Nineteen Candidates Seeking Governorship Of Texas

TEXAS DEMOS VIEW TANGLE OF POLITICS

BICKERING OF BOSSES ADDS TO MIX-UP IN STATE RACES

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, June 10.—Ending the first phase of one of the most tangled political situations in the history of Texas, nineteen candidates for Governor—fourteen democrats and five republicans—today were properly certified for the July 26 primaries.

Largely contributing to the mixup was the unusual number of candidates, perhaps the largest field the state has ever seen. The bickering culminated yesterday at the meeting here of the State Democratic committee, at which Governor Dan Moody and former Governor James E. Ferguson clashed heatedly, and State Senator Tom B. Love, "Anti-Tammany" candidate, was mercilessly cross-examined by the committee.

G. O. P.'s Certify Five

The republicans, meanwhile, hoping to profit from the dissension in democratic ranks and repeat their landslide of 1928 when the Lone Star state deserted the democratic standard, met peacefully at Houston, and certified five candidates for Governor and a complete party slate and expressed exceptionally high hopes for success at the polls.

The Moody-Ferguson exchange occurred as Governor Moody, for the first time, announced to the state at large that he would not seek reelection again.

Asking the committee to leave his name off the ballot, Governor Moody took the opportunity to deny that he was sponsoring the candidacy of R. S. Sterling of Houston, Moody's opponent to the State Highway commissioner, and to express the hope that James E. Ferguson, "running under his wife's petticoat," would not be nominated.

Jim Manning "Ma" Ferguson, barred from running by impeachment, named his wife Miriam, also a former Governor, to do family honors.

White with anger, Ferguson jumped to his feet and dared Moody to get into the race, declaring the Governor was afraid. It was the Governor's cue to reply angrily.

His face as red as Ferguson's was pale, Moody shook his finger at "Farmer Jim," and said:

"I met you and defeated you; (Turn to Page 10, Column 3, Please)

PARK CONTEST LAGGING

NEW TOWN IS TO BE BUILT IN N. MEXICO

BORGER SPRINGS UP AS REFINERY IS ESTABLISHED

(By Staff Correspondent)
BORGER, N. M., June 10.—Borger, New Mexico, has started as one of the oil field towns of Lea county with the establishment on the same section to the west of a refinery by the Shell Petroleum company.

The townsite proper has a scope of 160 acres and is in section 19, of 18-38.

Streets are all 60 or 100 feet wide. First, Second, Center, Third and Fourth streets will be 100 feet wide while Hobbs, Lovington, Refinery and Main streets will be 80 feet wide.

Lease Is Secured
The Shell company has secured a lease on some 60 acres from Fred Malloch and Dewey Singleton, owners of the townsite company, to the west of the townsite proper.

"Borger is assured," Mr. Malloch said. "We have sold a good many lots and with the refinery coming we are going to sell more lots."

"There will be thirteen locations between Borger and Hobbs, four south and east of this town. There are two lots now between the two places and these will have offsets for immediate drilling that will force new development."

Four Locations Made
On the McKinley lease in the same section as the town No. 19, the McKinley Oil company has four locations made and the Humble company the same number. The Shell will drill three offsets to the discovery well and several companies are planning offsets.

Mr. Malloch has 1,120 acres of land in one block around the townsite.

The Shell company has leases for 320 acres in section 19 and the southwest quarter of section 20. The half section in 19 is the south half.

Adding the refinery site and four tests, No. 1 McKinley of the Shell and Amerada's No. 1 McKinley, both are drilling and are expected to reach the pay within two weeks.

In addition the Texas company has two tests just starting.

MORE RAINFALL FOR TERRITORY

Adding an appreciable boon to the week end moisture, rains fell in varying degrees throughout the South Plains and the North Panhandle last night.

Precipitation in Lubbock totaled 26 of an inch, making a total of 1.11 inches since Saturday night.

Bus service between this city and Amarillo was interrupted due to heavy condition of roads along the route. Traffic along the highway resumed this afternoon, the union bus terminal reported.

Rains Are Spotted
Although rains fell spottily over the territory, the motor bus from Clovis arrived on schedule last night, as did the one from Spur.

Lamesa reported one-half an inch rainfall, as did Brownfield. Sea-graves and Tahoka. Plainview was under a one-half inch fall, while further north the precipitation was considerably heavier. Tulsa, Amarillo and Pampa reported rains ranging from one-half to 1 inch.

Littlefield reported one inch of rain. A similar amount fell at Levelland.

CENSUS WORK NEARS CLOSE

PHILADELPHIA AND ST. LOUIS FALL SHORT OF EXPECTATIONS

Census work in the larger centers of the United States was nearing its close today as reports filtered in from Philadelphia, Detroit and St. Louis. Associated Press dispatches in the Journal indicated, Philadelphia and St. Louis alike viewed their totals with chagrin.

SAINT LOUIS FALLS SHORT OF ITS MARK

ST. LOUIS, June 10. (AP)—Drift of population to suburbs today generally was regarded as responsible for the comparatively small growth of St. Louis city during the last ten years.

St. Louis' 1920 population, announced late yesterday, is 577,224, an increase of 44,537, or 8.7 per cent. The increase is considerably below that anticipated by the chamber of commerce and other civic organizations. The chamber of commerce had hoped St. Louis would go ahead of Cleveland, now sixth largest city with 901,482. The city limits have not been changed since 1878.

PHILADELPHIA SHORT OF TWO MILLIONS

PHILADELPHIA, June 10. (AP)—Unofficial estimates of the population of Philadelphia indicate that the figures may not reach the 2,000,000 mark, as had been hoped by those in charge of the census here. Latest estimates gave a population of 1,948,779, but a reshock of the city is under way which may result in an increase. Philadelphia's population in 1920 was 1,823,779.

DETROIT HOLDS TO FOURTH POSITION

DETROIT, June 10. (AP)—Enough of Detroit's population already has been counted and tabulated to insure the city's retention of its place as the fourth largest city in the United States.

Incomplete figures announced today show a total of 1,330,000 with an estimated 200,000 to be added when the count is completed. In 1920 Detroit's population was 993,076, and in 1910 it was 899,786.

TWO PERSONS ENTER NAMES FOR GROUNDS

CITY OFFICIALS URGE ENTRANTS: QUARTET OF SITES BEGGING

"Meadow Lark" and "Blue Bonnet" are names suggested today by two contestants in the process of naming of four park sites which have been purchased by the City of Lubbock.

A prize of \$5 will be offered the person who suggests the accepted name of each park.

"Meadow Lark" for the site bordered by Avenues W and X and 26th and 27th streets has been presented by Miss Helen C. Welch, 1704 Avenue O. In making the suggestion, she explained, "the meadow lark is one of the prettiest birds given to West Texas in its making and is a typical bird of the entire State."

Mrs. S. L. McSpadden, 1704 Ave. O, has suggested "Blue Bonnet" as name for the park site between 6th and 7th streets in northwest Lubbock. She explained, "almost every day we see people who have never seen blue bonnets in bloom. The native flower can be grown in Lubbock. A big bed in shape of a Texas lone star could be placed in center of the park."

Response to invitation of city officials in the park naming has not been widespread. Other names are being requested for all parks before the contest closes.

Texas Lads Are To Seek Edison Prize

AUSTIN, June 10. (AP)—Fresh from high school commencement exercises 81 Texas youths between the ages of 15 and 20 were qualified to compete here today for the honor of representing Texas in the national Thomas A. Edison Scholarship contest. The national contest will be held later in the summer at Menlo Park with the students chosen in the 48 state elimination contests participating.

The state examination will be conducted in five parts: one to ascertain the general mental ability of the contestants; one to determine their knowledge of chemistry, mathematics and physics, and a written paper setting out their ideas on either chemistry or physics.

Bodies Of Drowning Victims Are Found

PHILADELPHIA, June 10. (AP)—The bodies of seven persons who went to their death when their automobile plunged into the deep water of an abandoned quarry near Souderton, Pa., on Sunday, have been recovered.

Working all night in a rain, divers from the Philadelphia Navy yard, assisted by volunteer firemen, brought the last body to the surface today. It was that of Elmer Wisman, 45. The bodies of his mother and sister, his wife and 11-year-old son, his 3-year-old niece and Ralph Cupitt, driver of the car, were recovered earlier.

WAR BILL IS APPROVED BY SENATE BODY

COMPENSATION ACT TO AID EX-SOLDIERS; SUCCESS SEEN

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, June 10.—The House bill to liberalize World War veterans' compensation, modified to reduce the annual additional outlay by the government from an estimated total of at least \$150,000,000 to approximately \$74,000,000, was approved today by the Senate Finance committee.

Senator Shortridge said he would bring the measure up for Senate discussion immediately after the tariff and the rivers and harbors bill are dispatched.

Believes Hoover for It
"I have no direct information," the Californian said, "but I assume that the bill will be accepted in its present form. Including in that assumption, I indulge in the further presumption that the President will sign it."

Southern Cross May Start Flight Friday

DUBLIN, June 10. (AP)—Wireless tests were made at Baldonnell air-drome today between the Southern Cross and another plane in preparation for Captain Charles Kingsford-Smith's proposed Trans-Atlantic flight.

The Southern Cross remained in the hangar while a Free State plane tumbled about in the air for an hour, three miles away. The messages were handled by J. W. Stange, radio expert of the Southern Cross.

Today's weather reports showed an improved condition over the Atlantic. Captain Kingsford-Smith said he hoped to be off by Friday.

RAIL FIGHT SEEN

WASHINGTON, June 10. (AP)—On the eve of commencement of construction by the Rock Island and Frisco systems in northern Texas, the Interstate Commerce commission had granted the right to opposing local interests, largely represented by Burlington interests, to argue the motion for cancellation of permission to build which the constructing railroads now hold.

JONES TRIAL IS NEAR TO JURORS

WASHINGTON, June 10. (AP)—With population enumeration in cities completed, the Census Bureau had turned today to the census of construction.

A picture of building projects now in process throughout the United States, to be balanced with the census of unemployment, is the objective of the personal calls being made on all contractors doing a business of more than \$25,000 a year. The personal canvass is being limited to cities of more than 1,000 population, the rest of the construction census being taken by mail.

WELL DRESSED MAN IS SOUGHT AFTER CRIME IN TEXAS CITY

DALLAS, June 10.—Officers today were searching for a man who assertedly kidnaped a woman employee of the Western Union here yesterday and took her to an isolated spot, where he committed criminal assault, beat and robbed the woman, and then abandoned her.

The 24-year-old woman said she was waiting for a street car to bring her to town yesterday when a young and well-dressed man drove along side and offered her a lift. She declined the offer, she said, and the man drew a pistol and forced her into the machine.

Keeps Her Covered
Keeping the weapon pressed against her side, the man drove several miles from Dallas to a secluded spot southwest of Trinity Heights, where he stopped.

She struggled and the man started beating her over the head with a ten-inch iron bolt, the woman related. He next attacked her and took three diamonds from her finger and a dollar from her purse. That done, he left.

The woman said she started to walk to the nearest farm house about a mile away, but passing motorists picked her up and brought her to her mother's home.

In Hospital Today
Hardly able to talk because of the bandages which covered her head and face, the woman today was in a hospital. Police said they had no clue to the man's identity.

The woman was on her way to work when she was accosted. She was hysterical after the episode and fainted several times while telling her story to officers.

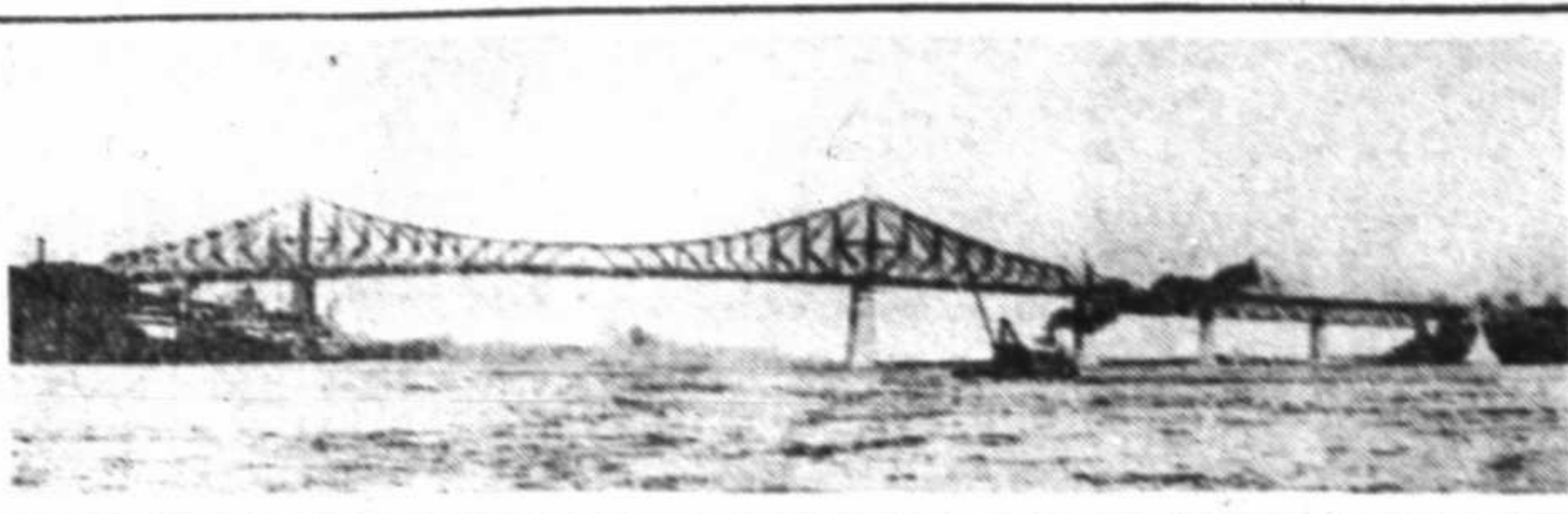

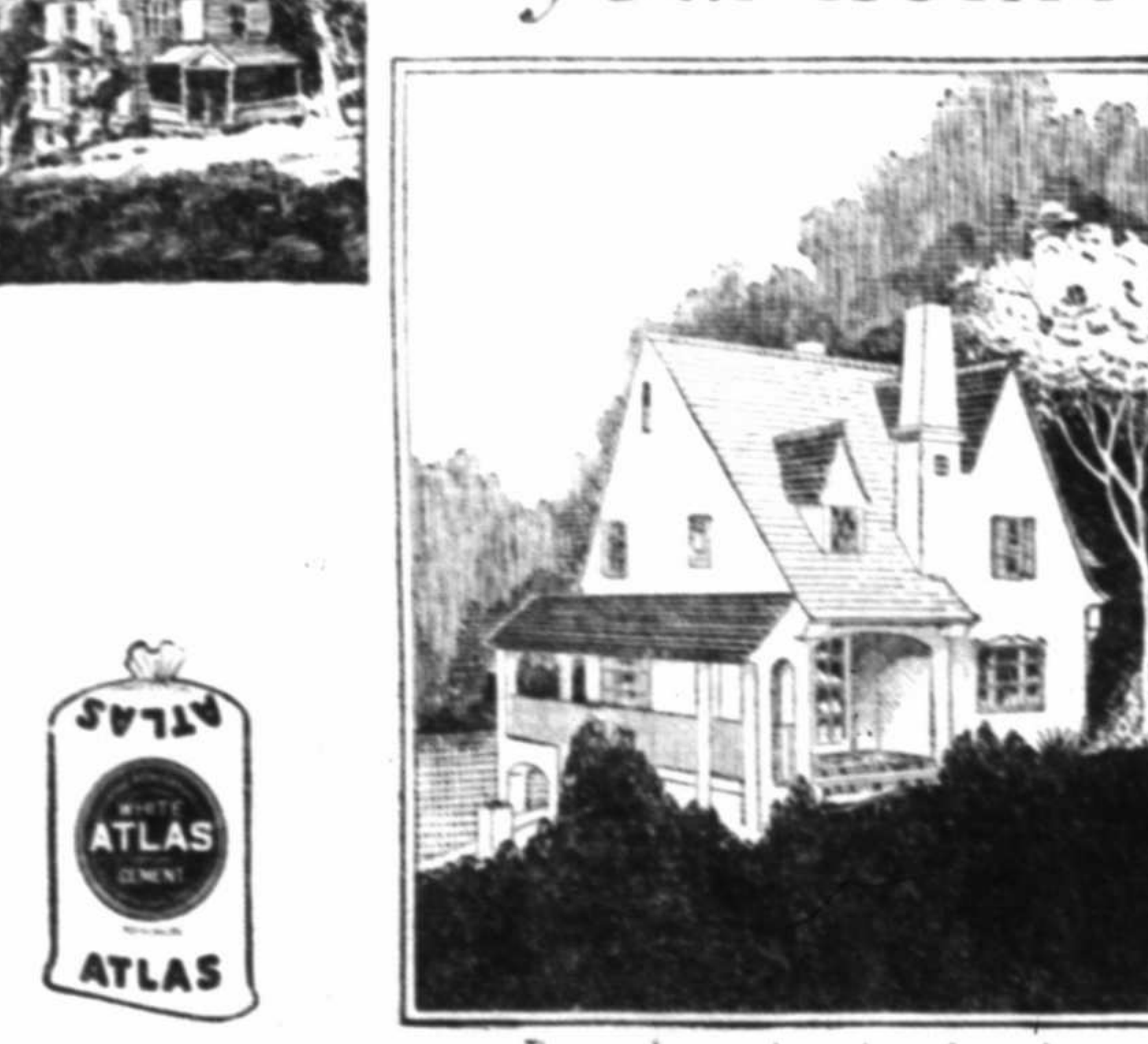

NEW ORLEANS REPORT

NEW ORLEANS, June 10 (P)—Cotton was steady at the opening, although cables were lower than due and first trades showed no change to 3 points decline. While July, which declined sharply yesterday, was comparatively steady this

morning, new crop months eased off 7 to 8 points soon after the start. October trading down to 13.81. Towards the end of the first hour, however, the market received better support on this early dip and all months rallied, October and December recovering 10 points from the low, reaching levels, three points above the previous close.

Following the early dip in the cotton market, there was a steady tone, and prices rallied 16 to 17 points from the low with July at 14.87 and October at 13.97. More or less trade buying and covering caused the steady tone in the market. Towards midsession prices eased off 6 to 7 points on realizing. Trade was rather moderate, the market appearing to be a waiting affair.

NEW YORK REPORT
NEW YORK, June 10 (P)—Cotton opened steady at an advance of 5 points to a decline of 5 points, with considerable covering of July in evidence after the heavy liquidation of yesterday. The price of that delivery advanced to 15.17 right after the call, or 12 points net higher, but there was renewed selling at that figure and it quickly reacted to 15.03 or 2 points net lower.

These fluctuations seemed to cause more or less nervousness in the later months, but after showing net losses of about 5 to 10 points, the new crop positions steadied up on covering while some

trade buying was reported in October.

Weather Favorable
The weather map was considered generally favorable, but failed to promote aggressive selling after the break of yesterday and the improved technical position of the market was reflected by considerable covering in the new crop months.

There was further liquidation of July longs from various sources but after easing off to 15.02 July rallied to 15.10, or 5 points net higher, while the new crop showed net advances of about 1 to 4 points at midday, with new October selling up to 13.93, during the late forenoon.

It was his suit before the Supreme court that bound the committee from barring as candidates any who failed to support the democratic ticket in 1928. Love was the leader of the "Hoover-Democrats" forces this year, and the court ruled that that record could not be held against him.

He was asked whether he would stand by the party this year. Love replied he would so far as his conscience allowed. Pinned to specify instances, the Senator stated he would not support Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson; neither would he support R. L. Henry of Houston, wet candidate for Senator, and Frank Putnam of Houston, wet candidate for Governor.

Still After Smith

"And should the democrats in 1932 again nominate Alfred E. Smith or any Tammany supporter for the Presidency," he shouted, "I would not vote for him."

Tenaciousness of the session was relieved somewhat when the candidates of R. B. Creager, Republican National committeeman, and C. C. Moody, Fort Worth laundry wagon driver, were discussed. Names of both were submitted by "friends," permissible under the law.

It was suggested that C. C. Moody's candidacy was a joke, and he should not be certified. But one committeeman replied that the committee did not even have the power to reject a republican precluding the possibility of rejecting Moody, presumably a good democrat. Creager's \$100 filing fee was returned to his "friends" at the committeeman's request.

Resolution Adopted

The committee adopted its usual resolution that all white democrats be invited to take part in the primaries, refusing to hear the petition of a negro delegation for recognition. It also declined to act on proposals to hold prohibition referendum.

H. E. Exum of Amarillo, wealthy rancher, and Dr. George C. Butte, of Austin, who ran against Mrs. Ferguson in 1924 and received the largest number of votes ever given a republican candidate for Governor, were considered among the leading republican candidates. Both were drafted.

Henry's nomination will be opposed by Senator Morris E. Sheppard, so-called father of the 18th amendment. Two republican candidates were in the field.

HOME BREW LAW TO BE TESTED

CHICAGO, June 10. (AP)—

Charges of violating the national prohibition law were dismissed against Joe Grein, proprietor of the first hops and malt store seized after the Supreme court held that sales of material for making alcoholic liquors were illegal, today so that they could be replaced by grand jury action.

Grein's stocks of malt, hops and paraphernalia, which can be used for the making of beer, were seized shortly after the Supreme court ruling. The stock, valued at \$75,000, is impounded and the government will seek to destroy it. Meantime, Grein has restocked his store on advice of his attorney, one of whom is Clarence Darlow, displaying placards that the materials are not for making of illegal beverages.
