FARMERS MEET NEXT MONDAY

Last Saturday afternoon at the tabernacle W. B. McGinnis, national organizer for The Farmers Equity Union, addressed the farmers of Hedley and vicinity, informing them of the benefits to be derived by organizing an exchange of the Union at this place.

The large audience that heard him seemed favorably impressed, and about seventy were signed up for the organization which will likely be completed next Monday afternoon at 1:30, at the tabernacle, when President C. O. Drayton will be present and deliver an address.

Another call meeting was held at the tabernacle Tuesday afternoon for the purpose of taking decisive action in regard to the cotton situation. Quite a number signed an agreement to keep their cotton off the market for thirty days, or longer if necessary. The farmers of this vicinity are determined that something must be done to protect their interests, and next Monday's meeting will doubtless be largely attended and thoroughly active.

Invitations to the meeting next Monday have been sent out as follows:

St. Bartholomew's In London

IF THERE is one building more than another in London which has suffered through the vicissitudes of time it is the church of St. Bartholomew the Great in Smithfield. If there is one charitable institution which through long centuries has ministered to the needs of the suffering poor it is St. Bartholomew's hospital, hard by, writes Ernest H. Ross in the Boston Transcript.

Church and hospital are inseparable in their history and associations. They stand together today close to the great meat market of the metropolis, where in ancient times, on the "Smithfield" (Smithfield), tournaments were held, where the dagger of Walter the Stricker struck down Jack Cade, and where martyrs passed through the gate of fire for conscience' sake, the white and cruel and implacable hands of the church looked on at their sufferings.

The history of the hospital has just been told in two sumptuous volumes by Sir Norman Moore, one of its most famous physicians, and this must be our excuse for rediscovering one of the most fascinating corners of ancient London.

Rahere's Divine Vision.

It is of the church that one must speak first if we are to have a clear understanding of all that is conveyed by the magic word "Bart's." For the noble charity of which Sir Norman Moore discourses so eloquently was originally only a part of the larger scheme of the immense church of St. Bartholomew the Great, with its college of canons of the Order of St. Augustine, popularly known as the Canons from the color of their robe.

In your mind back to the days when Henry I ruled England. At that time his court was a favorite place, where, touched with the enthusiasm of the day, determined pilgrims to Rome, by penitence hoping to obtain forgiveness of his sins. At last he reached the city and called his sins; but before he could do so, he was seized by a sudden illness, and feeling that his high he vowed that should he would build a hospital for the poor.

Right on his way home, he found himself on the edge of a deep and dreadful pit. In the moment of despair, when he was about to fall, when suddenly St. Bartholomew appeared to him and told him that if he would build a hospital in Smithfield he should have the land. He promised, and when he came back he found that this was indeed a vision, and that he must obey the command of the blessed saint. So after much trouble, he obtained the king's grant of land in Smithfield, and he set to work to carry out his task of piety, to build a hospital for the poor and nearby a

rose the hospital of St. Bartholomew. Of the latter, the first prior, was completed first cannot though it appears that but a few years separated the two. In the year 1123, and for nearly 300 years, the hospital continued to carry out of its founder.

NEW POINTS IN AUTUMN MODES

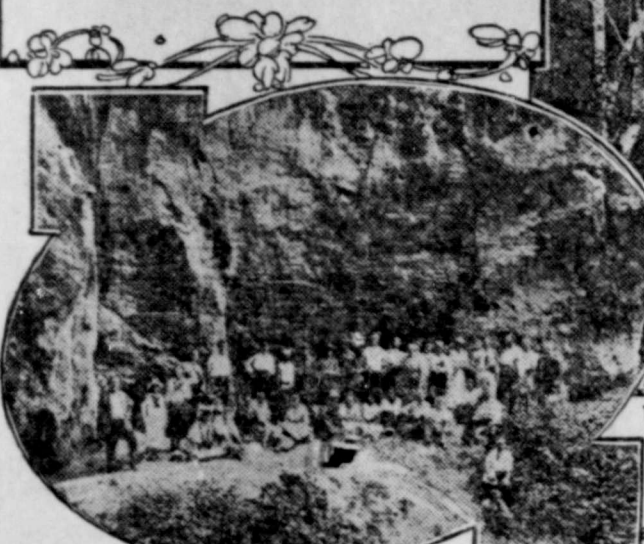

Studying Nature In Her Nomes

The American School of Wild Life Protection and Propagation in the future Mississippi Valley National Park

THE American School of Wild Life Protection and Propagation at McGregor, Iowa—the region of the proposed Mississippi Valley National park—is the outward and visible sign of an inward and spiritual desire to give the study and knowledge of nature its rightful place in our twentieth century scheme of life.

The American people are a nation of lovers of the beautiful in nature. Behind it, is one of the liveliest causes of the day. That is why we have established the first national park in the world, Yellowstone. We are now creating a system of national parks and thirty-five national monuments.

It is true beyond question that in general the people of thousands of years ago had a sense of nature which was a part of their life. To gain this understanding and appreciation is the purpose of the American School of Wild Life Protection and Propagation at McGregor.

The American frontier is no more. Gone are the days when the great plains, the passenger pigeon, civilization and the automobile cannot exist together. The automobile has brought us to the silent places. wide organization with a membership of 2,500,000 is carried on through a dozen or more departments. One of the most important of these is the department of conservation, which promotes the use without abuse of the natural resources of the United States.

At the biennial convention of the General Federation this summer in Des Moines, Iowa, one day was largely devoted to conservation. In the morning, in the convention, Mrs. John Dickinson Sherman, chairman of the conservation department, made her report and spoke on "The Conservation Outlook." She called attention to the fact that the natural scenery division of work, added by her to the department six years ago, was then considered as of little importance, natural scenery not being ranked as a natural resource of value; now natural scenery was recognized as a great national asset and the natural scenery division was the most popular in the department. George H. Maxwell, executive director of the National Reclamation association, delivered an address on "Our Conservation Problem."

Next was a "Natural Scenery Luncheon," in honor of Director Stephen T. Mather of the National Park service of the department of interior, in charge of Mrs. Charles H. McKider, chairman of the natural scenery division, attended by more than 250 delegates. Mrs. Sherman presided. She said, in brief, that any constructive work that advances the use, development and preservation of our natural resources must necessarily be based on accurate information and careful study of conditions. A practical, comprehensive study of natural science and nature would lay a foundation for an understanding and an appreciation of our natural resources. The children of today should be given the opportunity to gain a first-hand, intimate and scientific knowledge of the earth, her products, of nature's bounty and nature's ways.

Director Mather outlined the activities of the national park service; asked the federated club women to urge upon members of congress the necessity of larger national park appropriations. He laid special emphasis upon the educational mission of the national parks. He would promote by every possible means the interpretation of the natural sciences which are illustrated by the scenic features, flora and fauna of the national parks, encourage the popular study of their history, exploration, tradition and folklore and improve every opportunity for the protection and propagation of bird and wild animal life.

Dr. L. H. Pammel of Iowa State college, chairman of the Iowa state conservation board, spoke in behalf of the Mississippi Valley National park project. He set forth the many and varied attractions of the region. He emphasized the fact that 20,000,000 people lived within a radius of 500 miles and that 85 per cent of the people can not travel to the national parks of the scenic West for vacations. The Northern Mississippi Valley congress was of the unanimous opinion that a series of national parks should be established in the Mississippi valley. He appealed to Director Mather to give the Mississippi Valley National park project the most urgent consideration.

The afternoon session of the conference was devoted to the study of the program in the department of conservation, which promotes the use without abuse of the natural resources of the United States.

National park enthusiasts believe that recreation amid scenes of natural beauty is the best antidote for the manifold evils of our complex modern civilization.

All these things, you see, lead up directly to the American school and its work.

Mills, Longs Peak, Colo.; Dr. T. S. Palmer, secretary A. O. U., Washington, D. C.; T. Gilbert Pearson, National Association of Audubon Societies. The directors were: Fred G. Bell, F. S. Richards, T. A. Jayne, T. J. Sullivan and L. P. Bickel.

The departments and instructors were: Geology, Dr. George F. Kay, dean of the liberal arts college of Iowa State university; Iowa parks, Dr. L. H. Pammel of Iowa State college, chairman of the state conservation board; botany, Dr. Bohumil Shimek of the Iowa State university; archeology, Prof. Charles R. Keyes of Cornell college; ornithology, Rev. Leroy Titus Weeks, rector of Trinity church, Emmetsburg. The fee was nominal, \$2. George Bennett was secretary and registrar; Karl D. Bell; tents and cottages, William Meyers; boats, Frank Sloane; automobiles, Al Clements; signs, John Kramer; reception and information, Fred Phillips.

The activities of the school were varied and enjoyable. In addition to the class work and matters of routine instruction there was a river trip on a big steamer; many addresses and stereoscopic lectures, picnic luncheons, a community supper; music by the McGregor band; a union service; a formal opening and a general conference on the closing day.

Gov. W. L. Harding of Iowa, to further the Mississippi Valley National park project, called a conference of those most active in its promotion. The conference was held at La Crosse. Among those present from Iowa were: Governor Harding, State Senator Newberry, Assemblyman Becker, Doctor Pammel, Joseph Kelso, J. F. Ford, W. L. Albert, F. C. Bell, Logan Blizard, John Kramer, C. A. Luce, J. M. Berry, G. Pederson, C. A. Spigner, B. Hendrick, G. W. Eaton, Julius Boeck, Florence Clark, Mrs. F. C. Bell, Mrs. Logan Blizard and Mrs. C. A. Luce. Minnesota was represented by D. Lange, president of the state forestry association, Frank D. Lowman, superintendent of parks, represented Illinois. Among those present from Wisconsin were Congressman John J. Esch, Alderman Funk of La Crosse, C. L. Harrington of the conservation commission and Judge J. H. Long.

Governor Harding presided and Mr. Harrington acted as secretary. An executive committee was organized, consisting of Governor Harding, chairman, Mr. Harrington, secretary; Mr. Lange and Mr. Esch. All state organizations will unite in supporting the establishment by congress of a reservation in the scenic area under consideration.

In the afternoon session of the conference Governor Harding, Director Mather and W. F. Bickel arranged to have Chairman Good and staff of the house appropriations committee visit the scenic area which a large part of the hopes will be made the Mississippi Valley National park.

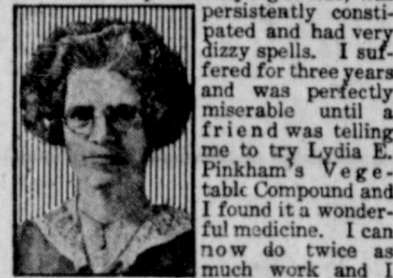

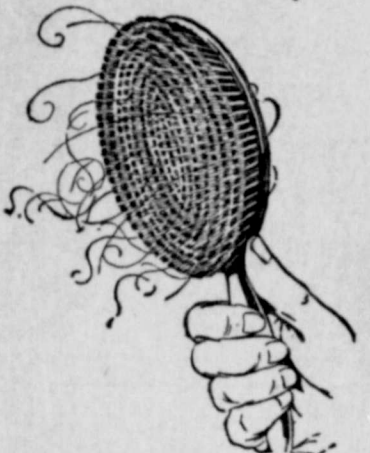

GOOD BARNS MEAN CONTENTED COWS

Type of Structure That Contains All Modern Equipment.

VENTILATION IS IMPORTANT

Design Provides Accommodations for Twelve Cows and Six Horses—Well Built and Protected Against the Elements.

Whenever you see a good looking herd of healthy cows, you can immediately conclude that they are well fed and housed. Unless a cow is protected by a modern, substantial home, she is not likely to be a heavy producer.

There are several essential features in the construction of a dairy barn that will aid in increasing production and the barn shown here contains many of those features. In the first place it should be firmly built and protected against the elements of wind, lightning, etc. If you will notice, this barn has been equipped with lightning rods. Every year the toll exacted by this single element amounts to \$8,000,000. And the heaviest loss is found among farm buildings. In a recent report the United States depart-

ment of agriculture stated that 95 per cent of this loss can be averted by the use of efficient lightning rod systems.

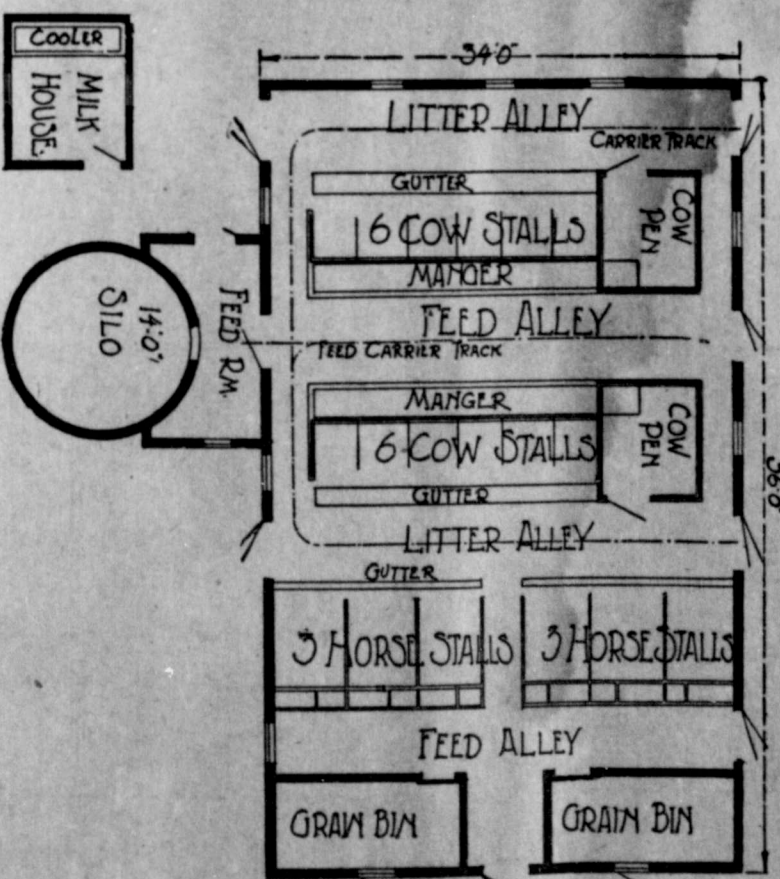
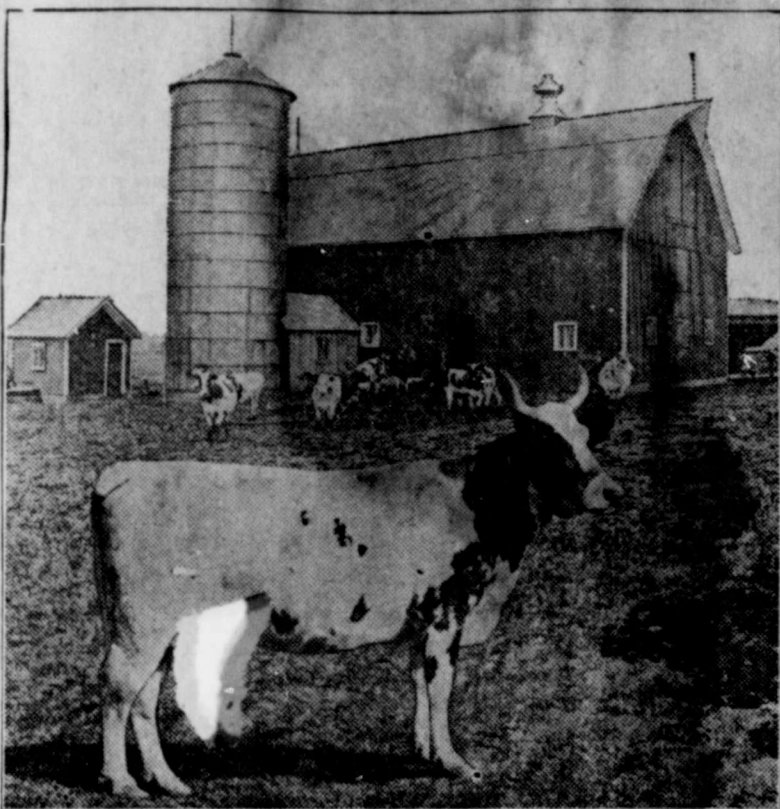
Another important feature of barn construction, and one that has been taken care of in this building, is ventilation. The health of the animals housed in a barn of this kind depends primarily on the supply and kind of air they have to breathe. Unless the barn has been built so as to provide a maximum of fresh air the effect will be noticed in the animals' output. This barn has been fitted with the most modern ventilating system, and all the foul air is drawn off through four air flues which lead from all parts of the barn.

A barn is a good type, built for those who do not have a large herd, plank construction, 34' x 36' and will accommodate 12 cows and 6 horses. The cow stalls are 12' x 12' and the horse stalls are 12' x 12'.

At the other end of this barn are located the six horse stalls with a feed alley running along one end. Two grain bins at the far corner provide storage facilities from whence a supply can be drawn for the dairy animals.

At the end of the feeding alley running between the cow stalls is a feed room where the feed can be ground and loaded onto the carriers for distribution among the various stalls. The silo is next to this feed room. It is built of wooden staves, a type that is very popular in some sections of the country. The staves are interlocked so as to form a continuous wall. The lightning rod at the top is designed to protect it from fire. A short distance from the silo is a small milk house equipped with a cooler where the milk can be kept in good condition until it is hauled to the factory. This building is a very convenient asset to the farm building group.

A large hay mow above provides plenty of space in the barn for feed storage. For the farmer who has



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DAIRY POINTS

HOME SUPPLIES FROM FARM

Measured in Money Value Dairy Products Constitute Most Important Group of Foods.

Dairy products constitute the most important group of foods measured in money value, consumed by the average farm family. Milk cows are kept on practically all farms. The average farm family uses annually about 2,600 quarts of milk in the form of milk, butter, cheese or cream.

In dairy regions where milk is shipped or sold to creameries or cheese

factories, practically all the butter and cheese used is bought instead of made on the farm, says the United States department of agriculture. Very few farmers buy whole milk. About four-fifths of the dairy products consumed by farmers are produced on the home farm.

In the South dairy products are used very freely. The common practice is to churn the whole milk for butter, producing a large quantity of buttermilk. The average annual consumption of butter per family is about 230 pounds in the South while for families in the North and West it is less than 150 pounds. It is not unusual for the average-sized family in the South to consume 2,000 quarts of buttermilk a year. Buttermilk is a cooling and healthful drink for that climate.

DRUGS INJURE DAIRY CATTLE

Iowa State College Experiments Show Decrease Rather Than Increase in Fat Production.

The use of drugs with the idea of increasing the fat production of test cows has been tried out by Iowa State College dairy section. In most cases it was found that drugs decreased rather than increased the fat production.

Such drugs as alcohol, castor oil, pituitrin, aloes, magnesium sulphate, nux vomica and sodium chloride were tried and in all cases they were detrimental to the cows. All cows used were in good normal condition at the start of the tests and various sizes of doses were used.

In some cases it was found that the flow of milk and butterfat was increased slightly but this soon fell off and in the end a decrease was noticed.

Up to date no drug has been found that will increase and it is strongly advised by the dairy men not to resort to this method as it injures the cows and is not a fair way to gain a record.

WHEN MILK TEST IS HIGHEST

Faculty of Milking Off Fat Is Used in Pushing Cows for Short-Time Records.

In pushing cows for short-time records, this faculty of milking off the fat is used; that is, the cow is allowed to freshen in very fat condition and will test very high when her record is being made two or four weeks after freshening. There have been cases where cows have tested from two to three per cent higher during this period than the normal test for her discloses and this test would be much higher than during the last part of her lactation.

MILK-CREAM WEIGHTS

Skim milk weighs 8.63 pounds a gallon.

The foregoing figures were based on milk with a fat content of 2½ per cent at 63 degrees temperature. Similar milk testing 3 per cent weighs 8.6 pounds.

Mixed milk and cream of 10 per cent butterfat content weighs 8.53 pounds.

The general rule is to estimate milk testing from 3 to 5 per cent as weighing 8.6 pounds a gallon.

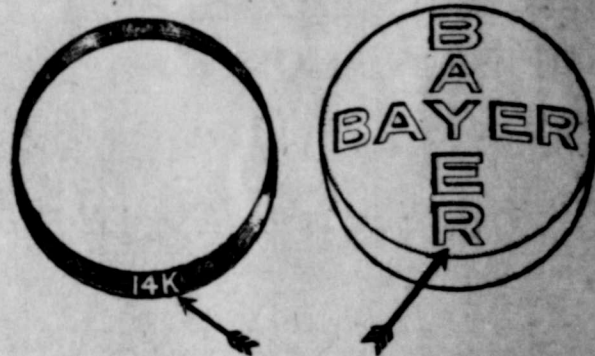

AUTO TURNED OVER

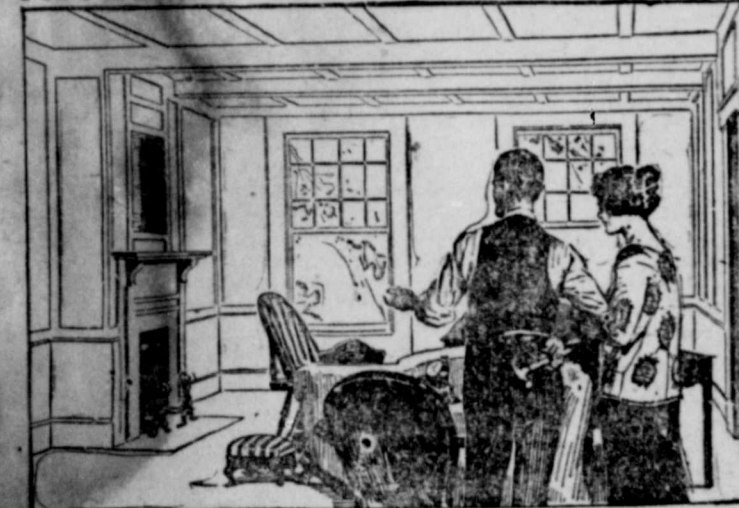
