Playhouse tryouts set

"The Member of the Wedding," a play by Carson McCullers, is a winner of both the New York Drama Critics and Donaldson awards.

The three-act play takes place in a small southern town in August of 1945.

Adapted from Carson McCullers' own novel of the same name, "The Member of the Family" played two years in New York and has been revived many times elsewhere and was the basis of the celebrated Stanley Kramer film.

In the role of Berenice Sadie Brown, the black cook who mothers the motherless Frankie Addams, the author has created a figure of classic scale. Equally memorable is the character of Frankie, a 12-year-old tall, lanky youngster.

Other characters in the play include John Henry West, a seven-year-old boy; Jarvis, a young man in the service; Janice, fiancée to Jarvis; Mr. Addams, Frankie's father who is a watch repairman; Mrs. West, John Henry's mother; Sis Laura, an older black woman; T. T. Williams, a pompous looking black man of about 50, dresses like a church deacon; Honey Camden Brown, a slender, limber black man of about 20; Barney MacKean, a boy of 12 and Helen Fletcher, a girl of 12 or 14.

CHS student invited on concert tour

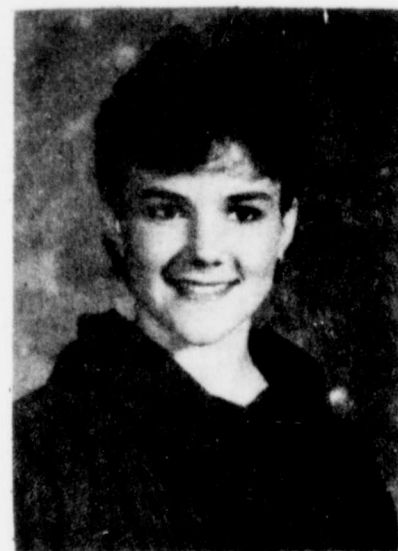

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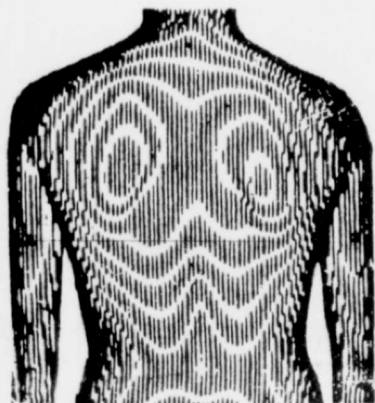
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Obituaries

The next meeting is scheduled March 12 in the home of Bea Harlow.

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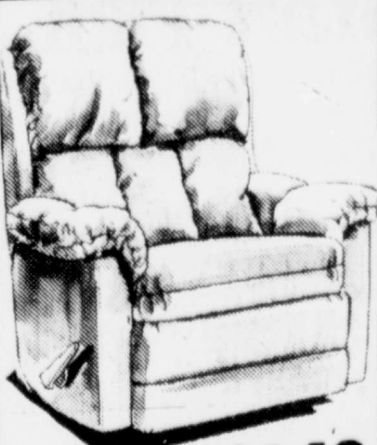
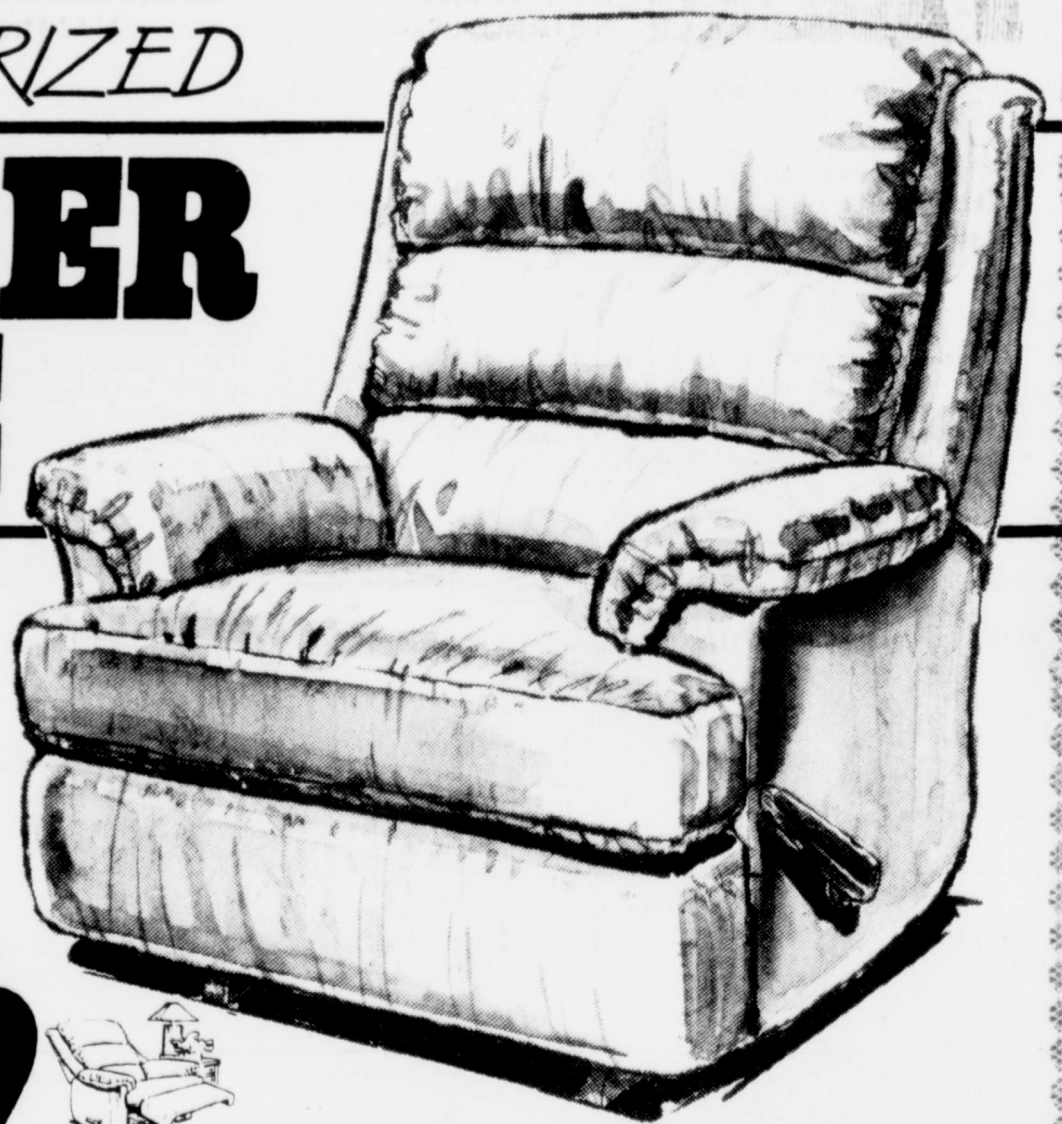
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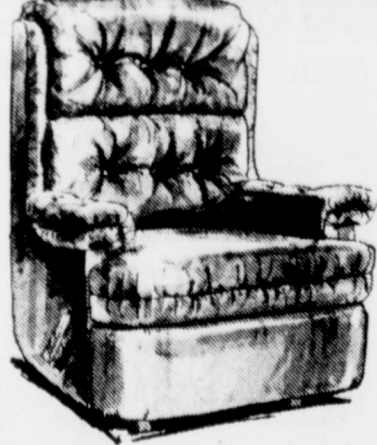
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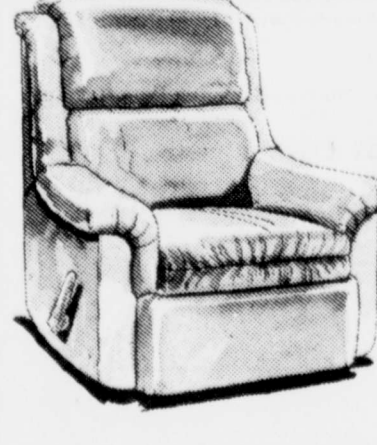
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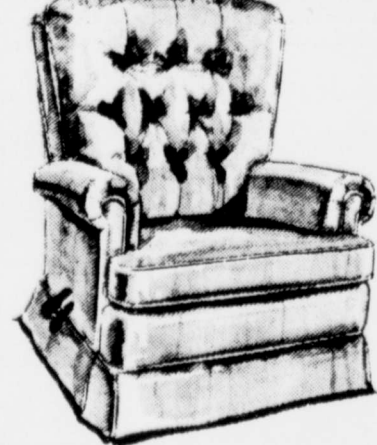
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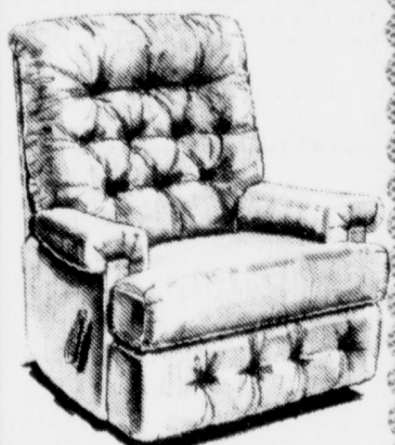
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Cook's Corner



Trisha Aston

The first thing that Trisha Aston learned to fix was tuna fish.

"My grandmother was coming for lunch and I was in charge of preparing it.

"I thought it was a very important thing, since this was the first time I had fixed lunch. "There were a few egg shells in the tuna, but my grandmother said it was real good."

Mrs. Aston learned to cook by watching her mother.

She never was in charge of a meal and just helped in the kitchen.

Aston enjoys cooking entire meals

"I never did bake cookies or anything like that and now, my daughter usually bakes all the cookies."

Meals are Mrs. Aston's favorite things to fix.

"I usually plan menus on Sunday for the whole week and it makes it easier to come home and cook a meal."

Mrs. Aston likes to cook, especially for company. She fixes a lot of casseroles "because I figure it's something you wouldn't fix everyday."

She likes to cook when she has time and she tries new recipes. "I like to change things up every once in a while."

Supper is the main meal at the Aston's house. "We always get to eat together at supper. Sometimes Ronnie gets called out, but we just warm his plate up in the microwave when he gets home."

Her family will eat nearly anything except vegetables.

We all have a picture in our mind of the way things need to look like, so Mrs. Aston remembers the time she made sand tarts.

"Sand tarts are supposed to be

dainty little cookies. You notice I used the word, supposed."

"I made the cookie dough and instead of shaping them into dainty little cookies, mine came out to be about two inch strips."

"They were good, even though they didn't look like sand tarts are supposed to."

Mrs. Aston is married to Ronnie and they have two daughters—Melanie, a freshman at CHS and Barbie, who is in the fourth grade.

Today she is sharing three of her recipes with RECORD readers.

LASAGNA

1 large package lasagna noodles

1 pound ground chuck
1 small container cottage cheese, mixed with 1 egg

2 packages Mozzarella cheese
2 cans tomato sauce
1 can tomato paste
1 chopped onion

Season with oregano and basil or use spaghetti sauce.

Cook noodles covered in microwave for 20 minutes on high. Brown meat with onions and stir in sauce. Layer: 1/2 meat sauce, 1/2 noodles, 1/2 cottage cheese

and egg and 1/2 mozzarella. Repeat, save 1/4 meat sauce for top. Microwave 20 minutes, covered on high.

BREAKFAST DISH

1 pound pork sausage, browned and drained
Mix together with:

4 eggs
2 cups milk
1 cup grated cheese
1 cup Bisquick

Pour into large iron skillet or 13x9 casserole, sprayed with Pam. Bake at 350 degrees for about 30 minutes.

RUSSIAN TEA CAKES

1 cup soft butter
1/2 cup powdered sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/4 teaspoon salt

Combine on low speed, mix well.

Gradually add 2 1/4 cups flour, lightly measured.

Add 1/4 cup finely chopped nuts. Roll dough into 1 inch balls.

Place on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake at 350 degrees for 8-10 minutes until firm, but not brown. While warm, roll in powdered sugar. Makes 4 dozen cookies.
