Some Thoughts On War Watching..And Responsible Reporting

Two weeks ago I wrote an article dealing with television newspeople creating news instead of reporting it.

Since then things have changed...they certainly don't have to create news about the Gulf War, there is plenty to report.

But once again we are seeing what to me is a very irresponsible aspect of visual media reporting.

No war in the history of the world has been more reported. War watching is a national pastime since last Wednesday, as we all sit watching as nearly instantaneous videos of missile attacks and air raids unfold before our eyes.

But just how many times now have we also watched as various officials, from the President of the United States on down have been literally harassed by the news media about exact figures, and what plan they intend to use next?

Why does any news person expect to get statements about when the air war will give way to a ground offensive, how many missiles the U.S. still has left or what the next stage of a campaign will be?

Anyone should be able to see that this information cannot be released.

Can't you just see the scene now-a-days carefully clad reporter standing in front

of a world map reporting: "And tomorrow, General Such and Such has said, they will begin a bombardment of the north west sector of Baghdad at 8 p.m. Eastern Standard Time. Four hundred planes are expected to be used in this particular mission, and they will be approaching at 3000 feet from a westerly."

That almost seems to be what these news hounds are wanting!

Of course freedom of the press is a basic amendment, and I support it. But I also believe that while the public has a right to know, the military has a right to withhold information which might jeopardize an operation.

Another common practice going on with interviewers is the tactic of "putting words in someone's mouth".

Personally, most of the officials interviewed have been more patient than I would have been with having to repeat "That is NOT what I said" or "I've already told you we cannot reveal this information at this time".

Visual media has a major advantage over the print journalists right now. They can broadcast live every few minutes. They don't have to deal in cold hard facts the way a paper does. Instead they have the luxury of dealing in entertainment.

Can you imagine reading a newspaper account in which the reporter kept saying "There's another flash of light, and then there goes another". As fascinating as this is, it doesn't really tell us too much. Later, when things need to be recapped, it's the written word that we tend to go back to for hard facts.

It's easy to check facts and quotations in print. Voice inflections don't interfere with content. Action photos don't take away from concentration.

I also feel Americans have enough sense to listen to a report or speech and not require an interpretation of what was said immediately afterwards.

So called "experts" have been interviewed and consulted until speculation seems to equal facts.

Obviously I'm prejudiced in favor of print...but whether it's a news reporter with a tv camera or a print reporter with a pad and pencil, both have a very deep responsibility to balance good reporting with responsible reporting.

Getting the news is one thing...misinterpreting it or dealing with speculation is something else again.

Please ladies and gentlemen of the media...a little responsible reporting here!

We have contacted a few relatives of those who are currently serving in the Middle East during this crisis. Others were unavailable, or we don't know about them yet.

Every week until the war is over we want to run a column about these brave servicemen and women, and want to encourage the family and friends of each and every one to contact us and let us know when they hear from their loved one.

Ted and Kay Byndas, whose son, Staff Sergeant Douglas Byndas is a member of the Air Force 33rd Combat Communication squad, report that their son called last Saturday morning, but they were not home. He left a message on their answering machine telling them that he was fine.

Nelda Harrell, of Jennings, reports that her son, Spc. Rodney C. Harrell, a Prairiland High School graduate, called them about 5:45 on Tuesday, Jan. 15. He is with the 82nd Airborne division. Nelda says that he was confident, and she isn't worrying too much, placing her faith in God.

Sgt. Tony Livingston is with the Engineering Battalion and called his wife Carmen in Germany. He has a 3 year old daughter, Cindy, and a 7 year old stepson, Randy. They all are in Germany. After hearing from him, Carmen called Tony's mother in Bogata and reported that he said he was "okay and not to worry." He is in Saudi Arabia but wasn't allowed to report where.

News about Tammie Richardson and Charles Owens, both from the Blossom area was unavailable at press time.

Sgt. L. Charles D. Weaver, in the Air Force 804 Air refueling section called his mother, Mary Bove, Sunday. He

reported that he was very tired, as they were working long hours, but otherwise is fine.

Donald Wayne Dillion, in the U.S. Marines, is the nephew of C.D. and Jane Glass of Bogata. They heard from him on Thursday night. He was helping load helicopters.

Danny Billy, who is with the U.S. Marine Medical Detachment, reported in phone calls Tuesday morning to his uncle, Joseph Wesley of Deport, and his mother, Molly, that he was okay, but tired. They are on alert, of course.

Danny also told them that Lonnie McKel, another Deport native, was all right, and that they had had the chance to visit several days ago.

Charles Fast is an Army Sgt. in the First Cavalry Division out of Ft. Hood.

Mrs. Jenae Fast talked to Chares after Thanksgiving. He called Christmas, but they missed his call. Jenae reports that she receives letters about every nine days. She is used to Charles being away, since they lived in Germany for three years and only moved back in June.

The last time Jenae knew where Charles was stationed in the war he was "somewhere between Syria and the Iraqi border."

Please, help people keep abreast of those who are so far away...when you hear from any family member of friends in the Middle East, give us a call even if all you have to report is that they are fine. That's the best news of all!

Ann has chosen to share several Mexican dishes that her family enjoys. Ann loves to cook but does not have a lot of time to devote to it. She usually cooks a lot on the weekends and seems to cook more during the winter than in the summer.

Tex-Mex Dip

1-16 oz. can refried beans w/green chilies
1-16 oz. vegetarian refried beans
4-5 ripe avocados
1-2 T. miracle whip
1/2 c. lemon juice
garlic salt to taste
2 oz. Colby/Monterey Jack Cheese (grated)
Sliced black olives
1/4 c. diced tomatoes
1/4 c. green onions

Mix both cans of refried beans together and spread in oblong or oval dish making a well in center of beans. Set aside. Mash avocados and add lemon juice. Mix in miracle whip and garlic salt to taste. Hot sauce may be added to avocado mixture if desired. Pour avocado mixture on top of beans filling the well and leaving a 1/2" margin from outer edge of beans. Sprinkle with grated cheese leaving 1/2" margin from outer edge of avocado mixture. Arrange top of dip with olives, tomatoes and green onions, leaving 1/2" margin from cheese. Serve with tortilla chips. Serves 12-14.

Tacos

1-12 oz. can Libby's roast beef/gravy
5 oz. Colby/Monterey Jack Cheese (grated)
shredded lettuce
2 c. diced tomatoes
12 corn or flour tortillas
oil enough to fry 1 dozen tortillas.

Heat tortillas in microwave by placing layer of tortillas on damp paper towel and cover with another damp paper towel for 1-2 minutes or until tortillas are soft and limber. Heat roast beef in sauce pan until meat can be separated with fork and meat is steamy. Drain off

gravy. Place 2-3 tablespoons of meat mixture in each tortilla and fold over in half. Fry tortillas in hot oil just enough to set fold for softer tacos and longer for crisper tacos. Place on several layers of paper towels to absorb extra oil. Immediately put small amount of grated cheese in each tortilla. Add shredded lettuce and diced tomatoes. Serve warm. Makes approximately 1 dozen. Shredded chicken may be substituted for beef.

Nachos

1-16 oz. can refried beans w/green chilies
3 oz. Colby/Monterey Jack cheese (grated)
hot sauce to taste
round tortilla chips

Spread thin layer of beans onto chips. Top with grated cheese. Place in microwave until cheese is melted. Top with hot sauce. Serve warm. Makes about 3-4 dozen.

Enchilada Casserole

1 1/2-2 lbs. ground beef
garlic salt to taste
2-10 oz. cans enchilada sauce
5 oz. Colby/Monterey Jack Cheese (grated)
2 dozen corn tortillas

Brown ground beef adding garlic salt to taste. Drain and set aside. Heat enchilada sauce in 10" fry pan. Place tortillas in sauce just enough to soften and coat lightly with sauce. Arrange coated tortillas in 9 1/2 x 12 baking dish in single layer. Add layer of ground beef. Top with layer of cheese. Continue to layer as described above until all tortillas and ground beef are used. Top with thick layer of cheese. Place in 350 oven for 20-25 minutes or until cheese is melted and bubbly. Serves 8-10.

Verna Betty Hill Dies January 19

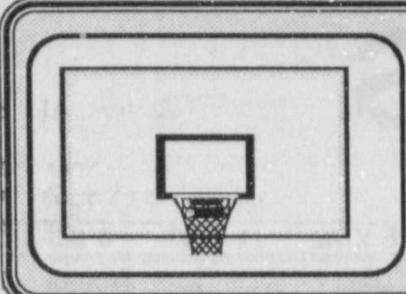
Verna Betty Dougan Hill, 76, of Denison died Saturday, January 19 at a Denison hospital.

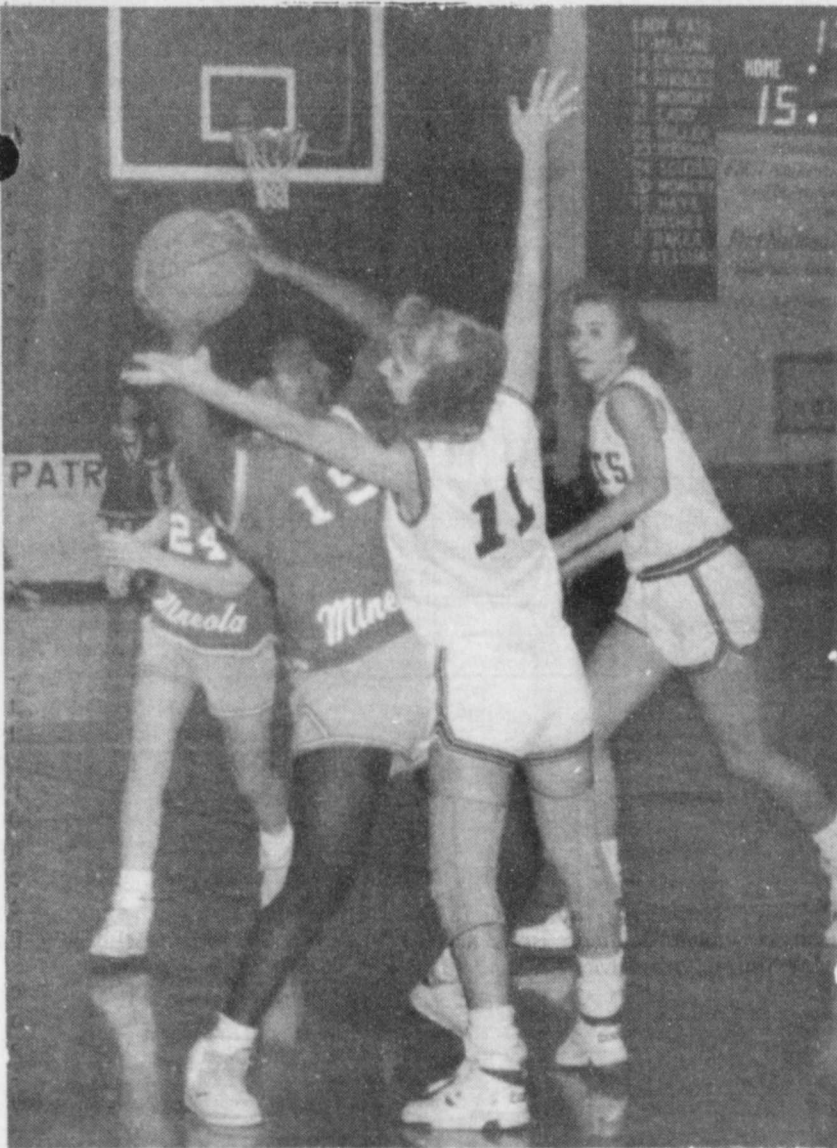

A bass fishing technique teleconference will be from 7 to 10 p.m. Thursday, February 7. Instructors are Hank Parker and Rich Tauber.

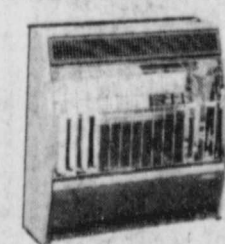

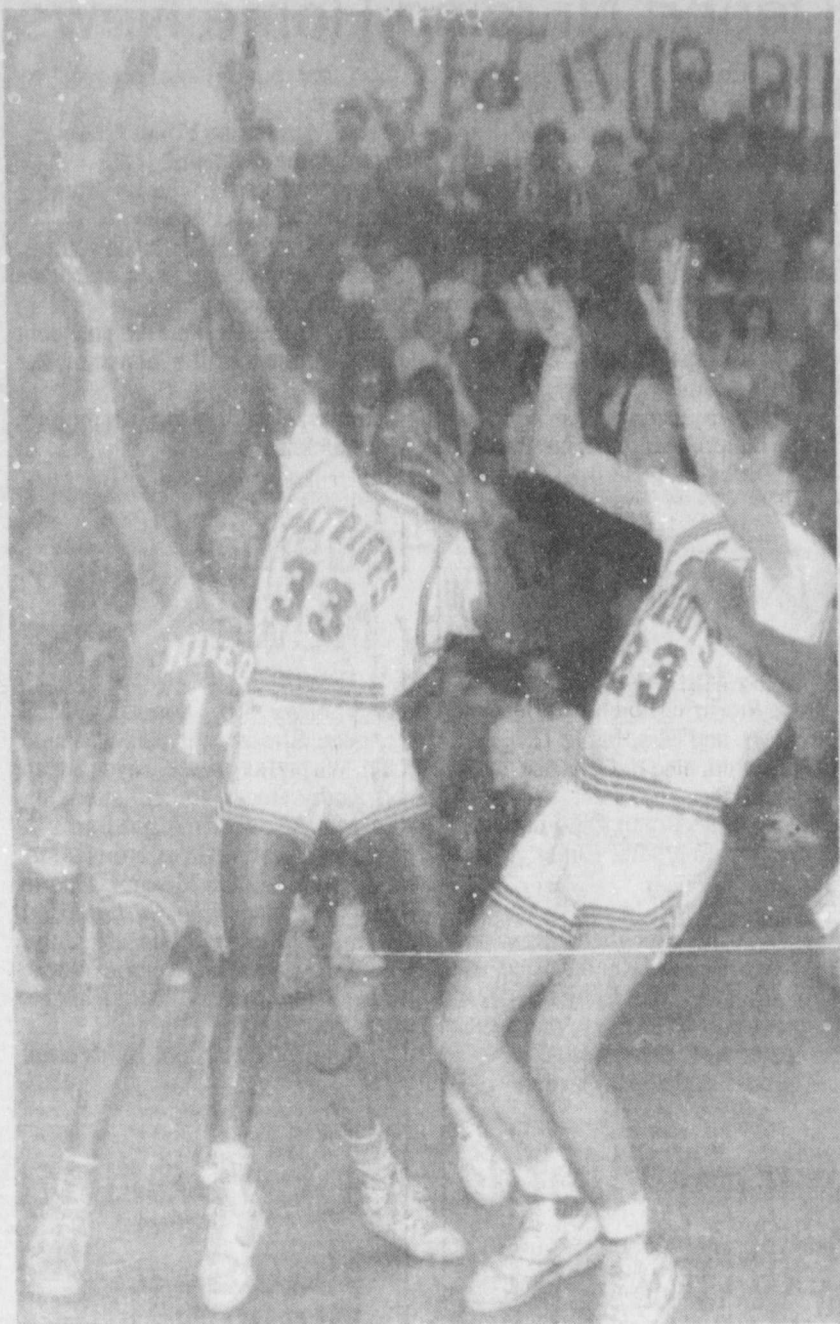

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TAX TIPS

Filing Your 1990 Tax Return

Yes, it's time again to file your tax return. Don't procrastinate; file early so that you can get a head start on your 1991 tax and financial planning. Gather all your 1990 tax information as soon as possible. Typical documents that you'll need include forms such as W-2's, 1099's, and K-1's (from partnerships, S corporations, etc.) You'll also need to check your records for alimony paid or received, unemployment or social security benefits received, rental income and expenses, retirement plan contributions, job-related expenses, estimated taxes paid, and child or dependent care expenses. If you're in doubt about the relevance of any piece of information in your files, take it with you to your tax appointment and ask your accountant about it. Remember, you also need to have social security numbers for any dependents you'll be claiming who are two years or older.

Get details on items you think might apply to you (such as the earned income credit if you are a low-income working parent). Also, while you're gathering your own tax information, check the filing requirements for your children. If any of them is required to file a return, pull together that information at the same time.

If you cannot gather all your tax information in time for the April 15 filing deadline, you can get an automatic four month extension to file by filing Form 4868 by April 15. This is only an extension of time to file your return, not an extension of time to pay your tax bill. You are required to estimate any tax you still owe and send it in with Form 4868. Final Note: April 15, 1991, is also the deadline for filing an amended 1987 tax return. So if you were planning to amend your 1987 return for some reason, get it taken care of soon.

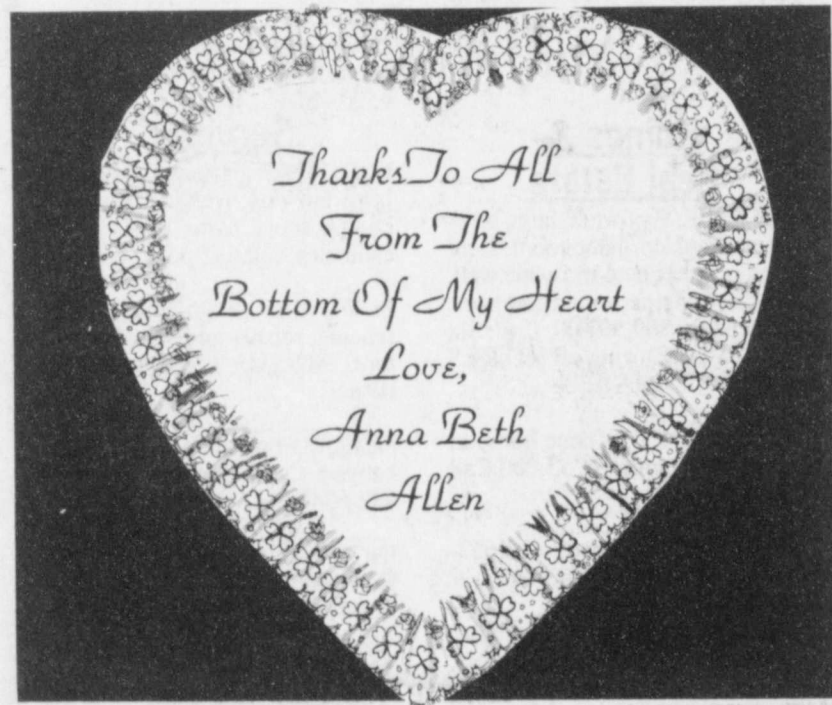
