

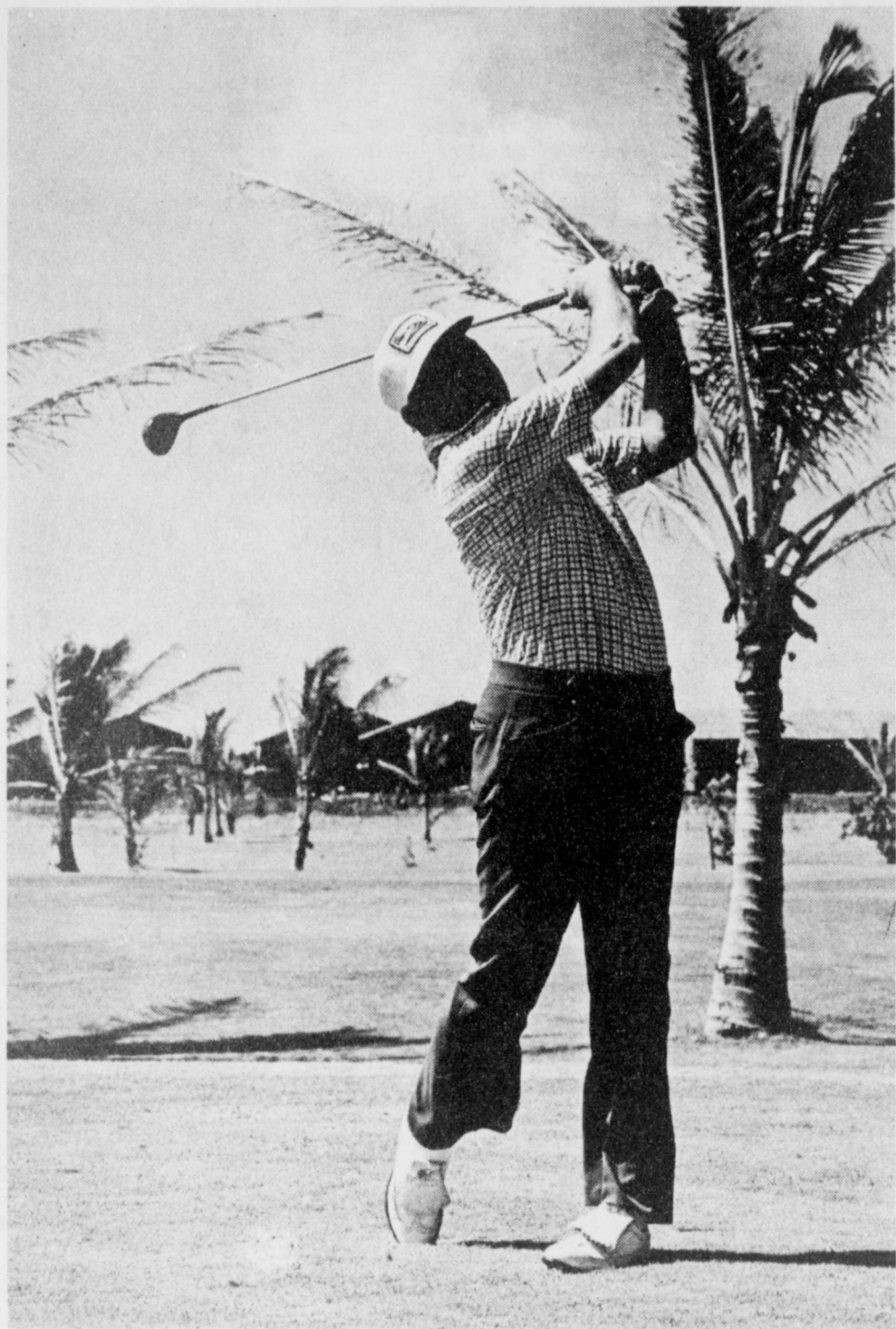

Jerry Jones Is Runner-Up At Golf Tournament

Jerry Jones, President, Talco State Bank, Talco, Texas placed as a runner-up in Security Corporation's 5th Annual Invitational Golf Tournament held at the Kuilima Resort Hotel and Country Club, Kahuku, Oahu, Hawaii.

More than 250 bankers and their wives from all parts of the country took part in the Invitational Tournament which offered over \$15,000 in prizes including a 1975 Cadillac as hole-in-one first prize and a vacation for two to London, Paris and Rome for "closest-to-pin" honors.

The event, which took place on October 18, one day before

the 100th American Bankers Association Convention in Honolulu, is hosted annually by Security Corporation, Irvine, California-based national marketer of equipment and services for financial institutions.

Cattlemen Protest Imports

During a television interview with Horace McQueen, agricultural director, Channel 7, Tyler, Texas, R.L. Moore, President and Lee Perkins, Vice President of the Independent Beef Producers of America stated that the cattlemen's hopes were shattered when news leaked out that the President was not going to curtail the meat imports. The latest word being that he would permit 1,100,000,000 (one billion, one hundred million) pounds to be imported while the ports of all foreign nations are closed to meat imports.

The news was disheartening because the new level will allow over 85 million more pounds to be imported in 1975 than was imported in 1974, Moore said.

Madril was the pride of the west coast rings until his arrival eight weeks ago. He was an instant hit and soon challenged for the championship.

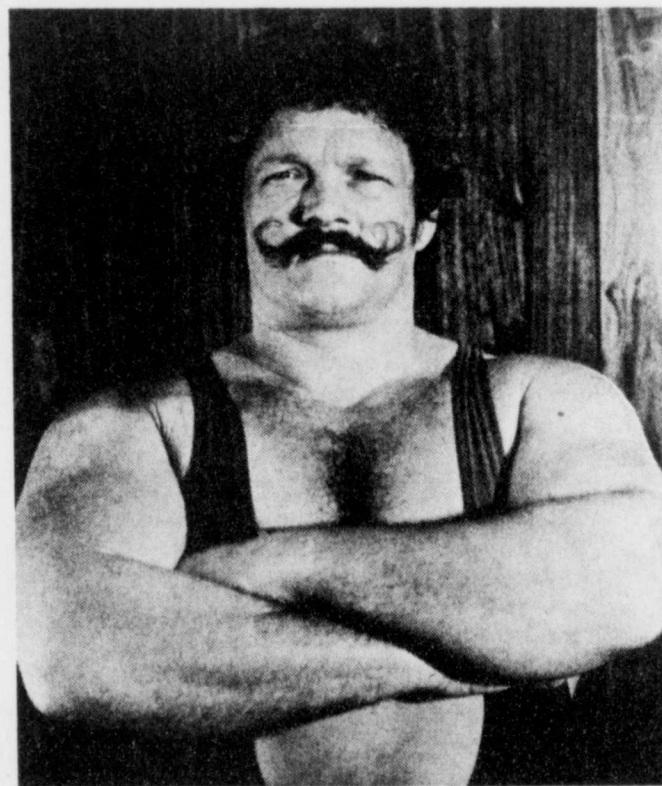
Mad Dog Vachon, long time recognized as Canada's top rough-houser, signed late for the card and finds himself in a prelim.

Clerk for absentee voting and Odessa
Isbell is hereby appointed Deputy Clerk
for absentee voting. The absentee voting
for the above designated election shall
be held at the Talco-Bogata Consoli-
dated Independent School District and
said place of absentee voting shall remain open for at
least eight hours on each day for
absentee voting which is not a Saturday,
a Sunday, or an official State holiday,
beginning on the 20th day and
continuing through the 4th day
