## DEPUTY STATE SUPERINTENDENT TO VISIT SCHOOLS IN OCTOBER

Deputy State Superintendent, G. D. Holbrook of Lubbock, promised an early visit to the schools of the county this year. He will make his inspection of the schools for the purpose of granting state aid the week beginning October 5th and continuing until all schools applying for aid have been visited.

County Superintendent Pauline Bulsterbaum said that an itinerary of visits was being prepared in the office and that teachers and trustees would be notified what day their school would be visited. Trustees are expected to be on hand.

Miss Bulsterbaum urges all teachers file their certificates in the office and to submit transcripts of college training and experience records. Failure to do so might disqualify a school for aid.

In addition, trustees are asked to get building and grounds ready for inspection and to make necessary repairs.

## N. R. S. Serving As Clearing House For Farm Labor

The local supervisor of the National Re-employment Service has asked the Courier to advise local people wanting to work in the cotton harvest to register with the local office of this agency as they are having more calls for hands than they have been able to fill to date. This is a government agency and is carried on for the help of both the employer and the unemployed. Their service is given without charge to either party in the transaction.

Local families should register, giving the number of hands in the family, the approximate amount of cotton they can gather, whether they have their own transportation or not, and if they have camping equipment.

Both employees and employers will save themselves time and money by making use of this service as the record kept by the office makes it easy for them to get the farmer just the type of labor best suited to his individual conditions.

They are also having quite a few calls for domestic help according to the local manager.

## Company 3811 Leads Eighth District In Education Program

"The Best Educational Program in the Lubbock District three months in succession," this is the record made by the Enrollees of the Lamesa Company, and definitely established the camp in the place of leadership in educational activity not held by any other camp since the establishment of a graded program.

The program is rated according to a comprehensive score card that takes into account practically every type of activity engaged in by the men of the company.

Some of the outstanding features of Lamesa's program include 100 per cent enrollment in 28 classes and educational groups by enrollees; 90 per cent attendance at classes and activity-meetings; and provision for additional lectures, correspondence courses, informal and miscellaneous activities included in a well rounded program.

In interest and accomplishment the company is working at 90 per cent capacity, according to rating given report issued August 17 by the Commanding Officer of the Lubbock District.

## Amateur Contests During Dawson County Fair

An applause machine similar to those used in nationally known amateur contests will decide the fate of Dawson County performers who compete in the three day amateur contests to be held during the 1936 Dawson County Fair, October 15th, 16th, and 17th.

Local amateurs will perform on the stage of an immense trailer truck secured especially by the Fair Association. The stage of the truck is furnished with a piano and couches and accommodates fifty performers. The normal equipment is five loud speakers, but carrying its own generators, is able to switch on four additional amplifiers, if the audience demands it.

A well known out of town master of ceremonies will present the amateurs to their audience in a manner that promises to be a show in itself. All types of amateur entertainment are invited, and applications must be mailed to Amateur Contest, Box 843, postmarked not later than October 5th. Professionals that cannot meet the amateur qualifications may appear on the programs, but cannot compete for the five cash prizes offered in each daily contest nor for the grand prizes offered at the final contest Saturday night, October 17th.

Full details of the amounts of the prizes and the method of elimination will be announced later.

## Sale of Fair Tickets To Be Made By 4-H Club Members

Tickets are now ready for distribution to the 4-H club boys and girls of the county, who have been designated to handle this part of Fair advance preparation. A ticket sales contest has been inaugurated and worth while prizes are being offered to the boys and girls who sell the most tickets to the celebration.

The Fair is sponsored by the 4-H clubs of the county and all the members are going to do their best to promote the program and make this the best Fair ever held in Dawson county. At the same time members will be given a chance at cash awards for extra service rendered in the sale of these tickets.

The first prize for the boy club member who sells the most tickets will be \$15. The second high boy in sales will receive \$10, while \$5 will be given to the boy selling the third most. The same prize schedule will prevail among the girl members. This will total \$50 in prize money to the leaders of the two groups.

In addition to the prizes offered, each club member who sells tickets will be given a commission of 5 per cent on all tickets they sell.

## Lamesa School Make Substantial Gain In Attendance

The enrollment in the Lamesa Elementary School had reach 788 on Monday of this week and high school had received 421 pupils making a total of white children of 1209 exclusive of the post graduate and part time pupils. The principal increase in the local schools is to be found in the elementary school grades which are now about 100 ahead of the corresponding time for last year. The gain in high school enrollment is about a half dozen over the corresponding time last session.

The establishment of classified four year high schools at Klondike and Ackerly has provided four year high school opportunities for pupils of communities which were formerly served by Lamesa High School.

The last available room is being fitted up this week. Four rooms in the high school building are given over to pupils of the primary grades of the Elementary school. These are on the bottom floor.

## ACKERLY SCHOOL OPENS WITH LARGE ATTENDANCE

Ackerly High School opened with a record attendance, Monday morning September 7th. Over two hundred students were enrolled, with eighty five in high school, reported Mr. J. L. Chiles, Superintendent.

A new stucco annex, consisting of two additional class rooms, study hall, and library has just been completed to take care of the increase in attendance. The new building is located just north of the old building and will house the high school, Mr. Chiles said.

Three school buses bring the children into Ackerly and transport the high school grades from Shumake district in Dawson county, Glen Creek district in Borden county, and Vealmoor and Soash Districts in Howard county. Ackerly has contracts for the high school grades with the above named districts.

The teaching force has been enlarged from seven to eight teachers. The staff this year is composed of Mr. J. L. Chiles, superintendent; Mrs. J. L. Chiles, first grade; Miss Edna Pearl Nelson, second and third grades; Miss Mayme Clanton, fourth and fifth grades; Mr. Sylvan Salsler, sixth and seventh grades; High School, Mr. Kenneth Baggett, Miss Geraldine Williams, Miss Henrietta Wilson.

Twelve units of affiliation have been granted Ackerly within the past year and it has been classified as a four year high school by the State Department of Education. Only four additional units are needed to make Ackerly a fully accredited four-year high school. Every effort will be put forth to acquire these additional units this year.

## Plans Completed For Celebration October 15-16-17

Officials of the Dawson County Fair Association are whipping into shape a program of fair activities which will equal any like celebration ever held in Dawson county. Joe Matthews, assistant county agent, and elected secretary of the Fair Association has been busy for the past several weeks completing arrangements for the exhibits, entertainments and premiums of the coming event. And the days of October 15, 16, and 17 will be gala days for the 4-H club boys and girls of Dawson county who are sponsoring the agricultural exhibit.

Nothing is being left undone to make this an outstanding showing of farm products and projects, entertaining and educational to visitors who attend. The entire personnel of the Fair, including J. M. Peterson, president, A. G. Beard, vice president, Joe Matthews, secretary, and Joe Williams and Miss Mattie Phenix, county agents, are sparing no effort in the planning of the fair.

For the entertainment feature of the celebration, the Fair board has made a contract with the Western States Shows to show on the grounds adjoining the exhibit tents. This show carries ten rides, twelve shows and 25 other concessions. They will arrive in Lamesa October 12 and show the entire week of October 12-17. Terms of the contract call for the Fair association to receive a percentage of all receipts of the show during its stay in Lamesa. This Fair will be unique in the fact that it is being carried on a self paying basis and merchants of Lamesa are not called on to make donations to make the fair possible. Space will be available in the exhibit buildings for those merchants who care to purchase booth space or advertising banners, but it is purely a business proposition for them with no donation system being used.

One very interesting sidelight of the main exhibit program will be an amateur contest conducted for local talent to enter with suitable prizes offered. This idea is explained more in detail in another news story on this page of the Courier.

Although no available building was large enough to house the exhibits which will be entered, the officials have secured the lots at the highway intersection of Dallas and North Fourth streets and will erect three tents to house the various exhibits. The Western States Shows will erect their tented aggregation adjoining the fair buildings.

Already about 40 4-H club calves have been entered and a like number of pigs besides poultry from several members. With about 130 members of the boys clubs signifying that they will enter some project and about 200 girls members of the 4-H clubs of the county to enter different exhibits, it looks like the club boys and girls are going to do their part to make a creditable showing of club work being carried on in the county.

The concessions in the exhibit tents will be in charge of the 4-H clubs who will have drinks, candy and lunches for sale. The profits from the sale will be used to further the work of the farm clubs of Dawson county.

A list of the premiums offered will be given in the next week's issue of the Courier and exhibitors are asked to get their exhibits ready for the best Fair on the plains.

Ticket sales have already begun. The 4-H club members will see you with tickets for the Fair. Single admission tickets are 10c each and season tickets are 25c.

In making our own kraut we want to be careful that we do not make sour kraut instead of sauer kraut.

**Sauer Kraut and Beet Salad**  
2 cups of sauer kraut.  
1 cup of chopped beets.  
1-2 cup of salad dressing.  
2 T spoonful chopped onion.  
Fluff your kraut, mix lightly with beets and stir in salad dressing. Top with the onions and a few mint or parsley leaves to add to the beauty of the dish.

**Kraut and Carrot Salad**  
2 cups of kraut.  
1 cup of chopped carrots.  
1-2 cup chopped green peppers.  
1-2 cup of salad dressing.  
Fluff kraut add chopped carrots and peppers, stir in salad dressing, heap on platters for serving.

**A One Dish Meal**  
2 cups sauer kraut.  
2 cups mashed potatoes  
2 T spoonful of butter.  
1 lb. stewed meat chopped  
Mix meat and potatoes, grease baking dish, line bottom of dish with kraut. Now put in a layer of your potatoes and meat, add another layer of kraut then potatoes and meat. Dot top with butter, place in oven and brown.

**Sauer Kraut and Tomatoes**  
Grease a baking dish. Place a layer of canned tomatoes in bottom, then a layer of kraut. Then place a layer of bread crumbs. Repeat this again, then dot with butter and place in oven to brown.

**August Banner Month For Chevrolet Dealers**

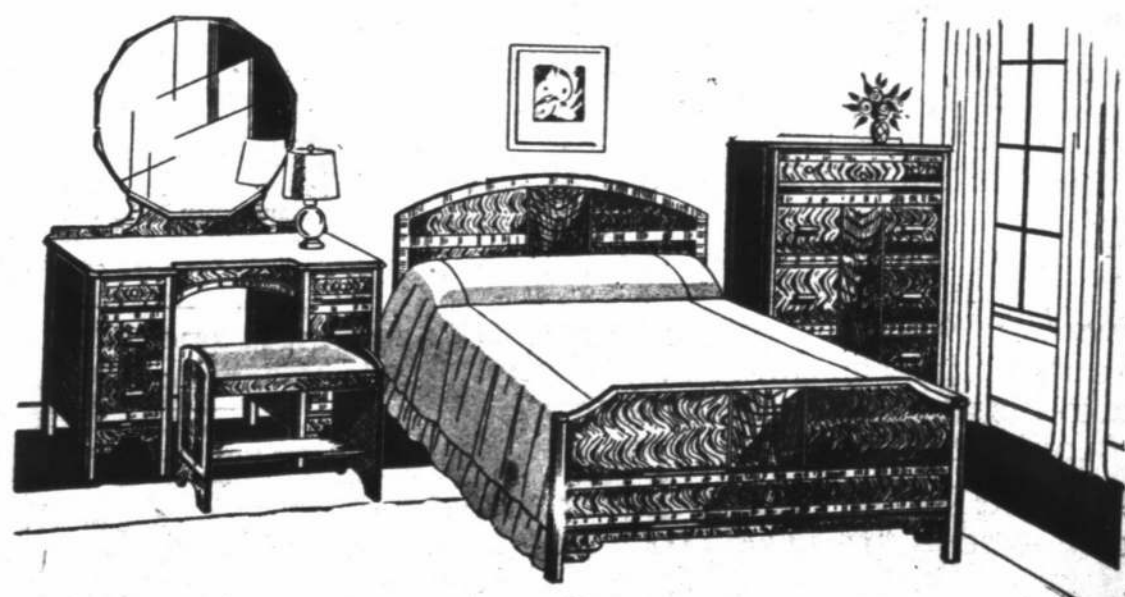

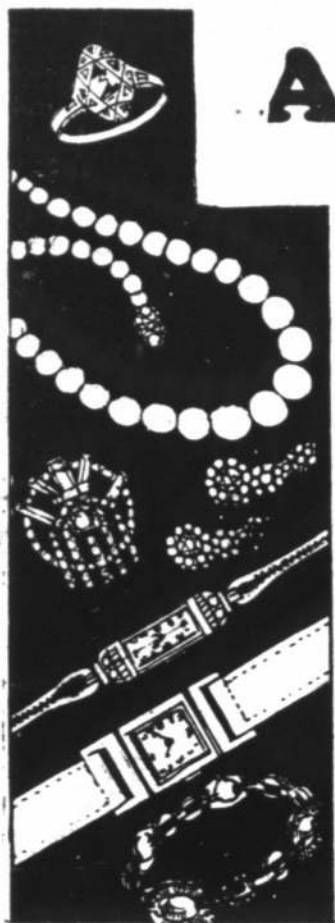

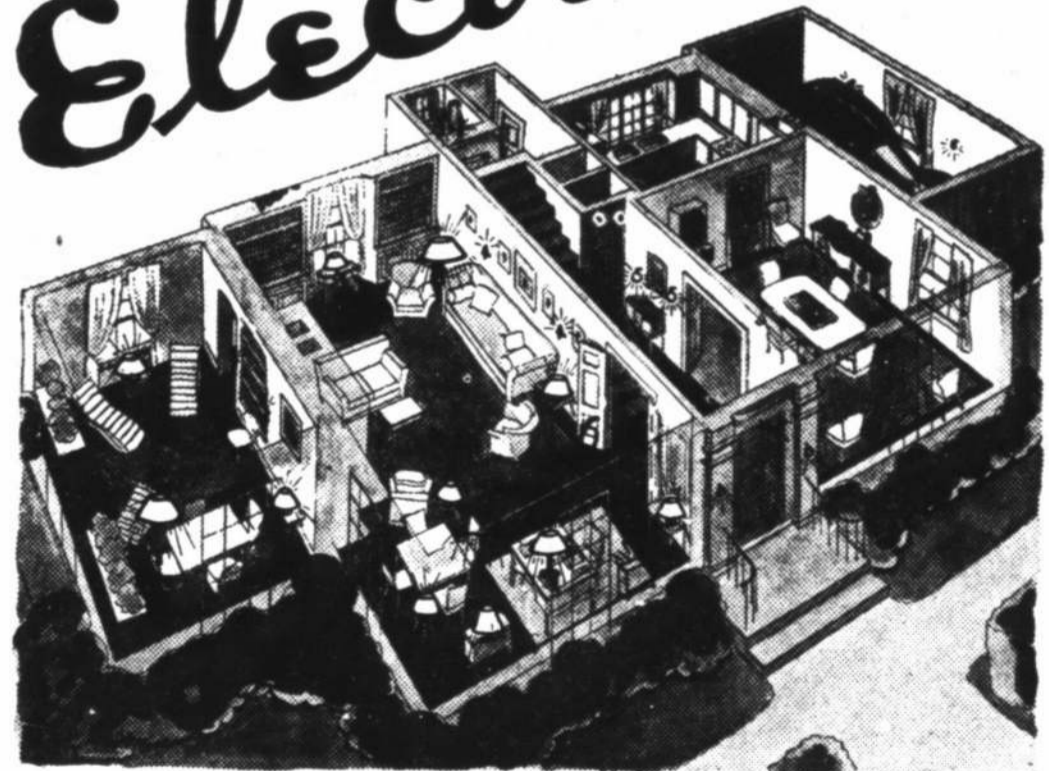

**LEGAL NOTICES**

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF LAMESA, TEXAS, Forbidding the sale, possession for the purpose of sale, firing, discharging, igniting, or exploding of fireworks, within the fire limits of the City of Lamesa, Texas, describing and defining such fire limits, defining terms and fixing penalties for violation of said ordinance.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF LAMESA, TEXAS

Section 1. The term "fireworks" shall include firecrackers, Roman candles, skyrockets, torpedoes, and all packages containing combustible or explosive material, save and except ammunition for firearms.

Section 2. For the purpose of this act the "fire limits" are and shall be bounded on the North by the North boundary line of North Second Street on the South by the South boundary line of South Second Street, on the

East by the East Boundary line of Dallas Street, and on the West by the West Boundary line of Houston Street, and shall include all blocks, lots, streets, alleys and territory within such boundaries.

Section 3. It shall be unlawful hereafter for any person to sell or to possess, for the purpose of sale, within such fire limits, any fireworks.

Section 4. It shall be unlawful hereafter for any person to shoot, fire, discharge, ignite or explode any fireworks as herein defined, within, on or upon the fire limits of the City of Lamesa, Texas, whether the same be done by means of fire, flame, spark, or impact or contact with another object, or otherwise.

Section 5. Any person who shall violate any provision of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not less than Five Dollars nor more than two hundred dollars, and each shooting, firing, discharging, igniting or exploding any fireworks shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 6. In the event any section, term, provision or part hereof shall be adjudged or deemed invalid or unconstitutional, this ordinance and all other terms, sections, provisions and parts thereof, shall nevertheless be held and deemed to be in full force and effect and valid in all other respects.

Section 7. This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force and effect on and after its due publication as prescribed by law.

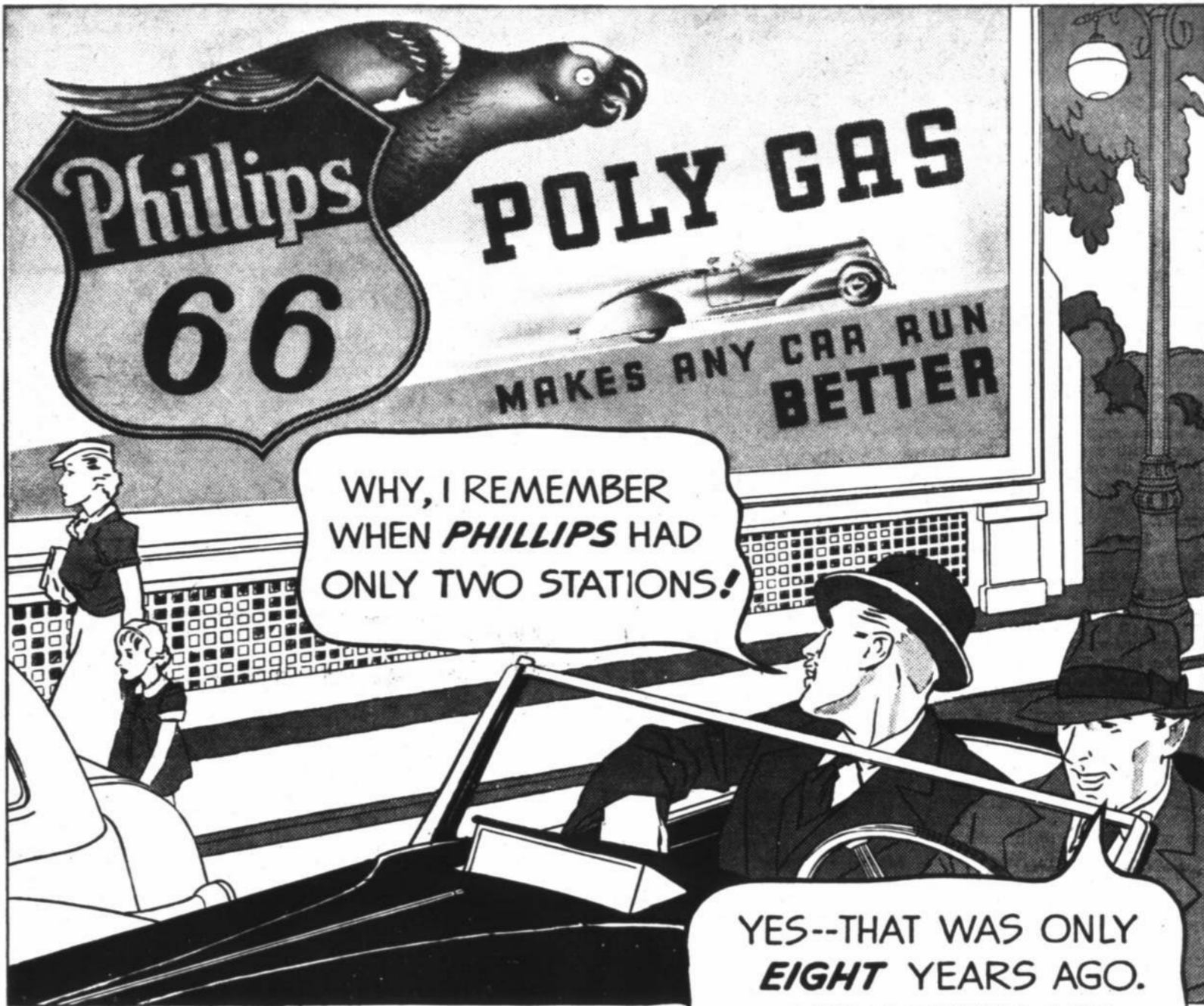

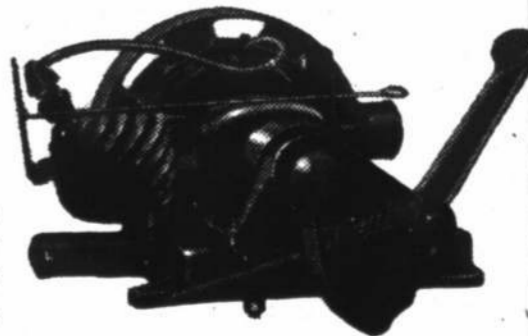

We would like to call the attention of all farmers who have any of the following crops planted as Soil Conserving Crops, Cane, milo, hegart, and fetaria. In case any of the above mentioned crops are harvested, such as cutting the heads, or as bundle feed, or pastured, that all government reduction payments will be forfeited. Regardless of the date that the crops are harvested in any manner or pastured even after the first of the year.  
Again, sudan may be harvested for seed or hay with a forfeit of the one dollar per acre as soil conserving practice. Soy beans and peas may be picked without forfeiting the soil conserving payment.

In case the cutter works with satisfaction the machine will be available for public use at a fixed charge per ton of the silage put into the silo. Mrs. Ruby Davis, and C. M. Burton have silos completed and will be filled as soon as the crops are ready to put up for silage.

**Leather Demonstration**  
There were several farmers out at the Gaston Martin farm in Spangenberg community to see the tanning done by Mr. Martin. Most of those who attended were well pleased with the leather made in the demonstration. Some made leather will be on exhibit at the County Fair in October for those who are interested in making leather for home use.

**Pasture Furrows**  
J. F. Hurst, of Spangenberg community reports that the recent rain of approximately one and one-half inches set the ground some distance from the little marks that were made with a turning plow at the time the lines were laid of on the water level in the pasture. There was a difference of one and one-half to three inches in the depth of the moisture near the marks made with turning plow during the dry weather.

"Grain sorghum, sweet sorghum, and millet are soil depleting crops if grazed, headed, or harvested in any way. These crops are soil conserving only when all the crop is left on the land or turned under.

"The Texas State Committee recommended that grain sorghum, sweet sorghum, and millet be classified as soil conserving crops when grazed. This recommendation was disapproved by the A. A. A."
