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Local Teacher To Attend Workshop On Agriculture

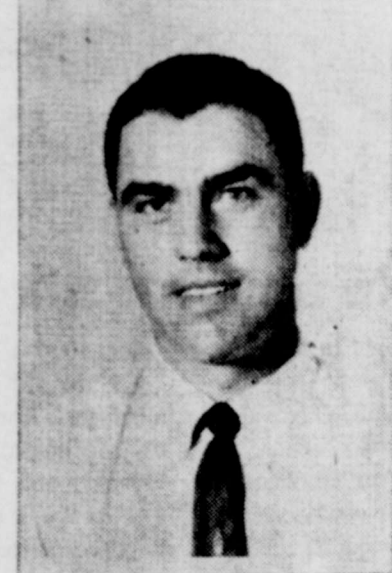

Easter, Vocational Agriculture teacher at Burk Burnett high school will participate in the In-Service Education Workshop for Teachers of Vocational Agriculture to be held at the Hotel Texas, Fort Worth, August 9-12. Guest speaker for the opening general session on Tuesday, August 9, will be R. L. McMillion, Branch Manager, Business Men's Assurance Company of America, Abilene, Texas. The meeting will start at 8:30 a.m. in the Grand Ballroom.

Conference workshops to be developed include Recent Trends in Swine Production, Beef Production, Developing and Conducting Agriculture Mechanics Programs, Leadership and Citizenship Training through the Texas Association of Future Farmers, Study of the Proposed Revised Lesson Plans of Farm Electrification, Young Farmer Training and Assisting First and Second Year Teachers in Developing and conducting Local Programs of Vocational Agriculture.

Also on the agenda for the week is the annual association Awards Breakfast during which tenure awards will be presented to 10, 15, 20, 25, 30 and 35 year teachers. Awards will also be presented to Honorary Members, Legislators, District Public Relations Chairmen, School Administrators and Members of the Press, Radio and Television.

Approximately 1,200 Vocational Agriculture Teachers are expected to attend the meeting. The Vocational Agriculture Education program in the state is under the direction of the Division of Vocational Agriculture, Texas Education Agency, with George H. Hurst, Austin, director. Teachers meet annually for training in new developments and trends in Vocational Agriculture Education.

Edwards Speaker At Rotary Club Noon Luncheon



"Men must not remain stagnant to men."

Johnny P. Edwards, Jr., of Graham, Texas, was featured speaker at the noon Rotary luncheon August 2. "The only criticism I have of the Rotary Foundation is that you do not publicize it enough," Edwards attended the American University in Beirut, Lebanon last year as a Rotary Foundation Fellow.

He told Rotary members of his experiences, his contact with his fellowmen from 39 countries and the lasting influence the year has had and will continue to have on his life.

George Byerly, in charge of the day's program, said of the young man from Graham, that if we had 1,000 exchange students like Johnny, where we now have one, our country would need less battle ships.

Rotary Foundation Fellowships promote international understanding. Through the foundation qualified graduate students are given one academic year of graduate study abroad and an opportunity to contribute to better understanding between the peoples of their home and study countries while advancing their academic careers. They become "Ambassadors of Good Will."

Beginning in 1947 with 18 fellows from seven countries, the number of fellowships awarded has grown to some 130 annually.

Rotary International last year voted to spend with in one year, 2 1/2 million dollars for research, through the Rotary Foundation to help promote world wide understanding and other objectives of the foundation.

School Board Lets Two Contracts For Construction

Two construction contracts were let by the Burk Burnett school board here Thursday. R. B. Swinford of Burk Burnett was awarded the contract for curbing and blacktopping a 50-foot extension of the student parking lot and two driveways at the high school, at the bid price of \$4,370.81.

Reed & McCluskey of Burk Burnett were low bidders at \$1,830 for concrete block extensions to two concession stands at the high school football stadium.

Dow Estes, tax assessor-collector, reported collections from the tax roll totaled \$185,878.73 and from the delinquent roll \$7,875.88. The board hired 13 new teachers, granted a leave of absence to one and accepted the resignations of seven others.

Mrs. Sharon Mullins was granted a year's leave of absence. Resignations were accepted from Mrs. Sydney Askins, Don Faubion, Mrs. Joan Faubion, Mrs. Nancy Miller, Carole Kilman, Bruce Roark and Mrs. Christine Wickersham.

The board also approved an amended budget for the 1965-66 fiscal year showing an anticipated income of \$1,365,991 and anticipated expenditures of \$1,290,869. Aug. 18 has been set for the public hearing on the proposed 1966-67 budget.

New Policemen Hired By City

Carleton Black, Wichita Falls, and Arnold McKinnis, Burk Burnett, have been hired as patrolmen for the Burk Burnett Police Department.

Police Chief Buck Abbott said their appointments filled vacancies created by resignations of Kenneth Gage and George Jackson. McKinnis, a native of Burk Burnett, recently completed 14 years with the Marine Corps.

KINGS HAVE FOUR-YEARS OF FOOTBALL EXPERIENCE

The Burk Burnett Kings will bring four years of professional grid war experience with them when they meet the Sherman-Denison Jets in an exhibition contest at Gainesville on Aug. 13. It will be the first football game of the 1966 season for both teams.

The Kings, organized in 1962 as a charter member of the Red River Football League, captured the league championship twice in three years of competition. In 1965, the Kings played independent football, compiling a record of 10 wins and 1 loss. This impressive showing was against such strong contenders as Kansas City, Tulsa, Dallas, Corpus Christi and Oklahoma City.

The Burk Burnett Kings record at the end of four years organized football is: 45 wins, 6 losses, and 2 ties.

Darrell N. Nichols, Kings president-general manager, said one of the major reasons for Burk Burnett's 101 record last year was the play of hard-charging halfback Jerry Bettis.

The 5-foot-9 Bettis, a graduate of Atoka, Okla., High School, played his college football at East Central State. He was voted all-conference halfback.

The 195-pound halfback was the number two scorer and punter in 1962 for the nation's small colleges.

He was the King's leading scorer in 1965 with 19 touchdowns. He compiled a record of 1,000 yards in 10 games last season.

Eugene Guthrie and Rip Smith provide experience at the quarterback slot. Guthrie, a four-year Kings veteran who measures 5-11, and weighs 195 pounds, keeps the opposition honest with his fine running on the roll outs.

Smith, used mostly on defense last year, is a seasoned offensive veteran who handles the ball well and passes with pinpoint accuracy.

Flanker Sonny Gossett is also an important link in the King's offensive.

Gossett, a 6-1 speedster with

a pair of sticky hands, caught 14 touchdown passes for the Kings last year.

The 175-pound flanker's ability to get clear after each catch makes him the favorite receiver of the Kings quarterbacks.

In the offensive line, the Kings rely heavily on such stalwarts as center Robert Walker and tackle Willie Taylor.

Walker, a former Hardin-Simmons grid star and a two-year Kings veteran, weighs 215 pounds. He has been instrumental in leading the hard-charging offensive line.

Taylor a graduate of Wichita Falls Booker T. Washington High School and Cameron Junior College, has been an offensive tackle starter for two years.

The 235-pound tackle has been a great help in opening holes in the opposing line.

The King's defensive line is expected to be one of the roughest in the newly-formed Texas Professional Football League.

Player-coach Norman Jones, a 6-1, 250-pounder, calls defensive signals and plays middle guard.

Four years defensive experience has given Jones an uncanny ability to "smell out" upcoming plays in given situations.

James Morris, another stand-out defense man, weighs in at 210-pounds and is one of the King's mainstays.

Scott Hodge, another player-coach, has three year experience with the Kings, and will be one of the starting guards.

Hodge, 6-2, 215-pounds, played his college football at Northwest Missouri State University.

The Burk Burnett Kings will have an average starting offensive line of 218 - pounds and 227-pounds for their defensive line.

The Texas Football League officially opens on Aug. 27. The league includes Burk Burnett, Sherman-Denison, Dallas, Pasadena, Odessa-Midland and Tulsa.

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DE GAULLE MAKES SENSE

There has been considerable American criticism level-
ed at French President, Charles de Gaulle in recent
months. While there may be ample reason for the verbal
attacks on the Frenchman's irascible nature, Americans
would do well to pause and take a few lessons in econ-
omics from him.

During a press conference held early in 1966, Presi-
dent de Gaulle offered this simple explanation of the
"new" French outlook on economics . . . Our develop-
ment and . . . our existence must not be at the discretion
of others. That is why, for eight years, we have entirely
stopped resorting to foreign gifts and credit and under-
taken to pay the debts that we had long accumulated. It
was therefore necessary at least to put our balance of pay-
ments in equilibrium, to ensure solidly the value of our
currency and, consequently, to banish inflation. We have
done so . . .

The American economy may not rely on foreign gifts
or credit, but it certainly relies heavily on government
deficits to finance its welfare programs, foreign aid, gifts,
low interest loans for favored projects, etc. Meanwhile,
our international balance of payments has been riding
the negative side of the column, and an insidious growth
of inflation eats away at the value of the American dol-
lar. U. S. citizens ought to insist that their own economic
house be put in order. If the French can do it, the U. S.
ought to be able to do it even better.

A FANTASTIC STORY

One of the most fantastic stories of the twentieth
century has to do with undersea exploration and drilling
for oil. Fifteen years ago, 30 feet of water was considered
"deep" when the first of the offshore drilling rigs were
put to work. By the end of 1966, there will be about 150
mobile offshore units in use around the world, with a total
value of some \$600 million. Some of these rigs will be
able to drill exploratory wells in water 1,000 feet deep.
In another five years, the number of offshore mobile rigs
is expected to reach 200, with a total worth of about \$1
billion. By that time, some oilmen believe technology
will make it possible to drill exploratory wells from float-
ing rigs in water 3,000 feet deep.

The reason for this intense activity and development
in offshore drilling is the result of the belief that the con-
tinental shelf may contain close to 700 billion barrels
of hydrocarbons, and in the next 20 years, the free world
may obtain one fourth of its oil and gas requirements
from beneath the oceans.

The story of the oil industry, aside from being a fan-
tastic record of achievement from the time of its found-
ing more than a century ago, provides a living demon-
stration of the initiative that is synonymous with private
enterprise. It explains the miracles of America as a nation,
where rivers of oil in its many forms flow day and night
to meet its astronomical energy requirements.

SOMETHING TO REMEMBER

Recent addresses to the graduating classes of two
of our nation's largest colleges were noteworthy for
their lack of comment on pride in United States citizen-
ship and a free economy. One stressed the problems of
technology, education, military aid, leadership, food pro-
duction, peace and the hydrogen age.

The other was confined to problems of the univer-
sity and the times, and the hope for a recognition of
responsibility for maintaining and building the institution.
Nowhere, was there a forthright statement of the fact that
the future of academic freedom and independent univer-
sities rests on perpetuation of our constitutional form of
government and a free enterprise system, as contrasted
with the totalitarian state.

It still remains for our schools and colleges to teach
their students sound economics. No word was spoken to
build pride in private property ownership and private
enterprise, which are the foundation of our independent
school system support. It's about time that our educa-
tors got over being afraid to use the term private enter-
prise and private property and teach their students what
these terms mean to their future. Because if they are
swallowed by government, academic freedom, as well as
freedom of the individual, will be a thing of the past and
representative government will be over. They will sink
or swim together — they must support each other.

- 1/4 teaspoon dry mustard
- 1 tablespoon salad oil
- 2 large chicken breasts, halved
- 4 medium size green-tipped bananas
- 2 tablespoons sesame seed

1. Mix together the lemon juice, molasses, salt, pepper, soy sauce, mustard and oil in a bowl. Add the chicken and marinate in the refrigerator for at least an hour.
2. Drain the chicken, reserving the marinade. Broil the chicken over a charcoal fire, at least four inches from the source of heat, for 15 minutes. Turn and broil 5 minutes longer, basting frequently throughout the cooking with the marinade.
3. Sprinkle the bananas with the sesame seed and broil alongside the chicken until both are tender, continuing to baste both the chicken and the bananas with the marinade.
4. Serves four. Enlarge amounts as needed.

PUBLIC NOTICE

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 79 proposing an amendment to Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding Section 1-d to provide that all land owned by natural persons designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the basis of agricultural use.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding "Section 1-d. (a) All land owned by natural persons designated for agricultural use in accordance with the provisions of this Act shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the basis of agricultural use."

"(b) For each assessment year the owner shall certify his land under provisions of this Section as designated for agricultural

use he shall file with the local tax assessor a sworn statement in writing describing the use to which the land is devoted.

"(c) Upon receipt of the sworn statement in writing the local tax assessor shall determine whether or not such land qualifies for the designation as agricultural use as defined herein and in the event it so qualifies he shall designate such land as being for agricultural use and assess the land accordingly.

"(d) Such local tax assessor may inspect the land and require such evidence of use and source of income as may be necessary or useful in determining whether or not the agricultural use provision of this article applies.

"(e) No land may qualify for the designation provided for in this Act unless for at least three (3) successive years immediately preceding the assessment date the land has been devoted exclusively for agricultural use, or unless the land has been continuously developed for agriculture during such time.

"(f) Each year during which the land is designated for agricultural use, the local tax assessor shall note on his records the valuation which would have been made had the land not qualified for such designation under this Section. If designated land is subsequently diverted to a purpose other than that of agricultural use, or is sold, the land shall be subject to an additional

tax. The additional tax shall equal the difference between taxes paid or payable, hereunder, and the amount of tax payable for the preceding three years had the land been otherwise assessed. Until paid, there shall be a lien for additional taxes and interest on land assessed under the provisions of this Section.

"(g) The valuation and assessment of any minerals or subsurface rights to minerals shall not come within the provisions of this Section."

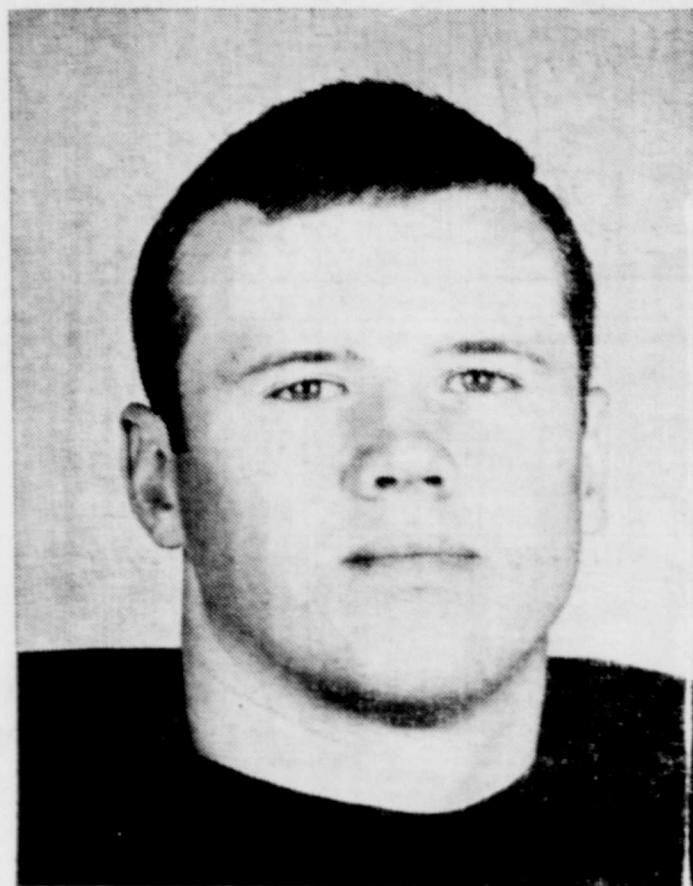
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to provide that all land owned by natural persons designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to provide that all land owned by natural persons designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

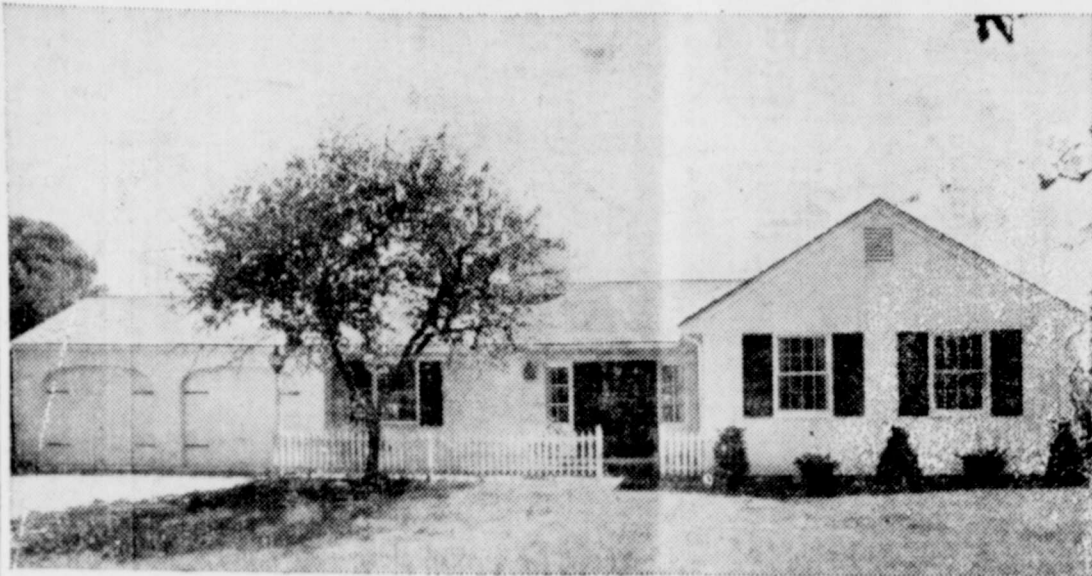

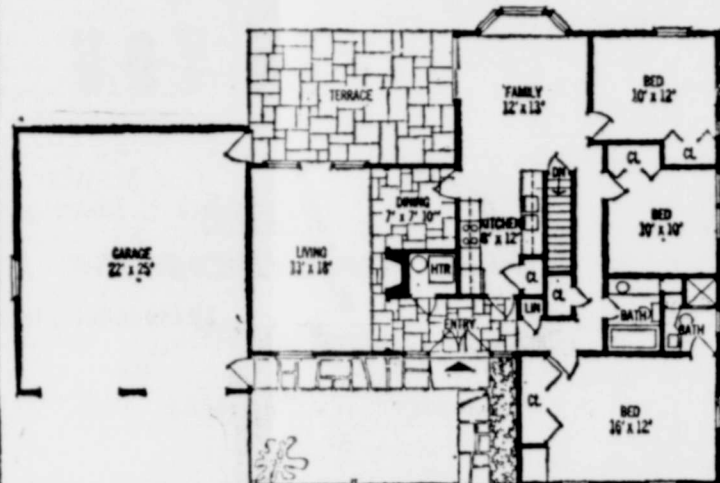

VETERANS

Questions - Answers
Q—Children of a deceased veteran may have some pension rights—do they forfeit these rights when their mother (the veteran's widow) remarries?
A—Eligible children of a deceased veteran retain their pension rights after their mother remarries until they become 18, or 23 if they are going to school.
Q—Under the terms of the GI loan benefit, can a veteran mortgage his present home to obtain money for other expenses?
A—Only for home improvement. GI loans are not available to pay doctor bills, buy furniture, etc.
Q—Is a member of the Reserves injured while on inactive duty training, eligible for disability compensation through the VA?
A—Yes. The law provides compensation for injuries incurred in line of duty by reservists during a drill or other period of authorized inactive duty training. Application should be filed with the nearest VA Regional Office, and should be accomplished by an official statement from the Unit Commander showing the date, circumstances, nature and line of duty status of the injury.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT
PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of Texas by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 12; authorizing the Legislature to provide by law for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of Airport Authorities composed of one or more counties; authorizing the creation of a board of directors by appointment or election; providing that the membership of the board shall be based upon the proportionate part of the population of each county, with no county having less than one member; providing for the necessary election; authorizing the levy of an annual tax not to exceed Seventy-Five Cents (75c) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation; provided, however, that the property of state regulated common carriers required by law to pay a tax upon intangible assets shall not be subject to taxation by the Authority; authorizing the Authority to employ or appoint an assessor and collector of taxes whose duty it shall be to assess and collect the taxes on the tax rolls approved by the Board of Directors of said Authority; said taxes to be assessed equally and uniformly throughout the county or counties, comprising the Authority, as required by the Constitution; granting to such Authority the power to acquire by purchase, or through eminent domain proceedings existing publicly financed airport properties or other sites necessary to have and to improve the same, power to issue and sell general obligation bonds and revenue bonds, or either of them; authorizing the assumption of outstanding indebtedness secured by general obligation bonds and assuming the obligations of the city or cities under ordinances and bond indentures under which revenue bonds have been issued and sold; to enact zoning regulations and other measures to protect the airport facilities from hazards and obstructions; providing for the adding of an additional county or counties to the Authority.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 12, reading as follows: "Section 12. The Legislature may by law provide for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of

thereon vote in favor thereof; provided, however, that the Airport Authority may be created and be composed of the county or counties that vote in favor of its creation if separate propositions are submitted to the voters of each county so that they may vote for a two or more county Authority or a single county Authority; provide for the appointment by the Board of Directors of an Assessor and Collector of Taxes in the Authority, whether constituted of one or more counties, whose duty it shall be to assess all taxable property, both real and personal, and collect the taxes thereon, based upon the tax rolls approved by the Board of Directors, the tax to be levied not to exceed Seventy-Five Cents (75c) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100) assessed valuation of the property, provided, however, that the property of state regulated common carriers required by law to pay a tax upon intangible assets shall not be subject to taxation by the Authority; said taxable property shall be assessed on a valuation not to exceed the market value and shall be equal and uniform throughout the Authority as is otherwise provided by the Constitution; the Legislature shall authorize the purchase or acquisition by the Authority of any existing airport facility publicly owned and financed and served by certificated airlines, in fee or of any interest therein, or to enter into any lease agreement therefor, upon such terms and conditions as may be mutually agreeable to the Authority and the owner of such facilities; or authorize the acquisition of same through the exercise of the power of eminent domain, and in the event of such acquisition, if there are any general obligation bonds that the owner of the publicly owned airport facility has outstanding, the same shall be fully assumed by the Authority and sufficient taxes levied by the Authority to discharge said outstanding indebtedness; and likewise any city or owner that has outstanding revenue bonds where the revenues of the airport have been pledged or said bonds constitute a lien against the airport facilities, the Authority shall assume and discharge all the obligations of the city under the ordinances and bond indentures under which said revenue bonds have been issued and sold. Any city which owns airport facilities not serving certificated airlines which are not purchased or acquired or taken over as herein provided by such Authority, shall have the power to operate the same under the existing laws or as the same may hereafter be amended. Any such Authority when created may be granted the power and authority to promulgate, adopt and enforce appropriate zoning regulations to protect the airport from hazards and obstructions which would interfere with the use of the airport and its facilities for landing and take-off; an additional county or counties may be added to an existing Authority if a petition of five per cent (5%) of the qualified taxing voters is filed with and an election is called by the Commissioners Court of the county or counties seeking admission to an Authority and the vote is favorable, then admission may be granted to such county or counties by the Board of Directors of the then existing Authority upon such terms and conditions as they may agree upon and evidenced by a resolution approved by two-thirds (2/3rds) of the then existing Board of Directors, provided, however, the county or counties that may be so added to the then existing Authority shall be given representation on the Board of Directors by adding additional directors in proportion to their population according to the last preceding Federal Census."
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:
"FOR the addition of Section 12 of Article IX of the Constitution, authorizing the Legislature to provide by law for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of Airport Authorities composed of one or more counties, and authorizing the levy of a tax not to exceed Seventy-Five Cents (75c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of all taxable property within such Airport Authority except the property of state regulated common carriers required by law to pay a tax upon intangible assets, after approval of its voters."
"AGAINST the addition of Section 12 of Article IX of the Constitution, authorizing the Legislature to provide by law for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of Airport Authorities composed of one or more counties, and authorizing the levy of a tax not to exceed Seventy-Five Cents (75c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of all taxable property within such Airport Authority except the property of state regulated common carriers required by law to pay a tax upon intangible assets, after approval of its voters."
Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election, and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

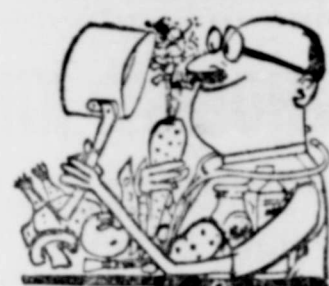

WHO NEEDS IODINE?

The human body is a complex
chemical factory, which needs
many raw materials in order to
do its job. Some of these are
needed only in minute quantities,
but their absence is severely felt.
These are called "trace ele-
ments", because all that is needed
is a tiny smidgen.

One of these trace elements is
iodine. Iodine is required by the thy-
roid gland to make its internal
secretion, thyroxine. The thyroid
gland is located at the base of
the throat just above the notch
between the two collar bones.
It is shaped somewhat like a
butterfly, with a central body and
two winglike lobes. Ordinarily it
does not show, but the doctor
can feel it when the patient swal-
lows.

Deficient Areas

At one time throughout the
central areas of the United
States, the Pacific coast, the high
mountains of Switzerland and
other areas with similar condi-
tions, it was common to observe
young people, especially girls,
and some older persons, with
huge swellings of the thyroid
gland known as goiters.

The cause of these was un-
known until two American re-
searchers related the occurrence
of goiters to the absence of iodine
in the water, and consequently in
the plants, of areas far removed
from the sea, or getting their
water supplies from such areas.
Feeding minute doses of iodine
to children as a preventive of
these simple goiters, as they were
known, was successful.

In my early days as a health of-
ficial I helped get iodine-bearing

candies distributed to school
children. This crude ap-
proach, soon out-moded by
