Work Progresses On Tile Plant

Work is progressing nicely on the Santa Anna Tile Plant and a part of the equipment has arrived with more of it expected to be here almost any day. Work was started this week on the kiln and it is expected to take from five to six weeks for its completion.

The Bob Trinkline family of Austin was due to arrive here this week and they will live in the former W. E. Baxter home in the west part of town.

Electricians are rapidly completing the principal part of the wiring of the building and other construction workers are keeping their work on schedule.

Plans call for the plant to begin operation about the first of September. It will start on a small scale and will gradually increase production when the capacity production is reached.

National Guard Activities

On Sunday, July 12, 1953, we returned from two weeks at North Fort Hood, Texas. The main body of the company arrived at 8:30 and the vehicles driven by M/Sgt. Thomas Stiles, Sgt. William Sharp, Pfc. Thomas Bailey and Pvt. Kenneth Grant arrived at 10:30. The men were all tired but had the sense of accomplishment that comes from doing a hard job and being able to finish it by saying "Well Done."

We left here on Sunday, June 28, 1953, at 8:00 and arrived at North Fort Hood at 10:30. The rest of that day and Monday morning was spent in organizing for the coming two weeks. Monday afternoon, the actual training started. Each year the training is under the guidance and supervision of regular army personnel. Our instructor this year was Major Fiori from 4th Army Headquarters, who had the tank companies of the division.

Monday afternoon, Tuesday and Wednesday was spent on the firing ranges with the men learning to fire the Cal. 30 Machine Guns on the tanks. Then on Thursday and Friday, the company was to run the Individual Tank Commanders Course in conjunction with troops from the rifle companies. The first tank to run the course was commanded by Sgt. Roy A. Gibson. He was to fire the Cal. 50 Machine Gun at an aerial target. The head spacing on the machine gun was set wrong and as Sgt. Gibson fired his first shot the gun exploded, wounding him in the right thigh. Much to everyone's relief, the wound was not serious. We did get a good example of how fast our Medical Corps can go into action. M/Sgt. Shag Garrett, the platoon sergeant, then took Sgt. Gibson's crew through the course. The crew was made up of Cpl. Gary Patterson, gunner, Sgt. Jimmy Regian, cannoneer, Pfc. Charles Hosch, bow gunner, and Pvt. Charles Davis, driver. The lieutenant from the 136th Tank Battalion that was running the course reported that this crew was the best crew that ran the course. The lieutenant particularly commented on the excellent firing done by bow gunner Pfc. Charles Hosch.

On Saturday, July 4th, the company participated in the review and parade with the rest of the division, then was released for the week end. We had Mr. Sam H. Collier, affectionately called "Captain Sam" by those who served under him, as our guest for lunch on that day. He had come down to see the parade and visit with old friends.

On Monday morning, the company moved out to the bivouac area, and the new men in the company started their first taste of life in a pup tent. The big problems confronting the men at this time was poison ivy, poison oak and threat of copperheads and stinging scorpions. For the most part the men were successful in combating the last two elements, with the exception of Sfc. Ray Owen who found the threat of copperheads ever present, but the first two elements have several members dutifully scratching. The company had a company attack on Tuesday followed by the Army Training Test on Wednesday. On Thursday, they moved to the firing range to fire the big 75mm guns on the tanks, moving back into camp Thursday afternoon. Friday, tank maintenance was the big thing on the agenda and the tanks were turned in on Saturday morning. Saturday afternoon was taken up with preparation for the return trip home on Sunday morning.

Every camp has its interesting sidelights to relieve the boredom and strain of routine training and this camp was no exception. The biggest thing happened three times each day, that is, the race to see who was to be first in chow line. The company received an overall rating of "Superior" this year, the highest grade it could get and the highest made so far. On the Army Training Test, we placed third with a score of 234. Major Fiori the 4th Army Inspector, gave the company his rating as "the best tank company in the Division." As Capt. Jesse K. Barton, the company commander said, "The men themselves, their parents, friends, relatives at home might well be proud of the showing made by their company at camp this year."

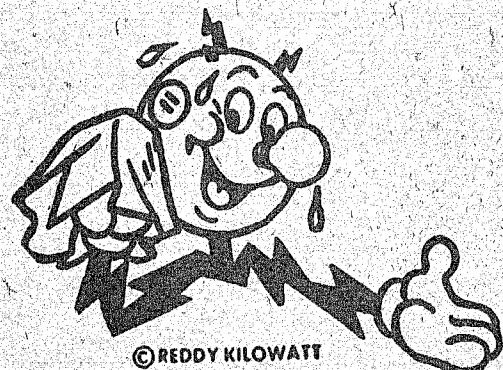

LET'S TALK LIVESTOCK BY TED GOULDY



Ft. Worth — Demand for stocker and feeder cattle and calves again led most classes of cattle and calves into higher ground as the trade opened at Ft. Worth's stockyards Monday. The brightest spots was the demand for stocker cows. Stocker cows were such a slow commodity three weeks ago that they were virtually unquotable and some good ones sold as low as \$7 and \$8, these kinds compared with cows sold at \$12 to \$14.50 at Fort Worth Monday, easily an advance of \$5 to \$6 per hundred in three weeks. Small calves at side sold today at \$13 to \$17.50, would have done well at \$10 to \$12 three weeks ago. Stocker calves selling up to \$18.50, a few to \$18.75, were 25 to 50 cents up or more.

Slaughter cattle sold fully steady, and spots forced into higher levels by the stocker play. Slaughter calves were spotty, packers again taking a bearish view on the early rounds, but weakening from it in face of good shipper and stocker demand.

Hogs hit the highest peak of the year topping at \$26.25 and \$26.50 and sows drew \$20 to \$23. Pigs cashed at \$20 down.

Feeder lambs were up 50 cents, selling \$10 to \$15. Slaughter ewes were 50 cents higher at \$3.50 to \$5. Other sheep were fully steady.

Good and choice fed steers and yearlings sold from \$17 to \$22. Common and medium sorts sold from \$10 to \$15, with cull yearlings \$8 to \$12. Fat cows drew \$10

to \$14, a few heiferettes above that range. Canners and cutters drew \$7 to \$10, some shells under \$7. Bulls sold at \$8 to \$14.50.

Good and choice fat calves \$15 to \$19, some yearlings weights around 500-600 lbs. or more to \$20.00 and above. Common and medium butcher calves drew \$10 to \$15, with culls \$7 to \$10.

Good and choice stocker steer calves \$15 to \$18.75, and a load of heifer calves topped at \$18. Stocker steer yearlings of the better kinds sold from \$14 to \$16.50. Stocker cows drew \$9 to \$14.50, a few above that range.

Good and choice fat lambs drew \$18 to \$23.00, and common and medium sorts sold for \$10 to \$15, with culls \$8 to \$10. Feeder and stocker lambs sold from \$10 to \$15. Old ewes drew \$3.50 to \$5, some solid mouthed ewes \$6 to \$6.50. Old wethers \$6 to \$8. Two-year-olds \$10 down. Fat yearling wethers drew \$10 to \$15, and feeder yearlings cashed at \$10 to \$12. Old bucks \$2 to \$3.

FIRES HUNT GAME COVER

Austin — Hunters and fishermen stand to lose mightily if fires recur in wooded areas, observed the Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

He said one major damage from fire is to game habitat. Also, he added, fires that kill trees and blacken grass cause erosion and, in the end, that means filled up streams and lakes.

The Executive Secretary called attention to a new state law which authorizes closing hunting and fishing where fires become a menace.

He said he thought hunters and fishermen are entitled to some protection against being blankly blamed for all fires. He suggested the best approach is to do their own policing and also to be alert to check on fires caused by cigarets tossed by motorists.

The Executive Secretary urged

the citizenry in the grass lands as well as on the woods land to be particularly careful with fire during the current drought.

Texas FFA Boys To Have Convention In Fort Worth Soon

Fort Worth — Three thousand Texas farm boys will swarm into Fort Worth late this month for the Silver Jubilee convention of Texas Future Farmers of America.

This year's convention, July 22-24, will mark the 25th anniversary of the founding of FFA and a full program of fun, entertainment and general convention activities has been lined up for the youthful farmers.

A special feature of this year's convention will be a massive downtown FFA parade. The parade, scheduled for Wednesday, July 22, at 2 p. m. will feature FFA boys in all types of conveyances and a moving display of all kinds of farm equipment. Several bands will add to the color and festivities, marking the arrival in Fort Worth of the Future Farmers.

The convention as usual, will be marked by the announcement of winners of statewide award. Here the boys will find out who has been picked as Star Lone Star Farmer of Texas, the highest honor which can come to one of the young men enrolled in vocational agriculture in Texas high schools.

This announcement will be made at the Lone Star Farmer Banquet in the exhibit building at Will Rogers Memorial Center on Thursday, July 23, at 7 p. m.

Arrangements for the convention are being made in Fort Worth by committees of the Ft. Worth Farm and Ranch Club, which is serving as official sponsor. Working closely with these committees are State FFA Adviser Vannoy Stewart and the state officers headed by Joe Dan Boyd of Winnsboro, president.

Cottonteed Stored For 15 Years Still Germinates

College Station — Under controlled conditions, cottonteed has been stored for periods up to 15 years and germination was good at the end of the test period. The percentage of germination was most effected by moisture and temperature, says Fred C. Elliott, cotton specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Seed from two upland cotton varieties were used in the tests which were conducted jointly by the Tennessee Experiment Station and the USDA. The seed were divided into lots and adjusted to moisture levels ranging from 7 to 14 percent. Samples of each were stored in constant temperatures of 90, 70 and 33 degrees Fahrenheit. Similar lots were stored at normal uncontrolled air temperatures at Knoxville, Tennessee.

After 15 years in storage, Elliott says, seeds kept at 33 degrees F. with 7, 9, and 11 percent moisture still germinated well. Those stored at 13 percent moisture showed some deterioration while those with 14 percent moisture were all dead after 15 years.

Seeds stored at 70 degrees and with 7 percent moisture for 15 years still showed 73 percent of the seed capable of germinating. All lots stored at 70 degrees with more than 7 percent moisture were dead at the end of the test period.

Seeds stored at uncontrolled air temperature did not fare so well, says Elliott. Only those with a moisture content below 7 percent survived beyond three years in storage and all lots were dead after 13½ years.

Most rapid deterioration of seed occurred at 90 degrees.

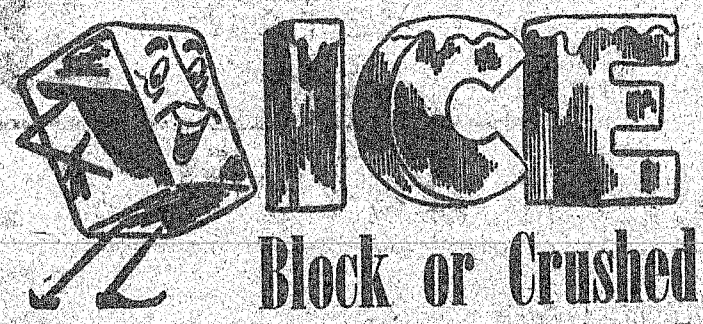

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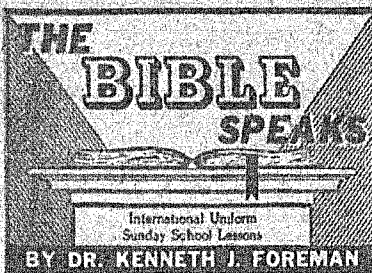

One World

Lesson for July 19, 1953

"ONE world" sounds simple. But even these simple words stir a great many different ideas in different people's minds. Some, when they hear the phrase, laugh a loud cynical laugh. "One world —? Nonsense! Anybody who calls himself a one-worlder is obviously soft in the brain. Look at the facts of life in 1953. Do you see any symptoms whatever that the world is ever going to be one?" Others, when they hear these two simple words, think, "Why not? It ought not to be so difficult. If you put the entire living human race into one box it would not have to be more than half a mile on each side; you could dump it into the Grand Canyon and lose it. If the whole of mankind were drowned in Lake Champlain (about 600 square miles) the level of that lake would not rise six inches. Why can't we all get together instead of tearing each other's throats all the time?"

How Christians See It

Christians, when they are wise, do not think the idea of one world is absurd, nor do they think it easy. Let us brush aside two one-world notions that Christians who take their Bible seriously cannot accept. One of these is the notion that the world is, now, really one whether we know it or not. It is not one. It is not even two. It is a mess of little worlds all more or less at war. People sometimes talk of differences of race and class and creed as if they made no difference. But they do make a difference; and no amount of soft-talking is going to make a man who has to earn his living, look at life the way a man does whose grandfather left him so much he doesn't have to work. The native African who has been shoved off the best land, can't possibly be "one" with the white settlers who

shoved him off.

But It Ought to Be

On the other hand, the Christian does not give up, cynically, and think that nothing can be done about this. The Christian, when he is close to the thought and ideal of Jesus and of Paul, or in other words the Christian who takes God's revelation seriously, sees every reason to believe that the world ought to be one. He believes that God "made of one all the nations of the earth" (Acts 17:26) — that we are all akin, that "the Colonel's lady and Judy O'Grady are sisters under the skin." The Christian can see that in spite of the terrific differences that separate human beings — and there is no reason to try to iron these out or to wish all mankind to be made in an identical pattern — the Christian can see that what we human beings have in common is more important than what we do not have in common. We have all the same Creator, the Father-God of all. We are all created for the same purpose — as one church expresses it, "to glorify God and to enjoy him forever." The Commandments, Love God and Love your neighbor as yourself, are not copyrighted by any church. They are not private rules; they are God's will for all human beings. The world ought to be one!

How It Can Be

And the world can be one — in Christ. As J. B. Phillips translates Paul's words in Eph. 2: "Christ is our living Peace. He has made a unity of the conflicting elements . . . He reconciled both (Jew and Gentile) to God by the sacrifice of one Body on the Cross, and by this act made utterly irrelevant the antagonism between them . . . It is through Him that both of us now can approach the Father in the one Spirit." Missionaries can tell you how true this is. In every land and climate and race on earth, there are Christians at this very day. Let us never forget this. There are Christians in Russia, there are Christians inside the Arctic Circle and along the steaming rivers of the rainforests of the Equator. On the face of it, nothing could be more unlikely than that an American, an Englishman or a Swiss (for example) could go to tribesmen in West China so savage that even the Chinese in a thousand years have not made a dent on them, and those same savages make (through Christ) brothers and sisters. But it has been done! Every time you are helping missions you bring the One World nearer.

IT'S THE LAW in Texas

CHECK TITLE WHEN PURCHASING HOME

A real estate title is claim of ownership, or your right to land you have purchased. Most of us have little or no idea of the pos-

sible pitfalls in acquiring a good title when we buy a home. Many prospective home buyers' title difficulties result from commonly held misconceptions of the significance of certain kinds of real estate papers.

If you can prove your title against all the world, it is a good title. If, in addition, the evidence of your claim of ownership is contained in proper public records, it is a good record title. Ordinarily only a good record title is salable.

How do you know if you are receiving a good title to property you plan to purchase? The safest method is to have a title examination made — that is, a careful study of the abstract and

other title evidence.

Here are a few of the common sources of trouble in real estate transactions to show why the minor expense of a title examination is justified.

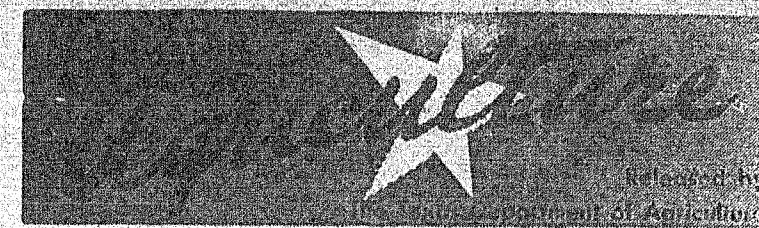
Many persons sign "earnest money contracts" believing that they are mere receipts with no serious implications. In reality they may specify, among other things, the kind of title you must accept.

A "warranty deed" from a responsible seller is comforting to have but it is a poor substitute for a careful title examination. A warranty deed does not guarantee a marketable title.

Moreover, serious title defects may not come to light until long after the seller on a warranty deed is dead, has moved to an unknown address, or is bankrupt. Even if he is available a good title is much better than a law suit.

The fact that the seller has possession of an "abstract" does not mean that he owns the property. An abstract is only a history of a title. Possession of an abstract no more indicates ownership of land than possession of the history of Texas means that you own the state.

Some purchasers of land feel safe because the title is being examined at the time of purchase by an attorney for the mortgage lenders. This seems logical but is a dangerous theory. Mortgage lenders are sometimes willing to accept less than good record title as security. This is sound business for them because, among other reasons, the chances are that the mortgage will be paid off so that no expense in perfecting the title would ever need be incurred. It is risky business for you when you are putting your life savings into the purchase.



TEXAS FEDERAL COOPERATION

Should Texas abide by all the projects and directives from Washington? Which joint programs are the most worthwhile?

The answer is obvious in some cooperative projects now in operation within our state. Certainly the commodity market

news which keeps producers informed on current prices is aided immeasurably by joint federal-state efforts. And no one objects when U. S. aid is rushed to states paralyzed by drought.

But where does federal cooperation end and federal encroachment begin?

A prime case in point is the Texas-Federal Fruit & Vegetable Inspection Service. An average of a half-million dollars is involved in this project annually. This money is collected in Texas from vegetable growers, buyers and shippers. It is of vital importance particularly in East and South Texas and other areas where commercial vegetables and fruits are grown.

In return, the products are inspected and graded in a uniform manner. This allows qualified Texas fruits & vegetables to be shipped out-of-state where they command prices comparable to those received by products from all other areas of the country.

This program is valuable and needed by all phases of the fruit and vegetable industry. Yet the question arises — who should control the functions of such a joint project? The obvious answer is that both parties should at least have 50-50 rights. But here is how the situation stands at present.

The most recent agreement with the federal government was drawn up and signed Aug. 1, 1949. Under its terms, the federal

authorities exercise almost complete control over state employees hired on the project. Federal agents can even veto expenditures of money believed necessary by state agents. And some 10 per cent of this Texas money is funneled directly into federal coffers.

The State Department of Agriculture has submitted a new contract to the federal government in the hope of remedying some of these defects. Texas money collected for Texas projects should be spent in Texas. Texas authorities should have control over their state employees. But to date, officials of the U. S. D. A. Fruits & Vegetables Branch have refused to sign the contract — a contract which is in every way similar to those of other states where the cooperative project exists.

Texas deserves the rights granted other states. The present contract is a perfect example of federal encroachment.

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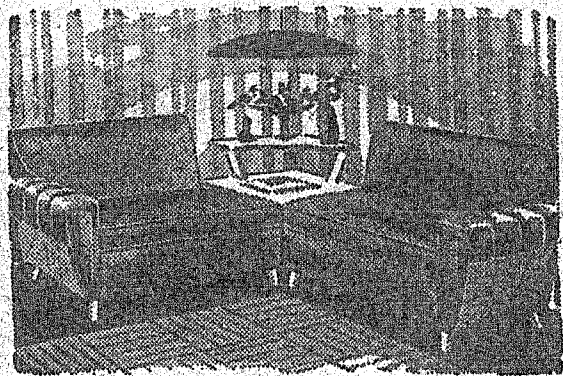

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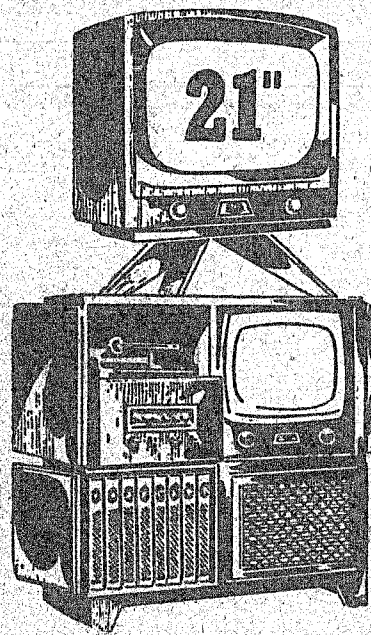

Our WASHINGTON Letter



The trip to the drought stricken area of West Texas last week end was a bit depressing to all the visitors but particularly to the Congressmen from Colorado, Nebraska and Iowa. "There has never been a drought in my district", commented Congressman Hoeven of Iowa. "I don't recall when there has ever been a crop failure out there."

The Congressmen, members of the House Agriculture Committee, were seeing the conditions first-hand and were collecting information in connection with pending disaster legislation which will soon come before the Congress. They all professed to be deeply impressed by what they saw.

While in Texas, I had the privilege of attending a 4th of July celebration on Hord's Creek lake near Coleman. There I met Representative Martin Dies who made a fine speech to a large audience. I preceded him on the program with a brief report on recent developments in Washington. Coleman County, or most of it — had been blessed with good rains a few days before and it was fine to see a feeling of optimism among the people. The rain added 5 feet to the level of Hord's Creek lake, from which the City of Coleman gets its water supply.

On the evening of the fourth a patriotic celebration and fireworks display took place at Goodfellow Air Force Base at San Angelo. There were more than 10,000 people on hand for the event. I introduced Mr. Dies who made the principal speech for the occasion and was well received and appreciated by the large crowd.

On Sunday Mr. Dies spoke to the Business Men's Bible Class in San Angelo on the subject of "The Christian in Government". He emphasized the moral obligation of citizens to take an active part in political affairs.

News From The State Health Department

You don't have to be a Mickey Mantle or a Babe Zaharias to be eligible for athlete's foot. You're qualified just by being human. This ringworm foot infection can come to either sex at any age at any time, although it is probably more prevalent during summer months when feet are more apt to perspire.

You'll know you've got it when your feet begin itching and blistering, and when you see the soggy dead skin between the toes or on the soles. Take action then, and you can usually get rid of it in a hurry. But neglect it and you're in trouble.

Here are some suggestions from State Health Officer George W. Cox which will prevent athlete's foot or help you get rid of it if you have it now:

Dry carefully and thoroughly between your toes after bathing and as often as practical during the day. The disease is caused by a fungus which thrives on damp, perspiring feet.

Massage your feet with a mild rubbing alcohol. This will help prevent spreading the infection from one spot to another.

Dust a good fungicide powder or even an unscented talcum powder or powdered boric acid, between the toes, in stockings and shoes. If at all practical, change stockings once during the day.

Swab all cracks or soggy areas between the toes with one part iodine diluted with ten parts of alcohol.

Wear absorbent socks and put a piece of cotton on areas between the toes where cracks or soggy areas are evident.

Don't use remedies which have been sold for eczema. Consult your physician if the cracks and blisters and soggy areas do not yield to these measures.

And keep this in mind: if athlete's foot is neglected, it can spread readily beyond the feet. The lesions will go deeper and deeper, and may cause critical damage.

Polio Costs In Texas Rises

San Antonio — The cost of polio is going up in Texas with 31 local county chapters of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis having run out of March of Dimes funds. This has resulted in sending of more than \$150,000 into the state by the Emergency Aid Fund of Foundation headquarters to meet outstanding treatment bills during the first half of 1953.

At the same time, the 1953 incidence of polio is running less than half the 1952 figure, with 487 cases having been reported against the 1952 half year total of 1096.

According to a report of the U. S. Public Health Service, compiled nationally by the Polio Foundation, there are but 10 states in the country showing less polio in 1953 than in 1952. For the most part, with the exception of Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi, these are states which have had extremely low incidence in the past.

California again leads the country in the total number of cases to date with 877 compared to the 1952 half year total of 544.
