German Prisoners Seem To Like Work at Compress

German prisoners of war, being utilized at the Memphis Compress to help meet an acute labor shortage, so far are making good hands, reports M. C. Allen, manager. They started to work last Friday. They are being brought here each morning and returned at night to the McLean prison camp. Three armed guards accompany them and stand guard while they are on the job. Twenty-five prisoners are in the group and they range in age from 15 to 45 years. Only one of the group speaks English and he is used as an in-

Prisoner Escapes Before Sheriff and D. A. Get to LA.

Robert Lee Herrod, third man wanted in connection with the robbery of the C. & F. Grocery safe here on the night of Oct. 25, "crossed up" Sheriff W. C. Anderson and District Attorney Sam J. Hamilton Sunday when he escaped from the New Orleans jail.

Sheriff Anderson and Mr. Hamilton, armed with extradition papers signed by the secretary of state, had left Memphis on Saturday afternoon for New Orleans to return the prisoner here for trial. They had planned to go by way of Baton Rouge to get the Louisiana governor to approve the warrant for Herrod's return to Texas, but learned early Monday that their man had broken out of the New Orleans jail.

They went on to New Orleans, however, but returned home late Wednesday night. Charges of burglary have been filed against Herrod, Ray Blankenship and Isaac Tomerlin of Dallas, in connection with the local robbery, when the grocery store safe was blown and \$800 in cash taken. Witnesses had identified Herrod and Blankenship as having been seen in Memphis on the afternoon of the night the safe was blown. All three of the men have prison records.

Immediate survivors are his widow and three children, Mrs. Bun Lewis of Amarillo, Mrs. Dorothy DeFord of Oakland, Calif., and G. L. Holcomb of Barstow, Calif.

Other survivors are two brothers, W. W. Wood of Monahan and C. E. Wood of Falfurris, and three sisters, Mrs. Eunice Herring of El Monte, Calif., Mrs. Rosie Jenkins and Mrs. Mary Turner of Austin.

Killing Frost on Monday Brings Cotton Pulling To Peak; More Help Sought

Rev. B. L. Peacock New Presbyterian Pastor in City

Rev. B. L. Peacock has accepted the pastorate of the Presbyterian church in Memphis. He comes here from Grand Prairie, where he has been pastor for the past two years. The new pastor and Mrs. Peacock already have moved here and he will fill the pulpit at both the morning and evening services on Sunday.

They have three children but none of them is at home at present. Their son, Leon, is in the Infantry in England. A married daughter, Mrs. Miles Evans, lives in Grand Prairie and her husband is employed at North American airplane factory. Their younger daughter, Kathleen, is a secretary for a wholesale firm in Dallas.

Rev. Peacock received his training in King's Institute, East Texas Teachers college and Southern Methodist University. He taught school for a number of years in Hunt County. He has been active in the young peoples work of the church and has been serving as permanent clerk of the Dallas Presbyterian and chairman of the Committee on Christian Education.

During his pastorate at Grand Prairie the church debt was paid off in full, new equipment was purchased, the church system was completely re-organized and many new members were added to the rolls. Sunday School attendance increased by 65 per cent, offerings to the church were almost doubled and an active Boy Scout troop was organized.

The farmers elected at these meetings will be responsible for insuring maximum benefits to farmers of their communities for the many programs and activities of the Agricultural Adjustment Agency. The work of local committeemen includes explaining AAA practices, certifying applications for payment, assisting with storage and loan programs and working on the disposition of surplus war property.

The killing freeze Monday morning, which came almost a month late, is expected to bring cotton pulling to its peak in Hall County within the next 10 days, but the serious labor shortage showed no general signs of improvement.

Publicity in down-state papers as to the need for 1,500 more cotton pullers in Hall County, plus the efforts of the Extension Service and the War Manpower Commission to recruit labor, resulted in some relief this past week, reports County Agent W. B. Hooser.

Both the Childress and Amarillo offices of the War Manpower Commission had representative in Memphis this past week and the appeal for more farm hands to help save the bumper cotton and feed crop in the county has been spread throughout the state.

The official temperature in Memphis Thursday morning was 19 degrees. Below freezing temperatures have been recorded every morning this week.

The extension service at A. & M. College has two field representatives covering central and south Texas seeking farm labor for Hall and Childress counties. Publicity in Houston, Austin and San Antonio papers has caused 25 or 30 families to come to Memphis in the past week.

At the same time others have been leaving, following the first real cold snap of the season.

With ginnings reported to the county agent's office as 11,121 bales up to last Friday and a cotton yield of 50,000 bales now freely predicted the problem of saving the crop is a serious one for many farmers.

Following the freeze many farmers are making plans to "seed" their cotton as soon as the leaves fall off and the remainder of the bolls open.

The killing freeze date this year, Nov. 27, was the latest on record here. Average date is Nov. 1. The late fall was of inestimable value to the county, however, as both late cotton and feed crops are bringing much greater yields than had been anticipated. Some persons estimate that the late freeze date meant an extra 10,000 bales of cotton to the county.

Hall County's agricultural agent was given the honor of taking the Texas group of club winners to Chicago because of his outstanding work in the extension service and in connection with 4-H activities. Hall County took first place this past year in 4-H club work in Texas.

Expenses of Mr. Hooser's trip are being met by the Memphis Chamber of Commerce.

"We are in position to take care of this out of our general fund", said President C. Hodges, "and the directors are pleased to authorize it because of the recognition given Mr. Hooser and the 4-H club members and sponsors in Hall County."

The Texas group will be entertained in Chicago at various events planned in their honor and will participate in a national radio broadcast.

Eight new pieces of heavy artillery are ready for delivery to the nation's dairymen for their 1945 battle of production. These are the recommendations in the new 8-point milk production program announced recently from Washington.

Stress in 1945 will be on efficiency in production, and every dairymen who wants to improve his methods will find these eight points invaluable as a guide in his operations.

Here they are:

1. Grow an abundance of high quality roughage.
2. Balance your herd with your feed supply.
3. Keep production records on each cow in your herd.
4. Practice disease control methods.
5. Produce milk and cream of the highest quality.
6. Adopt labor saving methods.
7. Take care of your land.
8. Develop a sound breeding program.

Avoid Late Rush By Ordering Seeds Now

I can remember a Christmas way back yonder when I shook my stocking and that jack-knife I was expecting didn't show up. It was an awful blow. It's going to be a shock to some folks next spring when planting time

comes 'round and they find their supply of fertilizer or seed or both has not arrived, because supply houses are swamped with late orders.

There was a rush late last spring when many orders came in at once and some farmers had to wait to get their supplies. But, like most problems, there's a simple way out.

You'll save yourself some possible grief if you'll order now and take delivery soon after the first of the year. Probably you already know how much lime or phosphate or nitrogen you'll need, how much corn or oats seed or something else you'll want.

It will help the suppliers and it will help the transportation situation if you'll get your orders in right away.

Late Pasturing May Damage Cover Crops

You remember the story about the goose which laid the golden eggs and how its owner cooked his own goose. Cover crops may not be actual gold mines but they put money in the dairymen's pocket.

However, you can overwork them and right now is the proper time to pull your cows off these fall pastures, to prevent damaging them and cutting down the "golden egg" production which you are expecting next spring.

Cover crops have done a fine job of keeping up milk production. Now they need a rest, particularly if there have not been any good recent rains and if a freeze may be expected in the near future.

Dairy specialists and the experts on pastures at the colleges tell me that the first of December is a cut-off time for cover crop pasturing. In the spring, they'll come back and you can start pasturing again. Past December 1, continued pasturing may cause severe damage.

If you still need cover crop bulletins, write the Extension Service, Mississippi State College, State College, Miss., for Leaflet No. 54, or the University of Tennessee, Knoxville, Tenn., for Leaflet No. 6.*

Pantex in Urgent Need of 125 Men, Lions Club Told

Pantex Ordnance plant is ahead of its production schedule but right now urgently needs 125 men to keep operations at full peak. R. J. Wheeler told the Memphis Lions club Wednesday noon. else, says R. A. Eddleman, Hall County AAA chairman, the organized effort made possible by the elected farmer committeemen puts American agriculture in a position to act quickly and unitedly in the reconversion to peace, just as it made agriculture the first in effectively adjusting to the needs of war.

All farm operators—men or women—who will take part in the program in 1945 are eligible to vote in community elections. In addition to electing community committeemen, the meetings also will name delegates to a county

convention to be held later to elect county committeemen.

In emphasizing the importance of full attendance at the meetings, Mr. Eddleman quotes N. E. Dodd, national Chief:

"These elections, much the same as local school elections and like the town meetings of other days, constitute real democracy in action. With the approach of peace AAA elections take on a new significance. It is more important than ever to have the best men available on AAA Committees. The solving of farm problems at this stage of the war, and those that face the nation from here on out will require the best possible leadership and the full participation of farmers."

Estelline Man in Bomber Group

The 12th Air Force B-26 Marauder group of which Cpl. Wyman E. Davis of Estelline is a member has been awarded the Corix de Guerre with palm by the French government for precision attacks on bridges in support of the French ground forces in Italy, the War Department has announced.

Oldest medium bomber outfit in the Mediterranean theater, the group was cited in an order by General Charles De Gaulle commending an entire Marauder wing. It is the only AAF unit to be decorated in this war by both the United States and French governments, having previously been cited twice by President Roosevelt for the accuracy of its attacks on Rome and Florence rail yards.

The proposed new American Legion home is, in our opinion, the most worth-while project to come before the people of Memphis and Hall County in years. In the first place, it is an opportunity for everyone to do something for the men of Hall County who today are on the battle fronts of the world fighting the battles for our freedom. It is an opportunity not only for the families and relatives of service men but for every patriotic citizen to show his appreciation in a concrete and tangible way for what our fighting men are doing for us.

Another factor which we should not lose sight of is the mental and physical welfare of the men who come back from battle. The community which has a well-equipped and modern Legion home will have gone a long way toward keeping its veterans at home. For, here they can find comradeship, recreation and athletic activities. If it is not provided for them they will go elsewhere.

The American Legion is destined to be one of the far-

reaching organizations in history in the welfare of service men. Already it has proven itself to veterans of the last war.
