summer is a good time to plan activities for the whole family. "Older children can even do much of the planning," she says. "Whether it's a short trip or an old-fashioned picnic, the children will enjoy having part in the decision-making."

The opportunities for summer activities for children are limitless. Take your children to the library. Find out your child's special interest. A book on that topic could lead to building an object or collecting subjects that could stretch to summer-long activities.

Encourage older children to check out working for a neighbor. People planning vacations may need someone to mow the yard or weed the garden.

And a young person can

do some jobs around the house. Children need to learn basic skills and it's reasonable to expect a son or daughter to help with some of the everyday jobs, like window washing, cleaning, or even cooking.

Children can learn the basics of food preparation and summer time offers them time that they might not ordinarily have during the school year.

One family I know assigns each child a meal to prepare each week. The young person plans the meal, purchases the food and prepares it.

Families also can take advantage of the many community activities held during the summer. Whether it's a festival or parade, it offers the family an opportunity to participate and have some good fun together.

Remember, children may be tempted to spend hours viewing television. Unless the parent offers some positive suggestions, the later part of the summer will be spent in a very passive manner.

CROP CERTIFICATION

July 16 is the final date to report acreages of spring seeded crops and acreage conservation reserve (ACR). Your certification needs to be accurate. If the spotchecked acreage differs from the reported acreage by the larger of 1.0 acre or 5 percent, that COMMODITY is ineligible for program benefits. If the spotchecked ACR is less than the required ACR by the larger of 1.0 acre or 5 percent the FARM is ineligible for program benefits. In either case, you will be subject to liquidated damages if participating in the program. You will be required to report your irrigated and dryland acreages of all crops separately.

MEASUREMENT SERVICE

If you are not sure of your crop acreage or ACR measurement service on spring seeded crops and

ACR is available. Please wait until after you plant all your crops and know where the crops are planted, planting patterns, out spots, etc before filing your request. The fee for measuring this year is \$20. for the first 25 acres and then \$.05 for each crop acre over 25. If you file a measurement service request and your crop fails, your measurement service will be cancelled. You will be required to certify your crop before you can plow up the destroyed crop and replant to another crop. By July 16 you will need to certify the replanted crop along with any ACR required for the farm.

FAILED CROP ACRES

It is important to file a "574" prior to the mechanical destruction of any crop that fails. Failure to file a "574" could affect your deficiency payment and base for the crop. You should file the "574" on a total or partial loss of the crop.

PLANTING FOR DEFICIENCY

As was the case last year, deficiency payments, by law, are tied to PLANTED acreage of the program crop. We do not have the authority to waive this requirement. Please remember that cotton in our county is required to be replanted through June 20. After June 20 you may still replant or plant for the first time as long as you feel there

is a good chance of making a satisfactory yield. You are required to plant the same quantity and quality of seed as you would under normal conditions.

EMERGENCY HAY AND GRAZING

Due to the recent drought conditions Borden County producers have been approved for emergency haying and grazing of ACR. If interested, producers must file a request with this office prior to haying or grazing ACR. The rules are as follows:

- 1) Only ACR owned or operated by the applicant may be grazed or baled.
- 2) Only livestock owned by the applicant prior to April 18, 1984 will be eligible to graze ACR for the remainder of the non-grazing period or receive benefit from baled hay off ACR.
- 3) No baled forage or grazing from this ACR may be sold or given to another person
- 4) Applicant will need to provide us with the number and type of livestock to receive benefit from the

The final date to request a loan on 1983 crops of cotton and grain sorghum is May 31. The CCC loan rate for May is 10.875 percent.

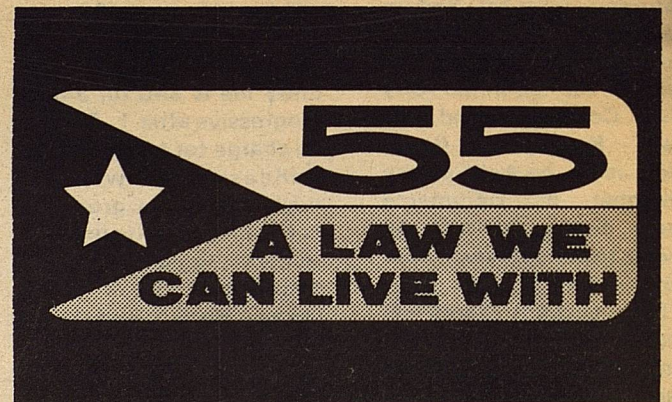
4-H Roundup Time



'83 Crop Receipts Slightly Down

Texas farmers got about \$4.1 billion from crop sales last year, down slightly from 1982. Although weather losses had a big impact on '83 crop receipts, the PIK (payment-in-kind) program helped buoy cash receipts. Cotton continued to be the leading cash crop in Texas, with receipts estimated at \$877 million. Receipts of other leading crops were wheat, \$638 million; grain sorghum, \$519 million; vegetables, \$370 million; corn, \$351 million; nursery crops, \$333 million; rice, \$191 million; soybeans, \$97 million; and peanuts, \$92 million.


