NOT MANY YEARS AGO, it was considered "taboo" to campaign against your opponent in a political race in a mud-slinging type of manner.

Most of the time, voters were "turned off" from this type of campaigning, and it would most likely backfire. Campaigns were run purely on the record of the accomplishments of the candidate himself, and the opponent was basically ignored.

How times have changed!

Practically without exception, the current campaigns have been nothing but an exercise in dissecting the candidate's opponent. What the candidate's opponent had done or had not done filled up the majority of the speeches, the advertising space or commercial time on radio or television.

Yours truly heard a longtime national commentator on the political scene say that he thought that the current campaign had been the worst from this standpoint that he had ever seen, and he also was voicing the hope that candidates would "turn the corner" and go back to a more positive type of campaign.

There has been such negative campaigning, that in some of the races which were held this week, you never heard a positive statement advanced on behalf of either candidate in a race.

As a voter, I found myself scanning the ballot and wishing that just once, a particular candidate or their supporters had come out with a statement on their own qualifications or background, so we could make a more intelligent decision on their race.

I think most voters are like myself, in that they would rather judge a candidate on his or her own merits, rather than having only heard all the bad information their opponent had been able to dredge up during the course of the campaign.

The worst part about negative campaigns such as witnessed in the 1982 election is the fact that voters get the idea that in reality they are having to make the choice between the lesser of two evils, rather than choosing a candidate on the basis of his superior qualities.

This gives you the idea that the person you are electing to serve in a particular office is inferior to begin with, and that he should most likely be replaced at the earliest possible time.

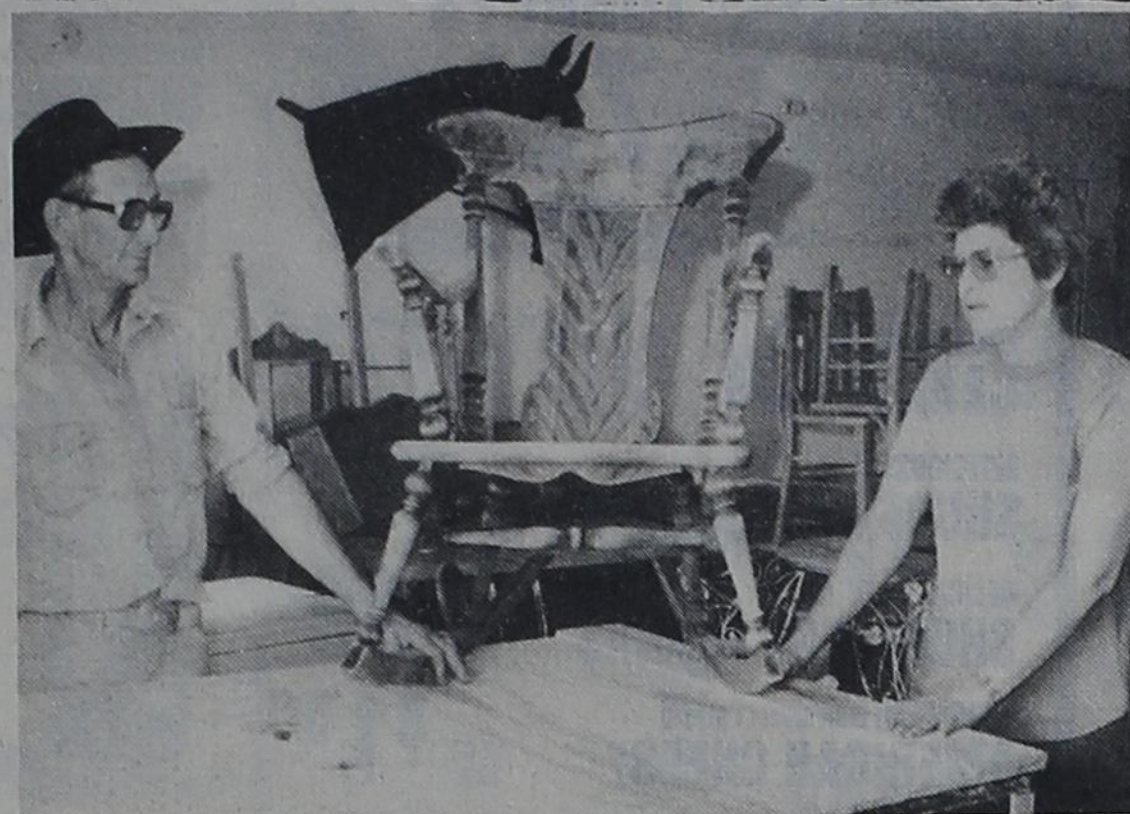
The voters are "saddled" with the candidates who run for office in the various parties, and many times have little control over who gets on the ballot for a particular race.

So you can understand voters' frustrations when all they hear about a particular candidate (or every one of them) is what a crook and a scoundrel he is, how inept he has been in his previous position, how much money he voted to spend on such-and-such, how much money he spent on the campaign, that he was arrested for speeding in 1955 in a Houston suburb, was once seen attending a "rock" concert, drives a foreign car, and at one time ran the bingo booth at his hometown celebration.

Thank goodness we are to be spared this type of abuse on the media for the immediate future. Now we can go back to the old regular ads and commercials, such as how to cure dandruff, acne, grey hair, being overweight, etc.

Come to think of it, this sounds sort of familiar. Reckon those political commercials were written by the same folks who try to attack our personal ills?

Local Couple Enjoys Furniture Re-finishing

Pete and Ruby Davies have begun a new business in Bovina that literally turns old things into new.

Mr. and Mrs. Davies are restoring and repairing furniture in a shop converted from an old garage. They also do upholstery work, and are antique dealers.

The Bovina couple got the idea for furniture refinishing a little over a year ago, when Ruby had a cabinet she asked Pete to strip for her.

Pete got some literature on how to go about it, one thing led to another, and now they have a complete shop. There are three tanks of chemicals in the shop. One takes off the finish from wood items. Another removes varnish, and a third brings back the wood's natural tones.

The tanks are three feet wide, eight

feet long and 30 inches deep, and are kept filled with chemicals to within four inches of the top. In one tank, the temperature of the chemicals has to be at least 100 degrees to function properly.

Davies says that oak is the most popular wood for antiques. After redoing several objects of their own, Mr. and Mrs. Davies decided to do work for customers.

The Davies shop works on such items as tables, chairs, cabinets, and at the present time has an old pedal sewing machine cabinet. Also in the shop is an old round oak table and six chairs. Several items which they have refinished are over 100 years old.

"We'll do any type of furniture repair or refinishing of upholstery work," Davies says.

Williams Wins County Commissioner's Position

Tommy Williams was elected County Commissioner for Precinct 2 in Tuesday's General Election, with a runaway victory over Republican challenger Dale Hart.

Williams, who had outpolled incumbent Jack Patterson in a narrow win in the Democratic Primary last May, had it much easier this time.

The final tally was Williams, 510 votes, to 175 for Hart. Williams had 89.6 per cent of the votes cast in the Bovina box, 354, to Hart's 41. He held a six-vote margin at Rhea, 28-22.

Hart's only polling precinct win was in his home box of Friona, where he picked up 102 votes to 93 for Williams. Williams also won the absentee box, 35-10.

Bovina election judge Jay Sherrill called the 413 voters a good turnout.

In other races, Bovina voters went for Jim Collins with 212 votes to 184 for Lloyd Bentsen; for Kent Hance, 319 to 51 for E.L. Hicks; and for Bill Clements, 216 to 178 for Mark White.

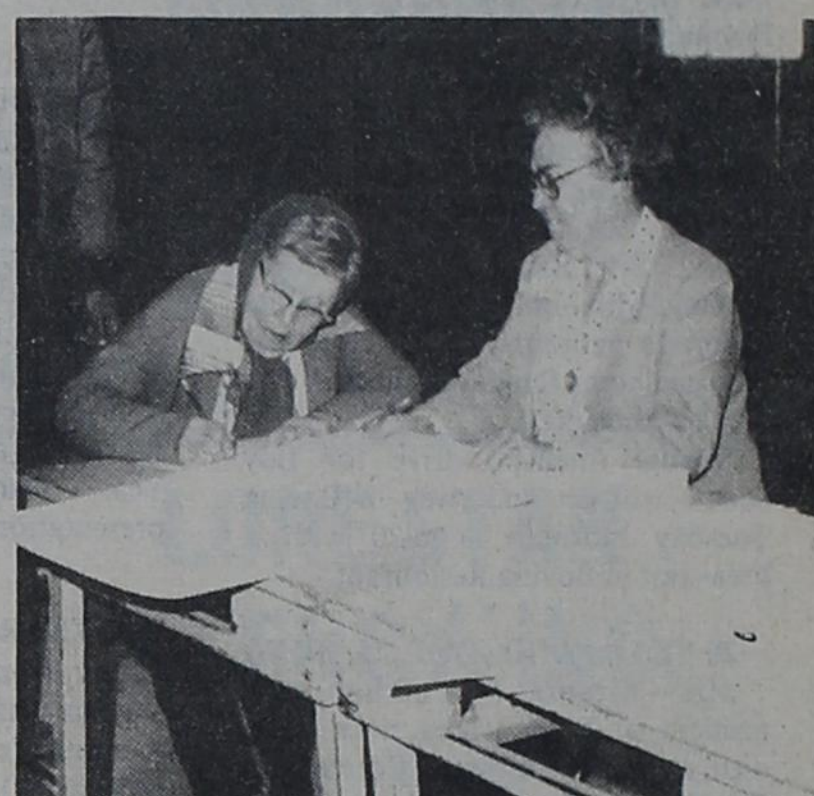
Bill Hobby had 219 to 163 for George Strake in the lieutenant governor's race. Jim Mattox polled 247 votes to 111 for Bill Meir for attorney general; Bob Bullock had 228 votes to 143 for Mike Richards for comptroller; Ann Richards received 246 to 122 for Allen Clark for state treasurer.

Garry Mauro received 222 votes to 117 for Woody Glasscock for land commissioner; Jim Hightower gained 261 votes to 116 for Fred Thornberry for agriculture commissioner; Jim Nugent had 240 to 109 for John Henderson for railroad commissioner, and Ted Robertson edged John Bates for supreme court justice, 209-121.

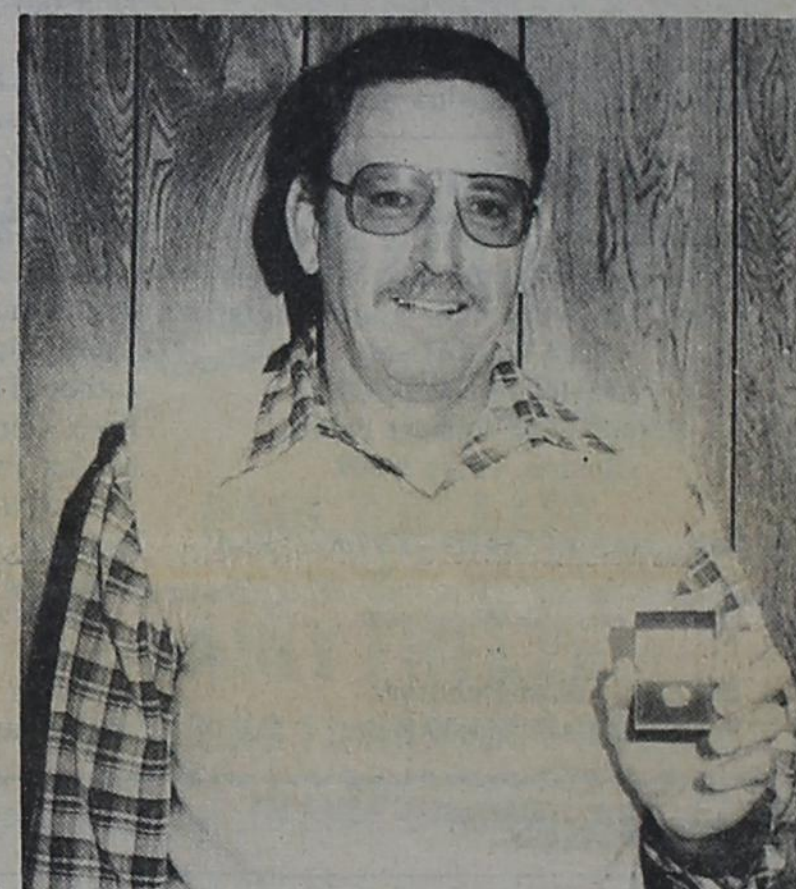
In amendment voting, Bovina voters favored five of the six proposals. They okayed number one (repealing state property tax), 194-227; number two (raising ceiling, dependent children assistance), 163-155; and number three (exempting ag implements), 213-114.

Proposition number four (provide terms for certain boards) passed, 210-109; number five (abolish offices downstate counties), passed, 138-117. Only number six (increasing maximum interest rate for general obligation bonds) failed, 158-138.

'cellar,'" says Mustang mentor Larry Helton.

Helton said he was extremely proud of the play of the seniors on the 1982 team, who had provided excellent leadership. "My heart aches for them because they won't be going into the playoffs. Just a matter of five or six plays in a pair of games made the difference in going and not going," Helton said.

Helton said he hoped the team could "have a good time" in their final game, and play with a relaxed attitude, since there's not that much at stake.

"I know one thing. I'm proud of these kids. They've done everything I've asked of them, and there's not a quitter in the bunch."

Hearing Is Held For Farm Road

Twenty people attended a public meeting conducted by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation on October 26, 1982, at 2 p.m. in the County Courthouse, Farwell, Texas. This meeting was held to discuss the construction of FM 3333 from U.S. 60, 5.0 miles northeast of Farwell to FM 1731 in Parmer County.

County Judge Porter Roberts opened the meeting and Lloyd Lust, Engineer from Littlefield State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, gave a presentation of information concerning the design of the project. He explained that drainage would be handled with culverts.

Gary Bernethy, Right of Way Engineer from Lubbock, SDH & PT, explained the State's Relocation Assistance Program and right of way acquisition. Right of way will be 100 feet on the project.

Dalton Jones, District Design Engineer, SDH & PT from Lubbock, helped to explain the design and procedures and requirements for getting started on the project.

It is estimated that easements for utility lines will be completed by January 1, 1983, and the project will be ready to be let to a contract by March 1, 1983.

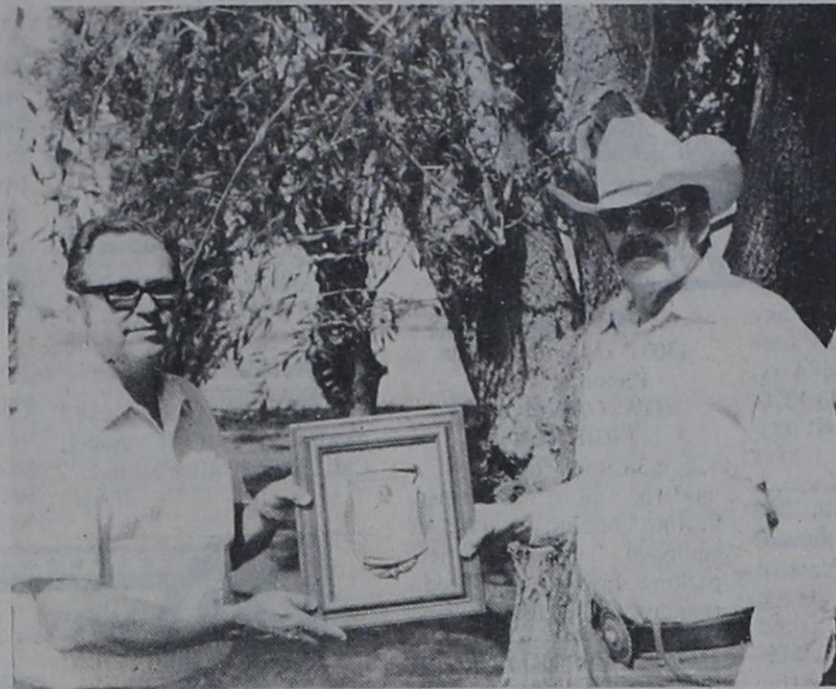
As one of five individuals serving on the district board of directors, Christian will be responsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas soil conservation district law.

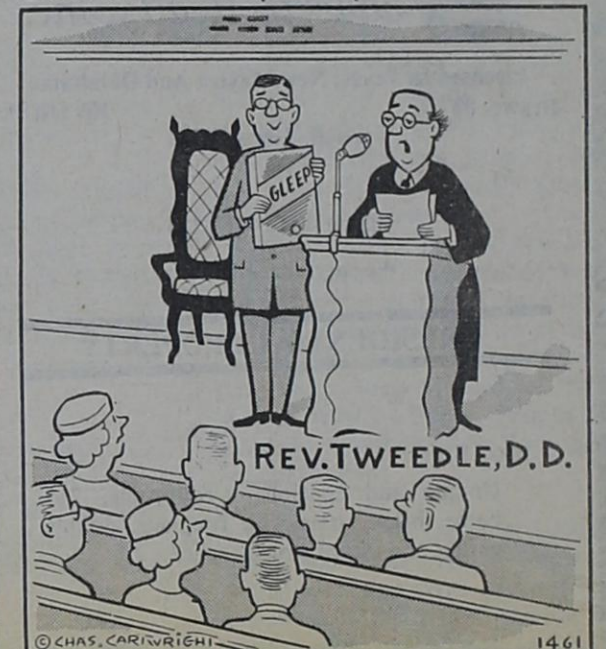

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Big First Half Pushes Olton Past Mustangs, 14-7

It was the story of Bovina's 1982 football life when the Ponies met Olton here in a vital District 3-AA game last Friday. The opponent dominated the first half, and Bovina came back for a great second half effort.

Unfortunately for the Mustangs, however, Bovina could not overcome Olton's great beginning, or could not capitalize on their scoring chances, and suffered a 14-7 defeat, which knocked the team out of the playoff picture.

Olton took the lead in the first quarter, after a pass interception gave the Mustangs the ball in good field position. Edward Wright ran 11 yards

for the touchdown. However, Terry Glasscock blocked the PAT kick, and the score stood 6-0.

After an exchange of possessions, in which neither team could move the ball, Olton punted Bovina into a hole deep in their own territory. A couple of plays lost yardage, and on third down, Gilbreath was blitzed and tackled in the end zone by Olton's Martin Diaz, and the Mustang lead became 8-0.

That turned out to be the halftime score, as Bovina just never could get its offense untracked in the first half of play.

In the third quarter, Olton again took advantage of good field position

and scored again on a five-yard run by Wright. Jay Judd blocked the PAT kick, but Bovina was called for "roughing the holder." Trying a run, the Olton ball-carrier was stopped short, and the score was 14-0.

Late in the third quarter, Bovina finally got its sputtering offense to moving, and helped by some timely penalties against Olton, put together a scoring drive.

During the drive, runningback Joe Black was hit late out of bounds and a flag was thrown. An Olton coach made a remark, and another flag was thrown. The coach kept talking, and the official kept throwing flags. During the process, Bovina moved from the Olton 35 to the 10.

After a pair of running plays failed to gain, Gilbreath spotted Jon Riddle in the end zone and drilled a pass which Riddle made a nice catch on for the touchdown. Jose Gomez kicked the point for a 14-7 score. (Actually, he had to kick it twice, after a penalty on the first one).

The Mustangs still had time to come from behind, but some uncanny defensive play by Olton hurt Bovina's comeback effort. Two interceptions by an Olton defensive back, one a super, one-handed effort, spelled doom for Bovina's other scoring threats, and allowed Olton to hold on for the win.

"I thought Gilbreath executed well. He and Riddle provided clutch leadership. Dale had a couple of interceptions he should not have had—when he was rushed, or throwing off the wrong foot. They just outplayed us in the first half, but we came back and shut them down in the second half. I was proud of that," said Bovina Coach Larry Helton.

Helton credited Terry Glasscock, Jose Gomez, Danny Silva and Martin Contreras for outstanding defensive play, having double-figure tackles.

A late drive by Olton, when Bovina was out of time outs, allowed the visitors to control the ball, and add to their statistical lead. Bovina's 93 net yards rushing was well below its season average, which ranks in the area standings:

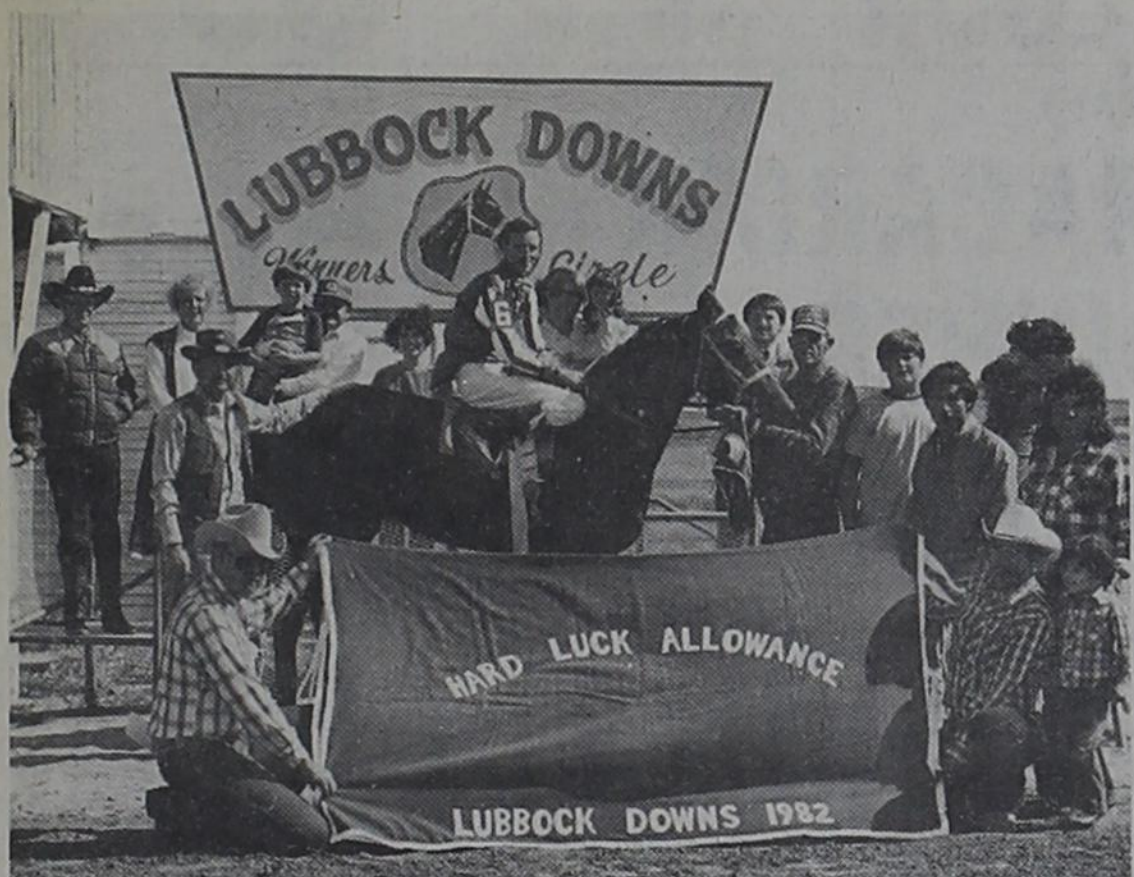
