BRITISH DOWN 31 PLANES IN LAST 2 DAYS

The British defenses shot down seven more Nazi bombers over Britain today, making a total of 31 for the two days.

There were indications that casualties and damage from the German raids were mounting. Big Italian bombers were also reported searching the Mediterranean area for British forces.

The Germans claimed that they had sunk five British merchant ships in the English channel yesterday, bringing the total tonnage loss of the war to 4,330,000 tons, which Britain said is "more than four times" higher than the actual losses sustained.

Several persons were killed in Scotland by bombs today, and there were growing indications that the axis powers are intensifying their efforts to crush England.

Prime Minister Churchill's secretary denounced as "rubbish" a German report that Churchill had been wounded in an air raid yesterday.

Bankers Shaping Meeting Agenda

NEW YORK.—Plans have been completed for the 66th annual convention of the American Bankers Association, opening at Atlantic City, N. J., on Sept. 23, at which Sen. Carter Glass of Virginia will be honored "for his service to American banking."

Robert M. Hanes of Winston-Salem, N. C., president of the ABA announced arrangements to pay tribute to the Virginia Democrat at the convention's closing general session on Sept. 26.

Plans for round-table discussions as well as the series of general sessions call for emphasis on "the enlarged services of the ABA as well as its expanded educational features," Hanes said.

Gov. Clyde R. Hoey of North Carolina will address the first general session of the convention on Wednesday, Sept. 25. Other speakers at this meeting will include Hanes and E. S. Wooley, vice president of the Louisville, Ky., Trust Co.

The four general divisions of the association will hold their annual meetings the first day, Monday, Sept. 23. All of the following afternoons will be devoted to round-table conferences and panel discussions.

Subjects for discussion at these meetings include problems of "How to Survey Your Trade Area," "The Influence and Value of Bank Staff Contacts," "Liquidity and Marketability of Loans Made to Farmers."

The 40th anniversary of the American Institute of Banking will be observed at the first general session on Wednesday, Sept. 25. William A. Irwin will be installed as national educational director of the institute by the retiring president of the AIB, Harry R. Smith.

Newly-elected officers of the ABA will be installed at inaugural ceremonies Thursday night, Sept. 26.

College Composer Fast Earning Fame

DENTON, Tex.—Peter Gates, young North Texas Teachers College composer, may be the next from Denton's two state colleges to hang his hat on the peg of national fame.

Gates' own song, "Same Old Dream," was selected as the best of several thousand submitted in a national contest judged by orchestra leader Isham Jones. The teachers college student, a junior, recently appeared with Eddie Cantor, along with his sister, Nancy Jane Gates.

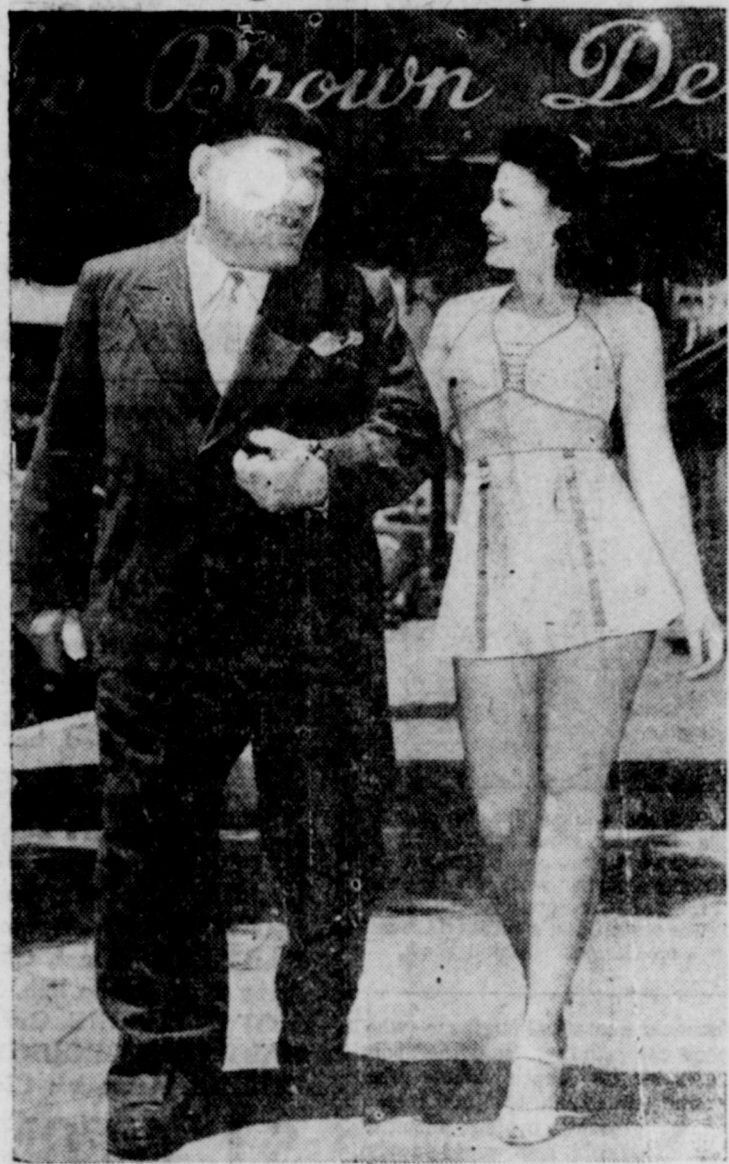
The brother and sister are children of Mr. and Mrs. Virgil Gates of Denton.

COUNTY SHOWS SLIGHT POPULATION DECLINE; FARMS ARE INCREASED

With the three major cities in Eastland County, Eastland, Ranger and Cisco, showing a total population decline of nearly 3500 during the past 10 years, the county as a whole showed a decline of only 3,784, according to census figures and showed an increase of 355 farms put into cultivation during that period.

The increase in the number of farms was the largest in the Abilene district, with most counties showing a decline in farms. Taylor county showed the largest increase in population, 3,170, but had the second largest decrease in number of farms in cultivation, 605. Jones county led in the farm decrease, with 631 farms being taken out of production.

Counties which showed an increase in population, of the 12 reported from the Abilene office, include Comanche, 814; Palo

Pinto, 841 and Taylor 3,170. Decreases were shown, with the amount of decline, as follows: Callahan, 1,234; Eastland, 3,743; Erath, 36; Fisher, 738; Hamilton, 206; Jones, 705; Nolan, 1,971; Shackelford, 461 and Stephens 4,225.

Totals for the 12 counties for 1940 show Callahan 11,555; Comanche, 19,244; Eastland 30,405; Erath, 20,768; Fisher, 12,825; Hamilton, 13,317; Jones, 23,528; Nolan, 17,351; Palo Pinto 18,417; Shackelford, 6,234; Stephens 12,335 and Taylor, 44,195.

Number of farms in each county in 1940 was listed as Callahan, 1,441; Comanche, 2,942; Eastland, 2,345; Erath, 2,801; Fisher, 1,483; Hamilton, 1,889; Jones, 2,173; Nolan, 954 Palo Pinto, 1,338; Shackelford, 810; Stephens, 810 and Taylor 1,885.

Twice Burned— At Least Once Shy

During and after the World War, the United States sent a vast volume of goods to Europe. It got nothing in return.

What happened was that great sums of money were lent. Our goods were bought with the money. When the time came to pay back, Europe had no money to pay, and no goods which the United States wanted.

Whatever part of our production was sent to Europe during and after the World War turned out to have been really a gift to Europe, whatever we expected at the time.

So, thought the United States, we will be smarter next time. Investment in Europe since the World War prevailing took the form of the building of American plants there to produce goods on the spot within the economies of the various countries where the enterprises were set up.

Now that has gone the same way. The German Nazis having overrun country after country, American losses in those countries will reach \$500,000,000, the Department of Commerce estimates.

The attitude which will be taken by the German government in its conquered territories is well forecast by what happened in Germany itself. American plants there during recent years simply failed to yield any return to American owners because the Nazi system of exchange control permits almost no money to be paid out to foreigners. In a sense, the building of such plants was simply a gift to Germany.

Such, it is reasonable to expect, will be the fate of American enterprises in Belgium, Denmark, Holland and France, Poland, Czechoslovakia, and Austria.

Since scarcely anybody would advocate sending an expeditionary force to recapture the General Motors plant in Germany or the Standard Oil refinery in Holland, the United States is now squarely up against the question, can anything be done at all?

Probably not, though a study is now being made of foreign assets in the United States owned by nationals of the countries which have confiscated our own. Possibly a little confiscating might be done here in partial compensation.

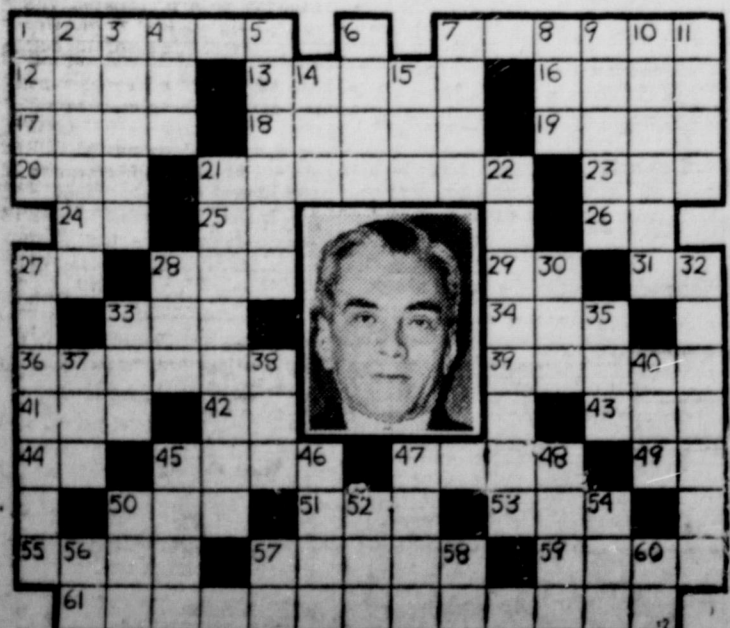

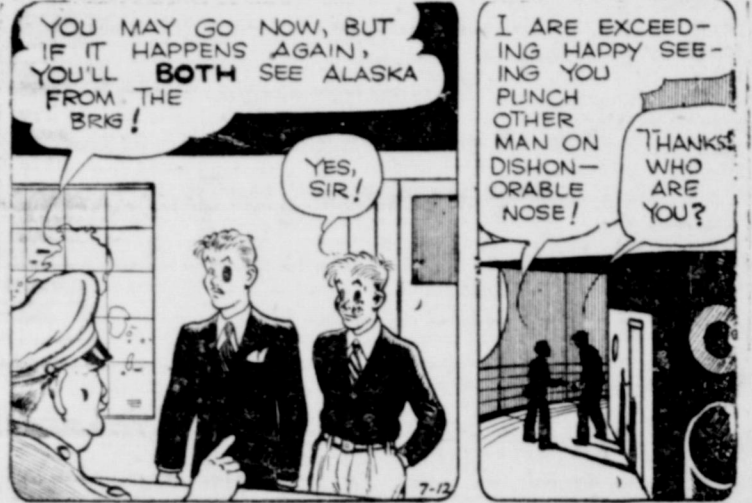

Women's Program At Convention Has Been Formed

WASHINGTON, D. C.—What 500 women delegates and alternates to the Democratic National Convention, in Chicago, will do, see, hear, and to some extent say, is told in the July Democratic Digest, just issued here. In a lead article, the nationally circulated monthly publication of the Democratic Committee describes women's activities for the quadrennial convention, which opens at noon on July 15, in the Chicago Stadium.

Never in their 20 years of suffrage have women faced more serious political responsibility than the 1940 elections impose on them, says the Democratic Digest. Mrs. Thomas F. McAllister, the Director of the Women's Division of the Democratic National Committee, is quoted as saying:

"The 1940 National Convention, in Chicago, comes at a time of world crisis. Our responsibility is grave. Our job is to help nominate the right candidates and to help formulate a platform which meets the challenge to democracy at a time when democracy is threatened."

On the basis of still incomplete reports from state conventions, it appears that there will be more than twice as many women at the Democratic Convention as there were at the Republican gathering, in Philadelphia, where there were 78 Republican women delegates out of an approximate total of 300 women accredited to the Convention.

In some states, including Florida and Utah, 50 per cent of the Democratic delegates selected are women.

Utah women, in their determination to get a 50 per cent representation at the convention, over-reached their quota and actually elected 9 women out of a total of 16 delegates.

Fifty per cent of Michigan's delegates-at-large are women.

North Carolina has 14 women in its delegation as opposed to 6 in 1936.

Idaho, which sent 6 women delegates in 1936, is sending 12 to the Chicago Convention.

Nine Wyoming women are going to Chicago as accredited delegates. There were only four at the 1936 gathering.

Probably the largest feminine delegate contingent will come from Missouri, which is sending 32 women out of the total delegation of 84.

On the basis of state increases in the number of women delegates, leaders of the Democratic women are hoping for 50-50 representation on the powerful Resolutions Committee which decides the party's presidential platform. Their expectations are based on a resolution introduced at the February meeting of the National Committee, which provided that: "This Committee recommend to the next Democratic National Convention the consideration of the resolution there to be introduced providing that each state, district and territory shall name two members to serve on the Committee on Platform and Resolutions and that the members so designated by each state, district and territory shall be of opposite sex." From this official dictum the women have evolved the slogan "50-50 representation," which means they want as many women as men delegates on the Resolutions Committee.
