Verdict Still Lacking In Blackwell Death

Officers left Eastland this morning for Austin where they will take organs of Mrs. Ola Faye Blackwell to the Texas Department of Public Safety laboratory for analysis. The 49-year-old Staff woman died Thursday afternoon at her home two miles southeast of Staff.

Justice Jim Boggus of Eastland, said today that he did not expect any report from the DPS laboratory until Wednesday or Thursday. He said he would not return an autopsy verdict until he had that report.

District Attorney Joe Nuesse termed the action of officers as a "routine investigation." Nuesse, who has been assisting Boggus and Tex. Ranger Jim Riddle, explained that anytime a person dies when no physician is at hand, or poison is involved or believed to be involved, or indications point to suicide, then an inquest must be held by law.

An autopsy was performed on the dead woman last week, and final analysis of the autopsy is the reason for the delayed inquest verdict, Boggus said.

New Wells Spotted In Eastland County

A new field venture, a new location in a regular field and the completion of a well highlight oil news in Eastland County.

W. H. Green of Abilene No. 3 V. M. Smith will be a new project in Eastland County's Bankline-Owen Field five miles east of Cisco.

Slotted for 4,000 feet with rotary, it spots 330 feet from the north and 1,320 feet from the east lines of Section 60, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

Completed as a regular field producer was Bruce L. Hoover of Ranger No. 1 C. C. Harris, three miles south of Eastland in Section 28, Block 2, H&TC Survey.

Daily potential was 30 barrels of 37 gravity oil, plus 29 percent water, through a 1/2-inch choke with 240 pounds on casing and 50 pounds on tubing. Production was from 20 perforations at 1,297-1,306 feet. Casing was set at 1,318 feet, total depth. Gas-oil ratio was 620-1.

Work On Farm Market Road 570 To Start

Resident Engineer G. L. Smith of the Texas Highway Department announced Tuesday that work on Farm-Market Road 570, six miles east of Eastland east to Farm-Market Road 571 near Cheney, a distance of approximately 7.2 miles, would begin in the near future.

Smith said work on the projects will begin as soon as final planning is completed and right-of-way secured. Smith will be in charge of the work.

This is a part of the Highway Commission's first step to inaugurate a new two year Farm-Market Road program for Texas, he explained. E. H. Thorton Jr., chairman of the Highway Commission, stated that the funds for this program are being derived from the Federal Aid Highway Act of 1954, matched with State highway funds on a dollar and dollar basis.

Here's Proof That Thirteen Is Lucky

The next time someone tells you that number 13 is unlucky, just tell him about this story.

In 1939 E. A. Hatten, then of Gordon, purchased a 1939 Chevrolet coupe from Claude Maynard, who was then a salesman for Harvey Chevrolet Co. of Eastland. Recently he traded the car in on a new Ford, again buying from Maynard who is now with King Motor Co.

Hatten and Maynard got to doing a little checking, and here's what they found out.

During the 16 years Hatten had his old car every license plate he had ended with the numerals 13. For instance, his 1938 car plates (he had to register the car that year) were 922-413. In '39 they were 922-313; in '40 it was 955-013; in '41, 997-313; in '42, A94-613; in '43, A94-613; in '44 they remained the same, (remember the little clip-on); in '45 his license number was ET59193; in '46, EX7613; in '47, BR1413; in '48, BS13; in '49, CA413; in '50, BZ-113; in '51, CP113; in '52, CP-13; in '53 it was again CP13 and in '54 again CP 13.

So for the entire time he has had the car it has been carrying the traditionally bad-luck number

Second of A Series Passage of Proposed Amendment Would Effect Retirement Plans

(Editor's Note: This is the second in a series of articles prepared by the Texas League of Women Voters given both sides of the question in regard to the 11 constitutional amendments to be voted on Nov. 2.)

When Eastland County voters go to the polls Nov. 2 they will vote on one amendment that many probably won't even understand. It concerns the interchange of teacher-state employee retirement benefits and should be given careful consideration.

This amendment would change the Constitution by permitting members of the state employees' retirement system and the teachers' retirement system to transfer eligibility credits between the two. Under the present law there is a slight variation in the periods of service after which retirement benefits may be claimed, but the amounts contributed in each system are the same: five percent of salaries, with an annual maximum of \$180. The State contributes equal amounts.

In 1949, the Legislature provided for reciprocity and joint retirement between the systems, but the Supreme Court ruled the provision unconstitutional. This amendment would make constitutional the transfer of rights under these two retirement systems.

FOR

Any employee of the State, teacher or otherwise, should be permitted to transfer credits from one retirement system to another without loss of accumulated savings and time earned toward retirement. They are actually transferring from one agency or department to another.

This proposal will add very little to State expense and it's passage would remove a discrimination now shown. State employees of both systems. Under the Federal Social Security program, no such penalty is imposed upon the participants.

"The Eastland C of C is enrolled in the Inter-Chamber National Fire Waste Contest, a nationally organized fire prevention movement sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce of the United States and its affiliated National Fire Waste Council.

"At the close of the year we will report in this contest, and we hope to place Eastland among the winners of national recognition for cities of our class. It is, therefore, highly important that we achieve a high standing for our observance of Fire Prevention Week."

Eastland Firemen Cop First In Area Contest

LOCAL TEAM TAKES SECOND STRAIGHT WIN

WEATHERFORD (TNS) — Eastland's crack six-man pumper race team did it again here Sunday when they scored their second straight victory at the North Central Texas Firemen's Association quarterly convention.

The Eastland team headed all others when they were clocked at 21.1 seconds in the hook-up race. Second was Weatherford with 23 seconds flat. Ranger was third with 24 seconds and Mineral Wells fourth in 26 seconds.

Some 200 firemen attending the convention. Registration was held at the Weatherford Fire Hall at noon and the business session started at 3 p.m. The next convention will be held Jan. 6 in Mineral Wells.

The Firemen's Supper was held at 6 p.m. in the Fire Hall for visiting firemen and their families. The 11 members of the Association are Ranger, Eastland, Mineral Wells, Stephenville, Comanche, DeLeon, Gorman, Alledo, Granbury, Dublin and Weather-

ford.

When a fire started in those days, everybody in the city turned out to help fight it. Will Martin, Ed Sparr, Steve Holland, Buddie Copland, George Phillips and L. A. Hightower were a few members of the first fire department here.

In 1918 the city purchased a Ford fire truck and in the year 1919 the fire department was reorganized with J. L. Mead as fire chief. S. M. Fowler was assistant chief and George Harrell was treasurer. There were 30 members of the organization including J. L. Mead, S. M. Fowler, George Harrell, Walter Hart, Paul Brown, Q. D. Powlmer, C. L. Mean and C. M. Collier.

During the year 1919 the city bought two new fire trucks. The records show that by 1928 three paid firemen were on the rolls. In that year A. W. Hennessee was chief.

A more modern look at the Eastland Fire-Department shows that there are 26 men serving as firemen and that the city now has four trucks in use.

The most modern piece of equipment is truck No. 4, which is a 1951 Ford V8 with a 750-gallon water tank and a triple combination pumper.

Truck no. 1 is a 1919 American

Le France 750 gallon a minute pumper truck.

Truck no. 2 is a 1935 V8 Ford with a 575 gallon water tank which can pump 160 gallons a minute.

Truck no. 3 is a 1929 Seagraves ladder truck which can pump 600 gallons a minute.

Texas Industries earlier reported net income of \$191,129 for the three months ended August 31, 1954, a gain of 110 per cent over the corresponding quarter last year, and sales of \$2,770,948, an increase of 33 per cent over the same period last year. Sales and earnings broke all previous company records for a single quarter, Ralph B. Rogers, president, said.

The company produces and markets concrete and concrete products in Texas, Oklahoma and Louisiana.

Man Killed In Train Wreck May Be Rangerite

An Associated Press release from Amarillo this morning said that the 42-year-old man killed in a train crash near that city is a Ranger man.

The AP story identified the dead man as Joe Hopper. The story did not say how the identification was made. A check with the Ranger police department and the city's two funeral homes did not clear up the situation. No Joe Hopper is listed in the Ranger

city directory.
Hopper was killed when 30 cars of a Fort Worth and Denver freight train plunged down an embankment near Amarillo Monday.

Another man, William Wilson, 44, of Pueblo, Colo., was reported injured with both arms and legs fractured. Wilson told officers he and the dead man boarded the freight Sunday night in Pueblo.

The wreck tore up around 300 feet of track on a high fill about 25 miles northwest of Amarillo. Traffic was rerouted on nearby Rock Island and Santa Fe tracks. Traffic is due to be rolling again by this afternoon.

An inspired Navarro Junior College eleven from Corsicana scored a resounding 13-7 upset victory over the Ranger Junior College Rangers Saturday night in a non-conference game played in Ranger's Bulldog Stadium.

The shifty back did a tight wire act down his right sideline but was pulled in by Brewer on the three. From that point the Rangers tried power over the line to no avail. Then on second down, Wood faked handoffs to two backs and then hit R. C. Smith with a pass in the endzone. That pass play was actually the best play of the night for Ranger, and came as a complete surprise to the Corsicana eleven. It found Smith all by himself out in the left flat. J. D. Hanson of Eastland converted for the Rangers to tie the score, 7-7.

Navarro was not to be denied, however. Taking over on their own 47 after a great punt return by Halfback John Whitten, the Bulldogs set up a drive that carried them 53 yards to paydirt and victory. Agricultural Census Begins This Month

COLLEGE STATION — When a stranger walks up to your farm this month, act kindly, sir, he may be a census taker.

The Bureau of Census this month begins its 1954 Census of Agriculture and each Texas farmer will answer about 100 questions regarding their land, crops, live stock, farming methods, expenses, labor and equipment.

Robert W. Burgess, bureau director, reports it will require 30,000 enumerators to check the more than 5,000,000 farms and ranches in the United States. And it will all be done during October and November.

After the enumeration is complete, the Bureau will total the figures and release them. It keeps individual farm's and farm's secrets by releasing only totals for a county or larger areas.

The census taking commenced October 4 in the High Plains counties and in the citrus belt of extreme south Texas. Enumerators will begin asking questions on the Edwards Plateau October 18 and on the Rio Grande Plains October 25. The canvass of east, central and far west Texas farms will start November 3.

"The 1954 census will collect information from every farmer in the United States, make it available as totals to the public—and keep secrets of individual farms and farmers at the same time," Burgess says.

Since 1920, an agricultural census has been taken every five years.

Farm Fires Take Staggering Toll

Farm fires last year cost an estimated \$139,000,000 and took some 3,000 human lives. In view of these staggering losses, the week of Oct. 3 through 9 has been proclaimed by President Eisenhower as Fire Prevention Week.

In his proclamation, Mr. Eisenhower calls upon the nation's citizens to initiate a year-round campaign against waste caused by preventable fires.

Fires in rural areas continue to be a costly drain on the farmer's income.

An extensive check of the farmstead for the common causes of fire is urged during this week. Fire officials say there are nine causes of most fires. They are: careless smoking and matches, improper use of inflammable liquids, spontaneous combustion, collection of trash and other rubbish, defective heating apparatus, combustible roofs, defective chimneys and worn-out, defective lightning-rod systems.

Prevention of fire isn't a one-week-in-the-year job, but a full time proposition. Everyone in the family, mom, dad, junior and sis—should become more fire prevention conscious and take steps to eliminate ever-present hazards.

Because farms usually are located distant from organized fire protection, the need for "prevention" is even more pressing than in the urban areas.
