Tole succeeds Carl Moeller of Electra who has served as Wichita County's Farm Bureau president since 1960. Elected with Tole were Raymond Schroeder, Burkburnett, first vice president; R. L. Farr, Iowa Park, second vice president and T. J. Pace, secretary-treasurer.

Directors named from three communities up for election included: J. T. Noel and Carl Moeller of Electra; James T. Montgomery, Frank Wolf, Frank Krajca and L. B. Slaughter of Wichita Falls and L. E. Bell, R. L. Farr, Robert Wilcox and Loys Barbour of Iowa Park.

Thirteen resolutions developed at an earlier series of policy development meetings were presented to the membership and accepted individually. These included recommendations on method of transportation of grain sold for export, firearms legislation called elections and a commendation to Gov. John Connally for his stand in vetoing the antipoverty program.

A report on county membership indicated 560 paid members of the Farm Bureau in Wichita County.

Three high school students, who attended a citizenship seminar in Huntsville during the summer sponsored by the Texas Farm Bureau, reported on their trip at the beginning of the meeting. They included Ann Lee, Nancy Hays and Robert Dawson.

Tentative plans were made for sending six delegates from the county to the state convention Nov. 14-17 in Dallas.

At the close of the meeting Loys Barbour, chairman of the nominating committee and past state director, presented Moeller a gift certificate for a pair of boots in appreciation of his five years of service as president.

Postmaster Speaks To Lions Club, Reports On Local Postal Service



"An accurate barometer of a town's economy is its postal receipts, a fact well known by those hunting a site for a new industry. The gross receipts of the Burkburnett Post Office have increased 600% in 30 years," Burkburnett Postmaster W. T. (Dub) Zimmerman presented this bright picture to the Lions Club at their regular meeting October 19.

Zimmerman pointed out that the Post Office Department, employing fifteen men and using local products and services, adds to, as well as reflects the economy of Burkburnett.

Mr. Zimmerman cited figures and showed a chart to illustrate the growth of the Burkburnett Post Office. He said gross receipts in 1935 were \$12,500, in 1945, \$24,000, and this year will be between \$70,000 and \$75,000. Improvements have been made in and around the Post Office building and many others are planned for the future.

"Adding zip code to your mail assures faster, more direct service," Zimmerman said. "There are 34,000 Post Offices in the United States. Under zip code there are 533 sectional centers. Overnight delivery of any piece of mail is the ultimate aim of the U.S. Postal Department and using zip code can speed the time when this will be possible."

"Even if he has the only stamp in town for sale, a postal employee gives courteous service," said Zimmerman. "All in all, we at the Post Office are trying to give the best quality service in a friendly, courteous manner at the least possible cost to the Post Office Department."

Kings Annex No. Six, Whip Raiders, 15-13

A first quarter safety proved to be the margin of victory, but a stubborn defense saved the game, as the Burkburnett Kings edged Arlington's Red Raiders, 15-13, here Saturday night for their sixth win without defeat.

The safety came early in the game and was a "gift" from the Red Raiders. As the Kings held the visitors on their first series of downs, Jerry Jack Terrell dropped back to punt from his own ten. His center must have gotten carried away as he snapped the ball over Terrell's head and completely through the end zone. The miscue gave the Kings a 2-0 lead.

The Red Raiders leaped ahead just after the second quarter started on a fine pass play. Amos North hit speedy Jim Campbell who galloped 57 yards to paydirt. Harold Tomme kicked the extra point to make it 7-2.

Campbell, a sterling halfback, began the season with the Kings but went to his old team when they reorganized.

The Kings got on the board again before the half, after some "heads up" play by guard Johnny Veach. Rip Smith, spelling Eugene Guthrie at quarterback, found some running room at Arlington's 48-yard line and scrambled for about five yards.

However, as he was hit, the ball shot backwards out of his arms. Veach very alertly fielded it on one bounce and galloped 45 yards to the Red Raider's three. Jerry Betts then plunged through the center of the line for the touchdown. Phillip Fancher's kicking attempt failed and it remained 8-7.

In the second half, the Red Raiders wasted no time in grabbing the lead again. Jim Campbell fielded the opening kickoff on the nine and raced up the sidelines for 91 yards and a touchdown. The kick was no good and the score stood 13-8.

The King's winning tally came off the arm of Eugene Guthrie. The local's steady signal caller hit Bob Steward on a 23 yard scoring play, capping a drive that had started on their own 36. Fancher booted the extra point to make it 15-13.

The magnificent King defense ruled the game in the fourth quarter. Twice, they held off serious scoring threats by the visitors, once from the 9 yard line and once from the 13 yard line.

The defense had many stalwarts. Leading all tacklers was a really outstanding young man, linebacker Norman Jones. Jones had 14 tackles, 4 unassisted. He received plenty of help from Phillip Fancher, Willie Galvan, Pete James, Bob Laurick, Norman Collingsworth and Linc Regis.

The Kings next game, as of yet is still indefinite, as they have to do some rescheduling due to some cancellations. However, the Burkburnett Star-News will inform you just as soon as the wrinkles are ironed out of the situation.

A bill now proposed in Congress would bring some 7 million additional workers — a substantial part of them farm workers — under the federal minimum wage law. But the irony is that, if it becomes law, it will do serious harm to the very group it is supposed to help.

As the Portland Oregonian succinctly puts it, the bill "... would add to unemployment by limiting job opportunities for the young, the unskilled and minorities." And the reason it would do that is that it would force the payment of an arbitrary wage without taking into consideration the productive abilities of the workers involved.

When that happens, two unfortunate results are certain to follow. First, prices go up — and the low-income groups are hit the hardest. Second, employers reduce the employment of marginal workers to the greatest extent possible. And that means that these workers are denied the opportunity to gain the experience and learn the skills that would qualify them for better paying jobs.

Many enterprises — retailing and agriculture and its related businesses among them — can provide a place and a training ground for the unskilled. But they can do that to the desirable degree only if the wages paid bear a fair relationship to the workers' productive value. The currently proposed bill would give a new shove to inflation — and at the same time swell the rolls of the unemployed.

CHEMICALS OF LIFE

Periodically, news stories are broadcast that pesticides have polluted our food or environment in some manner or caused injury to a person using them. It is important to realize that except where a pesticide has been used for committing suicide, the ingestion of poisonous doses has been accidental and has resulted from the incorrect use of the material involved.

Pesticides can be dangerous when people fail to follow instruction as to their proper use. But without these products to counteract the ravages of man in wearing out the land, and insects and disease in destroying nature's production as well as man's plantings, our abundance of food and greenery would be so depleted that we would now be facing the same famine conditions that plague so much of the world. Food of all kinds in the U. S. is not only in abundant supply but, by any comparison, of unparalleled quality and purity. Exhaustive Food and Drug Administration tests have shown pesticide residues in our foods to be inconsequential from a health standpoint.

Understanding of foods and the products that promote their production and preservation is more important than ever before as world population outpaces food production capability. It would be foolish to outlaw certain foods because they affect some persons adversely as it would be to condemn agricultural chemicals or pesticides because careless use of them may cause toxic conditions in certain cases.

The American Meat Institute reports that the word "barbecue" comes from the Spanish word "barbacoa." This is the name natives of the West Indies gave to the wooden framework they use in grilling smoked meat and fish. French-Canadians borrowed the word "barboka" from the western Indians. French explorers of the Mississippi Valley twister it into the modern "barbecue."

The American Medical Association says that the level of immunity against smallpox in this country has been shrinking steadily for years as more and more people neglect to get boosters. Health authorities estimate that at least three-fourths of the population is inadequately protected against this disease.

President Gerholz of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States holds that there is no need "to put our cities in uniform" by enlisting in a federal program of community development when the job can be done faster and better through private investment and initiative. Federal aid, he added, cannot help but inhibit the free play of imagination, originality, and innovation within the community.

From an article in Today's Health: "No accurate records have been obtainable but it is conservatively estimated that 10,000 men died of scurvy or its sequelae in the California gold rush, half of them in 1884-1849 when scurvy ranged like a raging contagion. Unlike cholera, scurvy was of man's own making because he ignored or disregarded the dietary measures that were for the most part already well established in both medical and lay knowledge."

Roger W. Babson Weekly Report**THE QUEST FOR PEACE**

Babson Park, Mass., Oct. 21—Great hopes and great expectations were kindled earlier this month as the result of the Pope's speech to the General Assembly of the United Nations. His words were acclaimed the world over and found response in millions of human hearts. Surely they will serve, for a long time to come, as a guide to a noble goal. But the reality of peace for which man has searched for thousands of years still eludes us.

Champions of Peace

The Pope has put the moral force and prestige of his half-billion-member church squarely on the line for world peace, at a very critical time. There are wars, or rumors of war, on every continent, ranging from the very hot war in Vietnam to the civil upheavals in Africa. And, one by one, our contemporary champions of peace have been dying off. In the short space of a year, the thinning ranks of the advocates of world peace have dwindled still further with the deaths of Herbert Hoover, Adlai Stevenson, and Albert Schweitzer.

Although a man of outstanding professional ability and of dedication as a public servant, Herbert Hoover was not a success as President. He is best remembered for his humanitarian acts following each of the two World Wars and for his lifelong devotion to the cause of peace. He was without doubt the best champion of peace America has produced so far.

Are There Any "Just" Wars?

Most of us would agree, I think, that true peace must be based on justice if it is to survive. But many of us have widely different opinions of what constitutes justice in a given situation. Our views are colored by our loyalty to our country, by our backgrounds, by our education and environment, and by our own experience.

Most Americans feel that the Civil War was a "just" war, but there are a very great many people living in the South who still vigorously dispute that claim. And we are at present in the midst of an agonizing debate on the rightness of our government's course in Vietnam. If peace is to triumph, war must eventually be outlawed; and that goes even for so-called "just" wars!

The Glorification of War

Loyalty and patriotism are strong, stirring words. But how many sins have been committed by national leaders throughout history as they appealed to these qualities in their followers. Love of country and willingness to sacrifice even one's life in the national interest or for the national honor have been instilled in all peoples of the world since time immemorial.

Read where you will in the history of the progress of mankind and you will find war glorified and the heroes of war venerated. We may be living in a world which aspires to peace.

and I believe we are; but we are so brainwashed by the glorification of war that we hardly know how to go about working effectively for peace. Without being unfaithful to the sacred memory of those who died in war that we might live and prosper, we must search for—and honor—new heroes who have been or who are men of peace. We must train our children and grandchildren to look up to those who strive for a true world peace.

Is the World Ready?

Time alone will tell how truly effective for peace has been the visit of the Pope to the U.N. Perhaps, as President Johnson has said, the papal speech may be "just what the world needs to get us thinking on how to achieve peace."

Is the world ready for peace? I think not... because from childhood most of the peoples of the world are taught to rely on the might of arms and on the power and righteousness of their individual countries. The desire for peace is indeed in our hearts, but the will to work for it has yet to be formed and nurtured. What we need is a Great Society that will embrace everybody—the whole world. I am confident this will one day become a reality; but I fear it will be a long time building.

VETERANS
Questions-Answers

(Editor's Note: Veterans and their families are asking thousands of questions concerning the benefits their Government provides for them through Veterans Administration. Below are some representative queries. Additional information may be obtained at any VA office.)

Q—Would you tell me if a 100 percent disabled veteran can take out a loan on a new GI "J" insurance, and if so how much could be obtained?

A—There is no loan provisions on the new GI "J" insurance that is now being sold to disabled veterans.

Q—I have one dependent and receive pension under the new pension law. What are the income limits for the various rates of pension?

A—With annual income of not more than \$1,000, the pension rate is \$105 monthly; with income of not more than \$2,000, the rate is \$80 and with income of not more than \$3,000, the rate is \$48.

Q—I recently moved and wish to file a change of address for delivery of future VA compensation checks. Can I

use the change of address on the envelope containing last payment?

A—Yes. But do not forget the change of address to Treasury Department. Mail to the VA office having custody of your records as a veteran.

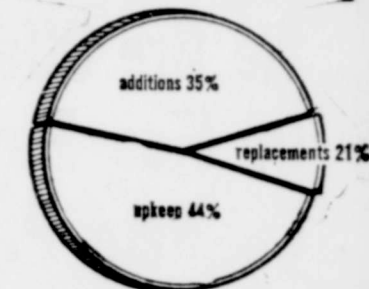

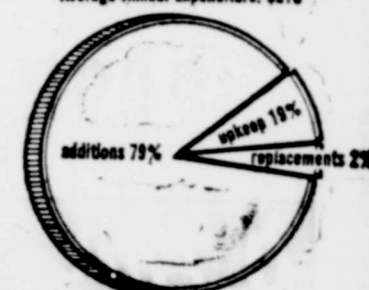

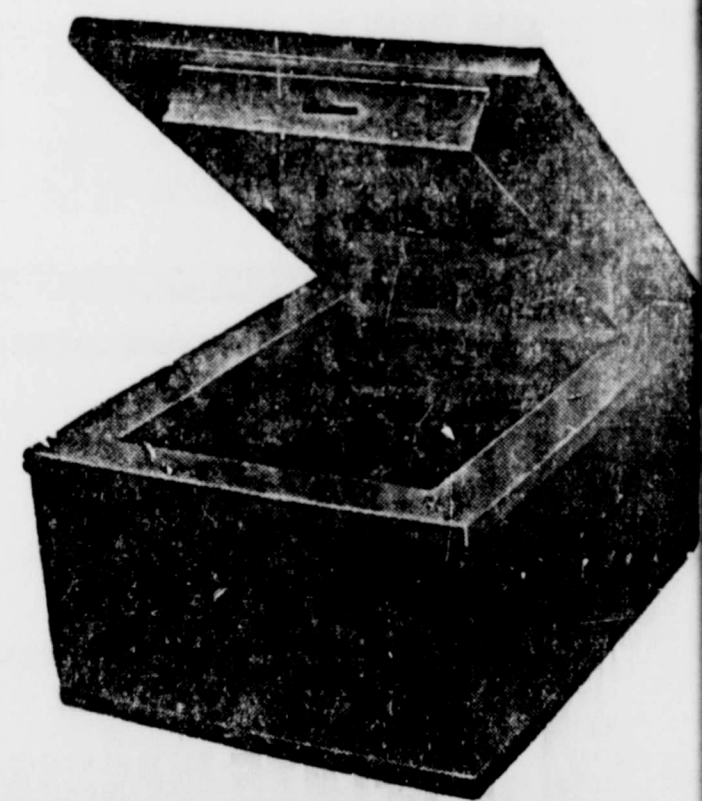

People To Benefit By The Approval of Bill

People who are sick or will benefit if voters Proposition No. 7 on the November 2 election. The bill is worded to affect only the Hermann Hospital Estate in the major charitable organizations in Houston and the Houston Independent School District. The bill would cost the State of Texas nothing, but it would cost the estate from paying taxes on its properties in Harris County. The majority of the local taxes are paid by the City of Houston and the Houston Independent School District. The estate paid \$332,463 in 1964 to local governments, which would have been in effect then. The bill would have provided free hospital care to poor people who had not been out in the hospital for more than 30 days. The bill would have received the approval of this year by the Legislature. Hermann Estate was founded as a pay hospital in addition to its charitable facility. 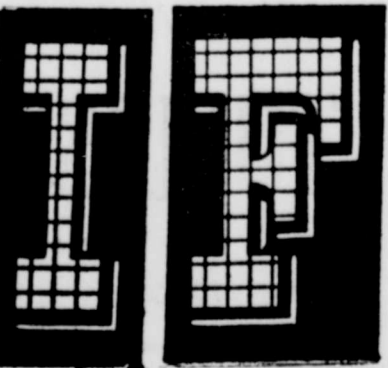
When the nerve cells of a part of the brain are deprived of their blood supply, the part of the body controlled by these nerve centers cannot function normally. The result may be weakness or paralysis, difficulty in speaking or loss of memory. Some patients recover quickly, and can resume their normal activities. Others may suffer such serious damage that even a partial recovery will take a long time. Immediate treatment with proper exercises and other forms of therapy can do much toward helping a patient regain the use of muscles and speech.

If a stroke is brought on by a narrowed blood vessel or, in some instances, a blood clot, the doctor may use anticoagulant drugs to prevent another stroke. When neck arteries leading to the brain are involved, a surgical operation can sometimes remove the obstruction to circulation. Rehabilitation for stroke requires the cooperation of the doctor, the patient and the family. The patient's own will to avoid invalidism and to become independent is especially important.

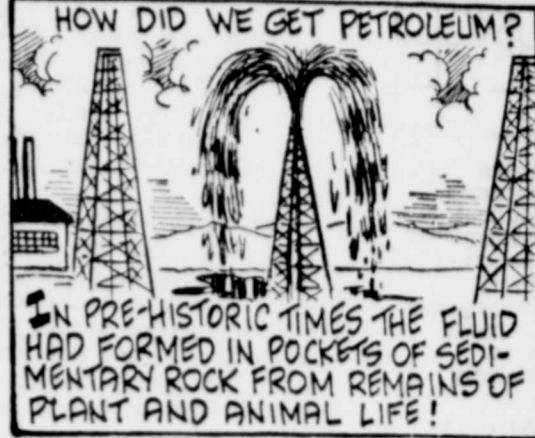
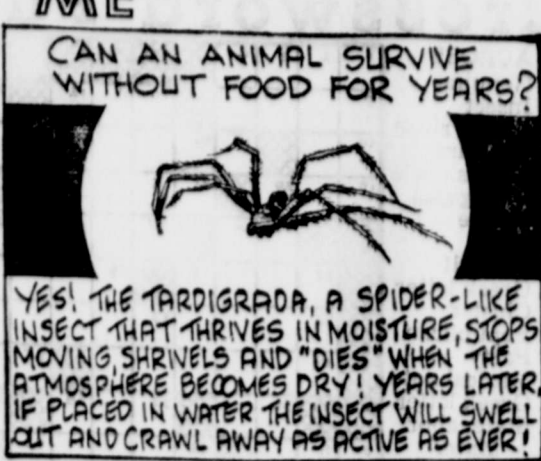

After you've passed your driving test, especially if you did some time ago, it's easy to fall into the habit of disregarding or — heaven forbid — not even remembering the signs along the road. But the intelligent woman driver will never let her knowledge of road signs slip away. It's too important for her safety and to the well-being of her passengers. Traffic signs serve three main purposes. First, of course, is to regulate traffic flow. Secondly, signs warn of hazardous conditions. Lastly, road plaques give the driver guidance and direction. You should react to the shape—as well as the content—of road signs automatically. Here is a brush-up course in shapes: In most states the octagon means stop; a round circle indicates a railroad crossing; the diamond shape is a warning that the character of the road will have a change like an up coming hill, a sharp curve, an approaching bridge. The triangle shape means yield right of way. And rectangular signs are informational—"No Parking Anytime"—or regulatory—"Slow, School Zone."

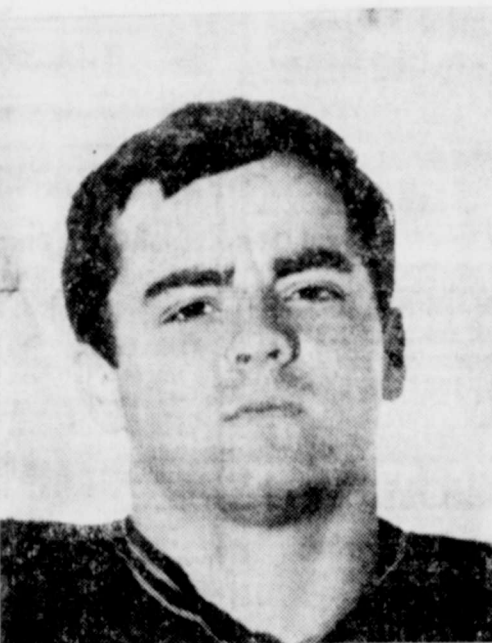
Forewarned is forearmed. And knowing what to expect on a road will make you a safer driver. Make it a practice to glance at every sign you pass. Of course there aren't signs for everything. If you're driving along and get a flat tire, it's best to pull over to the right shoulder immediately, before you ruin your tire. Accent on Health

Do you enjoy sitting down to a juicy T-bone steak?

Most of us do, and most of us eat our meat feeling secure that its quality is good, and that someone is looking out for our safety and good health.

This is true: two divisions of the Texas State Department of Health are directly concerned with the meat you eat—the Food and Drug Division and the Veterinary Public Health Division.

For example, butcher shops and meat-cutting tables are checked by investigators for evidence of meat-borne diseases. This falls under the routine duties of a score of Texas' food and drug inspectors.

The Veterinary Public Health experts' work begins while the animal is on foot and leaves off where the food and drug personnel take over. Not only does the staff maintain a surveillance program of zoonoses—diseases of animals transmissible to man—but it goes a step further.

At present, 207 establishments participate in the State's inspection program. Of these, 164 use the square stamp, and 43 use the State of Texas outline stamp.

Not only has the meat that bears one of these legends been inspected for wholesomeness, but the conditions under which the meat was processed were carefully observed for proper formulation and sanitation.

If the meat you eat has passed inspection, it will bear one of three stamps. The stamp will be square, indicating state approved municipal inspection; or an outline of Texas, showing State inspection; or round, indicating Federal inspection.

Of course, the two-by-two inch square stamp can't be shown on every piece of meat or on hamburger, but your meat-market man can tell you whether the meat was inspected or not.

But you, as an individual, have a responsibility, too. Yours is to look for the stamp on the meat certifying wholesomeness and ask your butcher about it, too.

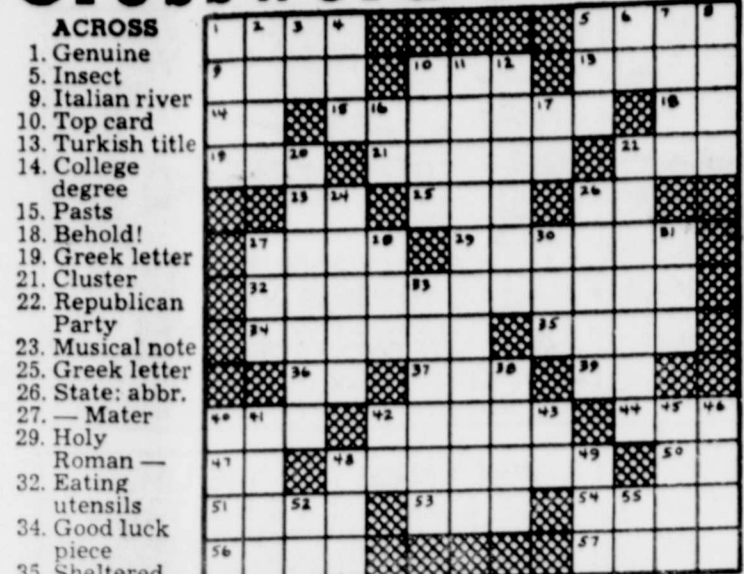
