Finns Claim New Wins on North Front

**Russian Attacks Are
Said Beaten Back
Near Lake Ladoga**

HELSINKI, Feb. 1. (AP). — Renewed Russian attacks in far northern Finland, both in the Salla and Petsamo districts, were thrown back by Finns, the high command reported today.

Russians were also thrown back with heavy losses after making several attacks on an island held by the Finns on the northeastern shore of Lake Ladoga, the communique said.

A merciless raid by 27 Soviet planes on the northwestern Finnish town of Rovaniemi left 15 dead and 60 wounded yesterday, while couriers brought reports of complete encirclement of hungry Soviet divisions in the bloody Lake Ladoga sector and the slaughter of half a battalion of 600 Siberian ski-troops in the north.

Observers said the Finns had captured the strategic town of Pitkanen northeast of Lake Ladoga and had thrown back Red army attacks "everywhere" along the same front. On the basis of Finnish daily communiques the Russian dead on this front run into thousands.

The Finnish casualties have not been disclosed.

The killing of 300 Russian ski-fighters, rushed as reinforcements from Siberia and the rout of an equal number was reported by Danish correspondents.

The precise locale of the battle was not made known. The defeated force, however, was identified as the Third Soviet Siberian Ski Battalion.

Three waves of Soviet planes bombed Rovaniemi, an important railway junction. They dropped, in all, 150 bombs. The raid lasted two hours.

Seven children died, five of them in one building when a bomb hit a cellar door and tore out a wall. Two nurses and a woman who had just arrived to become a mother were killed when other bombs smashed a hospital.

The fighting on the Ladoga front went on fiercely today.

Only their numerically inferior forces are keeping the Finns from polishing off the trapped Russians, said the account of the capture of Pitkanen, which is about 20 miles from the Russian border and one of the Soviet's early objectives in the war.

(But in Paris today Finland's minister, Dr. Harri Toima, warned that the Finnish army "is condemned to death" unless it receives sufficient help quickly.)

2886 Poll Taxes Are Paid in County for 1940; Less Than '38

A total of 2886 poll taxes were paid by Midland citizens, the tax collector's office announced today. In addition, 86 exemptions were issued.

Midland county lagged behind her western neighbor, Ector, in payment of polls. First checkup in Odessa showed 4008 polls paid and 200 exemptions issued, according to Henderson Shuffler, editor of the Odessa News-Times.

2 Ranchmen Sentenced Fined in "Gold Brick"

AUSTIN, Feb. 1. (AP). — Two Southwest Texas ranchmen Wednesday drew fines of \$10,000 and two-year penitentiary sentences each when they pleaded guilty in federal court on income tax charges which prosecutors said grew out of a \$287,000 swindle of a West Texas ranch owner.

The men, James A. Akers of San Antonio and Potect and his nephew, Henry Lee Forrest of Potect, were charged with failure to pay taxes on income which United States District Attorney W. R. Smith alleged was obtained from Mrs. Dora Roberts, widowed owner of a 36-section Howard county ranch between 1932 and 1936.

Akers, 56, was fined \$10,000 and sentenced to two years for failure to pay tax on net income of \$18,135 for 1933. He also received a suspended fine of \$5,000 and a two-year sentence for failure to pay tax on income of \$1,615.54 for 1936. The second fine and sentence was suspended on condition he not transfer any of his property and make a full disclosure of assets to the internal revenue department.

Forrest, 40, was assessed two years and \$10,000 for failure to pay tax on income of \$7,550 for 1933 and \$5,000 fine and one-year sentence suspended, for failure to pay tax on \$16,486.93 income for 1936. The suspension was conditioned on payment of the first fine in 10 days.

Responsibility for Home Supervisors Increased by Chief

To expediate measures to secure more conservation in the homes on the farms of present and prospective Farm Security Administration borrowers, L. H. Hauter, regional director, has placed greater responsibilities on the county farm and home management supervisors for carrying effective measures into the rural rehabilitation, resettlement and tenant purchase programs of this agency.

In outlining these measures, Mr. Hauter again emphasized the primary responsibility of the FSA program which is to aid in improving the welfare of human beings, including their social, economic, and community institutions and organizations.

County farm and home supervisors are instructed to continue appearing before county planning committees and presenting data showing the character and extent of the problem of low-income farm families.

These supervisors will emphasize data showing the extent and purposes of existing FSA loans; size of units and tenure arrangements; type of farm and home economy set up in farm plans; the land and water conservation adjustments being made; the provisions for working capital; the degree of self-sufficiency attained; debt adjustment accomplished and needed; and all the phases of individual and group action which have been undertaken for accomplishing rehabilitation.

Mr. Hauter said county supervisors also will present data indicating the planning and progress of borrowers in achieving a healthful standard of living, including sanitary improvements, dietary sufficiency and removal of injury and health hazards.

Provisions for adequate medical attention will be of paramount importance. County planning committees, Mr. Hauter said, will be assisted in analyzing the farm and home problems in the county and developing a constructive land use and conservation program which will sustain a self-supporting farm and home economy and rural social structure for families in the area.

Of special significance is the instruction that loan reviewers will have before them copies of each county plan to which they will refer as a guide in approving or rejecting the farm and home plans of individual FSA borrowers.

Another significant order is for district FSA supervisors to make an immediate survey and report as to the extent to which it will be necessary, in order to effect the human, land and water conservation practices approved in the county plan, to employ the joint purchase and use of equipment; and to obtain special technical services in supervision and construction of necessary conservation structures, including dams, ponds, check dams, terraces, contours, division dams, sod outlets, reforestation, new seedlings, stream clearance, sanitary facilities, etc.

County supervisors will continue assisting all owner-operator borrowers whose farms are mortgaged on terms not in line with the earning capacity of the farm, to obtain adjustment or reamortization of the debt in order to assure security of tenure.

Carnegie Show Of Art Changed

PITTSBURGH (U.P.)—Because of the European War, the annual Carnegie International art exhibit will be replaced in the fall by a strictly American show, the trustees of Carnegie Institute have announced.

The exhibition, "Survey of American Painting" will mark only the 7th year since 1896, that the annual Carnegie exhibit has not been an international event. Only during the five years of the World War and in 1932, has the Carnegie Institute failed to sponsor an "international" exhibit.

This year's exhibition will open on Oct. 17 and will continue through Dec. 8. It will present, on the recommendations of Homer Saint-Gaudens, director of fine arts of the institute, a group of 300 canvases that will "rehearse the work of American artists from the earliest times to the present day."

A group of about 100 paintings will represent the period of 1730-1880. Artists included in this section will be John Hesselius, John Smibert and Robert Feke, of the early period; Stuart and Copley, representing the peak period of English tradition; Sully and Trumbull, of the later period of portrait painters; Bingham with his genre pictures and Church and Cole, whose grandiose landscapes will be on exhibit.

The period 1880-1920 will also be represented by about 100 canvases most famous of them by Whistler and Sargent. Depicting the period of the development of American art consciousness which resulted in the organization of the Society of American Artists and the school of American realism, this group will include works of Homer, La Farge, Eakins, Thayer, Twachtman, Henri, Glackens, Leks, Sloan, Shinn, Bellows and Spaulding.

The final period, 1920-1940, will set forth works of modern artists like Leon Krull, Gifford Beal, Benjamin Kopman and Jack Levine.

According to John O'Connor, Jr., "in this exhibition, the plan will be, not to promote a school of art or to attempt to indicate that one artist is good and another bad, but to set forth in an unprejudiced way as possible the history of the art of painting in the United States."

The FSA rehabilitation program, is slated for special attention, Mr. Hauter said.

The written lease forms are designed to benefit both landlords and tenants. Whenever possible, these leases will provide for the compensation of tenants for improvements placed on the land, including those related to human, land and water conservation. They also will provide for compensation to the landlord for damages committed by the tenant, including those which have the effect of destroying or weakening the conservation practices and structures on the farm.

Mr. Hauter stressed the fact that these leases also will provide for definite permission for the tenant's participation in the AAA and SCS programs, together with a statement of the crop base available to the borrower on which he will share equitably with the landlord in the benefit payments. The FSA will strive to obtain long term leases for borrowers who need long term financing.

Mr. Hunter said, in cases of extreme need, this agency will continue making grants to low-income farm families. However, county supervisors will develop work plans incorporating conservation practices which can be performed on the grant client's farm and about his home by the available family labor. These practices will be limited to those which can be accomplished without special equipment or hired labor.

Soil Conservation plans will be required for all farm tenant purchases loans made by FSA under the Bankhead-Jones Farm Tenant Act.

Mr. Hauter said the purpose of reemphasizing these plans of the FSA program was in line with the department's theme of coordinating the numerous action programs in agriculture, to fit them to local conditions and to formulate more effective programs in cooperation with the farmers.

"Although our program," Mr. Hauter said, "is charged primarily with aiding and improving human welfare in rural America, we recognize the importance of conserving our soil and water resources, because it is ultimately upon the land that we must depend for food, clothing and shelter."

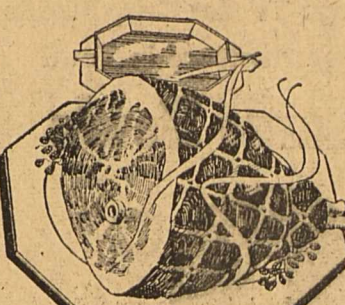

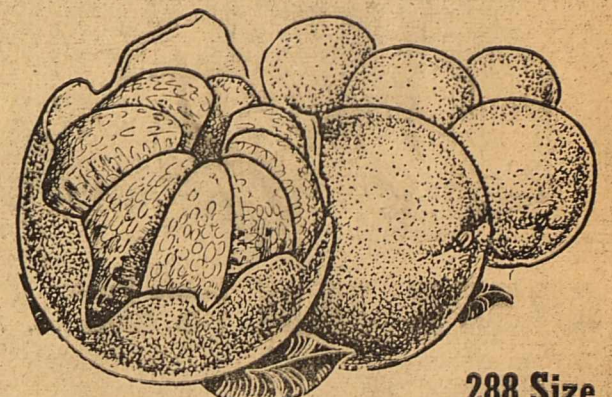

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Cells Are Work Rooms For British War Staff

LONDON (UP).—Scores of members of the war office staff have gone to prison. There's been no scandal attached to the move, but it's a fact just the same.

JOPLIN, Mo. (UP).—Fred Lane, who started to work near here more than a decade ago as a miner in the lead and zinc mines, has become one of the country's leading specialists in mineralogy because he wasn't content to remain a miner all his life.

While working in the lead mines near Picher, Okla., Lane took up the study of rock formations and his ability was recognized recently by the department of the interior.

He also is doing special work in mineralogy for Harvard University, for the Smithsonian Institution, for the Boston Mineral Club, and for other scientific and educational bodies.

Lane said that while working as a miner he became interested in the unusual shapes and colors of various rock formations he encountered. He began collecting unusual specimens of rocks and at the same time studied mineralogy to learn what he could about the science.

As time went on his collection of rocks grew and his knowledge increased. At length he began selling rock collections to school teachers and conducted tours of students who came to the mine fields to study geology.

Now Lane devotes his entire time to this scientific work and he recently was awarded a contract to unearth an entire underground cavern, with all of its interesting ore attachments, and ship it to

Harvard University.

Most of the Tri-State lead and zinc fields are underlain by these caverns, which range in size from small caves to caverns large enough to house a skyscraper.

The department of interior granted Lane permission to explore land owned by Indian tribes in the area.

Running Oil String.

After running Schlumberger electrical survey, Stanolind Oil & Gas Company No. 1 W. F. Cowden heirs, indicating two and one-quarter mile northwest extension of northern Ector's deep pay at the northwest edge of the North Cowden pool, is running 5 1/2-inch casing. Broken lime carrying oil staining and odor of gas was shown in cores from 5-110-64 feet. Coring from 5,164-82, operators recovered 18 feet of lime of which seven feet was stained and with good porosity and three feet saturated and bleeding. A core from 5,182 to 5,200, present total depth, returned nine feet and four inches of lime showing full saturation fair porosity. The well is 680 feet from the south, 1,980 from the west line of section 4, block 43, township 1 north, T&P survey.

Sinclair-Prairie No. 1 Marcus Gist of Midland, one-half mile north out-post to northeast side production in the Foster pool of Ector, this morning was drilling at 1,268 feet in red beds and sand shells.

Phillips Petroleum Company No. 70 Pure Oil Company-Glyde Cowden of Midland, Goldsmith pool well in northwestern Ector, rated 24-hour potential of 376.23 barrels of 36.8-gravity oil and gas-oil ratio of 1.170-1. It topped pay at 4,116 feet, seven inches, is bottomed at 4,161 feet in lime, and was acidized with 5,000 gallons.

Humble No. 1 Mrs. Bertha D. Young, farthest advanced of the northern Pecos county Ordovician tests, this morning was drilling at 4,611 feet in Permian lime.

House Members Will Ask Restoration of Slash in Farm Bill

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1. (AP).—House members from farm states decided today to put up a battle for several major items dropped from the next year's farm appropriation bill, but agreed their efforts were probably doomed to defeat.

Representative Ferguson, Oklahoma, said the group would support an amendment for restoration of the single largest item eliminated from the bill by the house appropriations committee—\$72,678,812—to supplement other appropriations for surplus crop disposal.

Failing to show for a commercial producer from either the Pennsylvanian or Ordovician, Continental Oil Company et al No. 1 J. S. Todd unit, central Crockett deep test, today was being plugged and abandoned after nearly a week of fruitless swabbing. Total depth is 7,010 feet, and it was bridged back to 6,336 feet for shooting with 1,235 quarts and acidizing with 7,000 gallons. It topped the Strawn, lower Pennsylvanian, at 5,950 feet; the Simpson, middle Ordovician, at 6,040; and the Ellenberger, lower Ordovician, at 6,255 feet, all markers occurring high on structure.

A shallow Permian test a half-mile to the west, Conoco No. 1-32 Todd, is plugging at 1,510 feet in lime where it showed two and one-half barrels of salt water hourly.

Gaines Duster, Oil Well Drilling Company No. 1 Humble-R. E. Skes, is plugging today for abandonment at total depth of 5,001 feet in lime, corrected from 5,005 by steel line. Core from 4,898 to 4,914 returned 13 feet of lime bleeding a little oil and sulphur water; that from 4,914-30 showed recovery of nine feet of lime and anhydrite showing a little oil but also bleeding sulphur water.

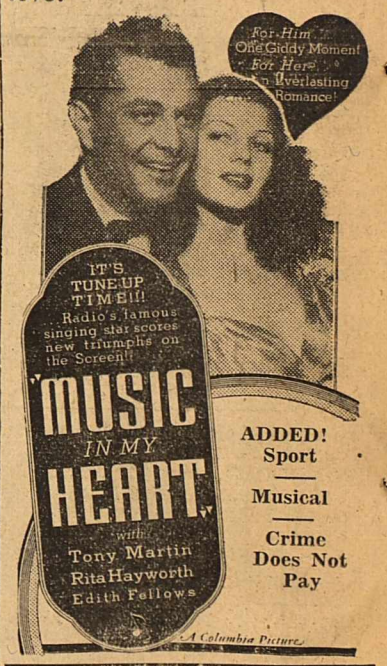

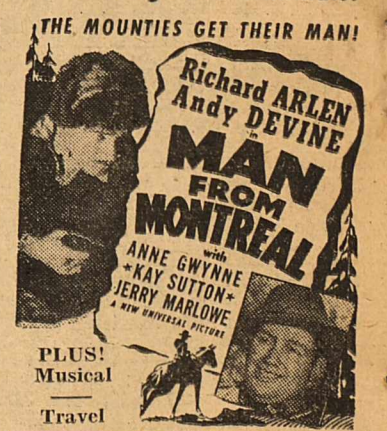
