

City Water Report Ok By State Health Department

A report was received last Saturday by the Loraine Water Department from Austin stating that the contamination in the Loraine water had cleared up and the water is again suitable for drinking without boiling. Water for the last test was taken from the end of the main and also from the tank at the wells.

The first two tests sent in some time ago were taken from a hydrant at the city hall where very little water is used and it is supposed that the water had become contaminated in these pipes because of non-circulation.

Loraine water is good, as good as can be found anywhere, and it is perfectly safe to drink all you want of it without fear of illness.

The last two tests of the city water from the Texas Department of Health Laboratories show good, no contamination. Dr. T. A. Martin, city health officer, states he now considers city water perfectly safe.

SURVEYING OF RENTED ACRES IN COTTON PROGRAM

Every day the question is asked, "Who is going to come out and measure off the acres I am renting to the A A A's?" Or "When is the committeeman coming around to survey the acres I am renting to the A A A's?" Or "What kind of land shall I set aside for my rented acres?"

The answer to these questions are as follows: The farmer is to measure his own land. He should measure the rented acres so as to be sure that there is the true and exact number of acres set aside that he has contracted to take out of cotton production in off the land that is to be planted in cotton to be sure that there is not more than the number of acres planted to cotton that he agreed to in his contract. As to when the committeemen will be around to survey or measure the land the answer is "Not now". We do not know when. But we do know that the land will be inspected after July 1st, 1934 to see that all the provisions of the contract are being fulfilled. Question 3 is answered by, "The rented acres shall be a fair average in productivity of the cotton land. The rented acres shall not be washed, gullied or eroded acres. They must represent the average of the farm."

It is suggested by the county committee and the county agent that every farmer should place a post on each corner of the rented acres, and along each side stakes should be set at intervals of about every 100 yards. These stakes need not be very large, but should be well set so they can not be easily destroyed or removed from the ground.

TEXAS STATE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH

Austin, Texas-Looking out on the world with clear vision is the birthright of each and every one, according to Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer. Texas has many hundred persons that are blind or with impaired vision. These figures would be more tragic if given for the period before the law was passed making it mandatory the use of prophylactic drops in the eyes of new born babies. Since then blindness caused by birth infections has been greatly reduced.

In the examination of school children other diseases of the eye are encountered quite frequently. Chief among these is trachoma. This disease is contagious and causes a destructive inflammation characterized by the formation of trachoma granulations. These gradually form scar tissue. Trachoma, if left untreated, will impair the vision and eventually cause blindness. This happens when the proper treatment is not given or the diagnosis and treatment is not given in its early stages.

Trachoma is most prevalent where sanitary conditions are worst. The prevention of this disease consists not only in avoiding the infection but maintaining sanitary conditions. Parents should watch closely for any indication of anything wrong with the vision of their children. Many diseases of the eye readily respond to treatment in their early stages but, if allowed to develop, may seriously affect the vision if not causing blindness.

Street Open To School Building

An old eyesore to Loraine has been removed. In its place a first class street has been opened. We refer to Lightfoot Street leading to the school building. Heretofore this street has been almost impassable up the hill because of large boulders and the steep incline. Now the boulders have been removed and the incline cut down considerably and a good coat of gravel put on it. It is a main street leading to the school building and will be of much benefit to the town and community. It would be fine if gravel can be placed on the street for its entire length.

PLANNING AHEAD

Now is the time to be planning ahead as to how to use the acres rented by the Government and being taken out of cotton production in 1934 and 1935. Plan to use the acres in such manner as will produce sufficient foods for the family-plan to get a variety as well as abundance. Plan the garden so that many different vegetables will be gathered, and vary the planting dates so that all of anyone vegetable will not be ready for consumption and canning at one time.

Careful planning and planting will make it possible to have many different kinds of vegetables for the family. People soon tire of one kind of bean or pea. They soon tire of the same old thing. The farm family can and should produce Snap beans, all kinds of peas, green pepper, corn, lima beans, pinto beans, squash, carrots, jellies preserves, fruit juices, potatoes, tomatoes, watermelons, cantaloupes, kershaw, pumpkins, and such vegetables used in making relishes. These consumption and also supply the surplus for canning. Meats and meat products can be added to this also. Fried chicken, boned chicken, barbecue chicken, and sausage may also be canned. From the by products you may can your scrapple, liverpaste, mince meat, soup and many other interesting products. Raise plenty of cucumbers for pickles.

Now is the time to get ahead. The A A A is renting our land and turning it back to us with the suggestion that we produce the many foods that we need, and the foods that will put us on our feet financially. A dollar saved is a dollar made. By careful planning and diligent work we can to a marked degree. Our cotton should bring a better price, our garden should cut down our living expenses, and our canned goods should carry us through the coming winter with reduced expenses.

Sandusky, who practiced law in Colorado since 1906 until he suffered a stroke of paralysis in 1932, this week authorizes announcement of her candidacy for nomination to the office of County Treasurer of Mitchell County, subject to the Democratic primary.

Mrs. Sandusky was before her marriage, Miss Sally Louise Geers, daughter of Col. C. W. Geers, for 40 years publisher of the Denton Monitor and who came near being elected Lieutenant Governor of Texas many years ago. He was a prominent Democratic leader of the State and a newspaperman who attracted unusual attention in the profession. Mrs. Sandusky has two brothers, Otis Geers, Tulsa and Will Geers of Oklahoma who are still in the newspaper business.

Judge L. W. Sandusky came to Colorado 28 years ago a young lawyer to follow the practice of law and was very successful until he was stricken with apoplexy in September, 1932, which incapacitated him from active

practice. He and Mrs. Sandusky were married two years after he came here and have made their home in Colorado ever since.

Mrs. Sandusky of course is capable of performing the duties of County Treasurer efficiently and satisfactorily, and promises if elected to devote her time to the office and render the best possible service to the public. She sincerely solicits the vote and influence of the people all over the county and assures them that any consideration given her will be gratefully received.

"I hope to be able to see everybody personally and solicit their consideration," she said, "but in the meantime I want everyone to know I will be grateful for their help and will try to merit the same."
