South Plains Crops Aided As Snow Blankets Area Death Toll Mounts To Twelve In Underground Blast

Gas Explosion Is 4,000 Feet Below Entrance Of Mine

Seven Of Nineteen Men In
Shaft Uninjured After
Fatal Blast; Unaware Of
Tragedy Until Return

Bodies Recovered

West Virginian Officials
To Start Investigation;
Rescue Work Carried On
By Large Crew Of Men

(By Associated Press)
ARNETT, W. Va., March 26.—Twelve miners perished today in the dark recesses of the Mine of the Old Crow Coal company here in an explosion of gas. Nineteen men were in the mine at the time and seven were uninjured.

The blast occurred 4,000 feet from the slope entrance. Those who escaped in another part of the shaft were unaware of the explosion until they reached the surface.

Bodies Recovered
The bodies all had been removed from the workings tonight. Some were badly scorched. Only a small part of the mine was damaged.

Rescue work was carried on by company men, crews from nearby mines, representatives of the West Virginia department of mines and the United States Bureau of Mines at Pittsburgh.

The blast occurred at 2 a. m. with only the small night crew of the loaders working. Two hundred workers are employed in the underground plant during the daytime.

Foreman Killed
The dead included J. H. Livingston, night foreman.

Officials of the West Virginia mining department said an investigation would be started. Belief was expressed that the workers in No. 9 heading struck a gas pocket and that it might have been ignited by a spark from a motor.

Lester's Hearing To Be Held Today

Court Of Criminal Appeals
Suggests Release Of
Defendant On Bond After
Bail Nullified Here

R. B. (Blackie) Lester, held in the Lubbock county jail on a charge of violation of the prohibition law, again will be arraigned in court today on a writ of habeas corpus. The writ was granted by the court yesterday.

The hearing comes as a result of an order by the court of criminal appeals, given as a result of an application filed with the court two weeks ago by Schenck and Triplett, attorneys for the defendant.

Bail Nullified
Lester's bail of \$1,000 recently was nullified by the court.

The opinion of the appeals court was received in this city yesterday and was made returnable to Judge Pharr. It included the suggestion that the relator be released immediately on his personal bond and that he be at large during pendency of the case.

Lester, who was granted an application for an insanity hearing after he had been charged, was lodged in jail by the court order in response to District Attorney Durwood Bradley's answer to a motion for continuance of the scheduled trial. The district attorney's answer held that in the event the defendant is insane that his bond is not valid and that, furthermore, for protection of the public, he should be confined in jail during pendency of the case.

The opinion of the court of criminal appeals expressed that the relator had not been charged with insanity and that his bond should be considered valid.

Local officers announced last night that they had received no order from the court regarding Lester's release and that he still was behind the bars of the Lubbock county jail.

GIVEN TWO YEARS

Lawrence Wheeler Is Found
Guilty At Post

Canadian Liquor System Pictured Absolute Failure

Former Ontario Premier Is
Dry Witness In Hearing
Of Prohibition Repeal;
Plays Government Control

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, March 26.—Government control of liquor sales in Canada was described as an "absolute failure" by E. C. Drury, former premier of Ontario province, who predicted at prohibition hearings before the house judiciary committee today that the Dominion eventually would return to complete prohibition.

"Whatever the solution of the drink problem may be," the Canadian asserted, "it is not government control."

Drury and John J. Lewis of Columbia, president of the American Insurance union, and a former member of the house of representatives, testified for dry forces today.

P. Scott McBride, general superintendent of the Anti-Saloon league, charged of assault with intent to kill when Mrs. Lenna Lowe Yost, general of the dry forces, presented him the committee meeting. He said the dries would be given next Wednesday in which to complete the presentation of their witnesses.

OFFICERS CHARGED

Assault Claims Aftermath
Of City Elections

KANSAS CITY, March 26.—(AP)—Charges of assault with intent to kill were filed here late today against Police Lieutenant James O. Reeves, in charge of the Westport police station, and Officer C. L. Reedy as an aftermath of Kansas City's municipal election yesterday.

Officers C. J. Brown and M. E. Feltz were charged with felonious assault upon complaint of a negro, who said they had beaten him at his home this morning.

Reeves was identified by Bernard Little, democratic precinct worker, as one of two officers who he said kidnapped him near a polling place, took him to the Missouri river front and beat and shot at him, threatening death should he return to his election work.

"Hard Luck" Bank Robbers Pick Out Insolvent Institution for Hold-Up

WEST ALEXANDER, O., March 26.—Two banking men sat in the First National bank here today chatting about the money that was to be there. Two other men with criminal intentions, walked in and roughly ordered "hands up!"

The bankers, Charles Draper, receiver for the bank, and a neighbor cashier, just sat and stared incredulously. They looked at each other and shook their heads.

"Can't you see you're being held up?" explained one of the robbers.

LONDON, March 26.—(AP)—Prominent efforts made to arrive at a five-power naval agreement by means of a consultative political pact which, it was hoped, will meet French demands for national security, there emerged tonight the following positions of the five nations represented here:

The United States: Appears willing to enter a purely consultative five-power agreement, which would involve no American obligation, either expressed or implied, to give military support on the occasion of any threat of war in Europe. Such pledge under no circumstances is to be made in return for reduction of French navy figures as presented here.

No Guarantees.
Great Britain: Is prepared to proceed with a general five-power consultative pact wherein Great Britain will hold a special position regarding France and Italy. No guarantee.

De Wolf Perry Is Chosen as Bishop

CHICAGO, March 26.—(AP)—The Rt. Rev. James De Wolf Perry, D.D., of Rhode Island, was elected presiding bishop of the Episcopal church in America today by the house of bishops.

Bishop Perry was chosen on the seventh ballot of the convention which is meeting in St. James Cathedral. He received 69 votes, one more than the majority of 68 needed.

The Episcopal priories were called by their dean, Bishop William Leonard of Ohio, to choose a presiding bishop to succeed the Most Rev. Charles Palmerston Anderson of Chicago, who died last month. Bishop Frederick Reese of Georgia, sat as temporary chairman of session.

Bishop Perry was born at Germantown, Pa., October 3, 1871, where his father, the Late Rev. James De Wolf Perry was rector of Calvary Episcopal church. He is descended from an old New England family.

TO PROBE FLOGGING
Former Prison Guard Beaten
By State Convicts

HUNTSVILLE, March 26.—(AP)—Prison and city officials today investigated an alleged beating administered by state convicts to a former prison guard, James Randall, who was arrested and placed in the prison.

He exhibited lacerations which he said were inflicted with a leather strap.

"The prisoners stripped me of all my clothing, laid me down on a wet blanket and struck me five blows," Randall said in his statement.

"Three men hit me a lick apiece and one man struck me twice."

Missouri Convicts Munity Two Hours
Against "Irish Stew" Menu Served by
Penitentiary; "Fried Meat" Demanded

(By Associated Press)
JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., March 26.—Rebelling against "Irish stew" for luncheon, 750 of the 4,000 convicts in the Missouri penitentiary mutinied for two hours this afternoon in the prison dining hall. They finally were quieted without violence after Warden Rudolph promised to improve the menu if there was anything wrong.

The prisoners demanded "fried meat."

Investigation by Warden Rudolph brought an announcement that the meal objected to "was probably not what it should have been," and that the "potatoes in the stew were slightly raw."

Refused To Meal
Two hours after the flare-up the same prisoners returned in orderly manner to the dining room, and without further objection, quietly ate the scheduled evening meal consisting only of stewed prunes, bread, syrup and coffee.

The prison was quiet tonight, with guards vigilant and ready to meet any emergency, although no further trouble was expected by prison officials.

The outbreak, which began at the noon hour and continued until 2:30 p. m., was not an organized revolt, according to the warden, who said there apparently were no ring leaders.

Warden Rudolph found the convicts seated at the long benches in the dining hall, banging on the tables and shouting for "meat!" They had not attacked any guards or resorted to other violence, but had refused the guards' demands.

The grand jury reported a no-bill in the case of Miss Schumacher, who had been charged in a complaint filed jointly against Hoad, Miss Frederick, Louis Goss, former high school teacher, and herself. No report was made of Goss.

Three Are Lodged In Jail Here For Slaton Burglary

Trio Returned To Lubbock
After Convictions For
Robberies At Post And
Snider; Sought Escape

Three men were lodged in the Lubbock county jail yesterday afternoon to await trial here following indictments of the grand jury on charges of burglary. The three are Willie Fisher, Willie Riley and Johnnie Fisher.

They were transferred to Lubbock yesterday by Chief Deputy O. B. Conley from Post where they recently were tried on similar charges and assessed penalties of two years each in the state penitentiary.

The men have been held in the Snyder jail and last week attempted a jail break when they overpowered the Snyder county sheriff. They, however, were held up in their flight by the officer's wife who, at the point of a gun, forced them to return to their cells. They also were tried in Snyder on charges of burglary and were given two years each.

Charges in this city grew out of the burglary of a service station in Slaton about two months ago belonging to P. Hord. A small sum of money was taken.

KILLS TWO DAUGHTERS

Father Surrenders After
Shooting G's, Self

NEWTON, Ia., March 26.—(AP)—George McKinney, 53, today shot and killed his daughters, Arlie Dora, 25, and Gladys, 12, and then shot himself in the hand. He drove his automobile here from his home at Mitchellville and surrendered.

McKinney told officials something had been telling him for two years to kill his daughters.

Sanders Liquor Trial Set
For April 7 At Post

POST, March 26.—Set for trial in this city today, the case of Dan Sanders, charged with sale of intoxicants, was continued until April 7 upon application of defense attorneys due to absence of a defense witness.

The case originally was set for trial this morning, was moved up to Tuesday and then continued again until Wednesday.

Sanders was indicted by the grand jury last Friday as the aftermath of an investigation into the death of J. T. Hanson, who was thought to have died from heart failure after an alleged drinking party. Tommy Rose, a son-in-law of Sanders, also was charged with sale of intoxicants.

Additional Precipitation
Forecast For Today With
Continued Drop In Local
Temperature

Mercury Declines

Below-Freezing Tempera-
ture In Lubbock With
Return Of Winter; Heavy
Fall At Slaton

Accompanied by sudden drops in temperature, snow and sleet last night was laying a white mantle over a vast section of the Panhandle and South Plains, the precipitation reading heavy proportions in Lubbock toward midnight, according to reports to the Morning Avalanche.

Late reports yesterday stated that the snow had only reached a southern point about 30 miles from this city but weather forecasts and reports from cities on the lower South Plains indicated that before Thursday morning the late draught of winter would have visited points on the T & P.

Forecasts for this section today were that snow or light rains probably would continue with Friday unsettled.

Temperature in Lubbock and vicinity yesterday afternoon stood at 38 degrees but at midnight last night the mercury had experienced a sharp decline and hovered near four degrees below freezing.

Snow reports were received by the Morning Avalanche from Amarillo, where a heavy fall was experienced. Shamrock gauged at one inch. Pampa, Childress, Breckinridge, Plainview, Clarendon, Canyon, Abilene, Hale Center, Tulsa, Slaton, Monroe and Woodrow.

Slaton reported a fall of between four and six inches.

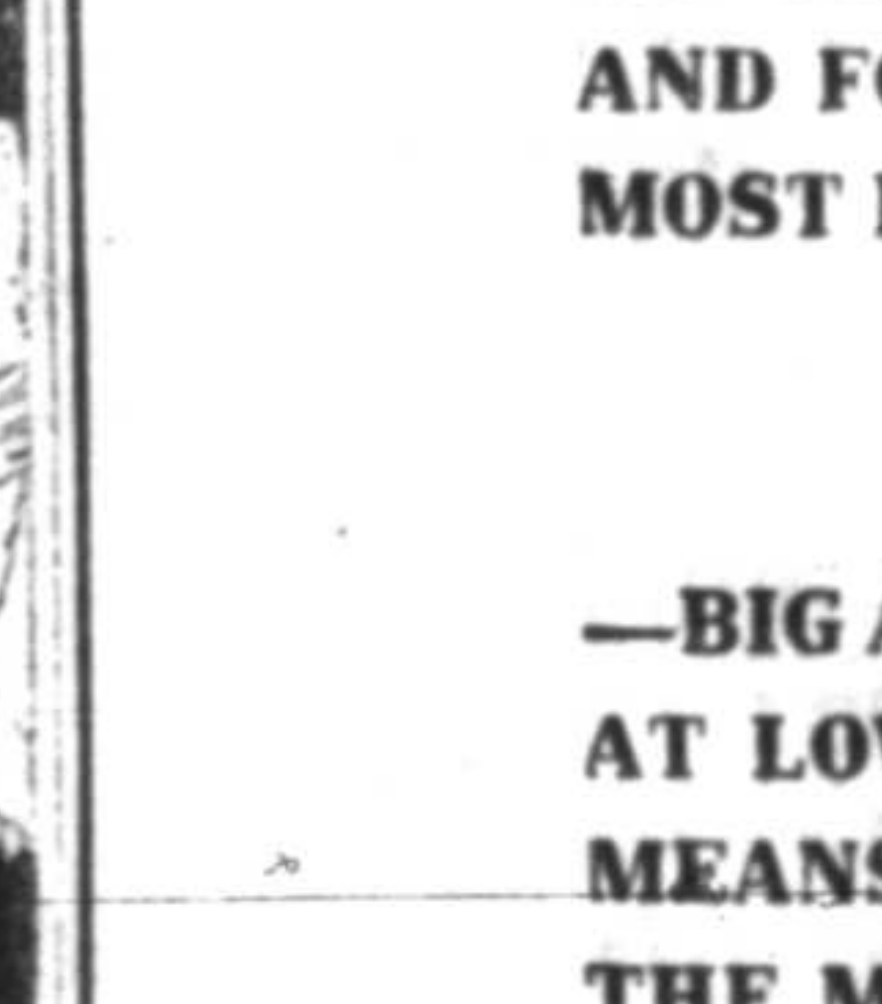

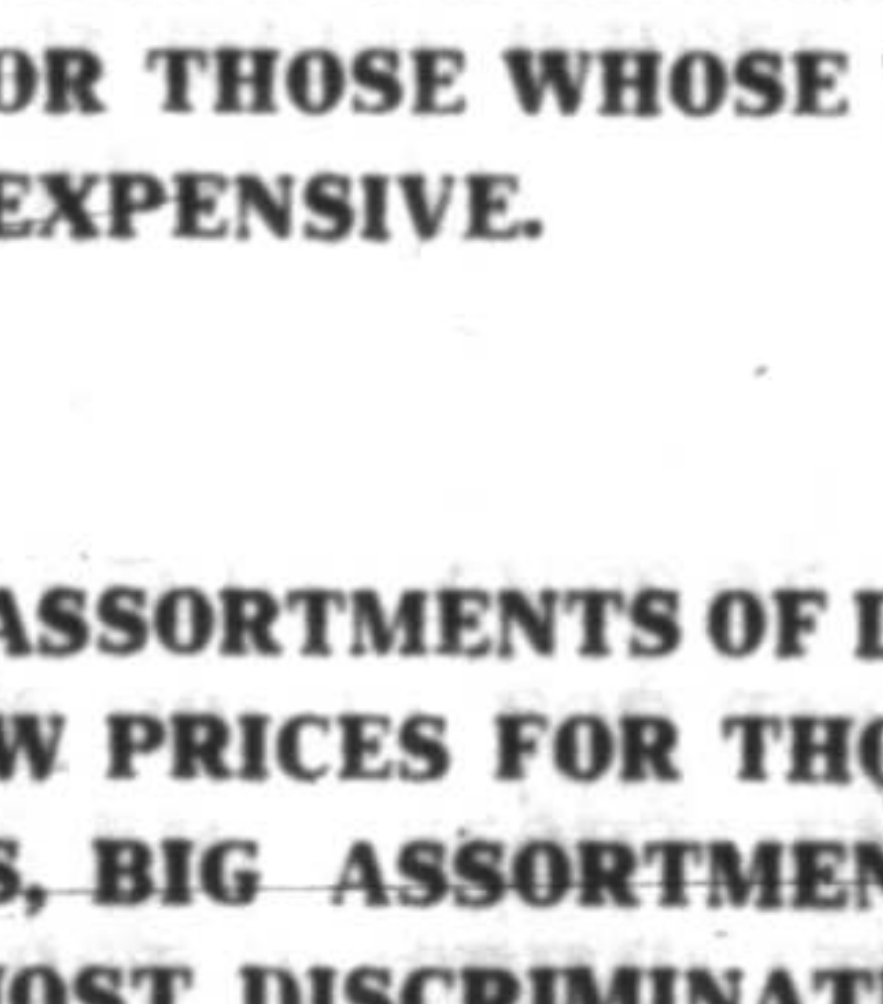

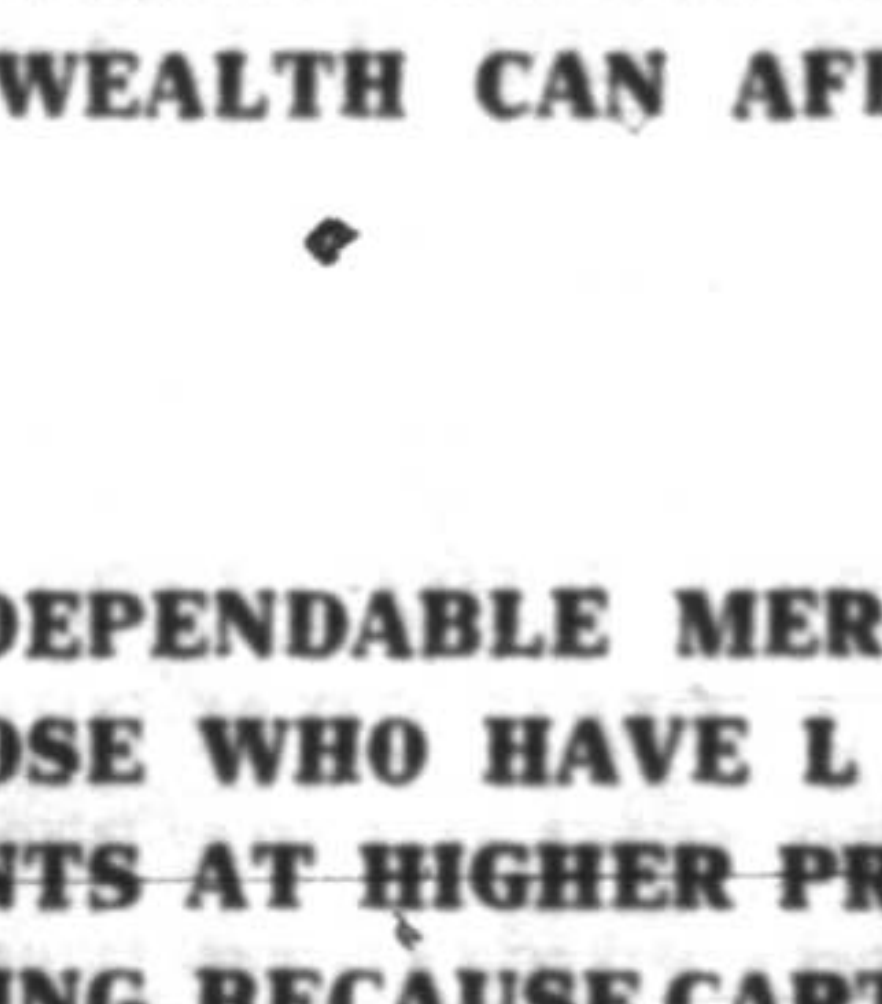

Tendency To Admit "Kids" Free Grows In Major Loops

Other Clubs May Follow Practice Of Chicago Teams

Effort Under Way To Have More Youths Witness Big Baseball Exhibitions; Would Help Interest

BY BRIAN BELL
Associated Press Sports Writer.

NEW YORK, March 26. (AP)—Boys, who always have the time and inclination but frequently lack the price of admission, will see major league baseball games in increasing numbers this season. For years half a dozen clubs have admitted small boys without tickets to the ball parks, but as a result of an effort initiated by the two Chicago clubs the practice may be more universal.

When Jimmy Walker cheered Babe Ruth on to bigger and better home runs as the Bambino's big league trail seemed nearer its end five years ago, the New York major league of the "dirty faced kids in the street" to whom Ruth was a hero. Since then Ruth has amply justified the faith of the "kids."

It was a small boy who appealed to Joe Jackson with the "way it ain't so, Joe," which went around the world when the White Sox star admitted that everything was not all that it should have been in 1919.

Bowler Leads Drive.
Thomas H. Bowler, Chicago alumnus, is leading the latest drive for free admission of boys to major league games. Bowler, commissioner of semi-pro baseball for Cook county, attended the last joint meeting of the major leagues to present the case of the boys, and the two Chicago clubs announced four "boys' days" each week. With a possibility that the number may be increased.

The Chicago plan is to distribute 4,000 free tickets through principals of schools. All semi-pro games will be witnessed by the boys without charge.

"Kids haven't any money and can't peep through knot-holes any more, as the fences now are concrete," said Bowler. "They are the supply of major league talent and because they don't see so many games they are losing interest. I used to peep through a knot hole myself and I was heart-broken when I couldn't see the games, and I almost forgot baseball."

Gotham Clubs Friendly.

The New York clubs for years have shown a friendly feeling for boys and every playing date, except Saturdays, Sundays and holidays, when capacity crowds fill the seats, the gates of the Polo Grounds and Yankee Stadium were thrown open to juvenile fans, who have an abiding faith and interest in baseball, but no money. The average number of boys admitted free in the New York parks ranges from 3,000 to 4,000 daily, but as many as 10,000 have crowded in when "open sesame" was sounded.

Detroit has numerous boys' days during the season, when youngsters sponsored by public schools, the recreation commission, and other local organizations are admitted free. The Tigers have restricted the movement to properly sponsored groups as the club believes an ever-free policy would be impossible to control.

Cards Sponsor Club.

The St. Louis Cardinals have a "Knot Hole Club," organized six years ago, composed of boys under 16 years of age, who are admitted to Sportsman's Park without charge on all National League playing days, except Saturdays, Sundays and holidays. The ranks of the Knot Holes will grow beyond the normal increase this year when girls will be admitted to membership.

A few points from Johnny Farrell's iron play will improve the work of us. His facts are simple and the results are uncanny. His whole game is based on the stationary head and that anchoring of the feet.

Little does it matter to Farrell what may happen between these two points. He spreads out and swings hard. Notice that his weight is entirely on his foot (D) and his left knee relaxes at will as in (C). Illustrated in (A) we have the knee straightened out, but the right foot is glued to the ground, although rolled over, never leaving the original stance.

In (B) we have the right shoulder hitting through the shot and the head is set as in the start of the stance.

The bending of the two knees as in (A) and (C) show how well the pivots work—throwing the weight unconsciously into the ball.

The average golfer should never concentrate on forcing his weight into the shot—forcing sends the ball offline.

This weight is evident in the hip action of Farrell when he rolls from left to right.

Or would Jones and Co. center its investigation upon the opinions of a few experts, with definite knowledge along the problem's line?

You know the answer. It is evident, even to a child.

John W. Brady, "hell of a once respected barrister," killed Leila Highsmith, girl stenographer with whom he had been familiar. Facts introduced in the first trial, resulting in a hung jury, proved that conclusively. Now his defense, sparring for time, proposes to again enmesh the case in a Gordian knot of red tape while the public stands helplessly by, demanding that justice be done. How long is Texas going to submit to such measures?

Some of these days a sweeping populace, not only in Texas but throughout this country of ours, is going to awake and arise in revolt against an archaic and altogether unsatisfactory court system. The people—the law-abiding people who want protection through clear channels of justice—will not forever be denied.

And a few more cases like that enveloping John W. Brady will hasten the day—don't you forget it.

UNCLE SAM: POLICEMAN

Charges that federal prohibition enforcement is lax and the recent assertion of Chairman Wickham of the Law Enforcement Commission that enforcement of prohibition compares favorably with the enforcement of other federal laws have brought under public scrutiny all police activities of the federal government and the extent to which the federal government has gone in for policing and law enforcement.

The police department of the national government is chiefly concerned with the liquor, narcotic, postal, white slave, anti-trust, immigration and revenue laws. For enforcing obedience to these laws it maintains a large and costly police force. And with what success?

Immigration authorities admit that thousands of aliens are smuggled into the United States each year and that hundreds of thousands of men and women who illegally entered the country are living here undetected.

Smugglers of goods to escape duties have been so successful that the diamond industry of the country found it easier to compete with foreign diamond merchants without benefit of duties than with the smugglers who were forced out of business by placing diamonds on the free list.

That the anti-trust laws, postal laws, white slave and narcotic laws are flagrantly violated is a matter of common knowledge, efforts of inspectors, agents and the department of justice being largely unavailing. For years the government has been trying to break the dope traffic and still it flourishes, although considerable progress has been made among certain classes of society. As for the tax laws, the number of income-tax evaders being fined is a fair barometer of the disrespect for law in this field.

BANK MERGERS

Bank merging continues on the grand scale throughout the United States, the latest and largest proposed merger being that of the Chase National Bank, Equitable Trust Company and the Interstate Trust Company in New York.

Consolidation of these three banks into one huge institution with assets of \$2,900,000,000 indicates in striking fashion the forces which are working today for bigness in financial matters. There is an irresistible pressure being exerted for the massing of financial resources in large units.

This merger would give New York City the largest bank in the world, but the race will not stop there. This same combination is already talking of absorbing a large Brooklyn institution, and there are rumors that the National City Bank, of New York, is to be the nucleus of another large merger.

On the Firing Line at the Nation's Capital

STEWART FAILS TO SEE HOPE FOR ANY LESS BOOTLEGGING UNDER PROPOSED BEER BILL

WASHINGTON, March 26.—Although it goes without saying that Representative Leonidas C. Dyer's 2.75 per cent beer bill will not pass, or come within gunshot of passing, or probably even come up for a vote, nevertheless it is the first beer bill introduced in congress since the eighteenth amendment's adoption to receive any serious consideration whatever.

Not that the Dyer bill has been so very gravely considered, either. In fact, quite the reverse. Still, it has been mentioned, commented on—indifferently, indeed; yet not entirely ignored. Which is more than the authors of earlier beer bills (and there have been a lot of them) have been able to claim.

The St. Louis congressman's offering undoubtedly attracts this medium of attention because it makes its appearance right in the midst of the wet's most energetic drive thus far for modification of the Volstead law.

Notwithstanding that the wets themselves perfectly recognize its hopelessness at the present time, it decidedly is a spectacular drive, and it includes the Dyer bill. Folk notice the bill as part of the ensemble. They would not consider it worth speaking of otherwise. Senator John J. Blaine of Wisconsin intends his resolution for the eighteenth amendment's repeal to be a feature of the drive, too; but that has more of a humorous effect. The Dyer bill, though futile, is not funny.

There is this to be said about beer bills: The wets know they cannot get one through now, and they are not at all sanguine of accomplishing it at the next session of congress, but they do believe that, by plugging persistently away, they will manage it sooner or later.

For some reason they seem to have decided on a 2.75 per cent alcoholic beverage as the article for them to concentrate on.

It will satisfy everybody, they appear to feel sure.

Personally I doubt it.

We have one-half of one per cent beer now—or just under it, one-half of one per cent being the stage at which it begins to be illegal. We also have bootlegging, because one-half of one per cent is not a high enough alcoholic content to suit the average individual who wants a "drink," in the pre-prohibition sense of the word.

We certainly would have no more bootlegging if the limit were one-quarter of one per cent.

We would have any less bootlegging (appreciably less, at any rate) on a 2.75 per cent basis? Again, I doubt it. Five per cent beer and 19 or 12 per cent wine? Yes. Such figures unquestionably would play smash with the bootleg business. But would 2.75 per cent be an adequate increase above one-half of one per cent to meet with connoisseurs' approval? I surely doubt it.

"Bear in mind," urges Representative Dyer, "that the 2.75 per cent which my bill proposes is 2.75 per cent by weight, as against one-half of one percent by volume."

"Reckoned in volume, 2.75 per cent by weight would be about 3.5 per cent by volume."

"Good pre-prohibition beer was about 4 per cent."

Your Health

AVERAGE CHILD OF ONE YEAR HAS A SEVEN-WORD VOCABULARY

The story is told of the stuttering broker who called in a bird store to buy a parrot. After selecting a bird that suited him so far as its appearance was concerned, he said: "C-c-can he t-t-talk?"

The storekeeper with a look of disgust answered: "If he couldn't talk any better than you can I'd wring his neck."

The anecdote merely emphasizes the fact that skill in speech is a special characteristic of many people and entirely absent in others. The human infant begins to make itself heard promptly after birth and from that time onward responds voluntarily to all sorts of conditions. An investigation of children by Margaret G. Blanton revealed the fact that children vary during the first 30 days of life in the way they cry, the sounds they make and the way the sounds continue.

Getting an Early Start

After infancy, according to the behaviorist John B. Watson, the child develops habits of a certain form of expression without, however, having any particular meanings attached to these forms. In a survey of the subject, Dr. John E. Anderson points out that investigators who have studied the early sounds of the child agree that during the first year it can make all of the sounds necessary for language, sometimes even as early as six months.

It is likely the sounds become a symbol for activities and experience before the child begins to talk.

After the first word is used new words are added slowly. Somewhere between 18 and 24 months, the child realizes that things have names and goes through a naming stage during which new words develop rapidly.

The major portions of language are developed early in childhood, so that by the age of six or seven, most of the characteristics of speech are developed. Before the child says a single word which has a meaning, he seems to understand the meaning of sounds that occur around him.

Many investigators have studied the vocabularies of children because the matter leads to the making of records. According to one investigator, a one-year-old child has an average vocabulary of seven words; an 18-month-old child, 71 words; and a two-year-old child, 320 words. Another investigator found three words as an average for a one-year-old child; 273 words for the two-year-old child; 866 words for the three-year-old child; 1540 words for the four-year-old child; 3072 words for the five-year-old child, and 2962 words for the six-year-old child.

Gets New Words Fast

Thus from the first to the sixth year it acquires from 300 to 600 words each year. Much depends on the way in which the study is made. If the child is presented with various objects and asked questions many more words are found in its general use than if a record is kept for its ordinary use of words day after day.

Another investigator found that at the completion of high school, children are able to use between 15,000 and 19,000 words. Another investigator found that a two-year-old child says from 475 words to 16,507 words a day, using about one-half of his total vocabulary. As the child grows older it uses more words, reaching as high as 15,000, using one-third of its vocabulary.

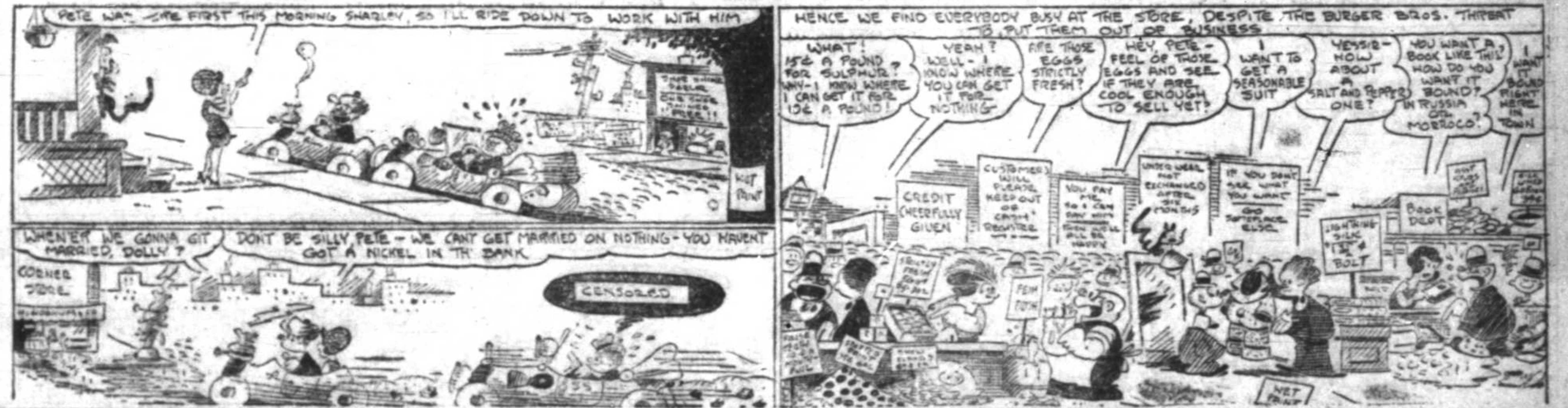

Case To Be Held In 72nd District Court Before Judge Homer L. Pharr; Survivors Seek Damages

With Judge Homer L. Pharr presiding, the trial of W. T. Strickel, Lubbock rancher, charged with murder in connection with the fatal shooting July 18 of Francisco Carrasco, 39, Mexican, will be called next Monday morning at Levelland.

After Justice of the Peace J. P. Taylor, of Morton, had ruled that the case was not ballable, Strickel obtained \$10,000 bond at a habeas corpus hearing in 72nd district court of this city on July 20. Attorneys for the state and defense had agreed on the bond, and following Justice Taylor's order that the defendant be removed to the Rockley county jail at Levelland, the case was appealed before Judge Pharr.

Shooting of the Mexican occurred at Strickel's Cochran county ranch. According to Strickel's explanation, the tragedy occurred following an altercation.

Subsequently, the relatives of Carrasco, the boy, mother and three children, filed a suit for \$50,000 damages against Strickel, the case resulting in a mistrial here three weeks ago. The jury failed to agree on the amount of damages.

New Road Between Lubbock And Gail Opens To Traffic

Previous Route Shortened By About 25 Miles; Wide Section Served By Newly Constructed Highway

Judge J. C. Grider, of Lynn county, has announced that a road, which shortens the route between Gail, Borden county, and Lubbock by about 25 miles, has been freshly constructed and is now open to traffic. The road connects with highway 83 eight miles west of Gail and runs north to Slaton.

From that point on 83 the road leads north over the caprock through the community of Tredway, Borden county, and Draw, Lynn county, continuing straight north through the eastern part of Lynn to intersect highway number 7 at a point between Slaton and Southland.

The road through Borden and Lynn counties serves a section of country nearly 50 miles wide, which hitherto did not have a good highway.

Work was started toward this accomplishment when about 50 men representing Lynn, Gaines, Borden and Lubbock counties met at O'Donnell.
