Edgar Graham discovered the fire when he went to the trash barrel back of his cafe and pastry shop a few doors north of Vaughn's.

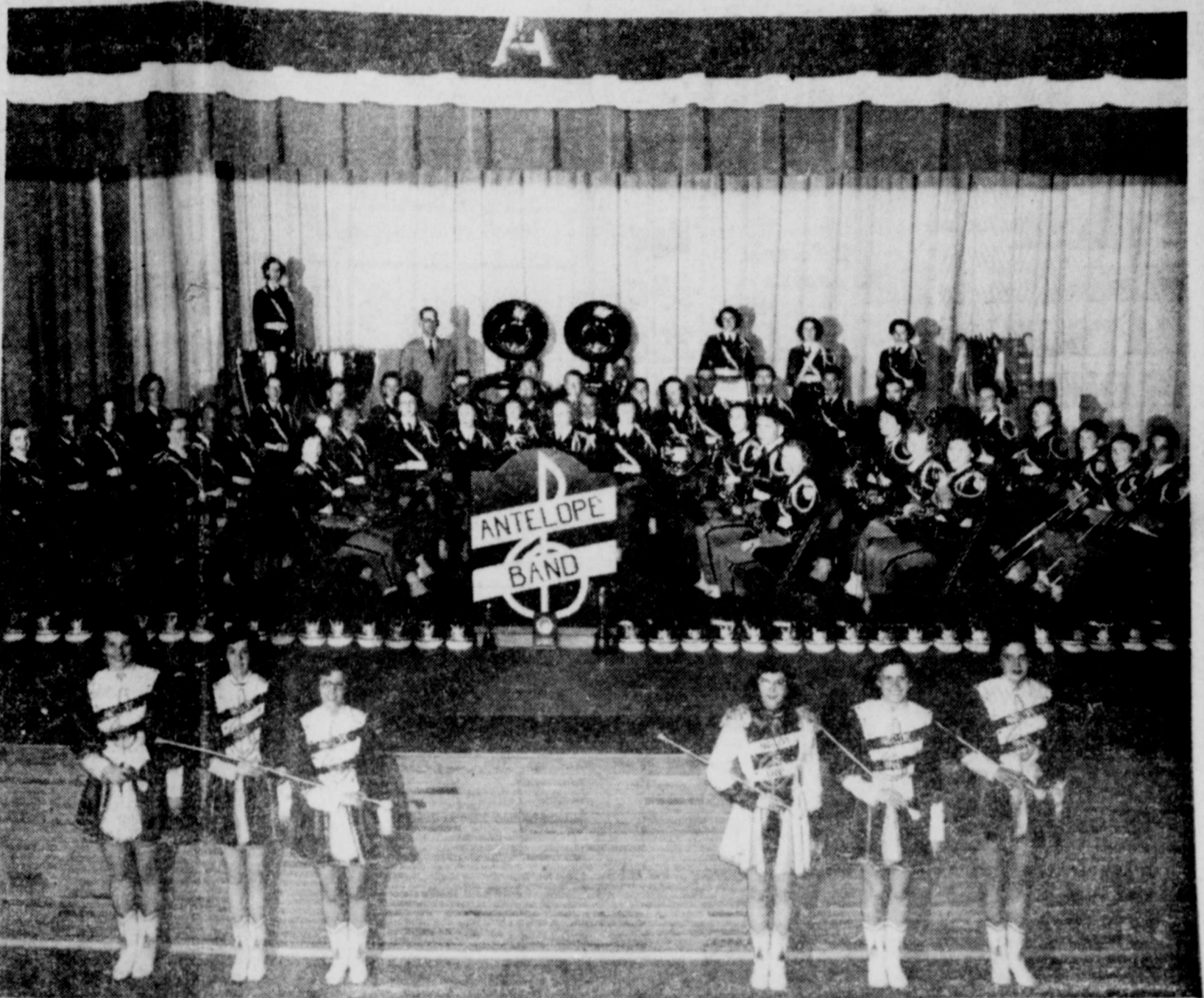

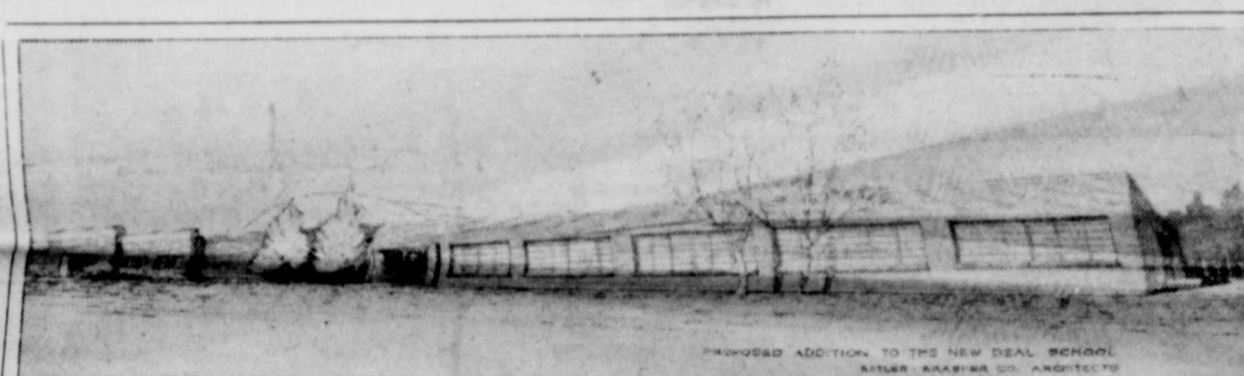
**GARDNERS TO OPEN

**RURAL MAIL BOX
IMPROVEMENT WEEK
APRIL 28-MAY 3RD**

The post Office department has designated the week of April 28 through May 3 as Rural Mail Box Improvement Week. It was announced this week by Postmaster W. A. Richter.

Rural mail boxes which are not properly erected or which are not in good condition retard the delivery of mail and expose it to damage from the elements, Mr. Richter pointed out.

It is the desire of the department to encourage patrons of rural delivery service to provide suitable mail receptacles and to erect them in such manner that they will be readily accessible to the carrier and present a neat appearance.

It is especially desirable that the boxes be maintained in a condition that will assure proper protection to mail placed therein, that the names of the box owners be inscribed on the side of the box visible to the carrier as he approaches them, and that the boxes and their supports be kept painted.
