

Local Sales Taxes Showing Increase

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday sent check totaling \$56.8 million in local sales tax payments to the 1,003 cities that levy the one-

percent city tax. Houston received the largest check, \$9.5 million, bringing their total 1985 payments to \$86.2 million, up four per-

cent over last year. Locally, Blossom has received \$788.34 this period, bringing their 1985 total to date \$7,792.84 for a 22.58% in-

crease from 1984. Deport received a check for \$677.22 for a \$5,633.63 total to date, marking a 30.56% increase from last year.

Bogata received \$1,303.22 this period, compared to \$666.81 for the same period last year, for a 10.49% increase over the payments to date last year of \$11,964.67.

Talco received a check for \$1,430.29, marking a 7.25% decrease over last year's payment of \$1,556.46 for the same period.

Chapman, Hargett In Full Swing

State Rep. Sam Russell announced that he is endorsing Democrat Jim Chapman in his bid to be the next representative for the First Congressional District.

Chapman is running against Republican Edd Hargett in a special election set for August 3.

Russell had come in third in an eight-man ballot on the June 29 election.

In other action, Texas State Senator Ed Howard announced that he was counting himself completely out of the race.

He announced that "I am, and intend to remain, a Democrat. I have no intention of endorsing the Republican candidate in the race. Neither do I intend to endorse his op-

ponent, but will remain out of the race altogether."

The runoff election is necessary because neither Chapman nor Hargett polled a majority in the first election held when Rep. Sam Hall resigned to accept a Federal Judgeship.

The campaign is heating up between Chapman and Hargett, with Republican Hargett expressing the opinion that Chapman is allied with Liberals, and Chapman denying the accusation, and saying that he better knows the needs and wants of the first district.

Both candidates have appeared locally a number of times, and both did well in Lamar, Red River and Titus Counties.

Light Shows And Distrust In Luxor

Still sailing with me? It's a slow time of year, so these articles fill in some space, and the response to them has been great.

After Aswan and Esna we spent one morning sitting on the upper deck of the boat at Dendera, a tiny village of probably a hundred people and watched life go on there.

I almost had to go to the cabin when the boat threw its plastic trash bag of garbage overboard, and the kids swarmed it and pulled it to shore...but stuck it out, and realized that it wasn't food they were after.

They fed scraps to the dogs, and kept empty plastic containers and the things that "rich" tourists think aren't work keeping became instant treasures to them.

The black-clad women took about their hard work with eyes cast down rather than looking up at us, but the children and men ignored us completely.

They cut clover for fodder, carrying donkey load after load from the fields to the village.

Tiny branches and twigs of firewood were carted in too, and after that work was done, the youngsters had a time to gallop around on the backs of the donkeys.

Then it was time to sail, and we went down the river to Luxor, one of the larger cities besides Cairo.

In Luxor we encountered the first, and only, sense of distrust among the people. The concierge of the boat ex-

plained that in Luxor they trust no one from "outside" because some years ago an unknown group bought up the land around Luxor at nearly nothing, then resold it only weeks later for a fortune because of the dam project.

That night we sat in the huge Karnak temple and watched and listened to the magnificent sound and light show there. The breeze blew, swallows, disturbed by the noise, flew overhead, and spotlights picked out ruins for miles in every direction.

In Luxor, too, Jayne had a boy ask her to change some bills for him (not an uncommon request). But when she pulled out her money, several men surrounded her, jabbering and pulled the roll of bills away from her. The boy had already started counting money out, so she snatched that money and her own roll back, and the two of us promptly got on teh bus, which drove off, leaving the group shouting and waving after us.

Imagine our absolute astonishment when we found she had managed to retrieve not only her own money, but about five pounds of theirs! It was the only unpleasant incident of the entire trip, and ended with her having a little accidental revenge on them!

After a late night at the sound and light show, six o'clock seemed early, but a droopy eyed group was ready to go to what was really a highlight of the trip...the Valley of the Kings, Queens and Nobles.

Hot, dry and dusty, the climate has changed from the time of the

pharaohs, when there were lush forests and green lawns there.

As we went deeper and deeper into various tombs, the paintings became richer, brighter, more intricate and beautiful.

The depredations of tomb robbers have long since taken away the solid gold ornaments, the jewels and precious incense urns, but the huge marble tombs, and the glorious paintings remain intact, deep within burial chambers begun when a king took the throne, and worked on all his life.

High above, in the sun-filled sky, clouds of vultures circled, reminding one of the sacred vultures painted on the tombs.

The queens were buried with no less beauty, and the nobles only slightly less.

It was indeed, the realization of a dream that has existed since childhood for me.

From there, we went once more on Air Egypt, again, having dry croissants thrown at us by stewardesses, and landed in the evening in Cairo, to finish up our sightseeing there.

PJC Tuition Increase Is Minimal

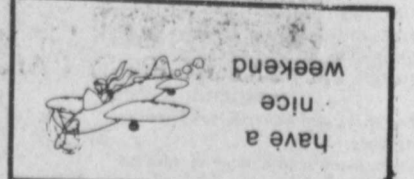
A slight increase in tuition was approved during the June 24 meeting of the Paris Junior College Board of Regents, according to Dr. Eric Priest, vice president of student services.
 Since PJC was not required to triple tuition this fall, costs are up only slightly, Priest explained. Starting with fall semester registration, tuition for in-district students will increase \$2 per credit hour. Tuition for out-of-district residents will increase \$8 per credit hour but the out of district fee will no longer be charged, so the increase will not actually amount to that much. No college fees will be increased.
 An in district student enrolled for 15 credit hours will pay \$205 for tuition and fees, only a \$30 increase from last year. For 15 semester hours, an out of district student will be charged \$285 rather than the \$225 charged last year. In district residents are those who live inside the Paris city limits or the Cunningham school district and pay PJC taxes, while out of district residents are those living elsewhere in Texas and Oklahoma.
 The average age of PJC students is 26, and about 30 percent of the students work full time to help pay for their education. "It's the pay offs in better career opportunities and lifetime earnings that make college a good investment," Priest said.

Freezing Is Easy

The Texas summer weather is fantastic! Everything is growing: the grass, the crops, the weeds, the bugs but most of all, the gardens. After you have served your family corn, okra and greens three times a day, given corn, okra and turnips and greens to the neighbors and they begin to bolt their door when you appear, it is time for action. But, what can be done with the bountiful summer crop?

Fresh produce can be preserved. Preserving food now for use during the cold, gray winter months will produce scrumptious foods and extend the winter food budget.

Fresh fruits and vegetables can be preserved by drying, freezing, canning and use of a root cellar. The ultimate goal in preserving food is to maintain a quality close to fresh product such as taste, texture and color. Those qualities are maintained by current food preservation techniques, quality packaging and correct storage.

To freeze fruits, sort, wash, drain and remove seeds and stems. The fruit may be frozen dry, with sugar or in a sugar syrup. Remember, if adding sugar or a syrup, jot down the sugar percentage on the package label. Later, you may wish to use the fruit in a cake, the sugar measurement is critical.

Next, freezing vegetables, all vegetables must be washed, drained and blanched. The mysterious blanching process is quite simple. It involves two steps, dipping the prepared vegetable in boiling water, holding until the water comes to a boil for a stated period of time. Remove and place vegetables in cold not lukewarm water. Blot the vegetables. Water left on produce will cause the vegetables to dry out and be tasteless. Now, it is onward to packaging in a moisture vapor-proof container, label and freeze.

Freezing is a quick and easy method of preserving food. You do not need special equipment, just moisture vapor-proof containers and a freezer that will maintain 0 degree temperature. Frozen food has an excellent color, fresh like flavor, cleaning is done, it is pre-cooked and therefore, saves cooking time.

The City will apply excess revenues collected from a class of users to the cost of operation and maintenance attributable to that class for the next year and adjust the rates accordingly. User Charge System-The rates hereinafter set out are hereby established for the use of sewerage services and facilities for single-family residences within the corporate limits of the city. With no further business, chapter closed in regular form. Next meeting will be August 13 at 7:30 p.m. All members are urged to attend.



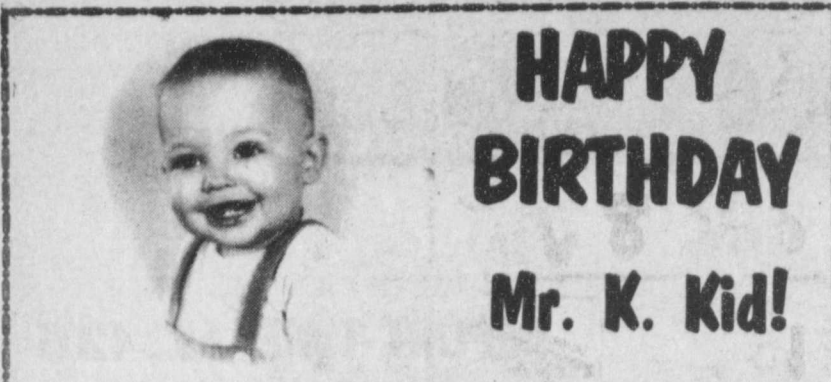

The Scarey Phonograph

By Wm. C. Barnard
Record players were not always the high fidelity, complex, electrical instruments that they are today.

Edison discovered the principal of reproducing the sound of human voices in 1877. This was a mechanical contraption, and no electrical components were involved.

The machine did not come into general use until about 25 years later because no one had come up with an economical method of making the records.

About 1910 the record manufacturing process was solved and graphophones or phonographs began to appear on the market.

We lived in Aberdeen, a small frontier lumber town on Grays Harbor in Washington. A family who lived in the next block from us got a graphophone.

The lady invited my Mother, along with several other neighbor women and children to come see and hear the new curiosity.

My Mother went and I went along. The thing wasn't very impressive to look at, just a little box sitting on a stand table. However, there was a great big horn that looked like a mammoth morning glory blossom sitting at an angle on top. After a little visiting and small talk with the guests, the hostess cranked the spring motor and started the turn table.

That is when things began to happen. The big horn started talking in a screechy, scratchy voice and the kids started running. I ran through the door and didn't look back until I got home.
