City Offers Divided Payment Plan On Taxes

HOLD INQUEST IN BOYS DEATH

FOUND DEAD IN ROOM ABOUT MIDNIGHT WEDNESDAY; POST MORTEM HELD THURSDAY

Harry Lind, age 27, of Portland, Ore., was found dead in his room in a private residence in Perryton at midnight Wednesday night. County officers who were summoned asked for an inquest, County Judge Oscar M. Flowers and County Attorney Max Boyer officiating.

A post mortem examination of the body was made Thursday morning by Dr. G. J. Budd, physician for the R. A. Conyes company by whom the deceased was employed.

Lind had been in Perryton for some time acting as superintendent for the R. A. Conyes company who have the contract for the pipe line north of here being put in by the Continental Construction company.

He was taken home early in the evening by a friend, T. R. Harris, after he complained of feeling badly.

Chas. A. Shea, a brother-in-law of Lind's, also of Portland, Ore., was in Perryton, Wednesday, but left for Los Angeles. He was found in Amarillo after the boy's death and returned here.

The body is being prepared by the Wilson Funeral Home and will be returned to Portland for burial. Mr. Shea accompanying the body.

According to the report made by Dr. Budd, the immediate cause of death was a ruptured valve in the heart. The contents of the stomach will be sent in to the state laboratory for analysis.

The deceased is survived by two sisters and two brothers, all of Portland, Ore. They are Mrs. Chas. A. Shea, Mrs. E. J. Jeffrey Jr., Donald H. Lind and Vivian Lind. He was previously employed by the J. H. Shea company, Portland, Ore., one of the largest construction companies on the west coast.

Several hundred invitations will be issued soon to the people of Perryton and vicinity to attend the wedding of Andrew Brown and Madam Queen of radio fame, to be held at the school auditorium on Tuesday night, January 27.

CITY COUNCIL FAILS TO AGREE ON ELECTRIC LIGHT RATE REDUCTION

No action was taken at the regular meeting of the City Council Tuesday night on the new lower electric rate schedule offered by the Texas-Louisiana Power company. Much discussion was heard on the subject but no agreement was reached.

"While the new rate schedule would mean a saving of over \$300 a month to the citizens of Perryton it is not exactly what we want," Mayor C. E. Forbes stated.

"We realize that represents a considerable saving but we are still more anxious to secure a rate that will reduce the bills of the small consumers who use from eight to fourteen kilowatts, whose bills will be slightly higher, under the new schedule."

An effort will be made to work out some revision before the next meeting of the city governing body, Mayor Forbes indicated.

CAGERS TAKE 4 HOME GAMES

RANGERS AND RANGERETTES BOTH WIN FROM FARNSWORTH AND FOLLETT HERE

Four more victories for the Rangers and Rangerettes were hung up during the past week when the local teams defeated boys and girls teams from Follett and Farnsworth.

The Follett games last Thursday evening proved easy ones for the locals, the Rangers winning by a 32 to 7 count while the Rangerettes run up a 47 score while the Follett girls were totaling 17.

The games Wednesday evening with Farnsworth proved stiffer competition, the Rangers requiring an extra three minute period to nose the visiting quintet out by a 21 to 19 score when they were tied at the end of the regular session.

1930 RAINFALL BELOW AVERAGE

TOTAL FOR YEAR IS OVER 7 INCHES BELOW PRECEDING-FIVE YEAR AVERAGE MOISTURE

The calendar year 1930 was one of the lightest rainfall years on record, so states Attorney Jack Allen, custodian of the official government rain gauge for Perryton and Ochiltree county. In the twelve months of 1930, the total precipitation was 16.45 inches of moisture.

This total is over seven inches below the average of 23.8 inches for the five preceding years. Following is a schedule of the fall by months:

An interesting fact gleaned from the above figures shows that a considerable of the years moisture fell in the months of April, May and June, a total of 7.42 falling in these months which are the principal growing months for wheat. This fact accounts for the fair average of wheat in this territory. The average 1930 yield in this immediate vicinity run from twelve to fifteen bushels per acre, some fields, of course, making more while others made less. At the present time there is a fair winter season for wheat in the ground, and it will carry for several weeks without any material damage.

HALF MUST BE PAID BY JANUARY 31; BALANCE PAYABLE JUNE 30

DEFERRED PAYMENT TO BEAR SIX PER CENT INTEREST; TAXES DELINQUENT IF FIRST HALF IS NOT PAID BEFORE FEB. 1

At the regular meeting of the city council held Tuesday night, it was decided to divide city tax payments in two installments, the first due on or before January 31, the deferred payment bearing six per cent interest payable on or before June 30. According to Mayor C. E. Forbes, unless the first half is paid before February 1, the entire amount is delinquent and the ten per cent penalty will be added.

This action was taken in order to help Perryton property owners to meet their taxes without adding the delinquent charges. An interest charge of six per cent on the balance was necessary as it is thought that the city will have to borrow money to meet the necessary expenditures until the balance of the tax revenue is received.

It is also thought that this action by the city council will help in the collection of county and state and the Perryton Independent School district taxes, as it will enable property owners to pay their other taxes should they take care of their city taxes on the two payment plan.

SCHOOL BUILDING GIVES WORK

BUILDING OF NEEDED SCHOOL ROOM IN PERRYTON WOULD PROVIDE LABOR FOR MANY WORKMEN

As will be noted by the following dispatch from the nation's capital, hundreds of school houses and other public buildings are being constructed all over the country, thus helping to provide work for many men. What's the matter with Perryton doing the same? At the present we have many idle men, and more will be out of work when the booster station is completed. Perryton needs additional school room. The basements of two churches are being used and at least a hundred pupils are crowded into the main school buildings.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—Municipal projects on which work is under way already or will be started before the end of January include the following: Col. Arthur Woods announced today:

In the northeastern districts, including the New England states, New York, New Jersey, Delaware and Maryland: Schools: Arlington, Mass., addition to high school, \$277,000; Ayer, Mass., six-year high school, \$100,000; Bierica, Mass., additions to high school, \$196,000; Somerville, Mass., additions and alterations to high school, \$388,382; Cranston, R. I., primary school, \$150,000; Pawtucket, R. I., junior high school, \$600,000; Middletown, Conn., schools, \$500,000; Meriden, Conn., trade school, \$160,000; New Rochelle, N. Y., additions to senior high school, \$400,000; Syracuse, N. Y., additions to high school, \$260,681, and grade school, \$353,293; Summit, N. J., two elementary schools, \$285,000; Jersey City, N. J., school for crippled children, \$410,000, and Ridgewood, N. J., additions to high school, \$500,000. Other projects: Pawtucket, R. I., hospital, \$110,000; Needham, Mass., fire and police station, \$100,000; Easthampton, N. Y., civic center, \$125,000.

From the central western district, comprising Ohio, West Virginia, Kentucky, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, Iowa, Minnesota and Wisconsin, the following projects are among those reported: Schools—Gary, Ind., grade and high school \$500,000; South Bend, Ind., schools, \$800,000; Jeffersonville, Ind., school additions, \$107,000; Hammond, Ind., schools, \$450,000; Hamtramck, Mich., junior high school, \$900,000; Winona, Minn., new ward schools, \$150,000; Burlington, Ia., junior high school, \$250,000. Other projects—Ottumwa, Ia., hydroelectric plant, dam and power house, \$775,000; Albert Lea, Minn., gymnasium and heating plant, \$150,000; Sterling, Ill., municipal building \$125,000; Milwaukee, Wis., court house, \$7,000,000.

DR. E. F. LANHAM, AMARILLO HERE JANUARY 19TH; OVER 300 HEAD SIGNED UP

Over three hundred head of dairycows in the vicinity of Perryton have been signed up for the tuberculosis test, according to County Agent G. R. Sheets, and the test will be made by Dr. E. F. Lanham, Amarillo veterinary on January 19.

Dr. Lanham is approved and recommended by the State Livestock Sanitary commission. Ft. Worth for this work. In addition to testing the cows, Dr. Lanham will address a meeting of dairymen at the courthouse at 7:30 o'clock on Monday evening. Everyone interested is invited to attend.

According to County Agent Sheets dairymen who are interested in having their herds tested can still come in on the group test anytime before the date of Dr. Lanham's arrival. He invites dairymen to come in and talk to him about having their herds tested.

Seasonable Hints

The crisp, invigorating days of autumn somehow inspire one with renewed courage and faith in the things about us. The appetite becomes keener, the breathing deeper; the morning walk in the open drives away the fatigue of mid-summer. The machinery of digestion takes on a new hum; in short, we "feel better all over."

The rural housewife finds much for her capable hands to do. Think of the canning of pears, the preserving of late plums, the pickling, canning, catsupping of the luscious fall tomato! Such substantial for the winter-day dining table! How we anticipate, as we carry out autumn details!

I am in direct touch with the National Canners Association of America, and with great benefit to myself as an advisor to the public in the interests of more and better health. I find the great canning industry striving, with every improved facility known, to give our people the best in sealed provisions, employing the most skilled scientists in laboratory tests, in order to provide nutriment of unparalleled flavor and purity for our people. The winter fruit-can holds the juices, vitamins, proteins, so acceptable to right living. Our canned products reach outward to the four corners of the earth.

In time, the housewife will escape the exacting duties of canning fruits; they can be put up fresh by the great and expert technicians, cheaper, more convenient to handle, and can be obtained ready to use with little outlay, compared with the drudgery of home canning.

We are well past the age when copper was used to color the glass jar of commercial pickles. Poisons are no longer used as bleaches or preservatives. The tin can is used where such employment is scientifically appropriate. I hear of little or no illness caused by the impure canning of fruits and vegetables. The summer, with its host of invaders of the partially-eaten canned food is gone. The "culture season" is over. But I am horribly afraid of the partly-used, hot-weather can of pigs' knuckles and other potted meats!

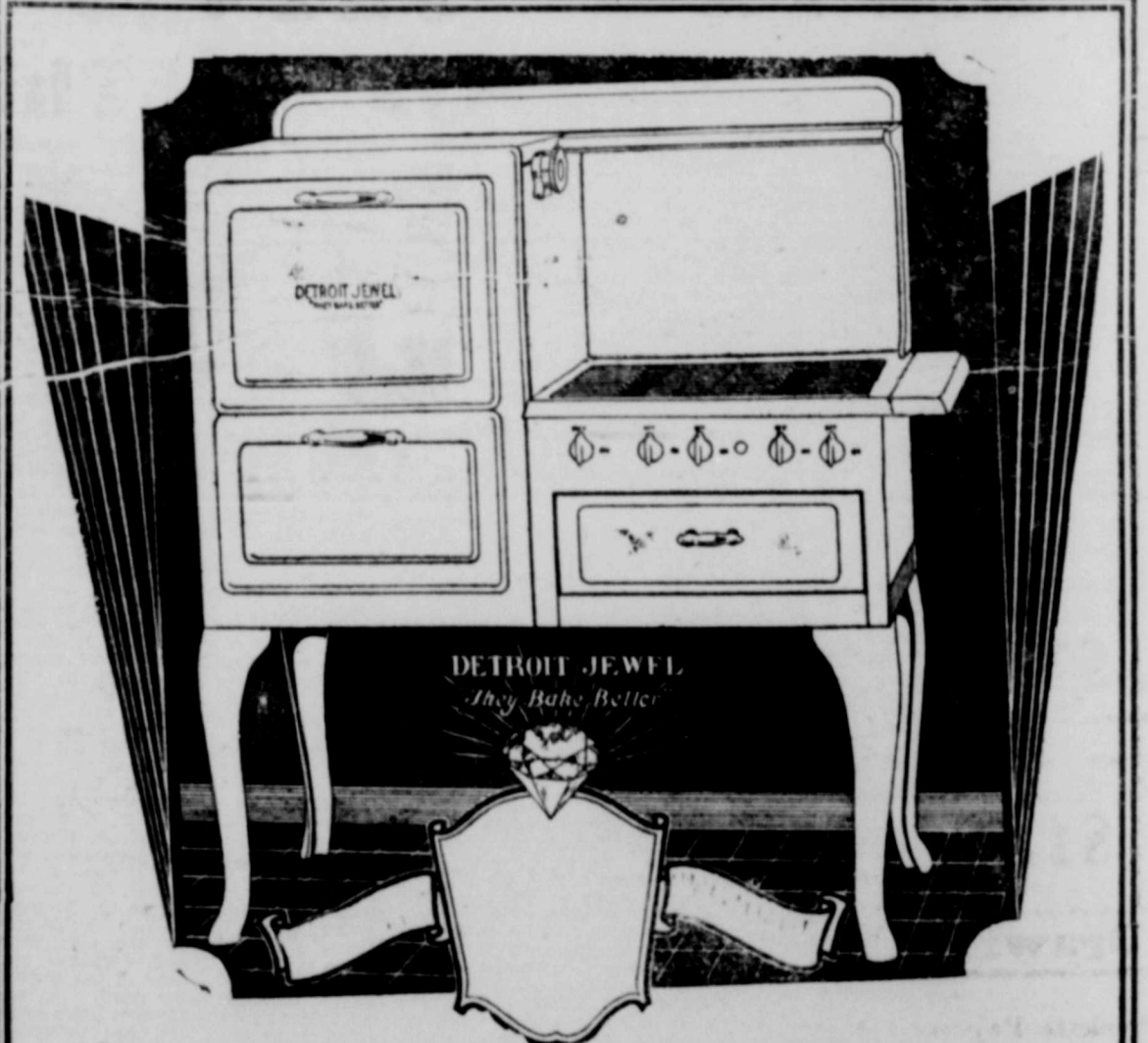

HOME-GROWN FOODS CUT HEALTH-PROTECTION COST

"A good cow or milk goat is one of the best investments a family can make to insure a satisfactory food supply," says the subcommittee on nutrition information, directed by the National Drought Relief Committee. "Milk contains the greatest assortment of nutrients of any single food material, and is the foundation upon which an adequate diet can most safely and easily be built. It is particularly important for its proteins of good quality, for calcium, for vitamin A, and for the pellagra-preventing factor."

"Every member of the family should have potatoes," according to these nutrition specialists, "tomatoes, raw cabbage or other vegetables of green or yellow color." The home garden can be depended upon for all these foods. Some of them can be stored throughout the winter, others canned.

The poultry flock is always mentioned in the "live-at-home" programs of home demonstration agents in the cooperative extension service of the United States Department of Agriculture and the land-grant colleges. As a source of eggs and meat in the diet poultry contributes to the food supply. In some parts of the South, the drought has played havoc with crops and has greatly depleted live stock, so that there is a shortage of home-grown products and also of ready cash. The committee on nutrition information nevertheless emphasizes the importance of continuing to try to maintain gardens, poultry, and one or more cows, wherever it is possible. Otherwise there is danger that many families will try to get along on too one-sided a diet, with pellagra and other physical disorders as a result.

If vegetables and fruit can not be grown, some of the food money should be spent for them. Canned milk and milk powder may be used in localities where it is difficult to secure good fresh milk, and where ice is not obtainable. Skim milk has value. If it is the only kind of milk used, it should be supplemented, if possible, by 1 or 2 ounces of cod liver oil per person per week.

AGRICULTURE INVESTS

The Federal Government and State agricultural experiment stations spend close to \$30,000,000 a year to learn how to control production, reduce loss and increase the profits of the \$60,000,000,000 agricultural industry. This is only three-tenths of 1 per cent of the annual turnover of \$10,000,000,000, a somewhat smaller proportion than the \$200,000,000 which other industries invest in research.

This investment in research, according to Dr. A. F. Woods, director of scientific work of the United States Department of Agriculture, has made American agriculture, with all its shortcomings, the best in the world. Not only has it placed the business of agriculture on a sounder basis than it otherwise would be, but it has also brought about a conservation of the nation's wealth of forest and animal life. Other industries have found their research expenditures a good investment in progress, Doctor Woods says.

NATION'S "ROOF" NEEDS TO BE RESHINGLED

Reshingling the "roof of the Nation," by reforesting the barren portions of mountain slopes is suggested by Assistant Forester L. F. Kneipp of the Forest Service, United States Department of Agriculture.

The Nation's roof, says Mr. Kneipp, like that of a house, needs constructive attention to keep it from "leaking" by allowing too rapid run-off of water, and to keep the Nation's rain barrel filled in dry periods. Some progress has been made with reforestation in the national forests, he says, and watershed values are being conserved by regulated grazing and organized fire protection. Systematic protection is bringing young growth back naturally on many denuded slopes, although planting operations will be necessary on some areas. On national forest ranges, protection from overgrazing is permitting forage plants to reseed and more grasses and weeds are springing up to hold the soil, checking sheet and gully erosion.

The United States Forest Service, says Mr. Kneipp, has demonstrated the feasibility of "reshingling" on national forest watersheds. But acute needs are found on many private and public domain lands outside the national forest boundaries for restoring vegetative cover to the "Nation's roof," to help conserve and regulate water supplies.

DROUGHT CUTS 1930 CROP

The value of crops produced in the United States in 1930 was \$2,400,000 below the value of the crops produced in 1929, according to the United States Department of Agriculture. The 1930 crop on December 1 was estimated to be worth \$6,274,824,900. The decline in value from the previous year was caused chiefly by the widespread decline in prices but was accentuated by the decrease in production that resulted from the drought.

INSECTS, NOT ALL PESTS, OFTEN BENEFIT MANKIND

To the mind of the layman insects are enemies to be fought at every opportunity—enemies which, if not repulsed, will drive man from the earth. Yet there are many insects aside from the honeybee and the silkworm which have lent their efforts to man's gains, says the United States Department of Agriculture.

Among the insects contributing useful products to man should be mentioned a group known as lac insects, which secrete a wax used in the manufacture of shellac, and the cochineal insect, which produces the cochineal from which rich scarlet dyes were formerly made. Development of the aniline dye industry has crowded the cochineal dye manufacture into the background.

In Hawaii the Lantana bug is counted a friend of man as a destroyer of weeds. New Zealand and Australia, overrun with cactus to such an extent that it is considered a serious impediment to agriculture have called on their entomologists to muster armies of many kinds of insects, chiefly a mealy bug, relative of the mealy bug pest known to Americans, to destroy the cactus. The blackberry, another troublesome weed in New Zealand, is to be fought similarly by insects.

A blister beetle, *Cantharis vesicatoria*, is dried and ground into a powder, known as Spanish fly, and used by the medical profession as an irritant to produce blood blisters and stimulate blood circulation near the skin.

As parasites of serious insect pests, some insects have proved fully worth their weight in gold. Several county horticultural departments in California have been breeding some such parasites and distributing them to attack pests on the English walnut and citrus trees. Ladybird beetles long have been identified as effective enemies of various kind of plant lice. The Federal Bureau of Entomology has propagated and distributed natural enemies of the Japanese beetle, the European corn borer, the gipsy moth, the brown-tail moth, and other pests. Some parasitic wasps are

able to force their ovipositors into the burrows of wood-boring insects or even through the wood to attack these borers.

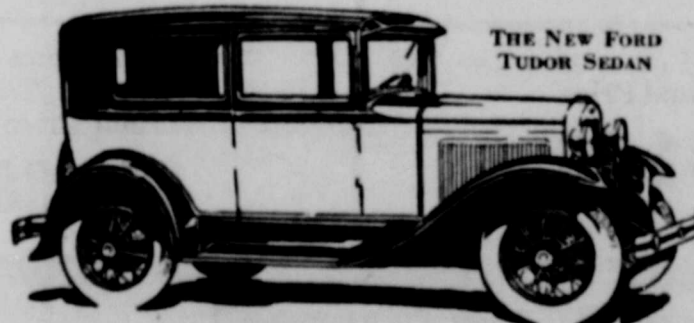

Confident your people will not fail to meet their share in this humanitarian need but because of general conditions desire to impress you necessity most vigorous possible campaign. Our efforts will be regarded as test of Red Cross by president and entire nation and we must not fail. Your chapter quota \$100. Report action taken."

Announcement was made at the Wednesday meeting of the Lions Club and several made subscriptions at that time.
