## Galindo and Wright Place In Refugio Meet

Two Aransas County athletes, Galindo and Wright, placed in the Refugio track meet next Saturday tying with a man from Sweeney for a three-way second place tie in the pole vault.

George West scored 36 points and won the championship, but Bloomington's Gerald Wynn set the only record. He tossed the shot 51 feet 9 1/2 inches, bettering the old record established in 1959 by almost a foot.

George Person of Goliat tied the old 100-yard dash record with a time of 10 seconds flat.

Sweeney placed second in the meet with 34 points, followed by Goliat with 23 and Edna with 19.

## EASTER EGGS OLD AS TIME

In many lands Easter is a season of festival, pageant, fancy and song. In lands where Easter eggs began, it is a time when curious legends and whimsical folklore—like our Easter rabbit—enchant both young and old, and where eggs by the untold millions are colored for a dozen and one uses, all having to do with this spring festival which marks the end of Lent.

Everyone knows that the date of Easter is determined by the moon, for in 325 A. D. the Emperor Constantine had the uncertain occurrence of this holy day pinned down for all time by the Council of Nicaea. Then the fathers of the church decided that Easter should fall on the first Sunday after the first full moon after the 21st of March and that, my children, is where Easter has fallen ever since.

Easter eggs are so closely bound with Easter that it would be like taking the Christmas tree away from Christmas to remove the eggs from Easter. Wherever this holiday is observed, eggs play some part in its celebration.

The problem of the origin of this use goes far back into ancient Egypt and India, where the symbol of the egg plays an important part in the mythical creation of the world. Egyptian legends say that from mighty egg the entire universe was fashioned.

From this egg came the Bennu bird, or phoenix, a symbol of the sun, which, each 1400 years, set fire to its own nest and burned itself to ashes.

In these ashes is found the egg from which the phoenix hatches once again. In later years the Christians adopted the bird as a representation of Christ (because of the way it died and came to life again) and presented one another with eggs at Easter time to symbolize the Resurrection. These eggs they dyed red in allusion to the blood Christ shed for their redemption.

This practice of exchanging eggs at Easter became particularly popular in Europe during the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries. The pope once sent Henry VIII of England an Easter egg in a silver case. In Russia, visits and eggs were exchanged at Easter, the barter being accompanied by a kiss. Egg races were the main events at Easter fetes in certain parts of France, as they were in Russia and other parts of Europe.

Even today, egg races and egg games have not lost their popularity. All over Europe, Easter is a time for games with eggs. Hard-boiled eggs are rolled at one another on a field, and the one remaining at the end of the game is called the victor egg. There are villages where, on the Sunday after Easter, everyone takes an egg to the market square and throws it into the air. He who fails to catch his egg as it comes down must pay a forfeit and runs a good chance of having it break on his head.

Nor must we forget the Easter egg hunts of our own land and the famous egg rolling contests held on the White House lawn each Easter time.

Of course, in the beginning, the eggs were all laid by hens or other poultry, and were colored red or left in their original condition. However, as time went on, the eggs, particularly in Slavic countries, began to be decorated in brilliant colors and designs, until today in the countries of Central Europe egg painting has become an art in itself.

Many designs are traditional in certain villages, where patterns and coloring secrets have been handed down from mother to daughter for generations. Some (Continued on page 8)

## Mrs. Hagar Sees Duck From South America In Area

Rarely does a year go by without Mrs. Jack Hagar of Rockport, nationally-known bird woman—making some discovery that adds to ornithologists knowledge, and now she's done it again.

The list of birds she has seen and reported from Rockport numbers between 500 and 600. A lot of them, according to the books, just didn't come to Rockport, but since she started her observations here over 20 years ago, she has added name after name to the list of those that have been seen here.

Newest addition to the list is a masked duck, named because the black band across its face looks like the mask used by highwaymen in song and story.

A little fellow, the masked duck is rarely seen north of the West Indies, and it makes its home from there south to South America, only occasionally straying north of the Mexican border.

In its native land, the masked duck is much relished as a table delicacy, because individuals are generally fat and tender.

The one seen by Mrs. Hagar was on the northern shore of Aransas Bay, near Mills' Wharf.

## Mrs. Naomi Johnson Displays Civil War Relics At Show

Relics from the Civil War were among antiques displayed by Mrs. Naomi Johnson of Rockport at the annual Gulf Coast Antique Show in Corpus Christi, which closes today at the Exposition Hall.

Among Civil War period items shown by Mrs. Naomi Johnson of Naomi's Antiques in Rockport was a shaving stand of pine, trimmed in walnut. It has a marble top and a drawer.

She also displayed a maple chair and English pitcher and bowl. Her original antique items included a late Victorian, maple sewing stand and "a very early solid brass carriage house or entrance lantern."

Mrs. Johnson also showed a platter with a picture of the original White House in the center. Around the edge 10 presidents are pictured, draped with flags, crossed swords, guns and pistols.

Among historical books, she displayed "Ladies of the White House," by Laura C. Holloway, 1881; "The Great Irish Struggle," with biographies of "Gladstone Parnell," 1886; "Picturesque Washington" by Joseph West Moore, 1889; "Reminiscence of Abe Lincoln" by Allen Thordike Rice, 1888; and a number of old poetical works and others.

## Band Receives Rating At Contest

The Aransas County High School Band participated in the University Interscholastic League concert and sight-reading contest last Friday in Edna. The band received a Division II rating in both events. Bands are not judged against each other, but against a set of standards.

A Division II rating represents "an unusual performance but not worthy of highest rating due to minor defects in performance or ineffective interpretation; comparable to a grade of 87 to 95."

In concert performance each band is required to play a march of the director's own choice and two overtures selected from a prescribed contest list. The band played "Our Glorious Land" and "Melody of Peace," and "Norwegian Folk Song Suite." The band was judged in concert by Mrs. Bryce Taylor of Three Rivers, Mr. Joe Frank of Edinburg, and Mr. Hal Spencer of Marlin.

In sight-reading, the band is allowed five minutes to study the overture and receive instructions from the director before performing the music. Mr. Lyle Skinner of Waco served as sight-reading judge.

Jackson served as a former city councilman, and was chairman of the Aransas County Navigation District for a number of years.

In the Precinct 1, Jack Horton, the incumbent, is running for reelection, and is opposed by former mayor, Hollis Collum.

## Manager Cites Work of C. of C.

What happens when a new industry comes to a Texas community? A great deal, according to Mrs. Mary Juergens, manager of the Rockport Chamber of Commerce.

Mrs. Juergens said, "If a new industry adds 100 workers to the local labor force, then the community gains 295 more people."

She said this also results in 112 new households, 51 more school children, \$590,000 more personal income per year, \$27,000 more bank deposits, 107 more passenger cars registered, 174 more workers employed, 4 more retail establishments, and \$360,000 more retail sales per year.

These figures, according to her, were compiled through a study made by the Texas Industrial Commission, and added that these economic factors stop short of another vitally important consideration; the additional local and state taxes paid by the new plants, by the additional workers employed, and by the business establishments favorably affected by the new employment.

The only organization devoting full time to the job of attracting new industry and other advantages to the community, the Rockport Chamber of Commerce will soon engage in a membership drive.

Without the energies, skills and fees of the membership, Mrs. Juergens said, a Chamber of Commerce cannot serve the community effectively.

## Candidates For School Board Ask Vote of Confidence

Both incumbents, running for re-election as trustees of the Aransas County Independent School District, have asked that people in the district turn out and vote as a gesture of confidence in the School Board's administration of the district's affairs.

"We realize," said Dr. H. F. Elliot, candidate for one of the Rockport places on the board, "that neither of us is opposed. However, we do hope that everyone in the district will turn out and give us this vote of confidence."

"We seldom have any other way of learning how residents of the district feel about things. For this reason, and because we have made some policy changes during the past year or so, we would certainly appreciate it if people would turn out Saturday."

The school election is Saturday April 1, at which time Elliot, a Rockport trustee, and Francis Rouquette, who holds one of the Fulton places on the board, are running for re-election.

J. D. Gray, school superintendent, emphasized the fact that everyone in the district is eligible to vote for both men, just as they are for every other trustee. Pointing out that the school district comprises one big precinct, he said, that only one polling booth would be open, that at the Aransas County High School.

"We do this," Gray said, "to save the district money. It is true that four places on the board are occupied by Rockport trustees, two by trustees from Fulton, and one by a trustee from Lamar, but everyone in the district is eligible to vote for every one, when their term is open. There is no breakdown like the one used for city and county, state and national elections. Aransas County Independent School District is one big precinct, and one only."

## Experimental Program In Departmentalization Started At Rockport

The following plan has been developed for use in the sixth grade of the Rockport Elementary School for the final six weeks period of the 1960-61 school year. It is an experimental program in departmentalization.

The objectives of the program are: To help provide a means of meeting the increasing pressure on the elementary school for more content subjects; to provide specialized teachers for certain subject areas; thereby strengthening presentation of content material to the student; to maintain enough "self contained classroom atmosphere" to provide a feeling of security for the immature student; to better prepare students for the junior high school program of departmentalization.

The program will include three 45 minute periods in which teachers will report to other classrooms for instruction in their fields of specialization. Mrs. Fay Hartman will teach English, Mrs. Stanley Shuts, science, Mr. Paul Clark, mathematics. If successful departmentalization will be continued next year.

## Service Officer Attends Clinic

Ed Barnard, Veterans County Service Officer for Aransas County, attended a Regional Rehabilitation Clinic for Veterans Service Officers which is being conducted in Corpus Christi, Texas, March 27-28, 1961.

This Regional Clinic was conducted by the Veterans Affairs Commission, in cooperation with the various Veterans Organizations and the Veterans County Service Officers Association of Texas. The purpose of the clinic was to offer Service Officers from the 60-county South Texas Region an opportunity to gain first-hand knowledge of recently enacted legislation dealing with benefits to veterans, their dependents and survivors. Topics discussed during the 2-day Clinic included compensation, pension, government insurance, GI loans, education and training for veterans and war orphans, veterans employment and re-employment rights, and hospital and outpatient treatment for veterans.

Section Seven-four and Section Eight-two gave the most out of eight sections in the junior high school.

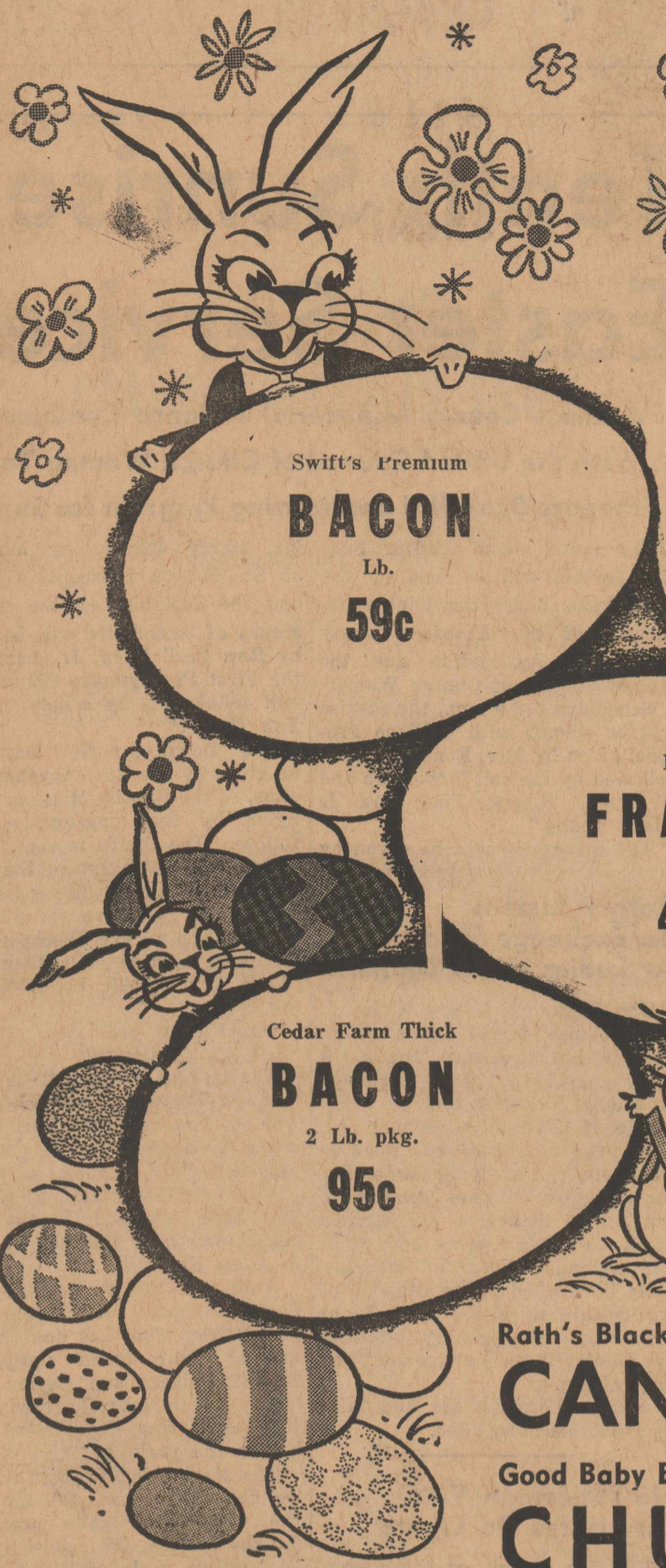

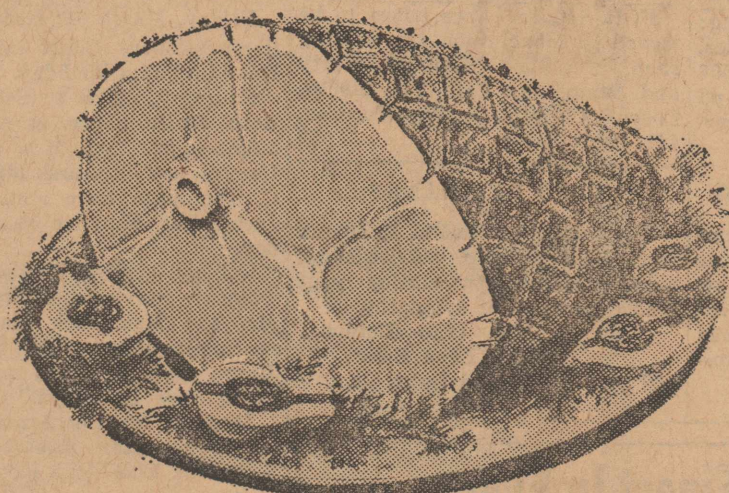

**TEXAS LAWYERS**

**Captain L. H. McNelly, Ranger**

*"Speak softly, but say something...  
You'll be heard!"*

One of Texas' most respected Rangers was described by historian Walter Prescott Webb as "a tallish man of quiet manner, with the soft voice of a timid Methodist preacher." It was said that as a scout during the Civil War L. H. McNelly had been able to disguise himself, successfully, as a woman.

But no one of Captain McNelly's special Ranger force would ever believe it. Some had known him since, at the age of 17, he enlisted in Co. F, 5th Reg., Texas Mounted Volunteers. Many of them were with him during the Civil War, at Val Verde, Brashear City, Lafourche, Mansfield, and knew all about this quiet man's contempt of danger. After the reactivation of the Texas Rangers in 1874, they saw him step into the sizzling Sutton-Taylor feud in DeWitt City, and chill it thoroughly. They went with him to the Rio Grande to suppress border trouble, and saw the border bandits simmer down to drowsy peace. This was the last service he was able to perform for his state. Not long after his outstanding border clean-up, Captain McNelly contracted tuberculosis and died, September 4, 1877, at his plantation home in Washington County. He was only 33 years of age.

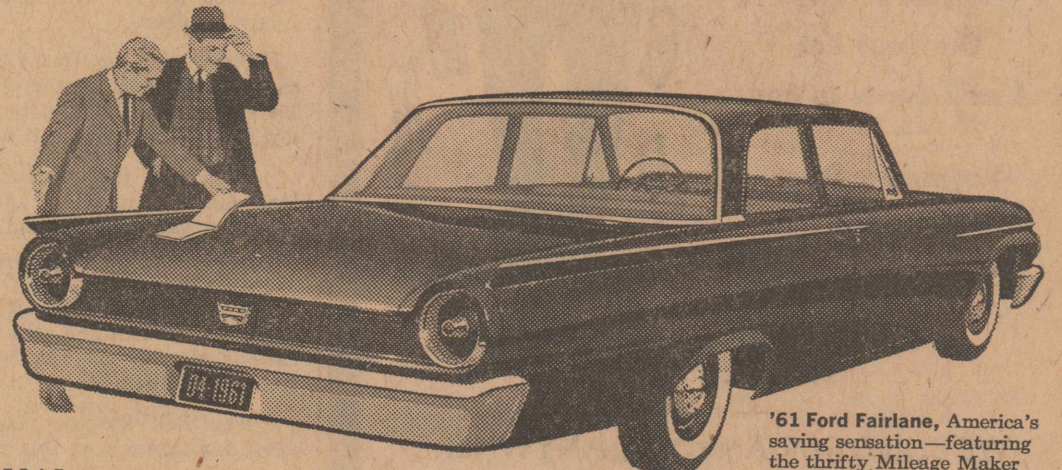

**EASTER EGGS—**

of the eggs are boiled for eating, but Czechoslovakia uses the real egg shell with the insides blown out. These are decorated so ex-

quisitely by a process similar to batik making that they look like lovely pieces of printed silk. Not all Easter eggs are the products of a hen, however. Many Russian eggs, before the country withdrew from civilization were made of wood, beautifully

hand-carved and painted, most of these were of two pieces fitted together, so that a gift could be contained in their interior. Moreover, in Czarist Russia, the Easter eggs of the wealthy were once fashioned from gold, ivory, or china and jewels, and might represent the labor of many a master craftsman. One, owned by a lady in Corpus Christi, is of wood, and

opens into a tiny bar with a decanter and four tiny glasses. In the 19th century, many beautiful hand-painted china eggs were made. There were also eggs made of bisque, milk glass, satin glass, and spatter, as well as eggs of tin, paper and sugar. Many of these bore legends like "Let Easter Gladness Fill Your Hearts," "Easter Joy," and similar good

wishes. Occasionally other sentiments were expressed, such as "In This Dear Little Painted Egg I Send You a Kiss," or, sarcastically, "He Who Wants to Know All Must Sit on This Egg a Year." These eggs ranged in size from a hen's to that of an ostrich. Occasionally was made of bisque to show a baby hatching out. The face was on one side, the feet on the other.

Large and small paper box eggs were made of brightly-colored paper pasted in strips over a cardboard box frame. They contained many designs, such as flowers and rabbits, and has lace paper lining in which candy or gifts were placed.

Italian wooden eggs sometimes contained little dolls. Then there were the scenic eggs. These ranged from two to eighteen inches in length and were of white crystals decorated with colored frosting. In one end was a window through which various scenes were visible.

Just what the Easter rabbit has to do with the whole thing no one seems to have been able to figure out, for the beginning of his association with the festival is lost in the mists of antiquity.

Today Easter eggs have been transformed into chocolate and tinsel or to brilliant cardboard covers for candy. Yet, though its presence is no more than a convention, and whether it be plain or colored, common hen's egg or confectioner's concoction, "it remains a symbol of our most remote beginnings, of our universe before heaven and earth and time were born."
