"Party hopping," as she describes the procedure, was approved in an amendment by the 1983 Legislature and allows voters to vote a straight ticket and still vote for write-ins or candidates in the other party as long as the election judge can tell their intent.

"As long as there is no contradiction, there is no problem," she explained, noting as long as there is one clear candidate marked on the ballot, then the vote will be counted.

City projects on schedule

Thanks to two grants and a bond program, Colorado City residents will be enjoying better streets and sewer service.

One project is almost complete, another is about half complete and another is still on the drawing boards.

City manager Brenda Tarter explains that the waste water treatment renovation, funded with \$750,000 in 1983 general obligation bonds, is a "little past half complete."

The first phase, which included installing ponds for effluent water, is complete and the second phase, renovation of plant itself, is about a third complete, she said.

A holdup on the plant renovation is waiting for parts and supplies. "Special made parts which sometimes takes six months to a year to get in are required for the project," she said.

"We hope to be through by the spring of 1985," said Mrs. Tarter. Graycon of Mesquite is the general contractor and Freese and Nichols of Austin did the

planning.

One project that is nearly complete is the curbing and paving of 3,200 feet of streets in the Sands area.

Contractors are in the process of putting the base material down and the first coat of asphalt should be applied within the next week, said Mrs. Tarter.

"Since it's so late in the season, only one coat will be applied now," she explained. "The second coat will be applied next spring."

She notes that the contractor will be responsible for the streets during the winter months.

The street-paving project was funded with a \$150,000 grant from the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

The city recently received a \$415,000 grant from the Texas Community Development Program for construction of sewer lines to areas presently not served.

Colorado City was only one of nine towns in this district to be funded and Colorado City's grant was \$41,500.

ant was one of the largest.

The grant money will be used to provide sewer services for 155 households and will affect 465 persons.

The money will provide for 15,350 linear feet of six-inch pipe, 28 man holds, 179 service connections and a lift station.

The areas which will benefit from the latest grant will include an area bordered by West

Point to Sherman Street on the east and Austin Street on the west. Another area will be bordered by Erie to Boulder to Division streets. The third area will be bordered by Labelle and Riverside streets.

The completion date is set for Oct. 1, 1985, but Mrs. Tarter said the city plans to seek an extension so the project period can be from Jan. 1, to Dec. 31, 1985.

"The overall asset to the city will be in meeting state regulations and added revenues through water and sewer extensions in these areas," said Mrs. Tarter.

"These projects are progressing right on schedule, and the city is quite fortunate to have these monies available to use to complete these projects," said Mrs. Tarter.

Mitchell SWCD offers various windbreak trees for sale

The Mitchell Soil and Water Conservation District will be selling windbreak trees from now until February 15th according to Jimmy Harrison, chairman of the board of directors.

The types of trees the district will sell will be the Mondell Pine, Native Plum (wild), Cottonwood (cottonless), Russian Olive, Green Ash, Hackberry, Black Walnut, Osage Orange (Bois-d'arc), Arizona Cypress, Austrian Pine and Ponderosa Pine.

Apricot, redbud, lilac and bur oak were added to the list of trees for sale.

The Mondell pine originated in the regions of Southwest Asia. The Mondell pine will reach a height of about 18 feet in five years, and 40 feet in 15 years. This pine can be used for windbreaks as well as for landscaping. The Russian Olive is a fast growing shrub or small tree that is excellent for wildlife. It has a beautiful foliage. It also makes an excellent large hedge.

The native plum is excellent for wildlife and makes excellent preserves and jelly.

Protection from rodents and wind should be planned for the trees. This can be done by using cans, containers, shingles, hail-screens, old tires, etc. Water is essential. A minimum of five to eight gallons per tree each week will be needed the first growing season and about ten gallons the second growing season. An inexpensive "drip" irrigation system is recommended. This can

be made using plastic pipe and emitter tubes.

Payment is due upon placement of the order. Refunds will be made if delivery is not completed. Due to variables in weather conditions and care required by planter, no guarantee of liveability is made.

Due to shortages of some of the trees, orders should be placed as soon as possible.

Forms for ordering trees can

be picked up at the District Office in the G-Kell building or call 728-3473 or write to Mitchell SWCD, P.O. Box 910, Colorado City, Texas 79512 and an order blank will be mailed to you. Soil Conservation personnel assisting the district can also be contacted if additional information is needed. Mitchell SWCD invites persons in Borden and Scurry counties to participate in this program.

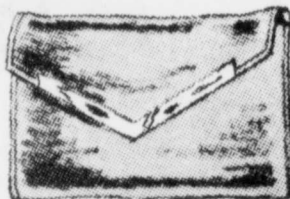

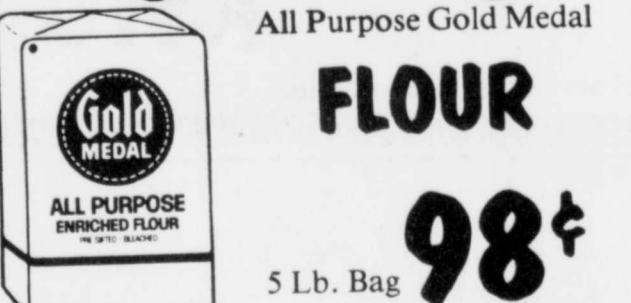

Gregory and Monroe served for one point to make it 13-10, then Lusk served the last two. A dink by Gregory clinched the match.

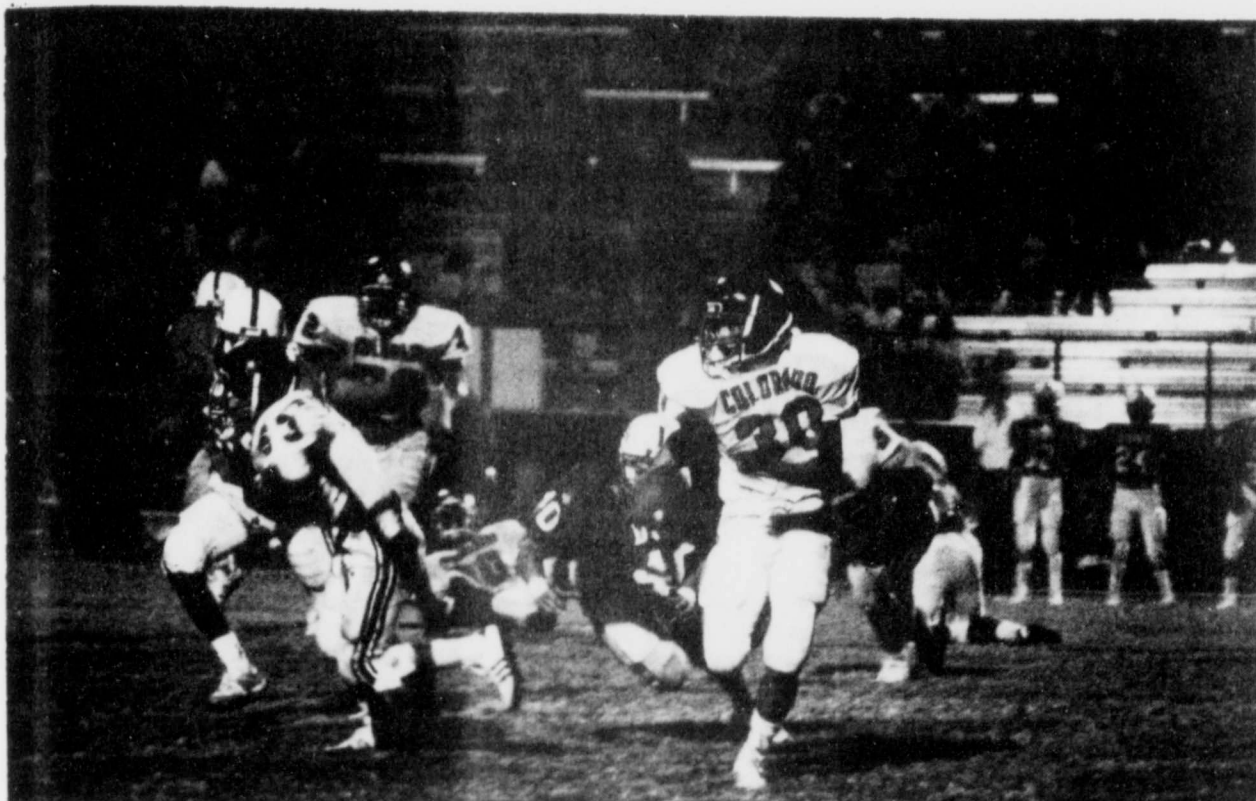
The eighth grade B team forced Sweetwater to three games before losing 13-15, 15-8, 9-15.

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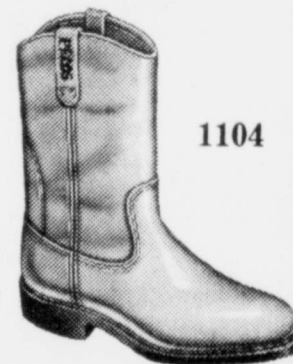
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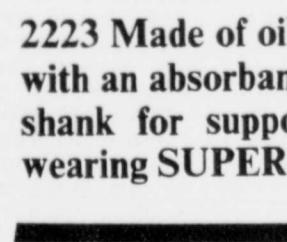
