Bills Introduced Are Of Interest to People Of the 19th. District

Washington, Jan. 23, (Special).—The Congress of the United States has been in session for two weeks and 4,138 bills have been introduced. These bills have been referred to Committees and will be considered there before being given a chance to be brought before the House itself.

The first bill to be introduced into the House was one providing for the payment of the Soldiers Bonus. It is still being considered by the Committee. The only one to pass the House of Representatives was an appropriation measure known as the Independent Offices Bill.

Some bills that have been introduced which involve the interests of the 19th District particularly might be briefly outlined as follows:

1. A bill providing for the reestablishment of the HOLC.
2. A bill providing for the continuation of farm seed and feed loans.
3. A bill that would give the western part of the State of Texas supply Federal District judge.

U. S. Civil Service Exam. for Postmaster Of Spur Announced

The United States Civil Service Commission, at the request of the Postmaster General, announces a competitive examination for Postmaster in this city.

Receipt of applications to close February 12, 1935.

This examination is held under the President's Order of July 12, 1933 and not under the civil service act and rules.

Competitors will not be required to report for examination at any place, but will be rated upon their education and training, business experience, and fitness.

Apply to the secretary of the board of civil service examiners at the post office in this city or to the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C., for application Form 10, and Form 2213 containing definite information in regard to the examination.

Applications must be properly executed on Form 10 and filed with the Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C., prior to the hour of closing business on the date specified above.

SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT

The McAdoo School is getting a new coat of calcimine on the walls of the building. The football field and grounds will also be worked on. The school has an open air gymnasium recently constructed.

Dickens School: The new and beautiful Dickens School Building is beginning to show up to an advantage now that the school grounds have been cleaned, leveled and drained. In February, shubbery and trees will be set out.

The Twin Wells School is very beautiful. Recently a windmill and a water system were installed. We have fountains in each room.

The Peaceful Hill School is building a new coal house. It has set up see-saws and swings which the children are enjoying immensely.

The Wichita School is only three years old, but not withstanding its age, it has a splendid system. It has a new cistern house and has been granted State Aid to paint the teacherage and both school buildings. Also, it was granted one hundred dollars of aid with which it can and will construct play ground equipment.

Patton Springs: The new consolidated school in the north end of Dickens county presents one of the most interesting spectacles in the county. The large main building is being built well and rapidly. This will be one of the best constructed buildings in this part of Texas. In another part of the large campus the bus sheds are going up. Across from the main building the superintendent's home is under construction. The Vocational Agriculture class is supervising the construction of an adobe house for their class. Some decorative masonry is being done at the front of the campus. Much of this work is being done with federal labor.

The Spur Stadium is a marvelous and stupendous thing. It is said to be second in the United States. Only the Rose Bowl in Los Angeles surpasses it.

Big Crew at Work On New Fire Line Water Main Here

A large crew are at work this week on the installation of a fire line water main along Hill Street and connecting the three schools of the city. The work is being rushed to completion so that it will be installed before construction begins on the new highway, which will be routed along Hill Street in a new course through the city.

Fire main pipe will also be installed in the heart of the business district and made accessible to sixteen principal blocks. Upon completion of the project a considerable reduction in fire insurance rates will be made and city officials estimate that this saving alone will pay the complete cost of the improvements in ten years time as well as give greater and more dependable fire protection.

J. H. Clay, well-known engineer of the city, is in charge of the installation work.

Tech College Is Made Depository of Federal Gov't. Documents

Washington, Jan. 23, (Special).—The announcement has been made from the office of George Mahon, Congressman of the 19th District, that Texas Technological College, at Lubbock had been named as the Government Depository Library for his District.

After contacting the Government Printing Office, Mr. Mahon found that he was entitled to designate one school in his District to serve as a depository for all Government documents and official publications. In answer to a written request that a selection be made, he sent his official choice to the Superintendent of Documents, naming Texas Tech. Mr. Mahon expressed pleasure at being able to cooperate in aiding the College in this matter.

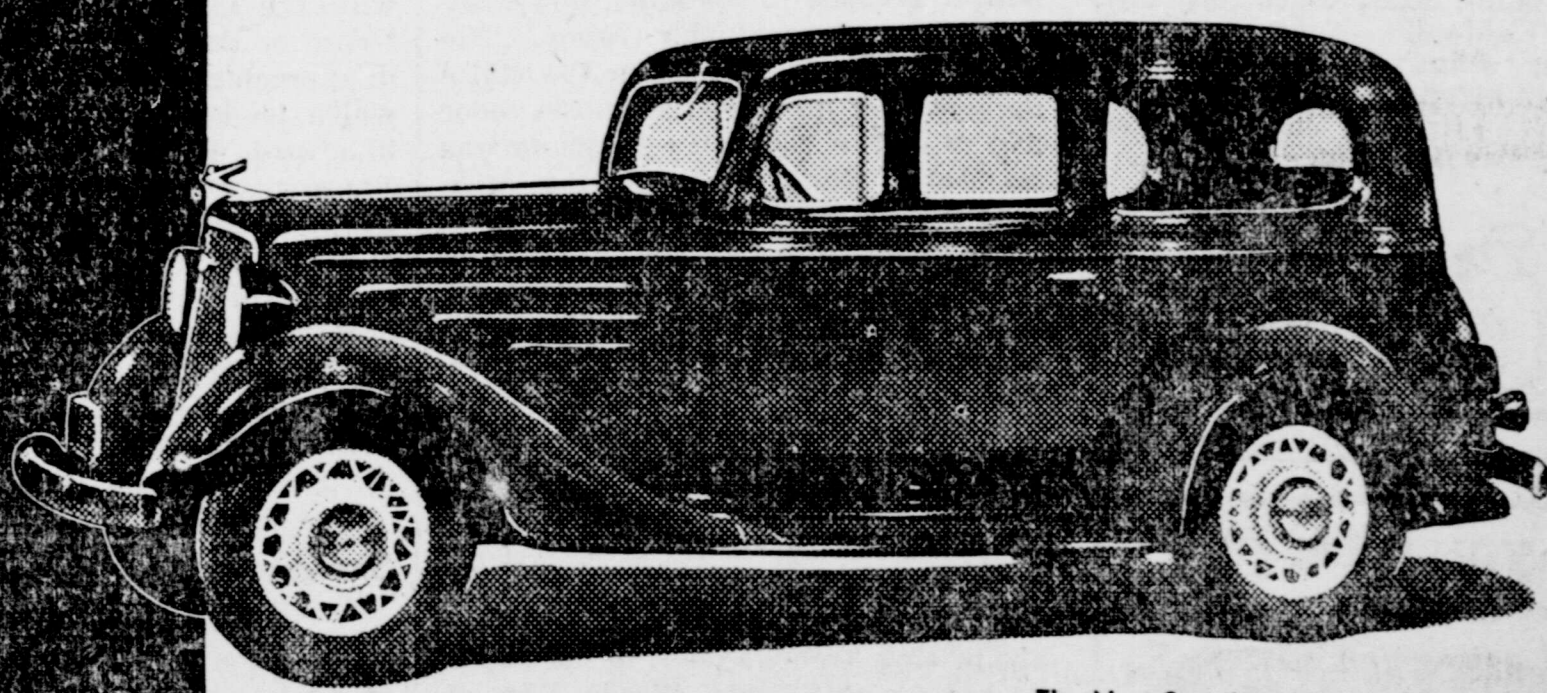

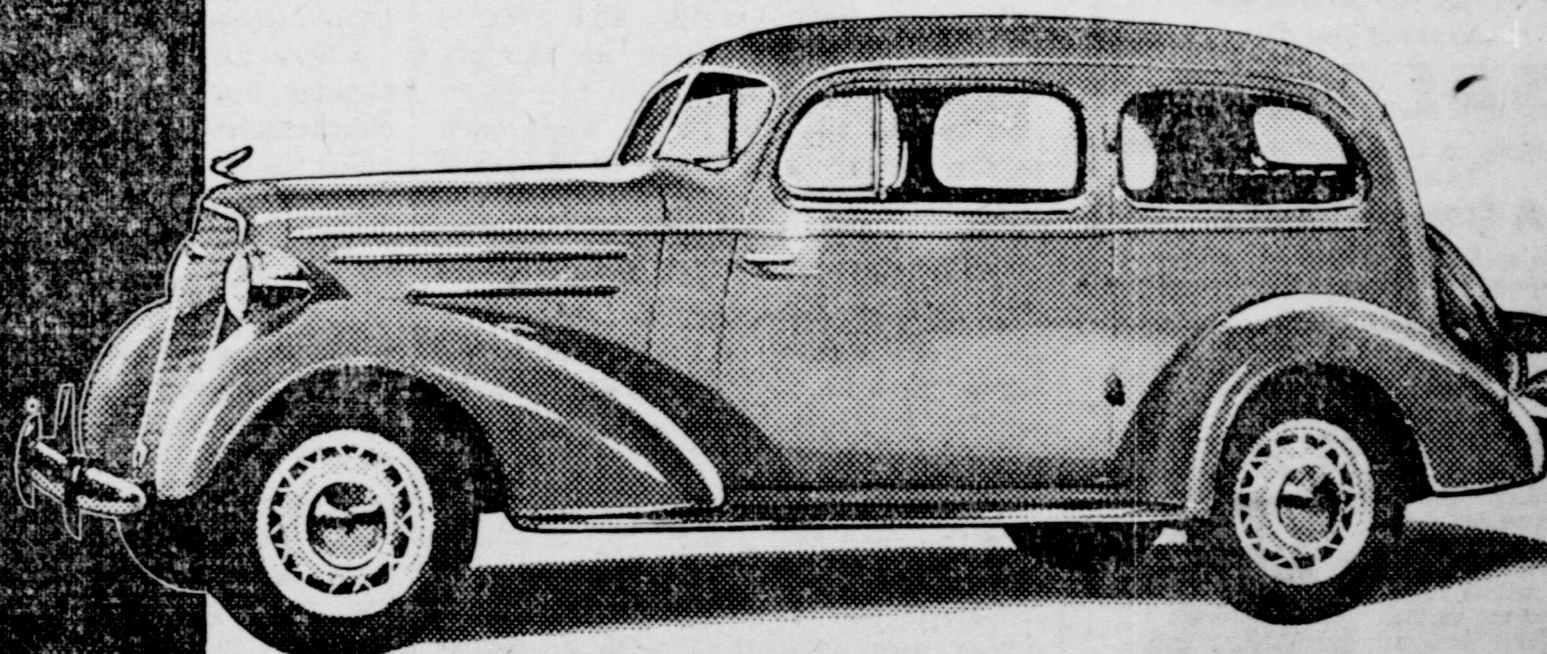

too, will be eligible for Federal Aid. Miss Mann says that she never heard of such grades as the schools made on Standardization, and never saw such enthusiasm before as our teachers, trustees, pupils, and patrons have. Much hard work has been done in making our schools standard.

The highest possible grade is 1000 points. Before these schools receive the certificates, we must wait for examinations which will be given the last part of April.

Miss Mann complimented our schools from every angle. She thinks we have remarkable teachers, trustees, and patrons. Much of the progressiveness and leadership occupied by Dickens County Schools can be attributed to our wide awake, loyal, and enthusiastic citizens.

MEETING OF DICKENS COUNTY EDUCATIONAL ASSOCIATION

The Dickens County Educational Association met in regular session Thursday, January 17 in the East Ward Building at Spur.

Mr. Fred C. Haile made a very interesting, entertaining and highly appreciated address. Musical numbers were rendered by The Merry Mandolin Maids. A musical reading, "A Little Journey Through Life," was given by Medames Granberry, Zachry, and McKnight. Mr. Sam Z. Hall gave an address on The Curriculum. Following this speech, Mr. McDonald, Director of Extension in Texas Technological College, who came here on invitation to assist in the organization of an extension course, made several announcements concerning a Curriculum Class. If as many as forty take this work, the price will be \$7.50. A reduction is given by this college as by others of Texas in order to co-operate with the State Department of Education in the big program that our State Superintendent, Mr. L. A. Woods, is launching. Miss Mann, Deputy State Superintendent over District No. 3, explained further the State's scheme and encouraged the organization of such a course. It was decided to meet Tuesday, January 22 in an organization meeting.

Messrs. Ivy, Langston, Reid, and Seals sang "Home on the Range." Mrs. Twaddell and Miss Mann talked about the Music program. Miss Mann demonstrated the use of the Victrola in teaching music. The body assembled decided, as the school already have these records, to substitute them for the choral records that the League has been using heretofore. One advantage, too, that this arrangement will have will be that the primary group will have a different kind of song from the intermediate crowd.

MUSIC PROGRAM

The schools of the county have Victrolas, one song book and uniform sets of records bought by the State of Texas. These records contain one hundred and forty pieces of music. We shall get a few more records later when our Texas songs have been recorded. The State has published a music bulletin which is in the hands of our teachers. Some of the songs are so selected as to be appropriate to primary children, some to intermediate, and others to high school and community singing. The songs are so written as to develop the ability of the children in the

use of their voices.

These songs will be sung both with and without the Victrola. The children will memorize the songs. Mental development will come from the memory work connected with the music project.

Each school will have a choir of from 10 to 30 pupils. The larger school will have a primary and an intermediate choir, and the rural schools a mixed choir. From these community choirs a county choir will be selected. This choir will be carried to Abilene in April to sing before a State Convention of Rural Supervisors and County Superintendents. In 1935, Dr. Woods, the State Superintendent, wants each county to take a choir to Dallas to sing at the Texas Centennial. He hopes to have as many as 50,000 children together, singing the same songs to the same time with uniform enunciations, etc. a music program. Dickens County has done more with this program up to now than the neighboring counties, but it still has much to do.

TESTING PROGRAM

Each year for four years, we have given scientific tests to the pupils of the county. We have found from year to year, as the county becomes better organized, that the grades made are higher. If the condition of the pupils can be normal when these examinations are given, they serve as a very accurate barometer to the work done.

This year before our schools achieve their standardization certificates, the pupils in the schools concerned must make grades that measure as average grades in the State. We in District No. 3, which is composed of twelve counties, are going to give our final tests about the last of April. The tests will be uniform examinations given by teachers trained in a school to be held at Aspermont. These key people will be selected in an educational meeting. The purpose of this district training is to assure us that all of them will be administered in exactly the same manner.

Dickens County has been recognized as a leading county in the educational field as in other lines. It is up to us as patrons, pupils, trustees, teachers, and county school superintendent to see that our standard of school work is so high that we can retain our position of leadership. There is a contest on between us and these other eleven counties. Let us not fall our county. If we are to become as good as we hope to be it is going to take an everlasting and persistent effort on the part of all of us.
