Tracks and the two boys, David and Tom, left Stratford last Wednesday and returned Saturday to visit relatives in the Bryan-College Station area.

We took the chance to combine a little business with the trip and asked each of the gasoline dealers where we stopped about fuel situation in their respective areas.

We learned that generally speaking, the shortage, if any, is limited to only a couple of major gasoline brands. The others seem to have plenty of gasoline available and even the ones who have been put on an allotment have managed to stay open and in business.

Visiting with one dealer of the two major brands which found had been cut the most down in Memphis, Texas, we learned that at his station has cut back on the hours they stay open to limit their sales. He told us that rather than only sell 10 gallons per customer they cut back from 24-hour service to 16 hours per day. He also told us of another dealer who used to stay open 24 hours cut back the same way plus closing on Sunday now. This way he said he could manage to take care of his local customers and the upcoming harvest season.

The crops around Clarendon, Memphis on our southward toward Paducah had recently taken a beating from torrential rains and cloudbursts. Farmers had just finished planting their cotton in that area and the big rains hit cutting the fields to shreds, washing out terraces. We could see in many places where bull dozers had been used to push silt off the roadways which had washed out of the fields.

These farmers were back in the fields replanting when we made our trip down and back to East Texas. Visiting with one farmer in the Childress area Wednesday he related that he had already planted over some 180 acres of cotton and planned to finish up that day replanting what had been washed out. He said the field damage itself, repair to terraces etc., would just have to wait and he hoped the rains held off until he got a good stand.

Wheat and other grain crops looked just about ready to harvest and we heard that around Wichita Falls there was some serious fuel shortages harvest efforts were being curtailed. We heard this on the radio as we didn't go that way on our trip. Y'know, we certainly get spoiled up here on the baldies...and we wouldn't trade our area for anywhere we know.

Certainly we'd like to see our area grow a bit, but downstate sure is getting crowded!

We tried to find our way around College Station while visiting with our father who is in a Bryan hospital recovering from surgery. Our old stomping grounds around Texas A&M have really grown. We had a hard time finding our way around campus, particularly when we found many old buildings had been torn down and new bigger ones where they used to be!

We did enjoy our trip, despite the nature for which we made it. Our boys got a look at how most of the people in Texas live and how many folks there really are south of the Canadian River.

Naturally the trees and all the greenery were in full bloom, it rained a little each day and the high humidity coupled with the temperature kept us a' sweating.

Stratford; Janne Burson, Channing; Micah Jones, Dumas; and Betty Brown, Stratford.

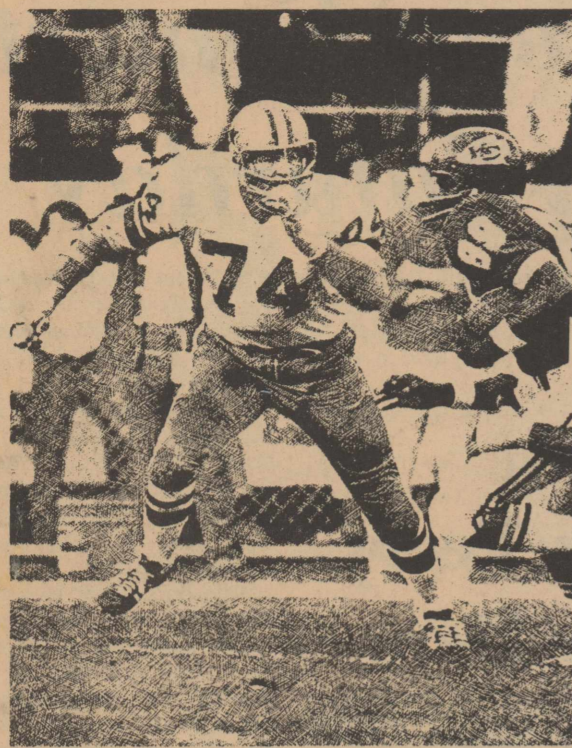

Sharon has lived in or around the Panhandle all her life. She and her husband Robert moved to Stratford three years ago from Nara Visa, New Mexico. She and her husband met while they were attending school at Logan High School. They were married August 10, 1965. The couple have three children, Robbie, 6; Doug, 4; and Sheri, 2. They make their home just west of the Santa Fe office. Sharon is presently employed with the Queen O' Creme and Mr. Bullock is employed with Walter Lasley and Sons.

Sharon has supplied us with three tasty recipes: Cherry Topped Cheese cake, Chicken Casserole and Green Enchiladas.

**CHERRY TOPPED CHEESE-CAKE**  
1 pkg. Yellow cake mix  
2 tsp. oil  
1 pkg. (8oz.) cream cheese softened  
1/2 cup sugar  
4 eggs  
1 1/2 cups milk  
3 tsp lemon juice  
3 tsp vanilla  
1 can (1 lb 5 oz.) cherry pie filling.

Preheat oven to 300 degrees. Reserve 1 cup of dry cake mix. In large mixing bowl combine remaining cake mix, 1 egg and oil. (mixture will be crumbly.) Press crust mixture evenly into bottom and 3/4 up the sides of a greased 13x9x2 in pan. In the same bowl blend cream cheese and sugar. Add 3 eggs and reserved cake mix. Beat 1 minute at medium speed. At low speed slowly add milk and flavorings, mix until smooth. Pour into crust. Bake at 300 for 45-55 minutes until center is firm. When cool, top with pie filling, chill before serving. Store in refrigerator, freeze covered with foil.

**CHICKEN CASSEROLE**  
Season a three pound chicken with slices of margarine, salt and pepper. Bake at 325 for 30 minutes. Turn the chicken and bake for another 30 minutes before the latter 10 minutes. Heat over low heat a can of cream of celery soup and a small amount of water. Then pour the cream of celery soup over the chicken and bake for another 10 minutes. Serves six.

**GREEN ENCHILADAS**  
1 pkg corn flour tortillas  
1 chopped onion  
1 lb. grated Cheddar Cheese  
1 can of cream of chicken soup  
1 cup of milk  
1 can of green chilies  
Fry tortillas until crisp on each side. Then lay tortillas flat in a 13x9x2 pan covered with chopped onion and grated cheese. Lay another roll of tortillas, onion and cheese until all is used. In a small sauce pan, combine green chilies, milk and cream of chicken soup. After the mixture is heated pour over tortillas onion and cheese. Then bake at 350 for 30 minutes.

**STRATFORD BUTANE'S**  
**Turnrow Topics**

The importance of using short residual chemicals has proven itself to several farmers the past few days. The volunteer problem in some milo, coupled with the soaring price of soybeans, has made some entertain the idea of plowing up the milo and plant soybeans. This seems to be a good decision IF you did not apply Milo-guard or Atrax on this land last milo season. If you did, then the planting of soybeans would be too much of a gamble.

Under the same situation, had the farmer used Igran on his milo, or in the case of corn, used Bladex, last year, then he would be free to go back to soybeans or any other crop he might choose. The residual on Bladex is 10 to 12 weeks, and Igran 12 to 14 weeks. These chemicals cost a bit more per acre, but the insurance of crop rotation more than offsets the increased cost.

Was visiting with Fred Cross the other day, and he reported some cases of Pale Western Cut-Worm. These are subterranean feeders, making control almost impossible at this time. A pre-plant application of chemical down in the soil will become necessary should this pest increase in our area. Fortunately, some of these chemicals will mix with fertilizers and can be chiseled into the soil when fertilizing.

We observed one field of milo north of Conlen earlier, that had been destroyed by flea beetles. In the past, some have had to spray corn for this insect, but this is the worst we

had seen on milo. The flea beetle eats across the leaf weakening it, causing it to break over at this point. It can be controlled with chemicals.

While checking some corn fields in the south part of the county last week, we observed damage on corn that possibly was caused by the first generation corn borer. You will remember that we have been advised not to try for a control on this generation, but we should all start giving serious thought to the method to be used for the control of succeeding generations.

Last week we applied Medina to 120 acres here in the county. Crops involved in the test are, wheat, milo, corn grass and soybeans. Hall Bennett estimates that the hay crop he is harvesting now, is showing a Medina increase of 18 bales per acre over non-treated. This is only an estimate, and will have to be adjusted as his baling is completed.

Much of our milo is being watered up. This practice in many cases will germinate the weeds along with your milo. If this happens to you, don't panic, for we can take care of the weed problem with Aatrex.

Andy Jensen, one of our pilots will be joining us again in a few days. Andy has been ill, but will be back with us soon, ready to go to work. Andy is an excellent pilot, and very knowledgeable in the field of aerial spraying.

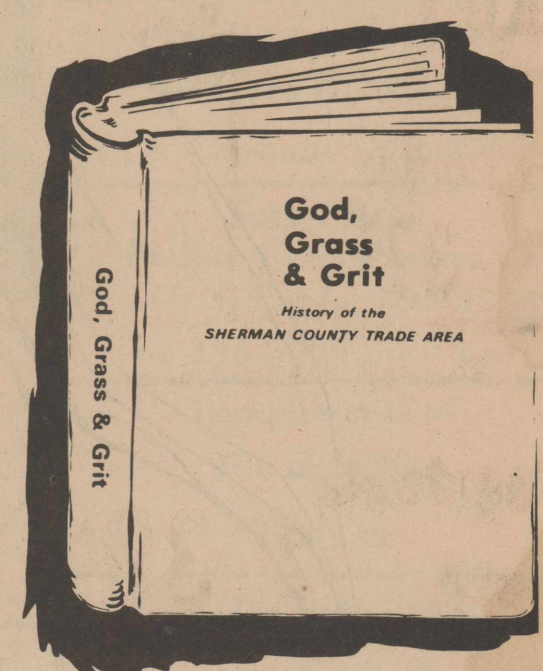

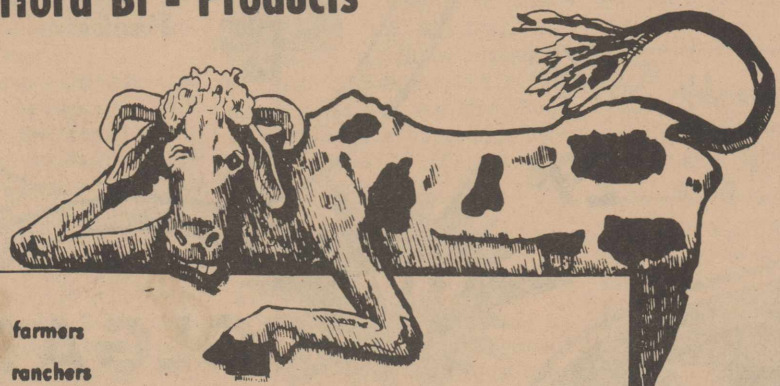

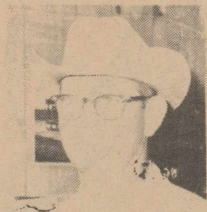

Plans for the Sherman County 4-H Horse Show are coming along. The show will be held on Saturday, June 23 at the County Barn Arena. We are expecting a good many 4-H'ers to take part. It should be a good show. Why not plan to be there to watch the action. The show starts at 10:30 a.m.

Plans are being made to conduct a Swine Fitting and Showing Workshop, for Adult 4-H Leaders or others interested persons in Amarillo on August 17 and 18.

A survey is being conducted to see how much interest there would be in a workshop like this, so if you would like to attend a course of this kind please let me know right away. Some garden vegetables need more nitrogen than is provided by the complete fertilizer recommended for the general garden plot.

Sweet corn, okra, peppers, tomatoes, squash and greens will need additional nitrogen applications.

Peppers and tomatoes need a side-dressing when their first fruits are one inch in diameter. For every two feet of peppers, apply one teaspoon of ammonium nitrate or one-and-a-half teaspoons of ammonium sulfate. Apply the same amount around each tomato plant and repeat applications at three-week intervals during picking.

For squash, apply a half to one teaspoon of ammonium nitrate or two teaspoons of ammonium sulfate around each plant when runners are 12 inches long. Greens need one teaspoon of ammonium nitrate or one-and-a-half teaspoons of ammonium sulfate along every two feet of row.

To avoid foliage burns, do not get fertilizer on wet plants while sidedressing.

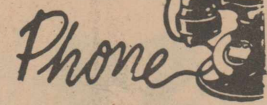
