This is National Newspaper Week. A week that is set aside to acquaint the public with the necessity of a newspaper, what it means to a community.

No community, however small, should be without a newspaper to tell the world what is happening in that community. It is the duty and privilege of the home town newspaper to keep the people informed of what has or what will happen. The weekly paper especially should not be concerned too much with news that happens outside their community. There is usually enough that happens in the community to fill the average paper. Those who subscribe for the home paper want to get the news about the community in which they live—all state and national news is gotten from a daily paper.

The Mitchell County News has endeavored to carry out such a policy through the years and will continue to do so as long as we are able to continue publishing a paper in Loraine.

Advertising is the commodity a newspaper sells to pay expenses of its operation. A subscription to the paper will hardly buy the newspaper that goes into it. Hence, the subscribers have a duty to perform—that of reading the advertisements in the home paper so that the home merchants will continue advertising to support the paper.

Sometimes people berate the editor for not having a certain news article in the paper. A newspaper reporter can't be at all places at the same time and it is sometimes necessary to depend upon someone telling the news to the reporter. Nothing that is important is left out purposefully.

I sometimes think every person should have some experience in newspaper work to give them an insight into what has to be done to publish a newspaper of any size. It would at least give them a better knowledge of human nature with its whims.

Ordinarily one would think it is easy to publish a newspaper. Let's see if it is: First, you would think people would almost run over themselves to give an item of news in to the paper; second you would think that the merchants would be so anxious to let the public know what they have to sell that it would be no trouble at all to get the ads for the paper; you would think that public officials would be anxious for the public to know what is going on in the local government, city or school. But it isn't always true. Most of the time a representative of the paper has to hunt down news, has to beg for advertising and sometimes go back again and again to get the copy. It isn't all a breeze by any means.

After the news has been run down it has to be typed into story form, turned over to the Linotype operator where it is set into type, proof read, then goes to the make-up man who places it in the page form, takes it to the press and prints the paper. An advertisement first goes to the mark-up man who marks the size and style type to be used. Then it goes to the ad man who builds it into the ad you see in the paper.

This man said he wouldn't, and come to think of it, I wouldn't either. As a matter of fact, I think Ike has made us one of the best presidents we ever had. If we had to go to war, I'd certainly rather have him at the head of our government than any other living American. But even more importantly—I'm convinced he is the best man to keep us OUT of war.

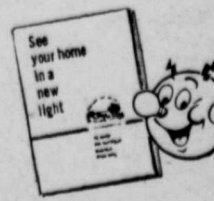
