## Three School Trustees to Elect April 3

### Have Filed as Candidates for the Three Places

With six candidates already filed for the three places on the board of trustees of the Perryton Public Schools, it begins to appear that there will be more than the usual interest in the election to be held Saturday, April 3. Terms of three members will expire. They are J. H. Hensfield, Dr. Manse Wood and W. C. Bryan.

Candidates filed are the above three for reelection and Emil Hearn, S. D. Key and L. D. Stinson. Trustees are elected for three year terms. Holdover members of the board are Mrs. H. C. Brillhart and W. M. Boston with one year to serve, and H. I. Hudson and Calvin Flowers with two more years.

There will be two polling places. J. H. Conley and Sam Hergert will have charge of the election at the Perryton schoolhouse. N. P. Dear and Dean Conner will conduct the election at the Farnsworth schoolhouse.

## Burns Fatal to Rosie Barnes

Rosie Barnes, age 20, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. B. L. Barnes of the McMillen neighborhood, died in a local hospital at 11 p. m. Wednesday of burns sustained in a fire at her home Tuesday morning about 9 o'clock. Her father, who was burned at the same time, is a patient in the hospital. His burns are not considered serious.

Mrs. Barnes was cleaning clothing, when the fluid ignited. Damage to the home was limited to draperies, wall paper and furnishings.

Mrs. Barnes was born June 14, 1922 at Waka. For the past few months she has been employed at the Greyhound bus station in Amarillo and was home for a few days visit.

Surviving are the parents, five brothers: Bernard, Murphy, Omar, Chester and Lester; and two sisters: Martha and Lola Belle.

Funeral services will be conducted Friday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at the Full Gospel Tabernacle with Rev. Ralph A. Durham officiating. The body will lie in state at the church from 10 a. m.

## County Farm Transportation Committees to Pass on Non-Highway Gasoline Applications

COLLEGE STATION, Mar. 15.—Interrupted farm production during 1943 keynotes the move which transfers non-highway gasoline applications from county farm transportation committees to county farm transportation committees. Under the new order which becomes effective March 1, all applications, whether on a new or renewal basis, will be referred to the 254 county farm transportation committees for analysis and recommendation.

Under applications for tractor gasoline in those cases where the board feels adjustment is required also will be referred to farm transportation committees for recommendation.

Objective of the Office of Price Administration move is to insure farmers receiving sufficient supplies

## No School Friday Teachers to Amarillo

The Perryton Public Schools along with all other schools in the Panhandle will be closed tomorrow, Friday, March 19. The Panhandle Educational Conference of the Texas Teachers Association will meet in Amarillo for a one day streamlined wartime meeting. All teachers will attend the conference. Members of the faculty of the Perryton school will make the trip to Amarillo in six cars, special gasoline for the trip authorized by the local rationing board.

## Rationing of Meat Starts March 29th

DALLAS, March 16.—Here are the highlights of the forthcoming meat rationing program which goes into effect March 29.

1. Beginning Monday, March 29, housewives will use the red stamps in Ration Book Two to get their family supplies of meats, edible fats and oils, butter, and canned fish.

2. Point values will be announced during the week of March 22.

3. These point values will be based on weight primarily, but with differences governed by supply, consumer preferences, and the edible content of the various cuts and products.

4. The official table of consumer point values will list 150 meat items.

5. In general, the new rationing program will include: All fresh, frozen, cured, smoked, and canned meats and meat products derived from beef, veal, lamb, mutton and pork, as well as variety meats and sausages. Canned fish and canned shellfish.

Most edible fats and oils, including butter, lard, margarine, shortening, salad oils and cooking oils, excluding mayonnaise and salad dressing.

6. Retailers will be permitted to give "change" in ration stamps, using only the one-point red stamps.

7. During the first five weeks, each holder of Ration Book Two will have a basic allotment of 16 points per week.

8. Red stamps bearing the letter "A" will be valid during the first week. "B" stamps will be used the second week and so on for five weeks.

9. Consumers will not be asked to declare the amount of the newly rationed foods on hand. This exemption includes fresh meats in frozen lockers.

10. Consumers will have complete freedom of choice in using their red stamps to buy any one of the rationed foods.

1. Retailers will collect points from the outset of the program, March 29, but will not give up points to their wholesale suppliers until April 11.

## Tuesday Sale Was Another Record Beater

"Bigger and better than before" must be the mark that Kenneth Manger, proprietor of the Perryton Sales Co., set for his community auction when he took it over a few weeks ago. When he broke all records with a \$20,000 sale on March 9, he pitched in listing livestock for the March 16 sale.

The auctioneer cried "sold" on the last animal after dark last Tuesday evening, another record high had been set with \$25,000 worth of livestock going through the ring.

Hog sales were \$8,000 with cattle accounting for about \$17,000. Every seat in the recently enlarged sales pavilion was filled with many buyers and sellers standing.

Top for hogs was \$14.65, fat cows sold as high as \$12, with steers going at \$13.25 to \$13.50 per 100 lbs. Baby calves brought \$27.50 to \$35 each. One bull sold at \$12.85 per cwt. for a total of \$224.

### Livestock Dealers And Slaughterers Must Have Permit

Federal regulations of the meat rationing program requires that all persons engaged in the handling of livestock as a dealer or agent have a permit. The term "agent" as used in the regulation includes persons operating auction markets who sell livestock for others on a commission basis.

The term "dealer" does not include bona fide producers who are engaged in dairy, wool or meat production or in breeding, feeding or finishing livestock and who keep such livestock 30 days or more.

Partners are not required to obtain a permit to buy and sell livestock, but are expected to keep records covering purchases and sales of livestock.

Slaughterers of livestock are required to obtain permits.

The USDA War Board, under whose jurisdiction the permits will be issued, is meeting today to formulate plans for administering the program in Ochiltree county. Members of the board are: Audie Conley, chairman; P. B. Sumpter, A. R. Turner, E. W. Thomas, Geo. M. Parker and Ford Hamker.

## Army and Navy College Training Tests April 2

Qualifying tests for the new Army and Navy College Training program will be held at the Perryton high school, April 2, 9 a. m. to 11 a. m. under the direction of Martin L. Stevens, principal of the high school. Full information regarding the examinations for the new program, known as V-12, can be obtained from Mr. Stevens.

From those who take the tests, the Army and Navy will eventually select students for the Army and Navy Training Program. Those accepted will take their college training while on active duty, in uniform, receiving pay and under general military discipline. Upon completion of their college training they will receive further training leading to commissions.

College training courses will relate to the war effort such as medical, dental and engineering.

The following are eligible to take the tests:

(a) High school and preparatory school graduates who will have attained their 17th, but not have reached their 22nd birthdays by July 1, 1943 regardless of whether they are now attending college.

(b) High school and preparatory school seniors who will be graduated by July 1, 1943, provided they will have attained their 17th, but have not reached their 22nd birthdays by that date.

(c) Students who will have attained their 17th, but have not reached their 22nd birthdays by July 1, 1943, who do not hold certificates of graduation from a secondary school but who are now continuing their education in an accredited college or university.

## Plant a Victory Garden at Home

County Agent E. W. Thomas says that there seems to be some misunderstanding about how to go about purchasing beans or peas for planting purposes since these items are on the list of rationed foods. The latest information available is to the effect that a certificate for the purchase of this kind of seed should be secured from the County Ration Board, and the certificate will be presented to the seed dealer. English peas are included in the ration list and these should be planted as soon as possible. The little Marvel is the variety recommended for this climate and is available in most of the seed stores. It is supposed to bear ready for eating in 62 days.

Most growers in this county say this week is the time to plant Irish potatoes. Several farmers have grown enough potatoes from small patches to last through the summer and it is believed that most every farmer in the county should plant potatoes in the Victory Garden.

## Rationing at a Glance

Ration Books

War Ration Book No. 1—Used for sugar, coffee and shoes.

War Ration Book No. 2—Blue stamps used for rationed processed foods. Red stamps will be used beginning March 29 for meats, edible fats and oils, cheese and canned fruit.

Mileage Ration Books—Books A, B, and C used for passenger car gasoline; E and R books for non-highway uses; D for motorcycles; T for trucks and commercial vehicles.

Rationed Commodities

Sugar—Stamp No. 12 in Book No. 1 good for five pounds from March 16 until midnight May 31, 1943.

Coffee—Stamp No. 25 in Book No. 1 (for those 14 or older on the date the book was issued) good for 1 pound until midnight, March 21.

Shoes—Stamp No. 17 in Book No. 1 good for 1 pair of shoes through June 15.

Meat, Edible Fats and Oils (including butter), Cheese, Canned Fish—Red stamps in War Ration Book 2 will be used beginning March 29. Each holder of Book 2 allowed 16 points per week in first month. Red stamps will become valid and will expire as follows: Week beginning March 29, A stamps worth (16 points) expire April 30; week beginning April 4, B stamp (16 points) expires April 30; week beginning April 11, C stamp (16 points) expires April 30; week beginning April 18, D stamp (16 points) expires April 30; and week beginning April 25, E stamp (16 points) expires at date not yet announced.

Processed Foods—Blue A, B and C stamps (46 points) in War Ration Book No. 2 good for purchase of rationed processed foods until midnight, March 31.

Mileage Rationing

Gasoline—Value of each coupon in A, B, and C books is 4 gallons. Second 8 coupons in A book are good until midnight March 21, 1943. Third 8 coupons in A book good from March 22 to midnight May 21, 1943. Those who think they are eligible for supplemental rations should see their local ration board.

Tire Inspection—All "A" book holders must have first official tire inspections by March 31, 1943. Subsequent inspections for A book holders will be once ever six months. "B" book holders must have second official tire inspection by June 30, 1943. "C" book holders must have second official tire inspection by May 31, 1943. Second official tire inspection for "T" book holders must be made 60 days from Feb. 28, 1943, or every 5,000 miles, whichever comes first.

Tires—if official tire inspector recommends a tire replacement, apply to local ration board for the ration certificate. Tires will be rationed to all on the basis of tire inspections and county quotas available with most essential mileage to come first. Recaps can now be secured without rationing certificates.

Other Rationing

Eligible purchasers needing new automobiles, bicycles, typewriters, rubber foot-wear, and other commodities on which sales might be restricted should see their local ration board.

## Must Obtain License Tags By April 1

### Sheriff Talley Says Sale of 1943 Tags Is Lagging Behind

Sheriff Talley stated Wednesday that the sale of 1943 car license tags was lagging and not up to expectations. He is asking that car owners purchase their new tags a tonce in order to avoid the last minute rush.

The 1943 tab must be purchased on or before March 31 and no car or truck can be operated on any public highway after April 1 if it does not carry a 1943 tab.

Car owners must bring the photostatic copy of certificate of title when they apply for license. They must have the 1942 license receipt or number of tag. Farm trucks must be weighed before registration and affidavit made to that effect.

At Wednesday noon, 1943 licenses as follows had been issued: passenger cars, 154; farm trucks, 77; and 25 commercials.

## The American Way

Never before has the need been so great for the American Red Cross. This year it will reach into the battle fronts and into the countries where the sick and suffering lie helpless. To operate this great institution through the coming year \$125,000,000 will be required, a small amount compared with the huge sums invested in the tools of war.

Let us be thankful that we have such an organization, for while it is necessary that the forces of evil be put down, the purpose of the Red Cross is to relieve the unfortunate and to spread the doctrine of a human democracy throughout the world without regard to race, color, or religious belief.

## Credit and Discredit

In a democracy such as our own where all people are free to think, to speak, and to act for themselves, there is always a great variety of opinions concerning a number of vital national problems. But there is one issue now before the country upon which most of us are agreed—that this war must be won and won as quickly as possible.

On the credit side of all-out war production, so essential to the winning of the war, we have great industries which have turned from the production of peacetime products to the production of ships, planes, tanks, guns, trucks and hundreds of other war needs with the greatest possible speed. We have millions of skilled workers who are not only performing their regular tasks but are helping the new workers to learn their new war jobs. We have housewives, businessmen, the handicapped, and even older children who spend either a part of their time or their whole time in the war plants.

These are the 100 per cent loyal Americans who, while giving up many of the things they are accustomed to having, are putting in extra time, extra money, and extra effort for the common good. They are the people who will win this war and keep its cost in lives and in dollars to a minimum.

On the debit side we have those who would make a profit or a holiday out of the war. These thoughtless or unpatriotic men and women are not only unwilling to give up the things to which they are accustomed, but actually stay away from their jobs or go out on strike because they want more leisure or more money. Big industry has thrown up a smoke screen putting all the blame for non-production on the workers. There are two sides to every question and the greed and ever grasping for more profits by business, both big and small, is just as unpatriotic as the striker and absentee.

Between unauthorized strikes, unwarranted absenteeism and greed of industry, America is losing millions of man-hours that should be devoted to the production of weapons so urgently needed by our armed forces.

The great majority of the American people who are doing their jobs have every right to expect equal effort from big business and those who shy away from their work without good or sufficient reasons, or striking for any reason at all.

Resentment toward these strikers and absentees and profiteers is rising on all sides. It is reflected in the press, at public meetings, and in the Congress of the United States. If those who are now clogging the war effort, through any one of a dozen devices, cannot see the light in time it is more than likely that effective measures will be taken to control them.

## Civilian War Service Jobs Are Available

Crop production specialists, soil conservationists and historical specialists to increase the nation's supply of natural rubber and vegetable oil, to protect plant and soil resources and to select and preserve significant records of the list of civilian war service jobs announced by the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Mr. Arvie Hale, local civil service secretary reported today.

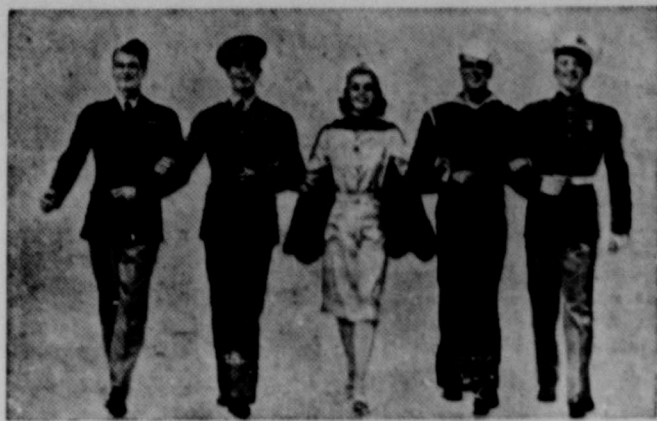
Salaries range from \$2,600 to \$8,000 plus additional compensation for overtime for these positions. Crop production specialists who go to Central and South America to administer research stations and plantations in remote and primitive areas will receive 25% more for foreign service.

Appointees will be selected on the basis of previous training and experience. Mr. Hale emphasized.

Women interested in employment as a printer's assistant, \$1791 a year, in the Bureau of Engraving and Printing, Treasury department, Washington, D. C. should file their applications with the Commission's Washington office by March 23, 1943. No previous experience is necessary. Applicants will be given a written test.

Complete information about all of the positions may be obtained from Mr. Hale at the post office. Applications are not desired from persons engaged in war work of equal skill.

This letter has been neglected and delayed for a long time. I once had hopes of thanking you and the USO committee personally for sending me the Herald, but it seems that I'm not going to be able to do that until this conflict is over.

I want you to know that I appreciate the news from home very much. North Carolina isn't far from home, but the boys here joke about it being Foreign Service. Customs are quite different here from customs at home.

Maybe some of the folks would like to know what I'm doing. I'm the Section Chief in the Communications Section at this base. I maintain the teletype machines in the base weather station and the rest of the boys in my section maintain the aircraft radio. We don't have many flying status ships since this is an AAF Technical School (ground). My wife, Dorothy, is a Civil Service employee here on the post. She is secretary to the Chief of Medical Service in the Station Hospital.

I'm anxiously waiting for another letter from "Buck" Garrison to appear in the Herald. I enjoy his letters very much. I sure hope nothing has happened to any of the Perryton boys in the "theatre of action." It's pay day and about time for pay call, and that is one thing a soldier can't afford to miss, so I must close.

Dear Mother and Dad:

How is every one tonight? Fine. I hope I am well and making it o. k. We have been having a little cool weather here.

The other day I went up to some Roman ruins, which had at one time been a large city, but was destroyed a long time ago. I also have been in a big city that is mentioned in the Bible. When I get back, I'll tell you about it. It was pretty and as you came within a few miles of it and saw it, you just began to wonder. No, there wasn't many motor vehicles there—mostly army trucks, but it was mighty interesting.

Oh yes, have I told you what an Arab cemetery looks like. I forgot whether I told you or not, but anyway, they just use common rocks for markers.

At present we have one lamb and one goat for pets. They are really cute. They are rather small and we have them staked out on ropes so they can eat what little grain there is without running off. We did have some chickens but the cook made soup out of them. They really did taste good. I don't know when we will have the lamb made into chops. It doesn't matter though because I don't like any kind of mutton.

Well, I guess that is enough to write about on our stock here in Africa.

I received your letter today that you wrote on Christmas day and I was really glad to get it. Some times it takes quite a while for our mail to come through but we really enjoy it when we do get it.

Curly wanted to know if we had turkey for Christmas dinner. Tell him yes and we enjoyed it.

Well news is short so I'll close for this time. I hope everyone is well. I'm a k. Write soon. Lots of love.

Port Clark, Texas

Dear Van:

In case you have never heard of Port Clark, it is an Army post located just 30 miles from the Mexican border. It is surrounded for miles on either side by clumps of sagebrush and cacti. It is hot and dry, making it exceptionally desirable for the training of soldiers. After marching around this place, the desert sands of Africa would seem like the pinnacle of Perryton's water tower in the middle of January.

My barracks was picked especially for me and my small group by our first sergeant. I am quite sure, knowing my first sergeant like I'm beginning to. You see, we have a whole division of Negro Cavalry in training here, and practically each Negro must have a horse to ride it seems. Anyhow our barracks is located immediately downwind from the stables. We get the full impact whenever the slightest breeze begins to stir.

I have been here about ten days, but we just started to drill yesterday. When we lined up for the first time yesterday, feeling quite like seasoned veterans in our resplendent uniforms and packs, our top kick, who has been in the Army 24 years, by the way, put us in our places by bellowing, "All right, you country boys, when I say fall in, I mean to line up like rows of cotton, just one hoe handle apart!"

All joking aside, I drew a pretty good assignment. I am working here in Post Headquarters and am in charge of the payroll, service records, classification records, and handle the correspondence for the medical detachment here. I am learning quite a lot and hope to rise above the status of a buck private some of these days.

I received the Ochiltree County Herald last week and, Van, it is really like reading a long letter from home. I enjoy it no end, and am looking forward with great anticipation to this week's copy.

It is nearly time for chow, and I must check out and get in line. You know, I wouldn't swap this G. I. uniform for the neatest tweed suit ever made. Maybe I'm not actually killing any Japs or Germans, but I am doing a little bit towards helping someone do it, I feel.

Dear Polks:

Well, here I am down to the USO club again and as usual there is a shortage of anything to do but I suppose I will make out all right.

I got off at midnight last night and don't have to go back to work until the morning, so you see I have about 30 hours off but last week I got off at 7 p. m. Monday night and didn't have to go back to work until Wednesday night at 7 p. m.

The pheasants must be thick up here as they are killing them right and left but don't see much chance of getting in on it as I have no gun or way to go hunting if I did.

The big city of Pierre is on the north bank of the Missouri river and from where I saw it, it seemed to be quite a stream but I suppose like all other rivers I have ever fished it has no fish, but I sure would like to try any way. But as the river has about 27 inches of ice on it, I don't see much chance now.

Well, our latest snow is melting and the weather is quite a bit warmer, but I suppose, as usual, it won't last. In this last hitch, we had about six inches of snow. It fell quite even but the next night the wind got up and blew it all over the place. In places it drifted to three feet and seemed like a regular blizzard but the sky was as clear as a bell.

There is still no news but you can't tell when there will be so I will put out the next edition soon so keep tuned to this station and you will hear more from me soon.

February 23—Well, how are things? It has been quite a while since I heard from you but I suppose you are busy with the income tax reports.

We have been having nice weather here until yesterday when the wind got around to the north. About noon it started snowing and got colder than the devil and we have to replace No. 1 cylinder on No. 1 engine. The bad part was that we had to do it outside. When we removed the plugs, the ends looked like some one had used a hammer on them. I removed the intake and exhaust stacks and the exhaust valve must have slipped down inside the cylinder. They should have the cylinder off when I go back to work.

## A Week of the War

A comparative lull pervaded in Southern Tunisia last week after the British Eighth Army's decisive defeat of Rommel before the Mareth Line. But although land operations subsided somewhat, the Eighth Army increased its air patrol operations, attacking enemy tanks and motor transports which were retreating to the shelter of the line.

In Northern Tunisia, the British First Army contacted General Von Arnim's forces in the region of Sed Jenane, and twice during the week stopped the Axis attacks cold. Von Arnim has made heavy sacrifices in trying to hudge the British from the northern end of the Allied line, but his gains have been minor.

In Central and Southwestern Tunisia, other Allied gains were scored. General Jacques Leclerc's French forces, advancing into Tunisia from the direction of the Mareth Line, effected a union with some of General Giraud's troops and occupied Tozeur, on the northwestern shore of Chott Dferid Salt Lake, and later Metlaoui, an important rail and road center from which to strike at Gafsa.

### Air Combat in Tunisia

Air activity, though restricted by weather, continued over the entire line. Allied planes attacked enemy airfields near Tunis, carried out offensive patrols in the northern and central sectors, destroyed a number of Axis vehicles and planes in the Sed Jenane region, and attacked targets at Gafsa in the south. Discussing air combat in Tunisia, Secretary of War Stimson said Allied planes continue to show "gratifying superiority," and pointed to last week's score of 58 enemy planes downed at a loss of 31 Allied craft. In one day, he said, Flying Fortress and Lockheed Lightnings without loss shot down 17 enemy planes, while 2 German planes collided and crashed into the sea.

Stimson Reveals Tunisian Casualties. In the same press conference, Secretary Stimson set at 2,242 American casualties suffered in Tunisia in the week of February 14 to 20—the period of the Allies' retreat toward the Algerian border and their initial counterattack. This included 59 killed, 176 wounded and 2007 missing, presumably taken prisoner. Losses during the past month have been substantial for both sides, he said, but the Allies have probably fared better than the enemy, as more than 1,000 Germans and Italians were taken prisoner during the month, and over 100 enemy tanks were captured and destroyed.

### American Raids on Europe

Good results have also been clocked up by American planes in their daylight attacks on Axis-held Europe. In one day's raids against Rennes and Rouen in Brittany, U. S. bombers downed more than 20 Axis fighter planes with a loss of only four of the bombers, and Allied fighters, escorting the bombers on their missions, accounted for five more.

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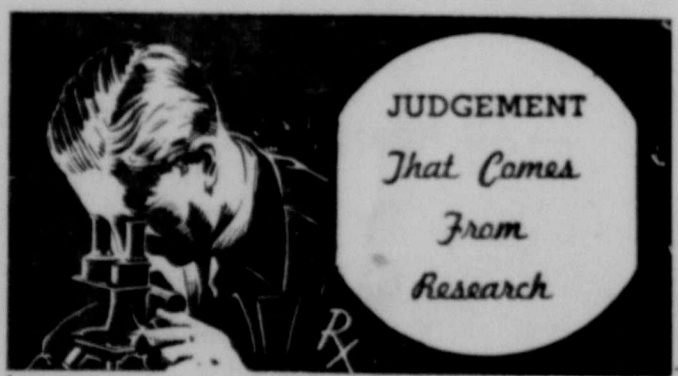

12. The two-week "point holiday" extends all through the meat trades permitting both wholesalers and retailers to maintain sizeable inventories and build up a "working capital" of points.

13. Wholesalers and retailers will register with local boards during the period May 3-14 and will be given an allowable inventory stated in points.

14. A separate table of "trade" points will be used by the retailer, with lower point values which allow for trimming, waste, and shrinkage depending upon the type of meat.

15. Cuts having a large amount of bone and fat will have lower point values than those which are more completely edible.

16. Point values of brains, kidneys, hearts, etc., also will be lower because these parts are more perishable.

17. The meat rationing program makes no provision for pet rations.

18. At least one official list of point values must be posted in each store. In addition, point values must be posted at or near the place where the rationed items themselves are sold.

## Higher Loan Rates Barley And Sorghums

COLLEGE STATION, Mar. 16.—Producers of grain sorghums and barley in Texas will receive higher loan rates this year than they did during 1942.

Under the loan program announced this week by Commodity Credit Corporation through the USDA, loan rates on grain sorghums will be from 25 to 32 cents higher while barley will be from 15 to 20 cents higher.

Loans on barley and grain sorghums stored on farms will be secured by chattel mortgage and if stored in approved warehouses the security will be warehouse receipts. Loans will mature on demand, but not later than April 30, 1944 for barley, and not later than June 30, 1944, for grain sorghums.

Loan rates for farm stored barley are as follows: No. 1 barley, 75 cents per bushel; No. 2, 73 cents per bushel; No. 3, 70 cents; No. 4, 67 cents; and No. 5, 60 cents. Farm-stored grain sorghum rates have been scheduled at: No. 2 or better, 85 cents per 56-pound bushel; No. 3, 80 cents and No. 4, 70 cents.

Discounts at 2 cents per bushel will apply on both barley and grain sorghums grading mixed.

To be eligible for loans on either crop, farmers must plant at least 90 per cent of their warcrop goals, P. C. Colgin, commodity loan specialist for the AAA in Texas, said. He added that loan rates for warehouse stored grain would be 7 cents less than the farm-stored loan rate.

garden this year.

Eight pounds of seed will plant a 100 ft. row. The potatoes should be cut in seed pieces half as large as a hen egg; plant 14 inches apart in 3 to 4 foot rows and cover with about 2 inches of soil. Some farmers make a practice of covering the potatoes with straw to keep down weeds and conserve the moisture. Straw from a stack that is two years old and partially rotted is the most suitable since less trouble will be experienced from the oaks or barley that remains in the straw.

## Town and Farm in Wartime

**Ceiling Prices on Milk Adjusted**  
A second upward adjustment in the ceiling price of sweet milk sold in Texas, Louisiana, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Missouri and Kansas becomes effective March 13. It was announced by Regional OPA Administrator Max McCullough. Under the new regulation, Amendment No. 14, the ceiling price range for quarts sold at retail moves up from a 12-cent low and a 15-cent top to a 13-cent low and a 15½-cent top.

**Replacement Rules Issued**  
With a warning that it is up to the individual to take the best possible care of his ration books, OPA issued uniform regulations governing replacement of lost, stolen or mutilated War Ration Books One and Two. Anyone desiring to replace a ration book or coupon sheet must apply to his local ration board on Form No. R-194. Ten days after submitting his application, the book owner may report to the ration board, which will examine the facts and, if satisfied, may issue the replacement. Where ration books are lost or stolen, the board may require the applicant to report his case to the police.

**Prices of Fresh Vegetables**  
Regional OPA offices may adjust the maximum price of any seller of fresh lettuce, spinach, carrots, green peas, snap beans, tomatoes, and cabbage when the ceiling price is likely to disrupt normal distribution, the OPA has ruled. The Dallas regional office already has started a series of open hearings on the vegetable price situation.

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loans was about 22 per cent less in the last six months of 1942 than in the same period of 1941 with 33,000 fewer farm mortgages recorded by all lenders in the U. S. in the last half of 1942.

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## Important to Grow Something to Eat

Food will be scarce, says Sadie Seward Home Demonstration Agent, Extension Service, A and M College, and many families won't be able to get enough of the food they need during the coming year, unless they produce a part of it themselves.

The total quantity of food in prospect for 1943 is 1400 pounds per person. A low cost adequate diet contains about 1500 pounds of food; a medium cost adequate diet about 1700 pounds; while a liberal diet consists of about 2000 pounds. This is from 1-15 to 1-16 to 1-14 below the total poundage needed.

Economists say that food prices rose 12 per cent in 1942 in spite of price ceilings, and food costs are 40 per cent higher than they were when the war started in 1939.

So, if you buy yourself a good daily diet it will cost you 40 to 50 cents per day. If you have a family of five, your food likely will be between \$730 and \$900 in 1943. Since canned fruits and vegetables are among the foods most needed for our fighting men, there is a great danger that you won't be able to get enough of these foods unless you raise at least a part of them yourself. Each person needs 1400 servings yearly of fruits and vegetables. Under rationing you can buy approximately 160 servings of canned fruits and vegetables. What will you do for the other 1300 servings needed to give you 2 servings of fruits and 2 servings of vegetables daily? Buy some fresh—not many because you won't be able to go to town as often; because you won't be able to buy many fruits and vegetables as they will be scarce; and, because they will be high in price.

Therefore all the food that you can produce in your victory garden at home will be good insurance for a better diet and it will be money in the bank, too.
