C-City's EDC holds first meeting Tuesday

Colorado City's newly-formed Economic Development Corporation (EDC) held its first official meeting Tuesday evening to establish by-laws, elect officers and consider recommendations to the city council.

The purpose of the non-profit corporation is to promote economic development and diversification in Colorado City and Mitchell County as a whole. The EDC board consists of seven board members, Jim Baum, Tim Boyd, Larry Chaney, Travis Lynch, Mark Merrell, Jim Bell Harris and Stephanie Perez. The city council approved board members and will continue to approve members going forward.

Four of the members on the board also serve as councilmen for the City of Colorado City, Boyd, Chaney, Lynch and Baum. They will serve a shortened term, but the other three members will serve 22-month terms.

The EDC Board is an advisory board and will make recommendations to the city council. All meetings of the EDC Board are open to the public, and the group

will meet at least once per quarter with an agenda posted at city hall three days before the meeting.

An executive director of the EDC, which is a paid position, is expected to be named at the next meeting on Monday, June 4th. City Manager David Hoover said funds for the position are in the city's budget. The EDC will be a department of the city.

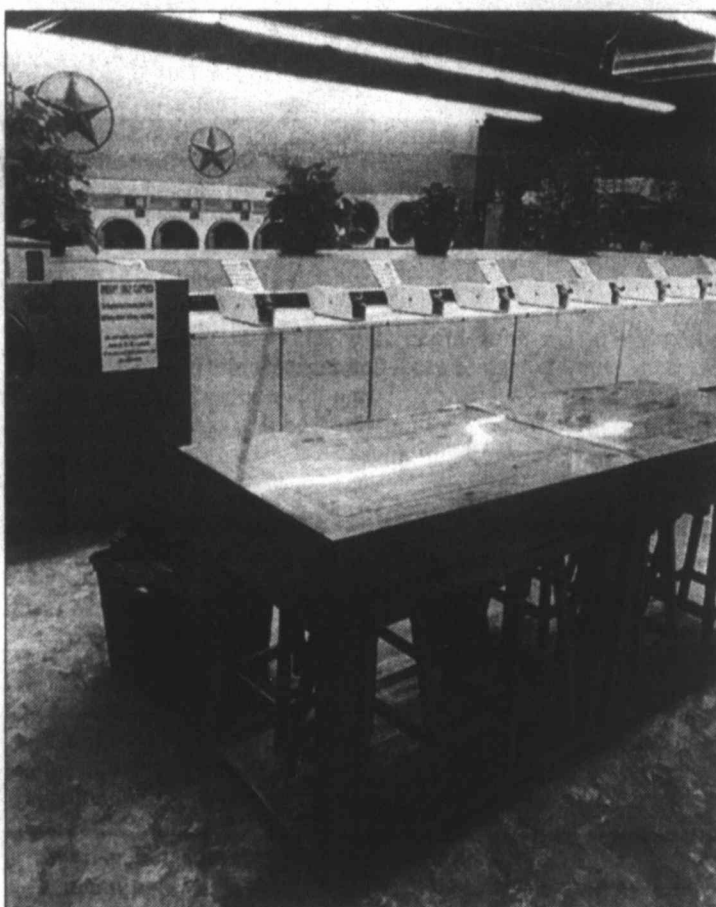
One of the main duties of the board is to develop an Overall Economic Development Plan, which must be approved by the city council. The plan will include short term goals that will help accomplish the overall plan.

Chaney moved to approve the by-laws, with Boyd seconding. The by-laws were then adopted by a unanimous vote.

Next officers were elected by the board. Chaney will serve as president of the EDC, while Boyd holds the vice president position. Perez agreed to serve as secretary.

A discussion followed regarding what board members would like to see on the agenda of the

Clean your duds at the new Scrubadubdudz

A new business opened in Colorado City over the Memorial Day weekend. Scrubadubdudz, located at 175 W. 3rd Street across the street from the post office, is a laundromat and so much more.

Owner Sharon Noletubby has been working toward the opening for quite some time. Building renovations were necessary before any other work could start, but now the place is cool, comfortable and inviting.

The "washateria" boasts 20 top-loading washers, 12 front-loading washers and 19 dryers. An attendant will be at the

laundromat to provide any help needed, and Scrubadubdudz will offer a wash and fold service. Noletubby said cost for the washers is anywhere from \$2 per load up to \$6 for the oversize washers. Drying costs 25 cents per seven minutes.

As Noletubby knows, it's important for a business like a laundromat to have more than just washers and dryers. She has created a children's play area complete with toys and a sitting area with a television to entertain those waiting for their laundry to

CISD personnel learn tactical skills from the best

Shooting and tactical expert Chuck Taylor came to Mitchell County from Arizona last week to give intense instruction to a few members of Colorado ISD staff. Taylor is a retired military man who has experienced gun fights and shares his knowledge and experience with others.

Taylor gives those he trains more than firearm knowledge. He began his career as a shooting expert in the military. He has since contracted with government agencies to train personnel how to survive a gunfight, among other things. His job as a trainer has provided Taylor the opportunity to train many different types of people, from CIA and DEA agents to teachers.

As a 2nd Lieutenant in the Vietnam War, it was Taylor's somber duty to write letters to the families of soldiers killed in action. The grim task made him think there had to be a better way. Taylor dedicated his life to a goal of teaching people how to keep themselves safer.

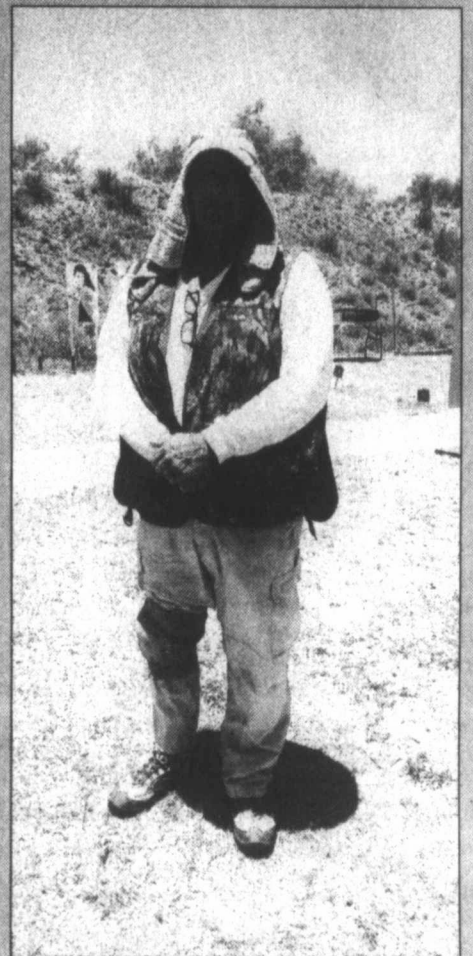
"... and it has worked very well," Taylor said last week.

Tactical firearm training is about much more than firearm knowledge and shooting accuracy, and Taylor said he subscribes to a motto commonly used by the military, "Keep it simple, stupid." While many may be knowledgeable about firearms and shooting, few people have faced death.

What CISD staff volunteers learned last week went far beyond the shooting range. Taylor said people volunteering to protect the school from an active shooter are called on for certain skills.

"This is serious business," Taylor said, understanding and conveying the gravity of the training. He also said he thinks the only way to deal with bad guys with guns is to give good guys guns and train them.

Taylor understands the necessity of arming school

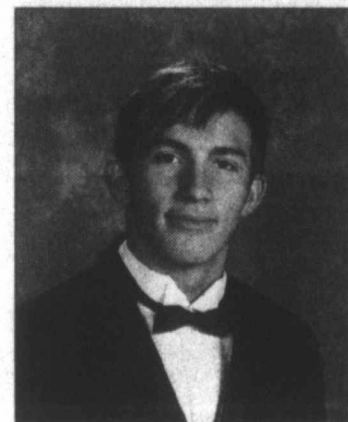

Guelker completed 164 hours of classwork before the testing phase. She joins an elite group of less than 250 people in Texas who have a Class A water license.

Most water operators have a Class C license.

She's not stopping there. Guelker said she's going to pursue a Class AA Water Operator License. If she attains her goal, she will be one of less than 100 people with such a license in Texas.

Requirements differ for cities of larger populations. For instance, the state requires two

COLORADO CITY – San Whe Limones, 49, passed away peacefully at her home with her loving family by her side on Wednesday, May 23rd, 2018.

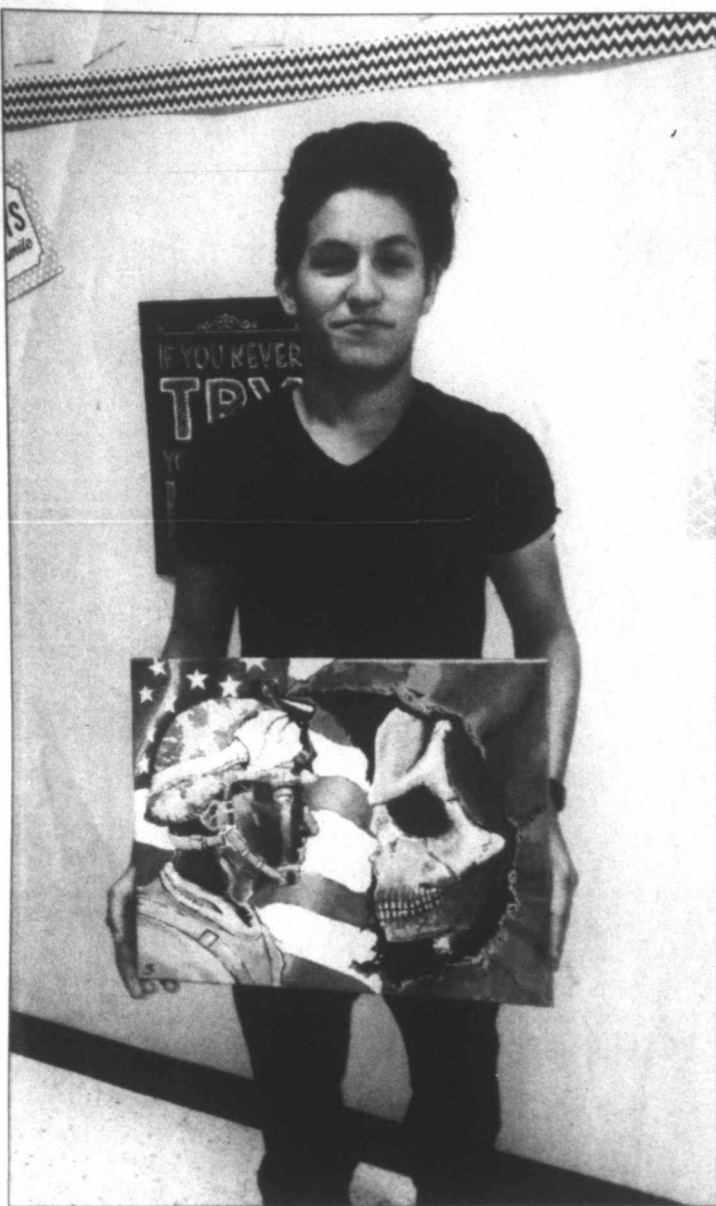
She was born in Loraine on May 26th, 1968 to Luis and Anita Salazar Limones Jr.

Lions Club hears MACC update

Terri Robben, co-founder of Mentoring in Colorado City (MACC), spoke to members of the Colorado City Lions Club last Friday. Robben is always on the lookout for volunteers who are interested in going into the local elementary schools to help with the program.

MACC was started four years ago, and since that time, volunteers have been meeting with students to help them with their reading. MACC volunteers help teachers by giving weekly fluency tests, and some volunteers are now doing one-on-one tutoring with those that need the extra help.

Robben said she had 15 volunteers the first year and 25 the second year of MACC. However, her numbers have decreased the last couple of years. "I understand," she said. "Life gets in the

way." During the school year this year, Robben turned to a little different source for volunteers. Several CISD 7th and 8th graders have been helping tutor 1st and 2nd graders. It's worked well, because the little kids look up to the older students.

Robben said she needs a minimum of eight volunteers to make MACC work. Most go to the school for an hour or so on Tuesdays.

The foundation of most learning is reading, Robben said. She knows students can't progress as they should if they can't read. It's important for students to practice reading at home, but not all have a home life that promotes such activities. Robben knows that's where volunteers can make the difference.

Volunteers are needed for the MACC program, which kicks off again at the beginning of the next school year. Robben said she'd also like to see volunteers coming up to school for special days, like Donuts with Dad or Grandparents' Day, to be there for students who don't have anyone attending.

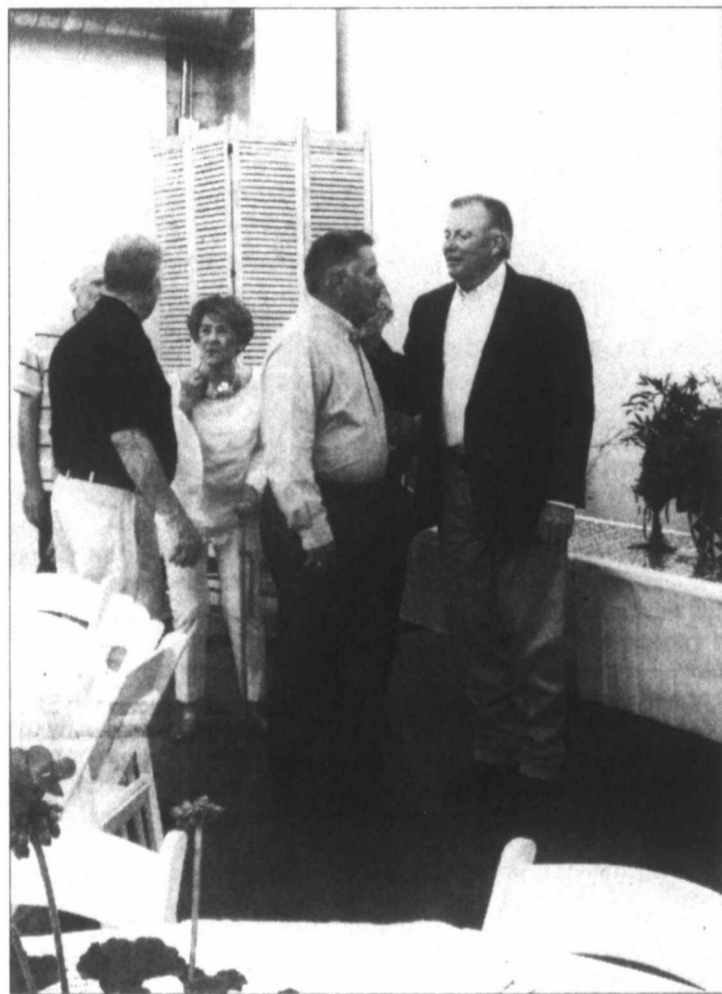

TUMBLEWEED SMITH San Jacinto battle re-enacted

On April 21st, 1836, Sam Houston's army defeated Santa Anna's army at the battle of San Jacinto, giving Texas its independence from Mexico.

"Santa Anna and his men were mostly sleeping," says Boyd Harris, lead interpreter at the San Jacinto Battleground State Historic Site near Houston. "They had spent the entire night before building fortifications to protect their camp and had worked through the next day. Around 3 o'clock in the afternoon Santa Anna ordered his men to stand down, so they were all lying down taking a siesta. Unfortunately for them that's also the time Sam Houston decided he wanted to attack."

More than 600 Mexican soldiers were killed. Many more were wounded. Only nine Texans perished. The Texans were anxious to avenge the massacres that occurred at the Alamo and Goliad.

The battleground is 20 miles east of downtown Houston near the town of La Porte. It is on 1,200 acres and is the original site of the Texas encampment during the battle. The park is a National Historic Landmark. Every April 21st it's the site of a re-enactment of the famous battle. Usually about 15,000 people attend.

"April 21st is on Saturday this year, so we'll have a festival and a re-enactment that day from 10 a.m. until 5 p.m. The main battle re-enactment will happen at 3 o'clock in the afternoon and we invite everybody to come out and see it. If you want to come out for the festival I recommend getting there early because parking fills up fast."

Along with the re-enactment, historians tell of events leading up to the battle. "Nine hundred and thirty Texan soldiers were in the Texas Army. The Mexican Army had about 1,200 soldiers. It's one of the shortest battles in history, lasting only about 18 minutes. Our re-enactment has roughly about a hundred plus re-enactors."

There is a lot of history at the site.

"We do programs on history, sure. But there are all kinds of things to do here. We have walking tours, riding tours; we have fishing and birding programs. The Battleship Texas is nearby in its own state park. We work with those folks over there and they give tours of the battleship as well as other programs."

The impressive San Jacinto monument is near the battlefield.

"The San Jacinto museum of history operates inside the monument. Visitors can watch a 35-minute film. There's an elevator that takes you to the top of the monument. Construction on it began in 1936 to celebrate the Texas Centennial. It was completed in 1939. The Works Progress Administration provided workers. This was during the depression years, but money poured in. The Texas Centennial was a big celebration all across the state. The monument is over 570 feet, 12 feet taller than the Washington Monument. It is the tallest standing column in the world. It was built to honor the soldiers who defeated Santa Anna."

Retiring? You have a choice to make on Medicare

When you retire and qualify for Medicare at 65, you'll need to decide how you'd like to receive your health care benefits.

Because you'll be new to Medicare, you may not realize you have two options.

One is to join the government's fee-for-service program that's existed for 53 years. The other is to buy a Medicare Advantage plan from a private insurer.

The choice may seem bewildering at first, so let's go over each option.

With traditional fee-for-service coverage, you may go to any doctor, hospital or other provider that accepts Medicare. Medicare pays the provider a fee for the service you receive. Once you meet your annual deductible, Medicare typically covers 80 percent of the cost for your care.

You have a few choices for covering the other 20 percent:

You may use your retiree health plan from your former employer, if you're retired and have such a policy. Some retiree plans may cost less or provide more benefits than other supplemental coverage.

You may qualify for Medicaid, if you have limited income and savings. Besides helping with your out-of-pocket costs like deductibles and co-insurance, Medicaid may pay for your monthly Medicare premiums.

If neither of those applies, you may buy a "Medigap" policy from a private insurer to cover what Medicare does not. There are 10 kinds of Medigap plans, with different benefits, so you'll need to decide which is best for you.

If you choose the traditional fee-for-service program, you'll probably also want to buy a prescription drug plan to go with your other coverage.

Traditional Medicare remains the favorite among people wanting the broadest possible access to doctors, hospitals and other providers. When coupled with a supplemental plan, it also makes your health care costs relatively predictable.

Still, 33 percent of all Medicare beneficiaries — including 33 percent of Texans with Medicare — now prefer to get their health care benefits through a private insurer. The number of people buying private Medicare Advantage plans has more than doubled over the last 10 years.

With Medicare Advantage, insurance companies contract with the government to provide care. Every private plan must cover all the benefits that traditional Medicare covers. In some cases, Medicare Advantage plans may offer extra benefits, like routine hearing or vision care.

Many plans charge a premium on top of the amount you'll pay each month for Medicare's Part B medical insurance, but there's no need to buy a supplemental Medigap policy. Likewise, most Medicare Advantage plans include drug

coverage with their other benefits.

The premiums, deductibles and co-payments will vary from one Medicare Advantage plan to another. But all plans, by law, must have annual limits on their overall out-of-pocket costs.

Unlike the traditional fee-for-service program, most Medicare Advantage plans require you to go to doctors and hospitals within their network of providers or pay more for getting care outside the network.

Still, the private health plans have been especially popular among people with low to moderate incomes. They provide relatively affordable supplemental coverage, with lower premiums than those for Medigap policies.

So, which is better — the traditional fee-for-service coverage or a private Medicare Advantage plan? That depends on your own circumstances and preferences. What's best for one person may not work as well for someone else.

To find out more about your options, you can visit www.medicare.gov and browse through the "Medicare and You" handbook. The website will also give you detailed information about the Medigap and Medicare Advantage policies available in your area.

Becoming informed will help you select the health care option that best fits your needs. It will also help you avoid mistakes that may cost you money.

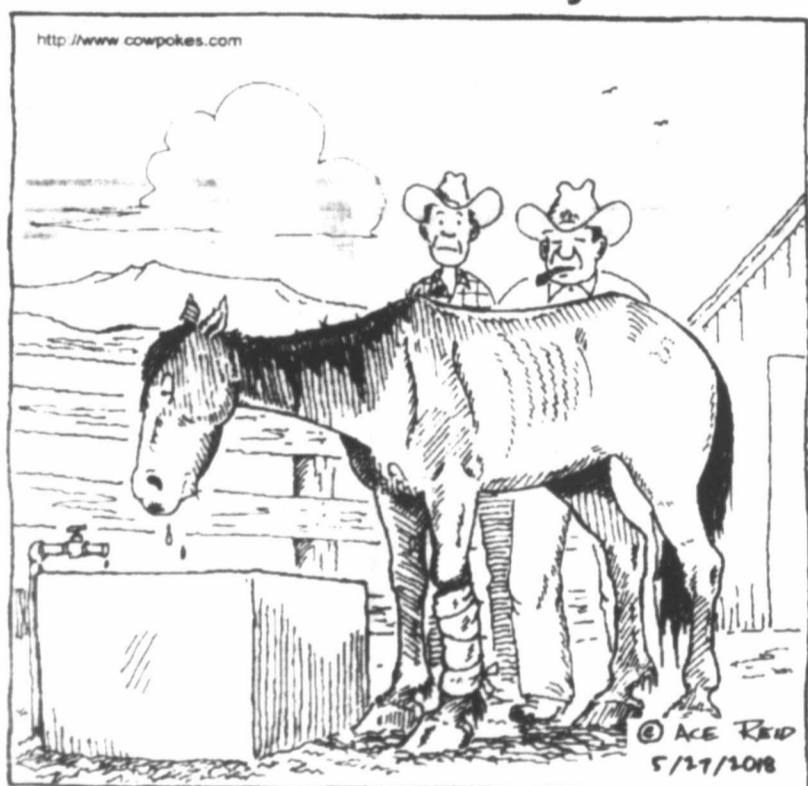

personnel. He said no matter the response time, police can't get to the active shooter location fast enough. School staff members are the first line of defense for innocent students.

The anonymous personnel being trained learned effective ways to use cover, how to operate in a heavy-density environment, to distinguish innocent students and shooters and how to do it all under pressure with the possibility of becoming a target themselves. Those passing showed success with accuracy and speed in a variety of situations.

Taylor said he explains to trainees how to make decisions under pressure. He teaches them to weigh the consequences of taking a shot in just a few seconds. He said a gun should only be used if the consequences of shooting it outweighs the consequences of not using it.

A visit to the gun range brought the reality to light, as the

targets are photos of real people. Taylor said he is training the volunteers to have mental discipline under pressure. "The brain is the weapon," he said. "The gun is just a tool."

The former military man is a big believer that arming good, responsible people is a deterrent to criminals. Taylor has been involved in combat and has experienced a situation where he was separated from his primary weapon. A 1911 Colt .45 saved his life.

Colorado ISD staff volunteers will carry 9mm pistols. Taylor said it's a good choice because there are many ammunition choices for the 9 mm. CISD Superintendent Reggy Spencer said DRT ammo will be used at school, because it is a low-ricochet ammunition and won't go through a torso.

Testing was held Saturday, and Spencer said a high percentage of the volunteers passed.

Mitchell hanging up his bee suit

Mitchell County's former bee man has retired. But that doesn't keep Doyle Mitchell from warning people about the possibility of being attacked and educating them on the necessity of the little pollinators.

Back in 2013, Mitchell found himself putting on the old bee suit quite often. He said he had to stop providing the service because of heat-related illness.

"Triple digit heat in a bee suit and three cases of heat exhaustion finally brought it to an end for me," Mitchell said recently. "But make no mistake, I loved every second of working with the bees and trying to save them. The time had come to pass that torch to some younger folks, which, by the way, are doing a great job of trying to save them."

According to Mitchell, the bees are swarming right now. Swarming is what honey bees do to procreate and advance their

survival. Spring and summer are the seasons when swarming is at its peak.

Mitchell said that citizens should look for what is called a "bee crossing". He said if you see bees flying in the air, just stop and wait. If more bees follow, the area is probably a bee crossing. If a crossing is found, Mitchell advises folks to follow the bees at a safe distance to see where they land.

He said that hives can be located anywhere, down low under houses or between siding and the walls of houses, even up in attics. A telltale sign of a hive is often a small hole with a brown ring around it. Bees usually clean their feet after a day of work before entering the hive, leaving a small area of wax around the entrance. The brown color is from dirt sticking to the wax.

Mitchell also wants to warn citizens that bees can hide in "tiny places", such as a barbecue

pit, a turned-over feed bucket, in trashcans and lots of other small locales.

Once a hive is found, Mitchell says mowing or using other yard working equipment is a no-no. There are two ways to remove the bees. Exterminators will come out to the property and kill the bees or a beekeeper can be called to remove the bees and the hive.

Mitchell said that exterminators don't usually remove the hives, and old hives lead to more bees. "For some reason, it attracts them like a magnet," he said.

After a hive is constructed, the queen bee lays eggs and worker bees fan the hive all day to keep it cool. If the bees are exterminated, the hive overheats and begins to melt. Honey and wax run, attracting not just bees but many other insects as well.

In the last few years, there have

been four attacks in Mitchell County, and Mitchell says bees in the area seem to be getting "meaner and meaner." There has been a lot of talk about Africanized or killer bees, but the only way to tell if a bee has been Africanized is to send it for testing to Texas A&M University. The possibility of hybrid bees is probable, as queens could be mating with Africanized bees.

While swarming bees can be dangerous, the swarm is all part of their existence. Once a hive is full of bees, the queen lays a queen egg. When the new queen hatches, she takes half of the population of the hive and sets out to find a new place to build a home.

"It's really hard to sit there and tell people how much we need the bees for agricultural reasons," Mitchell said, "but we do need them."

Those attending will also be offered tips on how to choose the appropriate safety seat based on their child's age, height and weight.

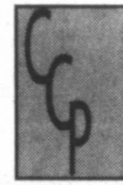

Press associations offering Bob Craig scholarships

Applications are currently being accepted from area students for two \$2,000 Bob Craig Memorial Scholarships awarded through the West Texas Press Association and the Texas Press Association.

The contest is open to applicants in the area served by WTPA member newspapers, and whose career goals include working with a community newspaper. Mitchell County students are eligible to apply for the

scholarships through the Colorado City Record's membership in WTPA.

Each scholarship is divided into two payments of \$1,000 each semester. Winners will be chosen by the West Texas Press Association board of directors, and announced during the association's 88th Annual Summer Convention in Cloudcroft, NM, July 19-21.

The Bob Craig Memorial Scholarships are named in honor of late West Texas publisher Bob Craig of Hamlin. Craig, who died in 1981, was the long-time publisher of the Hamlin Herald and a member of the West Texas Press Association. June 4th meeting. Besides naming an executive director, the board will establish when and where regular meetings will be held.

During next Monday's meeting, the board is also expected to discuss the Overall Economic Development Plan and consider a replacement for Merrell.

If all goes as planned, Merrell will take over the position of County Judge in January 2019. The county attorney has advised Merrell to come off the board to avoid any conflicts of interest.

EDC Board members are excited about drawing businesses, services, products and jobs to Colorado City. "I think we have a council and a board that's a lot more open than we used to be," Boyd said, before the meeting adjourned.

LOCAL NEWS

All local entities see slight sales tax increase

Texas Comptroller Glen Hegar sent out May's sales tax rebates to various entities around the state. Allocation totals are on the rise for cities in this area, and Mitchell County is enjoying the increase as well. See chart for exact numbers.

Mitchell County's May allocation of a little more than \$36,000 reflects an increase of \$8,660.16 when compared to the rebates received in the same time period last year. The county has received \$34,703.10 more this year than in the first five months of 2017.

The City of Colorado City is continuing to see a slight, steady increase in its rebates from the state. May's rebate is within a

few dollars of being \$5,000 more than what was received in May 2017. Totals for 2018 exceed last year's totals thus far by \$30,000.

Loraine's May rebate increased by more than \$100 and brought the yearly total closer to that of 2017. Because of decreased allocations earlier in the year, rebates are down by 7% for the year.

The City of Westbrook is receiving sales tax rebate payments again. Westbrook was sent over \$900 by the state comptroller and will continue receiving rebates for the rest of the year.

Big Spring, Lamesa and Roby saw double-digit increases from last year's May allocations. Those cities have also seen large increases when comparing 2017

to 2018.

The rising trend looks set to continue, as Hegar reported sales tax for April was up by more than 13% over what was received last April. Oil and natural gas production taxes totaled \$445.2 million, a 56% increase from totals in April 2017.

A look at the chart shows that

rebate payments increased for most of the area in May when compared with last year's totals. Almost all entities saw an increase in sales in May and most are in the positive for 2018. Rebates are based on sales made in March for businesses who contribute monthly.

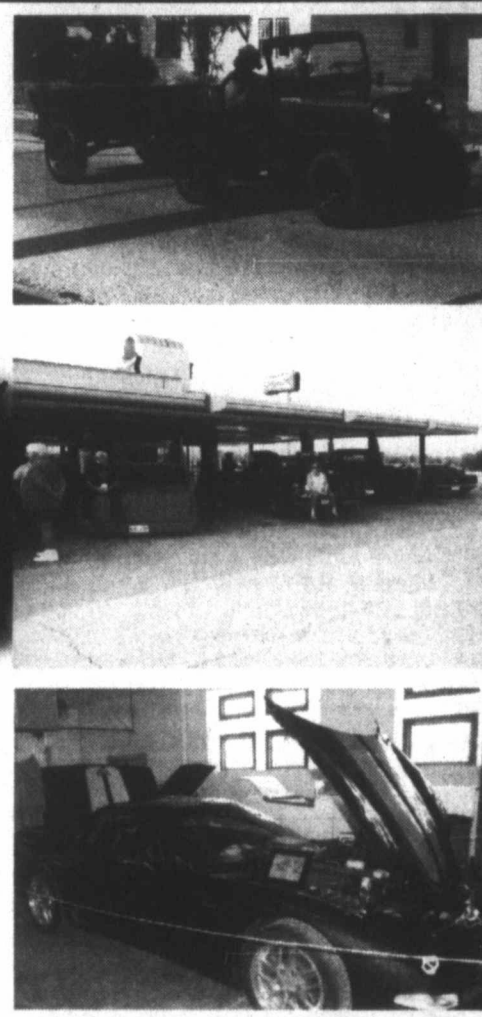
